HUGH DURHAM, GOLF COACH

Since taking over as Head Coach midway in the 1963 season, Durham has watched his Florida State Golf teams total a combined dual match record of 38-4, and a school record of 31 straight, including a perfect 8-0 mark last year.

The results have proven that Durham, better known for his basketball playing and coaching skills, made the right decision in 1959. Graduating from Florida State's School of Business, where he held a place on the Dean's List, Hugh stayed on a year for a Masters' degree and the freshman basketball coaching job. His record: 9-1, best in school history.

The following year he became a permanent assistant coach to basketball boss Bud Kennedy. His all-round sports background made him a natural for the golf coaching job when it opened up two seasons ago.

A respectable golfer in his own right, Durham plays when possible and shoots in the 70's. He's also city badminton champ, and played a good hand of tennis in his younger days. As a high schooler he turned down football scholarship offers to take Florida State's basketball grant.

As a track star in high school, Durham took third places in the quarter-mile and mile run at the state meet. He lettered four times in basketball and baseball, three times in football and track.

At Florida State, Durham scored more than 500 points in a season twice and finished his three-year career with 1381 points in 73 games. During much of his junior year he was bothered with a chronic ankle injury.

Hugh is married to the former Malinda Dixon of Jacksonville. They have two sons, David, 5, and Doug, 1.

PLAYER PROFILES

Dennis Lyons, Senior, St. Petersburg. The top man on the golf squad for three varsity seasons. An honorable mention All-American, Lyons has led the Seminoles to two undefeated seasons. He has never played in a losing match since coming to the Tallahassee campus and must be rated with former Seminoles Dowing Gray and Bob Shave as the best golfer in F.S.U.'s eighteen years... Although just 5-6, he is the team's second longest hitter, behind towering Bill Boutwell, while his short game is superb. He spends a lot of time on the practice tee and has become an exceptional student of the game. He is looking forward to a great year, including a trip to the NCAA Championships in June...Dennis played in the National Amateur at 15; also has played in the North-South Amateur, and won the state AA high school championships as a junior at St. Petersburg's Northeast High.

Bill Boutwell, Junior, Palm Beach. At 6-5 this giant of the green is probably the tallest collegiate golfer in the state of Florida. It is certain he is one of the most powerful drivers in the land. Last year he placed second in a driving contest held during the NCAA Championships at Knoxville, Tennessee with a drive of 341 yards. Despite his ability, he did not play at FSU as a freshman, but came out for the 1964 varsity. If he can learn to control his power, he should reach his tremendous potential. This year, with few experienced lettermen, Boutwell will be counted on to give the team the needed leadership.

Terry Moore, Junior, Brunswick, Ga. Moore slipped badly this fall, and must come back strongly to beat out a fine group of sophomores. However, he has the potential. He was the only sophomore to crack the lineup last year and had the lowest average on the 1964 frosh team...the son of a golf pro, he is a strong iron player knows his way around the greens.

Jim Conace, Junior, Columbus, Ohio. A transfer from Duke, Conace played well during fall qualifying. He is a long ball hitter who has shown his ability with a putter. With some competitive experience, he should remain a strong contender to play varsity.

Hugh Green, Sophomore, Birmingham, Ala. He will be counted upon this year to fill one of the top six spots. He is not a strong driver but has uncanny ability with his putter and a fine short game.

Carl DiCesare, Sophomore, Rochester, N.Y. One of the many sophs who must come through this year. He has the game of an outstanding college golfer. He was New York Junior Amateur Champion. Big, strong, and willing to play.

Jim Duval, Sophomore, Schenectady, N.Y. He played well in qualifying this fall. He is one of the hardest workers on the squad and has developed the consistency that is important in varsity golf.

Bob Duval, Sophomore, Schenectady, N.Y. Hampered by an injured hand in the fall, Duval has the ability to regain top form this spring. The son of a golf pro, he has developed a strong long iron game. He is a careful, consistent player.

Jay Morelli, Sophomore, Farmingdale, N.Y. Although he's small, he is extremely consistent and plays well on a short tight course. Morelli was New York St. High School Champion. He does not make many mistakes under pressure.

LEX WOOD, TENNIS COACH

Alexander Thomas 'Lex' Wood, a former star tennis player at Florida State, begins his second year as head coach.

Wood, 28, replaced Paul Scarpa in the winter of 1964. Lex received a teacher's diploma from Johannesburg College of Education in 1960 and taught English for two years at Dale College in his home town, King William's, South Africa. He came to the U.S. in January, 1962.

During his collegiate career at Florida State, Wood won 51 of 53 matches. 22-1 last Spring, he defeated SEC champion Graham Primrose of Miss. State, 6-4, 6-1; Junior Davis Cupper Walter Johnson of Georgia Tech; and Miami's two South Africans, Rodney Mandelstam and John Hammill. The victory over Mandelstam gave Lex the Florida Intercollegiate Singles Crown.

In a prosperous tour of American tournaments in 1963, Wood won the Eastern Collegiates at Hamilton, N.Y.; the Middle Atlantic Championships, Wilmington, Del.; the Eastern Clays at Hackensak, N.J.; the Tristates Championships at Cincinnati, beating Dave Reed; the Newport, R.I.; Casino Invitationals; and advanced to the National quarterfinals at Forest Hills.

Lex earned letters in rugby, tennis, track, and cricket as a King William's high schooler. Prior to coming to the U.S., he defeated Abe Segal, South Africa's top-ranked player and perennial Davis Cupper, Britain's Mike Sangster, and the world's third-ranked player, Nicolo Pietrangeli of Italy. As a Florida State junior, Wood defeated NCAA singles finalist Marty Reissen of Northwestern.

One of four sons of a well-to-do Cape Province merchant, Wood is of British and German descent. His great-grandparents arrived at the Cape in 1840 from Britain. A South African friend playing here in the States, Chip Drysdale of Lamar Tech, recommended Lex to the then FSU coach, Eddie Cubbon

Lex married the former Brenda Witshire of Tampa in May, 1964, and they have a daughter, Kelly Ann, 6 months.

PLAYER PROFILES

Paul de Zeeuw, Junior, East London, South Africa. A tall and rangy 20-year old, de Zeeuw is the most experienced player on the Florida State roster...he had a 9-6 record last year, playing mostly first singles... Paul improved through an impressive European tour last summer and showed well in the Gator Bowl Tennis Tournament this December. Bom in Holland, he moved to S.A. at three; his father, Engel de Zeeuw, is a proat Selborne Park in East London, a resort city on the Indiam coast...At Selborne High School Paul was the Western Province high hurdles and high jump champ, also the province's number one tennis junior.

Terry Poore, Senior, Anderson, S.C. Poore is a tremendous competitor and his 11-3 mark in dual competition last year was one of the best on the squad... a transfer from Anderson J.C. where he twice finished third in the United States Junior College Championships and defeated the top player, Tommy Chandrick. At Anderson High he was ranked as high as fourth in the 18-and-under ranks in tennis-conscious South Carolina... A solid player with strong groundstrokes and quick reflexes, Terry shows the leadership ability to spark the Seminole netters to higher goals in 1966. In preseason practice he was often placed above Bruner and Murphy in the five man fight for the number one spot on the FSU lineup.

Stewart Bruner, Junior, Plant City. Playing as high as number one position last year, Stew finished the season with a 12-3 singles record. He almost beat Miami's Mickey Shad in one of his stronger performances. A transfer student from Rollins, he sat out a year before playing for State. A hot-and-cold player Bruner has been plagued both by inexperience and by a quick temper, but he expects to have his best year in 1966. A lithe 6-4, Bruner has an aggressive net game and a flat serve that can match that of de Zeeuw. Always in peak condition, he is in competition for a high position on this year's strong squad. Consistency is the key to his success this season.

Steve Guse, Senior, Little Rock, Ark. An outstanding junior player who was hot and cold as a sophomore, Steve compiled a fine 14-2 singles record, winning his first nine matches. He always has shown considerable ability in intrasquad tournaments with displays of poised tennis but is counted upon this year to compete for a high position on the team... His ability as a doubles player is important... At North Little Rock High, Steve was the state's AAA singles title and Arkansas' number one junior... His timing, reflexes, and strong net game make him one of the team's best hard court players.

Russ Langstroth, Soph. Coral Gables. Once Florida's 15th ranked 18-and-under player, Russ is a fine competitor and showed much promise on last year's strong freshman squad. Finished year with a 4-1 record. The frosh team finished the year with a perfect mark and Langstroth's fine play and leadership were two of the reasons.

Clint Murphy, Soph. Pompano Beach. A newcomer with tremendous potential, Clint beat de Zeeuw in the Garnet-Gold matches this winter...a cool, deliberate player with an outstanding attitude, he has put great pressure on the veteran players this year. Last season Clint had a 4-1 mark on the freshman squad; his only loss to Miami-Dade J.C.'s outstanding Jay Schlosser. One of the top juniors in Florida, he will overcome his inexperience as the year goes on. Could crack the starting lineup at a high position.
