

ROGER WINCHESTER IS THE TYPE OF PLAYER ABOUT WHICH COACHES DREAM. IT IS NOT JUST HIS ATHLETIC ABILITY THAT STANDS OUT, BUT ALSO HIS ACADEMIC STANDING. 
Graduating in the spring of 1990, Roger will have earned a degree in communications. Presently he is maintaining a 3.1 grade point average and was named a 1989 Academic All-American. On the golf course there is a similar story to be told.

WINCHESTER EARNED 1989 ALL-AMERICAN HONORS LAST SEASON AND HOPES TO BE FIRST-TEAM ALL-AMERICAN THIS YEAR. LAST SEASON HE HAD A STROKE AVERAGE OF 72.4 AND HAD SIX TOP FIVE FINISHES. HE WON THE SEMINOLE CLASSIC, METRO CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIPS, AND LOST IN A SUDDENDEATH PLAYOFF AT THE SOUTHEASTERN INVITATIONAL. ROGER PLACED FOURTH AT THE FLORIDA STATE INTERCOLLEGIATE TOURNAMENT AND FIFTH AT THE TOURNAMENT OF CHAMPIONS AND THE IMPERIAL LAKES CLASSIC.

Roger shows remarkable consistency which indicates he could have a

PROMISING FUTURE IN GOLF. WHAT APPEARS TO BE SO REMARKABLE ABOUT ROGER IS THAT HE MANAGES TO GIVE MORE THAN 100 PERCENT TO BOTH HIS STUDIES AND HIS ATHLETICS.

Coach Giles says, "When Roger first arrived at FSU he told me that he wanted to be a great golf player, not good, but the best . . . he has shown me that he is determined to achieve such status and in my mind there is nothing holding him back. The simple truth about Roger is that he is a true All-American — athletically and academically."

VERLYN GILES Florida State '63

During the last decade, Seminole Head Coach Verlyn Giles has guided his teams to numerous victories and aided in their goal of being a successful, consistent golf team.

In the 1988-89 season, Giles guided the Seminoles to a final standing of 16th at the NCAA

Championships in Edmond, Oklahoma. In 1987, Giles directed the Seminoles to one of their most successful seasons ever, winning four tournament championships. The Seminoles, who were ranked as high as 10th during the regular season, saved their best performance for last at the NCAA Championships in Columbus, Ohio. Giles directed the team to a seventh place finish—the best FSU finish in over 30 seasons. Giles also coached the 1987 NCAA individual runnerup, Nolan Henke (26 top 10 finishes and eight tournament championships during his FSU career). His work with the Seminole golf team not only earned FSU its first NCAA bid since 1983, but also gave Giles District III Coach of the Year honors. Florida State's success on

the national level is also accompanied by much success in the Metro Conference. Under Coach Giles, Florida State University has won Metro Conference titles in 11 of the last 12 seasons. Florida State golfers have also won the in-

dividual title a total of eight times.

Giles' success is nothing new. He began coaching at FSU in 1978 as the head coach of women's golf and in1981 led the Lady Seminoles to victory at the AlAW National Championships. The team surprised the golf world by upsetting Georgia by three strokes on the Lady Bulldogs' home course to win the AlAW National Title. From that team alone came three mainstays on the LPGA tour: Lisa Young, Barb Bunkowsky, and Jane Geddes. Geddes, the 1986 U.S. Open medalist, currently is a leader on the LPGA money list. Giles, in fact, heads a Florida State program that boasts two of the leading money winners on both the LPGA and PGA tours. Former Seminole Paul Azinger was at the top of the men's tour money list in 1989.

Before coming to Florida State, Giles was no stranger to the program. He graduated from FSU in 1961 and later received his master's degree in 1963. He then coached at Leon and Palmetto High Schools before managing the Seminole Golf Course from 1972-1984. In 1978 Giles became head coach of the women's golf team and in 1983 was named head coach of the men's golf team as well. Verlyn Giles and his wife have three daughters.



Assistant Coach

DEBBIE MILES-DILLMAN Florida State '82

Debbie Miles-Dillman, the woman in the wings of the golf program at Florida State, has entered her sixth year as the assistant coach for both the men's and women's Seminole golf teams.



Miles-Dillman, previously a Lady Seminole golfer herself, was coached by Verlyn Giles with a team that won the AIAW National Championship in 1981. As a player in the 1979-80 season, Miles-Dillman's team was nationally ranked, with her participation a major contribution to this ranking.

As an assistant golf coach, Miles-Dillman's responsibilities include handling the majority of the numerous administrative duties as well as travelling with the women's team when there are scheduling conflicts between both teams.

While an undergraduate from 1979-82, Coach Miles-Dillman worked at the Seminole Golf Course in various capacities. Her employment gave her useful exposure and experience in the many areas of the golf course. It also subjected her to golf in competition as well as for entertainment purposes. During the summer months, Miles-Dillman worked with junior and ladies golf organizations in nearby Quincy and Monticello, where her excellent reputation has preceded her. Because of these experiences, Miles-Dillman's knowledge of the sport of

golf has grown in aspects such as management and competition regulations.

A native from Davison, Michigan, Miles-Dillman grew up with golf in her family. Her parents were involved in country club management. During her high school career, Miles-Dillman was named three time Flint Junior Golf Champion from 1977-79, which was named the number one junior golf program in the country. She was the captain of her high school team for four years and was twice a runner-up at the Michigan State Championship, while shooting a tournament record and winning the region 'itle her senior year.

Women's Outlook


The Lady Seminole Golf team enters its 1989-90 season as a young and relatively inexperienced team. The conclusion of the 1988-89 season brought Nadia Ste. Marie, an All-American recipient, to the NCAA championship as an independent golfer. The team was not included in the tournament, a big disappointment, but finished the season respectably. As the team swings into the golf matches of this year, the coaches' expectations are sobering and thoughtful. "We have a young team...they will have to work on consistency and adverse playing conditions," says Coach Verlyn Giles.

The 1990 version of the Lady Seminole team features but one senior, Kathy Grant, who will be expected to lead a battery of young, inexperienced players through their first season of intercollegiate competition. The coaches expect her to be a stabilizing force for the rest of the team. Florida State will have to rely on the play of several young golfers if they are to obtain

their goal of reaching the NCAA tournament.

Mary Lee Cobick, a sophomore, will be a welcome addition to the Seminole line-up. She has proven herself without a

doubt with results from her 1988-89 freshman season. Emma Rundle, also a sophomore, is considered to be one of the major carriers of the 1990 team. As a freshman, Emma astounded the team by placing a respectable eighth in the Metro Conference. Lisa Carriell, a freshman from Paradise Valley, Arizona, entered Florida State with outstanding statistics from her four year college-prep school and is expected to do extremely well during the 1990 season. The redshirted freshman, Kelly Pittman, is looking at a season to prove herself. After receiving little attention during her high school senior year and being redshirted, Kelly is ready to draw the attention her way by exploding onto the golf course with confidence, intelligence, and defined skills. The remaining two golfers, Kathleen Garrahan, a freshman from Naples, Florida, and Erica Firnhaber, a sophomore transfer student who is sitting out a year of eligibility, are expected to do extremely well during the upcoming years. Both have shown their ability to compete with above average results and will play dominant roles with the Lady Seminole team.

The team may be young and inexperienced in the way of competition, but do not make the mistake that the Lady Seminoles will let that stop their competitive instincts. The women will play to win. Coach Verlyn Giles and Assistant Coach Debbie Miles-Dillman are realistic in their predictions of the Lady Seminoles, but they feel that the abilities that each woman has must be unmitigated and decisive. They expect a culmination of power and drive in the near future.




The Seminole Golf Course is located approximately two miles west of the university campus. The course was designed by William W. Amick. The first nine holes were completed in 1963 and the completion of the additional nine in 1968.

The golf course measures 7,033 yards from the championship tees and 5,930 yards from the women's tees, and is considered an excellent test of golf. The greens, TIFTON 328 (bermuda) are of medium size, approximately 6,200 square feet each. The course rating is 72.0

The course and practice facilities are considered to be among the best in the country. The Seminole Golf Course is now run and operated by Club Consultation and Management, a private golf course management firm. There have been many improvements made and within the next five years it should prove to be one of the finest courses in the area.




Seminoles On Tour

Men's Outlook

To no one's surprise, the Florida State men's golf team is returning for the 1989-90 season with an outstanding line-up of players. After finishing 16th at the NCAA Championships last year, the FSU men's golf team is entering this season with extremely high expectations in hopes that they might be able

to boast of an even higher standing this year.

Ranked sixth in the country by the coaches and fifth by Taylor Made, the team is expected to perform quite well. Based upon last year's tournament results, such a feat should come easier than in past years. As a whole, the team is well balanced and has the potential to shoot low. However, without the consistent performances of Roger Winchester, Christian Williams, and John Tighe, the team would be faced with a far more difficult task.

1989 All-American Roger Winchester, playing in the number one position, comes into this season with confidence after last year's results. He had a stroke average of 72.4 as well as six top 5 finishes. He won both the Seminole Classic and Metro Conference, and lost in sudden death playoff at the

"This team has the potential to win three or four tournaments this season with a possibility of ranking eighth going into Nationals. From that point any team is a potential winner."

Southeastern Invitational. Winchester was also named an Academic All-American. For his senior year Roger hopes to be 1st team All-American and repeat as an Academic All-American.

Christian Williams enters his junior season in the number two position. Last year he was redshirted due to non-related golf injuries, but has come on strong and is ready for the 1990 season. In 1987 Christian played in the number 2 and 3 position throughout the season, and had the Seminole's best finish in the fall by shooting 74-66-72 for a three day total of 216 and a fifth place finish in the Dixie Invitational in Columbus, Georgia. Coach Giles is expecting great results from Christian.

John Tighe is an extremely long hitter. John is expected to play in the number three position this season. In the 1988-89 season, John placed seventh in the Seminole Classic, ninth in the Taylor Made/Doral Park Collegiate Invitational and tenth in the Metro Conference Championships. Coach Giles feels

that John's excellent length will pay off.

The team is looking forward to a challenging season, and is hoping to finish even higher in the rankings than last season. According to Giles, "This team has the potential to win three or four tournaments this season with a possibility of ranking eighth going into Nationals. From that point any team is a potential winner." But with the sure play of top returnees such as Winchester, Williams, and Tighe, their challenge could very well be met.









FLORIDA STATE 1981 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

Florida State, rallying on the back-nine on the final day of the four-day tournament, won its fourth and most important tournament championship at the AIAW National Championships in 1981.

After the third round, FSU led by one stroke over the host Lady Bulldogs of Georgia. A stumble on the front nine of the final round saw FSU fall two shots back of Georgia at the turn. That turn, however, proved to be the Lady Seminoles' turn of fortunes as four of the five FSU players

birdied the 17th hole and FSU was on its way to its first national championship. FSU finished the tournament at 1,220, three shots ahead of Georgia at 1,223.

Three Florida State golfers from that team were named to the All-American team during their careers. Lisa Young was FSU's top finisher in the championship in third place. Barb Bunkowsky, who was selected in 1982, did her part on the final day with birdies on the last five holes and came in a tie for 14th. Michele Guilbault, who earlier in the season easily won the prestigious Dick McGuire Invitational, was the other 1981 selection.

This Is Florida State University

Florida State University, expanding on its longstanding reputation in the performing arts, will soon be the professional training ground for one of the state's fastest growing industries—the motion picture and television in-

dustry.

Keeping pace with professional film studios opening in Florida, FSU has embarked on a new project that will eventually train 150 graduate and undergraduate students in film each year. Admitting its first students in fall 1989, the new School of Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts offers a bachelor's degree program in Tallahassee and a master's program in Sarasota.

Florida State is a public, coeducational university with more than 26,000 students enrolled. A senior member of the State University System, FSU was founded in 1851 by a legislative act that provided for two institutions of higher learning, one east and one west of the Suwannee River, and began operating in Tallahassee with its first stu-

dents in 1857.

Today, the main campus is spread over 347 acres in Tallahassee; the University owns a total of 1,167 acres in Leon, Bay and Franklin counties.


The University offers more than 275 graduate and undergraduate degree programs divided among eight colleges—Arts and Sciences, Business, Communication, Education, Engineering, Human Sciences (formerly Home Economics), Law and Social Sciences—and seven schools—Criminology, Library and Informational Studies, Music, Nursing, Social Work, Theatre, and Visual Arts and Dance.

With 1,450 members, the FSU faculty currently includes four members of both the National Academy of Sciences and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and has included four Nobel laureates. It is backed by 2,750 administrative,

professional and support staffers.

Library holdings at Florida State include 1.7 million book titles, 18,000 serials, and 3.1 million microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked via a computerized information system to other state university and national research libraries. Opened in fall 1988, the Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library places scientific library resources close by the university's main science research complex.

On the top floor of the Dirac Library is the Supercomputer Computations Research Institute, a multidisciplinary program that brings together some 50 scientists, engineers and technicians. Electronically linked to an off-campus research com-



plex, SCRI is home to two of the world's fastest and most powerful supercomputers.

Also providing unique research opportunities is the physics department's Tandem Van de Graaff Superconducting Accelerator Laboratory, which houses two powerful atom smashers and is ranked among the top four in the nation by the National Science Foundation.

FSU extends its reach far outside of Florida through international study programs in England, Italy, Switzerland, Yugoslavia, Panama, Costa Rica and the West Indies. Within the state, it spreads south to its marine laboratory on the Gulf of Mexico,

west to its 20-acre campus in Panama City, and south to its professional program at the Asolo State

Theater in Sarasota.

Recent growth during Dr. Bernard F. Sliger's 12-year presidency at FSU includes the student union complex expansion, the building for the joint Florida A&M University/Florida State University College of Engineering, the Village Green project at the College of Law and the new FSU Panama City Campus. Currently under construction is a new student recreation center.

The needs and interests of all its students rate high on the priority list at FSU. Recognized as one of the nation's top universities in minority retention, Florida State was selected by the U.S. Department of Education for a study of successful minor-

ity-retention policies and practices.

The one-of-a-kind, all-collegiate Flying High Circus, the Honors and Scholars program, student government and intramural sports are among more than 200 organizations and activities in which students can participate. Programs such as the FSU Artist Series and Distinguished Lecture Series also serve to broaden the horizons of FSU students.

Florida State bonds the educational and social aspects of campus life, just as it blends Gothic and modern styles of architecture with the oaks, pines, palms, azaleas and dogwood of North Florida and

with the state's thriving capital city.

Florida State remains a growing institution—from its roots as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, through the early 20th century as the academically respected Florida State College for Women, and its coeducational status as a university in 1947, to its modern development as an acclaimed research institution, a top-ranked competitor in athletics and as a standard-setter in the performing arts. In all areas of teaching, research and service, Florida State University continues to build on its national stature.

SEMINOLES TO WATCH
