


ince his arrival in Tallahassee in 2003. Trey Jones has worked tirelessly to raise the level of the program to where it finds itself on the way back to the national rankings, in to the most prestigious tournaments and ultimately back in National Championship contention.


Jones has assembled a team that in 2006 will begin to make itself known to the top teams in college golf.

Jones has pieced together his team through teaching and recruiting. He has taught his players to improve themselves both mentally and physically and recruited some of the best young talent in the nation. The results are starting to show as Florida State is certainly in the midst of becoming a better team ... one worthy of national consideration.

With only three seniors on its 11-player roster, Florida State's strength is in its youth. In building his team, Jones has been mindful of utilizing the talents of his experienced upperclassmen while working with the talents of his large group of freshman and sophomores. The experienced coach, who is in his 16th season as a coach on the collegiate level, is guickly finding ways to maximize the virtues offered by both groups of players in molding a championship team.

The building process at Florida State began with Jones's first recruiting class, which included sophomore Jonas Blixt and Song Jeon and senior Jacob Davis. Those three players became the building blocks on which Jones has begun to build his team. All three were members of the starting line-up last year and will be the backbone of the team again in 2005-06.

Blixt enters his second season as one of the Seminoles' top golfers, who should compete for both conference and national honors. He finished as Florida State's top golfer in five of the 10 events he competed in as a freshman and earned medalist honors at the Gator Invitational, Blixt became the first Seminole to earn an individual title since Mark Donaldson won medalist honors at the 2001 Cavalier Classic and only the third Seminole in tournament history to earn medalist honors at the Gator Invitational joining Paul Azinger in 1981 and Keith Kulzer in 1983.

Additionally, Blixt led Florida State in most statistical categories including tournaments played (10 of 11), rounds played (29), scores at par or better (six), scores in the 60's (two), low single round score (68) and low tournament score (209) as a freshman.

"Jonas has shown signs of playing at a very high level," said Jones. "He is a hard worker and we look for him to use the valuable experience he gained last year to improve his bad rounds and become more consistent."

Jeon, like Blixt, is another Seminole who began to make a name for himself within the ACC as a freshman. He played in eight events including his first career ACC Championship in 2005. His fifth place individual finish at the 2005 Gator Invitational and his 12th place finish at the ACC Championship helped him gain the confidence that he could compete among the top golfers in the nation.

Jeon was one of seven Seminoles to lead the team's individ-

ual finishers in at least one event during the fall 2004 and spring 2005 seasons. He was Florida State's top finisher at the ACC Championship and was third

among his team members in stroke average during the spring season.

"Song came along nicely for us as a freshman," said Jones.
"He is one of our hardest workers who gets better on a constant basis. I am looking for big things and low scores from Song this season. He is also showing the ability to take on the role of a team leader, which is something I really like to see in our younger players."

Davis, who won individual medalist honors at the 2004 Junior College National Tournament, also played well in 2005 and is expected to play a bigger role for the team in 2006. As one of only three seniors on the roster, Davis played in five events in his first year as a Seminole and finished with one of the team's lowest stroke averages. Davis finished at even par as a member of the Seminoles' starting lineup in the Courtyard by Marriott Intercollegiate during the spring 2005 season.



Junior Torstein Nevestad, one of four transfers on the Seminole roster, became eligible at Florida State during the spring semester of 2005 and quickly became a staple in the starting lineup. He competed in four tournaments; including his first career ACC Championship, during his first semester as a Florida State golfer. He helped lead the Seminoles to three top-10 finishes; including a sixth place finish at the Florida State hosted Seminole Intercollegiate and ranked third on the team with seven scores at 75 or less. Nevestad was the Seminoles' top finisher with a tie for 12th place at the Seminole Intercollegiate and he finished in the teams' top three in the four events he competed in, during the spring.

"Torstein has been a very positive addition to our team in many different ways," said Jones. "Not only is he a solid player on the course, but because of his consistent play, he quickly became a leader for all of our players. His experience on the collegiate level is invaluable for our younger players to watch and emulate as he plays his way through a round."

Two seniors who will compete for playing time are Gonzalo Ibarraran and Adam Wallace; both are in their final years in the Seminole program. Both players have worked hard throughout their careers and have contributed many good rounds to Florida State's success.

"Jake loves to compete and he has an exceptional short game. With the transition year behind him it would not surprise me if Jake became our most improved player this season."

Ibarraran is playing in his fifth season as a member of the Florida State men's golf team as the senior member. He will finish the requirements for his degree in social science in December of 2005 and will continue to compete as a Seminole, while he rounds out his academic career.

Wallace has played in 14 events and in 40 rounds, during his three-year-career at Florida State and is second only to sophomore Torstein Nevestad, who has played in 19 events and 53 rounds during his career, in collegiate playing experience on the 2005-06 Seminoles' roster. Wallace has carded his low of 70 twice during his career – during the second round of the fall 2003 Cleveland Golf Collegiate and the second round of the spring 2003 Gator Invitational.

"We are going to utilize both Gonzo's and Adam's strengths this season to help us become a better overall team," said Jones. "They are both strong competitors who will compete for

playing time and help us as we bring our younger players along during the season."

Junior Bradley Ruch, who has been one of the Seminoles' top golfers in his first two years on the team, will once again be a strong contender to find himself in the starting line-up in each event this season. Ruch has played in 16 career events; including two career ACC Championships. He has displayed his ability to be successful each time out.

Ruch, who has shot his career-low round of 69 twice, will

continue to improve, as his game continues to mature.

"Bradley has matured a great deal over the last two years and is developing into a team leader," said Jones. "He has been given some valuable tournament experience and should use that to become a more consistent player. He plays with a great deal of heart.


A pair of transfer student-athletes – Ivan Brannan and Tommy Rymer – are also in the mix and have the talent to compete for positions in the starting lineup.

Brannan will earn the chance to compete for a position in the Seminoles' starting lineup after spending one full year in the Seminoles' program after transferring from Louisiana State. He competed in one event during the one full academic year (2003-04) he was in Baton Rouge. Brannan begins the 2005-06 season as a junior academically and a sophomore athletically with three years of Division I competition left on his calendar.

Rymer enters his first full season at Florida State with the ability to compete for extended playing time. He transferred to Florida State after spending three semesters at the University of Texas and arrived in Tallahassee to begin his academic and athletic career as a Seminole, during the spring of 2005. He competed in three events during his first semester at Florida State and helped the Seminoles to a third place team finish at the Gator Invitational.

"Ivan and Tommy are fantastic additions to our team and we are lucky to have them on our roster," said Jones. "Both of them will find themselves in our starting line-up this season and many times during their careers."

Two of the top additions to any collegiate team in the nation are Matt Savage and Nicholas Smith, who are two of the top recruits in the history of the Seminole program. Both players, who have competed at incredibly high levels on the junior golf circuit, should join the Seminoles' starting line-up as freshman

and cement their positions there for the remainder of their Seminole careers.

Savage was named the National-Player-of-the-Year and earned All-American honors by the National High School Coaches Association as a senior in 2005. He was an America Junior Golf Association All-American Honorable Mention selec-

tion his junior season and earned All-State First-Team honors in 2002, 2003 and 2004. Savage won the individual state championship in 2004 and played in the USGA Public Links Championship during the summer prior to his freshman season at Florida State.

Smith helped the United States Junior World Cup team win the World Cup Championship in Japan in

June of 2005. He was a four-time AJGA All-American and was an AJGA All-America Third Team selection in 2004. Smith is the top ranked prep player in the state of Florida and closed his prep career ranked eighth among all high school golfers in the nation.

"Matt and Nick are going to be very good players for us during their careers," said Jones. "The level that they are already at and that they bring to this team immediately makes us a better team. Their addition to the Florida State program is very exciting."

The development of the Florida State men's golf team is under way. As the players continue to move into place, the Seminoles will find themselves among the top collegiate teams in the country.

TREY JONES

Director of Golf Operations Men's Golf Coach

Trey Jones, a three-time collegiate conference Coach of the Year, is in his third season as head men's golf coach at Florida State. He became only the fifth head coach in the illustrious history of the Florida State men's golf program in 2003 and immediately set the Seminoles on a course to become one of the nation's elite teams. Jones came to Tallahassee after spending eight successful seasons as the Director of Golf Operations and Head Coach at Georgia State where he made the Panther program a regular national contender.

Jones has had the biggest impact on the Seminole program in the area of recruiting during his first two years in Tallahassee. He has worked to attract some of the nation's top young golfers to join the Seminole program. Florida State's recruiting class ranked as the sixth best by *GolfWeek* Magazine in 2005.

An outstanding teacher and motivator, Jones is a 16-year veteran of the collegiate coaching ranks. He was the head men's coach and Director of Golf Operations at Georgia State for eight years (1996-2003) before committing his expertise to the Seminoles in 2004. Prior to his career at Georgia State, Jones was an assistant coach at Wallace State Junior College (1992-95) and his alma mater North Alabama (1991). Jones developed his teaching, coaching and recruiting philosophies as he helped mold those programs into national contenders.

Jones accepted his first head coaching job at Georgia State in 1996 and immediately began to assemble one of the dominant men's golf programs in the southeastern United States. He was responsible for all aspects of the program including recruiting, coaching, fundraising, public relations, strength and conditioning, scheduling and all aspects of the team's budget. His ability to be successful in each of those aspects of managing the program made the Panthers an annual national contender.

He led the Panthers to a national ranking as high as 20th

during the 2000 season, making the golf team on the second Georgia State team to earn a top-20 national ranking. In 2001, Georgia State won the Trans Atlantic Athletic Conference championship by an astonishing 41 strokes. Following the conference championship, the Panthers earned their third consecutive NCAA Regional Championship appearance.

Jones led the Panthers to a single season school record three team titles during the 2000 season. Georgia State won the TAAC, the Temple Owl Classic and the Bridges All-American Tournament team championships. The Panthers also won the TAAC championship in 2001. Under Jones' leadership, Georgia State amassed 91 wins over SEC teams and 33 wins over ACC opponents from 1999-2000. During that period, Georgia State earned 23 victories over top 25 opponents.

With Jones at the helm at Georgia State, the Panthers played in four NCAA Regional Championships (1999, 2000, 2001 and 2003) and the NCAA Championship in 2000.

While at Georgia State, Jones led the Panthers to the first three A-Sun conference titles in school history and earned conference Coach of the Year honors each time (1998, 2000 and 2001). He is one of only three coaches in conference history to win each of the awards three or more times during his career. Jones coached eight all-conference selections, the 2001 conference Player of the Year (Allen Thompson), the 2001 conference Rookie of the Year (Bradley Beverly), the only four-time all-conference player in school history (Jack Croyle, 1999-2001) and the only regional All-American in school history (Ty Harris, 2003). In addition, the top five margin of victory in a single tournament, the top 10 individual stroke averages for a single season and the top 10 career stoke averages in school history all came under Jones' watchful eye.

Prior to his tenure at Georgia State, Jones spent three seasons as an assistant coach at Wallace State Junior College in Hanceville, Ala. While at Wallace State, Jones was responsible for all aspects of the recruiting process and coordination of daily practice schedules. He coached nine NJCAA All-Americans and helped guide Wallace to the No. 1 national ranking in 1992 and

1993 and a national ranking of No. 2 in 1994. Jones began his coaching career as an assistant at the University of North Alabama in 1991.

Jones earned his bachelor's degree in health and physical education with a minor in business administration from North Alabama in 1991.

Jones is married to the former Cathy McVeigh who is the coordinator of financial aid for student-athletes at Florida State. The couple has a daughter, Jordan (4) and a son, Lawrence Andrew, who was born in September of 2005.

LANDRY MAHAN

Assistant Coach

Landry Mahan, who helped lead Oklahoma State to the NCAA Championship in 2000, is in his second season as an assistant coach at Florida State. His experience and success at the highest level of collegiate golf will benefit the Seminoles and Head Coach Trey Jones as the program sets its course to become one of the top teams in the nation.

From recruiting to scheduling to instruction of the Seminole golfers, Mahan is involved in all phases of the program. His golf expertise and keen eye for talent coupled with his administrative skills make him a solid fit to work side by side with Jones on the resurgence of men's golf at Florida State.

Mahan has played an integral part in the Seminoles' recruiting resurgence in the last two years. He has helped the Seminoles bring in the outstanding talent that has revitalized the program. The Seminoles' recruiting class of Nicholas Smith and Matt Savage was ranked as the sixth best class in the nation by *GolfWeek* Magazine.

Mahan was one of Oklahoma State's top golfers during his collegiate career (1996-2000). During his senior season, he shot a 281 and tied for 13th at the NCAA Championships to help Oklahoma State capture its ninth Division I men's golf title. A playoff hole between Oklahoma State and Georgia Tech allowed the Cowboys to edge the Yellow Jackets for the Division I Championship. He finished in 16th place in the individual standings to help Oklahoma State to a second place national finish in 1999.

Mahan earned All-America Honorable Mention honors and was named to the All-Big 12 Conference team as a senior. He was ranked 78th nationally on the MasterCard Division I Collegiate Golf Rankings and seventh in District V in his final season.


At Oklahoma State, he played in 51 tournaments and recorded one top five, five top 10 and fifteen top 20 finishes. His best career finish came in 1998 when he finished in a tie for third place the ASU Thunderbird Invitational. Mahan's career-low score of 65 came during his junior season. Mahan averaged 73.76 strokes for his 154 round career and was a four-year starter for the Cowboys.

Prior to his collegiate career at Oklahoma State, Mahan ranked among the top junior golfers in the U.S. He qualified for the 1999 U.S. Amateur and was a quarterfinalist at the 1998 U.S. Amateur. Mahan won the 1994 TaylorMade-adidas Golf Junior Tournament at The Woodlands with a score of 142 in two-rounds and was a member of the 1994 Championship Team at the 22nd Annual Junior Championship, he also won the 1998 U.S. Public Links Championship and recorded a top finish in the Southern Amateur Championship in 1995 with a score of 285.

He earned Rolex All-America First-Team status as a prep senior and won the Taylor Made Woodlands Championship in 1994 and was a member of the Cannon Cup team in 1994 and 1995.

Prior to his appointment at Florida State, Mahan has spent the last four years as a professional golfer and a teaching professional. He brings a wealth of teaching experience with him and he is a certified Bentley Sports Instructor. He made 12 of 13 cuts on the Tight Lies Tour and finished in a tie for ninth place at the Corpus Christi Open in 2002.

Mahan earned his bachelor's degree in leisure management in 2000 from Oklahoma State. He is engaged to Elizabeth Ward; the pair is planning a Dec. 2005 wedding.

FLORIDA STATE MEN'S GOLF TEAM CONTINUES IMPROVEMENT IN ALL PHASES AND IS A PROGRAM ON THE RISE NATIONALLY

UNDERCLASSMEN-LED SEMINOLES EARN FOUR TOP-10 FINSHES

With four top-10 finishes during its five-tournament spring schedule, the Florida State men's golf team continued to display its promise as one of the nation's most rapidly improving programs. The Seminoles finished in third place at the spring 2005 Gator Invitational - the best team finish for the program since the Cavalier Classic, during the spring 2001 season. Freshman Jonas Blixt earned individual medalist honors at the Gator Invitational making him the first Seminole player to win the individual competition at a tournament since the same 2001 Cavalier Classic. In addition to their third place finish at the Gator Invitational, the Seminoles finished fourth at the Mason Rudolph Intercollegiate, sixth at the Seminole Intercollegiate,

seventh at the ACC Championship and eighth at the Courtyard by

TRIO OF NEWCOM-ERS LEAD FLORIDA STATE IN 2005

Florida State was led by a pair of freshmen - Jonas Blixt (Hammaro, Sweden) and Song Jeon (Ocala, Fla.) - and a sophomore transfer - Torstein Nevestad (Oslo, Norway) - during the fall 2004 and spring 2005 seasons. Blixt led the Seminoles with a 74.03 stroke

average, while Jeon ranked third on the team with a 75.09 mark. Nevestad, who joined the team in January, finished second on the team with a 74.37 mark. Blixt and Jeon have three years of eligibility remaining while Torstein has two years left in his collegiate career at Florida State.

SENIOR CLASS PLAYS WELL IN FINAL YEAR

Florida State's departing seniors - Matt Adcock, Alan Beers, Rusty Mosley and Mark Sestilio - all played well during their final year on the golf course for the Seminoles. Adcock, (Apopka, Fla.) finished his career as the Seminoles' fifth leading golfer with a 75.67 stroke average in six events during the final year of his career. Mosley, (Vidalia, Ga.) who earned his way into the fourth ACC Championship of his career during the spring season, finished the year with a 75.85 stroke average; while Sestilio (Punta Gorda, Fla.) played in three events and earned a 79.33 stroke average. Beers, (Warner Robins, Ga.) played in 21 tournaments during his three-year varsity career with the Seminoles. The Seminoles' senior class helped the team earn 27 top-10 team finishes including three third place finishes at the fall 2003 Landfall Tradition (tied for 3rd), the spring 2004 Billy Hitchcock Intercollegiate (third) and the spring 2005 Gator Invitational (third).

- Florida State finished the 2004-05 season ranked 71st nationally in the GolfWeek/Sagarin Performance ratings Index;
- . The Seminoles played the 16th toughest schedule in the nation according to the Sagarin Rankings. It marked the second consecutive season the Seminoles have played a schedule ranked as one of the 35 toughest in the nation.
- Freshman Jonas Blixt missed only one tournament during the fall 2004 and spring 2005 seasons and finished with a teamleading 74.03 stroke average. He was in the Seminoles' lineup for every event; but the Carpet Capital Collegiate which closed out the fall 2004 season.
- Florida State's pair of freshmen Jonas Blixt and Song Jeon - ranked in the nation's top 20 in terms of freshman of impact. The pair combined to average 74.56 strokes in 52 rounds during 18 total events played.


BLIXT LEADS SEMINOLES IN 2004-05

Freshman Jonas Blixt, Florida State's top golfer during the 2004-05 season, was a top candidate for ACC Freshmen of the Year honors in 2005. He earned his first career victory at the spring 2005 Gator Invitational and with continued improvement will compete as one of the ACC's top golfers during the remainder of his career in Tallahassee. Blixt was Florida State's stroke leader for the fall 2004 and spring 2005 seasons combined with a 74.03 mark. He led Florida State in most statistical categories including tournaments played (10 of 11), rounds played (29), scores at par or better (six), scores in the 60's (two), low single round score (68), low tournament score (209) and number of individual victories (one). He also led the team with 24.67 countable rounds during the first year of his career. Blixt finished as the Seminoles' top golfer in five of the 10 events he participated in as a freshman.

Freshman Song Jeon played in eight of the Seminoles 10 tournaments and finished with a 74.11stroke average during the spring season. Jeon's top career outing came at the Gator Invitational with personal bests for finish (tied for fifth), low single-round score (69), low 36-hole score (143), best tournament score (212) and best tournament score vs. par (+2). Amongst his teammates, Jeon finished among the team leaders in stroke average (third, 75.09), tournaments played (tied for second, eight), rounds played (third, 23) and low single-round score (69, tied for second).

Sophomore, Torstein Nevestad, became a Seminole after transferring from Florida Atlantic and enrolling at Florida State





Landis Hall has been renovated from a traditional dormitory style living environment into one of the most functional and popular spots on the Florida State campus at a cost of nearly \$20 million.

From its pre-Civil War beginnings as the Seminary West of the Suwannee to a nearly four-decade stint as the Florida State College for Women to its return to coeducational status as a university, Florida State University has developed into an acclaimed research institution with excellence in teaching, research and public service.

The university enrolls nearly 39,000 undergraduate, graduate and professional students. Of these, 24.2 percent are minorities. Students are from all 50 states and the District of Columbia, as well as 132 foreign countries.

Florida State offers an impressive breadth of academic degree programs. Students may take courses of study leading to a baccalaureate degree in 94 programs, a master's degree in 107

degree programs, a doctorate in 73 degree programs, a specialist certification in 28 degree programs, and a professional designation in two degree programs. Courses are offered through 16 schools and colleges — Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Criminology and Criminal Justice; Education; Engineering; Human Sciences; Information; Law; Medicine; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Sciences; Social Work; and Visual Arts and Dance.

Our students have the opportunity to work and study alongside two Nobel laureates, five members of the prestigious National Academy of Sciences, seven members of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and two winners of the Pulitzer Prize. Florida State faculty also

lead several scholarly fields in citations of published work.

Several members of the Florida State faculty were recognized with major awards in 2005, including two Guggenheim Fellowships, a National Endowment for the Arts Fellowship, a Leopold Leadership Fellowship, five Fulbright fellowships, an Alexander Von Humboldt award, a new member elected into the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, a new member elected a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and a new member elected into the National Endowment for the Humanities.

Florida State has many academic programs that consistently rank among those at the nation's top 25 public universities, including programs in business, chemistry, creative writing, criminology, ecology and evolutionary biology, information, law, meteorology, oceanography, physics, political science, psychology, public policy, sociology and statistics.

The university had many noteworthy achievements in 2005. Among them:

The College of Law ranked among the top 30 public law schools in the United States; the environmental law program ranked 14th nationally and is considered one of the strongest in the Southeast.

The School of Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts was recognized by the Directors Guild of America for its distinguished contribution to American culture through film and television, joining fellow honorees Robert DeNiro, Jonathan Demme and other entertainment luminaries at the Fifth Annual DGA Honors. In addition, the school was honored with two Student Oscars and five Collegiate Television Academy Awards, more than those received by students from any other school in the history of the industry.

The Askew School of Public Administration and Policy was identified as the fourth most productive in the country among public affairs schools, and ranked third most productive in terms of published works by graduate students.

The risk management/insurance program was named one of the most highly recognized programs in the nation, ranked in the top 10 by U.S. News and World Report.

The College of Medicine, the first newly accredited allopathic medical school in more than 20 years, graduated its first class and matched all students to residencies.

Several faculty members in the English department were recognized with awards, including the prestigious Mary McCarthy Prize in fiction, awarded to Paul Shephard; an O. Henry Award for Elizabeth Stuckey-French; the Gustave O. Arlt Award from the Council of Graduate Schools to Nancy Bradley Warren; and the National Magazine Award to Robert Olen Butler.


Students also have the opportunity to conduct research in specialized interdisciplinary centers, such as the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory, the Institute of Molecular Biophysics, and the School of Computational Science; to participate in interdisciplinary work across campus, such as efforts that integrate economics, geography, climate forecasting, law and other environmental courses and programs; and to work with faculty to forge new relationships among professions, including medicine, the physical sciences, engineering, business and law.

Students at Florida State are encouraged to participate in international education through the university's programs in England, Italy, Switzerland, France, Panama, China, Costa Rica, Spain, Russia, Vietnam, the Czech Republic, Greece, Croatia, Germany, Ireland and the Caribbean. The university's study sites in Valencia, Spain; Florence, Italy; London, England; and the Republic of Panama are considered by many to be among the nation's best.

Florida State's main campus is spread over 450.5 acres in Tallahassee. Within the state, the university maintains facilities in Panama City, its Marine Laboratory at Turkey Point on the Gulf of Mexico, and the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. In addition, the Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Augustus B. Turnbull III Florida Conference Center on the edge of campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

Florida State also operates the Ringling Center for the Cultural Arts in Sarasota, which includes the John and Mable Ringling Museum of Art, the largest museum/university complex in the nation.

Library holdings at Florida State include 2.7 million book titles and 9.1 million microforms. The university's library holdings rank among the top 30 public research universities in the United States, according to 2003-2004 data. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked by computer to other state university and national research libraries. Florida State also maintains science, music, library and information science, medicine, engineering and law libraries, as well as the Mildred and Claude Pepper Library, which houses the papers, photographs, audio recordings, video recordings and memorabilia of the longtime congressman from Florida. Library materials and services also are available at the university's Panama City campus, as well as at the international study centers, and a collection of art and related materials is on display at the John and Mable Ringling Museum of Art in Sarasota. Collectively, the Florida State libraries are a member of the Association of Research Libraries, an association of the top research university libraries in the United States.

BACKGROUND: The Florida State University is one of eleven units of the Division of Colleges and Universities of the Florida Board of Education...It was established as the Seminary West of the Suwannee by an act of the Florida Legislature in 1851 and first offered instruction at the postsecondary level in 1857...Its Tallahassee campus has been the site of an institution of higher education longer than any other site in the state...In 1905, the Buckman Act reorganized higher education in the state and designated the Tallahassee school as the Florida Female College...In 1909, it was renamed Florida State College for Women...In 1947, the school returned to co-educational status, and the name was changed to The Florida State University...It has grown from an enrollment of 2,583 in 1946 to an enrollment of 38,886 in the Fall Semester 2004.

FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY COMPLIANCE OFFICE

The following information is provided by the Florida State Office of Compliance for prospective student-athletes. It is intended as a guideline to introduce you to some of the rules governing NCAA athletics.

Key Definitions You Should Know

Representative of Athletics Interests: A representative of the institution's athletics interests (AKA Booster) is an individual who is know (or should have been known) by a member of the institution's athletic department to:

- Have participated in or to be a member of an agency or organization promoting the institution's intercollegiate athletics program:
- Have made financial contributions to the athletics department of to an athletics booster organization of that institution;
- Be assisting or to have been requested (by the athletics department staff) to assist in the recruitment of prospects;
- Be assisting or to have assisted in providing benefits to enrolled student-athletes or their families; or
- Have been otherwise in promoting the institution's athletics program.

Once an individual is identified as a representative, the person retains that identity forever

Prospective Student-Athlete: A prospective student-athlete ("prospect") is a student who has started classes for the ninth grade, regardless whether he or she participates in athletics. A prospective student-athlete maintains his or her identity as a prospect, even after he or she signs a National Letter of Intent or financial aid agreement, until he or she attends the first day of practice or participates in an official team practice, whichever is earlier.

Contact: A contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's parents, relatives or legal guardian(s) and an institutional staff member during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of a greeting. In the sport of golf, a coach can contact you once in the month of April at your school and three more times after July 1 before your senior year in high school.

Evaluation: An evaluation is any off-campus activity designed to assess your academic qualifications or athletic ability, including any visit to your high school (during which no contact occurs) or the observation of any practice or competition in which you participate.

Phone Calls and Letters

During the month of March during your junior year in high school, a coach may make one phone call to you. After that, phone calls from faculty members and coaches (but not boosters) are permitted beginning July 1 before your senior year in high school. A coach or faculty member is limited to one phone call per week except that unlimited phone calls may be made:

- During the five days immediately before your official visit to the university.
 - On the day of a coach's off-campus contact with you.

• During the time beginning with the National Letter of Intent signing date through the two days after the signing date and after a National Letter of Intent or scholarship agreement is signed.

A prospect of any age could receive the following from a coach

- Questionnaire
- · Camp brochure
- · NCAA educational information

After September 1 of a prospect's junior year, a coach could provide

- Written correspondence, including letters, e-mails, instant messages and text messages
 - Game programs (only on an official or unofficial visit)
 - Media Guide
- Official academic, admission and student services publications and videotapes produced by the institution and are available to all students
- Any other information may be provided via the institution's web site.

Who is Permitted to Recruit for FSU?

Only Florida State University coaches who have successfully completed the NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination on an annual basis may be involved in the recruitment process. Boosters may not make any recruiting contacts. This includes letters, telephone calls or face-to-face contact on or off campus with a prospect or the prospect's parents.

Alumni and Boosters Do's and Don'ts

You may forward information about prospective student-athletes to the appropriate coaches.

You may have contact with a prospect regarding permissible pre-enrollment activities such as summer employment, provided the prospect has already signed a National Letter of Intent and the Compliance Office is aware you are making these contacts in regard to employment.

You may have a telephone conversation with a prospect only if the prospect initiates the call. Such a call may not be prearranged by an institutional staff member and you are not permitted to have a recruiting conversation, but may exhibit normal civility. You must refer any questions about our athletic programs to an athletics department staff member/coach.

You may view a prospect's contest at your own initiative provided you do not contact the prospect or his/her parents. In addition, you may not contact a prospect's coach, principal or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.

You may continue established family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with sons and daughters of these families are permitted as long as they are not made for recruiting purposes or encouraged by Florida State University coaches.

You may not become involved in making arrangements to receive money or financial aid of any kind for a prospect or the prospect's family and friends.

You may not make contact with a prospective student-athlete and his/her parents when the prospect is on campus for an official or unofficial recruiting visit.

You may not transport, pay or arrange for payment of transportation costs for a prospect and his/her relatives or friends to visit campus (or elsewhere).

You may not pay or arrange for payment of summer camp registration fees

for a prospect.

You may not provide anything to a prospect, the prospect's family or friends without prior approval from the Compliance Office.

STUDENT DEVELOPMENT / LIFE SKILLS

New Opportunities for Leadership, Education and Service

Developed by the Florida State University Department of Athletics, the N.O.L.E.S. program represents a commitment to the total growth and development of the student-athlete. This program establishes an administrative commitment to academic and athletic excellence. Those efforts will be supported with programs and services in personal and career development and community service.

Personal Development

Fostering the development of personal growth is a fundamental component of the N.O.L.E.S program. These support programs ensure that the student-athlete will be provided with opportunities to focus on personal growth such as values clarification, goal setting, fiscal planning, decision making and personal responsibility. Programming focuses on helping student-athletes develop a healthy lifestyle while they are at Florida State and habits that will benefit them for life.

Career Development

Preparing for life after college is a major focus of the N.O.L.E.S program. The program is designed to work in cooperation with Florida State's career center to acquaint students with the job search process, provide networking opportunities and ultimately assist with job placement. This program places a priority on the

development of the total person, with the goal of developing individuals who will have rewarding careers and productive lifestyles after they leave Florida State.

Community Service

Serving the community is the focus of the Seminole Spirit program. Student-athletes are challenged to give service to our community and individuals who are in need. With a clearly defined program of service, student-athletes are given the opportunity to develop a lifelong commitment to volunteerism. The Seminole Spirit Student-Athlete Speakers Bureau enables student-athletes to improve their speaking skills, develop effective communication skills and impact the lives of others through their service as role models in our community. During the 2004-05 academic year, Seminole student-athletes donated nearly 4,500 hours of community service activities.

Leadership Development

The Florida State University Department of Athletics is committed to developing programs of excellence that foster leadership development. One of the foundations of building leaders is the Athletic Ambassadors program. The Athletic Ambassadors have the opportunity to attend seminars and listen and learn from outstanding guest speakers. They learn skills that will not only benefit them as student and as athletes but as they pursue their goals after leaving Florida State. They learn how to build communication skills and have many opportunities to achieve their greatest potential and use their leadership skills to positively influence others.

The Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) serves as the advisory board to the N.O.L.E.S. program and athletics administration. The prestigious board, which is comprised of two representatives from each athletic team at Florida State, also recommends programming and serves as a liaison between student-athletes and the administration. The Advisory Council plans and implements various events as the department's most visible ambassadors. The

SAAC hosts the annual Golden Nole Banquet and plans many events including orientation for incoming student-athletes and the annual Back-to-School picnic.



STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING

The strength and conditioning program at Florida State University is designed to improve athletic performance through an individualized regimen of stretching, lifting, speed, power, agility and conditioning drills. The goal of the program is to maximize the performance of the Seminole golfers, while reducing the risk of injury.


Physical development is critical in order to excel at the collegiate level. The strength and conditioning staff individually customizes programs for each of the Seminole student-athletes beginning with a preconditioning program before the season gets under way. The focus of the strength and conditioning staff revolves around building stronger and more well-conditioned athletes. The staff is goal-orientated towards providing the Florida State student-athletes with the best instruction, tools and resources in the nation.

Strength and conditioning for golf must be carefully planned and geared to a golf build. Preparing the Seminole student-athletes to be successful on the golf course encompasses exercises that match the characteristics of the game. The best way to build strength for golf is to understand the principals that govern the sport itself, then apply the exercises, sets and repetitions to being successful on the golf course.

Zac Conner joined the Florida State strength and conditioning staff in July 2003 and works directly with the Seminole men's golf team. He customizes individual programs for each of the golfers. Conner's program for the golfers begins before the season and continues throughout the student-athletes' competitive season. The strength and conditioning staff takes great pride in customizing and implementing programs designed to enhance and help each golfer in the weight room.

Conner comes to Florida State from the University of Nebraska where he served as a student assistant member of the strength and conditioning staff for three years. While at Nebraska, he worked with the Cornhuskers' nationally ranked football, baseball and track and field teams.

He is currently working towards earning his certification by both the National Strength and Conditioning Association and the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches' Association. Conner earned his bachelor's degree in exercise science from Nebraska in 2003. He is currently pursuing his master's degree in sport management at Florida State.

ATHLETIC ACADEMIC SUPPORT

An overview of an Award Winning Academic Support Program

Academic, personal and professional support is essential to college success. At The Florida State University, an outstanding support program has been developed that enables student-athletes to reach their full potential.

Florida State Athletic Academic Support program director Mark Meleney states, "Our philosophy is to offer an academic support program integrated with the total university that will assist student-athletes in the transition into college and provide continuous support in all phases of academic and professional development, culminating with graduation, job placement or graduate school."

Florida State's program operates on a "proactive" rather than a "reactive" approach. The academic staff does not wait around for a crisis to occur. They gather important background information on each entering student-athlete, build an academic profile and develop individualized support programs which are tailored to the unique needs of each student-athlete. They also stay informed on the daily progress of the student-athletes through constant communication with the Florida State faculty.

In the summer of 2004, the Academic Support Unit moved into its new home, a state-of-the-art facility in the newly constructed Moore Athletic Center. The multi-million-dollar structure, which is located in the north end zone of Doak Campbell Stadium, is the new home of Florida State athletics. Some of the features in the new academic support area include a 32-station computer lab for student-athletes, 10 private tutorial rooms and a five-station "Learning Center" for student-athletes with learning deficiencies and/or disabilities. The compliance, student services, business, sports information and athletics marketing offices are also housed in the facility, providing a more efficient and functional department, thus allowing student-athletes an opportunity for balanced and improved time management.

The academic support staff is comprised of a director, associate director, administrative assistant, six academic counselors, two learning specialists, several graduate assistants and approximately 50 tutors and mentors.

Meleney was named the program's director in 1997 and brings over 20 years of advising experience to the position. Over the last nine years, Meleney has played an integral role in the development of a comprehensive program of student-athlete support, which in 1996 won the "Program of Excellence" award from Athletic Management Magazine.

Tutor and Mentor Program

The department of athletics at Florida State University has made a commitment to providing the student-athlete with one of the

finest and most comprehensive tutorial and mentor programs in the nation. The tutorial program is just one of several key support services that is available to all student-athletes as the progress towards their ultimate goal of earning a college degree. Florida State hires approximately 50 tutors a year, from a variety of academic departments, who are committed to providing a proactive, individualized approach in assisting student-athletes with course comprehension and study skills. In addition, mentors are academic role models who have demonstrated the ability to teach and give guidance in areas of academic developmental skills. They are responsible for providing assistance in the development of skills such as note taking, test preparation and communication with faculty.

Academic Honors and Awards

Florida State University student-athletes have achieved great success in obtaining recognition for academic excellence. More then \$350,000 in Postgraduate Scholarship monies have been granted to Florida State student-athletes over the past 10 years, as well as numerous other academic honors and awards.

Florida State named 169 student-athletes to the 2005 Atlantic Coast Conference Honor Roll. In the 2004-05 academic year alone, Florida State boasted three ACC Weaver James Corrigan Postgraduate Scholarship winners, three National Academic All-Americans, two Arthur Ashe, Jr., Sports Scholar Award Winners, two District Academic All-Americans and one NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship finalist.

Roger Winchester (1989, 1990) - Honorable mention All-America in 1989 and 1990 ... was the Seminoles' No. 1 golfer for three consecutive years ... one of five Florida State golfers to earn All-America honors multiple times ... played on Florida State's NCAA Championship team in 1990 as the Seminoles finished in eighth place ... former English Amateur Champion.

Duke Donohue (1989) - Honorable mention All-America in 1989 ... a member of Florida State's 1987 team that finished seventh at the NCAA Championships.

Andy Purnell (1990) - Honorable mention All-America in 1990 ... a leader on Florida State's 1990 team which finished in eighth place at the 1990 NCAA Championships.

Bobby Cochran (1993) - All-America first-team in 1994 ... a senior leader on Florida State's 1994 NCAA Championships team which finished 16th in the event ... an All-ACC selection in 1994.

Christian Raynor (1994, 1995) - All-America first-team in 1995 ... All-America second-team in 1994 ... led the Seminoles to a school-best tying seventh place finish at the 1995 NCAA Championships ... earned medallist honors at the 1995 NCAA East Regional Championship ... earned three first place finishes during his senior season ... one of five Florida State golfers to earn All-America honors multiple times ... All-ACC in 1994 and 1995 ... graduated from Florida State in 1995.

Ken Staton (1995) - Honorable mention All-America in 1995 ... led the Seminoles to a seventh place finish at the NCAA Championships ... finished 14th in the individual standings of the event ... his Seminole career was highlighted by being the individual leader after two days of the 1995 NCAA Championships. Florida State finished seventh in the event ... graduated from Florida State in 1995.

George McNeil (1998) - Honorable mention All-America in 1998 ... also earned All-ACC honors in 1998 ... earned one tournament title and 23 top 20 individual finishes ... a member of the three NCAA Tournament teams at Florida State ... a member of the Florida State's 1995 team that finished seventh in the NCAA Championship ... finished his career at Florida State in 1998.


NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

Florida State has earned a great deal of success in the NCAA Men's Golf Championships during the illustrious history of the Seminole program. The Seminoles competed in the event four times during the decade of the 1990's and have finished in the top 10 three times since 1985.

The Seminoles finished in a program best seventh place at the 1987 and 1995 NCAA Championships. The Seminoles' 1995 team finish of seventh place was a mere four strokes behind sixth-place Arkansas. Ken Staton, who finished tied for 14th in the individual standings with a four-round total of 289, led Florida State. George McNeil and Richard Fulford finished tied for 29th with respective four round totals of 293. Christian Raynor finished in a tie for 35th while Dennis Tymosko finished 78th. Staton (honorable mention) and Raynor (second-team) both earned All-America honors for the Seminoles.

The Seminoles also finished seventh at the 1987 championships. Nolan Henke, the Seminoles' only three time All-American, finished tied for second in the individual standings. Henke finished six strokes behind the individual medallist, Brian Watts of Oklahoma State. The four-day score for the Seminoles was 1,168 – was two strokes behind sixth-place California.

The 2004 NCAA Championship tournament, hosted by Virginia Tech, is scheduled to be played at the Cascades Golf Course at the Homestead in Hot Springs, Va., June 1-4.

George McNeil played in four ACC Championships and helped Florida State to a fourth place finish in the event in 1996.

Song Jeon finished in a tie for 12th place and Jonas Blixt in a tie for 18th to lead the Seminoles to a seventh place finish at the 52nd Annual Atlantic Coast Conference Championship at the Old North State Club at Uwharrie Point. Jeon earned the highest finish by a Seminole since the Peter Mitchell finished in ninth place during the 2002 conference championship.

Duke won its first ACC title since 1966 as it defeated Georgia Tech by four strokes in the final team standings. The Blue Devils and the Yellow Jackets were tied after two rounds at 583. Duke outscored Georgia Tech, 282-286, in the final round to win the championship. Duke's Ryan Blaum, who led the individual race wire-to-wire, became the first Blue Devil to win the individual championship since 1999.

Jeon finished in a tie for 12th place as he carded a two-over par 74 in the third round for a 221 total. He played three rounds at 74 or better (74-73-74) during the event to earn the second top 15 finish of his Seminole career. Jeon finished in a career-best tied for fifth place at the Gator Invitational earlier this spring.

Blixt and Torstein Nevestad led the Seminoles in the third round with identical one-over par scores of 73. Both players played their best golf of the event during the final round. Blixt was on par for a sensational score until finishing two of the final three holes with a pair of double-bogies. After a tough early start in the third round, Nevestad played the final 16 holes of the championship at two-under par.

Senior Rusty Mosley and sophomore Bradley Ruch carded scores of 75's to round out the Seminoles' afternoon. Mosley, playing in his fourth career ACC Tournament, earned his second best conference championship finish at tied for 33rd. He carded an even par 72 in the first round of the event. Ruch earned his best score of the tournament with his three-over par 75 over the final 18 holes. He was competing in the second ACC Championship of his career.



This Is Tallahassee



Tallahassee touts a menagerie of sights including one of the world's deepest freshwater springs, a wildlife habitat, Capitol buildings, fascinating museums of history, sprawling plantations and nearby beaches.

Among low, rolling hills, down moss-draped canopy roads, within picturesque historical districts, and across seas of flowering azaleas lies a magical part of the Sunshine State – Tallahassee, Florida's capital city. With its intriguing combination of power-play politics and classic character splashed with a twist of beauty and charm, Tallahassee is a genteel Southern belle with good manners, old plantation homes and y'all-come hospitality – a side of Florida few expect to find.

With the Gulf of Mexico just 25 miles south and the Georgia border only 14 miles north, Tallahassee rests between the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and the juncture of Florida's panhandle and peninsula in an area known as "The

Tallahassee is famous for its "canopy roads," streets and thoroughfares lined with 200-year-old oaks draped with Spanish

Big Bend." Nearer in miles to Atlanta than to Miami, Tallahassee more closely resembles its Georgia neighbor than Florida in topography, climate and lifestyle.

Like the city itself, the story of how Tallahassee was chosen as the state capital is rich in history. In 1823, two explorers set out – one on horseback from St. Augustine and the other by boat from Pensacola – to establish a permanent, central location for the seat of government. The two met at a beautiful site that the Creek and Seminole Indians called "tallahassee" – derived from the words "talwa," meaning town, and "ahassee," meaning old. This historic meeting place remains Florida's capital today.

The New Capitol building rises at the center of Tallahassee's downtown as a sleek modern structure, juxta-posed next to the Old Capitol, built in the more classic domed style. A gallery atop the 22-story New Capitol provides a sweeping view of the hilly city and its tree-lined streets. From it, you can see all the way to Georgia, less than 20 miles away.

Around the capitol complex, a 10-block historic district spreads, preserving the town's gracious old homes along a linear park and holding an historic inn, bars and restaurants patronized by Senators and sophomores alike. With no shortage of culture, downtown also offers museums, theater and art galleries. Artists have turned the old warehouses of the Downtown Industrial Park into the studios and cafes of Railroad Square. The Museum of Florida History, nearby, is highly acclaimed for its scan of the state's past, and the Mary Brogan Museum of Art and Science, along with changing art exhibits, brings to a kid's level hands-on exhibits. Other sightseeing favorites include the Floral masterpiece of Alfred B. Maclay State Gardens, Bradley's Country Store, FAMU Black Archives and the Tallahassee Antique Car Museum.

The area surrounding Tallahassee reveals numerous other historic and archaeological treasures, such as De Soto State Archaeological and Historical Site, Lake Jackson State Archaeological Site, Mission San Luis, Natural Bridge Battlefield and San Marcos de Apalache. Visitors can explore prehistoric Florida at the Museum of Florida History, where they are greeted by a giant 12,000-year-old mastodon pulled from nearby Wakulla Springs.

On the shores of Wakulla Springs, alligators still laze under the watchful eyes of "snake birds" perched on twisted cypress trees. The site of many underwater scenes in "Tarzan" movies, it's one of the world's deepest freshwater springs. Glass-bottomed boat tours across these mystical waters are available.

Nearby small towns offer fascinating excursions to places such as Pebble Hill Plantation, Florida Caverns State Park, Monticello Opera House and St. George Island.

Boasting more than 145 properties listed on the National Register of Historic Places, Tallahassee is a living showcase of Florida history and heritage. The crowning jewel of Florida's historic "Capitol Hill" is the Old Capitol, beautifully restored to its 1902 splendor complete with the red-and-white striped awnings, a dome adorned with stained glass, antique furnishings and political memorabilia. The 22nd-floor observatory of the New Capitol Building offers a breathtaking view of this surprising Southern city, awash in flowering azaleas, snowy dogwoods, towering pines, fragrant magnolias, and hundreds of lakes, springs, swamps, rivers and sink holes.

Charming downtown historic districts graced with lush linear parks lead visitors to the Knott House Museum, The Columns, First Presbyterian Church, John G. Riley House Museum and Old City Cemetery. Free walking tours and replica turn-of-the-century street cars carry passengers to antebellum mansions, picturesque churches and other downtown delights.

Minutes from downtown lies the lush 52-acre natural habitat and 1880s farm of the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science, home to the rare Florida panther and other furry "natives."

Tallahassee is almost as rich in cultural treasures as it is in history. A widely acclaimed collection of art, science and history museums and galleries, year-round festivals and non-stop entertainment at the 14,000-seat Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center, feed a variety of cultural appetites.

Area lakes, rivers, ponds and the Gulf – just 30 minutes away – offer a paradise for boating and fishing. Lakes Jackson and Talquin are renowned in the bass fishing world for yielding the "big ones." Local wildlife areas, such as the

St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge and Apalachicola National Forest, are perfect spots for camping, picnicking, swimming, biking and exploring.

And while Tallahassee also features eight golf courses and plenty of places to raise a racquet, it's a wild array of spectator sports that leave the crowds screaming for more. The Florida State

Seminoles and Florida A&M Rattlers provide collegiate action. And always a sure bet are the nearby greyhound races.

The debut of Southwood, which held its grand opening in 2002, gives Tallahassee a course it can call excellent. The Southwood Golf Course is the keystone to a 3,200-acre development located on the eastern edge of Tallahassee. Designed by the team of Fred Couples and Gene Bates, the course is on an uncommon piece of land which is a picnic setting of trees broken by soft slopes and cozy coves. The course itself is located over 175 acres and was created within a design that gracefully captures to the genteel feel of the land. The holes play before the various scenes of a former plantation, moving from a jaunt around a wetland area through a thicket of pine trees in into an open meadow. The trademarks of the course are the magnificent oak trees that stud the landscape. The topography speaks loudly of the untapped potential of golf in Tallahassee.

The semiprivate layout is the centerpiece of a 3,200-acre St. Joe/Arvida housing development. The land seems handcrafted for a course, as the topography rises and falls elegantly, creating some tough, but scenic, holes. Golf Magazine named it one of the best courses in the nation to open in 2002. Couples said it has the potential to be a "premier course in the Southeast."





Coaching Excellence

When it comes to legendary head coaches, its hard to argue anyone has been as fortunate. The Seminoles have three head coaches who have established records that rank them with the greatest coaches ever to roam an NCAA sideline.

Florida State is the only NCAA school with three coaches in the top 10 for all-time victories in their respective sports and in the top five in wins and winning percentage among active coaches. Bobby Bowden (football), JoAnne Graff (softball) and Mike Martin (baseball) have combined for 3,035 victories. Each coach appears in the top two for active winning percentage, active wins of all-time victories.

The caliber of coaches at Florida State is second to none and year after year, these coaches are recognized for excellence nationally, regionally and at the conference level. Sue Semrau earned the second ACC Coach of the Year award in 2005 while Bob Braman was recognized for his stellar year in

cross country (2004 NCAA South Region Coach of the Year) and both indoor and outdoor track and field when he was named the ACC Coach of the Year as well as region Coach of the Year in both sports.

In The Community...

Seminole student-athletes are committed to making a positive impact on the community, serving almost 4,500 hours of community service during the 2004-05 school year. They also helped raise thousands of dollars in direct support to charities.

FSU student-athletes have volunteered their time working with students from every elementary and middle school in Leon County as well as schools in nearby Wakulla and Gadsden Counties. In addition, the Seminoles have participated in projects such as Habitat for Humanity, Relay for Life and Special Olympics, just to name a few.

Postgraduate Scholarships...

Florida State student-athletes have earned over \$300,000 in post-graduate scholarships over the past 10 years. They have also received 21 post-graduate scholarships from the ACC since 1992.

In 1996, Seminole Daryl Bush was the first ever recipient of the State Farm National Scholar Athlete of the Year award, now

given annually.

Florida State boasts two NACDA Post-Graduate Award winners in the last five years. The scholarship, which was originated in 2001, grants

\$10,000 scholarships to its recipients.

In The Classroom...

At the conclusion of the 2004-05 school year, five of Florida State's athletic teams had a 3.0 or better cumulative grade point average. In the spring, 2005 semester, 177 Seminoles achieved a minimum 3.0 semester grade point average while the average team semester GPA was a 2.813.

Since joining the ACC in 1991, FSU has had six National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame National Scholar Athlete Award winners - more than all other ACC schools combined and a figures that ranks nationally in the past 12 years.

In 2001, former Seminole Chris Weinke was the recipient of the first ever ACC Scholar Award which is given annually to an excellent athlete and top scholar. Football's Chris Hope and baseball's Matt Lynch (2003) have also earned the distinction.

Florida State had three student-athletes garner national Academic All-American honors in 2005 when softball junior Natasha Jacob and track and field sophomores Garrett Johnson and Tom Lancashire earned such status. It marked the first time that three FSU student-athletes earned the honor in the same season.

Florida State has more all-time ACC Academic Honor Roll selections (2,014) than All-ACC honorees (1,612). On top of that number, FSU athletes have been named

> National Academic All-Americans 26 times and 24 Florida State student-athletes have received post graduate scholarships.





Top Athletes...

When you consider the top athletes who don the Garnet and Gold, it's easy to see why Florida State has enjoyed such success over the years. Of the 36 national awards for athletic achievements Florida State student-athletes have earned, seven have been for the top athlete in the nation award in their respective sports. Florida State boasts two Heisman Trophy winners, three Golden Spikes winners, a USA Softball National Player of the Year and a Honda Award winner for softball.

From football, to diving, to tennis, to track and field, several of Florida State's student-athletes achieve All-America status

each year. FSU boast 702 first team All-America selections as well as several regional and national award winners. Over the years, FSU has enjoyed 1,612 All-ACC selections. Even more impressive is that 21 student-athletes have been crowned individual national champions in their respective sports.

Great athletes make great teams and Florida State has a rich history when its comes to great teams both on the national and conference level. It has earned 11 national championships over the years. In 1999, the Florida State Seminoles became the first football team to go wire-to-wire as the Associated Press' No. 1 team when the squad went 12-0 on its way to the program's second national championship. FSU teams have combined for 130 NCAA Tournament appearances and 32 ACC team titles. Florida State's team sports have earned 7,977 victories and eight of Florida State's team sports have an all-time winning record.
