Facts about Florida State University

Location:

The Florida State University is located in Florida's capital city. Tallahassee, one of the most beautiful cities in the south. Tallahassee is located in northern Florida. 200 miles east of Pensacola and 169 miles west of Jacksonville. The picturesque capital city is some 16 miles from the coast of the Gulf of Mexico.

History:

In 1851 the state legislature passed an act establishing two seminaries of learning to be situated on the east and west sides of the Suwannee River. During the next 54 vears, the institution in Tallahassee was known as the West Florida Seminary, the Florida University, and the Florida State College. In 1905 the passage of the Buckman Act established this institution as the Florida State College for Women. Then, by act of the legislature, a bill was passed May 15, 1947, changing the Florida State College for Women to The Florida State University, admitting both men and women students.

The Plant:

The Florida State University grounds consist of 1319 acres beautifully landscaped and planned for future expansion. Valued at \$28,500,000, the present campus consists of some 28 main buildings. At present the University is engaged in a six million dollar building program which includes construction of a four story University Library, a three story Botany and Zoology Classroom Building, and a new modern Gymnasium. These structures are expected to be completed within the next year.

Curriculum: The Florida State University is made up of 16 major divisions, which include: The College of Arts and Sciences; The School of Business; The School of Education; The Division of General Education; The School of Home Economics; The School of Journalism; The School of Library Training and Service; The School of Music; The School of Nursing; The School of Public Administration; The School of Social Welfare; The Air Force ROTC; The Army Branch General, ROTC: The Home Demonstration Office; The University Extension Division; and The Graduate School.

DR. HOWARD G. DANFORD

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Dr. Howard G. Danford heads Florida State University's vast athletic and physical education program. He has served as director of athletics and physical education for men since 1947.

Prior to his arrival at Florida State, Danford served for seven years as director of health, physical

education, and safety in the Madison, Wisconsin, public school system.

Since coming to Florida State University, Danford has seen football rise from a pick-up sport in 1947 to major college status, as well as guiding all other phases of the FSU athletic program, which includes nine varsity sports, a complete physical education and recreation curriculum, and the nationally famous Florida State University Circus, "Flying High," "Gymkana."

The next big step in the over-all physical education program will be taken with the completion of FSU's new gymnasium on the East Campus. When this structure is completed, it will contain all facilities for the men's physical education program.

A graduate of Ohio University, Dr. Danford received his master's and doctorate degrees from New York University in 1943.

Dr. Danford is an author of note, his most recent work being the book "Recreation in the American Community," published in 1953. He has also authored numerous magazine articles and has held prominent positions in several national organizations. He is currently a member of the Executive Committee of the United States Volleyball Association; chairman of the Curriculum Research Committee of the College Physical Education Association; chairman of the Policies Committee of the Federation of National Professional Organizations for Recreation; and chairman of the Florida AAU Volleyball Committee.

One of America's volleyball pioneers, Dr. Danford made an extensive six weeks tour of Germany and France last winter, serving as an instructor for the U. S. Army's 1955 volleyball clinics. Danford made the trip at the request of the Commander in Chief of United States Army, Europe.

Under Dr. Danford's guidance and direction, Florida State's excellent program of intercollegiate athletics has grown in size and stature, and is now becoming recognized as one of the finest in the nation.

Danford's enthusiastic interest in the whole program of intercollegiate athletics at Florida State has resulted in phenomenal achievements made by all Seminole athletic squads in the eight short years Florida State has been engaging in intercollegiate sport.

TOM NUGENT

HEAD FOOTBALL COACH

Tom Nugent will be starting his third season as head football coach of the Florida State University Seminoles.

Nugent is becoming nationally known as one of the brightest young coaches in the business, and for several years he has had the reputation of being one

of the best innovators in the game.

It was Nugent who invented the typewriter huddle, the double quarterback, and the now famed "I" formation.

Nugent came to Florida State in 1953 after having served four highly successful years at Virginia Military Institute, his first college coaching position. After putting the Keydets on the football map, the likeable mentor turned his atten-

tions to sunny Florida, and has been highly successful in two years at F.S.U. Nugent's efforts have rewarded the Seminoles with a classification as a major football power.

Tom was born in Lawrence, Massachusetts, and got his college grid training as a star performer at Ithaca (N. Y.) College for three years.

Upon graduation from Ithaca, Nugent coached the freshman team there while he continued with his graduate work. He returned to his home town of Lawrence the next season to begin his head football coaching career when he tutored the Essex Training School teams in football, basketball, and baseball. Three seasons at Essex produced two undefeated football teams.

Nugent entered the Air Force in 1941 and was named head football coach of the Rosecrans (Mo.) Air Base Flyers. Other duties there included writing, directing, and presenting shows for the entertainment of troops. Nugent was and still is quite a song and dance man, and his flair for showmanship is strongly evident by the flashy teams he presents on the gridiron.

After his discharge in 1946, Nugent was appointed head coach at Williamsburg (Va.) High. His '46 team was undefeated in league play and also copped the state basketball, baseball, and track crowns.

Tom moved to Hopewell (Va.) High in 1947, and his first team there posted a 7-2 mark, while his 1948 eleven bettered that showing with an 8-2 record. Nugent's over-all high school coaching record in three years showed 24 wins and 4 losses.

This enviable mark brought about longing glances from the powers that be at Virginia Military Institute in Lexingotn, Va., and in 1949 Nugent was brought in as head football coach.

V. M. I. had been in the Southern Conference doldrums for many years, and Tom's 1949 squad showed the typical Nugent spark with a hard hitting and improving record of three wins, 5 losses, and one tie. The 1950 season saw the Keydets whip out a 6-4 record that included upset wins over Georgia Tech and William and Mary.

Then came the big season of 1951 when Nugent's Keydets turned in a splendid 7-3 season to end up in a tie with Maryland for the Southern Conference title. The door-mat days were over, and all Keydets from General George Catlett Marshall down to the newest-plebe were beaming with joy.

After spending one more year at V. M. I. to see his '52 eleven start another rebuilding job, Nugent heeded the call to follow the sun and took over the leadership of Florida State's fast-rising football fortunes in 1953.

A respectable 5-5 mark in 1953 greeted Tom's first efforts at Florida State, and then the Nugent touch burst all over the place last season as his high stepping band of Seminoles paraded through an ever tougher schedule for a resounding 8-3 season. This marked the beginning of top-flight recognition for the Seminoles, a recognition that is destined to become even bigger and brighter in the next few years.

Nugent has developed three major football techniques in his coaching career. His first was at Williamsburg where he found two quarterbacks, one left-handed and one right-handed. So, he placed them both under the center, thereby completely baffling the opposition. Notre Dame picked this up a year later. Then Nugent invented the typewriter huddle in 1947. Guess who picked that up first in the collegiate ranks . . . yep, Notre Dame. Then his latest innovation, the "I" formation, hit the headlines at V. M. I. three years later, and who picked it up from Nugent? Uh huh, Notre Dame.

Tom is married to the former Peg Foley of Lawrence, Mass., and the Nugents have five children: Tommy 11; Kerry 10; Peggy 8; T. D. 5; and Timothy David, four months.

COACH VAUGHN MANCHA

Vaughn Mancha, one of the University of Alabama's greatest centers, will be starting his fourth season as line mentor for the Seminoles.

A living symbol of Alabama's football prowess, Mancha lettered in 1944-45-46-47, and capped his brilliant career in 1947 by making the first team South-

eastern and All-America squads. He was 'Bama's standout performer in the undefeated 1945 football season that was topped with a 34-14 victory over Southern California in the 1946 Rose Bowl classic.

Mancha also played in the Sugar Bowl twice—gainst Duke in 1945 and Texas in 1948.

After receiving his B. A. in 1948, Mencha played a year of professional football with the Boston Yanks. He returned to Alabama in 1949, receiving his Master's degree that year.

Vaughn then sallied forth into the coaching field and put in a highly successful three year hitch at Livingston (Ala.) Teachers College where his teams posted a 21-7 record. He joined the ranks at Florida State University in 1952.

He is married to the former Sybil Little of Birmingham, Ala., and the Manchas have two daughters, Claire, 6, and Nan, 3.

COACH VINCE RAGUNAS

Vince Ragunas will be starting his third season on the Florida State coaching staff.

The capable backfield mentor served three previous seasons under Coach Tom Nugent in the same capacity at V. M. I.

Ragunas is a graduate of Virginia Military In-

stitute, where he played fullback and blocking back on the Keydet varsity teams of 1945-47-48. He played freshman football at V.M.I. in 1942 before going into the service for three years of duty with the Army tank corps in Europe.

Upon his graduation from V. M. I., Ragunas put in a year's tour of professional football with the Pittsburgh Steelers.

After his fling at the pro game with the Steelers, Vince accepted a position with Nugent at V. M. I., serving there for the seasons of 1950, 1951, and 1952.

Ragunas is the only unmarried member of the Seminole coaching staff.

COACH BOB HARBISON

In terms of longevity, Bob Harbison is the real veteran of the Seminole coaching staff. Harbison will be starting his eighth season as one of the Tribe's

Back in his playing days, Harbison was an outstanding guard for the late Bo McMillan at Indiana

University in 1945-46-47.

A native of Evansville, Indiana, Harbison was chosen to play with the North squad in the annual Blue-Gray game in Montgomery, Alabama in 1947.

Bob came to Florida State in 1948 to work under Don Veller, present Seminole golf coach, who was at that time head football coach. Harbison has worked primarily with guards and tackles, and is credited with developing Bill Dawkins, Little All-America guard in 1951, and Hugh Adams. little All-America tackle in 1949.

The genial Harbison was known as a real rough and ready performer in his playing days at Indiana, and his coaching techniques. show he expects the same of his Seminole charges.

Bob is married to the former Jane McEntee of Washington, D. C., and the Harbisons have two daughters, Paula, 5; and Susan, 3. And another little Harbison is expected this winter.

COACH WINSTON SIEGFRIED

The 1955 football season marks the third season for Win Siegfried as an assistant coach with the Seminoles.

Siegfried, one of Duke University's great players back in the ruling days of Wallace Wade, graduated from the Durham Institution in 1942. Siegfried made

All-Southern fullback and second team All-America in his senior year at Duke, and played against Oregon State in the "transplanted"

Rose Bowl game in 1942.

After his graduation from Duke, Siegfried entered the Navy for three and a half years. During his naval tour, he played with the Bainbridge (Md.) team.

Win played professional football in 1945 for the Washington Redskins, and then joined the coaching ranks with a two year stand at Fort Union (Va.) High and two more year at Varina High in Richmond where his teams had a 13-5-1 record.

Siegfried continued to move about successfully in the high school ranks, serving as backfield coach in 1948 at Hampton, Virginia, where the team won the state title.

In 1949 and 1950 he won two regional titles at Sanford (N. C.) High and then moved to Henderson (N. C.) High, a football hot-bed, where he had an undefeated ball club in 1951, and copping the regional and Eastern crowns in 1952.

Win is married to the former Ann Lake of Newport News, Va., and the Siegfried's have three children-Judy, 10; Nancy, 7; and Tommy, 4.

COACH FRANK TOOMEY

A native of Niagara Falls, N. Y., Frank Toomey begins his second season with Tom Nugent's F. S. U. Seminoles, having joined the staff late last summer.

Toomey is a graduate of Nugent's Alma Mater, Ithaca College in New York, and he earned letters for three years in football, basketball, and baseball before

graduating in 1942.

After spending four years in the Marines where he won a Purple Heart decoration as well as a presidential citation, Toomey went back to Ithaca College where he earned his Master's degree in 1946. While at Ithaca, Toomey coached the varsity backfield and was the freshman baseball and basketball coach.

Toomey took over as head football and baseball coach at Waverly (N. Y.) High school in 1948. During the summers he spent his time scouting for the Philadelphia Phillies, as he spent

a brief stint in 1946 playing in the Philly chain as an outfielder at Utica.

Frank stayed at Waverly until 1954, and during those seven years his teams compiled a remarkable record of 39 wins against but 8 defeats.

He is married to the former Rita Sullivan of Waverly, and the Toomeys have one son, Michael, aged 4.

TRAINER DON FAULS

A native of Ithaca, N. Y., Don Fauls came onto the Florida State scene in 1954 as head trainer, and has done a splendid job.

Don graduated from Ithaca College in 1948 with a degree in physio-therapy, and started his professional work at the hospital in Bath, N. Y. in that same year.

After serving at Bath for two years, Fauls went to Greensboro, North Carolina as trainer for the Greensboro Patriots in the Carolina Baseball League.

He worked during the off-seasons at the Gilmore Clinic in Greensboro in physio-therapy, and after two years with the Patriots ball club, Fauls joined the St. Louis Cardinal chain as team trainer for Omaha.

After remaining at Omaha for three seasons, Fauls accepted his present post at Florida State, arriving here last year.

Don is married to the former Marguerite Morgan of Naples, N. Y., and the Fauls' have three children: Donna, 4; and twins Danny and Jackie, aged 2½.

Seminole Outlook

Discussing his ball club right down the line, Coach Tom Nugent states the team will be better than the 1954 squad which won 8 and dropped three.

"That may seem very confident," smiled the everoptimistic Nugent, "but I say that with complete respect for the much tougher schedule we are playing in 1955. Meaning, of course, that if we can win against this rugged slate facing us, we will definitely be a better ball club.

"Let's look at the score-sheet: We have seven seniors, eleven juniors, and thirty two sophomores making up the 1955 Seminole eleven. Combine this group with the hoped-for top bunch of freshmen, and you will have our ball club . . . built from a nucleus of sophomorse and juniors, with a heavy foundation of freshmen and an icing of seven seniors.

Nugent continued with sound, common sense. In those first five games, against N. C. State, V. P. I., Miami, Georgia, and Georgia Tech, the youthful Seminoles must get their teeth into that tasty flesh and get their feet on the ground against some of the best teams in the South.

"If we get started right against those rough teams," mused Nugent, "the table should be set for the rest of the season, and the squad should be able to go after the meat and potatoes!"

When asked to describe his team as members in the way of football potential, Nugent put it this way: "I should say we have about 16 top flight football players. They can play with anyone. Then, there is strong potential in the rest of the club among several players who should develop into top boys.

"We think we have the best group of incoming freshmen that we have seen here. We have a dozen or so in this group who can go in any league, but of course, they will need seasoning." Then the youthful Seminole mentor added with a smile, "Look out for 1956 and 1957 when this gang gets moving!"

Here's the break-down on strong and weak points: Strongest part of the team is in the line, especially at guard. Here will be four year regular Jerry Jacobs, Vince Gibson, Al Pacifico, and Leo Baggett.

Another Seminole strong point will be in the backfield, with one of the brightest stars in the south hauling the leather from the left halfback post in the person of Lightin' Lee Corso, the Miami Comet. Nugent tabs the brilliant Corso as one of the finest running backs in the nation, and the little junior speedster will give Seminole opponents cause for many a bromo.

Running with Corso in the attack department are halfbacks Buddy Reynolds, Buck Metts, and Billy Weaver, with the ever dependable Billy Odom ready for spot duty . . . and his kind of duty could wreck the opposition at any given moment.

Gone at quarterback is the splendid Harry Massey, but stepping into a mighty big pair of shoes will be Vic Prinzi, Mike Norman, Ted Rodrique, Len Swantic, and Pat Versprille. At this writing, Norman and Prinzi have the inside track on the starting post, but any of the five could develop into top notch signal callers before season's end.

Seminole Outlook

Two converted players will be doing the duties at fullback. Joe Holt, who played fullback last season, and Bud Leonard, converted from halfback to end and now to fullback, will see most of the action here, but plenty of help may be right on the line in John Griner and Bob Mathews.

Over on the flanks, the Seminoles boast one of the finest ends in the nation. Tom Feamster, who many claim is the biggest end in the business, has all the attributes of an All-American from the word "go." Feamster stands a long 6-7 in the ozone, and weighs in at 250 pounds, and it's all muscle. A terrific receiver with plenty of speed and poise, Feamster could well mean the difference in the score in a close ball game, and more than likely he will be a marked man all season.

Running at the opposite terminal from Feamster is another fine performer, Ronnie Schomburger. This hefty sophomore from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania was just what the doctor ordered, stepping up from the freshman ranks to fill a big gap left by the graduation of Jimmy Lee Taylor.

The tackle positions will be one of the most vulnerable spots on the Seminole team. The loss via graduation of big Al Mackoweicki left a gaping hole in the line. Co-Captain Don Powell, Troy Barnes, and Bob Barber will be the work horses up front, with Bill Proctor getting the call for plenty of duty.

Co-Captain Bob Crenshaw, one of the finest little competitors in the business, will be starting at center, but lack of real size may handicap the Seminoles at the pivot post. Other center candidates include Ed Kercher, Hobo Ackerman, and Ray Staab.

Nugent stated that lack of depth at end, tackle, and center could be the weakest points, although Hamilton Bisbee, Jimmy Trado, Bill Swilley, and Pete Overton may ease the situation at end somewhat.

There is no doubt that FSU will once again be a dangerous team via the aerial route. The Seminoles led all colleges in the nation last season with scoring passes with 19 touchdown aerials in 107 attempts.

Couple the potent passing attack with a swift running game led by Lee Corso, and the evidence is clear that the Seminoles will be a highly offensive minded ball club. But Nugent states that the biggest improvement—making Florida State a better ball club than the 1954 crew—is in defense.

The biggest improvement on defense that has made this 1955 team an all around stronger edition is the emergence of tackle Bob Barber. Loaded with desire to do as good a job as can be done in the front line, Barber showed his stuff in spring practice, and Coach Nugent has tabbed the husky junior from Belle Glade as one of the best if not the best tackle prospects in Florida.

The summation of 1955 Seminole prospects: Good, fast offensive striking power, both on the ground and in the air . . . much stronger defensive club as a first line unit, but whole squad depth is big question mark . . . overall, the Seminoles will be a better ball club against a stronger schedule . . . emergence of good freshmen prospects could well make Florida State one of the top football powers in the South in the next few years.
