DEION SANDERS: A MAN FOR ALL SEASONS

The following column by Tom McEwen of the Tampa Tribune (May 29, 1968) is reprinted with ission of the Tribune.

There is this belief around Florida State University sports circles that Deion Sanders may be, or is on his way, to being the single best collegiate

And there is evidence to support the claim, with more on the way,

probably.

Delon Sanders, out of Fort Myers and finishing his third year at FSU, was just voted the Most Valuable Performer in the recent Metro Conference track and field meet, where he won the 100 and 200 meters and ran the third leg on the winning 4x100 relay team. This is Sanders' first track season. He now has qualified for the NCAA finals and the Olympic Trials. If he makes the NCAA finals in an event, he will be declared an All-American.

After the fine 1987 FSU football season, premier cornerback and punt returner Sanders was judged a consensus All-American in that sport. Shortly after that declaration, Sanders was picked as a 1988 preseason All-American outfielder in baseball. He won't be a baseball All-American, however, because this season he passed on the sport, at which he excelled last year, to give track a try. Now, he's thinking about giving basketball a try at FSU after the next football season. He was a second team all-stater at that sport at Fort Myers, where in football he quarterbacked and played defensive back.

Deion Sanders, in his three years of competition at FSU, will have played in a major bowl game (Fiesta, on New Year's Day, beating Nebraska) with a shot at the national title, he will have played in a College World Series (baseball, last year at Omaha), and after next week he will have run in the NCAA Track Championship in the 100 and 4x100. Can a Final Four basketball appearance be next? Bo Who?

This remarkable athlete stands 6-foot-1 and weighs 191 pounds. He plays all his sports effortlessly but full speed. In football, he's a terror at corner, a hitman, and a wordman as well. After the Seminole football team smothered Michigan State last year, Sanders said, 'that must have been somebody else in Lorenzo White's uniform today." The Seminoles shut down White, the great Michigan State running back, completely.

He is, by his own judgement and decision, a football player first. He is

a cinch high first-round NFL draft pick next year, although right now baseball people are asking him if he wants to consider that sport professionally. Maybe. Last year for the baseball Seminoles he batted .267 and stole 27 bases of the 36 he tried. He said baseball was too boring. Too much standing around. But he left the sport on good terms with Coach Mike Martin and asked permission to give track a try under Coach Dick Roberts. Doubtless one reason for this was his good friend, FSU running back Sammie Smith, is a track man. Smith, Sanders, running back Dexter Carter and world-class hurdler Arthur Blake make up the 4x100 relay team that will challenge in the NCAAs.

Sanders had not run track before this season.


His first 100 competitive meters he ran in 10.53 seconds, "which translates to 9.4 100 yards," said Roberts. "Most people would understand it that way better. His best 100 meters is 10.26, which qualifies him for the Olympic Trials," which Sanders probably will not pursue because of a conflict with football.

His best 200 was his only 200, 20.71 in the Metro Conference meet, and he won with it. Smith and Blake followed him for a 1-2-3 FSU finish. "Now, that was truly amazing," said Roberts. He then ran on the 4x100

winning team.

"I don't believe in my experience in track and field, which spans 23 years, that I have ever been associated with, or witnessed, anyone that performed so well, so quickly," Roberts went on. "He was instantly good at track. For example, when he ran his first 100, in the finish area, he toward the tape with the finesse of a world-class sprinter. I didn't teach him that. He smells the finish, I guess. His great size is a bonus for it is still the case of a good big man having a better shot than a good little man. How good can he be? I don't know. He is still trying to get comfortable at the start in the blocks. But we make no mistake around here, football is first with him."

"He claims he may want to try basketball next year," said Rob Wilson of the FSU public relations staff. "And now the baseball people are



wondering if he wants to play minor-league baseball this summer. In football he is a head hunter in the secondary and a threat with every

He is so quick and clever on punts. Coach Bobby Bowden may change his recent philosophies somewhat about that special team event. FSU has been celebrated in recent years as a punt blocking team, and it has worked effectively. But Sanders has been left naked to catch the punts that are gotten off and do what he could under that circumstance. Usually, he has done well. He has, in fact, broken all FSU punt return records. Twice he has scored touchdowns off them. As a defensive back, he has nine interceptions. His size and speed and killer attitude make him prime pro football material.

"We've never had anyone like him around here," said Wayne Hogan, FSU sports publicist. And he is but the fourth consensus FSU All-American. Ron Sellers, Greg Allen and Jamie Dukes were the others.

"Deion never ceases to amaze me," sald Bobby Bowden. "I had no idea he would be so good at track. In fact, while Bob Harbison, who signed him out of Fort Myers, was high on him, I could not have foreseen he would be as good as he is at football. Imagine having a fellow who can run the 40 in 4.2 seconds at cornerback. He can flat get to the ball, or run with it if he picks

it off. And he's big, and smart and a natural leader. He will have to be a leader this year ahead with (graduated linebacker) Paul McGowan gone." Bowden said he won't abandon the pressure FSU traditionally puts on punters, but at times "we will go for the return. We have to, with a talent like that. But pressure can cause shanks and he can catch shanks and run with

them, too Yes, there has been some agitation to move him to offense, but that won't happen.

"He's more valuable to us on defense," said Bowden. He surely is valuable to Bowden, to track, to baseball, and perhaps if he does indeed give it a whirl, basketball.

As if being a three-sport All-America talent is not enough.

SAMMIE SMITH: AN EXPLOSIVE RUNNER

The following article appeared in The Omaha World-Herald Tribune (December 22, 1987) prior to FSU's playing Nebrasks in the 1986 Fleste Bowl. Written by Lee Barkfknecht, it is reprinted with permission from the Tribune.

Tallahassee, Fla. - Florida State tailback Sammie Smith gushes when you bring up the name of 1982 Georgia Heisman Trophy winner Herschel Walker.

"He is the player I admire most," Smith said. "Going through junior high and high school, he was the man I really looked up to as a player and a person. I wanted to do some of same things he did."

So when people first began comparing Smith with Walker three years ago, the consensus high school All-American was delighted.

"Coming out of high school, it was a thrill to be mentioned with him," Smith said "but it really ended up hurting me more than helping me. I came to Florida State expecting to tear up the field the first year and it didn't happen."

In his second collegiate game, Smith gained 73 yards in helping FSU upset Nebraska 17-13 in 1985. But a stress fracture in his leg sidelined him after that, and he received a medical hardship.

Last year, as a second-year freshman, nagging leg and shoulder injuries limited Smith to 611 yards in nine games. But after what the Zellwood, Fla. native accomplished this year, the Smith-Walker talk is starting again.

Same Size

Smith sat out the season opener with a sprained knee, then bolted for a school-record 1,230 yards. He topped the 100-yard mark seven times, gained a career-high 244 yards against East Carolina and broke a 95-yard touchdown run against Furman. Of his nine touchdowns this season, seven were 25 yards or longer.

"Sammie can do it all when he is healthy," FSU Coach Bobby Bowden said. "A lot of people have wondered, but we've seen it."

If rushing statistics don't remind you of Walker, these physical facts might. Smith is 6 feet 2 and 221 pounds, Walker 6-2 and 223. Smiths runs the 100 meters in 10.31 seconds, Walker in 10.22.

"Sammie's got some of the same great assets that Herschel has, "said FSU offensive coordinator Wayne McDuffie, who coached the offensive line at Georgia during the Walker years. "He's not as mature as Herschel or quite as good - yet. But he's got two more years.

"He's got the size, the speed and the knack for making the right move in traffic. If you give him a seam, he'll go all the way on any given play. Regular backs don't do that."

Not Focal Point


Smith said the Walker talk no longer bothers him.

"It actually has helped me," he said. "It has forced me to settle down and learn to make a name for myself. I just have to be Sammie Smith."

With Smith's talent, it might be hard to be humble carrying the ball just 17 times a game.

"A lot of people ask me if I'm upset about not carrying the ball 30 times every game," he said. "But I really don't care, I am not the focal point of our offense.

"I don't care if I get a chance for a 2,000 yard season. We



have two or three tailbacks I share time with. Together, we gained more than 2,000 yards this season. That means just as much to me as one guy doing it."

The threesome of Smith, sophomore Dexter Carter (679 yards) and junior Victor Floyd (204 yards) combined for 2,113 yards and 15 touchdowns. The TD total might have been higher, but fullback Dayne Williams - FSU's short-yardage specialist - scored 15 touchdowns while gaining just 272 yards.

Smith had dozens of offers to attend schools that would have made him the feature attraction on offense. But FSU's balanced attack, in which he wouldn't be the focus, helped sell him on becoming a Seminole.

"This is a good place for a running back to come and develop if you're trying to get to the pros," he said. "You get a taste of running and receiving.

Developing for NFL

"Sure, I have Heisman Trophy aspirations. But if I have a year like I had this year and our team is successful, I feel I've accomplished as much as guys who carry the ball 300 times. And I only carried it 172."

Smith is on a roll. He has broken the 100-yard mark in six of his last seven games, including a 189-yard effort against a Miami defense allowing just 96.9 yards rushing a game on average. But he said he's not making any predictions about himself for next season.

"Right now, I'm just focusing on this last game," Smith said. "It's tempting to peek ahead and think about what I might get done next year. But the main thing on my mind is beating Nebraska in the Fiesta Bowl.

"This is a major bowl and it's what college football players dream about being in. We really want to go out and win because it would definitely sound a lot better to finish 11-1 than

CORNERBACK/PUNT RETURNER 6-0, 195, Senior F. Myers, Florida (North Ft. Myers High School)

he's the most exciting athlete in college football...everybody's All-American and a prime candidate for the Jim Thorpe Trophy...combines incredible speed (4.21 in the 40 timed for pro scouts) with power and grace...a sure Round #1 pick in next year's NFL draft...has nine career interceptions plus two in bowl games that are not included in his career stats...owns FSU's career punt return yardage record...a pre-season Playboy, Sporting News and College and Pro Football Weekly All-American...spent last spring on the track circuit for the first time and qualified for the Olympic Trials (10.26) with one of the top times in the nation...played minor league baseball for the New York Yankees over the summer in the Florida State league, forfeiting his FSU scholarship; the Yankees have agreed to pay for his final year of schooling at FSU...1987: Delon became only the sixth consensus All-American at FSU by being named to first team All-American squads by Walter Camp, Sporting News, Associated Press, United Press International, Kodak, Football News and the Football Writers Association...finished third in the Jim Thorpe voting behind Oklahoma's Ricky Dixon and Miami's Bennie Blades, who tied for first...intercepted four passes in 1987 and broke up nine ...played when the lights were on-against Auburn broke up four passes and intercepted another and against Michigan State and Nebraska broke up a pass and also had an interception in each game...had 46 tackles on the season...shut down several great receivers, including Tulane's Marc Zeno, Michigan State's Andre Rison and Auburn's Lawyer Tillman...broke the FSU season yardage mark for punt returns (381) after averaging 11.9 yards per return, the 14th best mark in the country...had 53 return yards vs. Miami. including a pretty 34-yarder; 99 yards vs. Michigan State, including a 53-yarder; and a 49-yard TD return vs. Tulane...Brent Musburger of CBS said Sanders was the "best cornerback in the country and as fine a punt returner as I've ever seen"...was honored by the Fiesta Bowl as a Good Samaritan All-American in the spring...on the track circuit, Deion qualified for the NCAA meet and the Olympic Trials, running the best FSU time (10.26) in eight years in only his third open 100 meter race... Deion won the 100 and 200 meter titles at the Metro Conference Championships and was named MVP of the meet ... he also joined Sammie Smith, Dexter Carter and world-class hurdler Arthur Blake on the 400 meter relay that won the Metro Conference title, ran at the NCAA meet and had one of the nation's fastest

times...was a pre-season Playboy All-American before the '87 football season...although he was a pre-season baseball All-American, did not play in '87 yet was drafted by the New York Yankees in the 18th round of the past draft...1986: made the Sporting News first team All-American squad and the third team of Associated Press...was also a UPI honorable mention choice and made the Football News Sophomore All-American team...a finalist for the Jim Thorpe Award...started nine of 11 regular-season games plus the bowl...his 61 tackles were sixth on the FSU team and his four interceptions were tops...caused two fumbles and credited with eight pass breakups...was named the FSU defensive MVP...picked off two interceptions vs. North Carolina...as a punt returner he averaged 9.4 yards per return...played well against Miami, getting a sensational interception and returning two punts for 49 yards...hit .221 in baseball with 28 stolen bases as the Seminoles made it to the College World Series...in the Metro Conference Championships, was named to the all-tournament baseball team and ran on FSU's 400 meter relay team-the first track experience of his career-between two of FSU's baseball games...1985: played in every game but Western Carolina where he sat out with a broken wrist...started three regular season games plus the Gator Bowl...had 42 tackles, four pass deflections and an interception vs. Tulsa that he returned 100 yards for an FSU record...made six tackles, broke up a pass and intercepted another in the Gator Bowl ... returned 30 punts for 255 yards and became the first Seminole since 1979 to return one for a TD when he broke a 58-yarder vs. Florida...he played with a rubber cast on a broken wrist in that game...played half of a baseball season until an ankle injury limited his play...batted .333 with 11 stolen bases...High School: played quarterback and defensive back as a senior...passed for 839 yards and rushed for 499 as a senior...limited by a knee injury late in the season...second team all-state in basketball after averaging 24 points...drafted by the Kansas City Royals...Personal Notes: nicknamed "Prime Time"...a social science major...born Aug. 9.

TAILBACK 6-2, 220, Junior Zellwood, Florida (Apopka High School)

nobody can overlook this young man for the Heisman Trophy voting...packs uncanny

sprinter's speed into a 6-2, 220 pound frame...a tough inside runner who is gone once he hits the secondary...a pre-season Playboy, Sporting News and College and Pro Football Weekly All-American...with two full years of eligibility left, he's already the fourth all-time leading rusher at FSU, lacking just 38 yards to reach the 2,000 yard mark...his 11 rushing touchdowns are ninth on the FSU all-time list...has 13 total TDs in his career and only two of those were less than 20-yard plays...Sammle would have flashier numbers if the Seminoles didn't rotate tailbacks...also a standout in track...1987: Sammie rushed for 1,230 yards, an FSU single season record, and averaged 123.0 yards per game, edging out Florida's Emmitt Smith for ninth place among the NCAA running backs...his average was also the nation's top sophomore mark...averaged 7.1 yards per rush and scored seven touchdowns...set school records for 100-yard days (7) and consecutive 100-yard outings (4)...rushed for a careerhigh 244 yards vs. East Carolina after coming off of a knee sprain in the second game of the year...had a TD run of 83 yards, which Smith himself describes as "the best run of my career", and another 52-yard pickup...was honored by Sports Illustrated as the magazine named him its Offensive Player of the Week ... rushed for 189 yards on CBS television vs. Miami and then closed the regular season with his second straight 100-yard game against Florida, picking up 111 yards as a CBS national audience looked on...his 95-yard sprint vs. Furman was the second longest TD run from scrimmage in FSU history...on the season caught six passes for 128 yards that included touchdown screen passes of 25 and 52 yards...was chosen to the first team of the All-South Independent squad and to the honorable mention list of the Associated Press All-American squad... got his first start of the year against Miami in the fifth game and started the rest of the way...missed the opener vs. Texas Tech with a knee sprain...on the track circuit ran 10.34, his second best 100 meter time...qualified and ran in the NCAA Championships with fellow footballers Deion Sanders and Dexter Carter and world-class hurdler Arthur Blake...the foursome turned in one of the nation's fastest times at 39.40...1986: a Football News Freshman All-American...ended the year by rushing for 205 yards and two TDs in the All-American Bowl and being named the MVP...his first collegiate 100-yard game (116) came in the last regular season game against Florida...rushed for 611 yards, a 5.9 average, and four TDs...also caught four passes for 39 yards...started three regular season games plus the bowl...was held out of the Wichita State game after missing practice and missed most of the Miami game and all of the South Carolina game with a separated shoulder...he got hit on the first offensive series vs. Miami after catching a 20-yard pass down the middle...rushed for an early-season 72 yards on nine carries on national TV vs. Nebraska, including a 52-yard scamper on a fake reverse...had 75 yards against Michigan on 13 carries and 81 on 14 carries vs. Louisville...his 74 vards vs. Southern Miss was on just four carries, including a 62-yard TD run...on the track, Sammie ran a 10.31 timing in the 100 meters and also ran on the 400 meter relay that qualified for the NCAA meet...a baton drop at nationals kept Smith and the relay from finishing...Metro Conference champion in the 100 and 200 meters... 1985: played in the first three games of the season before suffering a stress fracture in his leg and qualifying for

a medical hardship...had 121 yards on 28 carries, including a 74yard, 12-carry performance vs. Nebraska...High School: named to every all-star team in the country...a Parade, USA Today and Bally All-American... Football News named him one of its top 100 seniors in the country...also a first team class 4A all-state and Florida Super 24 pick...gained 1,210 yards in 119 carries and scored 16 TDs while playing in 7.5 games...rushed for 930 yards in five of those games...twice had 200-yard halfs...rushed for 175 yards in 17 carries for MVP honors in the Georgia-Florida all-star game, including a 73yard TD run...as a junior, rushed for 1,485 yards in 180 carries and scored 23 times...won the class 4A sprinting titles in the 100 (9.6) and 220 (21.3) his junior year and was third as a senior...Personal Notes: ran 4.31/4.32 for pro scouts in the 40...lists his sports idol as Herschel Walker...a social science major...he and his wife, Angie, have a daughter, Janay Chantelle...born May 16, 1967...

OFFENSIVE TACKLE 6-4, 303, Senior Middleburg, Florida (Middleburg High School)

"He's the best offensive lineman I've ever coached" says offensive coordinator Wayne

McDuffie...that's a tremendous quote from McDuffie, who coached the offensive line at Georgia that paved the way for Herschel Walker's record-setting seasons as well as the 1980 national championship...McDuffle has also coached former FSU All-American Jamie Dukes, who is on the roster of the Atlanta Falcons...McDuffie continues talking about his All-American tackle: "He comes the closest to perfecting technique of anyone I've seen. He's extremely quick and tough-he's one of the toughest players I've ever coached. He has a defensive player's disposition. Every college coaching staff that came in here during the spring noticed him right away and said he was one of the best they'd ever seen"... Tomberlin is a pre-season All-American on most lists, including Sporting News, College and Pro Football Weekly and Playboy...received the team's leadership award from FSU coaches during the 1988 spring drills...has started 33 straight games for the Tribe...1987; named to the Associated Press'second team on its All-American squad...was also a first team All-South Independent choice...anchored an offensive line that scored more points than any FSU team in history and also ran up the second most points and the third most offensive yardage in college football for 1987...FSU quarterbacks were sacked only six times all season...graded out to 80 or above for five games, excellent marks under McDuffie's grading system...highest grade was a 91 vs. Tulane...in every major game. Tomberlin played every minute of every down....1986: made Harry DeVold's "Almost All-American" team and earned second team sophomore All-American honors from Football News... Associated Press tabbed him an honorable mention All-American and he was a first team All-South Independent choice...played with a broken hand in the All-American Bowl...1985: Played in every game but the Seminoles' contest with Nebraska and became a starter in the fourth game...received second team All-South Independent honors and Associated Press honorable mention All-America honors...was one of seven first-year FSU freshmen to letter...High School: made 65 stops as a senior defensive tackle...named to the class 4A all-state and Florida Super 24 teams...pitched for his high school baseball team...Personal Notes: a physical education and coaching major...nicknamed "Ton"...born Jan. 29, 1966...





NOSEGUARD 6-1, 252, Junior Bartow, Florida (Bartow High School)

one of four All-American candidates in 1988 for FSU and the leader of the Seminole

defense...has been named to the Sporting News pre-season All-American team...decided prior to spring workouts that he would stay at the nose position instead of moving back to linebacker, the position he had previously played...1988: at the start of fall practice Haggins was told he would be the starting noseguard although he had left '87 spring practice fighting for a starting berth at inside linebacker...his only "deal" with head coach Bobby Bowden was that he'd be allowed to return to linebacker once the season was over...as the Seminoles' nose man, Haggins led the defense to its best ranking since 1980 and made several all-star teams, including the second team of the All-South Independent list and honorable mention on the Associated Press All-American list...his eight quarterback sacks tied him for third on the all-time Seminole sack chart...hls 73 total tackles were the fourth best mark on the '87 squad also...turned in great performances against Michigan State and Auburn; against MSU had 14 tackles that included two tackles for loss, two sacks and a caused fumble and against Auburn had three sacks and a tackle for loss among his eight tackles...recovered a fumble vs. East Carolina...named co-most improved player along with Eric Hayes by the coaching staff following the season . . . 1986: made 37 tackles, including three for loss, while seeing backup duty at linebacker ... also broke up four passes... had a team-high 10 tackles vs. Wichita State and recovered a fumble in that game...had nine tackles vs. Southern Miss and eight vs. Michigan...1985: played on FSU's scout team while being redshirted and was named the defensive scout team Player of the Year... he's expected to be the Seminole kicker for 1988...has a strong leg and has been impressive on long kicks...hit a 46-yard field goal in the spring game but missed an extra point and a short field goal...must improve his consistency in close...could also be called upon to punt if needed, but coaches would rather keep him to kicking chores...1987: Richie was one of three true freshmen to letter...he kicked off for FSU in every game and did a good job of getting the ball deep...High School: was generally considered one of the top three kickers in the South after a senior year where he hit 15 of 18 flield goals, three of those over 50 yards...owns the second longest field goal (58 yards) in state prep history...first team 4A all-state and a Super 24 Senior who played in the state's all-star game with Georgia...also played soccer...Personal Notes: born March 11, 1969...

if the Seminoles played Miami tomorrow, Chip would be the starting quarterback...also went into spring workouts as number one, although Peter Tom Willis grabbed the position for a week...completed eight of 17 passes for 67 yards and a TD in the spring game...a fierce competitor...improved in his reading of defenses and making good decisions...has kept his weight down which has improved his quickness...quarterback coach Mark Richt calls him an "ice man"-he's very good under pressure...has the most experience of all FSU quarterbacks...his 18 career touchdown passes are ninth on the FSU all-time list and his 2,132 passing yards are 11th...1987: Chip spent the entire season as a backup, getting playing time in eight regular season games while Danny McManus engineered the team to the Fiesta Bowl...the games he did not play in were Miami, Auburn, Florida and Nebraska...completed an impressive 59 percent of his passes (26-44) for 335 yards and three touchdowns...completed seven of eight passes for 66 yards vs. East Carolina and engineered two TD drives in the game-sprinting in from the 10 on the second...completed five of eight passes vs. Furman for 62 yards and a TD...1986: although it certainly didn't measure up to his freshman year, he began the season as the starter and came out hot, hitting 17 of 28 passes vs. Toledo for 176 yards...over the next three games, Ferguson would be sacked 12 times while completing just 21 of 49 passes for 356 yards...Nebraska sacked him seven times...a poor performance against Michigan (6-19, 73 yards) caused Bobby Bowden to turn to McManus...Ferguson went to third team until he was called upon to relieve Peter Tom Willis against South Carolina-he brought the Seminoles back from a 21-6 USC lead, completing 15 of 22 passes for 228 yards and a TD and a 45-28 win...didn't play in the Florida game or the bowl game...on the season completed 63 of 128 passes (49.1 percent) for 807 yards and four touchdowns...was intercepted seven times...1985: it was a storybook season for Ferguson, who came from a fourth team position to lead the Seminoles to the Gator Bowl championship...was named the bowl MVP after completing 20 of 43 passes for 338 yards and two TDs...it was later learned that he had cracked a collarbone in the first quarter...during the regular season completed 70 of 130 passes for 990 yards (53.9 percent) and 11 TDs...named Freshman All-American by Football News...first was called upon in a pressure situation in the Kansas game—the fourth game of the season—with FSU behind 20-10 in the fourth guarter...threw a 68-yard bomb to Phillip Bryant and then on the next series directed a 62-yard drive for the winning score...came off the bench again in the North Carolina game in the third quarter to complete 15 of 23 passes for 124 yards and a TD while FSU once again came from behind to win...got his first start against Miami and took over for the rest of the season...probably his most "freshman-like" performance came earlier against Auburn when he was intercepted and fumbled on his first two series in the fourth quarter, both leading to quick Tiger scores...High School: played at Spartanburg High School as a senior, setting single-season records for touchdowns (21) and total offensive yards (2,557), breaking Steve Fuller's (Clemson/Chicago Bears) marks...also ran for 10 TDs as his team went 12-1 and lost in the state finals... capped his career by throwing for 125 yards and a TD in the South Carolina-North Carolina Shrine game...ironically, Chip played in North Carolina for the earlier part of his career...at Independence High School, where he was a teammate of Steve Gabbard, he threw for 1,400 yards, leading the team to a 7-3 record...as a sophomore, Ferguson hit 59 of 60 extra points, serving as the squad's kicker while Mark Maye (now a senior at North Carolina) was the quarterback...Personal Notes: Chip's parents attend every game, home or away...a child development major...Chip had over a 3.0 GPA for the 1986-87 school year...born March 16, 1967...





Calhoun Academy)—although he grew up a Bulldog fan, signed with Florida State because of the role of the tight end in the FSU offense... attended a private school and was named the top player in South Carolina among those schools... 46 catches for 781 yards and seven touchdowns... all-conference for three years in football, basketball and baseball... plans to major in interior design...

PETE PRINZI, QB/DB, 6-0, 185, TAMPA, FLA. (Plant)—an "athlete", Prinzi may be looked at first as a safety . . . played quarterback in high school, throwing for 2,281 yards and 13 TDs in his junior and senior seasons combined . . . broke his leg in the last game of his senior season . . . finished first in his county in the President's Physical Fitness Program competition . . . father Vic was a former FSU quarterback and serves as the current Seminole Sports Network color analyst . . . Pete plans to major in business . . .

(Robertsdale)—a member of the Orlando Sentinel's All-South team, Stallworth had 103 tackles and 49 assists as a senior . . . 5 A all-state . . . originally committed to LSU . . . president of his high school class and also the National Honor Society . . . had a 3.8 GPA

ROBERT STEVENSON, OL, 6-3, 250, PENSACOLA, FLA. (Escambia) — he really signed with the Class of 1987, but did not enroll when he didn't get the ACT score needed under Proposition 48...re-tested and passed the exam last fall and spent two terms attending Pensacola Junior College on a part-time basis...he will be a full-fledged freshman in 1988...a second team All-South selection his senior year in high school after blocking for the nation's number one runner, Emmitt Smith...Stevenson made the first team of the

4A all-state squad . . . high school offensive coordinator Max is now a graduate assistant on the FSU coaching staff . . .

OLIVER STRICKLAND, DL, 6-3, 285, PHILADELPHIA, PA. (West Philadelphia)—named to the Super Prep Magazine All-American team on offense . . . his coach says he's the best offensive lineman he's coached in 25 years . . . FSU recruited him to play on its defensive line . . . father lives in Callahan, just north of Jacksonville, and Oliver attended West Nassau High School there until his senior year when he moved to Philadelphia . . . ran 4.83 in the 40 at Penn State's football camp . . . picked FSU over Florida, Pitt, UCLA and Penn State . . . has thrown the shot put 59 feet . . .
