ll media, with the exception of the live network telecast crew, will work from the 9th level of the press box. Media can access the press box only through the designated elevator in the northwest tower of the University Center. Media should proceed down Stadium Drive after parking and move towards Gate B in the northwest corner of the endzone. Do not enter the stadium, however, as you must proceed to the right and enter through the external doors marked "Press Entrance."

Credential Requests

All requests for working press, radio, television, photography or scouting credentials should be directed to Sports Information Director Rob Wilson no later than four days prior to the game. Requests for season credentials should be made at least two weeks prior to the first game.

Space for the working press, radio and television is allocated by the FSU Sports Information Office.

Press Policies

Working press only will be admitted to the press box where seats will be credentialed by FSU according to the following criteria:

State newspapers by circulation, wire services, national publications, newspapers from oppo-nents' area and student newspapers from FSU and opponents' schools.

Other daily newspapers with preference given to those which regularly cover FSU.

Radio and television personnel not broadcasting live, but considered reporting (seats may be provided in the stands and locker room access granted).

Non-daily newspapers, with preference given to those which regularly cover FSU.

Scouts.

Freelance and/or non-daily writers will be asked to produce copies of actual publications in which their work has appeared. In some cases, these materials will be required as verification of the writers' status. Your cooperation and understanding is requested in such instances.

In accordance with NCAA and FSU policies, internet sites, other than that of the opposing team, will not be credentialed.

Media Headquarters

The media headquarters hotel for Florida State football will be the Holiday Inn located at 316 West Tennessee Street in downtown Tallahassee. Most media functions, in-

Bobby," will be held at the Holiday Inn. The FSU sports information office has a limited number of rooms set aside for accredited media during home football weekends. Contact Lynn Hobby of the SID office at (850/644-2016) to make reservations for these rooms. Priority will be determined in the

same manner spelled out under "press policies."

SPECIAL NOTE — Media reservations for the Holiday Inn will require a TWO NIGHT MINI-MUM. There will be no exceptions. When reserving a room through FSU, it will be necessary to give a credit card number to guarantee the room. Florida State may have a limited number of rooms available at the team hotel for road games. Media should

contact Hobby for information on availability of these rooms.

Radio-TV

Florida State will host network television and both home and visiting radio in booths in the press box. Network television (or the network broadcasting live) will be working from a mid-field booth on the 8th Level (one below working press). Both home and visiting radio will broadcast from booths at the south end of the 9th Level.

Photographers 2 4 1

Only accredited photographers and those shooting for the FSU Sports Information Office will be issued working credentials.

Florida State reserves the right to admit only those photographers deemed to be on the premises for legitimate media purposes. All photographers working FSU games should be prepared to show a media ID card and equipment designed to photograph major college football.

Florida State uses a double photo line system on its sidelines. Only those photographers actually shooting the game will be allowed on the "front"


line. These shooters will be given photo armbands upon checkin to allow them front line access. All other photo personnel will be required to stay behind a second line so as not to obstruct the view of the shooters. This would include grips, runners and sideline reporters. Violation of the double-line system will result in removal from the sideline. No media personnel are allowed in the team area of the sidelines at any time during a game.

Sideline passes for local television will be severely curtailed for televised games and each station will be restricted to two passes. Still photographers may have access to the sidelines only. Those holding a photography credential should report to the Press Box where they will be issued an armband, rosters and a pre-game meal. The only access to the field is through the gate at the northwest corner of the stadium near Gate A.

Video Services

Florida State's Sports Information Office has the ability to assist networks and television stations by providing video services through Seminole Productions, Inc. (SPI). The FSU athletic department has a working relationship with SPI and its general manager, Mark Rodin. Seminole Productions has editing and studio facilities on site and can produce material upon request. In most cases, there will be a nominal fee charged for these services. Please call Rodin at 850/644-8624 to arrange for these services.





Press Parking

Once again, parking is extremely limited in 2000 and passes will be issued on a priority basis within the same guidelines as working credentials.

Telephones

Telephone service should be secured directly through the Florida State University Office of Tele-communications at 850/644-2414. Have them contact the Sports Information Office for location. The Tele-communications Office can provide both lines and phones. Please specify the type of line needed (i.e. touchtone, etc.).

Fax Service

An independent fax service will be available for each game. Please contact a member of the Sports Information Office staff during the game to secure post-game fax service.

Releases, Standings, Statistics and other sports information are available by accessing www.mediateamlink.com. You can have documents delivered directly to your e-mail and/or fax the moment they are updated. You can also view documents online. MediaTeamlink® is FREE to all accredited Media.

Log on to www.mediateamlink.com if you do not already have an account and click the "Sign Up Here" button and complete the short form. Documents requested via fax will incur a 15¢ per page fee. This site is for accredited media only. Pivotal will conduct an audit to eliminate non-accredited media.

Documents are also still available on InfoConnection[®]. To access, please dial (770) 558-6000 from the handset of your fax machine and enter your 10-digit PIN. If you do not have a PIN number, please call Pivotal Communications at (770) 399-0096.

ACC Teleconference

Each Wednesday during the 2000 football season, Coach Bowden will be available to the media on the ACC football teleconference call, along with the other eight league coaches. Bowden will be on the call from 11:20-11:30 a.m. every Wednesday from Sept. 1 through Nov. 17. Contact the FSU Sports Information Office or the Atlantic Coast Conference Office to get the number for the call, as well as a complete listing of the coaches and times. This is the only weekly conference call Coach Bowden will conduct in 2000.

ACC Satellite Feed

Video highlights and taped interviews with Florida State players and coaches can be obtained each week via an ACC satellite feed put up by JP Sports. The feed, which will contain at least six minutes of Florida State information, will run weekly beginning the first week in September. Contact FSU or the ACC to get the coordinates and time for the feed.

Breakfast With Bobby

Following each Seminole home game, Head Coach Bobby Bowden will join the media Sunday morning at 8:30 a.m., for a continental breakfast, followed by a question and answer session. Breakfast with Bobby will be held at the Holiday Inn, FSU's media hotel.

Conference Call

On road game weekends, media may talk to Bowden via a Sunday conference call. Contact a member of the Sports Information Office during the previous day's game for

further information.

Road Game Credentials

Writers covering Florida State on a regular basis may make requests for road credentials with the opponent school or with the FSU Sports Information Office by Monday of pame week.

Interviews

Media interviews with all FSU players should be ar-

ranged through the Sports Information Office. For phone interviews, a staff member will fill out a card asking the player to return the call. Please give one day advance notice when requesting players for mid-week interviews. All player calls to the media will be made collect.

Seminole players are available to the media on a daily basis during the lunch hours in the atrium area of the Moore Athletic Center. Contact the Sports Information staff member working lunch with your request. Advance notice is helpful in setting up face-to-face interviews to ensure that the player requested will be present that day.



DOAK CAMPBELL STADIUM



rom a maximum capacity of 15,000 in 1953 to a record crowd of 81,614 against Florida in 1998, Doak S. Campbell Stadium has risen alongside the Florida State football program to the top of the college football ladder. With final phases of construction completed, Seminole fans are welcomed with state-of-the-art additions.

The newest portion of the stadium is the south end zone, where the last bricks have been placed on the exterior of the stadium wall and the interior received its final finishing touches. The south end zone houses the Florida State school of hospitality education where students in the program receive hands-on experience in various aspects of the food and beverage industry. The multi-level facility includes a food court, a restaurant and a sports

grill on the top floor that gives a panoramic view of Doak Campbell Stadium.

The north endzone, which consisted of wooden bleachers until the 1994 season kicked off, is topped by the offices of the football coaches. The offices, which overlook the field, are just part of the Daisy Parker Flory wing of the Moore Athletic Center which

include a number of amenities for the football staff. In addition, the new wing allowed athletic offices housed in Tully Gym to move over to the Moore Athletic Center and be under one roof for the first time in school history.

Towering above college football action below from the east side are skyboxes which stretch from goal line to goal line. Newly added skyboxes are located above the west stands on the eighth floor. The new west addition also houses the president's level on the seventh floor (which includes an open air terrace in the northwest corner) and one of the largest press boxes in college football with seating for over 200 members of the media.

A brick facade surrounds the stadium, matching the architectural design of most of building on the Florida State campus. The University Center surrounds Doak Campbell Stadium and houses numerous offices that were located on the interior of the FSU campus.

Inside Doak Campbell, the lowest tier of field level seats has been removed, providing increased sideline space and better viewing lines for the first few rows of fans. A matching brick wall has been constructed along the east and west sidelines, limiting field access, increasing safety and giving the inside of the stadium a whole new look.

The increased seating capacity of Doak Campbell Stadium, now at 80,000, means more fans, and no place for all the noise

they make to go. That means an even louder stadium. As if Bobby Bowden and his team needed any more home field advantage!

The Seminoles currently own a 29-game home winning streak and have not been beaten in their last 46. In its last 74 home games, FSU is 71-2-1. Bobby Bowden's Florida State teams have lost only 16 games at home in 24 years, giving the coach an impressive 122-16-2 record and .878 winning percentage in Tallahassee. A milestone was reached on September 28, 1996 when Bowden won his 100th game in Doak Campbell Stadium as FSU's head coach with a 13-0 victory over North Carolina.

But the winning feeling of Doak Campbell Stadium, which was named after FSU president Doak S. Campbell, goes back before Bowden. All-time, Florida State is 204-66-4 in 274 home

games for a winning percentage of .752

Since the stadium opened on Oct. 7, 1950 with Florida State University taking a 40-7 victory over the Randolph-Macon Yellowjackets, millions of fans have packed Doak Campbell to see the finest in college football action. In 1998, Florida State set a single season attendance mark by drawing 482,941 fans over six home games.

The latest expansion is the ninth in the history of the stadium. The current capacity of 80,000 reflects an increase of 19,481

since the end of the 1991 season.

Florida State first began play at Centennial Field during the inaugural 1947 season. In the three seasons that the Seminoles called Centennial Field their home, FSU had an overall home record of 8-4, including Coach Don Veller's undefeated 8-0 home mark over the 1948 and '49 seasons.

It's hard to imagine the first Doak Campbell Stadium, with a capacity of 15,000 back in 1950. In 1954, the stadium grew to a capacity of 19,000. Six thousand more seats were added in 1961. During the Bill Peterson era (1960-70), the stadium was expanded to 40,500 seats, and it remained at that capacity for the next 14 years. Between 1978 and 1982, there were three more additions.

Named for Doak S. Campbell, the first president of Florida State University, the stadium sits adjacent to the Moore Athletic Center on the edge of the main campus. The stadium seats, each offering an unrestricted view, rise out of a Bermuda grass turf enclosing the field. Fans enjoy all the modern conveniences with spacious aisles, numerous concession areas and plenty of rest room facilities. A professional public address system, first aid booths and effective security system operate at every Seminole home game.

The field itself is one of the finest in college football, carefully managed and manicured year-round. A prescription athletic turf (PAT) system installed in 1988 and completely resodded three years ago, quickly alleviates drainage problems through a series of underground pumps. The field can go from seemingly flooded to merely wet in a matter of minutes, thanks to the pumps, which allow a deeper root system in the natural turf.

Last season marked another new addition to Doak Campbell Stadium as FSU unveiled the War Board video system. The big screen presentation is crystal clear and allows game day producers to show highlights of games all over the country to Seminole

fans watching their team in the stadium.

With the changes already made since last season, Doak Campbell is growing and improving faster than ever before. Like its residents, the most successful college football program over the past decade, Doak Campbell Stadium has become a fitting showcase for Florida State University.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

lorida State University's athletic staff is well aware of the importance of media coverage and is briefed continually on the role of the media insofar as it interacts with their respective duties. At no time is this cooperation more important than in the postgame interview and locker room procedures. To ensure the most workable situation for members of the media and for the FSU staff, the following procedures must be observed:

Entrance to the Florida State locker room can be made only
through the second floor interview room. All members of
the media will be directed to this room by the FSU Sports
Information staff immediately at the conclusion of the game.
It is helpful if all media personnel assemble at the tunnel
entrance in the north end zone following the conclusion of
the game. You will not be allowed access to the locker room
through the player entrance, so follow closely.

Florida State Coach Bobby Bowden will be brought directly to the interview room as soon as he dismisses the team and

declares the locker room open.

 When Coach Bowden makes his appearance in the interview room, members of the media who wish to go to the locker room will be shown the proper route. Down one flight of stairs leads directly into the player dressing area.

FLORIDA STATE'S LOCKER ROOM IS OPEN TO ALL MEDIA. HOWEVER, IT IS IMPERATIVE THAT FEMALE REPORTERS INFORM FSU SPORTS INFORMATION PERSONNEL DURING THE GAME THAT THEY WILL NEED LOCKER ROOM ACCESS. (FSU players have been assured they will be told on a game-by-game basis whether there will be female reporters in the locker room—a courtesy we feel must be extended.)

Exit from the locker room and access back to the press box can be made through the player entrance to the stadium.

Each visiting team will set its own post-game interview policy, which will be announced on the inside public address system in the fourth quarter. Check with the opposing team's sports information personnel in the press box if you have any other questions.

There is an interview room outside the visitors' locker room, where the visiting head coach and/or players may be brought for interviews following the game. The visiting team locker room and interview area is located through the gate at the southeast corner of the field.

It is our desire at Florida State to make the post-game procedure as effective as possible for both the media and our staff. Remember, both groups have important tasks and are under extreme pressure.



2000 PRESEASON OUTLOOK

lorida State head coach Bobby Bowden begins his 25th season at FSU with a tall order — duplicate last season. The Seminoles will be hard pressed to improve on the 1999 season that saw the Tribe go undefeated, win the national championship and spend the entire season ranked No. 1 for the first time in the history of the Associated Press poll. With eyes always set on the next goal, Bowden quickly points out that the season-opener against BYU in the Pigskin Classic will give the Seminoles the chance at 13 games in 2000 and, "we've never gone 13-0."

Optimism and expectations run as high as has become normal in Tallahassee with Seminole fans pointing to the return of 13 starters from last season's national championship team, including seven starters on defense and six on offense. Florida State may have already gotten it's biggest break of the 2000 season when quarterback Chris Weinke decided to return

for his senior season and for "a chance to do it all one more time." Weinke's decision put him in great company as Florida State has earned a reputation as a place where players want to enjoy their entire career. Weinke's choice to stay in school means he will join former Seminoles Corey Simon, Peter Warrick, Andre Wadsworth, Warrick Dunn, Derrick Brooks and all the way back to Deion Sanders as potential high draft picks who stayed for their senior seasons.

FSU's biggest obstacle, in addition to the 12 opponents standing in front of a potential bowl game, is the fact that the Seminoles must replace four consensus All-Americans. Gone are wide receiver Peter Warrick, defensive tackle Corey Simon, offensive guard Jason Whitaker and kicker Sebastian Janikowski.

The 2000 schedule features eight games which will be played within the state of Florida, but that includes an always treacherous visit to the Orange Bowl for the annual game against Miami. In addition, FSU must travel to Georgia Tech, Maryland, NC State and Wake Forest. The Seminoles will open in Jacksonville against BYU on August 26th and will host North Carolina, Louisville, Duke, Virginia and Florida.

"We are very excited about the potential of the 2000 season," admitted Bobby Bowden. "We had an excellent spring and we were very fortunate for the most part with injuries. Because we had guys healthy most of the spring we were able to get a lot done.

"The biggest thing I looked for in

the spring was any sign of complacency. That's the thing that could hold us back quickest. We still must find out if this team is hungry enough to live up to the potential. So far, I've liked most of what I've seen. They don't look like they expect wins to just be handed to them.

"Offensively, the key will be a veteran offensive line. We've got a chance to have a much improved running game, because I think we can be more physical up front. We've got the runners and we have experience in front of them. Chris' (Weinke) decision to play his senior season makes a big difference. Now we go into the fall with two guys with starting experience at quarterback and that may give us a chance to hold some other guys out.

"We told our receivers in spring that we must find out who can make the plays that Peter Warrick and Ron Dugans did last year. While the consistency isn't there yet, the whole group made some big plays in the spring. We've got some real talent there.

"Defensively, we entered the spring with the need to establish some players along the defensive front. You can't replace the experience and talent of veterans like Corey Simon and Jerry Johnson, but you can find players who want to play bad enough to pay the price. There was some

improvement there, but preseason practice will be crucial up front.

"Overall, we won't shy away from the fact that we want to be playing for the national champion-

If we can get a little lucky, stay away from injuries, and this team works hard enough to reach its potential, we've got a chance to be as good as last year."

Quarterbacks

Returning at quarterback is **Chris Weinke** who could rewrite most of the Florida State record book this season. The statistic that most impresses FSU fans is the bottom line — his win-loss record. Weinke is one of the most successful quarterbacks in the history of college football with a stunning 21-1 record as the starting quarterback for the Seminoles, which includes his current string of 20 straight wins. Weinke threw for 3,103 yards and 25 touchdowns over the regular season last year, then burned Virginia Tech's top-ranked defense for 329 yards and four touchdowns in the national championship game. He led the ACC in passing yards per game last year with an average of 282.1 and ranked seventh nationally in passing efficiency (145.1). Weinke already ranks fifth in FSU history with 5,672 passing yards and is just 707 yards away from becoming FSU's all-time passing leader.

Working an equal number of snaps with the first team at quarterback during spring drills was proven starter Marcus Outzen. Pressed into the starting role over the last four games of 1998, Outzen brought FSU from behind to defeat Virginia then won his next two starts against Wake Forest and Florida before falling short in the 1998 national championship game against Tennessee. Coaches used his athleticism all last year, primarily in running situations, but they are confident in his ability to

win for Florida State.

True freshman Fabian Walker already has FSU followers buzzing with his mobility and strong arm. He originally signed with the Seminoles last year, but enrolled at FSU in January and progressed nicely during spring drills. California phenom Chris Rix will see his first

this fall, but brings a reputation as one of the west coast's finest athletes to the FSU campus.

Running Backs

Coaches emphasized the power running game during the spring with the return of all six of their scholarship tailbacks. Travis Minor is back for his senior season after rushing for 815 yards and seven touchdowns last year. Minor is a proven tailback with 2,295 career yards, which ranks him among the nation's top five returning rushers. Nagging injuries slowed Minor some over the last two seasons, but rarely sidelined the tough competitor. He had an excellent spring that included a 75-yard touchdown run in the spring game that put an exclamation point on his dedication to having a great senior year. While it would be difficult for Minor to catch Warrick Dunn and Greg Allen at the very top of FSU's career rushing charts, he is just 659 yards away from becoming one of FSU's top three all-time leading rushers.

Jeff Chaney also returns after an excellent junior season including terrific games against Florida and Virginia Tech. Chaney, who changed his jersey number from 24 to 1 this year, gives the Tribe a bigger back who can play fullback as well. Davy

Ford continues an amazing recovery from knee injuries in 1997 and 1998. He ran the fastest 40 of all Seminoles in the spring when he was clocked at 4.2. Sophomore Nick

Maddox was the Tribe's third leading rusher as a rookie last year with 111 yards on 29 car-

ries.

tailback, but must recover from a knee injury suffered during spring drills. FSU's abundance of talent at tailback in 2000 has shifted the coaches plans on special teams where they will rely more on the running backs as kick returners instead of the receivers and defensive backs they have used in the past.

The fullback position should be strong in 2000 as well with the return of William McCray. McCray was running first team at fullback last season before he injured an ankle after the first game of the season that required immediate season-ending surgery. McCray had an excellent spring and coaches are very confident in his ability

Former walk-on **Chad Maeder** played well in a reserve role last year although limited by a broken hand midway through the year. Freshman **Randy Golightly** redshirted last year, but got in a lot of reps in the spring and improved dramatically.

Offensive Line

Much of the optimism surrounding the offense centers around the returning veterans on the all-important offensive line.

The Seminoles welcome back three starters from last year and perhaps, even more importantly, there will be competition at virtually every position in preseason drills.

Senior Tarlos Thomas returns for his third sea-

son as the

Returning at split guard is a player selected most improved on offense last year and Justin Amman's continued success will make him tough to beat out. He started every game last year and is counted on to anchor the position as a senior. Sophomore Todd Williams has great potential and will begin the season behind Amman. Williams got some much needed scrimmage time during spring drills and proved to coaches that he has the physical tools to be an exceptional player.

Perhaps the biggest surprise of last season was how quickly Brett Williams worked himself into an outstanding split tackle. An injury to Ross Brannon, who was a two-year starter and All-ACC performer, forced coaches to move Williams, then a fresh-

man, into the starting lineup midway through the season and he simply never let anyone take the position away. By the end of the year, he had shut down highlytouted defensive ends Alex Brown of Florida and Corey Moore of Vir-

starter at tight tackle. He earned First Team All-ACC honors in 1999 and played extremely well particularly late in the season. An excellent pass blocker and veteran of two straight national title games, Thomas is listed just ahead of another talented athlete in Charron Dorsey. Dorsey's potential is so great that coaches may look at the possibility of redshirting the big senior in 2000 if he does not break into the starting lineup.

Despite the loss of starter Eric Thomas, the center position also looks promising with a proven player in Jarad Moon leading the way. Moon platooned as the starter at center in 1998 and saw considerable time behind Eric Thomas last year. He had a fine spring at a position that is among the most demanding in football. In addition to snapping in both conventional and shotgun sets, FSU centers must call the blocking assignments once they reach the line of scrimmage. Sophomore Antoine Mirambeau seems to have found a home at center and needs only experience to become a solid contributor. Also seeing playing time at center in 2000 with be Josh Baggs.

The biggest question mark coming into preseason drills for FSU offensive line coach Jimmy Heggins will be at tight guard. Jerry Carmichael was well on his way to winning the position and giving the Seminoles yet another veteran starter, but he suffered a knee injury during the spring that will leave the early part of 2000 cloudy for him. Montrae Holland is only a sophomore, but coaches are anxious to see more of him on the football field. He played a tremendous game against Clemson last year, but missed the rest of the year with an ankle injury. Coaches had hoped he would have a big spring and enter 2000 as a potential starter, but he missed the second half of drills with another injury. He will enter the fall as the likely starter, but will need a strong preseason to hold the position. Sophomore Otis

Duhart redshirted last season and is push-

ing to be the starter at tight guard. Junior Ronald Boldin used a solid spring to prove to coaches that he's ready to play

Also returning for 2000 is senior Nick Franklin who would have seen a lot of playing time last year had a preseason knee injury not taken him out for the season. Patrick Hughes and Carver Donaldson both saw action last year and will be trying to use preseason drills to move up the depth chart.

Receivers

The bad news for receivers' coach Jeff Bowden is that Peter Warrick and Ron Dugans have graduated. The good news for the Seminoles is that they return a stable of talented players including emerging stars Marvin Minnis, Anquan Boldin, Robert Morgan and Atrews Bell. Minnis is the Seminole's top returning receiver with 19 catches for 257 yards and three touchdowns last year. Boldin is already proving to be a leader and his talent has everyone excited. He caught 12 passes for 115 yards and two touchdowns as a true freshman in 1999. Morgan made big catches all last year, and has great hands and the toughness to go over the middle. Morgan's 16 receptions for 245 yards ranks him as FSU's second leading returning receiver. Bell made every catch count last year finishing second on the squad with four touchdowns on just 14 receptions.

Sophomore Talman Gardner could not seem to stay healthy this spring, but made the most of his chances with a big spring game which included three catches for a game-high 96 yards. Classmate Greg Moore suffered a knee injury in spring and will be questionable entering fall drills. FSU coaches did get a chance to see junior college transfer Javon Walker during spring and he proved that he will see immediate playing time in the fall. Big and fast, Walker made the big plays all spring including hauling in a 51-yard bomb in the Garnet and Gold game.

Defensive Line

The strength of last year's national championship team on defense was a pair of senior interior lineman. The graduation of Corey Simon and Jerry Johnson leaves a void there and filling it was a top priority this spring for Mickey Andrews and his staff. As fall begins, the Tribe will trade seniors for a

redshirt freshman and sophomore as Kevin Emanuel and Chris Woods are listed at first team defensive tackle and noseguard, respectively.

Woods played impressively down the stretch last year especially in relief at the Sugar Bowl. His 27 tackles last year ranks him fourth among the returning down linemen this year. However, he must

fight off the charge of freshman Jeff Womble and sophomore Rian Cason in the important position.

Coaches searching for answers this spring moved Emanuel to defensive tackle and they found that he had the

Emanual needs to gain weight and lower body strength, but coaches are very encouraged by his performance in just 15 practices at the position. Listed behind Emanuel at defensive tackle is Woods again, who can play either interior position. Senior Randy Wilkins hopes to use a strong preseason to earn playing time at tackle as does sophomore Tony Benford.

Jamal Reynolds returns to his starting right defensive end position and is ranked by some publications as the top overall prospect in the 2001 NFL draft. Reynolds led FSU with seven sacks last year and will lead the defensive ends, a group who will be asked to step up their performance with the lack of experience on the interior. Backing up Reynolds will be sophomore Alonzo Jackson who used a good spring to move into the role. Also competing for playing time here is O.J. Jackson whose versatility has coaches considering playing him at either middle linebacker or at defensive end.

FSU found a comfortable three-man rotation among their defensive ends last year that allowed them to maximize the impact of an injury-limited Roland Seymour. However, coaches did not have that luxury in the spring as Seymour missed all the workouts and is questionable at the start of fall after undergoing surgery to repair a knee injury suffered in the Sugar Bowl win. With Seymour a question mark early, senior David Warren will enter preseason drills listed as the starter at left end. The position is not unfamiliar to Warren, who started five games last season including the national title game. Warren has always been one of the most productive players on the field as he finished in a tie for first place last year with three fumbles caused. He lead the entire defensive front with four passes broken up. Freshman Darnell Dockett is itching to get playing time and used a fine spring to move into the backup role at left defensive end. Walk-on Kendrill White is listed

season and showed that he had the potential to be a tremendous playmaker at the position. He por a lot of scrimmage time in spring and will be slated for immediate playing time in the fall.

Brian Allen returns at strongside linebacker for what should be a spectacular senior season. One of the leaders of the entire FSU team, Allen had a tremendous junior year, finishing second on the team with 101 tackles. Behind Allen in the spring will be a familiar name in a different place. FSU's lack of depth at linebacker in spring forced coaches to try some new players at the position and former rover Jean Jeune seems to have found a place to play there. While he came on strong in the spring, Jeune must develop the instincts that make a top-notch linebacker. Also providing depth behind Allen will be walk-on Lee Weaver, who played on special teams last year.

Solid middle linebacker Bradley Jennings also returns and he is a proven run-stopper. He finished third on the team with 92 total tackles during the national championship campaign. Lining up behind the veteran this spring was Jerel Hudson, who has moved from linebacker to down lineman and now back to linebacker. He had a strong spring game and looks like he will stick as the back-up in the middle. Also playing middle linebacker in the fall will be walk-on

Coaches will have a nervous preseason waiting to see when Polley will be full speed after undergoing surgery on his knee following the Sugar Bowl. Polley was the Tribe's top tackler last year with 109 stops (67 solo). Making coaches feel a little better about the rehabilitation of Polley was the play of true freshman Kendyll Pope in the spring. Pope enrolled in January after sitting out last

Abdual Howard moved to second team during the spring and should be a solid reserve behind Gibson. He also should see considerable playing time in FSU's nickel package.

Tay Cody comes off another solid year at cornerback and should emerge as one of the country's best as a senior in 2000. A four-year starter, Cody's coverage skills had teams looking the other way over the last half of last year and he has turned himself into a punishing tackler as well. Behind Cody at right corner will be redshirt freshman Rufus Brown. Brown improved as spring drills progressed and had an interception in the spring game. Also seeing time at cornerbacker will be Stanford Samuels who missed last year with a knee injury. He was impressive in spring drills before the injury, but will have to make up for lost time in the fall

Returning at left cornerback will be senior Clevan Thomas who emerged as the starter during his junior season and may have been the best cover man in the secondary last year. Sophomore Malcolm Tatum saw considerable action at corner as a freshman last season and he used the spring to prove to coaches that he is




KICKING SPECIALISTS

In contrast to the uncertainty at placekicker is the confidence coaches have in three-year starting punter Keith Cottrell. The senior averaged 42.8 yards per punt last year and should contend for the both All-ACC and All-America honors this season.

Sealed Lockers



The retirement (or permanent sealing) of lockers in the Florida State locker room began after Deion Sanders' senior season in 1988. Long-time equipment manager Jimmie Callaway came up with the idea to add more tradition to the area.

Former FSU Athletic Director Bob Goin established the criteria for locker retirement that

allows only the dressing area of two-time consensus All-Americans to be retired. To date, five players, Ron Simmons (1979-80), Deion Sanders (1987-88), Marvin Jones (1991-92), Sebastian Janikowski (1998-99) and Peter Warrick (1998-99), have had their lockers sealed. Charlie Ward, FSU's first Heisman Trophy winner, also has his locker retired.

The lockers are encased in glass with the player's final home uniform gear intact — right down to the sweat bands!
