
SEMINOLE FIELD

Florida State's Baseball Facilities are among the very best in the nation. Three on campus diamonds, nine batting cages and several pitching mounds are available to keep even the largest squads busy.

Seminole Field, the main diamond and site of all Florida State home games, was one of the first on-campus college fields to have its own lights. Like the Seminole program in general it was a trend setter that many of the nation's schools are now following.

With seating for 3300 fans at Seminole Field, the game crowds are large, day and night.

The field itself is equal to the best triple A ball fields and better than most. The Florida State University Department of Grounds does an outstanding job keeping the field in tip-tip shape year round. The basepaths are clay and a clay warning track circles inside the fences.



1970 BASEBALL OUTLOOK

Like the plot of the "late show" westerns on television, Florida State's baseball outlook seems quite familiar, only the faces have changed.

During the decade past, Florida State had one of the nation's most successful college baseball programs. The Seminoles won 283 of 397 games, a winning percentage of .713, and went to the District III playoffs seven of the 10 years.

Coach Jack Stallings sees no reason for the '70s being any different. But the Seminole mentor certainly will have his work cut out for him—and this is where that "late show" plot begins to really look familiar.

Seven of the eight regulars from the Tribe's 1969 team are gone, including All-America second baseman Dick Gold who holds eight Tribe batting records. The entire infield was wiped out and the only outfielder returning, Dick Nichols, is expected to start at Gold's vacated second base spot.

The pitching corps faired better, however. True, it lost two of the top three from last year's starting rotation, but several good ones return, including Gene Ammann, Mike Slade, John Ferguson and Carl Gromek. Add to this group a trio of fine lefthanders from Manatee Junior College and you have the nucleus of what might be the toughest pitching corps in college baseball this spring. Of the newcomers Pat Osburn brings the most impressive credentials. A juco All-America last year, he pitched for the U.S.A. team in the World Amateur Baseball Championships in Santo Domingo. Mac Scarce was also a high draft choice, who turned down a good pro offer to pitch for the Tribe. Robin Flake missed the draft by three inches. This little lefty is just 5-8 and the scouts all agree that with three more inches he would be as good a major league prospect as there is going.

The catching chores were expected to be handled by John Keith, who played some last year, and juco transfer Harry Saferight, a teammate of Osburn and Co. at Manatee. A third mask has been tossed into the ring, however, as Dan Roatche, a sophomore who caught for the Renegade (B team) last year, has looked extremely impressive.

Another Manatee product (Stallings picked up six Lancers in all last spring), John Grub will anchor the vacated outfield. Fast, sure handed and an excellent hitter, he will start in center. The other two spots will go to two of three returnees. Greg Schnute a fine defensive outfielder could be a definite starter if he can be more productive at the plate. The other two, Mike Vasquez and Larry Cocks are converted infielders, but have experience in the outfield.

The infield will be manned for the most part by members of the Seminoles' strong "second" team of last year. Doug Kasimier, a lanky lefty, is a fine defensive first baseman and potentially a good hitter. All he should need is regular playing time which he will get this spring. Nichols, who moved to the outfield last year when he couldn't beat out Gold, is back at second. He was the team's leading hitter last year. Greg Gromek, brother of hurler Carl, is the leading shortstop candidate. Third base will be handled by Ron Cash, the sixth Manatee product.


JACK STALLINGS Head Baseball Coach

One of the nation's most successful and highly respected coaches, Jack Stallings enters his second season as the Tribe's head coach.

The Durham, N.C. native served as head coach at Wake Forest University for nine years before assuming the Florida State position in January, 1969. At Wake Forest he led his teams to a 152-109-2 record, including two Atlantic Coast Conference Championships, a pair of District Three titles and strong showings in the College World Series.

In his first year with the Seminoles he led the Tribe to a 38-13 record, including a record equalling 21-game winning streak. The 1969 Seminoles placed two men on the first team District Three squad and had one first team All-America.



The energetic Stallings is a keen baseball tactician and his on the field capabilities are unsurpassed. His teams are marked by their sound fundamentals and they seldom beat themselves with mistakes. The early preseason workouts are liberally sprinkled with classroom "skull" sessions as well as on the field workouts.

For years the Seminoles "do it the way the pros do" style has been a

For years the Seminoles "do it the way the pros do" style has been a trademark, and Stallings continues to emphasize this point. "We want the same caliber player that the pros are seeking," he says. "And most of our kids will go into the pro ranks when they finish their varsity careers. There is no reason that we can't start them getting used to what they will face later."

A former pro himself, he has made many friends among the Southeastern and (through his long association in the Basin League) Midwestern pro scouts. The scouts, who are also very much aware of Florida State's long time outstanding reputation, never hesitate to recommend the Seminole program to a high school prospect.

Stalling's promising pro career was cut short by a polio attack in 1954. Although he recovered fully, he turned his attention to coaching where he has been ever since. He played his college ball at Wake Forest, where he captained the Deacon's 1951 team that represented the United States in the Pan American games. He signed a pro contract in 1952. He returned to Wake Forest in 1955, to complete his bachelors degree. The following season he was at North Carolina, where he was an assistant coach while working on his masters. After two years as head coach of the Hanes High School team in Winston-Salem, he returned to Wake Forest as an assistant. In 1959 he became head coach of the Deacons.

Since 1962 Stallings has spent his summers in Pierre, S.D. where he coaches that city's entry in the Basin League.

He is married to the former Norma Dean Griffin and they are the parents of three sons.

ASSISTANT COACHES

Bob Smith—One of the most successful small college coaches in the country, Bob Smith joins Coach Jack Stallings this year, while taking a leave of absence from Greenville College in Illinois.

A graduate of Greenville, he received his Masters from Southern Illinois and is working on his doctorate at Florida State. His lifetime coaching record at Greenville and Taylor Universities is 160-69. Last season after posting a 21-5 record he was named the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) "Baseball Coach of the Year."

The Dallas, Texas native will be chiefly responsible for the Seminoles' Renegade team.


He is married and he and his wife Joanna have two children.

SEMINOLES IN THE PROS

Florida State's baseball program continues to be one of the nation's leading producers of professional baseball talent. In the last five years over 30 former Seminoles have gone on to professional baseball — several to the big leagues.

Dick Howser, an All-America for two seasons, became the Seminoles' first major league ball player in 1961. Signed in 1958 after an outstandint college career, he moved up with the Kansas City Athletics in '61. He not only won the American League Rookie of the Year Award, but also was named to the AL All-Star team. In 1963 Howser was traded to Cleveland and in '67 to the New York Yankees. He is now serving as a coach under manager Ralph Houk of the Yankees.

Woody Woodward, another Seminole All-America infielder, has been a big leaguer almost since he left the Florida State campus. After a brief stay in triple A ball, Woodward joined the then Milwaukee Braves in 1963. Two years ago he was traded to Cincinnati.




