Scott Fletcher Head Coach

This will be Scott Fletcher's fourth season at the helm of the Seminole golf team.

The veteran club pro took over the Tribe reins in 1970 and put the Seminoles through their first "all tournament" schedule. Since that time the Tribe golfers have played nothing but the finest collegiate tournaments in the South and have a record any coach would be proud of.

In his first season, Fletcher directed the Seminoles to five wins in seven tournaments. The same winning attitude has prevailed.

Before coming to Florida State Fletcher was the club pro at Capital City Country Club for five years and spent one year managing the Florida State course. This background gave him extensive contact with young golfers and provided him a solid base for college coaching.

"I have always enjoyed working with young golfers because of their enthusiastic approach to the game," said Fletcher.

The Seminoles' home matches are played on the University's 6,900 yard 18 hole championship course. One of the finest university owned layouts, the challenging course has long fairways, well-trapped greens and a modern club house.

The University maintenance and grounds department keep the course in peak condition for year round play.

Assisting Fletcher this year is a former Seminole golfer, Mark Gutenberg.

PROFILES

JOHN RUBY, Sr., 21, 5-8, 175, Stratford, Conn.—Has been a regular for most of the last three years . . . will serve as team captain . . . had a strong showing last summer when he placed fourth in the North Eastern Amateur and first in the Eisenhower Invitational . . . was the 1970 New England Amateur Champion . . . has a strong all around game highlighted by outstanding wedge play . . . has all the tools to be a great golfer . . . placed second in Connecticut State High School championships in 1969 . . . was lowest scoring freshman in the Miami Invitational in 1970 . . . older brother Bob played golf at Ohio University.

JIM IHNOT, Sr., 21, 6-0, 160, Minneapolis, Minn.—team co-captain...made trip to NCAA Championships last year...outstanding athlete, was All-State basketball player and won his state high school golf championship...lefthander...transferred from Valencia Junior College where he played golf and ran cross-country...tough competitive spirit and a dedicated golfer...his older brother, Tom, played golf at Minnesota.

BILL VOYLES, Sr., 22, 6-7, 190, East Point, Ga.—Has made steady improvement throughout career... one of hardest workers on squad... twin brother Ben also member of FSU team... big strong player who hits long ball... two years ago he captured the Lakewood Country Club Tournament... disciplined player, plays well under pressure.

BEN VOYLES, Sr., 22, 6-7, 190, East Point, Ga.—Like his twin brother, Bill, a big strong player off the tee, led the squad at the 1970 Senior Bowl tournament ... placed 16th at the NCAA Championships two years ago, but did not make it back last season ... a hard worker and dedicated golfer, if he regains consistency should return to top form.

STEVE MULLEN, Jr., 20, 5-9, 165, Miami—A real scrambler...plays well under pressure...former Miami Junior champion...shows improvement over last year...may be toughest competitor on team ...his father is former FSU baseball player.

DOUG FISCHESSER, Jr., 22, 6-0, 170, Connersville, Ind.—Fine all around player...brought few prep credentials, but outplayed all his freshman teammates...a real sleeper who is showing much improvement...could be a solid contributer this year.

RAY THOMPSON, Sr., 21, 5-10, 160, Newton Square, Pa.—Philadelphia Amateur winner last summer... has shown much improvement... missed most of his sophomore year with a hand injury, but rebounded well last year... good competitive attitude... his brother Andy, is former Seminole golfer.

TODD CRANDALL, So., 19, 6-0, 170, Ashtabula, Ohio—Good young golfer with a great deal of potential...placed second in Northwestern Amateur...if he continues to improve could make solid contribution this year.

KIM HEISLER, So., 19, 5-11, 165, Aurora, Ohio—Was the 1971 Ohio High School champion...showed potential last year as a freshman and has greatly improved his game...had a good summer in local events...another young one to watch.

TOM TOSKI, So., 19, 6-0, 175, Dalton, Mass.—Fine athlete from a golfing family . . . his dad, Tom Sr., is a Massachusetts golf pro . . . lettered four years in basketball as well as golf in high school . . . steadily improving player . . . strong fundamentals.

DICK GROUT, Jr., 20, 6-1, 165, Miami—All City performer for Miami Archbishop Curley and "Golfer of the Year" in Dade County as high school senior... had promising freshman season...comes from golfing family...his father is a pro who has worked with Jack Nicklaus and his brother John played for Miami.

JOHNNY GODWIN, Jr., 20, 6-2, 170, Columbus, Ga.—Georgia Junior PGA Champion in 1970...was top performer on his high school team...fine athlete, also played football at Columbus High...has chance to become a regular this season...his father, Bill, was All-American Football Center at Georgia in 1943.

ROBERT IMPAGLIA, Jr., 20, 6-1, 175, Auburn, N.Y.—Transfer from Auburn (N.Y.) Community College...has excellent chance of becoming a regular ...won Finger Lakes Tournament in New York last summer...was MVP at Auburn CC his freshman year...has good all around game...top competitor.

TOM KEEDY, Jr., 5-11, 165, Leesburg—Most valuable player for his high school and junior college teams... transfer from Lake Sumter J.C....older brother Jim played two years of varsity golf for the Seminoles... has potential to make as strong a contribution as his brother.

OUTLOOK

In 1972 Coach Scott Fletcher led a relatively young Seminole squad and all things considered the Tribe fared very well.

This year Fletcher looks for improvement as a veteran club returns almost intact.

There are five seniors of quality, a strong group of juniors and enough talented newcomers to keep the older players on their toes.

Playing an all-tournament schedule, the Seminoles do not compete as often as in previous seasons so intra-squad competition becomes all important in keeping a keen edge. Fletcher feels he has enough talent to keep everyone razor sharp.

"No one better become too complacent," says the veteran mentor in his fourth season as Florida State's Golf Coach. "If they do there is bound to be someone else to take over for them."

The seniors Fletcher looks to are squad captain John Ruby, co-captain Jim Ihnot, Ray Thompson and twins Ben and Bill Voyles. All are veterans who should be ready for the best seasons.

Among the juniors Doug Fischesser, Steve Mullen and Ron Rusk are prominent.

The newcomers to keep an eye on are JC transfers Robert Impaglia and Tom Keedy and freshmen Chris Campbell, Paul Rankin, Eben Dennis and Dennis Allen.

The schedule which began in September, takes the Seminoles to New Orleans, La.; Houston, Tex. and Calloway Gardens, Ga.
