

## **Media Information**

#### Credentials

Required for all events where an admission is charged. Please contact the sports information office at least one week before event to be covered. Space for the working press, radio, television and scouts is allocated by the Sports Information Office.

#### **Press Parking**

Passes not required except for games at the Leon County Civic Center. For those events, make request at same time credentials are issued. Ample parking may be found in Doak Campbell stadium lots for baseball games and around Tully Gym area for basketball, track, and tennis events.

#### **Photographers**

Only accredited photographers will be issued working credentials. All still photographers must shoot from designated areas. Space for video cameras for certain events will be assigned by the Sports Information Office.

### **Statistical Services**

Complete statistics will be provided for all basketball and baseball games. Additional services will be provided as requested for all other events.

#### **Telecopiers**

Two telecopiers are owned by the Sports Information Office. These will be made available on a first come - first served basis, free of charge.

#### **Telephones**

Telephone service for visiting radio stations should be secured directly through Centel Telephone Company of Florida, phone (904) 222-2236. For baseball, Seminole Flagship Station WTNT radio has installed a visitor's radio line that may be used free of charge on a reciprocal basis. Call (904) 386-6143 for more information.

#### **Interviews**

All interviews with Florida State coaches and athletes should be arranged through the Sports Information Office. For phone interviews, the SID office will fill out a call card, instructing the athlete who to call and at what time the call should be placed. All athlete calls to the media will be on a collect basis.

This is another sport in which Florida State has been represented in the NCAA playoffs. So popular is the game in Tallahassee and so powerful is the FSU program, that plans are in the works to host a regional playoff.

Baseball at Florida State has long been the pacesetter among the nation's colleges. The reasons why go back to the program's roots. Never has a Seminole baseball team had a losing record. Only two schools have appeared in more NCAA Regionals; and all of that against the toughest schedule in college baseball. Such a showcase of the sport it is, that Florida State plays it's games in a shining million dollar baseball park, unmatched in this part of the country. A Seminole baseball player spends 11 months a year playing the game, with fall, summer and spring programs affording him the opportunity to play an incredible 150 games a year.

The Lady Seminoles recently added the latest of the national titles to the heritage by winning the 1984 NCAA Championships in Eugene, Ore. Incredibly, they had finished third and second in the two previous years. Members of the Lady Seminole track team have earned 51 All-American titles since 1982. Not, only the leader in its own state, this team has won The Metro Confrence title for eight consecutive years. 

# 1984-85 FSU MEN'S SWIMMING

With a strong recruiting year and the return of some of last season's outstanding performers, the Florida State swimming program looks ready to continue its climb to an eventual Top 20 ranking. To many, last year's record may seem a disappointment, but swimming against a host of nationallyranked opponents, the Seminoles broke five school records and finished second behind only South Carolina in the Metro Conference Championships. The Seminoles will be led this season by world-class breaststroker Dan Akre. Joining Akre in the Seminoles' upswing will be a core of veterans from last year's Metro runner-up and a strong recruiting class which has already proven its worth in the fall season. Once again the Tribe will battle many of the top teams in the country both in dual meet competition and in invitationals such as the Canada Cup and the Southern Intercollegiate Championships. Head coach Bill Shults believes his team's depth will be its strength. In most events, the Seminoles are solid from top to bottom and can put at least a pair of quality swimmers into the water for any race.

SPRINTS (50/100 Free) - Knowing a good sprint freestyle can really help a team's chances, the Seminoles will look to remove this question mark from their ledger. It's a wide open event and many people have a chance to contribute. Canadian Pat McConnell comes to FSU as the 1981 National Champion in the 50 free and is expected to lead the way. Junior co-captain Mike Kowalski should also provide some help in these events.

MIDDLE DISTANCE (200/500 Free) - Gone is school record holder Dan Niemer. What remains is a group of good swimmers who will have to come up with some great times. Lettermen Todd Barry and Tim Boozer will provide the strength for these races. Shults is also looking for some help from recruits Mike Halfacre, Davy Stevens, and Pat Owens.

DISTANCE (1,000/1,650) - Boozer is the only returnee from last year's distance group and will be counted on for quality times in this area. Also expected to provide support will be freshmen Stevens, Owens and Ted Durst.

BACKSTROKE (100/200) - The Seminoles appear to be deep in the back events with Mike Kowalski returning. Kowalski qualified for Nationals last season as sophomore. Transfer Richard Morris and freshman Charlie Oberst provide the quality depth that could make this a high pointscoring area for the Seminoles.

BREASTSTROKE (100/200) - This is potentially FSU's best event. Depth-wise, it is probably the toughest and deepest. Led by school record holder Dan Akre, the Seminoles look solid from top to bottom. Backing Akre are Canadian Marc LaPalme and highly regarded freshman Brian Summe. Sophomore John Galloway and freshmen Jim Boedeker, Andrew Kung, and Eric Smith round out the group that should prove formidable to beat.

BUTTERFLY (100/200) - With time Coach Shults believes this group of flyers could be as good as last year's outstanding corps. For the FSU program to succeed this year, consistent points need to come from this area. LaPalme, Durst, Owens, and Pete Freiberger lead the charge for the Seminoles. Sophomore Bobby Bowman should also help the Tribe attack in the fly.

INDIVIDUAL MEDLEY (200/400) - Akre is the former school record holder and has been a national finalist in the 200. Jeff Waldrop is also counted on to take up the slack from the loss of several of last year's IMers. In the 400, Richard Morris is the frontrunner with Galloway and Summe providing depth and support.

**RELAYS (400** Medley/400 Free/800 Free) - The Seminoles currently have two strong legs in the back and breast sections. If a good sprint flyer can be developed and a solid free swimmer found, an NCAA scoring opportunity is not out of the question.

In the sprint free relay, any of a number of Seminoles have a chance. Kowalski, Waldrop, McConnell, Halfacre and Akre are among those looking for a spot in this foursome.

The 800 free is potentially the best of the three relays for FSU. Led by Todd Barry and Halfacre, this should be a solid race on the Seminole program.

DIVING (One and three meter) - After his best recruiting year since he arrived at Florida State, diving coach Gary Cole is expecting good things from his young quintet of divers. Two freshmen, two sophomores and a junior make up the group that Cole hopes will challenge for the Metro Conference titles. Sophomore David Lehman and Canadian Benoit Seguin lead the diving hopes for this season.

Head Coach

After only two years as head coach of the Florida State men's swimming program, Bill Shults is already making a name for himself as a successful coach as well as an administrator within the governing bodies of the sport.

In his initial season as head coach last year, he led the Seminoles to a first place finish at the Canadian Cup Championship. Last season his Seminoles finished second in the Metro Conference Championships and are strong contenders for the title this year. On the administrative level, he is a past President of the Metro Conference/National Independent Swimming Coaches Association in addition to serving as chairman of the Academic Committee for the College Swimming Coaches Association of America.

Only the fourth head coach in FSU's 38-year-old program, Shults succeeded John Stafford at the position after serving as an assistant for three years. He was responsible for bringing some of the top swimmers in the country to FSU as Stafford's chief assistant and recruiting coordinator.

Before joining the Seminole program in 1979, Shults served as head swimming coach at the University of New Hampshire, his alma mater. In a single season at UNH, Shults was credited with recruiting the finest freshman class in the school's history.

Other coaching experience includes a year as head water polo and assistant swimming coach at Trinity College in Hartford, Connecticut. Shults' duties at Trinity College included working with both the men's and women's swim teams.

He began his coaching experience in his senior year at New Hampshire, where he served as JV water polo and assistant swimming coach for Phillips Exeter Academy in Exeter, New Hampshire. While at Exeter, he helped coach the school to its fifth consecutive New England Interscholastic Championship.

As a butterfly and individual medley specialist at New Hampshire, Shults lettered four seasons - as well as being named captain his senior season.

"Our goal is to bring Florida State Swimming into the national spotlight," Shults says. "At FSU, we have the potential to attract the top athletes. If we can continue to recruit these athletes with reasonable success we will improve our chances of attaining national prominence. Working hard, swimming fast and having fun are our day-to-day objectives, with strong performances at the NCAA Championship Meet our overall objective of the season. Of equal importance to me is the academic progress being made by our swimmers. In recruiting, we promise our candidates an excellent university education and personal assistance throughout their programs of study. Thus far, we have kept those promises, and I am determined to see that we continue to do so."

A 1976 graduate of New Hampshire's school of physical education, Shults is currently working on a master's degree in education at Florida State. The 30-year-old Shults is married to the former Linda Carlton.



GUY BERGERON Assistant Coach

Guy Bergeron enters his second year on the Florida State swimming staff. A 29-year-old native of Drummondville, Quebec, Canada, Bergeron came to FSU after two years as a head club coach in Dollar-Des-Ormaux, a suburb of Montreal.

As assistant coach, Bergeron's primary responsibilities include the planning and implementing of water workouts with an emphasis on the distance program. His other duties are assigned by the head coach.

While with the Dollar club, Bergeron coached two of his swimmers to spots on the youth national team. Over his two-year tenure, the club broke five provincial records and set a pair of Canadian marks. In his last season, the squad ended its campaign ranked 14th.

Prior to the Dollar assignment, Bergeron spent one year at the Montreal Aquatic Club, and another in Regina, Saskatchewan, working with former Australian Olympic Coach Harry Gallagher.

During his days as a competitive swimmer, Bergeron was a member of the 1974 Quebec Team, performing the 200 IM and 100 backstroke events.

Bergeron is currently working on credits to receive his degree in psychology.



GARY COLE Diving Coach

Gary Cole enters his third season as diving coach for both the men's and women's programs at Florida State. In his initial campaign, he was named NIC Diving Coach of the Year. A graduate of Bowling Green University, Cole has been involved in coaching for 12 years.

Before coming to FSU, Cole was head diving coach at Auburn University for three and a half years. Prior to the Auburn assignment, Cole worked one year as assistant coach at Michigan State University, as well as coaching for three additional years at the Tulip City Diving Club in Holland, Michigan.

In his dozen years in the coaching field, he has developed both outstanding individuals and programs. He has coached six high school All-Americans and has had finalists at every level of age group on up to U.S. Nationals. Cole had three former pupils participate in the 1984 Canadian Olympic Trials, all finishing in the top eight. In addition, he has coached two age group champions, the most recent a three-time champion this past summer.

Distinguished among his peers, Cole is a member of the NCAA Rules Committee for Diving as well as the U.S. Professional Diving Coaches Association. He has also traveled as a coach to several International meets.

A standout diver in high school, Cole was coached by Ron O'Brien, the U.S. Olympic coach since 1972.

## **EXCELLENCE IN ACADEMICS**

One of the most promising developments in the academic picture in this university over the past two or three years has been the development of three significant programs. Last fall (1982) the university opened its Institute of Engineering jointly sponsored with Florida A&M. A faculty is being hired and a Dean is being chosen. The engineering program has been well financed by our Legislature and promises to be one of outstanding quality. The second one is the newly funded broadly expanded program in Computer Science. The Florida Legislature had recently given the university a sizable amount of money to expand its already excellent program. It is probable that this university will offer the finest program in Computer Science in the south within the next two or three years.

Closely related to these new programs is the starting growth of yet another. The program in Hotel and Restaurant Management, part of the School of Business, has been given a great deal of added funding by the Legislature and from private sources. Already ranked in the top 5 programs of its kind in the United States, Hotel and Restaurant Management at this university will soon rival those at Cornell and Michigan State.

One of the continuing strengths of this university is offerings of the "hard sciences." The programs in Chemistry and Physics both have Nobel Laureates among their faculty members. The program in Biology ranks in the top 10 in the United States, and the program in Meteorology has shown international leadership, especially through the work of the late Seymour Hess who directed the Apollo mission in 1976. Closely related to the program in Biology are those of Marine Biology and Oceanography. These are new, growing programs, which have already gained national esteem. An outgrowth of the total science offerings is the Program in Medical Science, a specially prepared curriculum for those students who enter premedical training.

The School of Business is reputed to be one of the strongest in this region. Besides the previously mentioned program in Hotel and Restaurant Management, the departments of Accounting, Marketing, Finance, Business Administration, and Risk and Insurance rank high among business schools in the United States. This is especially true of the Department of Accounting which is ranked among the top in the country. The students graduating from the School of Business at this university are well received throughout the country.

The program in Movement Science and Physical Education is extremely strong having recently been ranked third in the country among doctoral granting institutions and as having one of the seven best undergraduate teacher education programs in the country. Students graduating from the programs at Florida State have gone to positions of leadership throughout the country.

There is also strength at the University in Humanities. The Schools of Visual Arts, Theatre and Music ranked among the best in the United States. The Theatre program, heavily financed by Burt Reynolds and the late Charles McCarthur, is ranked as one of the top theatre programs nationally. The same can be said for the School of Music. In general, these schools contribute not only to the academic prestige of the university, but present artistic performances much enjoyed by faculty, students, visitors, alumni and members of the local community.

It would be difficult to mention all of the outstanding programs to be found in this institution. Some mention, however, should be made of the Statistics Department which is highly ranked. This is also true of the Department of History, the School of Criminology and the program in Urban Planning. In general, it can be said that the academic posture of Florida State University is strong and continues to grow with increased support of the Legislature and private sources.


# **Athletic Facilities**








Among many interesting facets, Florida State boasts the only Collegiate circus in the world.








# **Tallahassee**

Since his arrival in Tallahassee, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities, including the Moore Athletic Center...Home of Florida State athletics.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Alabama, Ingram played for the Crimson Tide from 1951 through 1954 and led the nation in interceptions as a sophomore. He also lettered in baseball as an infielder. Following a stint in the army, Ingram turned to coaching. After several years of high school coaching, Ingram moved into collegiate athletics; making assistant coaching stops at Wake Forrest, Virgina Tech, Georgia and Arkansas.

**Bob Goin** Associate Athletic Director



A member of the Florida State athletic staff since 1981, Bob Goin begins his fourth full year as Associate Athletic Director.

All men's non-revenue coaches report to Goin and he also assists Director Ingram in the day-to-day operations of the athletic department. A large portion of football, basketball and baseball game day operations fall under his leadership.

A 1959 graduate of Bethany College, Goin recieved his master's degree from West Virgina in 1961. From 1960-76, Goin served Bethany in several administrative and coaching capacities, before moving on to West Virgina as an assistant athletic director. He was named athletic director at California (Pa.) State College in 1980, where he formed that institutions first scholarship fund for athletics and the college's first booster club.

# **Charles W. Ehrhardt**Faculty Athletic Committee Chairman



A Florida State University professor of law, Charles W. Ehrhardt is in his first year as Chairman of the Athletic Committee.

He is currently in his second stint on the committee, serving from 1969-71 and then being reappointed to the board in 1983. As chairman, Ehrhardt suceeds Dr. James Jones, who served in that capacity since 1980. Ehrhardt becomes Florida State's representative to the NCAA.

A native of Elkander, Iowa, Ehrhardt received his bachelor's degree from Iowa in 1962, before earning a law degree at Iowa State two years later. He came to Florida State in 1967.

A widely respected expert in the field of Evidence, Ehrhardt is frequently called on to lecture on the subject by lawyers and judges nationwide.

**Barbara Palmer** Associate Athletic Director



Barbara Palmer has been with Florida State athletic program since 1977. As Associate Athletic Director. Palmer is in charge of the women's athletic program and also holds the title of women's athletic director.

Since her arrival, the Florida State Lady Seminoles program has been recognized as one of the strongest in the country...with four national championship teams in the last four years (track, 1984; softball, 1981-82; and golf 1981). In 1982, all eight varsity sports went to national tournaments...one of only two schools to make the claim nationwide.

A 1970 graduate of Florida State, Palmer has been recognized as the driving force behind FSU's climb toward national excellence. Palmer headed a lobbying effort that pushed Title IX legislation through state government and she is directly responsible for state funding women's athletic recieves each year.
