

MEN'S OUTLOOK

Florida State golf coach Verlyn Giles just had to smile as he walked off the 18th fairway at last June's NCAA Championships. After witnessing his team fire the best round of the tournament to finish in seventh place, its highest finish in over 30 years, he knew the momentum the finish would create for his young team going into the 1987-88 season.

"We have a young team, especially after losing a superstar like Nolan Henke," Giles says. "But the people we have coming back have extensive national and international

tournament experience."

While most coaches would cringe at the thought of losing a first team All-American the caliber of Henke (eight career victories and 26 top 10 finishes), Giles however, will not enter the season empty-handed. With not one junior or senior in the starting line-up, Florida State may field the finest team its age in the entire nation.

Leading the way is Florida State's '88 All-American candidate, Roger Winchester a native of Great Britain. Winchester made the headlines in his native country over the summer as he miraculously recovered from a car accident to shoot a course record 63 in the qualifying round of the British Open. The Sidmouth, GB sophomore just missed the 36-hole cut and looks to use that experience to vault him into the forefront of the collegiate golf scene.

John Tighe, the second player who has a chance to hold down a top position in the line-up, comes to Florida State after spending two seasons at cross-state rival Florida. The Lake Worth sophomore showed his potential with a third place individual finish at last year's Gator Invitational as a Florida team member.

Sophomore Christian Williams, who played in eight tournaments last year as a true freshman, is the leading candidate to win the third spot in the lineup. Williams advanced to second level qualifying for the U.S. Open over the summer.

The favorite to hold the fourth spot in the lineup is redshirt freshman Donald Donahue. Donahue had an excellent summer on the amateur circuit to go along with his impressive junior golf record.

Giles also points to sophomore Robert Hill and junior David Beck,

a regular in last year's top five, as two possibilities who could break into the top five at some point during the season.

While the young Seminoles will be tested throughout the season at several of the nation's top tournaments — including the Golfworld Palmetto Dunes, Doral, Imperial Lakes and Chris Schenkel Invitationals — Giles is confident of a repeat trip to the NCAA Cham-

pionships in Los Angeles. Winning four tournaments last year, including its 10th consecutive Metro Conference title, Florida State will again battle Louisiana State for the number one ranking in the region.

"It's our goal to return to nationals," says Giles, who was named 1987 District III Coach of the Year. "Although we lost Nolan, we may have a stronger lineup from top to bottom."

If his young Seminole team can gel throughout the fall and spring seasons, Giles might just wear a smile again, this time in Los Angeles.

WOMEN'S OUTLOOK

Last year, Florida State's women's team wish was an invitation to college golf's biggest party — the NCAA Championships. The Lady Seminoles, however, fell just short of that goal.

"Sure I think it was a real disappointment not to make it to the national championships last year," FSU head coach Verlyn Giles says, "but this year I feel we can't be passed over. This team is probably one of the top 14 teams in the nation."

Giles, a veteran of eight seasons as head coach, is no stranger to judging talent; he led the 1981 Florida State team to the national title

Leading the 1987-88 Florida State charge toward its goal is senior Sarah Nicklin. A regular in the FSU lineup for the last three years, Nicklin averaged just over 75 strokes per round. Although she posted three runner-

up finishes during the spring, Nicklin did not receive a bid to the national championships as an individual. She enters this season as a bona fide All-American candidate.

The Lady Seminoles also return one of the their top players from a year ago. Leigh Ann Mills, another regular since her freshman season, made significant progress with her game over the summer. She qualified for the U.S. Open and narrowly missed the cut at the most prestigious of LPGA events.

"I'm very excited about the progress Leigh Ann and Sarah have made during their careers here at FSU," Giles says. "Both have made real breakthroughs in their games and should be two of the top players in the South."

Junior Nadia Ste. Marie, a transfer from Hawaii, is expected to have an immediate impact on FSU's fortunes. After announcing her intention to transfer last year, Ste. Marie selected Florida State over a host of other schools. Virtually every school in the nation was interested in Ste. Marie's impressive 75 per round stroke average as Hawaii's top player.

Cathie Fritz of Punta Gorda returns for her senior season in the number four position. She was a consistent performer during her junior year — her first as a Lady Seminole after transferring from Ohio State.

FSU's only question mark seems to be its fifth spot. Giles will likely wait until after the fall qualifying rounds before deciding on one of the three candidates. Redshirt sophomores Kathy Grant and Litia Bowman have the inside track to winning the job. Incoming freshman Crystal Kennedy will also be given a chance to crack the lineup.

"I'm as excited about the women's team as I am the men's team," Giles says. "A lot of times, teams move in four or five year cycles. We've come out of the valley and are ready to peak."

Florida State is already making plans to visit Las Cruces, New Mexico in May. Verlyn Giles and his team don't want to miss the party this year.

VERLYN GILES

Head Coach Florida State '63

Florida State golf coach Verlyn Giles has done it again. For the second time in his career at Florida State, Giles has taken over a program and in a few short years has proceeded to turn it into a winner. In 1987, Giles guided the

Seminoles to one of their most successful seasons ever, winning four tournament championships. The Seminoles, who were ranked as high as 10th during the regular season, saved their best performance for last at the NCAA Championships in Columbus, Ohio. Giles directed the team to a seventh place finish at the national championships — the best FSU finish in over 30 seasons. Giles also coached the 1987 NCAA individual runnerup, Nolan Henke (26 top 10 finishes and eight tournament championships) during his brilliant Florida State career. His

work with the Seminole golf team not only earned FSU its first NCAA bid since 1983, but also gave Giles District III Coach of the Year honors

Giles' recent success, however, is not foreign to the 50-year-old head coach. Joining the Seminole program in 1979 as head women's golf coach, Giles led the Lady Seminoles to the pinnacle of collegiate golf in 1981, surprising the golf world by upsetting Georgia by three strokes on the Lady Bulldogs' home course to win the AIAW national title. From the team came three mainstays on the LPGA tour: Lisa Young, Barb Bunkowsky and Jane Geddes. Geddes, the 1986 U.S. Open medalist, currently is a leader on the LPGA money list. Giles, in fact, heads a Florida State program that boasts two of 1987's leading money winners on both the LPGA and PGA tours. Former Seminole Paul Azinger was at the top of the men's tour money list in 1987.

Before coming to Florida State, Giles was no stranger to the Seminole program, as he graduated from FSU in 1958 and later received his master's degree in 1963. He spent coaching stints at Leon and Palmetto High Schools before returning to his alma mater. Giles and his wife, Kathy, have three daughters.



DEBBIE MILES

Assistant Coach Florida State '82

Entering her fourth year as assistant coach for both the men's and women's teams, Debbie Miles is the woman behind the scenes.

A former Lady Seminole golfer herself, Miles was a member of the 1981 team that captured

the AIAW national championship. She also played on the 1979-80 squad that was ranked nationally.

Her current responsibilities as assistant coach include handling many

of the administrative duties and traveling with the women's team when scheduling conflicts occur. Miles has also worked at the Seminole Golf Course. As an undergraduate from 1979-82, she was employed in various capacities at the course.

Her work at the Seminole Golf Course has carried over to other areas as well. During the past summers, Miles has worked with junior and ladies' organizations in nearby Quincy and Monticello.

A native of Davison, Michigan, Miles grew up in a golfing family as her parents were involved in country club management. A standout golfer in high school, Miles was Davison High's team captain for four years. She was twice runnerup at the Michigan State championship, while shooting a tournament record and winning the region title her senior year.



Florida State Greats

The numbers are staggering. With over \$1,500,000 in winnings, nine tournament championships and scores of top 20 finishes, Florida State alumni are dominating the world golf scene.

It's becoming a familiar happening. Just take the weekend of July 18-20, 1987. In an unprecedented near sweep, Florida State golfers on two continents brought home two tournament championships and a runnerup finish. Paul Azinger, playing in his first British Open, led the field for much of the first three rounds before finishing a shot behind Rodger Davis.

While Azinger was setting the pace in Great Britain, Kenny Knox and Jane Geddes were leading the competition in the United States. Knox, a year-around Tallahassee resident, won his second tournament in as many years at the Hardee's Classic in San Diego. Geddes, the 1986 U.S. Open Champion, found herself trailing the leader at the Boston Five Classic going into the final day. Geddes rallied on the final day to win the tournament for the second consecutive year.

But both Geddes and Azinger have sustained the steady play through the entire season to pull off a most unusual double. For the first time in recent memory, both the PGA and LPGA leading money winners have come from the same school — Florida State. Geddes, a member of FSU's 1981 national championship team, has won five tournaments and \$384,650 to take third place on the women's circuit. Azinger, with his wins at the Phoenix and Greater Hartford Opens and the Panasonic Invitational has won \$612,762.

A quick scan of the PGA and LPGA leading money leaders also shows Florida State's dominance on tour.

Trailing Azinger with \$214,487, Jeff Sluman has turned in his finest season since joining the tour. Sluman, at 5-8, jumped into golf's spotlight last March at the Tournament Player's Championship, when he finished

second to Sandy Lyle in a sudden death playoff.

Knox is another former Seminole to shine on the PGA Tour within the last two years. The 1977 Florida State All-American has won \$185,272 in 1987.

FSU's final mainstay on the tour is veteran Hubert Green. The 1977 Florida State Hall of Fame inductee became only the 16th player in professional golf to go over the \$2,000,000 career earnings mark.

On the LPGA tour, three former Lady Seminoles in addition to Geddes continue to star. Colleen Walker, the 1987 Mayflower champion, is rapidly rising up the money list. During the current season, Walker has won \$178,110 to boost her career earnings to over \$328,000.


Lisa Young, a teammate of Geddes at FSU, is the third Lady Seminole to crack the top 35 on the money list. She has won \$67,185.

Barb Bunkowsy, who was also a member of the '81 national championship team, has earned \$61,203 this year.

While these Florida State alumni on tour continue their success, younger Seminoles such as Nolan Henke are destined to carry on the school's lofty traditions. Henke, who won eight career championships and finished in the top 10 26 times, finished second in the 1987 NCAA Championship and national Player-of-the-Year balloting.


With the rapid rise of the Florida State golf programover the last 10 years, its easy to see what contributed to these player's success.




Sophomore Sidmouth, Devon, England

Notes Winchester Plays in 116th British Open

Roger Winchester's European vacation was something that not even Chevy Chase could dream up. Winchester, home for the summer in his native Great Britain following the NCAA Championships in June, planned on beating the odds and qualifying for the 116th British Open as an amateur. But just a week before the qualifying, Winchester fell from the back of a pickup truck he was traveling in and suffered a concussion. Most would have been intent on remaining in bed and watching the open on the BBC. Winchester refused to be held from his goal. Still suffering from amnesia, Winchester traveled to nearby Luffness to give it his best shot. All the sophomore did was shoot an amateur course-record 63 on the first day and come back to fire a 68 the following day to win a spot in the most prestigious tournament in the world.



Winchester's heroics were covered worldwide and were reported in the USA Today and on the front pages of the Orlando Sentinel and St. Pete Times. Rightfully so; he was scheduled to lineup against the likes of Nicklaus, Watson, Azinger, Ballesteros and Langer.

After one of the practice rounds, he was photographed with his idols, Watson and Nicklaus. Despite constant drizzle and rather cold conditions, Winchester preceded to fire a 75 in the first round, placing him in the middle of the pack. It looked like he had a shot at making the cut until the weather turned worse; he shot a 78 to miss the cut by just two strokes. Appearing in the British Open should not be overshadowed by that fact, however. Winchester was not known at all to the golf world just a week earlier.

"I was playing so well earlier in the week, I just wanted to give it a try," Winchester said afterward. "It definitely was a memorable experience."

■ 1981 NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP FILE

The Florida State Lady Seminoles thought they could win. They had done so four times earlier in the season. They knew how to win, and that, coupled with a back-nine rally on the final day, is what gave the Lady Seminoles the AIAW (Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women) National Championship in 1981.

After the third round, FSU led by one stroke over the host Lady Bulldogs of Georgia. A stumble of the front nine of the final round saw FSU fall two shots back of Georgia at the turn. That turn, however, proved to be Florida State's turn of fortunes as four of the five Lady Seminoles birdied the 17th hole and FSU was on its way to its first national championship. FSU finished the tournament at 1,200, three shots better than Georgia at

Three FSU golfers from that team were named All-Americans during their careers. Lisa Young was FSU's top finisher in the championship in third place. Barbara Bunkowsky, who was tabbed in 1982, did her part on the final day with birdies on the last five holes and came in a tie for 14th. Michele Guilbault, who earlier in the season had easily won the prestigious Dick McGuire Invitational, was the other 1981 selection.

The streak that started in 1977 has yet to end. Since the Seminoles joined the Metro Conference in 1976, they have won nine consecutive Metro Championships (the tournament was not held in 1983). The victories have come by the slimmest of margins — including a one shot win over Memphis State in 1978 — and also in seemingly easy fashion in 1984 FSU topped second-place South Carolina by an incredible 49 strokes. But the victories have always come.

FSU individuals have also fared well, winning medalist honors seven of the last nine years. Florida State Metro Champions Kenny Knox (1977) and Paul Azinger (1981) are now regulars on the PGA Tour. Former Seminole Jeremy Robinson captured the tournament championship for the past two seasons.


