FSU BEGINS NEW ERA UNDER HEAD COACH WILLIE TAGGART

- » Willie Taggart was named the 10th full-time head coach in Florida State history, and only the third different full-time head coach since 1976, on Dec. 5, 2017, ushering in an era of Lethal Simplicity on offense and a defense made up of Bad Asses and War Daddies
- » Florida State's coaching staff boasts experience from every Power 5 conference. Willie Taggart, Alonzo Hampton, David Kelly, Telly Lockette, Donte' Pimpleton and Raymond Woodie have coached in the Pac-12. Harlon Barnett, Walt Bell, Greg Frey and Mark Snyder have coached in the Big Ten. Barnett, Kelly and Snyder have coached in the SEC. Bell, Kelly and Odell Haggins have coached in the ACC, and Bell and Kelly have coached in the Big 12
- » Despite an average age of only 45.9 years old at the start of spring practice, Florida State's 11 full-time coaches enter the 2018 season with 224 years of combined coaching experience
- » According to SportsSource analytics, Willie Taggart has the 2nd-highest percentage of big-play runs among FBS head coaches since 2015. He has had 263 rushing plays, 14.67 percent of rushes called, gain at least 12 yards. He also ranks 5th with 8.5 percent of his plays earning at least 20 yards and 6th with 2.5 percent of his plays gaining at least 40 yards. Coach Taggart's overall big play percentage of 16.08 ranks 7th
- » Since the start of the 2015 season, Coach Taggart's record is 25-12 (.676) and his offense is averaging 37.84 points per game, the 5th-highest scoring average among FBS head coaches in that timespan
- » The Florida State football team made its 36th straight bowl appearance, the longest streak in college football history, and secured the program's 41st consecutive winning season in 2017
- » Florida State's bowl streak dates back to the 1982 Gator Bowl. Nebraska had an NCAA-record 35-year bowl streak from 1969-2003. The next longest active bowl streak in the country is Virginia Tech's 25 straight
- » The Seminoles' current streak of 41 consecutive winning seasons is second in FBS history, trailing only a stretch of 42 straight winning seasons compiled by Notre Dame from 1889-1932
- » FSU earned a 38-22 victory at Florida last season, which was a program-record fifth straight in the series and extended the school-record winning streak in Gainesville to four
- » The Seminoles won five of their last six games of 2017, including each of their final four. In their season-ending four-game winning streak, the Seminoles outscored their opponents 199-51, including a 77-6 win vs. Delaware State that tied Oregon's output against Southern Utah for the most points scored in a game by an FBS team in 2017
- » FSU's 199 points scored in its last four games of 2017 marked the highest-scoring four-game stretch for the program since 2013 when the Seminoles scored 221 total points vs. Syracuse, vs. Idaho, at Florida and vs. Duke in the ACC Championship Game
- » Florida State enters 2018 with the 6th-longest active winning streak in the country, and the Seminoles scored at least 38 points in each of their four victories to end the season. That stretch marked the first time since 2013 FSU scored at least 38 points in four straight games
- » The Seminoles' 2017 season opener vs. No. 1 Alabama had 12.335 million viewers, the most-watched non-conference regular season game of the year across any network and the highest-rated game all year on ABC

GAME NOTES: OFFENSE

FSU RETURNS OFFENSIVE PRODUCTION

- » Florida State returns 97.5 percent of its passing yards from 2017, as well as 95.8 percent of its total offense yards, 93.8 percent of its rushing yards, 66.3 percent of its scoring, 62.4 percent of its receptions and 57.5 percent of its receiving yards. The Seminoles also return the individual leader in each stat category

QUARTERBACKS

- » Florida State is the only Power 5 team to have two quarterbacks with at least 10 starts for their current school as Deondre Francois has 14 starts and James Blackman has 12. Over the last two seasons, the duo has combined for 5,790 passing yards and 40 touchdowns on 427-of-730 passing
- » Blackman started the last 12 games of the 2017 season and was the first FSU true freshman to start at quarterback since Chip Ferguson in 1985
- » Blackman recorded the most passing yards (2,230) and TD passes (19) by an FSU true freshman in program history in 2017. He recorded 10 of his touchdown passes during Florida State's season-ending, four-game winning streak
- » Blackman saved his best performance of the season for the bowl game, finishing with 233 passing yards and a career-high four touchdown passes, breaking the record for most passing touchdowns in the Independence Bowl's 42-game history, and was named the game's Offensive MVP
- » Francois was named the 2016 ACC Rookie of the Year and ACC Offensive Rookie of the Year after passing for 3,350 yards and 20 touchdowns. His passing yards are the 5th-highest single-season total in program history
- » Francois was 19-of-33 for 210 yards and one touchdown before suffering a season-ending injury in the 2017 season opener vs. No. 1 Alabama
- » Redshirt freshman Bailey Hockman, who passed for 2,604 yards and 25 touchdowns as a senior in high school, will join Blackman and Francois in a battle for the starting position

RUNNING BACKS

- » Florida State returns one of the nation's most dynamic rushing duos as rising sophomore Cam Akers and rising senior Jacques Patrick combined for 1,772 yards and 14 touchdowns in 2017
- » Akers broke Dalvin Cook's Florida State freshman rushing record and posted the 9th-highest single-season rushing total in school history with 1,024 yards in 2017, eclipsing Cook's 1,008 yards from 2014. Akers' four 100-yard rushing games ranked 2nd all-time among FSU freshmen
- » Patrick was the Seminoles' leading rusher in three games in 2017. He scored six of his seven rushing touchdowns over the final five games of the season after missing two games due to injury
- » Patrick enters 2018 tied for 18th on FSU's career rushing touchdown list with 16 and his 1,412 career rushing yards leaves him just 194 shy of cracking FSU's all-time top 20

WIDE RECEIVERS

- » Florida State's wide receivers group features a combination of proven production and playmaking potential entering the spring
- » Nyqwan Murray leads the receivers into 2018 after his junior season produced a team-high 604 receiving yards on 40 receptions, which tied for the team lead, and four touchdowns. He showed his explosive ability during a five-game stretch beginning at Duke and concluding at No. 4 Clemson during which he averaged 82.2 yards per game on 3.8 receptions per game. He had at least three catches and 60 yards in each game of that stretch
- » Rising juniors George Campbell and Keith Gavin and rising sophomore D.J. Matthews return to the wideout group with experience after combining for 39 receptions for 472 yards in 2017. Matthews also averaged 11.1 yards per punt return as a true freshman

TIGHT ENDS

- » FSU's tight ends room looks different heading into 2018 as rising junior Naseir Upshur, rising sophomore Tre' McKitty and rising redshirt freshman Alex Marshall are joined by converted fullbacks Gabe Nabers and Johnathan Vickers
- » In 2017, Vickers caught four passes for 50 yards, McKitty made one 23-yard reception and Nabers hauled in a two-yard touchdown catch

OFFENSIVE LINE

- » Florida State started the same offensive line unit - Josh Ball (LT), Derrick Kelly II (LG), Alec Eberle (C), Cole Minshew (RG) and Rick Leonard (RT) - for the final nine games of the season. Of that group, only Leonard (graduation) does not return in 2018
- » Eberle is the most experienced offensive linemen returning. The 2017 team captain has started 32 consecutive games for the Seminoles
- » Florida State has six offensive linemen on the roster with starting experience. Along with the unit that ended the season, redshirt sophomore Landon Dickerson, who missed the last nine games of 2017 due to injury, has started 11 games in his career and redshirt senior Corey Martinez has three career starts

GAME NOTES: DEFENSE/SPECIAL TEAMS

NEW-LOOK DEFENSE FOR 2018

- » After sending six defensive players to the NFL Combine, Florida State will replace at least seven starters from the 2017 season but has productive defenders returning. The Seminoles return athletes responsible for 44.1 percent of their tackles from last season, as well as 45.7 percent of their tackles for loss, 50 percent of their sacks, 66.7 percent of their interceptions, 45.3 percent of their pass breakups, 50 percent of their quarterback hurries, 75 percent of their forced fumbles and 50 percent of their fumble recoveries

DEFENSIVE LINE

- » Florida State's defensive line has more depth than any other position on the field as the Seminoles return nine contributors from 2017 who combined to make 157 tackles, including 33.5 for loss with 12.5 sacks, 17 quarterback hurries, eight pass breakups, four forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and four blocked kicks
- » Rising junior Brian Burns returns after leading the team in tackles for loss, forced fumbles and blocked kicks in 2017. He also is FSU's returning leader in tackles, sacks and fumble recoveries
- » Last season at No. 4 Clemson, Burns became the first player in program history to force two fumbles and recover one fumble in the same game
- » Joshua Kaindoh saw action in all 13 games of his true freshman season and led Florida State with six quarterback hurries. He also forced a fumble from Heisman Trophy winner Lamar Jackson that the Seminoles recovered and returned for a touchdown
- » Rising senior Demarcus Christmas was a destructive presence in the middle of the defensive line, tying for the lead among defensive linemen with four pass breakups and blocking a field goal that was returned for a touchdown against Delaware State
- » Marvin Wilson saw action in 12 games as a true freshman and ended the season by recording a tackle in each of the last four games, all FSU victories
- » Rising seniors Walvenski Aime and Fredrick Jones each made 18 tackles with 2.0 for loss in 2017

LINEBACKERS

- » The Seminoles are replacing starters at each linebacker position in 2018
- » Dontavious Jackson's 17 tackles, including 1.0 sack, last season leads the returning linebackers. He is joined by Emmett Rice's 14 tackles and one interception, Adonis Thomas' 12 tackles, Leonard Warner III's five stops and Josh Brown's three tackles
- » Florida State signed local linebacker Amari Gainer, the All-Big Bend Defensive Player of the Year for 2017, who enrolled early and will go through spring practice

DEFENSIVE BACKS

- » Florida State returns starters Levonta Taylor at cornerback and A.J. Westbrook at safety. Additionally, safety Hamsah Nasirildeen earned two starts as a true freshman, rising junior Kyle Meyers started twice and rising sophomore Stanford Samuels III started one time in 2017
- » Taylor enters his junior season as an established lockdown corner. According to Pro Football Focus, in 2017 Taylor led all Power 5 cornerbacks with an average of 30.6 snaps in coverage per reception allowed and also ranked first among ACC cornerbacks with a passer rating of 26.1 when targeted in coverage
- » Westbrook's 40 tackles and seven pass breakups in 2017 rank first among returning defensive backs
- » Samuels made an impact in 2017 despite only one start as he tied for the team lead with two interceptions, including one against rival and 13th-ranked Miami, to go with five pass breakups, one forced fumble, 27 tackles, 3.0 tackles for loss and 1.0 sack as a true freshman
- » Nasirildeen and Meyers each recorded three pass breakups to go with 29 and 26 tackles, respectively, in 2017

SPECIAL TEAMS

- » The Seminoles have experience in each area of special teams as FSU returns kicker Ricky Aguayo, punter and kickoff specialist Logan Tyler, punt returner D.J. Matthews and six athletes who returned at least one kickoff
- » Aguayo led the ACC and ranked 10th in the country with his .857 field goal percentage and tied for 5th in the ACC with 96 points. He had two streaks during the 2017 season, making 11 in a row over a four-game stretch and ending the season with seven straight makes after his last miss on Oct. 21
- » Aguayo tied the FSU record for PATs made in a game with 11 vs. Delaware State and also holds the single-game record with six field goals from 2016
- » Tyler's 43.2 yards-per-punt average in 2017 ranks 9th on the program's single-season list. He averaged 63.8 yards per kickoff, and opponents' average starting field position after his kickoffs was their own 23-yard line
- » Matthews piled up the highest single-game punt return yards total in FBS in 2017 with 138 vs. Delaware State, and his 200 return yards were the most by a Seminole since 2013
- » Defensive end Brian Burns, whose two blocks tied for 1st in the ACC and 3rd nationally, led the way as FSU blocked six kicks, tied for 1st in the ACC and 2nd in the nation, in 2017. The team total was the Seminoles' highest since 2006, and the 2017 season was the first since 2010 Florida State recorded at least one punt block and one field goal block in the same season

WILLIE TAGGART

HEAD COACH

→ 1st season at FSU | 9th season as head coach

Florida State hired Florida native Willie Taggart to be its 10th full-time head football coach on Dec. 5, 2017. Taggart is considered one of the best

offensive minds in the country and a relentless recruiter.

Taggart returns to the Sunshine State, where he was the head coach at the University of South Florida from 2013-16, after one season as head coach at the University of Oregon. He began his head coaching career at his alma mater, Western Kentucky University, from 2010-12 after serving as an assistant from 1999-2006. Between his tenures at Western Kentucky, he was an assistant at Stanford from 2007-09.

Taggart has led remarkable turnarounds at each of his three previous head coaching positions. In the season prior to his hire, the programs Taggart inherited were a combined 7-29, and the best team he took over was a 4-8 Oregon squad. His overall record is 47-50, including a 25-12 mark since the start of the 2015 season. In that same timespan, his offenses are averaging 37.84 points per game, the fifth-highest total among FBS head coaches behind only Mike Gundy, Kliff Kingsbury, Urban Meyer and Jeff Brohm.

Taggart jumped out to a hot start at Oregon, leading the Ducks to a 77-21 win in his first game in Eugene. The point total tied for the highest in the NCAA in 2017, was Oregon's highest since 1916 and included a school-record nine rushing touchdowns. The offensive fireworks continued as Oregon scored 42 first-half points in each of the first three games of the season, marking the first time in school history the program scored at least 42 points in one half in three straight games. The Ducks began the season 5-1 and completed the regular season with another offensive explosion, defeating rival Oregon State 69-10 for the team's seventh 40-point offensive output of the season.

Oregon ranked in the top 30 in the NCAA in 15 different statistical categories, including boasting the 12th-best rushing offense in the country rushing for 251.0 yards per game and the 18th-highest scoring offense averaging 36.0 points per game. On defense, the Ducks ranked 24th in the country in third-down defense allowing a .333 conversion percentage and 27th in fourth-down defense at .417. The defense had one of the best performances of the season against Arizona's Khalil Tate, who ranked seventh in the NCAA with an average of 128.3 rushing yards per game, holding him to only 32 yards rushing in a 48-28 victory.

Taggart returned to his hometown Tampa Bay area prior to the 2013 season to take over a South Florida team that won three games in 2012 and turned the Bulls into one of the most exciting programs in the country by 2016. In his final year at the helm in Tampa, Taggart led South Florida to a 10-2 record and No. 25 ranking in the final regular season poll, the team's first ranking since 2011 and only the second time in program history the Bulls were ranked at the end of the regular season. His offense averaged 43.6 points per game, ranking seventh

in the country, and was fifth in the nation averaging 291.8 rushing yards per game. The 2016 season also marked the first time since 2010 the Bulls qualified for back-to-back bowl games.

With Taggart serving as the primary play caller, his offense broke 33 program records in 2016, including scoring, total touchdowns, total yards, rushing yards, yards per play, yards per rush and points per game. Quarterback Quinton Flowers was named the American Athletic Conference Offensive Player of the Year after becoming the first USF player to post 2,000 yards passing and 1,000 yards rushing in the same season, highlighting a program-record 10 all-conference selections.

Taggart helped build the offensive juggernaut with the top-ranked recruiting classes in the AAC in both 2014 and 2015. He also oversaw a vast improvement in the classroom while at USF, which improved its Graduation Success Rate in each of his four seasons and boasted a program-record 38 academic all-conference honorees in 2015.

His first head coaching job was one of the most difficult reclamation projects in the country, taking over his alma mater that had lost 20 games in a row. He quickly led Western Kentucky to its first two winning seasons since transitioning from FCS to FBS and in 2012 saw the program reach its first bowl game. The Hilltoppers had a 12-2 stretch from Oct. 2011 through Oct. 2012 with their only two losses coming to No. 1-ranked LSU and top-ranked Alabama. Taggart again made a splash in recruiting as he signed the top class in the Sun Belt in 2010 and 2011.

Prior to being named head coach at WKU, Taggart was the running backs coach at Stanford, where he helped tutor 2009 Doak Walker Award winner, Pac-10 Offensive Player of the Year and consensus first-team All-American Toby Gerhart. That year, Gerhart's average of 144.7 rushing yards per game helped the Cardinal rank second in the Pac-10 and 11th in the nation with 224.3 yards per game on the ground and break the school's single-season rushing record that had stood for 60 years with 2,481 total yards. The team also led the Pac-10 in total offense with an average of 441.4 yards per game.

Taggart's time as an assistant at Western Kentucky started in 1999 as wide receivers coach before shifting to coach quarterbacks in 2000, a position group he continued to coach for the rest of his time at WKU. He added co-offensive



coordinator duties for the 2001 and 2002 seasons and served as assistant head coach for his final four years.

Taggart helped direct an offense that set school records with 432 points, 5,749 yards of total offense and 263 first downs on the way to the 2002 NCAA Division I-AA national championship. That season, the Hilltoppers ranked second in the nation in pass efficiency and sixth in rushing yards per game. The offense saved its best performances for the playoffs, where it averaged 38.8 points per game in the four postseason wins.

Under Taggart's guidance from 2003-06, quarterback Justin Haddix set school records with 8,890 yards of total offense, a 57.1 completion percentage, 50 touchdowns and a 137.28 pass efficiency rating. Haddix also ranked second in program history with 541 completions and 7,929 passing yards.

Taggart transitioned to coaching after authoring a playing career that ranks among the best in school history. He was the program's starting quarterback all four years and broke 11 school records, highlighted by his 47 rushing touchdowns, and left school holding the NCAA Division I record for rushing yards by a quarterback. He also ranked second in program history with 286 points, a 127.71 pass efficiency rating and 3,997 rushing yards and tied for third with 17 100-yard rushing games and for fourth with 30 touchdown passes.



Taggart was recruited to Western Kentucky following a prep career at Bradenton's Manatee High School. There, he was a first-team all-state and all-conference selection as a senior after directing the Hurricanes to the 5A state championship game. He earned his bachelor's degree in social sciences from Western Kentucky in 1998.

Taggart and his wife, Taneshia, have two sons, Willie Jr. and Jackson, and one daughter, Morgan.

HARLON BARNETT

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR/DBs

→ 1st season at FSU | 16th season as college coach

Harlon Barnett was hired by Florida State as the program's defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach in January of 2018.

Barnett joins the Garnet and Gold following an 11-year run coaching defensive backs at his alma mater, Michigan State. He was promoted to associate head coach while retaining co-defensive coordinator responsibilities in 2017 after serving as assistant head coach and co-defensive coordinator for the 2015 and 2016 seasons. During his time in East Lansing, the Spartans were 100-45 with three Big Ten championships and were selected for the College Football Playoff in 2015.

At Michigan State, he coached three All-Americans, one Thorpe Award winner, eight different first-team All-Big Ten performers and a total of 27 all-conference recognitions. He also tutored back-to-back Big Ten Defensive Back of the Year winners after Darqueze Dennard won the award in 2013 and Kurtis Drummond claimed it in 2014. Seven of his defensive backs have been selected in the NFL Draft, including Dennard taken 24th overall in 2014 by the Cincinnati Bengals and Trae Waynes picked 11th overall in 2015 by the Minnesota Vikings to become the highest-drafted Spartan in the modern era of the NFL Draft.

In 2017, Barnett directed a unit that led the Big Ten and ranked second in the NCAA in rushing defense, allowing only 95.3 yards per game on the ground. The team also ranked seventh in the NCAA in total defense by holding opponents to 297.6 yards per game, 18th in third-down defense with a conversion percentage of only .328, 19th in the country in scoring defense, allowing an average of 20.0 points per game, and had the nation's 17th-best passing efficiency defense rating. He was nominated for the Broyles Award, which is given annually to college football's top assistant coach.

Sophomore safety David Dowell earned first-team All-Big Ten recognition, and freshman cornerback Josiah Scott was a third-team all-conference selection, first-team Freshman All-American and a member of the Big Ten's All-Freshman Team. Under Barnett's tutelage, Dowell became only the second Spartan sophomore defensive back to earn first-team All-Big Ten honors and first since 1983, and Scott made 12 starts in 2017, the most by a true freshman position player in head coach Mark Dantonio's 11 seasons at MSU.

In his first season coordinating the defense, Michigan State won 12 games and the Big Ten championship on its way to the College Football Playoff semifinal at the Cotton Bowl. The Spartans forced 28 turnovers, the ninth-highest total in FBS, while also ranking in the top-25 in rush defense, sacks and scoring defense. Six times that season MSU held its opponent to less than 100 yards rushing. In 2014, he led Drummond and Waynes to All-America honors as Drummond became just the fifth All-American safety from Michigan State.

The Spartans had a historic stretch of defensive dominance from 2011-14 when Michigan State was the only FBS team to rank in the top-10 in total defense each of the four years and became only the second Big Ten team to lead the conference in rushing defense four straight years since the conference started recognizing statistical champions in 1985. The rush defense ranked in the top-two of the NCAA for three of Barnett's final five seasons, including an NCAA-best 88.5 yards per game in 2014.

The 2013 defensive backfield was highly acclaimed as all four starting defensive backs received All-Big Ten honors, including three first-team selections. That year, Dennard won the Thorpe Award as the nation's best defensive back and became the first cornerback in program history to earn unanimous first-team All-America honors.

In 2012, Michigan State ranked third in the nation and first in the Big Ten with a pass efficiency defense rating of 98.8. The Spartans also led the conference with 14 interceptions, ranked second in the Big Ten with 77 passes defended and tied for third with 63 pass breakups. Dennard and Johnny Adams both earned first-team All-Big Ten recognition as the Spartans swept the cornerback spots.

In 2010 and 2011 all four of Barnett's starters were named to the All-Big Ten Team as MSU grabbed 35 interceptions over those two seasons. The 2010 squad helped lead Michigan State to its first conference championship since 1990 by ranking in the top-25 in pass breakups, passes defended and interceptions. In 2011, the Spartans led the Big Ten and tied for 12th in FBS with 18 interceptions while also ranking 11th in pass defense and 18th in pass efficiency defense.

In his first season at Michigan State, Barnett's secondary ranked fourth in the Big Ten in pass defense and collected 12 interceptions, which were the most for the Spartans since 2003. His 2008 defensive backfield, led by first-team All-Big Ten selection and Thorpe Award finalist Otis Wiley, recorded 14 interceptions and broke up 50 passes.





Barnett moved to East Lansing with Dantonio after spending three seasons on his staff at Cincinnati and coaching four defensive backs to all-conference honors. In his first season, Barnett directed a secondary that ranked first in Conference USA and 26th in FBS by allowing only 194.2 passing yards per game. In 2006, Cincinnati had the Big East's third-ranked pass efficiency defense with a rating of 109.3 that ranked 23rd in the nation.

Barnett began his collegiate career as a graduate assistant on LSU's coaching staff in 2003, where he reunited with his former position coach at MSU Nick Saban. That year, the Tigers won the BCS National Championship, the program's first national title since 1958, after defeating Oklahoma in the Sugar Bowl to complete a 13-1 season. The Cincinnati native started coaching in his hometown, serving two seasons as secondary coach and three more as defensive coordinator at Princeton High School.

Barnett authored an impressive career on the gridiron at Michigan State, compiling 154 tackles, six interceptions and 13 pass breakups. He was a three-year starter for the Spartans and earned first-team All-America honors in 1989 when he helped Michigan State rank No. 1 in the Big Ten in rushing defense and total defense. As a sophomore, he helped the Spartans win the Big Ten title and claim their first Rose Bowl victory in 32 years.

His seven-year NFL career began when he was selected in the fourth round of the 1990 NFL Draft by the Cleveland Browns. After three seasons in Cleveland, Barnett played the next two seasons with the New England Patriots before two seasons with the Minnesota Vikings.

Barnett earned his bachelor's degree in communication from Michigan State in 1990. He and his wife Tammy have two children, Todd and Tori.

WALT BELL

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR/QBs

→ 1st season at FSU | 12th season as college coach

Walt Bell was hired as the Seminoles' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach in January of 2018.

Considered one of the most dynamic young offensive minds in college football, Bell joined the Seminoles after two seasons as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Maryland. He has four years of offensive coordinator experience and has also coached at North Carolina, Oklahoma State, Southern Miss and Memphis.

In 2017, Bell oversaw an offense that started four different quarterbacks due to injuries and was one of two teams in the country to win at least three games with three different starting quarterbacks. Even with so much instability at the quarterback position, the Terrapins only threw eight interceptions and tied a program record for fewest turnovers with 14, a number that ranked 19th in FBS. Maryland opened the season with a 51-41 victory at No. 23 Texas, breaking the school record for points in a game against a ranked opponent.

Bell's offense featured Big Ten Receiver of the Year DJ Moore, who broke the single-season school record with 80 catches, a conference-high average of 6.7 per game, and led the Big Ten with 1,033 receiving yards while becoming the program's third 1,000-yard receiver. Moore, who declared for the NFL Draft following his junior season, ended his career with a streak of 33 straight games with at least one reception.

In 2016, Bell made his mark on Maryland's offense immediately as the Terrapins scored a program-record 173 points in the first four games of the season. Maryland rushed for 2,594 yards in 2016, ranking fourth in the Big Ten with an average of 199.5 yards per game, while scoring 26 touchdowns on the ground. The rushing yards total marked the program's seventh 2,500-yard rushing season and first since 2003, while the rushing touchdowns were the most in College Park since 2007. Quarterback Perry Hills led the Big Ten in completion percentage and ranked second in the conference in passing efficiency.

Bell joined the Maryland staff after two seasons as offensive coordinator, assistant head coach and quarterbacks coach at Arkansas State. In his 26 games in charge of the offense, the Red Wolves recorded 11 games with more than 500 yards of total offense, 18 400-yard games and 24 300-yard games. The 2015 team ranked 12th in the country with an average of 40.0 points per game and had eight All-Sun Belt selections, including offensive linemen Jemar Clark and Colton Jackson and wide receiver J.D. McKissic on the first team.

In 2014, Arkansas State broke single-season school records with 6,194 yards of total offense, an average of 476.5 yards per game, 1,024 plays, 477 points and 65 touchdowns. The team ranked 18th in the country in scoring offense by averaging 36.7 points per game, 20th in total offense and 25th with an average of 216.4 rushing yards per game.

Bell spent the 2012 and 2013 seasons as tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator at North Carolina. During his time in Chapel Hill, he helped the offense break 35 school records. The 2013 team averaged 432.4 yards of total offense, including 277.4 yards per game through the air. In 2012, North Carolina won the ACC's Coastal Division crown and ranked 14th in the nation with an average of 485.6 yards of total offense per game. As recruiting coordinator, he helped pull in two classes ranked in the top-five of the ACC.



Tight end Eric Ebron was a standout performer for the Tar Heels under Bell's guidance, developing into the 10th overall pick in the 2014 NFL Draft. Ebron twice earned All-ACC acclaim and was a first-team All-American in 2013 after he piled up 973 receiving yards, the most by a tight end in ACC history. In 2012, Ebron tripled his output from the previous season and finished with 40 receptions for 625 yards.



Bell was at Southern Miss in 2010 and 2011, serving as the Golden Eagles’ offensive graduate assistant in 2010 before being promoted to wide receivers coach for the 2011 season. That 2011 team won the Conference USA title and the Sheraton Hawai’i Bowl, finishing with a school-record 12 wins behind an offense that ranked 14th in the country in scoring and 17th in total offense. In 2010, the offense recorded a then-school-record 5,894 yards and broke the school record with an average of 453.38 yards per game.

Prior to his time at Southern Miss, Bell spent the 2009 season as a quality control coach at Oklahoma State. That year, the Cowboys finished 9-4 and played in the Cotton Bowl. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant coach at Memphis in 2007 and 2008, helping the Tigers to back-to-back bowl appearances.

Bell, a native of Dickson, Tennessee, was a four-year letterman at Middle Tennessee State. He played wide receiver for the Blue Raiders and also earned two degrees, graduating in 2005 with a bachelor’s degree in criminal justice administration and in 2006 with a master’s degree in sport management.

ODELL HAGGINS

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH/DTs

→ 25th season at FSU | 25th season as college coach

Odell Haggins enters his 25th season on Florida State's coaching staff in 2018 after head coach Willie Taggart announced on Dec. 26, 2017, that Haggins would be FSU's associate head coach and coach the defensive tackles, a group Haggins has led since 1996.

Haggins was named Florida State's interim head coach on Dec. 1, 2017, and the next day led the Seminoles to a 42-10 victory over ULM that clinched bowl eligibility for the 36th straight year. He finished his time as interim head coach with a 2-0 record after leading FSU to a 42-13 win in the Independence Bowl that clinched a 41st consecutive winning season for the Seminoles. Haggins was promoted to associate head coach in 2014 and has helped FSU post a 235-72-1 (.765) record in his time on staff.

Haggins starred on Florida State's defensive line from 1986-89. He began his career as a tight ends/offensive line coach with the Seminoles in 1994 and took over the interior defensive line duties in 1996, where he has remained a fixture and helped the Seminoles to a pair of national titles in 1999 and 2013.

Haggins has repeatedly developed future NFL pros while at Florida State. He has coached 17 defensive linemen that have been selected in the NFL Draft, including first-round selections Brodrick Bunkley in 2006, Travis Johnson in 2005, Corey Simon in 2000 and Andre Wadsworth in 1998. Wadsworth was the No. 3 overall pick and remained the highest-drafted player in FSU history until 2015 when Jameis Winston was selected No. 1 overall.

Named one of the six best defensive line coaches in college football by CBS Sports in 2008, Haggins has repeatedly turned out top-flight talent. In addition to the first-round selections, he has coached second-round picks Eddie Goldman and Timmy Jernigan as well as Pro Bowler Darnell Dockett, Larry Smith, Andre Fluellen, Jerry Johnson, Julian Pittman and Letroy Guion.

Haggins has established himself as an outstanding recruiter, developer of talent and a role model to his players. He earned ACC Top Recruiter of the Year honors from ESPN in 2012. In 2014, Haggins was named one of the top 25 recruiters in the nation by Rivals.com for the fourth consecutive year. He captured the same top-25 mention from 247Sports in 2016.

The 2017 version of FSU's defensive line was a dominant force in the middle as senior Derrick Nnadi and redshirt junior Demarcus Christmas teamed up to wreak havoc in opponents' backfields. Nnadi was a third-team All-ACC selection after setting career-high marks with 53 tackles and 10.0 tackles for loss, while Christmas also posted career highs

of 36 tackles and 4.5 tackles for loss. In 2016, the Seminoles ranked first in the nation in sacks per game and were fifth in the ACC in rushing defense while Nnadi garnered first-team all-conference recognition.

Haggins' defensive line anchored one of the nation's best defenses in 2015. The Seminoles ranked ninth in the country in scoring defense and allowed only 10 rushing touchdowns, fifth-fewest in the country, while improving from 17 sacks in 2014 to 32 in 2015. Two defensive linemen captured all-conference honors as Nile Lawrence-Stample was a first-team selection and Nnadi was on the third team. In 2014, Goldman captured third-team All-America honors from the Associated Press and was a first-team All-ACC selection. The Seminoles advanced to the first-ever College Football Playoff, set an ACC and FSU record with a 29-game winning streak and captured the program's third straight ACC championship.

A staunch interior defense played a prominent role in helping Florida State to its third national championship in the 2013 season. Jernigan enjoyed another fine season as he earned All-America nods from several organizations including the Football Writers Association of America, Associated Press and USA TODAY. The high-powered run-stuffer in the trenches led a defensive front that surrendered just seven rushing touchdowns, the fewest in the nation. Florida State's defensive tackles paved the way for the nation's top scoring defense and the third-best total defense. The work of the front four was noticeable on several fronts, including allowing just 124.8 yards per game to opposing rushers. Opponents averaged just 3.3 yards per rush against the stout defensive front of the Seminoles, and FSU continued its strong pass rush, racking up 35 sacks.

The 2012 season saw three Seminole defensive tackles earn All-ACC honors with senior Everett Dawkins and sophomore Jernigan capturing second-team recognition





while senior Anthony McCloud picked up honorable-mention accolades. In part due to suffocating pressure up front, the Seminoles ranked second in the nation in total defense in 2012, yielding just 254.14 yards per contest. FSU allowed opposing running backs just 2.75 yards per carry, which tied for fourth in the country. Jernigan was productive in his first season under Haggins' tutelage, becoming a Freshman All-American in 2011 with 100 tackles, including 16.5 for loss. FSU's run defense allowed opposing backs to average just 2.35 yards per carry, which led all 120 FBS programs, and the Seminoles ranked fourth nationally in total defense.

Haggins helped produce one of the best defensive lines in the nation in 2010 as the Seminoles ranked third in FBS in quarterback sacks per game and tied with Boise State for first nationally in total sacks with 48.

Haggins' 1999 defensive front included future NFL standouts Corey Simon and Jerry Johnson, who were instrumental in FSU's 12-0 run to the national championship. The Seminoles boasted the nation's top-ranked defense in 1998 and the No. 1 rushing defense in 1996 and 1997. The 2008 defense ranked first nationally in tackles for loss.

Haggins has won at every level as a player and a coach. He was on the front end of Florida State's dynasty years, starring at nose guard for the Seminoles. FSU posted a 39-8-1 record with Haggins on the defensive line, and he was part of four bowl-winning teams. He earned Kodak, Walter Camp and UPI All-America honors as a senior in 1989.

A ninth-round pick in the 1990 NFL Draft by the San Francisco 49ers, Haggins went on to play for the Buffalo Bills during their 1991 Super Bowl season. Following a three-year NFL career, he returned to Florida State, completed his degree and joined Bobby Bowden's staff following the Seminoles' 1993 national championship season.

Haggins and his wife, Robin, have one daughter, Amelia Grace.

DAVID KELLY

RECRUITING COORDINATOR/WRS

→ 1st season at FSU | 20th season as college coach

David Kelly is in his first season with the Seminoles in 2018 and returns to the field with more than 30 years of coaching experience.

He was on head coach Willie Taggart's staffs at Oregon and South Florida, serving as assistant athletic director for football recruiting operations and director of player personnel, respectively. He has coached wide receivers at some of the top programs in the country, including LSU, Stanford and UCF, and coached running backs at Georgia following a successful run as head coach at Dunwoody High School in Georgia.

In the previous two seasons, Kelly played a vital role in the recruiting operations at Oregon and South Florida. He is a highly respected coach and recruiter with experience at the high school level, ACC, SEC, Pac-12, Conference USA and, most recently, in the Canadian Football League with the Edmonton Eskimos. He was named one of the top 25 college football recruiters in the nation by ESPN in 2010 and by Rivals in 2009.

His most recent collegiate coaching job was at UCF, where he served as the assistant head coach and wide receivers coach from 2007-11 after spending 2006 as the program's director of high school relations. In 2010, the Knights won 11 games, captured the Conference USA championship and defeated Georgia in the Liberty Bowl for the first bowl win in program history. In his first season as a coach at UCF, he helped the Knights compile a 10-4 record and win the conference championship.

Kelly's group developed depth every season as the offense counted on contributions from multiple wide receivers. In 2007, true freshman Kamar Aiken caught a team-high five

touchdowns and was one of three receivers with at least 20 catches. Aiken made nine touchdown catches in 2009, the most by a UCF receiver since 2005, as part of a 44-catch campaign, and Rocky Ross made 41 receptions. Ross also received Academic All-America honors that season for his work in the classroom.

Before going to Orlando, Kelly was the associate head coach and wide receivers coach at Duke for two seasons. In 2002 and 2003 he coached at Stanford as the Cardinal's offensive coordinator and associate head coach.

He was the wide receivers coach at Georgia Tech in 2000 and 2001, where he developed the best wide receiver corps in the ACC to help the Yellow Jackets win 17 games and make two bowl appearances. While he was in Atlanta, he guided Kelly Campbell to first-team All-ACC honors in 2001. Campbell finished his career as the school's all-time leader in career receptions, receiving yards and touchdown receptions.

His first collegiate wide receivers job came at LSU, where he mentored the Tigers' receivers from 1996-99. In each of his first two seasons LSU earned a share of the SEC Western Division crown. The team also appeared in the Peach Bowl twice and the Independence Bowl while he was in Baton Rouge.

Kelly's first full-time college coaching opportunity came as Georgia's running backs coach in 1994 and 1995. There, he coached Pro Football Hall of Famer Terrell Davis, Hines Ward and Robert Edwards, among others. Davis was drafted in the 1995 NFL Draft by the Denver Broncos and became the organization's all-time leading rusher. He was named MVP of Super Bowl XXXII and helped the Broncos win back-to-back championships with a victory in Super Bowl XXXIII. Ward had a 14-year NFL career with the Pittsburgh Steelers and was named to the Steelers' All-Time Team. He won two Super





Bowls with the Steelers and was named MVP of Super Bowl XL. Edwards was the 18th overall selection in the 1998 NFL Draft and played six seasons of professional football.

Kelly was the head coach at Dunwoody High School in Georgia for 10 seasons and earned a record of 80-36-1. In 1993, he capped his career with a 15-0 record and the Georgia 4A state championship. That year's team was ranked No. 3 in the final USA Today national poll, and Kelly was named Georgia's Coach of the Year by the *Atlanta Journal-Constitution*.

Kelly began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Furman after earning four letters. During his playing career, he saw time at wide receiver, running back and cornerback for the Paladins. He earned his bachelor's degree in education from Furman in 1979 and completed his master's degree in education at Furman in 1981. He and his wife, Belinda, have one daughter, Brittany.

ALONZO HAMPTON

SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR

→ 1st season at FSU | 11th season as college coach

Alonzo Hampton is in his first season as FSU's special teams coordinator in 2018.

Hampton joins Coach Taggart's staff for the fourth different time as he was on staff at Oregon, South Florida and Western Kentucky. Hampton also has experience as a successful high school coach in Arkansas and Georgia.

Last season, Hampton was a defensive analyst at Oregon after serving two seasons as South Florida's defensive backs coach and adding special teams duties in 2016. In 2016, Hampton helped lead a defense that forced 26 turnovers, the 18th-highest total in FBS, and returned three for touchdowns to tie for the 19th-highest total in FBS, as the Bulls won a school-record 11 games.

While he was at South Florida, he coached cornerback Deatrick Nichols to all-conference honors both seasons and punt returner D'Ernest Johnson to second-team all-conference in 2016 when his output included an 83-yard punt return touchdown that ranks as the second-longest in program history. Nichols, who recorded a team-high four interceptions in both of his seasons under Hampton, finished his career with 11 interceptions to tie for third on the Bulls' all-time list. In 2015, USF made 17 interceptions, 13 by the defensive backs, to rank 14th in FBS.

Prior to his time with Coach Taggart in Tampa, Hampton was the defensive backs coach at Tift County High School in Georgia for two seasons. In 2014, he helped lead the Blue Devils to a 7-4 record and a spot in the Class 6A playoff bracket.

He was the defensive backs coach at Western Kentucky for the 2011 and 2012 seasons, helping complete the Hilltoppers' historic turnaround and earn the program's first bowl appearance. His defensive backs, led by 2014 NFL Draft pick safety Jonathan Dowling, boasted the nation's 34th-best pass defense and led Conference USA in pass efficiency defense and total defense in 2012.

Prior to his time at Western Kentucky, Hampton spent five seasons at Arkansas-Pine Bluff. He was promoted from cornerbacks coach to defensive backs coach and finally to defensive coordinator as he proved his mettle within the program. In 2008, his second season coaching the entire secondary, the Golden Lions ranked eighth in FCS in

pass efficiency defense, 17th in pass defense and 29th in interceptions. UAPB's 160.9 passing yards allowed per game also ranked first in the SWAC.

Hampton began his coaching career in the high school ranks in Arkansas, serving as defensive coordinator at Warren High School from 2000-03 and then head coach at Dumas High School for the 2004 and 2005 seasons. While he was at Warren, where he also was the head track and field coach, the Lumberjacks posted an overall record of 48-12 and won back-to-back state championships. During his time leading the Dumas program, he also served a minority internship with the Philadelphia Eagles.



Hampton was a member of the football and track and field programs at ULM. He was named team captain and selected to the All-Louisiana Defensive Back Team in 1996. Following his collegiate career, he spent time with the Seattle Seahawks and Jacksonville Jaguars as well as the Frankfurt Galaxy. During his time in Frankfurt, he started in the World Bowl in 1998 and 1999 and helped Frankfurt win the title in 1999.

Hampton earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from ULM in 1996 and his master's degree in teaching from the University of Arkansas-Monticello in 2002. He and his wife, Yolanda, have two children, Alonzo Jr., who will be a freshman defensive back at Northwestern in 2018, and Ashton.

GREG FREY

RUN GAME COORDINATOR/OL

→ 1st season at FSU | 23rd season as college coach

Greg Frey, a member of the Seminoles' 1993 national championship team, returns to Tallahassee with 22 years of collegiate coaching experience to be Florida State's run game coordinator and offensive line coach.

Frey most recently spent the 2017 season as Michigan's run game coordinator while also coaching tackles and tight ends. In his career, he has coached more than 20 student-athletes that reached the NFL and has tutored 22 all-conference honorees.

Frey's group helped pave the way for the fourth-highest rushing attack in the Big Ten in 2017 as the Wolverines averaged 177.7 yards per game on the ground and scored 26 rushing touchdowns. Michigan also was effective at grinding out the clock, holding the ball for an average of 31:57 per game to rank third in the conference and 20th in the NCAA. Offensive tackle Mason Cole earned second-team All-Big Ten honors and broke the school record for career starts by an offensive lineman with 51.

Combined, UM tight ends caught 54 passes for 697 yards and five touchdowns. Sean McKeon led the Wolverines in receiving with 31 catches for 301 yards and caught a team-high three touchdowns, and Zach Gentry ranked second on the team with 303 receiving yards on 17 receptions with two touchdowns. McKeon and Gentry both earned honorable mention All-Big Ten honors, and six tight ends made the Academic All-Big Ten Team.

Before moving to Ann Arbor, Frey spent six years coaching the offensive line at Indiana. While there he also served as the assistant head coach in 2016, co-offensive coordinator in 2014 and 2015 and the run game coordinator for the 2012 and 2013 seasons. His efforts in 2015 resulted in him being a nominee for the Broyles Award, which is presented annually to college football's top assistant coach.

While in Bloomington, he tutored some of the best offensive lines in school history. Right guard Dan Feeny was a two-time first-team All-American, earning first-team honors in 2015 and 2016, and left tackle Jason Spriggs earned first-team All-America status while becoming the program's first Outland Trophy semifinalist in 2015. That year, Feeny and Spriggs became only the sixth pair of teammates, and first in IU history, to be first-team All-Americans in the same season. Spriggs was selected in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft by the Green Bay Packers, and Feeny was a third-round pick by the Los Angeles Chargers in 2017.

The 2015 offensive line blocked for one of the most prolific and balanced offenses in NCAA history as Indiana became only the fourth FBS team with a 3,500-yard passer,

two 1,000-yard rushers and one 1,000-yard receiver in the same season. The Hoosiers also were the first Big Ten team since Ohio State in 1995 to lead the conference in total offense, scoring offense and passing offense.

In 2014, Indiana rushed for a single-season school-record 3,163 yards led by Tevin Coleman's school-record 2,036 yards that ranked as the 16th-best single-season rushing total in FBS history and placed him sixth on the Big Ten's all-time list. Behind Frey's offensive line, Coleman became only the 18th 2,000-yard rusher in FBS history.

Frey spent the 2008-10 seasons as the offensive line coach at Michigan and helped build an offensive line that blocked for a school-record and Big Ten-high 6,353 yards of total offense in 2010 led by quarterback Denard Robinson's Big Ten-record 4,272 yards of total offense. The Wolverines boasted a balanced attack that season, averaging 250.2 passing yards per game and 238.5 rushing yards per game.

During his first Michigan stretch, Frey coached All-Big Ten performers Taylor Lewan, David Molk, Patrick Omameh, Stephen Schilling and Michael Schofield. Lewan was a two-time Big Ten Offensive Lineman of the Year and was picked 11th overall in the 2014 NFL Draft by the Tennessee Titans. Molk won the Rimington Trophy before being drafted by the San Diego Chargers.



In 2007, Frey was the offensive line coach at West Virginia and helped lead the Mountaineers to an 11-2 overall record, the Big East championship and a Fiesta Bowl victory. His offensive line, anchored by All-American Ryan Stancheck and first-team All-Big East performer Greg Isdander, blocked for an explosive offense led by Big East Offensive Player of the Year Pat White. The Mountaineers rushed for 297.2 yards per game, the third-best average in the NCAA, ranked ninth in the country with an average of 39.6 points per game and



averaged 456.2 yards of total offense per game to rank 15th in the nation.

Frey spent the first 11 years of his collegiate coaching career at South Florida as part of the first staff to bring football to USF, which began its program with the 1997 season. After spending three seasons as a graduate assistant and serving as the Bulls' defensive ends coach in 1999, Frey moved to the offensive line for his final seven seasons in Tampa. In his time with South Florida, the Bulls were 70-43 and played in the first two bowl games in program history.

The 2005 squad set single-season program records with 2,436 rushing yards and an average of 203.0 yards per game on the ground. Both marks stood until 2015, when the Bulls' offense directed by head coach Willie Taggart eclipsed them. In 2001, Frey's line blocked for an offense that recorded a school-record 273 completions while averaging a school-record 273.2 passing yards per game. The team's completion percentage of 63.5 in 2006 also still stands as a single-season school record.

Frey's linemen earned six all-conference selections while he was in Tampa, despite USF only being in a conference for his last four seasons. His group included offensive tackle Kenyatta Jones, who became the first USF player to be drafted when the New England Patriots made him the first selection in the fourth round of the 2001 NFL Draft.

After redshirting his first season for the Seminoles, Frey saw action at both tackle positions during his career. His five years on campus resulted in a 54-7-1 overall record with four ACC championships, five top-four final rankings and Florida State's first national championship in 1993.

A Clearwater, Florida, native, Frey graduated from Florida State in 1996 as a dual major, earning his bachelor's degree in interdisciplinary social science and political science. He and his wife, Andrea, have two sons at home, Cameron and Drew.

TELLY LOCKETTE

TIGHT ENDS

→ 1st season at FSU | 6th season as college coach

Telly Lockette is in his first season as tight ends coach at Florida State in 2018 after joining the Seminoles in December of 2017.

Lockette returns to his home state and reunites with head coach Willie Taggart as the pair worked together at South Florida for two seasons. Lockette has spent the previous three seasons coaching running backs at Oregon State after serving in the same capacity at USF in 2013 and 2014.

Prior to entering college coaching, he coached two of Miami's most successful high school programs as the head coach at Miami Central and the offensive coordinator at Miami Northwestern, his alma mater. The esteemed list of players he coached in high school includes FSU's all-time rushing leader Dalvin Cook and fellow former Seminole running back and two-time Pro Bowl selection Devonta Freeman.

In 2016 at Oregon State, Lockette directed a rushing attack that broke the school's single-season record with an average of 5.2 yards per carry. That season, the Beavers ranked fourth in the Pac-12 and 28th in the country in yards per rush. While in Corvallis, Lockette oversaw the development of Ryan Nall, who had the 10th-highest rushing average in the Pac-12 in 2017 and in 2016 totaled 1,165 yards from scrimmage and 15 touchdowns. Lockette also coached Artavis Pierce to Pac-12 All-Freshman honors in 2016. Nall, Pierce and Damien Haskins all earned Pac-12 Academic Team recognition while under Lockette's tutelage.

At South Florida, Lockette helped Coach Taggart establish the foundation for the Bulls' ascent to contenders in the American Athletic Conference. Lockette tutored Marlon Mack, the 2014 AAC Freshman of the Year and first-team all-conference selection who led the conference in rushing while becoming South Florida's first 1,000-yard rusher since 2005. In his collegiate debut, Mack rushed for a USF- and AAC-record 275 yards. Mack would go on to earn first-team all-conference honors in each of his three seasons and break 14 school records before being picked in the fourth round of the 2017 NFL Draft by the Indianapolis Colts.

At Miami Central, Lockette earned a 60-10 overall record and won two 6A state championships. The Rockets were ranked as the No. 1 high school team in the nation following their 2012 state title and were the country's No. 2 high school team after a state championship in 2010. Lockette, who also

guided Miami Central to the 2011 state championship game, was the first coach in South Florida history to coach a team to three straight state title game appearances.

In addition to his state titles, Lockette had an undefeated record against teams in Dade and Broward Counties for a state-record three straight years. He also was tapped to coach in the Semper Fidelis All-American Bowl twice and was an assistant coach on the USA National Football Team. He was recognized as the Prep Coach of the Year by Nike, the Miami Dolphins and the *Miami Herald* and earned the Nike Sportsmanship Award.



His final season at Miami Northwestern featured an offense that averaged 43.3 points per game during a 15-0 season that culminated in the 6A state crown, the school's first since 1998. His explosive offense re-wrote the state record book, including breaking the record for points per game in a season. During his time as a high school coach, Lockette worked with more than 70 players who earned college scholarship offers.

Lockette was a standout linebacker at Idaho State during his collegiate playing days. He was a two-time All-American for the Bengals and was inducted into the Idaho State Athletics Hall of Fame in 2013.

Lockette earned a bachelor's degree in education from Idaho State in 1998. He and his wife, Shikira, have three children, Jakari, Tellek and Skylar.

DONTE' PIMPLETON

RUNNING BACKS

→ 1st season at FSU | 10th season as college coach

Donte' Pimpleton is in his first season as the Seminoles' running backs coach in 2018. Pimpleton, who was college teammates with head coach

Willie Taggart, has joined his staff for the fourth time.

Pimpleton first coached with Taggart at Western Kentucky, where Pimpleton oversaw the wide receivers, before he joined Coach Taggart again at South Florida and Oregon, coaching running backs at both programs.

Last season at Oregon, the Ducks ranked second in the Pac-12 and 13th in the NCAA with an average of 251.0 rushing yards per game, and the team's 40 rushing touchdowns tied for seventh in the nation. Oregon's rushing total was paced by six 300-yard games and 10 games of more than 200 yards on the ground. In the season opener, UO scored an FBS-high 77 points behind nine rushing touchdowns, the most in a game in 2017 by an FBS team.

Pimpleton coached Royce Freeman, a semifinalist for the Maxwell Award and the Doak Walker Award, to second-team All-Pac 12 honors after finishing with 1,475 yards on the ground for an average of 122.9 yards per game. His per-game average ranked 10th in the country, and his 16 rushing touchdowns tied for 14th in the nation. Freeman ended his career with a school-record 5,621 rushing yards, the sixth-highest total in NCAA history. He also broke UO career records with 60 rushing touchdowns, which ranked 10th in college football history, 31 100-yard rushing games, 6,435 all-purpose yards and 64 total touchdowns.

At South Florida, Pimpleton helped the Bulls to a program-best record of 11-2 in 2016 while completely rewriting the program's rushing record book. USF set new school records with 3,709 rushing yards, 47 rushing touchdowns, an average of 6.50 yards per rush, an average of 285.7 rushing yards

per game, 77 total touchdowns scored, 569 points scored, an average of 43.8 points per game, 300 total first downs and 164 rushing first downs. The Bulls ranked second in the nation in yards per rush, fifth in rushing yards per game and 11th in total offense.

His debut season at USF also made its mark on the record books as the team broke records for most rushing yards with 3,205, highest rushing average of 5.41 yards per carry and most rushing yards per game with 246.5. The team's 28 rushing touchdowns in 2015 ranked second in team history at the time. Pimpleton tutored Marlon Mack for two seasons, helping the school's all-time leading rusher earn first-team all-conference honors in each season and break 14 school records before being picked in the fourth round of the 2017 NFL Draft by the Indianapolis Colts.

Before becoming a member of the USF staff, Pimpleton spent two seasons at Kentucky Wesleyan. He was the Panthers' wide receivers coach in 2013 before being elevated to offensive coordinator in 2014. That season, he directed an offense that broke 10 school records as a team while 13 different individual records fell. The 2014 squad also tied the school record for wins, matching a mark that had stood since 1999. He tutored Keelan Cole, who led Division II in receiving yards, receiving yards per game and receiving touchdowns in 2014 and in 2017 helped the Jacksonville Jaguars win their first division title since 1999.

In 2010, Pimpleton joined Coach Taggart's first staff at Western Kentucky. He served two seasons as an offensive quality control assistant before being promoted to wide receivers coach in 2012 and helping the Hilltoppers reach the first bowl game in program history. His first collegiate coaching opportunity came in 2009 when he was hired as an offensive quality control assistant at Louisville.





Pimpleton began his coaching career in the high school ranks in his hometown of Louisville, Kentucky, serving as wide receivers and defensive backs coach for one season at Iroquois High School before handling both roles for two years at his alma mater, Fern Creek High School. Before joining the University of Louisville staff, he spent two seasons as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Doss High School.

Pimpleton played quarterback and wide receiver at Western Kentucky following a prep career as an all-state quarterback at Louisville's Fern Creek High School. At WKU, he gained 1,425 rushing yards with 18 touchdowns and caught 13 passes for 165 yards and four touchdowns in a run-heavy offense. He helped lead the Hilltoppers to the 2000 Ohio Valley Conference championship and earned honorable mention All-Gateway Conference honors in 2001. Following his collegiate career, he played three seasons in the Arena Football League and two more seasons in the American Indoor Football League.

Pimpleton earned a bachelor's degree in business and communications from Western Kentucky in 2002. He and his wife, Nicole, have one daughter, Anistyn.

MARK SNYDER

DEFENSIVE ENDS

→ 1st season at FSU | 30th season as college coach

Mark Snyder is in his first season at Florida State coaching the defensive ends in 2018.

Snyder comes to Tallahassee with 29 years of collegiate coaching experience, including 12 as either a head coach or defensive coordinator, and has been on staffs that have won four national championships. He has spent the previous three seasons as special teams coordinator at Michigan State, where he also coached the defensive ends and linebackers. During his time in East Lansing, the Spartans won 25 games, including the 2015 Big Ten championship, and played in the College Football Playoff.

In 2017, Snyder's defensive line helped Michigan State lead the Big Ten and rank second in the NCAA in rushing defense, allowing only 95.3 yards per game on the ground. The team also ranked seventh in the NCAA in total defense by holding opponents to 297.6 yards per game, 18th in third-down defense with a conversion percentage of only .328, 19th in the country in scoring defense, allowing an average of 20.0 points per game, and had the nation's 17th-best passing efficiency defense rating.

Sophomore defensive end Kenny Willekes thrived under Snyder's tutelage in 2017. The former walk-on led the Spartans in tackles for loss with 14.5 and in sacks with 7.0, totals that also ranked sixth in the Big Ten. Willekes was a third-team All-Big Ten selection and a finalist for the Ted Hendricks Award. Sophomore defensive tackles Mike Panasiuk and Raequan Williams both earned honorable mention all-conference honors.

Kicker Matt Coghlin was named to the Big Ten All-Freshman Team and an honorable mention All-Big Ten performer after tying the MSU freshman record for field goals made with 15. He finished the season 15-of-19 on field goals, making his last eight in a row to end the season, and a perfect 38-of-38 on PAT attempts. Coghlin's makes included a game-winning 34-yard field goal as time expired to give MSU a 27-24 win over No. 7 Penn State. Punter Jake Hartbarger also garnered honorable mention All-Big Ten honors after averaging 42.0 yards per punt with a long of 62 yards and 12 punts of 50 yards or more.

During his first two seasons at Michigan State, he led four Spartan linebackers to All-Big Ten recognition, including two-time recipient Riley Bullough, who made a team-high 106 tackles as a junior before collecting 76 as a senior despite missing time due to an injury. Bullough was signed by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2017 and appeared in three games as a rookie.

In 2015, all three of Michigan State's starters earned All-Big Ten accolades, helping lead the team to the Big Ten championship and an appearance in the College Football Playoff semifinal at the Cotton Bowl. The linebackers helped pace a defense that ranked 11th in FBS in rushing defense, 25th in scoring defense and 26th in total defense.

The Spartans' special teams played a crucial role in the 2015 championship season and were directly responsible for two game-winning plays as time expired. At No. 12 Michigan, Jalen Watts-Jackson scooped up a fumble by the Wolverines' punter that he returned 38 yards for a touchdown to give

the Spartans a 27-23 victory. The touchdown was later voted the No. 1 play during the 2015 season at the ESPN College Football Awards Show. At No. 2 Ohio State, kicker Michael Geiger made a 41-yard field goal to give the Spartans a 17-14 victory and snap the defending national champions' 23-game winning streak.

Snyder was Texas A&M's defensive coordinator from 2012-14. In 2014, he coached true freshman Myles Garrett, who broke school and SEC freshman records with 11.5 sacks and was a consensus first-team Freshman All-American and second-team All-SEC performer. Garrett went on to be picked No. 1 overall in the 2017 NFL Draft by the Cleveland Browns. In 2012, Snyder oversaw the development of consensus first-team All-American Damontre Moore, who recorded 85 tackles, including 21.0 for loss with 12.5 sacks, and was a third-round pick by the New York Giants in the 2013 NFL Draft. The Aggies finished the 2012 season with an 11-2 record and a win in the Cotton Bowl over Oklahoma behind a defense that ranked 26th in FBS by allowing an average of 21.8 points per game.

As the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at South Florida in 2010 and 2011, Snyder oversaw a top-25 rushing defense both seasons. In 2010 the Bulls allowed 125.6 rushing yards per game and were 22nd in the country before improving to 15th in the nation with an average of 107.3 yards per game on the ground in 2011. The 2011 team collected 99 tackles for loss, the second-highest total in the nation, and ranked fourth in the country with 39 sacks, while the 2010 team ranked 17th in total defense and 22nd in scoring defense. Snyder coached first-team All-Big East defensive tackle Terrell McClain, who was selected in the third round of the 2011 NFL Draft by the Carolina Panthers, as well as Super Bowl champions Jacquian Williams, who won Super Bowl XLVI with the New York Giants, and Kayvon Webster, who won Super Bowl 50 with the Denver Broncos.

Snyder was the head coach at Marshall for five seasons, during which he led the program's transition from the Mid-American Conference to Conference USA. He won 22 games, including a 6-6 mark and berth in the Little Caesars Pizza Bowl in 2009, and produced 40 all-conference selections, led by 2006 Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year Albert McClellan. Defensive end Vinny Curry was the Conference





USA Defensive Player of the Year and won Super Bowl LII as a member of the Philadelphia Eagles. Running back Ahmad Bradshaw was a two-time all-conference selection before being selected in the seventh round of the 2007 NFL Draft by the New York Giants. He helped the Giants win Super Bowl XLII and Super Bowl XLVI while becoming only the eighth running back in NFL history to be the leading rusher in multiple Super Bowls.

Snyder spent four seasons at Ohio State, helping the Buckeyes win the 2002 national championship and post a 40-11 record from 2001-04. That 2002 squad ranked second in the nation in scoring defense, allowing an average of 13.1 points per game, and third in rushing defense, giving up only 77.7 yards per game on the ground. In 2003, Ohio State ranked second in the country in rushing defense, 10th in total defense and 16th in scoring defense while putting together an 11-2 record and a No. 4 final ranking.

While in Columbus, Snyder oversaw the development of first-team All-American and three-time first-team All-Big Ten linebacker A.J. Hawk, who won the Lombardi Award and was the No. 5 overall pick by the Green Bay Packers in the 2006 NFL Draft. He also coached Bobby Carpenter, the 18th overall selection in the 2006 NFL Draft, Rob Reynolds, a fifth-round draft pick in 2004, Cie Grant, a third-round selection in 2003 and Matt Wilhelm, who was a first-team All-American before being picked in the fourth round of the 2003 NFL Draft.

Prior to his time at Ohio State, he was the defensive ends coach at Minnesota for four seasons. While there, he helped develop first-team All-American and first-team All-Big Ten performer Lamar Williams, who led the nation with 18 sacks in 1997. He also coached Karon Riley, who led the Big Ten with 16 sacks in 1999 and earned first-team All-Big Ten recognition in 2000.

Snyder spent six seasons on staff at Youngstown State, where he helped the Penguins win three I-AA national championships and play in four consecutive national title games. At Youngstown State, he coached outside linebackers, inside linebackers and the secondary while spending two seasons coordinating the Penguins' special teams and one season as defensive coordinator. His first college coaching experience came at Central Florida, where he was a graduate assistant in 1989 before being promoted to linebackers coach in 1990.

As a player, he was an honorable mention All-American and first-team All-Southern Conference free safety at Marshall. He led the SoCon with a school- and conference-record 10 interceptions in 1987, and he made 124 tackles during his senior season to help the program reach its first national championship game.

Snyder graduated from Marshall in 1988 with a bachelor's degree in sport management and marketing. He and his wife, Beth, have three daughters, Chelsea, Lindsay and Shaylee.

RAYMOND WOODIE

LINEBACKERS

→ 1st season at FSU | 9th season as college coach

Raymond Woodie is in his first season coaching the Seminoles' linebackers in 2018 after joining head coach Willie Taggart's staff for the fourth time.

Woodie coached defensive ends and linebackers at Western Kentucky before serving as linebackers coach, assistant head coach and defensive coordinator at South Florida and then outside linebackers coach and special teams coordinator at Oregon.

Woodie orchestrated a nearly perfect kicking game in 2017 as Oregon finished the season 63-of-63 on PAT attempts and 9-of-12 on field goals. Additionally, the team's average of 22.73 yards per kickoff return ranked third in the Pac-12. Long snapper Tanner Carew earned first-team All-America honors from Phil Steele and was invited to the Senior Bowl, and freshman Brenden Schooler was a first-team All-Pac-12 selection as an all-purpose/special teams player. Kicker Adrian Schneider broke Oregon's school record with 51 career made field goals.

On defense, Woodie's outside linebackers made major contributions to a unit that ranked 23rd in the country with 25 turnovers forced, 22nd with an average of 7.2 tackles for loss per game and 24th in rushing defense by allowing 128.5 yards per game on the ground. The team's total defense ranking soared from 126th in 2016 to 46th in 2017.

At South Florida, Woodie held the title of assistant head coach for two seasons and coordinated the Bulls' defense during their record-breaking 2016 season. That year, USF won a school-record 11 games while the defense forced 26 turnovers to rank 18th in the country and returned three for touchdowns, tied for the 19th-highest total in the nation.

He also oversaw the linebackers at South Florida, coaching two to all-conference recognition. In 2014, Nigel Harris led the country and broke a school record with six forced fumbles. Woodie tutored the Houston Texans' sixth-round selection in the 2015 NFL Draft, Reshard Cliett, and also helped DeDe Lattimore and Harris reach the NFL.

In 2015, he was responsible for the Bulls' special teams and coached the sixth-best kickoff return unit in the country as USF finished the year with a program-record average of 26.66 yards per return. Kickoff returner Rodney Adams was a second-team all-conference selection after leading the American Athletic Conference and ranking sixth in the NCAA with his average of 29.1 yards per return. Adams was selected in the fifth round of the 2017 NFL Draft by the Minnesota Vikings.

Woodie boasts an impressive resume on the recruiting trail and impacted Florida State immediately as he was ranked as the No. 2 recruiter in the ACC by 247Sports in 2018, despite having less than two months to recruit for the Seminoles after he was hired. Woodie also earned AAC top recruiter recognition by Rivals in 2014 and was named the Sun Belt's Recruiter of the Year by Scout/FoxSports.com in 2012. He was also ranked as the No. 1 recruiter in the Pac-12 and No. 13 nationally by 247Sports during the 2017 season. He helped Coach Taggart sign the AAC's top classes in 2014 and 2015, directly recruiting nine of USF's 10 all-conference selections in 2016, and the highest-ranked classes in the Sun Belt in 2010 and 2011.

While at Western Kentucky, he recruited Venice, Florida, native Forrest Lamp and Lakeland, Florida, native Andrew Jackson to Bowling Green. Lamp was a second-round pick by the Los Angeles Chargers in the 2017 NFL Draft and Jackson





was selected in the sixth round of the 2014 NFL Draft by the Indianapolis Colts. They are two of seven Hilltoppers recruited by Woodie to play in the NFL.

Before entering college coaching with Taggart at Western Kentucky, Woodie was a high school head coach in South Florida for 13 seasons. He was the head coach at Palmetto High School from 2007-09 and led the Tigers to a district title in 2008. From 1997-2006, Woodie was the head coach at Bayshore High School following one season as the team's defensive coordinator and led the Bruins to the state playoffs seven times. When he took over as head coach he was only 23 years old, making him the youngest head coach in the state.

Woodie lettered as an outside linebacker and strong safety at Bethune-Cookman from 1992-95, where he earned GTE Academic All-America honors and was a I-AA All-American and first-team All-MEAC performer his final two seasons. As a junior, he broke the program's single-season record with 14.5 sacks. Following his collegiate career, Woodie spent one season playing for the CFL's British Columbia Lions.

A native of Palmetto, Florida, and graduate of Palmetto High School, Woodie graduated from Bethune-Cookman in 1996 with a bachelor's degree in criminal justice and earned his master's degree in education from National Louis University.

Woodie and his wife, Stephanie, have three children, Raymond, Alanah and Kaden.

- » Junior receiver Auden Tate had two receptions for 41 yards, including a three-yard touch-down pass from redshirt sophomore Deondre Francois in the second quarter.
- » Francois was 19-of-33 for 210 yards and a touchdown. He completed passes to seven different receivers, including seven to sophomore Keith Gavin for 50 yards. Gavin did not record a catch as a freshman and made his first start against the Crimson Tide.
- » The defense, led by redshirt senior linebacker Matthew Thomas and redshirt sophomore safety Derwin James, held Alabama to 96 passing yards and 173 rushing yards. It was just the second time under Nick Saban that Alabama has passed for fewer than 100 yards and rushed for fewer than 200 in the same game (Tulane, 2008).
- » Matthew Thomas led the team with 10 tackles. Over his past three games (Florida & Michigan in 2016), Thomas has 32 tackles and has led the team in tackles each game.
- » Junior Josh Sweat led the team with one sack as the Noles took down Jalen Hurts twice.
- » Freshman running back Cam Akers was one of six true freshmen to play for the Seminoles. Akers had 30 rushing yards and an 11-yard reception. Two redshirt freshmen - Josh Ball and Janarius Robinson - also made the first appearances of their career.
- » Three sophomores - Gavin, defensive end Brian Burns and defensive back Levonta Taylor - made the first starts of their careers.
- » Francois continued to climb FSU's all-time lists. Francois ranks 16th in FSU history with 3,560 passing yards, 17th with 254 completions and 21st with 21 touchdown passes. Francois left the game in the fourth quarter with a leg injury.
- » Defenders Tarvarus McFadden (5), Fred Jones (5) and Ro'Derrick Hoskins (9) all set career highs for tackles.
- » George Campbell's 21-yard catch in the first quarter was his first since the 2015 opener.

- » Freshman running back Cam Akers led the Seminoles in rushing with 56 yards on 12 carries (4.7 ypc).
- » Redshirt sophomore receiver George Campbell's 60-yard reception late in the third quarter was a career long. Campbell also registered career highs with three receptions for 85 yards.
- » Redshirt senior linebacker Ro'Derrick Hoskins led the Seminoles with nine tackles, tying his career high from the season opener against No. 1 Alabama.
- » Senior Derrick Nnadi and sophomore Brian Burns shared the team lead with 2.5 tackles for loss each. Burns also blocked A.J. Cole's punt with 3:31 to play in the game, his second career blocked punt.

- » Jacques Patrick's 69-yard run from the FSU 1-yard line was the longest of his career and FSU's longest of the season. It highlighted a 120-yard game for Patrick.

- » Auden Tate's go-ahead 20-yard touchdown reception from Blackman with 1:24 remaining marked the fourth consecutive game he has caught a touchdown. The last Seminole to have a touchdown catch in the first four games of a season was Rashad Greene in 2013.
- » Tight end Ryan Izzo's 15-yard touchdown reception with 12:17 remaining was the fourth scoring grab of the redshirt junior's career and first since the 2016 opener against Ole Miss. Izzo led the Noles with four catches, equaling his single-game high.

- » True freshman tailback Cam Akers turned in a career-high performance with 199 rushing yards on 22 carries, including touchdown runs of 54 and 63 yards. That moved him from sixth to No. 3 on FSU's all-time rushing list for true freshmen.
- » The Seminoles posted their earliest touchdown strike of the season on their opening possession of the game. James Blackman's 51-yard touchdown pass to Nyqwan Murray with 10:02 on the game clock finished off a 4-play, 53-yard drive.
- » It was the first time since November 28, 1976 against Virginia Tech, the final game of Bobby Bowden's first season as head coach in Tallahassee, that FSU had three offensive touchdowns of at least 50 yards.
- » Matthew Thomas and Derwin James both blocked field goals, the first time since Duke in 2003 that FSU blocked two FGs in a game. FSU has four blocked kicks this year (two Brian Burns punts as well), the most in a season since 2010.
- » Freshman defensive back Hamsah Nasirildeen made his first career start. He joins Blackman and Akers as the third true freshman to start this season.
- » Ermon Lane made his first start at wide receiver since the 2014 season. It was his seventh career start, the last four of which came at defensive back in 2016.
- » Blackman's 51-yard touchdown pass to Murray was his longest touchdown pass this season and his second-longest completion (60 yards to George Campbell vs. NC State).
- » Derwin James had his second career interception on Syracuse's first drive. The defense finished with three sacks, six tackles for loss, nine pass breakups and nine QB hurries.
- » Syracuse ran 95 plays, the second-most by an opponent in FSU history (Houston, 99, 2015 Peach Bowl).

- » Brian Burns set a career high with seven tackles and 4.5 tackles for loss. Burns added two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery, the first player in FSU history with two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery in the same game.
- » Burns is the first Seminole with two forced fumbles in a game since Jalen Ramsey at NC State in 2014.
- » Burns' 4.5 tackles for loss are the most for a Seminole since DeMarcus Walker had 4.5 (all sacks) against Ole Miss in the 2016 season opener.
- » Demarcus Christmas recovered the second fumble of his career at the FSU three-yard line after Clemson traveled 71 yards in 15 plays. Christmas' first fumble recovery came against Charleston Southern in 2016.
- » Nyqwan Murray finished with a team-high 73 yards, including a 39-yard catch that led to FSU's first touchdown. Over the past five games, Murray has 19 catches for 411 yards.
- » Redshirt senior linebacker Matthew Thomas finished with 11 tackles, his fifth game this season with at least 10. He added 1.5 tackles for loss.
- » True freshman defensive back Hamsah Nasirildeen had 10 tackles, more than doubling his previous career high of four against Syracuse.
- » Redshirt junior tight end Ryan Izzo's 60-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter was the longest catch of his career. The 60-yard score was the longest touchdown catch for FSU this season and the second-longest score overall (Akers' 63-yard run vs. Syracuse). It was the longest TD for an FSU tight end since 1993 (Lonnie Johnson vs. Clemson).
- » The 60-yard pass was the longest of true freshman quarterback James Blackman's career, matching a 60-yard pass to George Campbell against NC State.
- » FSU had a pair of touchdown drives of at least 85 yards at Clemson.

- » FSU's 77 points scored are the most in the country in 2017 and the second-most in FSU history. FSU's 56 first-half points are the most in school history (also vs. Tulane, 1992).
- » Derwin James' 41-yard interception return for a touchdown in the first quarter was FSU's first pick-six since Terrance Smith did it against Florida in 2014. Tarvarus McFadden added a touchdown on a blocked field goal, FSU's first since 2006 against Clemson.
- » Freshman D.J. Matthews amassed 138 yards on 5 punt returns. Matthews is the first Nole with more than 100 punt return yards in a game since Tyler Hunter (122) vs. Duke in 2012 and is the third-highest single-game total for FSU.
- » Fullback Gabe Nabers (2-yard) and receiver Justin Motlow (12-yard) scored the first receiving touchdowns of their careers.
- » Senior running back Ryan Green's 5-yard TD run in the third quarter was his first score since a 1-yard plunge against Nevada in 2013. Green capped his day with a career-long 50-yard TD run and a team-leading and career-high 96 yards on 7 carries.
- » Freshman defensive end Joshua Kaindoh recorded four sacks - the first four of his career. Kaindoh's four sacks are the second-most by a player in the country this season and the most sacks by a Nole since DeMarcus Walker had 4.5 vs. Ole Miss last season. Kaindoh led the Noles in tackles with six after entering the game with nine through his first nine games.

- » Jacob Pugh's fumble recovery for a touchdown was his third career fumble recovery. The score was the first of his career.
- » Brian Burns' sack on Florida quarterback Feleipe Franks was his fourth of the season and 13th of his career. Burns forced the fumble that led to Pugh's touchdown. Burns has three of FSU's seven forced fumbles this season. Burns added 2.5 tackles for loss and two pass breakups.
- » Cornerback Levonta Taylor's interception on the final play of the first quarter was his first career takeaway. His second was in the second quarter, an 18-yard interception return for a touchdown. He is the first Seminole since Pugh against Notre Dame in 2014 with two interceptions in a game.
- » Stanford Samuels III recorded his first career sack, a seven-yard loss in the second quarter.
- » FSU converted all four Florida turnovers into touchdowns. FSU entered the game with just 24 points off turnovers on the season. The four takeaways are the most for the FSU defense since forcing four in the 2016 season opener against Ole Miss.

- » Redshirt senior defensive back Nate Andrews made his 22nd career start and first of 2017.
- » Running back Jacques Patrick had 155 rushing yards, his fourth career 100-yard game and second this season. Cam Akers added 117 yards on the ground, the first time since USF in 2016 that FSU had a pair of 100-yard running backs.

2017 INDEPENDENCE BOWL RECAP

- » Playing in a bowl game for the 36th consecutive season, Florida State beat Southern Miss 42-13 in the Walk-On's Independence Bowl. Interim head coach Odell Haggins moved to 2-0 in his career as head coach.
- » The win improved FSU to 7-6 on the season, FSU's 41st consecutive winning season, one shy of the all-time record (Notre Dame, 1889-1932).
- » FSU is 29-16-2 all-time in bowl games, with eight wins in the past 10 tries.
- » FSU had a 23-6 halftime lead and improved to 7-1 in 2017 when leading at halftime.
- » FSU had 16 scoring drives of 75 or more yards (15 touchdowns, one field goal), including three TD drives against USM.
- » FSU forced at least one turnover in eight of 13 games this season.
- » After allowing 63 yards and a touchdown on the first drive of the game, FSU's defense allowed 86 yards on the Golden Eagles' next five drives combined, resulting in three punts, a lost fumble and the end of the first half.
- » FSU was 6-for-7 in the red zone vs. USM and finished 2017 44-of-48. Before ending the game on the USM 5-yard line, FSU had converted 26 consecutive red zone tries. In that span, FSU scored 22 touchdowns and four field goals (five TDs vs. USM).
- » FSU had a 1,000-yard rusher for the fifth straight season (D. Freeman 2013, D. Cook 2014-16, Akers 2017). FSU did not have a 1,000-yard runner between 1997 and 2012.
- » FSU made its first appearance in the Independence Bowl and improved to 11-6 when playing in a bowl game for the first time.
- » FSU outscored opponents 199-51 over the season-ending four-game win streak.
- » FSU's 42 points scored are its most in a bowl game since also beating Wisconsin 42-13 in the 2008 Champs Sports Bowl.
- » True freshman quarterback James Blackman and redshirt senior Nate Andrews were named offensive and defensive MVPs, respectively.
- » Freshman running back Cam Akers ran for 94 yards on 13 carries, passing Dalvin Cook for the most rushing yards by an FSU freshman in a season (1,024). Akers also caught a 14-yard touchdown pass from James Blackman in the second quarter. It was Akers' first career receiving touchdown.
- » Blackman passed for a career-high four touchdowns. Blackman threw for at least one touchdown in 11 of 12 starts and had multiple touchdown passes in five games, including three of the past four.
- » Blackman's four touchdown passes set an Independence Bowl record for TD passes in a game and were the most for a Seminole QB in a bowl since Chris Weinke had four against Virginia Tech in the Sugar Bowl (1/4/2000).
- » Junior wide receiver Auden Tate caught five passes for 84 yards against Southern Miss, including three touchdowns. Tate's 10 touchdown catches are the most for a Seminole since Kelvin Benjamin (15) in 2013. It was the first multi-TD game for an FSU receiver in 2017 and tied the Independence Bowl record for TD catches in a game.
- » Blackman's 19 TD passes tied for No. 19 in single-season history. Tate's 10 TD catches tied for 13th in FSU single-season history.
- » Freshman wide receiver D.J. Matthews, redshirt sophomore defensive end Jalen Wilkerson and sophomore linebacker Emmett Rice made the first starts of their careers.
- » FSU's starting offensive line of Josh Ball, Derrick Kelly, Alec Eberle, Cole Minshew and Rick Leonard started for the ninth consecutive game.
- » Sophomore kicker Ricky Aguayo made three field goals. He was 18-for-21 on the year and made seven straight over the final seven games. Aguayo entered bowl season 21st nationally and third in the ACC with an .833 field goal percentage.
- » Redshirt junior tight end Ryan Izzo had six catches for 59 yards, setting a career high for receptions in a game.
- » True freshman defensive back Stanford Samuels III forced a Southern Miss fumble late in the second quarter, the first of his career. It was recovered by junior A.J. Westbrook, his first career recovery.
- » Playing his final career game, redshirt senior Nate Andrews led FSU with six tackles, a season high.
- » Junior running back Jacques Patrick ran 16 times for 61 yards, including his 16th career rushing touchdown, tied for 18th in FSU history.
