

A Return to Omaha Possible

"Realistically, it would not be easy to get back there this year," Florida State head coach Mike Martin begins. "We lost six players, including four underclassmen, in the first 10 rounds of the major league draft. Added to that is the fact that five of our new kids signed with the pros. At best it would be a difficult task."

But Florida State may indeed be ready to make another run at the national championship in 1987 if several highly touted newcomers can perform up to expectations. Martin even admits his team could be good. "This year will be like a jigsaw puzzle for us," the eighth year head coach says. If certain pieces fall into place for us, then we could have a shot at getting back to Omaha this year. But if one or two things go wrong for us, Florida State will still have a good overall team, but not one that would make it to the final eight."

Martin's rebuilding job will be tough without question. The six players lost were indeed the heart and soul of a Florida State team that went 61-13 and lost to Arizona in the championship game of the College World Series.

Gone is Golden Spikes Award winner Mike Loynd, who won an NCAA record tying 20 games last season and also led the nation in strikeouts with 223. The St. Louis Cardinals picked slick fielding Luis Alicea in the first round before picking up Alicea's double play partner Bien Figueroa in the fifth round. Junior power hitter Paul Sorrento gave up his senior year, after California picked him in an early round; while centerfielder Eric Mangham made a similar decision after being selected by the Dodgers. Senior Doug Little, FSU's all-time winningest pitcher who won nine games for the Seminoles last season, also joined the professional ranks when he was drafted by the Chicago White Sox. Of the six, Sorrento, Mangham, Alicea and Loynd all had one year of eligibility remaining.

That same major league draft that took six Seminoles off the 1986 team also drafted several athletes that signed letters-of-intent at Florida State. Five of those players, including standouts Dean Palmer, Milton Cuyler and Reggie Jefferson, elected to accept those offers—hitting Florida State hard.

Most coaches would not enjoy the prospect of playing FSU's schedule without the services of nine players that had either signed with the Seminoles or had eligibility remaining. But Martin has taken that in stride and looks forward to the challenge of the upcoming season.

"It's easy to sit there and cry about who you lost in the draft," Martin says. "But I'm not going to do it. We knew guys like Sorrento, Loynd and Alicea were going to sign—what else did they have to prove? Those guys were great ball players for Florida State but their dream is to play major league baseball. It was time for them to move on in search of reaching that goal. All the guys that left said they were going to come back and get their degrees and I believe them. I don't think that coming back for their senior years would have helped them to get to where they wanted to be any faster.

"Without question it hurt to lose some of our signees particularly the underclassmen. There's a certain small percentage of kids that I think everybody from the scouts on down classify as can't miss and if that's what they want to do they should sign, but I hate to see marginal players that are 18years-old lose the option of a college scholarship for a few thousand dollars of signing bonus. But the main thing about being a college baseball coach is that you have to contend with the present professional draft system and you know going in, you stand a chance of losing some players you had hoped would contribute to your team. You just have to pick up the pieces and move on."

It's a solid assortment of pieces that Martin has to work with and that's why that optimism is the Seminole camp remains high despite the losses from the draft. A position-byposition analysts of the 1987 Florida State team follows.

CATCHER: If any team in the nation has a better pair of catchers, Martin wants to see it. Junior Ed Fulton returns as the starter. Fulton is an excellent defensive catcher who hits lefthanded for both power and average. Last season, Fulton hit lefthanded for both power and 78 RBIs; while throwing out 26 potential base stealers. He added some international experience to his resume this past summer, as he was selected to the United States Senior National team that represented the USA in the World Championships. His backup is Barry Blackwell. FSU's starting third baseman last season, Blackwell came to Florida State as a catcher and moved to third only to fill a team void at that position. He hit .299 last season. Look for both to be in the lineup every game; as Blackwell will play first, third and DH as needed.

FIRST: Although Jose Marzan may move to the outfield based on what happens with FSU's freshmen, he is tenatively penciled in as the starter at first. A senior, Marzan hit .322 last season and hit 12 home runs and added 55 RBIs as FSU's leadoff hitter.

Defensively, Marzan was as good as any Seminole first baseman in recent memory. He made but seven errors in 641 chances, with four coming in two games. He gave FSU an added dimension offensively with 33 steals in 42 attempts. Backup help will come from Blackwell, Fulton, and incoming freshmen Mike Rudi and Mike Schmit.

SECOND: It's impossible to replace a player like All-American Luis Alicea. A first round draft pick of the St. Louis



Cardinals, Alicea signed after his junior year and took his considerable baseball skills to the professional ranks. So if you can't have Luis back for his senior year, what do you do? Martin solved this problem with next best solution—you sign his brother. Enter Edwin Alicea. At 5-9, 172, he's a bigger version of the original. Although not as polished defensively, Edwin has a little bit more power than Luis and will be a fine addition to Florida State's lineup. Martin believes it's just a matter of time before Edwin establishes himself as an outstanding collegiate star. John Egertson will provide depth

SHORT: Martin faces another problem in finding a replacement for Figueroa-a player that collected 100 or more hits in each of his two years with Florida State and teamed with Alicea to give FSU one of the best double play combinations in the nation for the past two seasons. Enter Rafael Bournigal, who like Figueroa is a native of the Dominican Republic. One of the most highly recruited infielders in the country last spring, Bournigal was an all-state and all-conference selection at Canada Junior College last year. Martin feels that Florida State fans are in for a treat. "Rafeal will never hit like Bien did," he says. "But his range is outstanding. Defensively I think he's Jody Reed's equal and I think most of you know how I feel about that guy." Don Erickson will provide backup help at short.


THIRD: Last year, Blackwell played here because he knew Florida State needed him. For the first time since Mark Barineau, FSU now has a legitimate third baseman in junior college transfer Don Erickson. Last season, Erickson hit .417 with 4 home runs and 43 RBIs for College of the Canyons in Los Angeles. His addition to the FSU lineup should solidify a new but talented infield. John Egertson will backup here as will

OUTFIELD: Going into the season, only one spot in the outfield is locked up. Martin says that Greg Clayborne will start in leftfield. The former walkon from Jacksonville hit .288 last season but played great defense. Filling the other two spots may be easy or difficult, depending on how you look at it. On one hand, centerfield should be patrolled by Ronnie Lewis. A FSU football player who saw action as a freshman, Lewis has all the tools including great speed. Football coaches promised him during his recruitment that he could play baseball and he displayed a strong interest in doing so by driving to Tallahassee last summer to play for Jerry's Caterers—the FSU summer team. Rightfield could be filled by Mike Skoutelakis, who transferred to FSU from Oklahoma State. Other possibilities include Marzan and designated hitter Steve Taddeo. "With the people in this group, we should have a good outfield," Martin says. "But you always worry about injuries and inexperience. Clayborne played well for us last year, but past that we don't have a lot of experience. Hopefully we can get those positions settled before we get too far into the season."

PITCHING: Despite losing Loynd and Little, Florida State returns several outstanding players-including All-American Richie Lewis. A junior, Lewis led the nation in strikeouts per nine innings last year with 202 in just 127.2 innings. He went 14-2 and picked up four saves. Chris Pollack, a senior lefthander, went 9-3 last season and will be a solid number two starter. FSU's rotation will be completed from veterans Ed Porcelli and Steve Kovensky or newcomers Jerry Nielsen, Rod Byerly, Mike Brady, or John Wanish.

If Koensky doesn't win a starting job, look for the senior to provide FSU with an excellent middle relief pitcher. Nielsen or freshman Mike Schmit could become FSU's short relief specialist; while Lewis will also be used in between starts as a stopper.

OVERVIEW: Florida State's schedule was rated toughest in the nation last year by the NCAA and will provide an even stronger test with the addition of Georgia and the Superdome Series to the 1987 schedule. With six seniors and underclassmen lost in last year's major league draft, the Tribe will have its work cut out in trying to match last year's success. But Florida State will field a competitive team, despite its youth that will see at least five new starters among its regulars. Should this talent blend together, look for the Seminoles to make a run at earning their ninth straight trip to the NCAA Tournament.


