All requests for working press, radio, television, photography or scouting credentials should be made to either Wayne Hogan, Sports Information Director, or Dan Pearson, Assistant Director, at least one week prior to game day.

WORKING MEDIA — Working media will be admitted to Seminole Field and seated in the press box. Additional seating will be provided in the grandstand if overflow conditions exist. Credentials not mailed may be picked up at the will call window prior to the start of the game.

PHOTOGRAPHERS — Accredited photographers may shoot along proper locations on foul line. No freelance photographers will be allowed on field.

TELEVISION — Space will be reserved for network and local brandcasts of FSU baseball.


RADIO — Sections are reserved for FSU and visiting radio in the press box. Florida State grants broadcast rights on a reciprocal basis with visiting clubs,

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### Florida State University: The Best in College Baseball

Few baseball teams have had the success the Florida State program has maintained since 1948.

But this is no surprise to the people closely associated to the college baseball scene. Long a dominant force in not only the entire south but from coast to coast, the Seminoles annually live up to the reputation of the "Best in College Baseball."

Florida State's most recent trip to the College World Series in 1980 marked the seventh time in the school's history that the Seminoles made it to the final eight of the prestigious national tournament. Only five other teams have ever made it to the CWS that many times.

Added to that impressive mark, Florida State has played in an unbelievable 20 NCAA regional tournaments, despite only playing baseball as a varsity sport for 35 years. Included in this mark is five straight appearances in the regionals dating back to 1978.

A tribute to Florida State's baseball program is its overall record since the inaugural season in 1948. Despite playing highly competitive schedules year in and year out, Florida State has compiled an overall record of 1060 wins, 423 losses and seven ties; good for a winning percentage of .714. Of FSU's 1060 wins, 55 have came in either NCAA regional or College World Series Play. Only two other teams in college baseball have more wins in championship play.

Many former Florida State players have gone on to play professional baseball. Six former Seminoles off the 1982 team signed professional contracts, bringing the Seminole total of professional signees since 1966 to 82.

Florida State's baseball excellence is recognized around the country. Many future Seminoles are recommended to FSU coaches who have said "if there is a boy who is determined to get an education before turning pro we enthusiastically encourage him to consider Florida State. He is going to get as much or more experience and training at FSU as he will anywhere else in the country." High school and junior college coaches from around the country recognize this. It's reflected in a Florida State roster that is often dotted with players from many different regional sectors.

For the Tribe baseball player, baseball is a year round season. The mild Florida State winters make it possible for the Seminoles to practice in year round comfort.

Following completion of a 70 game season, FSU players have the option of staying in Tallahassee in the summer and playing for Jerry's Caterers, the FSU summer league team that plays a 45-game schedule. Once the fall semester begins, the Tribe plays 30 informal games during the warm autumn months. Homecoming concludes with the annual "Old Timer's Game" between the current Seminoles and great players from the past. During the 1982 game, several former Seminole All-Americans, including San Diego Padre stars Terry Kennedy and Juan Bonilla made the trip to Tallahassee for the game. Kansas City manager and former Tribe player and coach Dick Howser stopped by to help coach the alumni.

In all, a Seminole player can expect an opportunity to participate in 140 games over the course of a year. During the off season, the Florida State players are given the opportunity to work in a conditioning program that is considered as good as any in the country in terms of both facilities and instruction.

With Tallahassee being in a direct line with the major league training camps in Florida and the northern major league cities, it is not unusual for many professional players to stop by during the January pre-season workouts for the Seminoles and offer a few tips to the Seminole coaches and players.

Even without this "bonus" coaching, the Florida State coaching staff offers a player some of the best tutoring anywhere.

When the regular season ends, several players may elect to play summer ball elsewhere. In addition to summer leagues and semi-pro teams all over the country, several Seminoles are usually selected to play on U.S. All-Star teams that literally tour the world. Mike Yastrzemski, a senior on the 1983 FSU team toured Holland this past summer on one such all-star team.

An opportunity to play baseball year round does not mean Florida State is not interested in the academic side of collegiate life. FSU coaches put heavy emphasis on the recruitment of players that are seriously interested in obtaining a college education. Florida State employs a full-time academic advisor whose sole concern is to help the student athlete make progress towards a college degree. If the student-athlete needs help in scheduling, tutoring or other special help, someone is there to help.

As Florida State head coach Mike Martin explains "While one of our goals is to develop a player to his full potential, we are more concerned that the player reaches his full potential as a person in society. We want our players to graduate and we will assist them in anyway possible to help them towards that goal."

Keeping with the tradition that Florida State is truly a first class program, it is not surprising to learn that the baseball facilities are nothing short of impressive.

Seminole Field, the home of the FSU baseball team, is often praised by visiting players and coaches as the finest natural turf they have ever seen or played on. The permanent concrete light standards support a lighting system as fine as any, college or pro. This system makes night games a popular attraction in Tallahassee on warm spring nights.

In addition to a pro style scoreboard and public address system, the Seminole Field facilities recently underwent a \$1 million renovation that included replacing FSU's bleacher seating with a new 2,000 seat grand-stand featuring theater type chairs. An additional 3,000 seats, made of aluminum, were added as well as a new press box. New concession stands and restroom facilities were installed for maximum fan comfort.

Under the supervision of grounds crew leader Robert Barrett, the Tribe is fortunate to have two full diamonds and an additional practice field at its disposal. Several pro-style batting cages, a jugs speed gun, several pitching machines and numerous pitching mounds give Florida State baseball facilities a major league look.

A training program, under the direction of the legendary Don Fauls, insures that Florida State baseball players receive the finest athletic training care available.

If playing before enthusiastic fans, and plenty of them, is important to the perspective player, Florida State offers the answer. Last season saw over 65,000 fans flock to Seminole field to watch the Tribe play. Averaging over 1,400 for all games, Florida State partisans often filled Seminole field to capacity when nationally-ranked competition came to town. Fan support did not stop at home games. Large groups of FSU supporters often follow the Tribe on the road, with several throngs of Seminole followers making the trips to Atlanta, Clemson and Miami to watch their battling Noles play. Over 100,000 people saw Seminole baseball in 1982.

Media attention towards Florida State baseball is high. Seminole baseball is front page news in the city and is covered on a regular basis in the state's major newspapers. Several Seminole games are seen on local cable, and ESPN, the national sports channel, has been no stranger to Seminole Field. WTNT, one of the most popular radio stations in Tallahassee and surrounding areas, carries a full slate of Seminole games live. Tallahassee's television stations often carry Florida State baseball as their lead stories following games.

It is little wonder that Florida State is the envy and model of most college baseball programs. In terms of facilities, fan support, and successes on the field, Florida State lives up to it's billing as the best in college baseball.

### **FSU in Championship Play**

With an appearance in the 1982 NCAA Central Regional Tournament, Florida State continued its record as one of the top teams in college baseball. Although playing baseball for only 35 years, Florida State has earned berths in the NCAA playoffs a total of 20 times.

During that championship span, Florida State has won seven regional championships and placed second twice. In its seven trips to the College World Series, the Seminoles have placed fourth once and took the runnerup spot in 1970.

Florida State's 55 wins in NCAA Championship play is the third best of any team in the country and only six other teams in the country can match FSU's seven trips to Omaha.




### **World Series Honor Roll**

### MIKE MARTIN Head Coach

With 163 wins in only three years at the helm, Mike Martin is well on his way to establishing himself as the winningest coach in Florida State baseball history.

In just three seasons as the Seminole head coach, Martin has continued to maintain and improve Florida State's image as one of the finest baseball schools in the country.

Under Martin, the Tribe has compiled an impressive 163-52-1 record—including three consecutive seasons of 50 or more wins. Included in the record has been two Metro Conference Championships, three trips to the NCAA Regional tournament, a Regional Championship and an appearance in the College World Series.

Martin's work was recognized several times, with his selection as Coach of the Year in the Metro Conference in both 1980 and 1981. The Diamond Club voted him similar honors in his first campaign with FSU.

When Florida State tabbed Martin as its head coach on November 27, 1979, it selected a coach that brought a wealth of baseball experience to the position. Martin served as an assistant at Florida State for four seasons, starting under Woody Woodward in 1975 and later under former FSU head coach and now Kansas City Royal manager Dick Howser in 1979.

Prior to becoming an assistant at FSU, Martin spent several years coaching two sports at both the collegiate and high school ranks. His record included serving several years as baseball and basketball coach at the junior high level, a year as the head basketball coach at Tallahassee Community College, and finally four years as a basketball coach at Tallahassee's Godby High School.

Martin was a standout baseball player at Wingate Junior College, earning All-American honors two consecutive years. From there, Martin went on to earn all-district honors at Florida State for two years as an outfielder.

Following his collegiate career, Martin went on to play three years in the professional ranks, first with the New York Met organization and later with the Detroit Tigers before returning to Tallahassee to teach and coach.

A popular speaker, as well as a coach, Martin has spoken at national and state meetings including appearances at the Florida High School Coaches Clinic, the North Carolina Coaches Clinic, and the Atlanta Braves Instructional Clinics. Martin is also in demand as a featured speaker with the Seminole Boosters, having given numerous talks to Booster Clubs in Tallahassee, Jacksonville, Ft. Lauderdale and Miami.

A 1966 graduate of Florida State, Martin earned his master's degree from Florida A & M in 1971. Mike and his wife Carol are the parents of three children, Mary Beth 13, Mike Jr. 10 and Melanie 7.

### RANDY GAILEY Assistant Coach

Randy Gailey begins his second season as chief assistant to head coach Mike Martin. Gailey was named assistant on July 16, 1981 when former FSU aide Jim Morris resigned to accept the head coaching job at Georgia Tech.

As assistant coach, Gailey is mainly responsible for coaching the pitchers and serving as a hitting instructor with the Seminoles. In addition to several administrative duties, Gailey also heads up Jerry's Caterers, Florida State's summer league baseball team.


Gailey joined the Tribe from South Georgia Junior College, where he served as head coach from 1980 through 1981. During his two year stint at South Georgia JC, Gailey was credited with rebuilding the Tiger baseball team. As skipper, he led the junior college to a fine 59-27 record.


A 1973 graduate of Florida State University, Gailey was the starting left fielder from 1971-73. Following graduation, Gailey immediately entered the coaching profession, serving as head baseball coach and assistant football coach at Fernandina Beach High School, where he was named Coach of the Year in both 1976 and 1977.

It was at Fernandina that Gailey helped develop former Florida State quarterback Rick Stockstill.

Gailey left the prep ranks in 1977 to work on a master's degree at Georgia Southern College. He spent two years in the Eagle program as assistant baseball coach before leaving to take the head job at South Georgia College.

Gailey and his wife Leslie are the parents of three children.





### DAVE FANNIN Assistant Coach


David Fannin enters his third season as assistant coach at Florida State. During that time period, Fannin has proved to be a valuable member of coach Martin's staff.

Fannin's responsibilities with the Sem-

inoles include instructing the hitters and catchers, charting opponent's defenses, scouting and over seeing the management of all equipment. In addition, the popular 27-year-old coach heads up the Seminole recruiting.

Previous coaching experience includes six years as coach of Tallahassee's Post 13 Legion team from 1975-81. During that time period, Fannin has seen over 50 of his former players go on to play at the collegiate level.

A graduate of Leon High School in 1973, Fannin was an outstanding high school and collegiate catcher before a knee injury cut short his playing career.




### MIKE McLEOD Assistant Coach

Mike McLeod is in his second year as pitching instructor at Florida State. A former Seminole pitcher in the mid 70s, McLeod brings a wealth of both playing and coaching experience to the Seminole program.

During the past three summers, McLeod served as pitching instructor for the New York Yankees farm team in Paintsville, Kentucky. An oustanding pitcher at Middle Georgia Junior College, where he earned All-American honors, McLeod went on to play at FSU from 1975-77.

Following graduation, McLeod went on to play three seasons in the New York Yankee organization before accepting the coaching job in Paintsville.



### GREG JONES Assistant Coach


A former Seminole player and a native of Tallahassee, Greg Jones is in his first year on the Seminole coaching staff. Jones fills the vacancy created when part-time assistant Joe McFarland resigned to become assistant coach at Georgia Tech.


A former standout athlete at Godby High School, Jones came to FSU on a football scholarship before turning his full attention to baseball. Playing under former FSU head coach Woody Woodward, Jones played seven positions in one season for the Seminoles. His most productive offensive year was 1978, when he hit .258 with five doubles and 10 RBIs.



### JEFF O'NEIL Trainer

A native of Miami, Fla., FSU senior Jeff O'Neil begins his first season with the Seminole baseball team. Majoring in physical education, O'Neil has been involved in the Seminole training program for three years under famed Seminole trainer Don Fauls.





1983 Outlook

### 1983: A New Look

Last season Florida State possessed one of the most feared offensive machines in college baseball. In winning 56 games in 74 attempts against a great schedule, the Tribe literally clubbed opponents to defeat.

Although Florida State had fair pitching and defense, the Seminoles rarely had to rely on those aspects of the game because it was averaging over 10 runs per game.

But last season was a senior dominated team. With the graduation of sluggers Jeff Ledbetter, Chris Cawthon, Mark Lacy and Hal Cohen, the Seminoles will be losing a lot of their fire power. The four players above combined last year to give the Tribe a total 94 home runs and 337 RBIs.

With this offensive production loss, the 1983 Seminoles will have to make up for it in the areas of team speed, using the hit and run, getting timely pitching and playing good defense. No longer will the Seminoles be thought of as just a power hitting ball club.

"The move away from power was not made by design but rather by necessity," Florida State head coach Mike Martin says. "When you graduate the power we had last year alternatives had to be found. We tried to recruit more power to fill in the gap but let's face it. When your talking about replacing players like Jeff Ledbetter (42 home runs, 124 RBIs) or Chris Cawthon (26 home runs, 103 RBIs), your talking about trying to find replacements for guys that don't come around too often. In Jeff's case, your talking about trying to find a replacement for a player that may never come along again."

One area where the Seminoles must show steady improvement in is the pitching department. Led by departed seniors Jay Keeler (10-2, 3.00 ERA) and Tim Phillips (11-4, 3.98 ERA), FSU's staff compiled a respectable 4.18 ERA. Despite the loss of Keeler, Phillips, Jeff Ledbetter (10-1), and Jamey Shouppe (7-3), who are all now in the professional ranks, the Seminoles have the potential to be as strong as last season in the pitching department.

Jeff Gray, a junior finesse righthander, returns as the Seminole top starting pitcher. In 1982, Gray compiled a 8-2 record with a 3.06 ERA—tops among returning letter winners. Hard throwing newcomer Doug Little, along with fellow all-state selection Buddy Shaw, was recruited in hopes of finding replacements for the departed senior starters. With a year's experience under his belt, sophomore Bruce Tanner may step forward to help shore up the FSU pitching staff.

Sophomore flame thrower Todd Morgan (2-2 record, 44 K's) will be the Tribe's top short relief specialist; with senior David Smalley being used in primarily a long relief role.





Florida State will have both experience and depth at the catching position. Danny Dowell hit .285 last season in 60 games and returns as the starter at catcher. Freshman all-state recruit Tom Zoeller and freshman Vince Insogna will battle for backup duties behind Dowell. Senior Billy Ashford (.306, 28 RBIs), Dowell's principle backup last season, will be used regularly as a utility player in the coming season. "We expect to use Billy in several positions, not just catcher," Martin says. "We feel this will be the best way to give Vince and Tom experience, but at the same time it will allow us to keep Billy's valuable bat in the lineup."

Florida State's infield will be blessed with both talent and depth. The Tribe's third leading hitter from a season ago, Rick Figueredo (.354, 59 RBIs), moves from third base to first for the 1983 campaign. The move was made to allow Florida State to use talented sophomore Danny Griffin at third. Figueredo will be backed up by sophomore Jimmy Jones. A native of Langley, Va., Jönes will also be used as a designated hitter in 1983. Jones belted five home runs and hit .289 in backing up Mark Lacy last season.

Orson Mobley, Florida State's mammoth 6-6, 270-lb. football tightend will also join the Tribe this season at firstbase. Mobley hit .375 in 10 games last season before making the shift to spring football practice.

At second base, Florida State is fortunate to return both Matt Robinson and Bart Mitchell. Robinson, a senior, was described as having the "best hands in collegiate baseball," by Martin last season. Both Mitchell and Robinson played solid defense for Florida State last season and also helped out at the plate by combining for a .271 average.

In another major shakeup, returning shortstop Mark Barineau has been moved to the outfield to make room in the lineup for junior college transfer Jody Reed. Playing for Manatee JC during the past two seasons, Reed earned all-state honors both his freshman and sophomore years. A product of Brandon High School, Reed was drafted on two occasions. In January of 1982, Reed turned down an offer from the Texas Rangers and later turned down a contract from the San Francisco Giants, who drafted Reed in the first round of the June summer draft.

Danny Griffin, who hit .353 in 32 games last season, heads the list of candidates at third base. A solid player, Griffin should see considerable more action this year after sustaining several injuries last year. Freshman Tommy Bryant, an all-state player from Caldwell, New Jersey, and Ashford will also see playing time at third.

Steve Givens, an all-around athlete who hit .354 last season while playing mainly at third base, enters the 1983 eason as the starting leftfielder. Givens came on strong at the end of last season to hit .500 (10 for 20) over the last three weeks of the season.

Frank Fazzini, who led the state of New Jersey in hitting as a junior, will battle Givens for playing time in left field.

Barineau enters the season as Florida State's leading contender for the starting position in center field. With the help of great speed (led team with 36 stolen bases), Barineau is expected to make the transition with little problem. All-state selection Alan Gentry from Utah will provide quality depth to the Seminoles at this position.

Right field finds "No. 8" Mike Yastrzemski returning. A fine defensive outfielder, Yaz also added power to the Seminoles last season by batting .288 with nine home runs and 61 RBIs.

Walk-on Eric Deddens, who impressed coaches during fall ball with both glove and bat, will provide backup help for Yastrzemski.

The 1982 Seminoles will need all the depth and experience they have as they prepare to face one of the toughest, if not the toughtest schedule, in college baseball.

The Tribe will play a minimum of 19 games against teams that made it to the NCAA Tournament last season — including six games against defending national champion Miami.


Florida State will also face national powers Clemson, Nevada-Las Vegas, Wake Forest and LSU this season. Not counting the Metro Conference Tournament, Florida State plays 72 games, with 70 contests, coming against division one competition.

"I'll match our schedule against any team in the country in terms of quality opponents," Martin says. "We play at least four teams that made it to the NCAA tournament last year, and at least eight other teams that are no stranger to tournament play."

While a tough schedule may help prepare his squad for the all-important Metro Tournament, Martin worries about pressures that could hurt his young team. "We're going to be playing a lot of young kids," Martin says. "It's important that they realize that we may not win as many as we did last year. They cannot let a loss effect their play the next day, because if they do, it will hurt us."

One thing that Martin is planning on to prevent any letdown is help from his seniors. "We have to have guys like Yaz and Rick Figueredo and Danny Dowell take control of this club from a leadership stand point. These players have been with our program for four years and know what it takes to win. If they can instill that desire on our younger players, this team will be tough this season and at the same time build momentum for future years."





1982 Review

### 1982: An Explosive Year

The 1982 Seminoles will go down in collegiate baseball history as one of the most explosive teams of all times. If not for anything else, FSU earned the respect of all opponents for their ability to score runs, and lots of them.

Evidence to this claim is undeniable. In 1982, the Seminoles set or tied 26 team records and 27 individual records on their way to compiling an impressive 56-17-1 record.

It is not surprising that many of the records set came in the form of offensive records. Boasting a lineup that included six .300 hitters and an overall team batting average of .327, FSU set school marks in hits (839), runs scored (752), doubles (159), RBIs (658) and total bases (1457).

FSU finished the campaign averaging over 10 runs per contest, while scoring 15 or more runs in 16 different ball games.

But no review of Florida State's season can be made without mentioning the exploits of Jeff S. Ledbetter in the same breath. The two-time All-American and *Sporting News* Player of the Year rewrote every power hitting record in existence.


In leading FSU to a new collegiate home run hitting record of 131 in a season, Ledbetter accounted for almost a third of the total with 42 round trippers. This total is not only remarkable in number, but also in stature when one realizes that the old record was 29. Ledbetter's career mark of 97 is 33 more than the old record of 64.

With 344 career RBIs, including 122 this past season, Ledbetter went on to break almost every Florida State offensive record.

Ledbetter's year totally overshadowed the fine seasons that several teammates enjoyed. Chris Cawthon's All-American statistics of 26 home runs and 103 RBIs were almost ignored by the Ledbetter infatuated media.

Mark Lacy added 18 home runs and had a school record eight straight hits at one point this season. Rick Figueredo (.354), Mark Barineau (.333) and Hal Cohen (.332), all had outstanding years at the plate.

But outstanding individual efforts was not the whole story. Florida State managed to win games by playing as a unit. After rolling up a 7-0 record by outscoring opponents 115-15 early in the season, the Seminoles suffered an embarrassing 21-5 defeat at the hands of Georgia. Rather than falling apart, the Seminoles came together to roll up 15 straight wins and earn a number four national ranking with a 22-1 record.



Midseason saw the Seminoles hit a series of peaks and valleys.

The Tribe took three out of four from arch rival Florida, but lost a pair of identical 12-6 decisions on the road to Jacksonville. Taking advantage of some clutch hitting and timely pitching, FSU then won 13 of its next 15, beating Virginia Tech and Miami two out of three, before sweeping Clemson on the road in two straight.

FSU encountered its roughest period following the Clemson-Georgia State road trip. The Tribe dropped four out of its next nine ball games — splitting with Jacksonville at home, before losing three of five in a road trip to Memphis State and Auburn.

Bouncing back has been a trademark of the '82 Seminoles all season and despite the losses, FSU was able to shake out of it to win eight in a row and 13 of their last 15 games to take a 51-13-1 record into the Metro Tournament.


After winning the first game over Cincinnati by a 10-2 count, Florida State ran into a hot pitcher in Memphis State's Tim Corder and lost a narrow 4-2 decision. FSU fought valiantly in the loser's bracket to win three straight, including a 2-1 decision over Virginia Tech and a 7-6 win over Memphis State, before falling to Tulane in the championship round by an 11-7 count.

After receiving an at-large bid to the NCAA Central Regional Tournament, the Seminoles were stymied by a strong Eastern Michigan team in the first game, 7-2. The Seminoles fought back in the loser's bracket to eliminate Ohio State, 8-3. Florida State's hopes of a trip to the College World Series ended the next game, however, when Oklahoma turned back a strong comeback bid to drop the Seminoles, 7-6.

Although Florida State did not reach their goal of a trip to the College World Series, the 1982 season was anything but a failure. The Seminoles did manage to reach heights that were never accomplished before by any Tribe team.

The squad's 50 regular season wins was a Florida State first. Its NCAA record 131 home runs may never be reached again. NCAA national champion Miami could only win two of six games against the Seminoles. National powers Clemson, Florida, Virginia Tech and Tulane all lost regular season series to Florida State.

As Florida State head coach Mike Martin puts it "College baseball may never see a power hitting team like 1982 Seminoles again."


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

### Metro Conference

Formed in 1975, the Metro Conference has emerged after seven years as one of the top collegiate conferences in the country.

Larry Albus envisioned the formation of the conference while he was athletic director at the University of St. Louis. His dream became reality in 1975 when six schools — Cincinnati, Georgia Tech, Louisville, Memphis State, St. Louis and Tulane — announced that they would become members of the conference.

Under Albus, the Metro quickly became a force to be reckoned with on the collegiate athletic scene. When Louisville won the NCAA basketball championship in 1980, the Metro became the first conference to boast an NCAA basketball champion in its first five years of existence.

The conference quickly grew in prestige. Florida State entered the conference as an additional member in 1976. When Georgia Tech resigned its membership in 1978, Virginia Tech quickly joined.

A new look came to the Metro when St. Louis resigned at the conclusion of the 1981-82 school year and was replaced with strong southern independent Southern Mississippi.

Although considered a top flight basketball conference, the Metro holds championships in six men's sports and three women's sports. Baseball is given special attention, as members Florida State, Memphis State, Virginia Tech and Tulane are no strangers to national rankings and the NCAA tournament.

Since 1978, the winner of the Metro Conference has received an automatic bid to the NCAA tournament; and the selection of an at-large team is not uncommon.

In 1982, Tulane won its second Metro Conference title by beating Florida State 11-7 in the championship round. Prior conference winners included Florida State (1981, 1980, 1977), Tulane (1979) and Memphis State (1978, 1976).

Tallahassee has been selected again as the tournament site for the Metro Conference Spring Sports Championships. In addition to baseball, FSU will serve as the host site for conference championships in golf and track and field.





## A Pipeline to the Pros

Perhaps no institution in America has provided a pipeline to professional baseball as Florida State has. A total of 83 Seminoles have signed major league contracts since 1966.

The 1982 season was no different, as six Seminoles joined the pro ranks. NCAA all-time homerun king Jeff Ledbetter headed the list by being drafted in the first round by the Boston Red Sox. Chris Cawthon, Jay Keeler, Jamey Shouppe, Tim Phillips and Allen Swindle also signed contracts and are currently working in the minor leagues.

Former Seminoles Terry Kennedy and Juan Bonilla recently led San Diego to its

best finish ever in the National League's western division; while former Florida State player and head coach Dick Howser took Kansas City to a western division championship in the American League in 1981. John Grubb, Craig Skok, Ron Cash, Rick Langford, Mac Scarce, Woody Woodward, Danny O'Brien all have seen major league experience.

Almost 20 former Seminoles are still active in professional baseball. With this deep baseball tradition, it is not surprising to find the current Seminole rosters dotted with a dozen players that have been drafted professionally at one time or another but have decided to play college baseball first.

Florida State has had two or more former players sign professional contracts every year since 1968. In 1977, 11 Seminoles off of that 37-13 NCAA Regional qualifying team inked professional contracts.

FSU, which holds an excellent reputation among professional baseball administrators, is often recommended to younger players as an excellent place for additional seasoning. A large contingent of scouts see every Florida State game.

This tradition of college-professional transition started at Florida State in 1961 when former Seminole All-American Howser broke into the major leagues with Kansas City. He made an immediate impression by winning the American League Rookie of the Year Award.

Howser, John Grubb and Terry Kennedy hold the distinction of being three Seminoles to have played in a major league all-star game; while Woody Woodward, a former big league player and now an administrator in the Cincinnati Reds organization, and Rick Langford each played in a World Series.

## **Seminoles Who Made It** To The Professional Ranks

Success does not alway stop at the collegiate ranks for many Seminole players. Many go on to the minor league or major league level. Since 1966, 82 Seminoles have gone on to sign professional contracts and play baseball at either the major or minor league level.

Several are still active in the major leagues. Dick Howser (manager-Kansas City), Woody Woodward (GM-Cincinnati), Terry Kennedy (San Diego), Juan Bonilla (San Diego), Rick Langford (Oakland) are just a few of the Seminoles still active in major league baseball.



To say that Jeff Ledbetter had an outstanding year in 1982 would be the understatement of all time. The senior from Largo, Fla. set varsity records in just about every category available.

In addition, Ledbetter set NCAA records for home runs in a season (42), home runs in a career (97), home runs in a game (4), RBIs in a career (346), most total bases in season (273) and most total bases in career (346). His .875 slugging percentage for the 1982 season is a new NCAA record provided it recognizes a new 200+ at-bats category.

Ledbetter capped off the 1982 season by being named All-Metro, All-Metro Tournament, Metro Player of the Year, All-American, and Sporting News Player of the Year. He was drafted in the first round by the Boston Red Sox.



## Seminole Field: Both Old and New

While new homes are often a source of pride for their owners, so is New Seminole Field a source of pride for the Florida State baseball team.

With the help of a \$1 million facility improvement grant to Florida State University, Seminole Field has undergone a major renovation. By the advent of the 1983 season, FSU will offer not only one of the finest natural playing surfaces in the country, but will also offer baseball fans a new stadium that was designed for maximum fan comfort.

In essence, all the excellent aspects of Seminole Field were left in tact. Under the watchful eye of head groundskeeper Robert Barrett, the Seminole Field playing surface was only changed slightly to level off several low spots. Despite the heavy surrounding construction, the infield surface and bermuda grass outfield remained in excellent shape.

Florida State's facility will still feature metal hyliade 1500 watt lights mounted on concrete standards surrounding the field. An eight foot wall surrounds the stadium and will still measure 321 to right, 411 to center and 340 to left. A major league scoreboard mounted on standards past the left field wall will keep fans posted to important information; as will its high quality public address system.

While the excellent playing surface remains unchanged, fans and media will notice a huge difference in Seminole Field. The old wooden stands, once a trademark of the stadium, have been replaced by a 2,000 seat grandstand that will feature theater type seats.

In addition, the right field bleachers have been upgraded to aluminum bleachers and will increase in number to 3,000 available seats. Permanent seating will increase to 5,000; with an easy add on expansion feature if needed in the future.

Restroom and concession facilities will be added as part of the grandstand complex, to give new Seminole Field a major league look.

A lounge area, new visitor and home dugout facilities and a large equipment storage area will give additional class to the facility. Media members which cover Florida State's baseball team will be impressed with its new pressbox facility. A more spacious working area, that will feature a better view of the entire playing surface, will replace former small wooden pressbox that used to be situated over the third base dugout. Several viewing windows situated behind home plate will aid in television broadcasts of Seminole baseball.

### Seminole Baseball on WTNT

Six games with the University of Miami, three games against Tulane and the Metro Conference tournament highlight a list of 43 games to be aired this season on Tallahassee's sports station — WTNT (1270 AM).

Popular sports personality Rod Meadows will call the play-by-play with expert color commentary provided by Jim Crosby and Wayne Hogan.

Included in the broadcasts will be the Mike Martin Show, a 15 minute pregame slot where Meadows will talk to the FSU head coach on the 1983 Seminoles and the upcoming opponent. Player interviews will also be an important part of both the pre and post game shows.

In addition, WTNT will carry three inning updates of all other Florida State baseball games not being carried live.

Other series games to be carried live include matchups with Southern Mississippi, South Florida, Florida, Wake Forest, Louisville, LSU, Jacksonville, Mercer, Memphis State and Southwest Louisiana.

"WTNT is extremely pleased to bring this schedule to the Tallahassee listening audience," station manager Meadows said. "I believe this is not only the most Florida State games ever broadcast but is also the best schedule ever broadcast."

In addition to the regular season schedule and Metro Tournament, WTNT will also carry any subsequent NCAA Regional or World Series action that Florida State would qualify for.





The University

### This is Florida State



Florida State University—the home of more than 22,500 Seminoles—has a campus that starts at the top of one of Tallahassee's famed seven hills, and rolls gently downward and westward across 340-odd acres of pines, palms and pecan trees.

Founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, its heritage is evidenced in the wide range of architectural struggles to preserve

history and keep up with modern times and air conditioning. Yet it still ranks as one of the South's last, few bastions of campus greenery — the kind that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods with moss-hung oaks that are, in some cases, as old as the University itself, if not older.

From the Gothic towers of Westcott at the eastern entrance to the campus, to the modern glass and steel structures of its Science Complex to the west, Florida State University has moved forward in time and growth more rapidly than many of its newer counterparts in the State University System. Its enrollment has quadrupled since it became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as the Florida State College for Women.

Today, its 14 schools and colleges are spread through \$150 million worth of buildings, its annual budget exceeds \$100 million and it attracts more than \$18 million a year in research contracts and grants. Students can pick and choose from more than 100 career options offered in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, dance, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater and visual arts programs.

The location of FSU in the Capitol City of Florida offers unusual opportunities for study



and research in the social and policy sciences, and an optimum environment for internships and on-the-job learning experiences for students in many fields of study.

A city within a city, Florida State has 1,200 faculty members, more than 6,000 additional employees and a construction program that will exceed \$50 million before the end of 1981.



### Dr. Bernard F. Sliger President

Dr. Bernard F. Sliger doesn't fit the stereotype of the ethereal, pipe-smoking academic. Almost everyone who's ever dealt with him calls him "Bernie";

he's down-to-earth, personable and by his own admission, "not tough enough" when it comes to handling personnel.

This year, the Florida Board of Regents gave Sliger an "outstanding" evaluation after his first five years in office. Regents Chairman DuBose Ausley said Sliger has brought "a great sense of stability and purpose" to the University.

Sliger earned a Ph.D. in economics from Michigan State University. Prior to coming to Florida State, he worked 19 years as a professor and administrator at Louisiana Coordinating Council for Higher Education, of which he was executive director.

In 1972, Sliger joined the administrative team at FSU as executive vice president. He officially became the 10th president of Florida State on June 10, 1977.

One of Sliger's proudest accomplishments has been getting legislative approval for the FAMU/FSU Institute for Engineering which opens this fall. That was one of his goals when he became president.

His remaining goals include seeing the completion of the engineering program and obtaining a new science library.

Although Sliger gives academics top priority, he sees athletics as a vital aspect of FSU. He said, "The athletic program at Florida State University is a means of identification for Florida State and a rallying point for anyone connected in any way with the University, in addition to being an important source of outside giving."

Even with the time-consuming demands of a university president, Sliger finds time to participate in Florida State sports as, he terms it, "an energetic spectator."

But President Sliger is no newcomer to the athletic scene. During his high school days in his hometown of Trout Creek, Mich., he was a member of the basketball, track and football teams. Following a three-year tour of duty with the Army during World War II, Sliger returned to Trout Creek to teach math and coach the track and basketball teams.

"This year," Sliger said, "Florida State is celebrating its 125th birthday — more than 12 decades educating young people. First, they came just from the immediate environs; now we have students from every state and more than 100 foreign countries. I predict the next 25 years will see us growing even more in quality, taking our rightful place among the leading educational institutions in the United States. We have survived and thrived, developing from a tiny pre-Civil War seminary into a first rate university of which we can all be proud."

### Dr. James P. Jones Chairman, Faculty Athletic Committee

Dr. James P. Jones has been a member of the Florida State University History Department since 1957, and was named to chair that department in 1980. He received his B.A., M.A., and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Florida. Jones has served on the Athletic Board since 1973. He was chairman of the Board's Academic Sub-



committee until 1980 when he was named Board chairman. In this capacity he is the University's representative to the NCAA.

Jones is a historian of the American Civil War and has published five books and thirty-five articles on the history of 19th century America. He has also written on such sports subjects as minor league baseball, Hank Aaron and the Gator Bowl. Jones' work best known to fans of Seminole football is *FSU One Time! A History of Seminole Football*, published in 1973 and updated in 1974, '75 and '76.

## C.W. "Hootie" Ingram Athletic Director

C.W. "Hootie" Ingram is in his second year as Florida State's athletic director. He came to the post in 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeastern Conference.

Since coming to Florida State, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million building program for athletic facilities that will include

a new athletic administration building and improvements to the football stadium, baseball complex and swimming pool area.

Ingram had been associated with the SEC office for eight years. He was first an assistant commissioner before being named associate commissioner (1978).

A native of Tuscaloosa, Ala., the home of the University of Alabama, Ingram played football for the Crimson Tide from 1951 through 1954. He was all-SEC as a sophomore when he led the nation in pass interceptions. The '53 Alabama team played in the Orange Bowl and the '54 Squad in the Cotton Bowl. Ingram also lettered for the Tide in baseball as an infielder.

Afer an Army stint, Ingram turned to coaching. He started as an assistant at Bradenton (Fla.) Manatee High School and was later head coach at Tuscaloosa High School for three years.

He later moved into college coaching and had stops at Wake Forest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas as an assistant. His only college football head coaching assignment began in 1970 when he succeeded the veteran Frank Howard as head coach at Clemson. Three years later he joined the SEC as assistant commissioner.





### **Bob Goin** Associate Athletic Director

Bob Goin joined the Florida State staff as associate athletic director on July 1, 1981 after serving two years as athletic director at California (Pa.) State College.

Goin, who received a bachelor's degree from Bethany (1959) and master's at West Virginia (1962), has a background in both coaching and athletic administration. Prior to taking the California State post, he was assistant director of athletics at West

Virginia, Between 1960 and 1976 he served in various capacities at Bethany (W. Va.) College. Included among those duties were coaching responsibilities in football, basketball and baseball.

Immediately prior to moving to West Virginia, Goin served Bethany as associate professor and chairman of physical education and athletics. That assignment lasted for four years (1972-76). Goin was Bethany's head football coach between 1963 and 1972.

Goin was responsible for expanding the California athletic program. He formed the Cal State Athletic Scholarship Fund and Athletic Booster Club. He also developed a new office complex for coaches, helped equip a training room, exercise and weight training areas and renovated the football locker rooms.



## Claude Thigpen Assistant to the Director

Claude Thigpen has been a member of the Florida State athletic department staff for 27 years. He has been in his present position as assistant to the athletic director since 1978.

Prior to taking his present role in the athletic department, Thigpen served as athletic business manager, accountant and ticket manager for the Seminoles.

He currently supervises the entire ticket operation of all sports and is responsible for game day operations of all sports. He coordinates season ticket drives for football, basketball and baseball. In addition, Thigpen is responsible for the athletic department courtesy car program.

In the fall, Thigpen takes on the added duties of supervising the travel for the Florida State football team and its official party. This includes making hotel and airplane reservations for the group of 100 traveling with the Tribe.



## Larry Pendelton Assistant to the Director

Larry Pendleton, a member of the Seminole athletic family since 1973, is serving as assistant to the athletic director. Until July of 1980, he had been the academic advisor.

Pendleton's present role covers many areas within the athletic department. he is responsible for maintaining and scheduling of all the facilities in the athletic complex. Any building projects will be coor-

dinated and supervised by Pendleton.

His duties also include scheduling for the basketball team and aiding the coaching staff with its travel arrangements during the season. He is also responsible for management of the athletic department insurance programs.

Pendleton is in his eighth year as a full-time member of the Seminole staff. He returned to his alma mater in 1973 as a graduate assistant football coach and spent the '74 season as an assistant coach.

During 1975 and 76 he served solely as the academic advisor for the football squad. Those duties were expanded to include all athletes in 1977.



## Dennis Boyle Director of Marketing/Promotions

Dennis Boyle has been a member of the Florida State Athletic Department since August of 1980. As Director of Marketing and Promotions, it is Boyle's role to produce the Seminole Sports Network for football and basketball.

In addition, Boyle works in the promotional area to develop season ticket campaigns for all

sports teams. During the baseball campaign, Boyle is in charge of the outfield wall advertising, game programs advertising, and producing baseball radio and television broadcasts.

Popular Seminole baseball promotions such as "Wendy's Swinging Singles Inning Contest" are directed through Boyle.

Boyle graduated with a bachelor of science degree in mass communications in 1977 and later received his master's degree in 1978, both at Florida State.



## Wayne Hogan Sports Information Director

A former assistant at New Mexico, Wayne Hogan is in his first year as Sports Information Director at Florida State. As SID, Hogan is in charge of handling the publicity for all 16 varsity sports at Florida State.

In addition to being in charge of the Sports Information office, Hogan handles color com-

mentary for the Florida State basketball radio network and will work with WTNT's Rod Meadows in a similar capacity on Seminole Baseball broadcasts.

A native of Tallahassee, Hogan received his bachelor's degree in Communication from Florida State in 1979. Prior to his two year stint at New Mexico, Hogan worked two years in the minor league baseball scene, covering the Charleston Charlies (AA) in 1979 and the Albuquerque Dukes (AAA) in 1980.



# Dan Pearson Assistant Sports Information Director

Dan Pearson is in his second season working with the Florida State baseball team. In addition to other duties assigned by the director, Pearson works as chief public relations director for the Seminole baseball team and also fills the statistician role.

A 1979 graudate of West Virginia University, Pearson served three years at WVU as a student and then a graduate assistant. He moved to Tallahassee in 1981 as a part-time assistant before being elevated to assistant SID in September, 1982.
