

Media Information

Credentials

Required for all events where an admission is charged. Please contact the sports information office at least one week before event to be covered. Space for the working press, radio, television and scouts is allocated by the Sports Information Office.

Press Parking

Passes not required except for games at the Leon County Civic Center. For those events, make request at same time credentials are issued. Ample parking may be found in Doak Campbell stadium lots for baseball games and around Tully Gym area for basketball, track, and tennis events.

Photographers

Only accredited photographers will be issued working credentials. All still photographers must shoot from designated areas. Space for video cameras for certain events will be assigned by the Sports Information Office.

Statistical Services

Complete statistics will be provided for all basketball and baseball games. Additional services will be provided as requested for all other events.

Telecopiers

Two telecopiers are owned by the Sports Information Office. These will be made available on a first come - first served basis, free of charge.

Interviews




Baseball at Florida State has long been the pacesetter among the nation's colleges. The reasons why go back to the program's roots. Never has a Seminole baseball team had a losing record. Only two schools have appeared in more NCAA Regionals; and all of that against the toughest schedule in college baseball. Such a showcase of the sport it is, that Florida State plays it's games in a shining million dollar baseball park, unmatched in this part of the country. A Seminole baseball player spends 11 months a year playing the game, with fall, summer and spring programs affording him the opportunity to play an incredible 150 games a year.





What a proud tradition there is in track and field at Florida State. The Lady Seminoles recently added the latest of the national titles to the heritage by winning the 1984 NCAA Championships in Eugene, Ore. Incredibly, they had finished third and second in the two previous years. Members of the Lady Seminole track team have earned 51 All-American titles since 1982. That is about as close to domination of a sport as you'll find. The mens' track team continues to uphold its own proud tradition. Not only the leader in its own state, this team has won The Metro Confrence title for eight consecutive years. And Florida State's prowess in this sport, too is aided by a newly renovated and upgraded track and field stadium. Utilizing the annual site of the prestigeous Domino's Pizza relays, no other track athletes in the area have the advantages that these Seminoles do in terms of training facilities and coaching.





1984-85 FLORIDA STATE GOLF:

1984-85 Women's Golf Outlook

Experience and leadership may be the key words that will tell how far the 1984-85 Lady Seminoles will go during the spring season.

Experience, or the lack thereof, is one of the biggest concerns of Head Coach Verlyn Giles as he enters his sixth year at the helm of the Lady Seminoles. With only two seniors on his roster and only one golfer who has spent three years in his program, Giles is looking to his veteran players to provide help as the younger golfers gain valuable experience in tournament competition.

This season the needed leadership is being provided by the team's two top players, Ann Lavis and Lorraine Elder. In a close battle for the number one position, the pair will be looked to for strong and consistent rounds throughout the

Lavis, a senior from Ontario, was this past winter selected as the Female Amateur of the Year in Canada. A junior, Elder has lettered in her first two years at FSU and last year qualified for the 1984 U.S. Women's Amateur.

Behind Lavis and Elder, the rest of the squad is balanced so that any of the six may qualify for the remaining three spots at anytime during the season.

Upperclassmen Lyn Leonard and Debbie Zahand provide depth and even more experience to the team. Both saw tournament action during the 1983-84 campaign.

The lone spohomore on this year's squad, Kristin Ericson, should also see action in the top five. A strong short game is her biggest asset.

An outstanding trio of freshmen have already shown during the fall season they are ready to contribute to Lady Seminole fortunes. Jacky Gryzwacz (pronounced griz-wack) finished in a tie for fifth at the Carrier-Memphis Women's Intercollegiate. Redshirt freshman Leigh Mills was the Lady Seminoles' top finisher in the Alabama Tournament. The final freshman, Sarah Nicklin from Stourport, England, struggled at the beginning of the fall but saw her game come around and is now expected to make several appearances in the top five.

With a young team playing against a very tough schedule, the Lady Seminoles may stumble at times, but Giles is optimistic his eight quality golfers will develop into a strong unit as the 1985 spring season progresses.

1984-85 Men's Golf Outlook

The 1984-85 men's golf team possesses a hard-to-find combination of experience and youth. Head Coach Verlyn Giles believes that mixture could be just what the Seminoles need to again put them among the nation's elite.

Eight golfers, including four of the top six, return from last year's squad which literally walked away with its seventh consecutive Metro Conference Championship by an amazing 49 strokes over runnerup South Carolina.

The continued success of two young yet experienced sophomores could be the secret to FSU's hopes for the 1985 season. After a strong fall campaign, Nolan Henke has emerged in the number one position for the Seminoles. His stability in that spot will prove valuable to Tribe fortunes in the spring.

Along with Henke is Jacksonville native Tom Krystyn. Krystyn finished off a fine year last season when he captured the runnerup spot at the Metro Championships behind teammate Brian Kamm.

The leadership on the team is keyed by seniors Keith Kulzer and Jonathan Morrow. Both have been regulars in the top five for the past three years and are expected to anchor this year's lineup.

Junior returnees Greg Garde and Steve Greek provide depth and strength to the roster. Both Garde and Greek have seen tournament action and will again be in contention for a spot in the top five.

Junior Mark Horton and sophomore John Veghte are the final pair of golfers returning from the 1983-84 season. Horton and Veghte give Giles experience that could prove valuable as the year progresses.

The new faces this year include three transfers and a trio of freshman recruits. Jeff LeMaster comes to FSU after one season at Ohio State, Ray Ziats arrives from Centenary College, and Ron Philo moves up from junior college.

Local product David Beck, Roger Kennedy, and Englishman Jeremy Robinson round out the Seminole' roster.

Playing in one of the most balanced and competitive regions anywhere will again make FSU's schedule one of the toughest in the country. An early highlight of the spring campaign is Florida State's Seminole Classic, now in its 16th year, from February 22-24.

VERLYN GILES Head Golf Coach

Now in his third year of coaching both the men's and women's golf teams at Florida State, Verlyn Giles has established himself as one of the finest collegiate coaches in the country.

Giles has served as women's head coach since 1979. He assumed the dual role three years ago when long-time men's coach Don Veller retired.

Giles was the head coach of the 1981 women's team which captured the AIAW National Championship. Three members of that squad were named All-Americans, and Giles was honored as Florida AIAW Coach of the Year for the team's accomplishments.

In addition to his coaching duties, Giles is also general manager of the Seminole Golf Course. He has held that post since 1971.

The Jacksonville native first came to Florida State in 1958. From 1961-63 he served as the assistant track coach under former coach Mike Long. Giles then moved on to Palmetto High School where he served as an assistant football coach, head track coach and head golf coach until 1965.

The coach then returned to Tallahassee where he accepted a position as offensive line coach under Gene Cox at Leon High School. Giles was also head golf coach in his seven seasons at Leon until he accepted the position of general manager at the golf course.

Giles received his associate degree in 1958 from South Georgia College where he played football under now FSU head coach Bobby Bowden. He earned his bachelor's degree from Florida State in 1961 in physical education.

In 1963, he was awarded his master's from FSU in physical education and student personnel work in higher education.

Serving as the professional at the Seminole Golf Course, Giles is a Class A member of the PGA of America and was also a member of the Tournament Players Association in 1982. He is also a member of the Golf Coaches Association of America

Giles is married to the former Kathy Moon and the couple have three children: Stephne, 20; Stacy, 15; and Kacci, 11.

DEBBIE MILES Assistant Coach

Debbie Miles enters her first year as an assistant coach for the men's and women's golf teams at FSU.

A former Lady Seminole herself, Miles was a member of the 1981 team that captured the AIAW National Championship. She also played on the 1979-80 squad that was ranked nationally.

Her current responsibilities as assistant coach include handling many of the administrative duties and traveling with the women's team when conflicts in scheduling occur. Miles has also worked at FSU's Seminole Golf Course. While pursuing her degree in leisure services at Florida State from 1979-82, she was employed in various capacities at the course.

Interested in becoming a golf teacher and coach, Miles hopes to enter the PGA Apprentice Program, where she can be certified as a teaching professional. Miles has already gotten involved in that aspect of the sport by traveling to clubs in nearby Quincy and Monticello during the past two summers to work with junior golfers and ladies' organizations.

A native of Davison, Michigan, Miles grew up in a golfing family, with her parents involved in country club management. A standout golfer in high school, Miles was Davison High's team captain four years in a row. Twice the runnerup in the state championship, Miles won the region title her senior year while shooting a tournament record.

1981 NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP TEAM

The Florida State Lady Seminoles thought they could win. They had done so four times earlier in the season. They knew how to win, and that, coupled with a back-nine rally on the final day, is what gave the Lady Seminoles the AIAW (Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women)

National Championship in 1981.

After the third round, FSU led by one stroke over the host Lady Bulldogs of Georgia. A stumble on the front nine of the final round saw FSU fall two shots back of Georgia at the turn. That turn, however, proved to be Florida State's turn of fortunes as four of the five Lady Seminoles birdied the 17th hole and FSU was on its way to its first national championship. FSU finished the tournament at 1,220, three shots better than Georgia at 1,223.

Three FSU golfers from that team were named All-Americans during their careers. Lisa Young was FSU's top finisher in the championship in third place. Barbara Bunkowsky, who was tabbed in 1982, did her part on the final day with birdies on the last five holes and came in in a tie for 14th. Michele Guilbault, who earlier in the season had easily won the prestigious Dick McGuire Invitational, was the other 1981 selection.

The Metro Belongs To FSU

Florida State joined the Metro Conference in 1976. The following year the Seminoles began competing in the conference championships. That year FSU defeated Memphis State by eight strokes to win its first-ever Metro Conference Golf Championship. The streak that started in 1977 has yet to end. Over the last eight years, Florida State has won seven consecutive Metro Championships (the tournament was not held in 1983). The victories have come by the slimmest of margins - a one-shot win over Memphis State in 1978 - and also in seemingly easy fashion. Last year FSU topped second-place South Carolina by an incredible 49 strokes. But the victories have always come.

FSU individuals have not fared much worse, winning medalist honors five of the past seven years. In fact, perhaps an even more impressive streak in that for four years in a row, four of the five FSU golfers have finished in the top five of the tournament. Florida State Metro champions Kenny Knox (1977) and Paul Azinger (1981) are now regulars on the PGA Tour. Conference champion Keith Kulzer (1982), who won the title as a sophomore, in now in his senior season with the Seminoles.

Seminole Golf Course ≡

Florida State University boasts one of the best all-around collegiate golf facilities in the nation. The university-owned Seminole Golf Course is tough, long, and interesting.

The 18-hole, par-72 course measures 7,015 yards on the men's Championship tees and 5,930 yards from the women's team tees. The bermuda greens are of medium size and measure approximately 6,200 square feet each. Perhaps even more important, however, are the adjacent practice facilities with their superb surfaces. The practice driving range includes some 2,800 square feet of hitting area.

Located approximately two miles west of the university campus, the Seminole Golf Course was designed by William W. Amick. The first nine was completed in 1963 with the completion of the additional nine done in 1968.

The Seminole course is available for year-round play largely because of Tallahassee's moderate North Florida climate. The 80,000 square foot facility is for the exclusive use of students, course members and FSU golf team members.

In addition, each year the Seminole is the host course for two championship collegiate tournaments. In the fall, the women's team hosts the Lady Seminole Invitational in late September. For the men's team, one of the high points of its spring campaign is the Seminole Golf Classic in late February, now in its 16th year.

Among many interesting facets, Florida State boasts the only Collegiate circus in the world.








Tallahassee

C.W. "Hootie" Ingram Athletic Director

Cecil Ingram, known to most of his friends and associates as simply "Hootie", has headed the Florida State athletic department since 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeast Conference.

Since his arrival in Tallahassee, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities, including the Moore Athletic Center...Home of Florida State athletics.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Alabama, Ingram played for the Crimson Tide from 1951 through 1954 and led the nation in interceptions as a sophomore. He also lettered in baseball as an inflelder. Following a stint in the army, Ingram turned to coaching. After several years of high school coaching, Ingram moved into collegiate athletics; making assistant coaching stops at Wake Forrest, Virgina Tech, Georgia and Arkansas.





A member of the Florida State athletic staff since 1981, Bob Goin begins his fourth full year as Associate Athletic Director.

All men's non-revenue coaches report to Goin and he also assists Director Ingram in the day-to-day operations of the athletic department. A large portion of football, basketball and baseball game day operations fall under his leadership.

A 1959 graduate of Bethany College, Goin recieved his master's degree from West Virgina in 1961. From 1960-76, Goin served Bethany in several administrative and coaching capacities, before moving on to West Virgina as an assistant athletic director. He was named athletic director at California (Pa.) State College in 1980, where he formed that institutions first scholarship fund for athletics and the college's first booster club.

Charles W. EhrhardtFaculty Athletic Committee Chairman



A Florida State University professor of law, Charles W. Ehrhardt is in his first year as Chairman of the Athletic Committee.

He is currently in his second stint on the committee, serving from 1969-71 and then being reappointed to the board in 1983. As chairman, Ehrhardt suceeds Dr. James Jones, who served in that capacity since 1980. Ehrhardt becomes Florida State's representative to the NCAA.

A native of Elkander, Iowa, Ehrhardt received his bachelor's degree from Iowa in 1962, before earning a law degree at Iowa State two years later. He came to Florida State in 1967.

A widely respected expert in the field of Evidence, Ehrhardt is frequently called on to lecture on the subject by lawyers and judges nationwide.

Barbara Palmer Associate Athletic Director



Barbara Palmer has been with Florida State athletic program since 1977. As Associate Athletic Director. Palmer is in charge of the women's athletic program and also holds the title of women's athletic director.

Since her arrival, the Florida State Lady Seminoles program has been recognized as one of the strongest in the country...with four national championship teams in the last four years (track, 1984; softball, 1981-82; and golf 1981). In 1982, all eight varsity sports went to national tournaments...one of only two schools to make the claim nationwide.

A 1970 graduate of Florida State, Palmer has been recognized as the driving force behind FSU's climb toward national excellence. Palmer headed a lobbying effort that pushed Title IX legislation through state government and she is directly responsible for state funding women's athletic recieves each year.
