


Rod Meadows, an old veteran of the Tallahassee sports scene, begins his sixth year as the "Voice of Seminole Baseball".

Mike Martin Head Coach

Now in his seventh year as head coach of Florida State, Mike Martin has established himself as one of the winningest coaches in all of college baseball. Under Martin, FSU has maintained its status as one of the top college baseball programs in the nation.

During the past six years, FSU has won 50 or more games six times, has collected five Metro Conference Championships, and has qualified for NCAA playoff competition all six years.

Martin's career coaching record reads 332 wins, 122 losses and 2 ties - good for a winning percentage of .7302.

Not only is Martin the winningest coach in the school's history, but one of the winningest in the country. His 332 career wins places him 82nd on the list of active coaches, but first among coaches with seven years experience or less. His winning percentage currently ranks him eighth in the nation; while his average wins of 55.3 per season is rivaled only by Wichita State's Gene Stephenson, who has won an average of 56.6 in his eight seasons of coaching.

Martin's work at Florida State has been recognized several times. In addition to numerous Coach of the Year awards from the Metro Conference, Martin was selected for similar honors from the Florida Diamond club. He also serves on the NCAA Championship Advisory Committee and is a voting member on several national polls.

When FSU selected Martin on November 27, 1979 to become the eighth Florida State head coach, it selected a man that possessed a wealth of baseball experience. For four years prior to taking the head job, Martin was an assistant to former head coaches Woody Woodward (1975-78) and Dick Howser (1979).

Prior to becoming an assistant at FSU, Martin spent several years coaching the prep and college ranks. His tenure included several years as baseball and basketball coach at the junior high level, one season as head basketball coach at Tallahassee Community College and four years as basketball coach at Amos P. Godby High.

Prior to entering the coaching profession, Martin was a standout baseball player at Wingate Junior College, before finishing his collegiate career at Florida State. A two-time junior college All-American at Wingate, Martin went on to earn all-district honors as an outfielder at FSU. Following three years of professional ball in the New York Met and

Detroit Tiger organizations, Martin returned to coach and teach in Tallahassee.

A popular speaker, Martin has delivered the keynote addressess at several state and national meetings, including gatherings of the Florida High School Coaches Association, Atlanta Braves Instructional Clinics, and Seminole Booster Clubs throughout the Southeast.

A 1966 graduate of Florida State, Martin earned his masters' degree from Florida A&M in 1971. Mike and his wife Carol have three children, Mary Beth (16), Mike Jr. (13), and Melanie (10).

ASSISTANT COACHES



Rod Delmonico ● Assistant Coach =

Rod Delmonico begins his third season on the Florida State staff and his second as full time assistant to Seminole head coach Mike Martin. As assistant coach, Delmonico coaches the outfielders, serves as firstbase coach, and handles travel arrangements for the Tribe.

Delmonico also heads up the Florida State recruiting efforts, which has resulted in a top 10 ranking in each of the last two years—including a number one ranking in 1984.

Delmonico came to FSU from Clemson University, where he served as a graduate assistant coach for two years. Prior to that, Delmonico was a standout athlete at Liberty Baptist College, where he lettered in soccer and baseball.

A 1981 graduate of Liberty Baptist, Delmonico earned a degree in physical education before completing a masters' degree in administration and supervision at Clemson.

In addition to his coaching duties, Delmonico is a noted author of several articles geared toward high school athletics. He is a regular columnist in Scholastic Magazine and has been published in numerous other magazines. His latest project involves an instructional video with Kansas City Royal manager Dick Howser.

The 28-year-old Delmonico is married to the former Barbara Vanaman.



Chip Baker • Assistant Coach

In his second year at Florida State is assistant coach Chip Baker. In addition to instructing the catchers, Baker will take over third base coaching duties this season and will take over as head coach of Jerry's Caterers—FSU's summer team.

A former assistant at Georgia Tech and Virginia Tech, Baker also coordinates an extensive off season conditioning program, which includes aerobic workouts. He is also the laison between FSU players and their academic advisors.

Baker works closely with FSU's summer camps and serves as director of the highly successful Seminole Select School. He has served on the staffs of many camps throughout the Southeast.

A 1980 graduate of High Point College, Baker led the Panthers to four conference championships. He participated in the 1979 NAIA World Series. After completing his degree in physical education at High Point, Baker went on to earn a master's at Virginia Tech in motor behavior.

Baker, 28, is single.



Mike McLeod Assistant Coach

A former FSU standout, Mike McLeod begins his fifth year on the Seminole coaching staff. A former player with both college and professional experience, McLeod brings a wealth of experience to his position as both a student and teacher of the game.

A 1977 FSU graduate, McLeod is in charge of the Seminole pitching staff and serves as bullpen coach during all Florida State games.

In addition to his FSU experience, McLeod was an instructor for the New York Yankee farm team in Paintsville, KY for four summers.

McLeod earned All-American honors at Middle Georgia Junior College in 1974, before transferring to Florida State. In two years with the Seminoles, McLeod won 13 games. Among his college achievements are three no-hitters, including the last by a Florida State pitcher—a 23-0 decision over Olivet in 1977.

Following graduation, McLeod played three years of baseball in the Yankee organization. Mike and his wife Rose have two children, Garett (4) and Jenny (2).



Steve Winterling • Graduate Assistant Coach=

Steve Winterling is the newest member of the Florida State baseball staff, as he assumed duties as graduate assistant coach in June of 1985. As assistant coach, Winterling will handle several on-the-field coaching duties, as well as several administrative tasks assigned by head coach Mike Martin.

A native of Jacksonville, Winterling comes to FSU from Edgewood Senior High School where he was an assistant coach for the last three years. Prior to that he was an assistant at Florida Junior College.

A 1981 graduate of South Florida with a degree in physical education, Winterling also coached four seasons at Florida College, where he was an assistant for three years and the head coach for one.

Winterling lettered two years in baseball at Florida College before moving on to South Florida to complete his studies. A member of the American Baseball Coaches Association for seven years, Winterling also scouted for the New York Yankees in 1981.

The 27-year-old Winterling is single.

Pitching and Defense are Keys

Although Florida State head coach Mike Martin returns six starters and almost his entire pitching staff off of last year's Metro Conference championship club, the seventh year head coach believes that 1986 may prove to be his most challenging one ever at FSU.

Gone off of last year's club is Frank Fazzini, who elected to turn professional after his junior year. Fazzini, FSU's latest .400 hitter, was a consenus All-American who hit 33 home runs and drove in 118 runs last year. Also departing was senior co-captain Jimmy Jones, who added 21 home runs and 73 RBIs. Add in Vince Calandra's 12 home runs and 54 RBIs and the reason for Martin's concern is evident. Through the professional draft and various other means, the Seminoles have lost players that have contributed 73 home runs and 273 RBIs.

"You have to be concerened when you've lost almost 50 percent of your run production," Martin says. "On the bright side, we have most of our pitching staff back. If we are going to be successful, we are going to have to do it with pitching and defense. If our arms stay healthy, we have a chance to be a good club. But we are no longer able to give a team a four or five run lead and be able to come back and win the game with our bats."

A new look at Seminole Stadium provides another reason why pitching will become an important aspect of the 1986 Seminoles. A 20-foot screen has been added to Florida State's notorius right field wall—upping its height to 30-feet.

"The days of the so called cheap home run at Seminole are gone," Martin says. "Judging from fall practice, you had better hit a 375 or 385 foot shot to the power alley in right or its not going out. Hopefully we can mold our ball club to fit this field. I already know the addition will be an advantage to our pitching staff. It will give it a lot more confidence. Our pitchers won't have to worry about getting beat on a home run that should have been an out. It will definitely help our recruiting of pitchers."



If Martin is banking on pitching and defense, he should be pleased with his team on paper. With the exception of third base and the emergence of a possible fourth starter, the Seminoles look to field a strong club this season.

That team could be even stronger if FSU football star Deion Sanders plays to his potential in his first season.

A look at the 1986 Seminoles follow:

CATCHER: Florida State is possibly as strong here as any team in the nation as it returns not one, but two excellent players. The good news for Coach Martin is that both are only sophomores. Ed Fulton is listed number one on the preseason depth chart. Fulton is an excellent defensive catcher who caught fire late last season with the bat. He finished last year with a .285 average—slugging 10 home runs and adding 42 RBIs. FSU's depth at catcher shines when one considers that Barry Blackwell is listed as the number two catcher. Blackwell hit .327 with 8 homers and 34 RBIs and was selected to Baseball America magazine's Freshman All-America team—barely edging Fulton for the honor. Blackwell and Fulton combined to throw out 39 potential base stealers last year. On days that Fulton starts behind the plate, look for Blackwell to be starting either at first, third or DH. Craig Saxner (.283, 3 HR, 10 RBI) provides a solid third catcher. Martin on position: "Ed Fulton has shown tremendous improvement over the past year and will be our top catcher going into the season. We may still platoon him with Barry Blackwell. But even if we don't platoon, Blackwell will be in the lineup some place. He's too solid not to have in the game.

FIRST: Blackwell will see action here, in addition to being the back up catcher. Senior Tommy Zoeller (.296, 8 HR, 48 RBIs) will also see considerable action at first. Junior Jose Marzan, who hit .365 before being sidelined with a broken leg in the middle of last season, could also figure at first. Martin on position: "Even though we lost Jones, first base should not be a concern. We have three solid players here that can do the job. Whether one emerges above the rest is a wait and see thing, but I feel good about what we have coming back."

SECOND: Part one of FSU's great experiment. Shortstop Bien Figueroa has been moved to second, allowing Luis Alicea's stronger arm to be better utilized at short. Figueroa is a solid player, who hit .369 and drove in 67 runs last season. Freshman Chad McClellan will back up here. Martin on position: "Bien has worked hard at learning this new position and has done well. He's a strong all around ball player and I don't anticipate any real problems with the change."

SHORT: Part two of the experiment involves moving Alicea to short. A junior, Alicea is the best professional prospect on the club. Great hands and quick feet make the third team All-American one of the best in the college game. But the switch hitting Alicea also has surprising power, hitting 12 home runs last year. Martin on position: "A few years ago I said that if there was one player we could absolutely not afford to lose it was Jody Reed. Well, I feel the same way about Alicea on this club. He's one of the best in the nation. I would be hard pressed to name an infielder in college ball I would take over Luis. As far as the change, Luis came to us a shortstop and I'm sure he'll make the adjustment without any problems."

THIRD: A problem area for a number of seasons, Florida State again enters the season with no proven performer. Marzan, an outstanding outfielder, was used here before getting hurt and will again be given the opportunity to earn a starting assignment. Blackwell will also be given a shot at starting, as well as McClellan. Martin on position: "It would be a pleasant surprise if somebody will just take charge at third base. Right now Blackwell will be our starter and hopefully he or somebody else on this team will emerge as a leader. We've had too many errors here in the last couple of seasons and hopefully we can reverse this trend.

RIGHT FIELD: Two-time starter Paul Sorrento returns as the starter. He hit .328 last year in a slump ridden season, where both his average and home run production (9) fell off from his freshman season. Steve Taddeo will provide depth. Martin on position: "If Paul matches his freshman year it would be a big plus. Obviously we want to see an increase in Paul's home run production."

CENTER FIELD: Junior Eric Mangham begins his second season as FSU's full time centerfielder. Mangham's experience was limited as his high school dropped baseball during his sophomore year, but he has made great strides. He hit .307 last year with 10 home runs and 43 RBIs. A possessor of great speed, Mangham will be out to improve his stolen base total of 18 from a year ago. Deion Sanders, Florida State's outstanding freshman defensive back, has announced plans to play baseball this year. Sanders, who was drafted in the sixth round by the Kansas City Royals, will contribute greatly at some outfield position. Look for walkon Greg Clayborne to provide quality depth. Martin on position: "Getting Deion Sanders will be a big plus. Mangham has improved greatly but still hasn't learned to take full advantage of his speed. If does learn how to use his speed and improve with the bat, he could become a valuable weapon for

LEFT FIELD: It is impossible to lose a player that hit .400, drove in 118 runs and hit 33 home runs and not notice a drop off. Junior Keith Kidd will be given the shot at replacing Fazzini. Kidd, the son of successful football coach Roy Kidd (Eastern Kentucky), hit .305 last year in a reserve role with 8 home runs and 20 RBIs. He possesses excellent speed. Sanders will also be watched closely at this position. Martin on position: "Obviously we can't expect Keith to do what Frank did, but I have faith that he can do the job. Deion Sanders could also help us out here."

STARTING PITCHING: Doug Little and Mike Loynd give the Seminoles one of the top one-two punches in the nation. Little, a second team All-American, was 16-2 last year. Together the two combined for a 29-6 record, accounting for almost half the team's victories. Sophomore Richie Lewis (9-6, 5 saves, 113 strikeouts) is being moved from the bullpen into starting rotation to give FSU a solid number three starter. Florida State's biggest question mark is the four slot. Sophomore Al Ashmont, who has been described as having awesome stuff, could challenge for this spot. Ashmont was 4-0 last season, but had severe control problems walking 42 batters in 39 innings. Newcomers Mike Lee, Ed Porcelli, and Chris Pollack will battle Ashmont for the four spot. Martin on position: "Doug Little and Mike Loynd are proven winners. Both will keep us in practically every game this season. Lewis is a gamer who can also be used in short relief. With Al Ashmont's stuff, I would like nothing better for him to emerge as our number four. I honestly believe the potential for greatness is there. This team will go as far as its pitching staff will take it.'

RELIEF PITCHING: With Lewis moving back to the starting rotation, the Seminoles are banking on sophomore Paul Thomas to carry the load. Thomas, a 6-6 left hander, began throwing side-armed last year and picked up a key win in last year's Metro Tournament. Both Lewis and Loynd will also be used in short relief on certain days. All other pitchers that do not win the fourth starting spot will be used in long and middle relief. Martin on position: "Paul Thomas is a key. If he's able to come in as often as needed and give us one or two strong innings, it could do a lot towards making our season."

With so many veterans returning, Martin sees the team's attitude as a key to the coming season. "The thing that impresses me most about this group is their attitude. I believe we have a bunch of guys that know what it takes to win and are willing to work hard to achieve victory. We know we have a lack of power and we are going to have to compensate for that in other ways."

The schedule again promises to be challenging. "On computer our schedule worked out to be the second toughest in the nation last year," Martin says. "We haven't changed anything. Our conference is solid with five or six extremely strong teams. Throw in the Miami's and Florida's and it's easy to see our work is cut out for us."
