


N. B. "Bim" Stults Aquatic Center

Count Florida State's N. B. "Bim" Stults Aquatic Center among the best in America, following a massive \$1 million renovation this past year which refurbished both the pool and locker room facilities.

The construction of a moveable bulkhead, which allows almost total water flow-through, has created a competition area which ranges in depth from five to 16 feet — making it one of the fastest in the South. Heated between 80 and 82 degrees year-round, the pool itself sports two standard 25-yard collegiate courses which have eight lanes set in a 60-foot wide area. With outside lanes two feet from the wall they are as fast as the middle lanes. The same holds true for the 50-meter "long course."

In addition, the pool is equipped with Keefer lane lines at both the 25-yard and 50-meter distances. Three underwater windows are available for stroke analysis and filming. The recently installed stainless steel gutters are extremely deep.

"We are really proud of our swimming and diving facility," says head coach Bill Shults. "The new course layout has made it bullet-fast and one of the quickest in the South. With the recent renovations complete, we now have a first class facility to go along with our championship goals."

The diving areas at the center meet or exceed published specifications as outlined by the NCAA. FSU's diving areas include a pair of one meter boards, one three meter board and a 10-meter tower. All three boards are mounted on Durafirm fulcrums and the tower possesses platforms at five, seven and a half, and ten meters — each with new coco matting. The diving facilities also include a new porta pit/trampoline practice area located just a few feet from the competition boards.

Located conveniently on the FSU campus, the entire facility is named after legendary former Florida State swimming coach N. B. "Bim" Stults, and is home to both FSU swimming teams, as well as being the center for many physical education and recreational activities.

HEAD COACH Bill Shults

After only one year as head coach of the Florida State men's swimming program, Bill Shults is already making a name for himself as a successful coach as well as an administrator within the governing bodies of the sport.

In his initial season as head coach last year, he led the Seminoles to a first place finish at the Canadian Cup Championship. On the administration level, he has recently been voted President of the Metro Conference/National Independent Swimming Coaches Association in addition to serving as chairman of the Academic Committee for the College Swimming Coaches Association of America.

Only the fourth head coach in FSU's 38-year old program, Shults succeeded John Stafford at the position after serving as an assistant for three years. He was responsible for bringing some of the top swimmers in the country to FSU as Stafford's chief assistant and recruiting coordinator.

Before joining the Seminole program in 1979, Shults served as head swimming coach at the University of New Hampshire, his alma mater. In a single season at UNH, Shults was credited with recruiting the finest freshman class in the school's history.

Other coaching experience includes a year as head water polo and assistant swimming coach at Trinity College in Hartford, Conn. Shults' duties at Trinity included working with both the men's and women's swim teams.

He began his coaching experience in his senior year at New Hampshire, where he served as JV water polo and assistant swimming coach for Phillips Exeter Academy in Exeter, NH. While at Exeter, he helped coach the school to its fifth consecutive New England Interscholastic Championship.

As a butterfly and individual medley specialist at New Hampshire, Shults lettered four seasons — as well as being named captain his senior season.

"Our goal is to bring Florida State Swimming into the national spotlight," Shults says. "At FSU, we have the potential to attract the top athletes. If we can continue to recruit these athletes with reasonable success we will improve our chances of attaining national prominence. Working hard, swimming fast and having fun are our day-to-day objectives, with strong performances at the NCAA Championship Meet our overall objective of the season. Of equal importance to me is the academic progress being made by our swimmers. In recruiting, we promise our candidates an excellent university education and personal assistance throughout their programs of study. Thus far, we have kept those promises, and I am determined to see that we continue to do so."

A 1976 graduate of New Hampshire's school of physical education, Shults is currently working on a master's degree in education at Florida State. The 29-year-old Shults is married to

the former Linda Carlton.



ASSISTANT COACH Guy Bergeron

Guy Bergeron, a 28-year-old native of Drummondville, Quebec, Canada, is the newest member of the FSU Swimming Staff. Bergeron comes to Tallahassee after two years as a head club coach in Dollar-Des-Oranoux, a suburb of Montreal. While with the Dollar club.

Bergeron coached two of his swimmers to spots on the youth national team. Over his two-year tenure, the club broke five provincial records and set a pair of Canadian marks. The squad ended last year's campaign ranked 14th.

Prior to the Dollar assignment, Bergeron spent one year at the Montreal Aquatic Club, and another in Regina, Saskatchewan, working with former Australian Olympic Coach, Harry Gallagher.

During his days as a competitive swimmer, Bergeron was a member of the 1974 Quebec Team, performing the 200 IM and 100 backstroke events.

Described as "a strong stroke technician" by Head Coach Bill Shults, Bergeron will concentrate his efforts on the FSU distance program, as well as working with the IMers.



Gary Cole

Gary Cole is in his second year as diving coach for both the men's and women's programs at Florida State. Last season he won NIC Women's Coach of the Year honors in his initial campaign. A graduate of Bowling Green University, Cole came to Florida State from Auburn

University where he served as head diving coach for both men's and women's teams for three and one-half years.

Prior to the Auburn assignment, Cole worked one year as assistant diving coach at Michigan State University, as well as coaching for three additional years at the Tulip City Diving Club in Holland, Mich.

While at Tulip, six of Cole's pupils earned high school All-American acclaim; with one winning a national title. At Auburn, six of Cole's divers made it to the finals of the U.S. Senior National Championships.

Distinguished among his peers, Cole is a member of the NCAA Rules Committee for Diving as well as the U.S. Diving Law Legislation Committee. He is also in charge of all clinics for the U.S. Diving Coaches Association.

A standout diver in high school, Cole was coached by Ron O'Brien, U.S. Olympic diving coach since 1972.

John Moorman, Coaching Assistant — A native of Miami, Fla., John is in his third year of association with the FSU swimming program. A former four-year letterman at Miami Columbus High, Moorman was a butterfly specialist for the Seminoles during his freshman year at the Tallahassee school. The 21-year old junior is majoring in computer science at Florida State.

Carol Cronin, Coaching Assistant — A senior communications major, Carol begins her second year as an assistant with the Seminole Swimming program after coming to FSU from Indian River Community College. She previously spent two years as a swimming assistant at IRCC. Cronin, 21, swam for seven years as an AAU participant and for John Carroll High in Ft. Pierce, Fla.

Dave Costello, Trainer — Dave is in his second year of association with the FSU athletic training staff and his first with the Seminole swimming team. He will serve as trainer for the FSU men's program both at home and on the road. An athletic training major at Florida State, Costello works in the Department of Athletics under the supervision of veteran trainer Don Fauls, assistant trainer Randy Oravetz and graduate assistant Sam Lunt. Costello, a junior, is a native of Orlando.

Steve Marble, Manager — A former sprint freestyler for the Seminoles, Marble begins his first season as team manager for the FSU swim program. Selected Most Valuable Swimmer as a senior at Plantation (Fla.) High School, Marble has been named to the Dean's List at FSU while majoring in accounting. He is a junior.

1983-84 Outlook

Generally Speaking — At the turn of this new decade, FSU's swimming program received a commitment from the University that it would receive the support it needed to build a national calibre program. After three excellent recruiting seasons, combined with hard work and the addition of a "new" swim complex, Florida State looks well on the road to its goal of establishing a tradition and eventual top 20 status. A cast of qualifying hopefuls for the U.S. Olympic trials will form the nucleus of the Tribe attack. Dave DeGruchy, a transfer from North Carolina State, is the most tested and proven. He sat out last year per NCAA transfer regulations but placed 13th at NCAA's two years ago. By no means will this year's team be a consistent force. How they gel during the dual meet season will spell their fate.

Sprints — **50/100 Freestyle** — David Shropshire enters the campaign as a co-captain but is still untested here. Victor Creighton, Dan Akre and Mike Kowalski are all green, but will challenge. No distinct hierarchy in these events. Coach Bill Shults is looking for some pleasant surprises. Could be critical area when relay time comes around.

Middle Distance — 200/500 Freestyle — Dan Niemer is back as the school record holder in both events (1:40.01; 4:30.07). Newcomers Todd Barry and John Danko along with senior Ed Coryell will balance things out. Justus Breese, Jeff Waldrop and Akre, as well as some distance men, will see action here.

Distance — 1,000/1,650 Freestyle — Niemer is the school record holder in the 1,000 as well (9:29.45) but will concentrate on other events this year. Taking the stage in his absence will be highly recruited freshmen Tim Boozer, Scott Rainey and Steve Roberts, who will make up the first solid distance group at FSU in quite a long time.

Backstroke — 100/200 — Clarke Morris returns after reaching USS championships the past two years. He has been the most consistent but the No. 1 spot is as yet unclaimed. Niemer, Waldrop and Bill Dornbach are all in the running along with Morris.

Breaststroke — 100/200 — Akre, the 100-yard record holder (57.40), will lead a solid group of breaststrokers including freshman Jon Ballard. Senior Chris Chain will add strength here as well.

Butterfly — 100/200 — Potentially the strongest event with the emergence of DeGruchy. Breese is back as a USS qualifier and further competition will come from sophomore Syd Lovelace and newcomer Bobby Bowman.

Individual Medley — 200/400 — Akre holds the school record in the 200 event (1:51.58) but will be pushed this year by DeGruchy. These two are the frontrunners but doing some pushing of their own will be Waldrop, Niemer, Ballard and Lovelace. Distance personnel like Roberts will be looked upon in the 400 event. DeGruchy, Waldrop, Niemer, Coryell and Breese are others to look for here.

Relays — 400 Medley/400 Freestyle/800 Freestyle — Here are the ingredients needed to brew success in the medley event: a backstroker emerging from the pack, along with consistent times from sprint breaststrokers Ballard and Akre. DeGruchy must come up with a tough leg in the fly, and a surprise from the sprint group will be needed to anchor the effort. If the ingredients are mixed carefully, the recipe calls for All-American possibilities. The 400 free will be a critical area with unproven, untested freestylers. This one could go either way. The 800 free unit could be very strong with this year's solid group of middle distance performers.

Diving — **One and Three Meter** — Chris McGregor was the only Seminole to qualify for last year's conference meet. The addition of Phil Hahn, Daniel Polnasek, Dave Lehman and Larry Hoke, however, should produce more points this goround. Everyone in this group is talented, though still learning. Leadership will be provided by the veteran, McGregor. Plenty of competition for NCAA's will come from close by. The Southeast region is considered the toughest as far as NCAA qualifying zones are concerned. This year's goal is to sweep the conference.





This is Florida State



Florida State University, nestled in the center of Florida's capital city, is home to more than 22,000 students from all over the nation and from 115 foreign countries. FSU was founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee. Today, the main campus, with more than 340 green acres, is one of the prettiest in the South.

Camellias, azaleas and dogwoods blossom under towering moss-draped oaks. From the stately Gothic-styled structures on the eastern end of the campus to the contemporary science complex on the west, FSU has grown and changed with the times. Enrollment has quadrupled since the school became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as FSCW — Florida State College for Women.

Today, students at Florida State can choose from more than 100 career options made available by 14 schools and colleges including arts and sciences, business, communications, criminology, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theatre and visual arts. Also, the FAMU/FSU Institute of Engineering began this fall.

The University's location in the capital city of Florida affords excellent study and research opportunities in the areas of government, social sciences and policy sciences. Additionally, the presence of state government provides widespread opportunities for internships and on-the-job study.

When it comes to the performing arts, Florida State ranks among the best schools in the nation.

The School of Theatre is recognized nationally for its leadership and training of talented young people. Burt Reynolds, acclaimed for his work with aspiring theatre professionals at the Reynolds Institute for Theatre Training in Jupiter, Florida, is an adjunct professor of professional and regional theatre at FSU.

The Department of Dance is ranked as one of the top five in

The University is home to the only collegiate circus in the country, the Flying High Circus carries a reputation of quality, professional aerial and stage entertainment for children of all

When it comes to intercollegiate athletics, Florida State has established a winning tradition. The athletic program, including both men's and women's athletics, is among the top 20 in the nation.

But it's not just good programs that make the University great. As President Bernard Sliger proclaims, it is the people who make Florida State the successful monument to learning that it is. He takes special pride in the people — students, faculty, administrators and staff — who are Florida State University.

Nature of Excellence in FSU Academic Programs

One of the most promising developments in the academic picture in this university over the past two or three years has been the development of three significant programs. Last fall (1982) the university opened its Institute of Engineering jointly sponsored with Florida A&M. A faculty is being hired and a Dean is being chosen. The engineering program has been well financed by our Legislature and promises to be one of outstanding quality. The second one is the newly funded, broadly expanded program in Computer Science. The Florida Legislature has recently given the university a sizable amount of money to expand its already excellent program. It is probable that this university will offer the finest program in Computer Science in the south within the next two or three years.

Closely related to these new programs is the starting growth of yet another. The program in Hotel and Restaurant Management, part of the School of Business, has been given a great deal of added funding by the Legislature and from private sources. Already ranked in the top 5 programs of its kind in the United States, Hotel and Restaurant Management at this university will soon rival those at Cornell and Michigan State.

One of the continuing strengths of this university is offerings of the "hard sciences." The programs in Chemistry and Physics both have Nobel Laureates among their faculty members. The program in Biology ranks in the top 10 in the United States, and the program in Meteorology has shown international leadership, especially through the work of the late Seymour Hess who directed the Apollo mission in 1976. Closely related to the program in Biology are those of Marine Biology and Oceanography. These are new, growing programs, which have already gained national esteem. An outgrowth of the total science offerings is the Program in Medical Science, a specially prepared curriculum for those students who enter premedical training.

The School of Business is reputed to be one of the strongest in this region. Besides the previously mentioned program in Hotel and Restaurant Management, the departments of Accounting, Marketing, Finance, Business Administration, and Risk and Insurance rank high among business schools in the United States. This is especially true of the Department of Accounting which is ranked among the top in the country. The students graduating from the School of Business at this university are well received throughout the country.

The program in Movement Science and Physical Education is extremely strong having recently been ranked third in the country among doctoral granting institutions and as having one of the seven best undergraduate teacher education programs in the country. Students graduating from the programs at Florida State have gone to positions of leadership throughout the country.

There is also strength at the University in Humanities. The Schools of Visual Arts, Theatre and Music ranked among the best in the United States. The Theatre program, heavily financed by Burt Reynolds and the late Charles McCarthur, is ranked as one of the top theatre programs nationally. The same can be said for the School of Music. In general, these schools contribute not only to the academic prestige of the university, but present artistic performances much enjoyed by faculty, students, visitors, alumni and members of the local community.

It would be difficult to mention all of the outstanding programs to be found in this institution. Some mention, however, should be made of the Statistics Department which is highly ranked. This is also true of the Department of History, the School of Criminology and the program in Urban Planning. In general, it can be said that the academic posture of Florida State University is strong and continues to grow with increased support of the Legislature and private sources.
