DON VELLER HEAD COACH

A low handicapper himself, Dr. Don Veller returned to the coaching ranks last season following a ten year

layoff and promptly led the Seminoles to a tenth place finish in the NCAA tournament.

From 1953-57, Veller led Florida State's golf teams to a 43-8 record including fifth and fourth place finishes in 1956 and '57.

Since leaving the coaching ranks, Veller has been instrumental in starting Florida State's highly successful Coaching Minor program which allows a student obtaining his degree in another academic area of the university the opportunity to study the fundamentals of coaching under Florida State's varsity coaches.

A 1935 graduate of Indiana University, Veller was a standout football player for the Hoosiers. The highlight of his career was an 82-yard run which helped upset Purdue in 1934 and helped him earn the Chicago Tribune Most Valuable Player award that year.

Veller returned to his alma mater in 1947 to work on his doctorate. While he was there he served as an assistant football coach and the tennis coach.

In 1948 Veller moved to Florida State as the Seminoles football coach for their second season of intercollegiate competition.

In five seasons, Veller led teams, compiled a 30-12 record, including the school's only undefeated team (8-0 in 1950) and its first bowl game. In 1957 he became Assistant Director of Athletics and a year later Associate Director before he stepped down to devote full time to the development of the Coaching Curriculum.

He is a full professor and a member of the graduate faculty at the University.

The Seminoles saw action in four tournaments, plus the NCAA national championships, and the Tribe fared well in all. Brightest hour came at the prestigious Miami Invitational, which the Tribe won by five strokes. Individual honors were captured by Hubert Greene. The Seminoles led the Cape Coral Tournament for the first three rounds, but fell by two strokes to Florida on the last day. It was another fine tourney for Greene, however, as he again was the individual medalist. The Seminoles placed second to Florida in the State championships at Gainesville, and took a fifth in the LSU Invitational. At the NCAA's the Tribe finished tenth overall, after being third and just three strokes off the pace at the halfway point.

OUTLOOK

Three top performers are gone from last year's squad which placed tenth overall in the NCAA Championships. Gone are Hubert Greene, Carl DiCesare and Jim Conace, all top performers for the last three seasons.

Coach Don Veller is not pessimistic about the 1969 Seminoles chances, however, as several championship caliber players return along with the acquisition of two top flight junior college transfers.

The top returnees are Ron Philo, Bob Huber and Mike Cheek. All played regularly last year and are familiar with

the pressures of the tournament game which highlights this years schedule.

In addition one of the best freshman crops in several seasons is on hand to supply depth with Mark Alwin and Mit Layton leading the day.

Biggest talk of newcomers, however, turns to JC transfers Dick Stephens and Jim Keedy. Both from Florida junior colleges (St. Petersburg and Lake Sumpter) and they both bring impressive credentials into this years play. Stephens last season wound up second in the National Junior College Championships.

With tournament golf becoming the dominant factor in collegiate golf, the Seminoles will be taking part in several of the nation's toughest tourneys.

Included on the schedule is the annual Hollywood Men's International Four Ball Tournament, the Miami Invitational and All-American Intercollegiate at Houston.








Florida State's University owned golf course is located approximately three miles from campus, near the University Reservation at Lake Bradford. Originally a nine hole course, it has been expanded this year to 18 holes. Although the new layout will not be ready for 1969 competition, it will be open in September. In addition, the Seminole golfers have access to the courses at the Killearn Country Club (site of this year's Tallahassee Open Invitation) and the Capital City Country Club, both located in Tallahassee, providing a varied and challenging set of championship courses to play.



LEX WOOD, TENNIS COACH



One of the finest tennis players to play for Florida State, Lex Wood is now in his fifth year as the Tribe Head Coach.

Wood, 31, came to the Seminoles from King William's South Africa and starred for two years as a player before taking the reins in 1965.

During his collegiate competition he won 51 of 53 matches, the Florida Intercollegiate title, the Eastern

Collegiates and advanced to the quarter-finals at Forrest Hills.

As a King William's high schooler Lex earned letters in rugby, track and cricket, as well as tennis. He received his teachers diploma from Johannesburg College of Education in 1960 and taught English for two years at Dale College in his home town.

Prior to coming to Florida State, Wood had defeated Abe Segal, South Africa's top-ranked player and former Davis Cupper, and the then third ranked player in the world, Nicola Pierangeli of Italy.

One of four sons of a well-to-do Cape Province merchant, Wood is of British and German descent. His great grandparents arrived at the Cape in 1840 from Britain. A South African friend playing here in the States, Chip Drysdale of Lamar Tech, recommended Lex to the then FSU coach, Eddie Cubbon.

Lex married the former Brenda Witshire of Tampa in May, 1964 and they have three children.

1969 TENNIS OUTLOOK

Coach Lex Wood has an enviable position this season—every one of the top performers from last year's 19-3 squad returns.

"It was a good team last year," says Wood, "and this year they will be a year older and wiser."

As was the case last season the Seminoles will be marked by a tight knit, highly competitive squad.

"Everyone of our first seven is capable of beating any of his teammates on a given day," says Wood, "And in intra-squad competition it happens frequently."

While Wood acknowledges this is a very desirable attribute for the club, he also admits that the Seminoles don't have the "super" player at the number one spot.

That doesn't dismay the former Tribe net star, however, as top seed Dave Danielson is a very capable performer who will make you come out and beat him. "He goes down reluctantly," said Wood about his senior captain. "He doesn't beat himself often. In the last two season's he has lost only ten matches."

Behind Danielson are seniors Bob Marcher and Randy Jobson, juniors Al Procopio, Herb Rapp and Scott Bristol. Sophomore John DeZeeuw was a regular as a freshman last year also.

The lone newcomer is Dale Baker a freshman with the credentials to become a good one.

A five game pre-season road trip saw the Tribe come out with an even split, winning two, losing a pair and having one match called because of darkness.

"We certainly weren't disappointed with the results," Wood said. "Our boys played real fine tennis. We were within a match of having three wins on the trip."


The Seminoles defeated Mississippi State (9-0) and LSU (7-2), and were tied with Tulane when darkness fell. The losses came in Texas, to second ranked Rice (6-1) and Houston (5-4). The tribe had won four of the six singles matches in the latter one, and needed only to take one doubles, but could not manage the victory.

The schedule will be a good test, but is not overpowering. Included are SEC toughies Florida and Mississippi State, perennial college division power Rollins Miami, Michigan State and Southern Illinois.

"This team will be a winner no mat-




