

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# THIS IS TALLAHASSEE

ear, but far from the glaring strips of neon amusement, and the castles and crowds of Disney, lies another magical place in the Sunshine State — one of powwows, plantations, politics and great pride. Often described as "The Other Florida" with its deep-rooted history, rolling hills, canopy roads of moss-draped oaks, cool climate and Southern-style hospitality; it is a Florida few have seen. It is Tallahassee — Florida with a Southern accent.

Best known as Florida's capital, Tallahassee is an intimate neometropolitan city where the power of state government, the academic and the artistic are complimented by subtle, old-fashioned charm.

Tallahassee — derived from the words "talwa" meaning town and "ahasee" meaning old — has undergone many changes, but one thing remains the same — it is still a government town fiercely proud and dedicated to preserving its heritage.

The famous Gulf beaches and major metropolitan areas of the South are a short trip


from Tallahassee. As Florida's capital city, Tallahassee offers the grace and charm of a small city, while Atlanta, Jacksonville, Tampa, Orlando and New Orleans are within easy driving distance.

The Capitol buildings, both old and new, epitomize Tallahassee's perseverance. With the 22-story New Capitol towering overhead since 1977, the Old Capitol, erected in 1845, has been restored to its 1902 appearance complete with red-and-white candy-striped awnings and a gracious dome adorned with stained glass. The

22nd floor of the New Capitol reveals a spectacular view of the rolling hills of Leon County all the way to the shimmering Gulf of Mexico. Chambers of the House and Senate buzz with political zeal during the March through May legislative session.




The first Christmas mass celebrated in the U.S. was held in Tallahassee.



Standing nine feet tall, Herman, a skeletal prehistoric mastodon — originally weighing about five tons — was pulled from Wakulla Springs in the 1930s. The Museum of Florida History also features the Prehistoric Florida Exhibit, Spanish treasures, war relics and even a riverboat.



Downtown Tallahassee grew as a trade center with Florida's first rail-road — a simple mule-drawn, rail trolley epitomizing the leisurely pace of Southern life — connecting Tallahassee and St. Marks. The 16-mile railroad has now been paved as the St. Mark's Bike Trail, and the Old Trolley remains a stylish way to get around.






Tallahassee enjoys four distinct seasons with an average annual temperature of 67 degrees. Weather conditions are mild and moist due to close proximity to the Gulf. Summer temperatures are subtropical with an average of 83 degrees while Winters average a pleasant 50 degrees.



Red wolves, Florida panthers, alligators and other fascinating wildlife in a 52-acre habitat highlight the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science.



As one of the largest arenas in Florida, the Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center, situated on 22 downtown acres, provides the ideal setting for "star-studded" events. The Civic Center Arena was the site of the 1995 NCAA Basketball Southeast Regional while Jacksonville native Jimmy Buffet makes regular visits to Tallahassee.



create dramatic emerald tunnels of dancing sunlight on Tallahassee's famous Canopy Roads.



Only 13 miles from the Capitol, amid alligators, anhingas and tranquillity is the 2,900acre Wakulla Springs State Park. Visitors can drift lazily aboard a jungle cruise boat on Wakulla Springs while the alligators sun on the shore. Tallahassee's underwater passages have intrigued adventurers from around the world — even National Geographic magazine attempts to uncover the mysteries of the springs.



The Winter Festival and Celebration of Lights, an outdoor celebration of holiday lights, music and the arts with activities including a night alow parade, Jingle Bell Run and Santa's Enchanted Forest has become a popular wintertime event in Tallahassee.



# THIS IS FSU

State University System, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1852 by legislative act and began in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857. Today, FSU's operating budget is \$442 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$95 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the University: the FSU Foundation, which raises millions in private gifts to support academics, the Seminole Boosters and the FSU Alumni Association.



tercollegiate athletics and as a standard-setter in the basic sciences and the performing arts.

Florida State University, nearing its golden anniversary as a co-educational graduate research institution, has joined the nation's elite in both academics and athletics. Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida and building rapidly on the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, the University has emerged over the past 48 years as an institution of national and international esteem.




FSU ranked 20th in the nation for 1990-91 in the number of black Ph.D. students it graduates. Over the five years from 1986 to 1990, FSU ranked eighth nationally by granting doctorates to 70 African-Americans.



The Dr. Bobby E. Leach Center, a state-of-the-art student recreation facility, with an indoor pool, saunas, basketball and racquet-sport courts, was completed in 1991. And in June, a 2300 square foot free weight area was completed.



With 1,568 members, the FSU faculty currently includes five members of the National Academy of Sciences and eight members of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and has included five Nobel laureates. It is backed by 2,987 administrative/professional and support staff.




FSU's high-tech program in structural biology in 1991 received the University's largest single foundation grant, S4 million, to position it among the leaders in the field worldwide.



Vice President Al Gore spoke at the dedication of the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory at FSU in October 1994. The National Science Foundation established the \$100 million magnet lab at Florida State, which is partnered in research with the Los Alamos National Laboratory and the University of Florida, in 1990. A Nobel laureate in physics and a top Russian physicist were among the first scholars drawn to the faculty by the magnet lab. The world's largest magnet — two stories high and capable of generating 45 tesla or 1 million times the Earth's magnetic field — is to be installed in 1995 at the NHMFL, located in the off-campus research complex, Innovation Park.



Florida State University alumnus, Dr. Norman Thaggard ended the longest space flight in U.S. history in July after a historic mission on the Russian space station Mir. Thaggard who received his undergraduate degree in engineering at FSU in 1965 and his masters a year later, is an avid Seminole football fan and brought his cosmonaut counterparts to their first college football game in Tallahassee last year. Thaggard's Florida State pennant could be clearly seen in the space shuttle aboard Mir during press conferences. Thaggard has been on three space missions including the historic six-day flight on the Challenger in 1983 that included Sally Ride.



Library holdings at Florida State include 2.06 million book titles, 18,498 serials and 4.25 million microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked via computerized information systems to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library is located at the heart of the University's science research complex. FSU also maintains extensive music, library science and law libraries, and the Mildred and Claude Pepper Library houses the personal and professional papers of one of Florida's best known political couples.



Florida State ranks first in popularity nationwide among high school seniors, based on the number of students who request their Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) and American College Test (ACT) scores be sent to an institution. FSU was the only institution listed among the top 10 choices of both black and white college-bound students. Florida State is also tops in the state for community college transfers as FSU admits over 3,000 transfer students every fall semester.



In fall 1994, the first tenants moved in to the east side of the \$82 million University Center, a classroom-and-office facility at Doak Campbell Stadium. The stadium's south end zone also was enclosed and the adjacent Moore Athletic Center expanded. When the west side is completed in 1996, the University Center will provide 550,000 square feet of much needed academic space and a centralized location for student services.

# 1996 OUTLOOK

lorida State head coach Ernie Lanford is looking for the 1996 spring season to be a great opportunity for a number of golfers to get some much needed collegiate experience. The team returns only one senior and a bevy of underclassmen. Five freshman, five sophomores, and two juniors round out the roster that will lead the Seminoles into a difficult schedule of tournaments. This young squad will have to follow the best year in Florida State golf history.

"We have a number of young golfers who can play excellent golf," Lanford said. "We just have to put it all together in the spring. Richard Fulford and George McNeill gained a lot of experience last year in the NCAA Championships. They have to step up and have a very good spring for us to contend for the ACC Championship and the NCAA's. With the addition of a number of newcomers and the solid nucleus that returns, we hope to gain a berth in the NCAA's."

With four team championships and a 7th-place finish in the NCAA's, the 1994-95 season was the best ever for the Seminoles. The Tribe stepped to the forefront of collegiate golf, winning four tournaments in the spring, while second-team All-American Christian Raynor claimed three individual titles. Raynor, one of the most prolific golfers in Florida State history, finished in the

top 10, nine times. Raynor, an academic All-American the last two years, led the Tribe in every tournament with the exception of one, the NCAA Championships. Ken Staton, finished tied for 14th in the NCAA's, leading the Seminoles to a very successful NCAA Tournament. With loss of Raynor, Staton and two other lettermen, the 1995-96 Seminole golf team looks to replace them with a wealth of young talent.

"It is hard to replace golfers of that

caliber," Lanford comments. "Raynor is one of the best players I have ever coached. He had all the tools to make him one of the best golfers in the country. Christian was a great leader, a player who led by example on the golf course. Raynor got better with every tournament, because he had a great work ethic.

"Staton had a very good NCAA Tournament. He had the skills to play at that level, but he didn't get much playing time in the spring."

With the loss of four lettermen, the Seminoles will have to rely on the play of sophomore McNeill and junior Fulford. McNeill played in six of 13 tournaments last year, including a 6th-place finish in the Wofford Invitational. A native of N. Fort Myers, McNeill shot a low round of 67 to clinch the team championship for the Seminoles at the Wofford Invitational.

Fulford, a junior from Johannesburg, South Africa, finished his first collegiate year with a 29th-place tie with teammate McNeill at the NCAA's. Fulford came to the Seminoles following a successful career in South Africa as a member of the junior team. Fulford, a preseason honorable mention All-American choice by GolfWeek, played in all 13 tournaments last year.

He was only one of two golfers on the squad to play in every tournament.

McNeill and Fulford both struggled in the fall season. McNeill's top finish was a 12th place finish in the Tennessee Tournament of Champions which led the Seminoles to a tie for 4th place with South Carolina. He finished the year with a stroke average of 74.2.

"George and Richard had mediocre fall seasons," Lanford said. "They, along with the rest of the team, have all the talent in the world but they just have to put all the components together. Both golfers had to bring the mental aspect of the game with their play making ability to be successful."

With the strong nucleus of Fulford and McNeill, Coach Lanford will be looking for a couple of golfers to step up and solidify the top five spots for the Seminoles. Junior transfer Tice Vieira and sophomore Sean Ashby could be the answer for the Tribe. Vieira, who was unable to play in the fall, transferred to Florida State from junior college. He will contend for a top five spot, after an excellent fall season of practice.

"Tice was the best player in practice at the end of the fall season," Lanford said. "He will be eligible for tournament play in the spring and should help the squad immensely."

Ashby, a second year player from Lake Howell, played very well in the fall. Ashby also played in three tournaments last year as a redshirt freshman. A very long hitter, he has the ability to bring the Seminoles to the next level in tournament play.

The lone senior on the team, Don Carpenter, will help bring some much needed experience to the Seminoles. James Baker will step in after sitting out for a year after transferring from Vanderbilt. Freshmen Steve Carrington and Craig Cochran saw tournament action in the fall, while sophomores Jason Pool and Barry Dyche will also vie for top five spots.

The 1996 season will have the Seminoles playing a difficult tournament schedule. The Tribe will play in eight tournaments, including its own Seminole Classic at the Killearn Country Club. The fifth annual event will feature 18 teams from throughout the South and Midwest.


The Atlantic Coast Conference Championships will be held at the Old North State Club in Uwharrie Point, NC. The ACC tournament will showcase some of the best teams in the country.

"The ACC is the best conference top to bottom in the country," Lanford stated. "Year-in and year-out the ACC teams are amongst the top 20 teams in the

country. This tournament will give us an idea of where we stand in the country."

The goal for the spring, like every year for the Seminole golf program, is to make it to the NCAA Championships.

"Our goals are to qualify for the NCAA's and win the ACC Championships for the first time," Lanford said. "We want to stay in the top five in every tournament. If we can stay in the top five, we have the chance to win a tournament at anytime."

# COACHES

### COACH DR. ERNIE LANFORD



ntering his fifth year as head coach at Florida State, Dr. Ernie Lanford's 1995-96 squad will look to maintain the success that the program has achieved over the last three years. Last year saw the Seminoles win four tournaments and place an impressive seventh in the NCAA Championships, which tied the best ever finish in the NCAA's by a Seminole golf team. Arguably one of the best players in Florida State history, Christian Raynor, won three tournaments and placed first in the NCAA East Regional. The loss of Raynor leaves a hole that will have to be

filled by a young and talented Seminole squad. With a nucleus of young players and the program in the right direction, Coach Lanford will look to improve on the most successful season in Florida State history.

Coach Lanford came to Florida State to establish a program that would be a national power year after year. With the ability to recruit excellent student-athletes and mold them into a successful team, Lanford has built a reputation that is second to none in NCAA Division I golf circles.

Lanford arrived in Tallahassee after serving as golf coach at Augusta College from 1982-91. He is credited with putting the Augusta, Ga., school on the "golf map." His teams claimed Big South Conference championships in 1985, '86, '87, '90, and '91. His success was well recognized by his peers, being selected as Big South Conference Golf Coach of the Year in 1985, '86, '87, '90, and '91.

From 1982 until 1991, Dr. Lanford served as head golf

coach, as well as head basketball coach from 1982-85. In addition to coaching, he taught Kinesiology, Exercise Physiology, Anatomy, Recreation, Fitness for Living, Secondary Methods of Physical Education, Curriculum, Organization

and Administration of Athletics, and Foundations of Physical Education at Augusta College.

Prior to his stint at Augusta College, Lanford was at Flagler College in St. Augustine, FL, where he held various positions including; Athletic Director, Physical Education Department Chairman, Assistant Professor, and head Basketball coach. He has also served as a faculty member at State University of New York, Brigham Young University, and Michigan State University.

While in Augusta, Lanford was active in the Augusta area junior golf program and directed over 15 tournaments and clinics a year in cooperation with the area golf courses. He raised funds and recruited volunteers in the Augusta area for these tournaments and oversaw a School Development program specifically for the junior golf program.

Dr. Lanford has continued his involvement in junior golf in Tallahassee. Recently, he spearheaded the establishment of summer camps for junior golfers. He is also heavily involved in the organization of events associated with the Big Bend Junior Golf Association.

Florida State is currently enjoying an ongoing relationship with its former players now on tour due to the efforts of Lanford. He maintains contact with them and has created "Seminole Golf Day" to honor past and present players. "Seminole Golf Day" has become an annual event in which former players, team members, and Florida State alumni gather to celebrate FSU's rich golf tradition.

Lanford began his academic career at Florida State, receiving his bachelor's degree in business. He completed his masters requirements at Michigan State before going on to Brigham Young for his doctorate.

Lanford was a member of the armed services prior to his college education. As a captain in the Army, Lanford was also a paratrooper. Dr. Lanford was honorably discharged after his stint in the armed services.

Lanford lives in Tallahassee with his wife Sandy and son Michael. Sandy helps with the junior program that Lanford started in Tallahassee and will begin some artist work in the spring. Michael, 19, is currently enrolled at Florida State, but plans to transfer to William & Mary or Colgate.

Dr. Lanford brings experience in the field of golf and excellence in education. With the experience Lanford brings in all aspects of collegiate athletics, he demands the same from his student-athletes.

### Seminole Links

The Seminole Links, now in its second year with the Florida State golf program, are a group of Florida State students who assist in the day-to-day operations of the Seminole golf programs. The Seminole Links will also assist with recruiting visits and provide assistance at the men's Seminole Classic and the women's Lady Seminole Invitational.

The Links are led by Jennifer Carman who is a senior at Florida State University. Carman was a member of Seminole Links in its inaugural season and was actively involved in the Seminole Links program. Carman is majoring in English and is planning to attend law school at the conclusion of this year.

### **ASSISTANT COACH SUE URRY**

B oth the men's and women's golf team benefit from the experience and service of assistant coach Sue Urry. Urry, in her second year at Florida State, performs a variety of duties to assist Dr. Ernie Lanford and women's coach Debbie Dillman in the day-to-day operations of the Seminole golf program.

Urry grew up in Peoria, Illinois, where her father first introduced her to the game of golf. Under the influence of Jerry Barber, a player on the senior tour, Urry became more serious with golf in addition to playing volleyball.

Urry's athletic talents attracted attention from college coaches. She headed south to Miami to attend Florida International University on a volleyball scholarship. She played four years for the Golden Panthers, earning All-American honors. After graduating in December 1986 with a degree in Computer Science, Urry stayed at the univer-

sity to complete her eligibility and compete on the golf team her final year.

In addition to performing administrative duties for the Florida State golf teams, Urry assists with FSU's two tournaments, the Lady Seminole Invitational and the Seminole Classic. She also does publicity to help the golfers become more visible in the community.

"I also get to play a lot with the teams when they practice," Urry said. She also occasionally competes in professional tournaments.

In her spare time away from the course, Urry enjoys boating, playing volleyball, and other outdoor sports. She and her husband, Keith, share their home with two yellow labs.



# **ENDOWMENT SCHOLARSHIPS**



# 1994-'95 REVIEW

lorida State University is back on the collegiate golf map! The Seminoles went into the 1994-95 year with a solid returning nucleus, including All-American candidates Ken Staton and Christian Raynor and had the most successful season in Florida State golf history. With four tournament victories and three individual medalist honors, the Seminoles finished amongst the elite teams in the country. In winning the four tournaments, the Seminoles also set a new single season record for tournament victories. The squad was victorious in the Mercedes Benz Collegiate Championship, the Seminole Classic, the Cleveland-Augusta Classic Invitational and the Wofford Invitational in the spring and Raynor claimed individual title in the Cleveland-Augusta Collegiate Invitational, the Wofford Invitational, and the NCAA East Regional.

The Seminole golf program saw the emergence of two young golfers in the spring that should set the stage for the 1995-96 campaign. George McNeill and Richard Fulford had very successful springs in their first year of collegiate play. McNeill's best finish came in the Wofford Invitational, where he finished in 6th place and Fulford finished tied for 7th in the Mercedes Benz Collegiate Championship. Raynor was selected as a Second Team All-American and an Academic All-American. Staton, who had an impressive NCAA Championships, was named as a Honorable Mention All-American. Staton finished tied for 14th with a four-round total of 289 in the NCAA's, paving the way for the Seminoles to finish in 7th place in the team championship. With the best NCAA finish in Florida State history, Coach Lanford and the young Seminoles hope to continue the success of Seminole golf in the 1990's.



This year will mark the third year that the Seminole Classic has taken place, bringing in some of the finest collegiate golfers in America. The tournament will consist of 18





The most prolific golfer in Florida State history is current PGA Tour member Nolan Henke. Henke, who played at Florida State from 1983-87, was a three-All-American time 1985,'86,'87. Henke, in his final year of play for the Seminoles, finished second in the NCAA Championships, 6 strokes behind winner Brian Watts of Oklahoma State. Henke was inducted into the FSU Golf Hall of Fame

at the conclusion of his illustrious career at FSU. Christian Raynor, a graduate of Florida State in 1994, led the Seminoles to their best year ever and a 7th place finish in the NCAA Championships. Raynor, a two-time All-American in 1994 and '95, won three individual medalist honors in the 1994-95 campaign, including a first place finish in the NCAA East Regional. Raynor, during his career at Florida State, was very effective in amateur play. Raynor qualified for match play in the US Amateur of 1994. With that impressive performance, Raynor put his name on the golf map and amongst the elite golfers in the country. Raynor is currently involved in the PGA Tour School and is hoping to qualify for the PGA Tour.

Five Florida State golfers have been All-Americans at least two times. Todd Crandell, Grant Turner, and Roger Winchester have all won the honor twice. Henke is the lone three-time winner of the award. With this rich tradition in All-Americans, Florida State is recognized as one of the elite Division I-A golf programs in the country.



"With strength there is added confidence," Van Halanger said. "Also it will help cut down the threat of injuries and give the players a mental edge."




# NOLES IN THE PROS



final four-day score of the Seminoles was 1191, four strokes behind sixth-place Arkansas.


