

DON VELLER Golf Coach



When Dr. Don Veller took over the reigns of Florida State's golf team in 1974, it marked the beginning of the third tenure for the veteran Seminole coach.

The personable and well-liked former FSU football coach first led the Seminoles golf team from 1953-58. His second tenure went two seasons beginning in 1967. He guided the 1956 and 1957 teams to a fourth and fifth

place finish in the NCAA championships. Veller also led the 1979 squad to three consecutive first place finishes including wins in the prestigious Chris Schenkel Intercollegiate and the Metro Conference championships.

Veller holds a bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degree from Indiana University and maintains the rank of professor emeritus at Florida State. Veller's chief forte is in the area of coaching psychology where he has published numerous articles and is currently working on a book.

During Veller's stint as football coach, his teams (1948-52) won 30 of 42 games including the Tribe's first unbeaten regular season, 1950.

Veller, married to the former Frances Brindley over 40 years ago, is a five handicapper, holds a high position in national golf circles and writes a weekly golf column for the Tallahassee Democrat.

SEMINOLE OUTLOOK

After getting off to a modest start last year (1978-79) the Florida State golfers finished the regular season like Gangbusters. Winning their last three tournaments (Prudential, Chris Schenkel and Metro Conference), they were ranked 9th nationally by Golf World and were among 27 teams selected to compete in the NCAA Championships.

In the Prudential Tournament, the Tribe came from 5th place the last day to win over such powerhouses as LSU and the second-ranked Florida Gators.

By capturing first place in the Chris Schenkel, the Seminoles accomplished the greatest golf team victory in the history of the school. After trailing Wake Forest by two strokes the first day, they shot 10 under par as a team the second round and then went on to win by an unheard of 16 strokes over Georgia Southern, 17 over Florida, 22 over Wake Forest and 23 ahead of the eventual national champions, Ohio State.

In the Metro Tournament, the Seminole golfers won by a margin of 18 strokes over runner-up Memphis State.

Individually, the Seminoles also made high marks. Allan Menne, the lone senior, won the State of Florida individual championship in the fall. Freshman Paul Downes (English Amateur Champion) paced the Seminoles in the Prudential by placing second.

Another English lad, Sophomore Grant Turner, was runner-up to All-American Gary Halberg of Wake Forest in the Schenkel by scoring 72-69-69. Junior Jeff Sluman was third with 71-67-74. Menne and Downes tied with U.S. Amateur Champ, John Cook of Ohio State with 216's

Turner tied for first in the Metro but lost in an extra hole play-off.

Individually in the NCAA, Grant Turner finished a creditable 12th, a performance which helped his selection to the 3rd team All-American, and an invitation along with other All-Americans, to the prestigious Sun Bowl College All-Star Tournament in El Paso on December 1, 1979.

Assuming that the three returning regulars, Turner, Sluman and Downes, play as well as last year, the remainder of the 5-man team will be lined up with two of the following: Senior Marcus Beck, junior lettermen Mike Grant and Dave Boeff, seniors Scott Perry and Jim Crowley, improving senior Mark Sorel and incoming winter quarter freshman, Stephen Keppler from London, England.

Beck, who returns after a red-shirt year while winning several highly regarded non-collegiate tournaments, seems to be the leading contender.

In early qualifying, Keppler (winner of Doug Sander's World Junior Championship in 1978) appears to have the edge for the remaining spot. Other leading freshmen include John Huggan, Brian Kamm, Chip Holcombe, Paul Brown and John Huff.

The 1979-80 schedule is the toughest and best in the history of the School, guaranteeing that the Seminoles will be playing with and against the nation's best.




JEFF SLUMAN

SEMINOLE GOLF COURSE

Florida State University boasts one of the best all-around collegiate golf facilities in the nation. The university-owned Seminole Golf Course is tough, long and interesting.

The 18-hole, par 72, course measures 7,015 yards.

Perhaps, even more important, however, are the adjacent practice facilities with their superb surfaces. The practice driving range has 2,800 square feet of hitting area.

The Seminole course is available for year-round play largely because of Tallahassee's moderate North Florida climate. The 80,000 square foot facility is for the exclusive use of students, course members and FSU golf team members.

In addition to the Seminole Course, the FSU varsity members are privileged to play each Monday at Killearn CC (scene of the PGA Tallahassee Open), and once a week at the scenic, tight Capital City CC.



(The following sections were taken from Golf World Magazine on May 4, 1979 demonstrating the improvement of the Seminole golf team last season)

... In Statesboro, 21 teams gathered for the eighth annual Chris Schenkel Invitational and were treated to a team-golf clinic as Florida State made believers out of a whole bunch of people when the Seminoles strode to a 16-stroke victory... Florida State was coming fresh from first place in the Prudential Intercollegiate in Jacksonville but no one expected the Seminoles to tear up the tract the way they did in the Schenkel... The roof caved in for everyone else in the second round when Florida State flew past the field with a composite of 11 under par. The Seminoles were in command after 36-holes with a 13-stroke lead over Florida... Sluman, the defending New York State Amateur champion, paved the way for that remarkable charge with a 67. Grant Turner shot 69 and Paul Downes and Allan Menne each carded 71's.
