#### Don A. Veller Seminole Golf Course

The Don A. Veller Seminole Golf Course is named for Dr. Veller in recognition of his fifty years of dedication to Florida State Athletics and the Seminole golf program.

After excelling in Indiana Athletics, both as a coach and a player, Dr. Don Veller came to Tallahassee in 1948 as Florida State University's first full-time head football coach. Veller propelled his Seminole football team to their first bowl game in 1949 and their first undefeated season in 1950.

In 1953, his career and passion turned to golf and he became the Seminoles' head golf coach until his retirement in 1982. During his reign, Veller's teams were routinely among the country's best and went undefeated in 1957. Many from Veller's teams became PGA tour players such as Hubert Green, Paul Azinger, Jeff Sluman, Kenny Knox and Brian Kamm.

In addition to coaching, Dr. Veller has written golf columns and poems about golf for over fifty years, being published in Golf Digest, the Tallahassee Democrat and his own book "Fluffs, Muffs and Really Deep Rough."

Don and Fran Veller, who have already endowed scholarships for golf and football, have made plans to leave an additional \$2 million to those programs.

"We don't have any children, so we wanted to give it to a great cause like scholarships and facilities for Florida State golf and football, "Don said. The Seminole golf team and the entire Florida State community

would like to thank Dr. Veller for his generous contribution to the golf program.

Coach Goetze

ead Coach Nicky Goetze has high hopes for his first Florida State squad as it begins the spring season. He inherited a veteran team when named head coach in July of 2000 and feels the team is on the cusp of being able to perform well both in the Atlantic

Coast Conference and nationally.

"Our team continues to improve each day," said Goetze. "The players have all been receptive to the new training strategies and ideas I have implemented as their new head coach. I have been pleased with

Returning senior Mark Donaldson will help provide the maturity the team needs as a handful of talented underclassmen come into the lineup this

their effort and I feel it will be just a matter of time before success comes our way. We need to be focused each day we are on the golf course and victories and championships will become a reality for us."

A pair of upperclassmen, Rick Westbrook and Mark Donaldson, are expected to lead the Seminoles Westbrook and Donaldson were the team's most consistent golfers during the fall season and are expected to lead the team through a tough spring schedule and into post-season play for the first time since 1996.

Junior Rick Westbrook, who earned the team's top stroke average during the fall season, enters the spring season as the Seminoles' top golfer and team leader. Westbrook earned a seventh place finish at the Kiawah Island Invitational and crafted a 73.75 average during four tournaments. He led the team with four rounds of par or better during the fall.

"I see Rick continuing to be a team leader throughout the season," said Goetze. "He worked extremely hard during the off-season to correct some mechanical flaws in his swing, and with these improvements, has

improved his overall game. He is hungry to earn medalist honors this season and I can see his scores consistently approaching the 72-73

Senior Mark Donaldson is another player who Goetze will count on to help lead the Seminoles. Donaldson, too, enjoyed a strong fall season and finished with the team's second best stroke average of 73.91. He led the team with nine rounds under 75 and shot a low-round score of 68 in the second round of the Coca-Cola Tournament of Champions.

"For our team to be successful, we need to be able to count on Mark for consistent scores each week," said Goetze. "Mark plays very smart golf and rarely shoots a score above 75.

Senior Kris Hannah, another seasoned veteran, continues to improve as his confidence continues to grow. In nine rounds during the fall season, Hannah completed five with scores at 75 or below. He shot his careerbest round of 71 at the Coca-Cola Tournament of Champions while helping the Seminoles to a tenth place finish in the team standings.

"Kris Hannah has a great attitude, and his intelligence on the golf course continues to serve him well," said Goetze. "He has the chance to finish out his collegiate career at Florida State with a strong season."

Jason Lopez, the third senior who will be asked to contribute to the Seminoles this spring, possesses a solid golf swing and strong short-game. He has begun to show his ability in providing low scores in tournament play as evidenced by his shooting six rounds of 75 or lower during the fall season. He averaged 75.50 strokes per round and carded a career-low 71 in the second round of the Cleveland Golf Intercollegiate.

"Jason should develop a comfort level in his starting role and be able to produce lower scores as the spring progresses," said Goetze. "We are excited about the progress he is making in tournament play.

The biggest surprise player of the fall season was freshman Rusty Mosely. He participated in all four tournaments, averaged 75.50 strokes per round and shot a sensational 69 in the second round of the Coca-Cola Tournament of Champions. Three of his 12 rounds during the fall were 75 or below and two were par or better.

"Rusty Mosley has the potential to have a great spring season," said Goetze. He is capable of shooting subpar scores at any time and has an excellent chance to win an event this season. He has the ability to improve as much, or more, than all of the golfers on our squad this season."

A host of juniors and sophomores including Peter Mitchell, Al Giebler, Brian Hawver, Matt Ackley and Brad Lusenhop will have the chance to compete for playing time this spring. Each has played strong golf during their careers and could contribute to the Seminoles' starting lineup this spring. Mark Sestillio, the lone freshman on the roster, will also be given a chance to compete for playing time.

Giebler and Ackley are both juniors who have performed well throughout their careers at Florida State. Giebler was a member of the Seminoles' lineup during last fall's Gary Koch/Cleveland Golf Intercollegiate where he averaged 78.00 during the three round tournament. Ackely finished tied for 27th at the Louisiana State Invitational as a sophomore and shot a career-low 71 during the Keswick Cavalier Classic as a freshman.

Mitchell, Hawver and Lusenhop are all sophomores who will make their mark on the program during the remainder of their careers.

Mitchell competed in two tournaments during the fall season and averaged 76.00 strokes in six rounds during two tournaments. He shot a career-best 74 in the first round of the Coca-Cola Tournament of Champions. Hawver played in five tournaments as a sophomore and shot a low round of 75 at the Coca-Cola Tournament of Champions. Lusenhop also played in five tournaments as a sophomore and was the third highest finisher in the Seminole Classic.


"Our sophomores and juniors have been working hard to make the difficult

step of earning a spot in the starting lineup," said Goetze. "I have been very encouraged by their play during the fall and spring seasons."

Florida State plays six tournaments leading up to the Atlantic Coast Conference and NCAA Championship events. The schedule offers the Seminoles a chance to compete among the nation's top teams from both the ACC and SEC on a weekly basis. The spring season includes one of the toughest Seminole Invitational fields in recent memory and appearances in the Beau Rivage College Classic in Gulfport, Miss., and the Augusta State Invitational in Augusta, Ga.

"The competition we will face from the ACC and SEC schools will place a tremendous amount of pressure on our team each and every week," said



#### Nicky Goetze Head Coach

n August 16, 2000, Florida State Men's Golf entered a new era. Nicky Goetze, who guided the Mississippi State men's golf team to a 19th place finish at the 2000 NCAA Regional Championship in just his second year of coaching, was named head coach for the men's golf team. Goetze inherited a program with eager young men ready to become nationally dominant.

"I am excited that Dave Hart has chosen me to lead the Seminoles to the forefront of collegiate golf," Goetze said. "I feel that I can combine my talents as a golf coach with the reputation and backing of such a dominant university to create a golf program with unlimited national potential."

Goetze, who was head coach at Mississippi State for 2 years, is ready to get the program into contention for the national title. Athletic Director Dave Hart, comments on appointing Goetze.

"We are very pleased that Nicky has accepted our offer to lead our men's golf program," said Hart. "His energy and expertise, coupled with our plans for a new teaching facility, makes for an exciting time in the growth of our program."



In his rather new coaching career, Goetze has made a significant impact on all the programs he has worked with. Goetze began his coaching career at the University of Florida as an assistant to Buddy Alexander. At Florida he assisted with recruiting and team instruction. He was also responsible for coordinating the Gator Golf Camps for young golfers.

Following his time at UF, Goetze went to University of Texas-El Paso, where the Miners claimed one tournament championship and did not finish lower than fifth during the fall season.

In 1998, Goetze was hired as the head coach at Mississippi State University. In Goetze's first tournament as head coach, Mississippi State claimed the team title at the G. Gunby Jordan Intercollegiate. Individually, the Bulldogs claimed 14 top-15 finishes, and the team placed fourth at the SEC Championships. Combined with the SEC Championship performance and a first-place finish two weeks later at the Furman Intercollegiate, the Bulldogs received a bid in the NCAA East Regional. Mississippi State finished tied for 10th.

Although Goetze has proven to be a successful coach, most of Goetze's golf success has been as a player.

Goetze achieved success at the collegiate and professional levels. At

> n his second year as assistant coach, David Beck helps the Florida State Men's Golf team with instruction and guidance, but he also serves as a connection to the local community. Coach Beck, who graduated from Leon High School here in Tallahassee, serves as a bridge to the loyal Seminole fans and boosters. Beck continued his education and his golf career at Florida State University from 1986 to 1989. Beck played in two NCAA golf championships and was a medalist in the 1989 East Regional while at Florida State.

Coach Beck graduated in 1989 with a bachelors of science in

Clemson, he competed in more tournaments and more rounds than any other player in Clemson history. He was a three-time NCAA All-American selection and a four-time All-ACC selection. He earned MVP honors three times, and was an NCAA Academic All-American in 1992. Goetze graduated with a degree in financial management in December of 1993.

Following college, Goetze played on the Canadian Tour for three years and the Asian Tour for two seasons. In 1995 while playing on the Canadian Tour, he won the British Columbia Tel Pacific Open, and he finished 8th on the Order of Merit Canadian Tour, qualifying for the Canadian Open, a PGA tour event. His stroke average that summer was 70.22.

Golf obviously runs in the Goetze family. Coach Goetze's sister, Vicki

knew that many challenges were ahead. However, seniors Guy Bradley and Ryan Felty were determined to lead the tribe through. And that is what they did.


Going into the season, the team knew that the talent was there and





## his is lallahassee

ear, but far from the glaring strips of neon amusement and the castles and crowds of Disney, lies another magical place in the Sunshine State one of pow-wows, plantations, politics and great pride. Often described as "The Other Florida" with its deeprooted history, rolling hills, canopy roads of moss-draped oaks, cool climate and Southern-style hospitality, it is a Florida few have seen. It is Tallahassee – Florida with a Southern accent.

Best known as Florida's capital, Tallahassee is an intimate neometropolitan city where the power of state government, the academic and the artistic are complemented by subtle, old-fashioned charm. It is the perfect two or three-day diversion for the more than 41 million annual visitors to Florida and 13 million residents.

Tallahassee touts a menagerie of sights including one of the world's deepest freshwater springs, site of America's first Christmas, a wildlife habitat, Capitol buildings, fascinating museums of history, sprawling plantations, highly acclaimed fishing and hunting adventures and nearby beaches. Spirited area festivals range from celebrations of Tallahassee's spectacular spring and

swamp stomps to genuine rattlesnake roundups and seafood festivals.

With the Gulf of Mexico just 20 miles south and the Georgia border only 14 miles north, Tallahassee

rests between the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and the juncture of Florida's panhandle and peninsula. Nearer in miles to Atlanta than to Miami, Tallahassee more closely resembles its Southern neighbors than Florida in topography, climate and lifestyle.

Accentuating Tallahassee's Southern persona are lush rolling hills, likened to the seven hills of Rome, and five "official" canopy roads of patriarch oaks. The fertile, rich soil and four distinct, yet pleasant, seasons breed floral brilliance and natural vitality year-round.

Like the city itself, the story of how Tallahassee was chosen as the state capital is rich in history. In 1823, two explorers set out – one on horseback from St. Augustine and the other by boat from Pensacola – to find a permanent, central location for the legislature to convene. The two met at a beautiful site that the Creek and Seminole Indians called "talla-

hassee" – derived from the words "talwa" meaning "town" and "ahasee" meaning "old." The rendezvous point remains Florida's capital.

The "old town" has undergone many changes, but one thing remains the same – it is still a government town fierce-

ly proud and dedicated to preserving its heritage. The Capitol buildings, both old and new, epitomize Tallahassee's perseverance.

The 22nd floor of the New Capitol provides a panoramic scope of a sophisticated Southern city awash in a sea of flowering azaleas, snowy dogwoods, towering pines, fragrant magnolias, and hundreds of shimmering lakes, springs, swamps, rivers and sink holes. Special legislative viewing galleries are open during the legislative session.

Below, in the shade of giant live oaks, proudly stands the Old Capitol originally constructed in 1845 and restored to its 1902 splendor complete with red-and-white candystriped awnings, a dome adorned with stained glass, antique furnishings and political memorabilia.

Across from the Old Capitol are the 40-foot twin granite towers of the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial, and the blue stone Union Bank, Florida's oldest surviving financial institution. The nostalgic Old Town Trolley, a replica

lorida State University, a coeducational graduate research institution, stands among the nation's elite in both academics and athletics.

Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida and building rapidly on the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, the university has emerged over the past 52 years as an institution of national and international esteem. Its stature is evidenced by a number of additions to its record of excellence in the 1990s:

- In 1994, Florida State was classified a "Research University I" by the Carnegie Foundation, placing it among the nation's top research uni-
- In 1999. FSU was ranked as the most wired university in Florida, and 44th in the nation, in the "100 Most Wired Colleges" ranking by Yahoo! Internet Life magazine.
- FSU established the Bryan Hall Living-Learning Community in fall 1994, a unique academic residential program for freshmen designed to create a closeknit learning environment that benefits from the assets of a large research university. Building on the success of the Bryan Hall program, the Broward Hall Social Sciences Residential Program in

International Affairs was 1999.

Public and launched in fall

 Former Vice President of the United States Al Gore spoke at the dedication of the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory at FSU in 1994. The National Science Foundation established the \$100 million magnet lab in 1990 at FSU, which runs

the facility in partnership with the Los Alamos National Laboratory and the University of Florida. A Nobel laureate in physics and a top Russian physicist were among the first scholars drawn to the faculty. The world's largest magnet two stories high and capable of generating 45 tesla or 1 million times the Earth's magnetic field - was installed in 1995 at the NHMFL, located in Innovation Park, an off-campus research complex.

- FSU created the first multipurpose student identification/banking card. The Card Application Technology Center is a national leader in "smart card" systems.
- In fall 1994, the first tenants moved into the east side of the \$85 million University Center, a classroom and office facility at Doak Campbell Stadium. With the completion of the west side in 1996. University Center now provides 550,000 square feet of much needed academic space and a
- In 1998, the FSU School of Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts' graduate film program was ranked in the top 10 in the nation and third among public university film programs. Offering training for one of Florida's fastest growing industries, FSU conferred its first master's degrees in film in 1991 and its first bachelor's in film in 1993. The Film School's students have produced numerous national and international

award-winning films.

centralized location for student services.

- The Center for Civic Education and Service was established in 1994, aimed at promoting community involvement and civic responsibility as integral elements of the liberal arts education at FSU. The center supports such servicelearning programs as Into the Streets, a one-day community service project for freshmen, and Gadsden ESL (English as a Second Language), which provides educational services to migrant farmworkers. Through ServScript, students' service may be recorded on their official academic transcript.
- Florida State ranked eighth in popularity nationwide among all prospective students, fifth among prospective African-American students and fourth among prospective Hispanic/Latino stu-

dents, based on the number of students who request that their Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores be sent to an institution. FSU was the only institution listed among the top 10 choices of all three prospective student categories.

- FSU ranked 7th in the nation among public universities for 1993-97 in the number of African-American Ph.D. students it graduated.
- To better understand the world's cultural diversity, FSU undergraduate students are required to complete at least two courses that focus on diverse traditions beyond Western civilization. The multicultural study requirement, in effect since 1991, complements a longestablished liberal studies program at
- In 1999. FSU created the Institute on War World II and the Human Experience to "save the memories of those who saved the world" by collecting letters, diaries, memoirs and photos from participants in the war effort, in order to preserve the materials for classroom teaching, scholarly research and public viewina.
- · Capping more than a decade of national prominence in inter-collegiate athletics. Florida State's athletic teams, nicknamed "Seminoles," joined the Atlantic Coast Conference as its ninth member in 1990. The FSU football team won the 1993 National Championship and its quarterback, Charlie Ward, won the university's first Heisman Trophy.
- The Dr. Bobby E. Leach Center, a state-of-the-art student recreation facility, with weight-training facilities, a pool, saunas, basketball and racket-sport courts, was completed in 1991.
- The Appleton Museum of Art in Ocala, its vast art collection and an eminent scholar chair were donated to FSU and Central Florida Community College
- FSU acquired the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota, home to the graduate theater program, the FSU/Asolo Conservatory of Professional Actor Training.

As this list of highlights attests. Florida State has excelled in the 1990s with exceptional strength, energy and





vision for the future. Under the leadership of the university's 12th president, Talbot "Sandy" D'Alemberte, who took office in January 1994, FSU will continue to build on the foundation of its history of excellence in scholarship, research and service.

A senior member of the 10-member State University System, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act and began in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

Today, FSU's operating budget is \$525 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$112 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the university: the FSU Foundation, which raised \$301 million in private gifts

during the university's first capital campaign, Seminole Boosters and the FSU Alumni Association.

The main campus is spread over 455.5 acres in Tallahassee; FSU, which has one of the smallest campuses in the SUS, has been actively acquiring land in the 1990s after years of being landlocked at 347 acres. FSU owns 1,308 acres in Leon, Bay, Franklin and Sarasota counties.

Within the state, the university maintains facilities at its 25-acre campus in Panama City, its Marine Laboratory in the Gulf of Mexico, the Appleton Museum in Ocala and the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. The Center for Professional Development

and Public Service, housed in the Augustus B. Turnbull III Florida Conference Center on the edge of the campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

For years, FSU has reached far beyond Florida through international programs in Switzerland, France, Panama, Costa Rica, Spain, Russia and the Caribbean. FSU's student centers in Florence, Italy, and London, England, are considered by many to be the nation's best in Europe.

Florida State offers 289 graduate and undergraduate degree programs through its eight colleges – Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education, Engineering (operated jointly with Florida A&M University, a historically black institution); Human Sciences, Law, and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the Reubin Askew School of Public Administration and Policy) – and eight schools – Criminology and Criminal Justice; Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

With 1,731 members, the FSU faculty has included nine National Academy of Sciences elected members, nine American Academy of Arts and Sciences fellows and five Nobel laureates. It is backed by 3,002 administrative/professional and support staff.

Library holdings at Florida State include 2.2 million book titles, 16,384 serials and 4.7 million microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked by computer to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library is located at the heart of the university's science research complex. FSU also maintains extensive music, library science and law libraries. Also providing research opportunities is the tandem Van de Graaff Supercon-ducting Accelerator Laboratory, which houses two powerful atom smashers.

Graduate students, who number more than 5,685, pursue advanced degrees in fields as diverse as business

administration and theoretical particle physics. A majority of research done at FSU is the direct result of student effort, culminating in numerous books, monographs and journal articles relating to the whole spectrum of intellectu-

al interests and the practical needs of society.

FSU, a residential campus, places a high priority on its 31,193 students and their needs and interests (of the student population 45 percent are male, 55 percent are female, 21.7 percent are minorities, 2.6 percent are foreign students). The University Honors Program. Disabled Student Services, International Student and Scholar Center, Student Government Association, Flying High Circus and intramural sports are among more than 200 organizations and activities in which students may participate. Situated in the heart of the state's thriving capital city, Florida State's main campus blends Jacobean Revival and modern styles of architecture with the oaks, pines, dogwoods, palms and azaleas of North Florida. Florida State continues to progress and grow - from its pre-Civil War foundation as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, through the early 20th century as the academically respected Florida State College for Women, (returning to coeducational status as a university in 1947) to its modern development as an acclaimed research institution, a top-ranked competitor in intercollegiate athletics and as a standard-setter in the basic sciences and the performing arts.

Florida State University enters the 21st century with excellence in all areas of its mission – teaching, research and public service.

## MCAInformation

he following information is provided by the Florida State
Office of Compliance for
prospective student athletes. It
is intended as a guideline to
introduce some of the rules
governing NCAA athletic
involvement.

Who is permitted to recruit for FSU?

Only Florida State University coaches who have successfully completed the NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination on an annual basis may be involved in the recruitment process. Representatives of our athletics interests may not make any recruiting contacts. This includes letters, telephone calls or face-to-face contact on or off campus with a prospect or the prospect's parents.

Key terms you should know

You become a prospective student-athlete if you have started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, you become a prospective student-athlete if the college provides you (or your relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide to prospective students generally.

A contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's legal guardian and an institutional staff member or athletic representative during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of greeting. NOTE: At the Division I level, athletic representatives (boosters) may not contact you for the purpose of recruiting. A college coach may contact you in person off the college campus beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year in high school.

An evaluation is any off-campus activity designed to access your academic qualifications or athletic ability, including any visit to your high school (during which no contact occurs) or the observation of any practice or competition in which you participate.

During your senior year, you can have one expense-paid official visit to a particular campus. You may receive no more than five visits. During your official visit, which may not exceed 48 hours, you may receive round-trip transportation between your home and the campus, and you (and your parents) may receive meals, lodging and complimentary admission to campus athletics events.

#### Phone calls and letters

Phone calls from faculty members and coaches (but not boosters) are permitted beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year. A college coach or faculty member is limited to one telephone call per week except when it is:

- During the five days immediately before your official visit to the university
- On the day of a coach's off-campus contact with you
- During the time beginning with the initial National Letter of Intent signing date in your sport through the two days after signing date
- Letters from coaches and faculty members (but not boosters) are not permitted until September 1 at the beginning of your junior year in high school. A Division I university may provide you with the following printed materials:
- General correspondence, including letters, U.S. Postal Service postcards and institutional note cards
- Game programs which may not include posters and one Student Athlete Handbook can be provided only during official or unofficial visits to the university's campus
- NCAA educational information
- Pre-enrollment information subsequent to signing a National Letter of Intent with the university
- One athletic publication which may include only one color of printing inside the covers
- Official academic, admissions and student services publications published or videotapes produced by the institution and available to all students
- Schedule cards
- Questionnaires which may be provided prior to your junior year
- Summer camp brochures which may be provided prior to your junior year.

Alumni and boosters do's and don'ts You may forward information about prospective student-athletes to the appropriate coaches. You may have contact with a prospect regarding permissible preenrollment activities such as summer employment, provided the prospect has already signed a National Letter of Intent and the Compliance Office is aware that you are making these contacts in regard to employment.

You may have a telephone conversation with a prospect only if the prospect initiates the call. Such a call may not be prearranged by an institutional staff member and you are not permitted to have a recruiting conversation, but may exhibit normal civility. You must refer any questions about our athletics programs to an athletics department staff member/coach.

You may view a prospect's contest at your own initiative provided you do not contact the prospect or his/her parents. In addition, you may not contact a prospect's coach, principal, or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.

You may continue established family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with sons and daughters of these families are permitted as long as they are not made for recruiting purposes or encouraged by Florida State University coaches.

**You may not** become involved in making arrangements to receive money or financial aid of any kind for a prospect or the prospect's family and friends.

**You may not** make contact with a prospective student-athlete and his/her parents when the prospect is on campus for an official or unofficial recruiting visit.

**You may not** transport, pay or arrange for payment of transportation costs for a prospect, and his/her relatives or friends to visit campus (or elsewhere).

**You may not** pay or arrange for payment of summer camp registration fees for a prospect.

**You may not** provide anything to a prospect, the prospect's family or friends without prior approval from the athletics' Compliance Office.


The golf course measures 7,033 yards from the championship tees and is considered an excellent test of golf. The greens, TIFTON 328 (bermuda) are of medium size, approximately 6,200 square feet each. The course rating is 72.0.

The course and practice facilities are considered to be among the best in the country. The Don A. Veller Seminole Golf Course is operated by Club Consultation and Management, a private golf course management firm. There have been many improvements made and within the next five

years should prove to be one of the finest courses in the area.

The Seminole golf team also has the luxury to play at many other courses in the Tallahassee area. The majority of Seminole practices take place at the Killearn Country Club, Golden Eagle Country Club and Seminole Golf Course. The team also practices at the Capital City Country Club. Killearn Country Club will host this year's Seminole Classic in March.

The academic programs have moved to the state-of-the-art University Center and is located on the sixth floor of the \$126 million facility. It includes private study carrels, a tutorial study area and a computer lab outfitted with 16 new IBM computers and laser printers. In addition, athletic sky boxes are utilized for group and individual tutorial instruction.

FSU offers 16 Schools and Colleges with 99 undergraduate degrees and 75 post-baccalaureate

The Florida State golf program has been blessed to have excellent student-athletes in recent years. The

Seminoles have had four Academic All-Americans in the last 10 years. Steve Greek received the prestigious honor as a member of the golf team in 1986. Roger Winchester and Christian Williams also received the honor in 1989 and '90 respectively.

Christian Raynor is the lone two-time winner of the award, receiving the award in '94 and '95. Raynor maintained a very high GPA while performing exceptionally on the golf course. While at Florida State, Raynor was named to the ACC Honor Roll as a sophomore, junior, and senior. Raynor was also the recipient of the Hubert Green Endowment Scholarship.



he Florida State golf program is rich in tradition that dates back to the early 1970's. The Seminoles have been blessed to have a number of All-Americans pass through the clubhouse doors at Seminole Golf Course. A total of 16 All-Americans have played for Florida State in the last 26 years.

The most prolific golfer in Florida State history is current PGA Tour member Nolan Henke. Henke, who played at Florida State from 1983-87. was a three-time All-American in 1985,'86,'87. Henke, in his final year of play for the Seminoles, finished second in the NCAA Championships, six strokes behind winner Brian Watts of Oklahoma State. Henke was inducted into the FSU Golf Hall of Fame at the conclusion of his illustrious career at FSU. Christian Raynor, a graduate of Florida State in 1994, led the Seminoles to their best year ever and a 7th place finish in the NCAA Championships. Raynor, a two-time All-American in 1994 and '95, won three individual medalist honors in the 1994-95 campaign, including a first place finish in the NCAA East Regional. Raynor, during his career at Florida State, was very effective in amateur play. Raynor qualified for match play in the US Amateur of 1994. With that impressive performance, Raynor put his


name on the golf map and among the elite golfers in the country. Raynor is currently playing selective NIKE Tour and Tommy Armour Tour

Nolan Henke won the prestigious Porter Cup Championship in 1986. He was a three-time All-American at Florida State.

onsistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor. However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 47th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the

strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 75 national championships, including 38 in men's competition and 37 in women's. In addition, 115 NCAA Individual men and 26 women have earned the coveted title of NCAA Champion.

The conference had an immediate impact on the national college football scene in the fall of 1953 when the University of Maryland captured the first of what would eventually be five national football titles for the ACC. Clemson laid claim to the league's second national title in 1981. Georgia Tech followed suit in 1990 while the Florida State Seminoles pocketed national title No. 4 and 5 in 1993 and 1999.

#### THE HISTORY

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members - Clemson. Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference bylaws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws

were adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971 when the University of South Carolina


tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The Atlanta school withdrew from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State.


