THIS IS FSU BASEBALL

A Program of Tradition and Success—Few teams have managed to maintain the success that Florida State baseball teams have enjoyed since 1948.

But this is no surprise to the people associated with college baseball, as the Seminoles have annually lived up to their billing as the "Best of College Baseball."

Florida State's most recent appearance in the College World Series in 1986 marked the eighth time the Seminoles have qualified for the prestigious "Final Eight." Consider that only five other teams have played in that many College World Series.

Added to that is the fact that FSU has played in a near record 24 NCAA tournaments—easily ranking Florida State in the top five for most regional/district tournament appearances. Despite having to qualify through tough Metro Conference competition, the Seminoles have made the NCAA Tournament field every year since 1978—a string of nine consecutive post-season appearances.

In 1986, Florida State again electrified college baseball by finishing with a 61-13 record, placing second in the CWS and earning a number one final ranking in the Collegiate Baseball


Magazine poll.

A tribute to FSU's overall success has been the school's overall record since the beginning. Although Florida State's schedule is usually ranked in the top 10 in terms of difficulty by the NCAA computer, the Seminoles have compiled an overall mark of 1296-506-7—which translates into an all-time winning percentage of .718. Florida State has never experienced a losing season and has dipped below the .600 winning percentage mark just once since 1954. FSU's 65 wins in NCAA Tournaments and College World Series play also ranks the Tribe in the top five nationally.

Many Florida State players go on to play professional ball. With six players being selected in the top 10 rounds of last June's professional draft, the Seminoles have increased their number of professional signings to 100 since 1966.

If a player is determined to get a college diploma before turning professional, FSU offers an excellent opportunity. High school and junior college coaches around the country recognize this fact. FSU's roster reflects this in that players come from eight different states, Puerto Rico and the Dominican Republic.

FSU players are given the opportunity to practice and play year around. Following a 60-game regular season spring schedule, the Seminoles participate in the Metro Conference Tournament. Post-season play in the NCAA Regional Tournament usually follows. In the summer, players often

elect to stay in Tallahassee and play for Jerry's Caterers—a summer league team of Florida State players and recruits that participate in a 30 to 35 game schedule.

In addition. Florida State players are often sought after in the nation's premier summer league teams. In recent years, Seminole players have been regulars in the Cape Cod League, the ACC Summer League and the Alaskan League to name a few.

In the fall, Florida State plays in a full complement of practice games that end on homecoming weekend with the annual Alumni-Varsity game. Terry Kennedy and Mike Loynd are just two of the many former All-Americans that participated in the 1986 game.

All told, a Florida State player will have an opportunity to

play in at least 100 games per year.

An opportunity to play baseball year around does not mean FSU is not concerned with academic life. The Seminole academic department employs two full-time academic advisors and a host of part-time assistants whose sole purpose is to help the student-athlete obtain a marketable degree. If an athlete needs help in scheduling, tutoring or special service—help is always available. Florida State recently started a mandatory study-skills class for freshmen. Praised nationwide as one of the most innovative classes of its type, the study skills class helps all newcomers adjust to the rigors of college life.

Facilities at Florida State are second to none. Seminole Stadium was built in 1984 at a cost of \$1 million. It has been praised as the finest facility of its type in the nation. Lights

make night baseball a Tallahassee favorite.

The new \$3.9 million Moore Athletic Center serves as the hub of Seminole Athletics. Coaches offices, two weight rooms, and a baseball locker room are all part of the facility that is located within short walking distance of the Seminole Stadium.

A training program under the able direction of Randy Oravetz insures that each athlete receives the finest medical and athletic training care available. At least one athletic trainer is present at each Seminole game and practice; while team doctors Doug Henderson and Tom Haney check in daily.

If playing before large crowds is important to the prospective student athlete, FSU is the answer. In regular season attendance, FSU ranked fourth in the nation. Counting the NCAA Regional Tournament in Tallahassee, over 118,000 fans flocked to Seminole Stadium to see their team play. Overall, including World Series play, almost a quarter of a million people saw the Seminoles play in 1986. FSU is one of the few teams in the country to sell over 1000 season

tickets—topping the 1200 mark in 1986.

Media attention is also high. FSU baseball is page one news in Tallahassee and is covered on a regular basis by 10 major newspapers in Florida whose circulation tops the 1.3 million mark. Over 100 members of the working media requested credentials to the NCAA South II Region last season. Added to that is a radio package that broadcasts 50 games a year to the Tallahassee market on WTNT Radio. National exposure is also high. Last season, seven ball games featuring Florida State were seen nationally on ESPN, including a game from Seminole Stadium between number one LSU and number two Florida State—a game FSU won 6-4 to recapture the top ranking in both major polls.

It is little wonder that Florida State serves as a role model to many building programs in the nation. In terms of facilities, coaching, education, fan support and on the field success—the Seminole program may be the best overall program in college

Florida State Among the Nation's Attendance Leaders =

One reason Florida State possesses one of the top reputations in college baseball is because of its ardent fan support. Again in 1986, Florida State was among the nation's leaders in game attendance as 118,997 flocked to Seminole Stadium to see FSU in action.

In regular season attendance, Florida State drew over 100,000 fans for the second consecutive year-finishing fourth in the nation in total number. FSU's average of 2,529 fans per regular season game was third best in the country.

FSU set attendance records for single home game attendance (6145), single series attendance (16,151-3 games) and largest weekday crowd (4530) in 1986.

FSU's Professional Pipeline universities in the country have provided a pipeline to professional baseball as Florida State has. Since 1966, a total of 100 have signed contracts.

Several former FSU players are currently active in the major leagues. Terry Kennedy (Orioles) and Johnny Grubb (Tigers) played in the 1984 World Series. Mike Loynd finished 1986

with the Rangers.

Former FSU All-American and head coach Dick Howser managed his Kansas City Royal club to the 1985 World Series. Woody Woodward, another ex-FSU player and head coach, is now vice president of the New York Yankees. Howser, Grubb and Kennedy are the three former


Seminoles to play in a major league all-star game; while Woodward, Kennedy, Grubb and Rick Langford hold the distinction of former Seminoles to play in World Series competition.

1986 Recruiting Class Ranked Second

Florida State University, a coeducational institution with an enrollment of 21,500 students, is located in Tallahassee, the capital of Florida.

The beautiful 345-acre campus is wrapped in greenery that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods with palm trees and moss-hung oaks. The campus looks enough like Ivy League schools, particularly around its older, Gothic buildings, that several times each winter New York

advertising agencies fake summer scenes supposedly shot at Princeton or Harvard. On the west side of campus, the scene is dominated by the contemporary, high-rise science complex.

There are more than 1,300 faculty including four members of the National Academy of Sciences. Florida State is one of only five universities in the nation to have its own supercomputer.

Academic programs in the sciences (notably physics, chemistry, biology and meterology) and the performing arts (music, theater, visual arts and dance) have high national rankings. Other strong departments among the 15 schools and colleges include criminology, hospitality administration, accounting, statistics and interior design. FSU's pre-med program has a much higher than average medical school placement rate for its graduates.

Today, FSU offers students the opportunity to choose from more than 100 career options in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, education, home economics, law, library and information studies, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater, visual arts and engineering, which operates in cooperation with Florida A&M University. The most popular majors at FSU are business, biology, computer science and communication.

Florida State has honors programs for its top students. Overseas study program in fields ranging from law to hotel and restaurant administration are offered in Florence, Italy; Oxford and London, England; Switzerland, Costa Rica, Yugoslavia and the Panama Canal Zone.

Social life for many centers around 24 fraternities and 20 sororities. Wind surfing, swimming and sunning are among the activities to be enjoyed at FSU's convenient lakeside "Reservation" or along the sandy beaches of nearby coasts.

A unique extracurricular activity is the Flying High Circus, the nations only all-collegiate circus. Students from every academic major can become stars on the flying trapeze, on the highwire or in clown acts.

Fine entertainment is provided year-round by the FSU Schools of Music and Theater and the Department of Dance.

Student Campus Entertainment presents concerts, movies, lectures and other activities throughout the year and the Artist Series brings professional entertainers to campus.

Student government at FSU is one of the most powerful in the country. Elected students spend an annual budget of about \$1.7 million. Student government funds intramurals, activities at the Student Union and more than 200 interest organizations.



C.W. "HOOTIE" INGRAM Athletic Director

Cecil Ingram, known to most of his friends and associates as simply "Hootie," has headed the Florida State athletic department since 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeastern Conference for eight years.

Since his arrival in Tallahassee, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities, including the Moore Athletic Center - home of Florida State athletics.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Ala., Ingram played for the Crimson Tide from 1951 to 1954 and led the nation in interceptions as a sophomore. He also lettered in baseball as an infielder. Following a stint in the army, Ingram turned to coaching. Afterseveral years of high school coaching, Ingram moved into collegiate athletics; making assistant coaching stops at Wake Forest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas.



BOB GOIN Associate Athletic Director

A member of the Florida State athletic staff since 1981, Bob Goin begins his fifth full year as Associate Athletic Director.

Goin handles the day-to-day operations of the department. A large portion of football, basketball and baseball game-day operations fall under his leadership.

A 1959 graduate of Bethany College, Goin received his master's degree from West Virginia in 1961. From 1960-76, Goin served Bethany in several administrative and coaching capacities before moving on to West Virginia as an assistant athletic director. He was named athletic director at California (Pa.) State College in 1980, where he formed that institution's first scholarship fund for athletics and the college's first booster club.



CHARLES W. EHRHARDT Faculty Athletic Committee Chairman

A Florida State University professor of law, Charles W. Ehrhardt is in his second year as Chairman of the Athletic Committee.

He is currently in his second stint on the committee, having served 1969-71 and then being reappointed to the board in 1983. As chairman, Ehrhardt succeeded Dr. James Jones, who held that position since 1980. Ehrhardt becomes Florida State's representative to the NCAA and was also president of the Metro Conference in 1984-85.

A native of Elkander, Iowa, Ehrhardt received his bachelor's degree from Iowa in 1962 before earning a law degree at Iowa State two years later. He came to Florida State in 1967,

A widely respected expert in the field of Evidence, Erhardt is frequently called on to lecture on the subject by lawyers and judges nationwide.

MEDIA INFORMATION:

CREDENTIALS: Working press credentials are required for admittance to the Seminole Stadium pressbox and will be issued to working personnel only. All requests should be directed to Dan Pearson or Wayne Hogan at least one week prior to game day. Seminole Stadium has 15 seats in the main pressbox that will be allocated on the following priority: (1) Local and student press, radio and television stations actually broadcasting, state daily papers, national publications, wire services, and opponent's local and student press. (2) Radio and television stations not broadcasting. (3) Weeklies or other publications.

RADIO: Florida State will provide one booth for opposing team's broadcast. Should an FSU opponent have more than one radio station, a platform will be made available in the stadium. When such a case occurs, the visiting team's SID will allocate the space.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Accredited photographers will be permitted to shoot from designated areas on the field. No free-lance passes will be issued.

PHONE LINES: Florida State has three phone lines in the main pressbox, for media use. Visiting radio stations are required to secure their own phone service directly through Centel Telephone (904) 681-6600. Seminole Flagship Station WTNT has in the past installed one phone line for use by visiting radion stations. Call Rod Meadows at (904) 893-4358 or Mark Johnson at (904) 386-6143 for details on using this line.

PARKING: Easy access to Seminole Stadium from Doak Campbell Stadium parking lot. No pass is required, but those with equipment will want to arrive early and avoid longer walks to baseball field.

SERVICES: Florida State will provide scorecards, programs, statistics and light refreshments at all Seminole baseball games. A complete box will be available approximately 10 minutes after the conclusion of each game.

INTERVIEWS: Florida State players will be available to the media prior to and during batting practice. Coach Martin and his players will be available for post game interviews, approximately 10 minues after each game. All interviews during off days should be arranged through Dan Pearson of the FSU Sports Information Office.
