

Success. A word synonymous with Florida State golf. With five NCAA Tournament appearances in the 1990's and a seventh place finish following the 1994-95 season, the Seminoles have asserted themselves as one of the most successful golf schools in the nation. Coupled with that NCAA success is ten tournament championships and 35 top five finishes in seven years under Coach Ernie Lanford. These accomplishments during the first 50 years have established Florida State as a national power in men's golf circles. This year's Seminole golf team hopes to continue the trend into the next 50 years at




Florida State.

"I realistically think that we are seven deep with experience," said head coach Ernie Lanford. "The top four guys have played in big tournaments and have experienced success."

The Seminoles return four of the top five golfers from





last year's squad. The only departure for the Seminoles was Tice Vieira, who didn't participate in a tournament last year.

As the Seminoles enter the fall season, the top player will be senior Jason Pool, Pool, a native of Great Falls, VA, is coming off a summer that saw him set the course record of 62 at the Seminole Golf Course. Serving as this year's captain along with Barry Dyche, Pool finished last season with a stroke average of 74.5 and led the Tribe in four of 11 tournaments. Pool is one of three golfers that is entering his fourth year of competition with the Seminoles, providing the Seminoles with leadership and experience.

"Jason had an exceptional summer," said Lanford. "He gained alot of confidence with the course record and the way he finished last spring. He is our captian this year and will look to him for experience and leadership."

Arguably the most experienced player for the Seminoles, George McNeill enters the season as the number two player for the Tribe. McNeill, a three-year veteran for the Seminoles, is the only member of the team to participate in the NCAA Championships twice. A native of N. Fort



ALL-ACC CANDIDATE GEORGE MCNEILL LOOKS FORWARD TO HIS SENIOR SEASON.


Myers, McNeill played in only eight tournaments last year. Forced to sit out the fall due to academic complications, McNeill ended the year with five top 20 finishes, including a tied for 8th performance at the ACC Championships. His stroke average of 73.4 led the team last year.

"If George (McNeill) plays the way that he can, he can be an All-American this year," stated Lanford. "He missed last fall and didn't practice much, but he played well in the spring and will be looked upon for great things this year."


The battle for the three and four positions is between senior Barry Dyche and Nathan Bertsch. Dyche, a three-year letterwinner, enters his last season with the Seminoles. Dyche played in all 11 tournaments for the Seminoles last season, finishing the year with a stroke average of 74.7. Leading the Tribe with a tied for 5th performance at the Killearn Seminole Classic, Dyche recorded three top 20 finishes.

Bertsch was one of three true freshmen to see action last year. A native of Gulf Breeze, FL, Bertsch was the only freshman to play in more than three tournaments, finishing the year with nine appearances. Playing the full spring season and one tournament in the fall, he posted five top 20 finishes. Bertsch's best performance came in the Mercedes Benz Collegiate Championship, finishing tied for 7th with a three-round total of 222, leading the Seminoles to a team championship.

"Nathan was our best player in the spring last season," commented Lanford. "He didn't play well in the fall last year and we didn't expect him to come in and play right away. But down the line, Nathan played well for us."

The fifth and final position is up in the air as the spring season gets underway. The early leader to replace Bradley is freshman Kris Hannah. Hannah, a native of Tallahassee, FL, has impressed Lanford with his work ethic and play in early practices.

Several other candidates are vying for playing time. Craig Cochran, a junior from Rosemont, PA, has played well in early practices. Cochran, a third-year player and cousin of former FSU All-American Bobby Cochran, has played in two tournaments for the Seminoles over the course of his career. Both tournaments came in the 95-96 season, including a 56th place finish at the Country Club of Louisiana Intercollegiate.

"Several players will be vying for the final spot," said Lanford. "Mark Monroe and Kris Hannah have been impressive. Craig Cochran had an excellent summer, but has struggled a little bit in the fall. They will all compete for playing time as the year progresses." Ryan Felty and Kevin Zuelch return for their second season at Florida State. Felty saw action last year, while Zuelch worked on his game in hopes of cracking the line-up. Felty, a native of Selinsgrove, PA, participated in three tournaments last year with his best finish coming in the University of Tennessee Tournament of Championships. Mark Donaldson, a freshman from Scotland, joins the team in January and should put the pressure on for a top five spot.

The schedule is no different this year for the Seminoles. The Seminoles will once again play a tough schedule featuring the ACC Championships and the Seminole Classic. The fall schedule will look much the same as it did last year. The Seminoles once again travel to the Keswick Club Classic, Tennessee Tournament of Champions and the Country Club of Louisiana Intercollegiate. The Seminoles will add the Kroger Intercollegiate, hosted by the University of Memphis, to their fall schedule.

The spring schedule will be highlighted by the Seminole Classic on March 9-10, 1998. This year's Classic will take place at the Golden Eagle Country Club, host to past Nike Tour events. Golden Eagle will

take the place of the Killearn Country Club that hosted the event for the last five years. The ACC Championships will also feature several of the top teams in the country. All nine ACC schools will be represented at the annual event at the Old North State Club in Uwharrie Point. NC.

The Seminoles hope to return to the NCAA East Regional tournament after a one-year hiatus. This year's Regional will be hosted by the University of South Carolina and will take place in Dufauskie, SC. The NCAA Championships will take place at the University of New Mexico Golf Course on May 27-30,1998. The top 30 teams from the three Regional sites will qualify for the Championships in Albuquerque, NM.

With the experience and talent that this team possesses, Florida State will looks to return to the NCAA Tournament field. Reasserting themselves with hard work and dedication in the off season, this Seminole team could be one of the best in 50 years of Florida State golf.



Coach Biographies



DR. ERNIE LANFORD

Entering his seventh year as the Florida State men's golf coach, Dr. Ernie Lanford will look to maintain the success that he has achieved as head of the Seminole golf program in recent years. Bringing the Seminoles to five appearances in the NCAA Championships in the

last six years and 11 tournament victories during his career at Florida State, Coach Lanford has established a winning tradition that will continue for years to come. Taking a golf program that was struggling, Lanford brought such student-athletes in as All-Americans Bobby Cochran and Christian Raynor to rebuild a program into the national power.

Coach Lanford came to Florida State to establish a winning tradition that would remain at the top of college golf year after year. With the ability to recruit excellent student-athletes and mold them into a successful team, Lanford has built a reputation that is second to none in NCAA Division I-A golf.

Lanford arrived in Tallahassee after serving as golf coach at Augusta State from 1982-91. He is credited with putting the Augusta, GA, school on the "golf map." His teams claimed Big South Conference championships in 1985, '86, '87, '90, and '91. His success was well recognized by his peers, being selected as Big South Conference Golf Coach of the Year in 1985, '86, '87, '90, and '91.

From 1982 until 1991, Dr. Lanford served as head golf coach, as well as head basketball coach from 1982-85. In addition to coaching, he taught Kinesiology, Exercise Physiology, Anatomy, Recreation, Fitness for Living, Secondary Methods of Physical Education, Curriculum, Organization and Administration of Athletics, and Foundations of Physical Education at Augusta College.

Prior to his stint at Augusta State, Lanford was at Flagler College in St. Augustine, FL, where he held various positions including; Athletic Director, Physical

Education Department Chairman, Assistant Professor, and head Basketball coach. He has also served as a faculty member at State University of New York, Brigham Young University, and Michigan State University.

While in Augusta, Lanford was active in the Augusta area junior golf program and directed over 15 tournaments and clinics a year in cooperation with the area golf courses. He raised funds and recruited volunteers in the Augusta area for these tournaments and oversaw a School Development program specifically for the junior golf program.

Dr. Lanford has continued his involvement in junior golf in Tallahassee. Recently, he spearheaded the establishment of summer camps for junior golfers. Also, he is heavily involved in the organization of events associated with the Big Bend Junior Golf Association.

Florida State is currently enjoying an ongoing relationship with its former players now on tour due to the efforts of Lanford. He maintains contact with them and has created "Seminole Golf Day" to honor past and present players. "Seminole Golf Day" has become an annual event in which former players, team members, and Florida State alumni gather to celebrate FSU's rich golf tradition.

Lanford began his academic career at Florida State, receiving his bachelor's degree in business. He completed his masters requirements at Michigan State before going on to Brigham Young for his doctorate.

Lanford was a member of the armed services prior to his college education. As a captain of the Army, Lanford was a paratrooper. Dr. Lanford was honorably discharged after his stint in the armed services.

Lanford lives in Tallahassee with his wife Sandy and son Michael. Sandy helps with the junior program that Lanford started in Tallahassee. Michael, 21, is currently a senior at Colgate University, majoring in music and literary studies.

Dr. Lanford brings experience in the field of golf and excellence in education. With the experience Lanford brings in all aspects of collegiate athletics, he demands the same from his student-athletes.

ASSISTANT COACH SUE URRY

Both the men's and women's golf team benefit from the experience and service of assistant coach Sue Urry. Urry, in her fourth year at Florida State, performs a variety of duties to assist men's coach Dr. Ernie Lanford and women's coach Debbie Dillman in the day-to-day operations of the Seminole golf program.

Urry grew up in Peoria, Illinois, where her father first introduced her to the game of golf. Under the influence of Jerry Barber, a player on the senior tour, Urry became more serious with golf in addition to playing volleyball.

Urry's athletic talents attracted attention from college coaches. She headed south to Miami to attend Florida International University on a volleyball scholarship. She played four years for the Golden Panthers, earning All-American honors. After graduating in December 1986 with a degree in Computer Science, Urry stayed at the university to complete her eligibility and compete on the golf team her final year.

In addition to performing administrative duties for the Florida State golf teams, Urry assists with FSU's two tournaments, the Lady

Seminole Invitational and the Seminole Classic. She also does publicity to help the golfers become more visible in the community.

"I also get to play a lot with the teams when they practice," Urry said. She also occasionally competes in professional tournaments.

In her spare time away from the course, Urry enjoys boating, playing volleyball, and other outdoor sports. She and her husband, Keith, share their home with two yellow labs.







Duke University. The Keswick Classic was an opportunity for Lanford to experiment with his line-up and get an indication of the young talent that this team possessed. Freshman Ryan Felty played in his first collegiate tournament, finishing tied for 66th after a final-round 76. The Tribe finished in 10th place out of 14 teams, one stroke behind the University of Ala-

NCAA Championships, the Seminoles were poised to tackle a schedule that featured many of the top teams in the country. Although the Seminoles returned three golfers that played a majority of the rounds last year, Coach Ernie Lanford was forced to replace All-ACC performer Richard Fulford and deal with the loss of George McNeill for the fall season.

With only one senior on the squad and a host of underclassmen, Lanford relied upon young, experienced talent as they entered tournament play. Jason Pool and Barry Dyche participated in the NCAA Championships the previous year and were determined to repeat the same such performance entering the fall season. Pool and Dyche have been a mark of consistency for the Florida State program, contributing in a combined 30 tournaments prior to the 1996-97 season.

Several freshmen were worthy of the challenge, as three true freshmen saw action. The key contributor from the freshman class was Gulf Breeze, FL native Nathan Bertsch. Bertsch played in nine tournaments, including all eight in the spring. With five top 20 finishes and a stroke average of 74.0, Bertsch established

himself as a top 5 player of the future for the Seminoles. Fellow freshmen Ryan Felty and Mat-

thew Raitz also saw tournament action in the fall.

The Seminoles opened the season with the Keswick Club Classic in Charlottesville, VA. Junior Jason Pool, a native of Great Falls, VA, returned home with an impressive showing. Pool finished the tournament in fifth place with a three-round total of 214, ten strokes behind winner Jason Buha of As the season entered October, the Seminoles traveled to Tennessee for the Tournament of Champions. Held at the prestigious Holston Hills Country Club in Knoxville, TN, the Tribe finished in 13th place out of 15 teams. Another new golfer was added to the top 5 as Mark Stillwell qualified for his first tournament of his collegiate career. Stillwell finished the tournament with a two-day total of 229 and a tied for 66th performance.


In the third and final tournament of the fall, the Seminoles participated in the difficult Country Club of Louisiana Intercollegiate. The tournament featured eight district teams and perennial powerhouses Houston and Oklahoma. The Tribe used a tied for 14th place finish from Barry Dyche to finish ninth. Dyche shot a low-round of 68 in the first round to finish with a total of 218. The final tournament of the fall also mark the first tournament of the year for Bertsch. Bertsch finished tied for 19th with a three-round total of 220.

The fall season ended with some question marks. The Seminoles were fortunate to get McNeill back in the spring, but were still in search of a number five player. The Seminoles and Coach Lanford solved that problem as the spring season began. Bertsch established himself as a top 5 player with a solid off-season of conditioning and practice.

The Tribe started the spring season with a trip to instate rival Florida for the Gator Invitational. Played at the University of Florida Golf Course, the Seminoles fired a second-round team total of 282 to pace them to an eighth place finish. Jason Pool posted two subpar rounds, finishing tied for 11th, while McNeill returned to the Seminole line-up with a top 20 finish. A native of N. Fort Myers, McNeill placed tied for 20th with four other golfers. Robert Floyd captured the medalist honors, one stroke ahead of Mark Northey of Georgia and Jake Kransteuber of South Carolina.

After a week off, the Mercedes-Benz Collegiate Cham-

pionship was an opportunity for the Seminoles to return to their winning ways. They did just that, capturing their lone team championship of the year, beating Mississippi State University by seven strokes. Three Seminole golfers finished tied for 7th place with totals of 222. Jason Pool and Nathan Bertsch finished three strokes out of the lead, while McNeill finished tied for 18th.

With the first victory of the year under their belts, the Tribe participated in the inaugural Bridges All-American at the newly-built Bridges Country Club. On a course designed by Arnold Palmer, the Seminoles finished in fifth, eight strokes behind the University of Minnesota.

The Seminoles enjoyed a break from classes by hosting the Killearn/Seminole Classic at the Killearn Country Club. A field of 18 teams traveled to Tallahassee for the sixth annual event. Six of eight teams from the ACC were represented, as well as teams from across the southeast and midwest. The Seminoles rebounded after a slow start to finish tied for sixth with Louisiana State University. The team total of 890 was

one stroke behind South Carolina and 17 strokes behind winner North Florida. Dyche recorded his best finish of the season, finishing tied for 5th with Martin duToit of Southeastern Louisiana University.

After a fifth place finish at the Alabama Spring Invitational, the Seminoles traveled to Augusta, GA for the Cleveland Classic. The Seminoles finished in ninth place with a team score of 887, one stroke behind Florida Southern College. Nathan Bertsch led the team, finishing tied for 16th with three other golfers.

With the subtraction of a fall tournament, the Seminoles had the opportunity to play in the Billy Hitchcock Intercollegiate in Auburn, AL. The Seminoles finished in eigth place withat three-round total of 885.

The last tournament of the year for the Tribe was the ACC Championships. This year's tournament was part of the ACC Spring Weekend and was held in Atlanta, GA at the Whitewater Country Club. The Seminoles finished the season with a fifth place finish, 14 strokes behind fourth-place Virginia. McNeill finished tied for 8th, while Dyche used a final-round 71 to finish in 11th place.

Although the Seminoles failed to make the postseason, several positive things were accomplished over the course of the year. The Seminoles captured the team title at the Mercedes-Benz Collegiate Championship. McNeill returned to tournament play in the spring, leading the team with a stroke average of 73.4 in 24 rounds of play. McNeill also led the team with six top 20 finishes in eight tournaments, including the 8th place finish at ACC's.

The emergence of the freshmen was also a positive for Coach Lanford and the Seminoles. Bertsch, along with Felty, added much needed depth to the squad. Craig Cochran also showed signs of life, competing for tournaments throughout the year.

With the tournament victory in Jacksonville and the addition of young, talented freshmen this season, a blueprint has been set for the future. The Seminoles will use the experience from this season to return to the NCAA Championships in future seasons.

This Is Tallahassee

Near, but far from the glaring strips of neon amusement, and the castles and crowds of Disney, lies another magical place in the Sunshine State — one of pow-wows, plantations, politics and great pride. Often described as "The Other Florida" with its deeprooted history, rolling hills, canopy roads of mossdraped oaks, cool climate and Southern-style hospitality; it is a Florida few have seen. It is Tallahassee — Florida with a Southern accent.

Best known as Florida's capital, Tallahassee is an intimate neo-metropolitan city where the power of state government, the academic and the artistic are complemented by subtle, old-fashioned charm. It is the perfect two- or three-day diversion for the more than 41 million annual visitors to Florida and 13 million residents.

Tallahassee touts a menagerie of sights including one of the world's deepest freshwater springs, site of America's first Christmas, a wildlife habitat, Capitol buildings, fascinating museums of history, sprawling

plantations, highly acclaimed fishing and hunting adventures and nearby beaches. Spirited area festivals range from celebrations of Tallahassee's spectacular spring and swamp stomps to genuine rattlesnake roundups and seafood festivals.

With the Gulf of Mexico just 20 miles south and the Georgia border only 14 miles north, Tallahassee rests between the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and the juncture of Florida's panhandle and peninsula. Nearer in miles to Atlanta than to Miami, Tallahassee

more closely resembles its Southern neighbors than Florida in topography, climate and lifestyle.


Accentuating Tallahassee's Southern persona are lush rolling hills, likened to the seven hills of Rome, and five "official" canopy roads of patriarch oaks. The fertile, rich soil and four distinct, yet pleasant, seasons breed floral brilliance and natural vitality year-round.

Like the city itself, the story of how Tallahassee was chosen as the state capital is rich in history. In 1823,

two explorers set out — one on horseback from St. Augustine and the other by boat from Pensacola — to find a permanent, central location for the Legislature to convene. The two met at a beautiful site that the Creek and Seminole Indians called "tallahassee" — derived from the words "talwa" meaning town and "ahasee" meaning old. The rendezvous point remains Florida's capital.

The "old town" has undergone many changes, but one thing remains the same — it is still a government town fiercely proud and dedicated to preserving its heritage. The Capitol buildings, both old and new, epitomize Tallahassee's perseverance.

The 22nd floor of the New Capitol provides a panoramic scope of a sophisticated Southern city awash in a sea of flowering azaleas, snowy dogwoods, towering pines, fragrant magnolias, and hundreds of shimmering lakes, springs, swamps, rivers and sink holes. Special legislative viewing galleries are open during the legislative session.



Below, in the shade of giant live oaks, proudly stands the Old Capitol, originally constructed in 1845 and restored to its 1902 splendor complete with red-and-white candy-striped awnings, a dome adorned with stained glass, antique furnishings and political memorabilia.

Across from the Old Capitol are the 40-foot twin granite towers of the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial, and the blue stone Union Bank, Florida's oldest surviving financial institution. The nostalgic Old Town Trolley, a

replica turn-of-the-century street car, carries passengers through restored Adams Street Commons to numerous other historical downtown shops for *free*—unheard of even 100 years ago.

jungle cruise boats whisk visitors within arm's length of "The Other Florida."

Minutes from downtown lies the Governor's Mansion, which resembles the home of Florida's military hero Andrew Jackson; and the 52-acre natural animal habitat and 1880s farm of the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science, which provide the rare chance to walk and talk with native Florida animals.

Tallahassee remains firmly linked with the past as evidenced by the unearthed 1539 winter encampment of Spanish Hernando de Soto, the site of the first Christmas celebration America. Visitors travel back through time as they stand in the shadow of a giant 12,000year-old American Mastodon at the Museum of Florida History or explore other historical spots including The Knott House that Rhymes, The Columns, San Luis Mission, Lake Jackson State Archaeological Site, Natural Bridge Battlefield, First Presbyterian Church, Brokaw-McDougall House, Goodwood Plantation and Adams Street Commons.

Nearby, alligators lazing in the sunshine and anhinga "snake birds" perched on twisted cypress branches are seen at Wakulla Springs, one of the world's deepest freshwater springs and site of many underwater scenes in the "Tarzan" movies with Johnny Weissmuller and Maureen O'Sullivan. Safaris aboard glass-bottomed and











Outdoor enthusiasts enjoy adventures including boating and fishing on area lakes, rivers, ponds and the Gulf — just 30 minutes away. Lakes Seminole, Jackson and Talquin are renowned in the bass fishing world for yielding the "big ones," and dense forests offer an abundance of prize-winning game. Local wildlife areas such as the Florida National Scenic Trail, St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge and Apalachicola National Forest are among many spots for camping, picnicking, swimming, biking and exploring.

Appealing to the strokes of different folks, Tallahassee also features 99 holes of golf on six courses and a proliferation of tennis centers. Sideline athletes cheer the nationally-ranked Florida State Seminoles, Florida A&M Rattlers and the Tallahassee Tiger Sharks, of the East Coast Hockey League. And always a sure bet are the nearby greyhound races.

A sport of sorts, shopping at two regional malls and many specialty centers offer many "playing options" — from popular chains to curiosity and antique shops.

Cultural interests are sparked by widely-acclaimed museums and galleries and elaborate entertainment at the 14,000-seat Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center.

Tallahassee is a collaboration of power-play politics and classical character splashed with a twist of Southern beauty and charm. Tallahassee is Florida with a Southern accent.

This Is Florida State


Florida State University, celebrating its golden anniversary as a coeducational graduate research institution in 1997, has joined the nation's elite in both academics and athletics.

Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida and building rapidly on the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, the University has emerged over the past 50 years as an institution of national and international esteem. Its stature is evidenced by a number of additions to its record of excellence in the 1990s:

- In 1994, Florida State was classified a "Research University I" by the Carnegie Foundation, placing it among the nation's top research universities.
- In 1994, the college referral service, "Who's Who Among American High School Students," placed FSU among its top 10 — with such universities as Harvard, Duke, Stanford, North Carolina-Chapel Hill, Michigan-Ann Arbor and Yale
 — of most frequent choices of more than 100,000 of the nation's best and brightest high school students who asked that a specific college be notified of their recognition in "Who's Who."
- · Vice President of the United States Al Gore spoke at the dedication of the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory at Florida State in 1994. The National Science Foundation established the \$100 million magnet labin 1990 at FSU, which is partnered in research with the Los Alamos National Laboratory and the University of Florida. A Nobel laureate in physics and a top Russian physicist were among the first scholars drawn to the faculty. The world's largest magnet — two stories high and capable of generating 45 tesla or 1 million times the Earth's magnetic field — was installed in 1995 at the NHMFL, located in the offcampus research complex, Innovation Park. In 1996, the NSF renewed and increased by 50 percent the NHMFL's funding for another five years.
- FSU created the first multipurpose student identification/banking card. The Card Application Technology Center is a national leader in "smart card" systems.
- In fall 1994, the first tenants moved into the east side of the \$100 million University Center, a classroom-and-office facility at Doak Campbell Stadium; the stadium's south end zone also was enclosed and the adjacent Moore Athletic Center expanded. With the completion of the west side in

1996, University Center now provides 550,000 square feet of much needed academic space and a centralized location for student services.

- In 1990, Florida State **ranked second in popularity nationwide** among high school seniors, based on the number of students who request that their Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores be sent to an institution. FSU was the only institution listed among the top 10 choices of both black and white college-bound students.
- Capping more than a decade of national prominence in intercollegiate athletics, Florida State's athletic teams, nicknamed "Seminoles," joined the Atlantic Coast Conference as its ninth member in 1990. The FSU football team won the 1993 National Championship and its quarterback, Charlie Ward, won the University's first Heisman Trophy.
- The Dr. Bobby E. Leach Center, a state-of-the-art student recreation facility, with a pool, saunas, basketball



and racquet-sport courts, was completed in 1991.

• FSU ranked 20th in the nation for 1990-91 in the number of black Ph.D.students it graduates. Over the five years, 1986 to 1990, FSU ranked eighth nationally by granting doctorates to 70 African-Americans.

As this list of highlights attests, Florida State is excelling in the 1990s with exceptional strength, energy and vision for the future. Under the leadership of the University's 12th president, **Talbot "Sandy" D'Alemberte**, who took office in January 1994, FSU will continue to build on the foundation of its history of excellence in scholarship, research and service.

A senior member of the 10-member **State University System**, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act and began in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

Today, FSU's operating budget is \$474.3 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$102 million annually in external funding to supplement statesponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the University: FSU Foundation, which raises millions in private gifts to support academics, Seminole Boosters and FSU Alumni Association.

The main campus is spread over **451.6** acres in Tallahassee; FSU, which has one of the smallest campuses in the SUS, has been actively acquiring land in the 1990s after years of being landlocked at 347 acres. FSU owns 1,281 acres in Leon, Bay, Franklin and Sarasota counties.

Within the state, the University maintains facilities at its 25-acre campus in Panama City, its Marine Laboratory on the Gulf of Mexico, the Appleton Museum in Ocala and the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Augustus B. Turnbull III Florida State Conference Center on the edge of the campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

Florida State offers **286 graduate and undergraduate degree programs** through its **eight colleges** — Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineer-











ing (operated jointly with Florida A&M University, a historically black institution); Human Sciences; Law; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the Reubin Askew School of Public Administration and Policy) — and eight schools — Criminology and Criminal Justice; Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

With 1,655 members, the FSU faculty has included nine National Academy of Sciences elected members, nine American Academy of Arts and Sciences fellows and five Nobel laureates. It is backed by 2,887 administrative/professional and support staff.

Library holdings at Florida State include 2.1 million book titles, 16,384 serials and 4.5 million microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked by computer to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library is located at the heart of the University's science research complex. FSU also maintains extensive music, library science and law libraries.

Graduate students, who number more than 5,929, pursue advanced degrees in fields as diverse as business administration and theoretical particle physics. A majority of research done at FSU is the direct result of student effort, culminating in numerous books, monographs and journal articles relating to the whole spectrum of intellectual interests and

the practical needs of society.

FSU, a residential campus, places a high priority on its **30,264 students** and their needs and interests (of the student population: 45 percent are male; 55 percent are female; 20.1 percent are minorities; and 2.5 percent are foreign students). The **University Honors Program**, **Disabled Student Services**, **International Student Center**, **Student Government**, **Flying High Circus** and intramural sports are among more than 200 organizations and activities in which students may participate.

In all areas of its mission — excellence in teaching, research and public service — **Florida State University** is advancing boldly toward the 21st century.

NCAA Information

The following information is provided by the Florida State Office of Compliance for prospective student athletes. It is intended as a guideline to introduce some of the rules governing NCAA athletic involvement.

WHO IS ALLOWED TO RECRUIT FOR FSU?

Only Florida State University coaches who have successfully completed the NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination on an annual basis may be involved in the recruitment process. Representatives of our athletics interests may not make any recruiting contacts. This includes letters, telephone calls or face-to-face contact on or off campus with a prospect or the prospect's parents.

KFY TERMS YOU SHOULD KNOW

You become a **prospective student-athlete** if you have started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, you become a prospective student-athlete if the college provides you (or your relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide to prospective students generally.

A **contact** is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's legal guardian and an institutional staff member or athletic representative during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of greeting. NOTE: At the Division I level, athletic representatives (boosters) may not contact you for the purpose of recruiting. A college coach may contact you in person off the college campus beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year in high school.

An **evaluation** is any off-campus activity designed to access your academic qualifications or athletic ability, including any visit to your high school (during which no contact occurs) or the observation of any practice or competition in which you participate.

During your senior year, you can have one expense-paid **official visit** to a particular campus. You may receive no more than five visits. During your official visit, which may not exceed 48 hours, you may receive round-trip transportation between your home and the campus, and you (and your parents) may receive meals, lodging and complimentary admission to campus athletics events.

PHONE CALLS AND LETTERS

Phone calls from faculty members and coaches (but not boosters) are permitted beginning July 1 (August 15 for football) after completion of your junior year. A college coach or faculty member is limited to **one telephone call per week** except when it is:

- · During the five days immediately before your official visit to the university
- On the day of a coach's off-campus contact with you
- During the time beginning with the initial National Letter of Intent signing date in your sport through the two days after signing date
- In the sport of football only, during the permissible off-campus contact periods and during the 48 hours prior to and 48 hours after 8:00 a.m. on the initial signing date for the National Letter of Intent.
- Letters from coaches and faculty members (but not boosters) are not permitted until September 1 at the beginning of your junior year in high school. A Division I university may provide you with the following printed materials:
- General correspondence, including letters, U.S. Postal Service postcards and institutional note cards

- Game programs which may not include posters and one Student Athlete Handbook can be provided only during official or unofficial visits to the university's campus
- · NCAA educational information
- Pre-enrollment information subsequent to signing a National Letter of Intent with the university
- One athletic publication which may include only one color of printing inside the covers
- Official academic, admissions and student services publications published or videotapes produced by the institution and available to all students
- · Schedule cards
- Questionnaires which may be provided prior to your junior year
- Summer camp brochures which may be provided prior to your junior year.

ALUMNI AND BOOSTERS DO'S AND DON'TS

You may forward information about prospective student-athletes to the appropriate coaches.

You may have contact with a prospect regarding permissible pre-enrollment activities such as summer employment, provided the prospect has already signed a National Letter of Intent and the Compliance Office is aware that you are making these contacts in regard to employment.

You may have a telephone conversation with a prospect only if the prospect initiates the call. Such a call may not be prearranged by an institutional staff member and you are not permitted to have a recruiting conversation, but may exhibit normal civility. You must refer any questions about our athletics programs to an athletics department staff member/coach.

You may view a prospect's contest at your own initiative provided you do not contact the prospect or his/her parents. In addition, you may not contact a prospect's coach, principal, or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.

You may continue established family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with sons and daughters of these families are permitted as long as they are not made for recruiting purposes or encouraged by Florida State University coaches.

You may not become involved in making arrangements to receive money or financial aid of any kind for a prospect or the prospect's family and friends.

You may not make contact with a prospective studentathlete and his/her parents when the prospect is on campus for an official or unofficial recruiting visit.

You may not transport, pay or arrange for payment of transportation costs for a prospect, and his/her relatives or friends to visit campus (or elsewhere).

You may not pay or arrange for payment of summer camp registration fees for a prospect.

You may not provide **anything** to a prospect, the prospect's family or friends without prior approval from the athletics' Compliance Office.

NEW OPPORTUNITIES FOR LEADER-SHIP, EDUCATION AND SERVICE

Developed by the Florida State University Department of Athletics, the NOLES program represents a commitment to the total growth and development of the student-athlete. This program establishes an administrative commitment to academic and athletic excellence. Those efforts will be supported with programs and services in personal development, career development and community service.

PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

Fostering the development of personal growth is a fundamental component of the NOLES program. These support programs ensure that the studentathlete will be provided opportunities to focus on personal growth issues such as values clarification, goal setting, fiscal planning, decision making and personal responsibility. Programming focuses on helping student-athletes develop a healthy lifestyle while they are at Florida State and habits that will benefit them for life.

CAREER DEVELOPMENT

Preparing for life after college sports is a major focus of the NOLES Career Development program. The program is designed to work cooperatively with the University's Career Services to acquaint students with the job search process, provide networking opportunities and ultimately assist with job placement. This program places a priority on the development of the total person, with the goal of developing individuals who will have rewarding careers and productive lifestyles after they leave Florida State.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

Serving the community is the focus of our Seminole Spirit program. Student-athletes are challenged to give service to our community and individuals who are in need. With a clearly defined program of service, student-athletes are given the opportunity to develop the foundation for a lifelong commitment to volunteerism. The Seminole Spirit Student-Athlete Speakers' Bureau enables student-athletes to improve their speaking skills, develop effective communication and impact the lives of others through their service as role models in our community.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

The Florida State University Department of Athletics is committed to developing programs of excellence that foster leadership development. The foundation of the leadership development program will be the two councils that represent the student-athletes at the University.

The Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) serves as the advisory board to the NOLES program and the

athletics administration. The prestigious board, comprised of two representatives of each athletic team at FSU, also recommends programming and serves as a liaison between student-athletes and the athletics administration. The Advisory Council plans and implements various events for student-athletes and serves as the department's most visible ambassadors. The SAAC planned and hosted the annual Golden Nole banquet for the first time last year and recently planned such events as orientation for incoming student-athletes and the back to school picnic.



The golf course measures 7,033 yards from the championship tees and is considered an excellent test of golf. The greens, **TIFTON 328 (bermuda)** are of medium size, approximately 6,200 square feet each. The course rating is 72.0.

The course and practice facilities are considered to be among the best in the country. The Seminole Golf Course is now run and operated by Club Consultation and Management, a private golf course management firm. There have been many improve-

ments made and within the next five years should prove to be one of the finest courses in the area.

The Seminole golf team has the luxury to play at many other courses in the Tallahassee area. This year the Golden Eagle Country Club will be hosting the Seminole Classic while last year's tournament was held at the Killearn Country Club. The majority of Seminole practices take place at the Golden Eagle Country Club. The team also practices at the Capital City Country Club.

ENDOWMENT SCHOLARSHIPS

There are two former FSU golfers who have endowed scholarships for the Seminole golf team, Dr. Don Veller and PGA famer Hubert Green. Both endowments came from the two men in 1992 and they both cited their confidence in Dr. Ernie Lanford as one of the reasons for the endowment.

The Florida State golf program is also blessed to have three additional scholarships. David Middleton, Galin Kilborn and Tom Woodruff have made contributions to the golf program for the 1997-98 season. Pat O'Leary and Mark Gavalas are recognized as friends of the program for their support of Seminole golf.

"I knew Ernie when I was at Florida State," said Green. "I was glad that he was hired. He's got a good background and he's a good person."

Dr. Veller has the same feelings about the sixth-year coach for the Seminoles. Veller said, "I think it's (golf program) very upbeat and I think the future is going to be really successful. Lanford is very nice. He's business-like and he works hard and has the know-how, and that's a pretty good combination."

The Endowment scholarships make it possible for students to ensure the future of Seminole golf. Thanks to all FSU golf supporters for their tremendous contributions to the program.

Academic Support

Academic, personal and professional support are essential to college success. At Florida State University, we have developed an outstanding support program which enables student-athletes to reach their full potential.

FSU's academic support philosophy is "to offer an academic support program integrated with the total university that will assess all student-athletes with the transition into college and provide continued support in all phases of academic and professional development culminating with graduation, job placement or graduate school."



ACADEMIC SUPPORT STAFF

To accomplish this goal we have developed an academic environment which facilitates the academic success of student-athletes. Student success is encouraged through competent academic counseling, career exploration, planning and placement and academic assistance through tutorial programs.

Our program operates on a "proactive" rather "reactive" approach. At Florida State, our academic staff does not wait for an academic crisis to occur. We gather important background information and build an academic profile on all student-athletes to assess their needs in advance. We also stay informed on the daily progress of each student athlete.

The academic programs have moved to the state-ofthe-art University Center and is located on the sixth floor of the \$126 million facility. It includes private study carrels, a tutorial study area and a computer lab outfitted with 16 new IBM computers and laser printers. In addition, athletic sky boxes are utilized for group and individual tutorial instruction.


The Florida State golf program has been blessed to have excellent student-athletes in recent years. The Seminoles have had four Academic All-Americans in

the last 10 years. Steve Greek received the prestigious honor as a member of the golf team in 1986. Roger Winchester and Christian Williams also received the honor in 1989 and '90 respectively.

Christian Raynor is the lone two-time winner of the award, receiving the award in '94 and '95. Raynor maintained a very high GPA while performing exceptionally on the golf course. 





A Closer Look at the ACC

The Atlantic Coast Conference has a rich tradition in men's golf with the first conference championship dating back to 1954. Duke defeated Wake Forest and North Carolina by 10 strokes to take home the first championship trophy.

Wake Forest has won the most ACC titles, claiming 18. The Demon Deacons are followed by North Carolina with ten titles, Duke with five and Georgia Tech with five.

The 1997 ACC Tournament was held in Fayetteville, GA. participating in the ACC Spring Weekend. Clemson University claimed their fifth team title, beating defending champion North Carolina by ten strokes. Wake Forest University finished in third, 14 strokes off the lead. Charles Warren of Clemson claimed the individual medalist honors, beating Rookie of the Year Matt Kuchar of Georgia Tech by four shots.

The Atlantic Coast Conference was privileged to have five teams in the NCAA Championships last year. Wake Forest was the top finisher, placing second followed by a third-place finish by Clemson. North Carolina was the only other team to make the cut, posting a 10th place finish. Clemson's Warren was also crowned NCAA Champion after carding a four-round total of 279.

ACC institutions have also had a rich tradition of top finishes in NCAA play. Wake Forest has claimed three national titles and nine players from ACC schools have been NCAA Individual Champions.

This year the ACC Championships will return to the Old North State Club in Uwharrie Point, NC on April 17-19, 1998.

"THE STRONG SHALL SURVIVE."

It's the motto of Florida State strength and conditioning coach Dave Van Halanger and his staff in the FSU weight room. It's also the philosophy that has made Seminole athletes in all sports among the strongest, fastest, fittest and most flexible anywhere.

The Seminole weight room is a state-of-the-art facility that covers 7,200 square feet and is conveniently located in the Moore Athletic Center. The gym is a carpeted and mirrored room which includes exercise systems by Cybex Eagle as well as free weight equipment. A variety of exercise bicycles, rowing machines and Stairmasters incorporate both strength and conditioning and cardiovascular endurance.

The words of encouragement and guidance come from FSU Strength Coach Dave Van Halanger and his staff, who take a personal interest in each and every Seminole student-athlete. Van Halanger has specially designed a weight program for the men's golf team which works on their legs, backs, stomachs, wrists, and forearms. Van Halanger's well thought out plan helps players in all aspects of their game.

"With strength there is added confidence," Van Halanger said. "Also it will help cut down the threat of injuries and give the players a mental edge."


MEDICAL CARE AND TREATMENT

An athlete can expect to receive the best care and treatment possible with the athlectic traning team at Florida State University. Prior to competiton, all FSU student-athletes undergo screening in order to detect any potential injuries. If a problem is detected, the athlete may be placed o

n a prevention care system which may include any kind of treatment from icing to exercising.

Through the prevention of injuries is the main objective, some injuries are unavoidable. Rehabilitation is another component of the Florida State training room. The FSU athletic training staff will work with the athlete and provide an intense rehabilitation schedule that will allow the athlete to successfully rehibilitate after an injury. Some injuries and illnesses may be referred to the Seminole team physicans at the Tallahassee Orthopedic Center, who, for many years, have worked in conjuction with the FSU athletic training staff in successfully rehabilitating athletes after an injury.

Drug testing is also a responsibility of the athletic training team which is dedicated to providing the best care possible for all FSU student-athletes.



NCAA Championships

The Florida State Seminoles, under the coaching of Dr. Ernie Lanford, have been well represented at the NCAA Championships in recent years. The Tribe has placed in the top 20 two of the last four years and the team has qualified for the NCAA Championships four of the last five years and Seminole individuals have qualified the last five of the six years .

Last season, the Florida State Seminoles failed to qualify for postseason play. It was the first time in three years that the Seminoles didn't participate in the NCAA Regional and Champiohship play.


In their last appearance in 1996, the Florida State Seminoles struggled to a 27th place finish in the NCAA Championships at the Honors Course in Chattanooga, TN. Coming off the best finish ever in Regional competition, the Tribe was looking to improve on the seventh place finish the year before. Junior Richard Fulford led the Seminoles, finishing the tournament tied for 47th with a two-round total of 152. Sophomore George McNeill ended the tournament with a tied for 70th place effort. Steve Carrington, Jason Pool,

and Barry Dyche all participated in the 99th Annual event.

The 1995 NCAA Championships tied the best finish ever for a Seminole golf team. Florida State finished seventh in the NCAA Championships held at the Ohio State Scarlet Course in Columbus, OH. The team total of 1168 was two strokes behind sixth-place California. The Seminoles were led by All-American Honorable Mention Ken Staton, who finished tied for 14th with a four round total of 289. George McNeill and Richard Fulford finished tied for 29th with four-round totals of 293. Second-team All-American Christian Raynor finished tied for 35th, while Dennis Tymosko finished 78th.

The Seminole golf team also finished 7th in the 1987 Championships, also held at the Ohio State Scarlet Course. That year, the Seminoles were led by three-time All-American Nolan Henke, who finished tied for second. Henke finished six strokes behind the winner, Brian Watts of Oklahoma State. The final four-day score of the Seminoles was 1191, four strokes behind sixth-place Arkansas.

The 1998 NCAA Championships will be held at the University of New Mexico Championship Golf Course in Albuquerque, NM. The tournament, hosted by the University of New Mexico, will take place on May 27th through the 30th.

The Seminole Classic

When Coach Ernie Lanford came to Florida State six years ago, one of his top priorities was to host a tournament in Tallahassee. This year will mark the sixth year that the Seminole Classic has taken place, bringing in some of the finest collegiate golfers in America. The tournament will consist of 15 teams from all over the United States.

In last year's 18-team tournament, University of North Florida Ospreys claimed the team title, finishing one stroke ahead of second-place Virginia and North Carolina and nine strokes ahead of fourth-place Wake Forest.

Individual champion Lewis Chitengwa of Virginia beat Tim Clark of North Carolina State on the first playoff hole. Both golfers fired three-round totals of 213, one stroke better than Garrett Morrison of North Florida. Barry Dyche was the highest finisher for the Seminoles, placing tied for 5th with Martin DuToit of Southeastern Louisiana.

This year's tournament will take place on March 10-11, 1998 at the Golden Eagle Country Club. It will mark the first year that this tournament will take place at Golden Eagle. The previous six tournaments were held at the Killearn Country Club. The two-day tournament will consist of three rounds totaling 54 holes.

The Florida State golf program has had the opportunity to feature several golfers that have made their mark in the world of golf.
