




## MEN'S OUTLOOK

Head coach Verlyn Giles has a problem, but it's one which he is delighted to have. Giles, now in his fourth year at the helm of the men's program, has eight top flight golfers on his 1986-87 roster. His problem is that only five players can play in each tournament. The Seminoles look to be a much stronger team than a year ago.

"In our region, I think we will be battling it out for the number one slot with LSU," he says. "I think this is the strongest team at FSU since I took over four years ago."

The competition for a spot in the top five will be intense despite the presence of four returning lettermen. Giles insists that the only player assured a position in the top five is All-American Nolan Henke, who has 15 top 10 finishes and a Porter Cup Trophy to his credit at Florida State. "I look at other schools and I don't know of any player who could knock him out of the number one position in the nation," Giles says. "We're talking about a first team All-America."

Besides Henke, the Seminoles return four players with tournament experience, led by senior Tom Krystyn, the fourth place finisher in last year's state championships. Giles was also pleased with the 1986 performance of senior John Veghte. "You can always count on John to shoot a good score and keep you in the match," Giles says.

Also returning are senior Jeff LeMaster and sophomore Tallahassee native David Beck.

Add to the competition Christian Williams and Donald Donahue, a pair of talented freshmen with impressive credentials. "I believe that both Christian and Donald have the potential to contribute this season," Giles says.

Rounding out the competition for a top five position are redshirt freshman Roger Winchester and junior Ray Ziats. Winchester was redshirted last year to give the Great Britain native an extra year of eligibility. He returned in the fall to impress many with his play during the qualifying rounds. Ziats played well enough last spring to place second at the Seminole Golf Classic. Either player could turn out to be a pleasant surprise.


"I've named eight players who I think could play in the top five," Giles says. "That

means several players will not play." But the Seminole head coach believes the added competition will not only help each player to improve, but it will make the entire team stronger this year.

"This is the type of situation it takes to produce a championship caliber team," he says.

# Look Who's Back . . .

## WOMEN'S OUTLOOK

Five years ago, head coach Verlyn Giles directed the Lady Seminoles to the national championship, the pinnacle of collegiate golf.

Since that time, Giles has never felt more

confident that FSU's women's team can again compete among the nation's finest teams until this season. He makes his point by classifying the nation's top teams into four categories. "Usually there are three teams at the top with three groups of about ten behind them," the seventh year coach says. "We've been in the third or even the

fourth bracket, but now we're moving up into that second bracket."

Giles optimism rests in an excellent mixture of seasoned returnees and promising newcomers.

Senior Kristin Ericson leads a list of three returning players, all of whom played in each of Florida State's ten tournaments last year. Ericson practiced every day during the summer and is looking to lower her 81 stroke average from a year ago. A pair of experienced juniors, Leigh Mills and Sarah Nicklin, also return after playing in the top five throughout much of their careers. Giles believes that all three players will show marked improvement with the added competition from a host of newcomers, headed by freshman Jodie DeCosta. DeCosta, who last year won eight tournaments, is considered one of FSU's top signees ever. Giles thinks that the New South Wales, Australia native can compete against the South's finest players this season, which should keep the Lady Seminoles on the leader board.

FSU also welcomes two transfers with extensive collegiate playing experience. Cathie Fritz, who played for two seasons at Ohio State, and Kristina Kavanaugh, a sophomore transfer from Nazerath (N.Y.) College, will be challenging for positions in the top five.

Rounding out the Florida State roster and adding depth that the team lacked last year are Kathy Grant, a redshirt freshman, and Victoria Crawford, a 1985-86 letterwinner.

"We've got seven exceptional players," Giles says. "All we need is for someone to shoot a 75 everytime. And we've got the people who can do that now."

Giles adds that the Lady Seminoles could return to their former glory if the newcomers and veterans gel as a team. "I don't know if optimism and the prediction has a lot to do with winning," he says, "but when I've thought that in the past we've played pretty well."

# Florida State alumni will earn over \$1,000,000 on the PGA and LPGA tours this year

Florida State alumni combined to produce its most successful year on the PGA Tour in 1986. Leading the list of players was Kenny Knox, who won the Honda Classic in Coral Springs, Florida. The Tallahassee resident also finished in the top 10 at the inaugural International and the Buick and Westchester Classics. Knox earned \$202,065 through August to push his career earnings to \$251,557.

Just ahead of Knox on the 1986 money leaders list was Paul Azinger, who earned \$219,237. Azinger recorded five top 10 finishes, including second and third place showings at the Hawaiian and Andy Williams Hartford Open.

Joining Knox and Azinger over the \$100,000 plateau was Hubert Green with \$106,495. Green added that total to over \$2,000,000 in career earnings which makes him one of the only 16 tour players to surpass that mark in PGA history.





### The Seminole Golf Course

Seminole Golf Course, home of the FSU golf teams, is one of the finest collegiate golf facilities in the nation. The course, which is for the exclusive use of students, members and golf team members, offers a true test of golf with its challenging layout. Each year the Seminole is the host for two championship collegiate tournaments.

### Capital City Country Club

The Capital City Country Club is the elder statesman for the courses in the Tallahassee area. It is nestled among the rolling hills and majestic oaks, which contributes to its demanding makeup. The Capital City course has been the site of several regional championship tournaments.

### Hilaman Park

Hilaman Park offers a true test to the golfer. Narrow fairways and numerous lakes and streams dominate the layout of the par 72 course.

### Killearn Country Club and Inn

An exclusive country club setting situated on the outskirts of town, Killearn is kept in immaculate shape throughout the year and hosts Tallahassee's PGA tour stop—the Tallahassee Open. Many players on the PGA circuit feel that Killearn's greens are the finest on the tour.

### Golden Eagle Country Club

The Golden Eagle Country Club promises to be one of the finest courses in the state when it opens in 1987. The course is designed by noted golf course architect Tom Fazio and will be surrounded by a country club community.





# GEDDES WINS U.S. OPEN

Winning her first LPGA event, Jane Geddes defeated Sally Little in an 18-hole playoff to claim the 41st U.S. Open Championship on July 10-13. The victory at the NCR Country Club in Dayton, Ohio marked the first time an FSU graduate won the LPGA tournament. For Geddes, the Open win culminated a banner year, where she finished in the top 10 in seven tournaments. With consecutive wins at the U.S. Open and the Boston Five, Geddes pushed her season earnings to \$196,832—that placed her fifth on the LPGA money list. She earned \$373,240 during her four years on the tour.

Two of her teammates on the 1981 AIIWA national championship team at FSU also completed successful seasons on the LPGA circuit. Lisa Young finished 47th on the money leaders list and had four top ten finishes to her credit, including a pair of fourth place showings at the Mazda Hall of Fame and the Elizabeth Arden Classics. Young's career earnings total \$117,110.

Florida State's third alumna on the PGA tour is Barb Bunkowsky, who this year has earned \$22,231 on the women's circuit. Bunkowsky's career earnings are \$151,637.

The streak that started in 1977 has yet to end. Since the Seminoles joined the Metro Conference in 1976, they have won nine consecutive Metro Championships (the tournament was not held in 1983). The victories have come by the slimmest of margins—a one shot win over Memphis State in 1978—and also in seemingly easy fashion in 1984 FSU topped second-place South Carolina by an incredible 49 strokes. But the victories have always come.



# This is Florida State University

Florida State University, a coeducational institution and a senior member of the nine universities in the state system, is in Tallahassee, Florida, the state's capital.

Located just a few blocks from the Capitol, the Florida State campus is considered to be one of the most beautiful in the southeast. The 347-acre campus is covered with hardwoods, pines and palms as well as springtime greenery that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods.

The approximately 22,500 students currently enrolled at Florida State learn from a faculty of 1,500, which include four members of the National Academy of Sciences.

Florida State offers students the opportunity to choose from more than 100 career options in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, education, engineering, home economics, law, library and information studies, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater and visual arts. Honors programs are available for top students.


The University has been recognized by the Board of Regents for its continuing leadership at the graduate levels of education.

Overseas study programs in fields ranging from law to hotel and restaurant administration are offered in Florence, Italy; Oxford and London, England; Switzerland; Yugoslavia, Costa Rica and the Panama Canal Zone.

The University's location in the state capital affords excellent study, research and internship opportunities in the areas of government, social sciences, law and policy sciences.

Florida State is setting the pace as higher education in Florida prepares to enter the 21st century. One of the few institutions of learning in the United States with its own supercomputer, FSU is attracting researchers from around the globe.

In 1982, Florida State received the Panama City campus, originally a part of the University of West Florida, through administrative transfer from the Board of Regents and the state legislature. Today



approximately 85 percent of the courses offered in Panama City are taught by full-time Tallahassee faculty.

The Bay County Commission purchased 21 acres, 16 of which make up Phase I of the new campus. The remaining acreage will be available for expansion into technical degree programs such as engineering and science.

Social life for many students in Tallahassee centers around 24 fraternities and 20 sororities. Wind surfing, swimming and sunning are among the activities to be enjoyed at FSU's lakeside "Reservation" or along the sandy beaches of nearby coasts. In the fall, the campus goes wild for football, supporting the Seminoles both at home and away.

When it comes to intercollegiate athletics, Florida State has established a winning tradition. Both the men's and women's athletic programs are among the nation's best.

A unique extracurricular activity is the Flying High Circus, the nation's only all-collegiate circus. Students from every academic major can become stars on the

flying trapeze or highwire or in clown acts.

Florida State is growing. Construction has begun on the Florida A&M University/FSU College of Engineering Building, located adjacent to Innovation Park, two miles southwest of the FSU campus. It is expected to be completed by October 1987.

Construction began last fall on the new student union complex and construction is expected to be completed in 1987 on the Science Center Library.

Plans are also underway for a \$12.1 million multipurpose student gym, approved by the 1986 Legislature, as well as improvements to the central utility plant and renovation of the old Music Building (Music School South).

The College of Law's Village Green project has begun. When completed, the \$3.8 million project will feature four restored historic homes to be used as study, meeting and reception areas.

FSU President Bernard P. Sliger takes pride not only in the programs, but also in the people—students, faculty, administrators and staff—who make Florida State a successful monument to learning.






