

1989-90 TENNIS OUTLOOK

Last year was a year that saw the South Carolina Gamecocks dominate the Metro Conference Tournament with the Seminoles finishing a distant second. All that could change this year as FSU could be a top contender for the Metro crown.

The Seminoles return four of last years top six players and have added a two-time NAIA All-American to their arsenal. With these facts in mind it may be a year to remember for the Seminoles netters.

Seminoles hopes are boosted with the arrival of transfer Stephen Noteboom from Huntingdon College in Birmingham, Alabama. The 6'2" junior is a two-time NAIA All-American and has finished each of the past two seasons in the top ten of the NAIA singles rankings. Noteboom was a top five player in the junior rankings in his native Holland and may take over the number one singles position immediately. He recently won the Sandestin Invitational Tournament and was the runner-up in the Barnett Bank Fall Invitational.

Noteboom could be challenged for the number one position by junior Scott Shields. The Sarasota native played at the number one position for the majority of last season, posting a 22-16 record and gaining valuable experience. Shields had been ranked as highly as number 28 in the collegiate rankings before falling from the polls toward the end of the year.

Shields is but one of the four returning players from last years lineup. Greg Gusky could be a force to contend with. Gusky posted the best record on the team last year playing from the number three singles position at 27-8. Gusky finished as the Consolation Champion at the recent Barnett Bank Fall Invitational and looks like a strong contender for the number three singles title at the Metro Tourney this year.

Other returning players to watch include Neil Krefsky, who spent last season at number two singles, Adam Schwartz, who logged playing time at the number three, four, five, and six positions last year, and Chris Durham and Bryan Lafferman, who played lightly last year but figure to crack the top six this season. Newcomers Kirk White and Don Blair will add valuable depth to the already potent Seminole lineup.

Doubles hold the key to Seminole success in the upcoming campaign. No doubles teams have been set in stone as of yet but Seminole coach Richard McKee will be able to use the Fall tournaments as a testing ground for possible combinations.

All in all, McKee has a lot to smile about. The future looks bright for the Seminole netters.

Florida State head coach Richard McKee enters his seventh season at the Seminole helm with strong hopes for the 1990 edition of FSU Men's Tennis.

Last year the team put together a respectable 19-12 mark while finishing second to a very strong South Carolina squad at the Metro Tournament. The team was extremely young and should benefit greatly from the experience it gained last year. This year the team is again young but the players all have some collegiate experience behind them. It promises to be an exciting season in Tallahassee.

In a collegiate and professional playing career, as well as coaching experience, McKee has seen tennis at all levels. At Florida State he has seen the ups and downs of collegiate tennis. Through it all, he has amassed a 108-57 overall record at FSU winning his 100th match last March against Columbia. Individually, he has produced NCAA participants that are currently enjoying success in the pro ranks. Former Seminole Paul Haarhuis recently shocked the tennis world by defeating John McEnroe, the #4 seed at this years U.S. Open 6-4, 4-6, 6-3, 7-5. The win moved the 23 year old into the top 100 for the first time in his career. Joey Rive, another FSU alumnus, is also ranked among the top 100.

McKee's success at FSU comes as no suprise. He has achieved excellence at all levels of collegiate tennis, beginning with his playing days at North Carolina. While earning his bachelors degree in history he was a standout for the Tarheel netters. He posted an 85-12 record playing at positions one through four in the North Carolina lineup. During his college career McKee won two ACC Championships, was named top the NCAA All American team three times, and was a NCAA Doubles finalist in 1973.

The Seminole mentor is married to the former Mary Kay Jeter of Jackson-ville and has three children – Kendall, 9, Scottie, 7, and R.J., 3.

Tech in 1987 after playing lightly at the number six position



NEIL KREFSKY 5-8, SOPHOMORE STATEN ISLAND, NY

Spent most of last year at the number two singles position, posting a respectable 17-12 record at that position ... should be able to find a steady place in the Seminole lineup ... one to watch for the future says McKee ... undefeated in his last three years of high school tennis ... reached the round of eight in the Men's National Amateur Championships in the summer of 1988 from a field of 128 ... has been ranked as high

as number 70 in the nation as a junior player ... while in the 16-and-under group once played against Andre Agassi ... roommate of Seminole team member Greg Gusky ... majoring in accounting

JOHN STUPKA 6-1, SOPHOMORE MIAMI, FL



FSU AND THE METRO CONFERENCE

The Metro Conference, originally called the Metro Six, was formed on June 13, 1975. Charter members included the University of Cincinnati, Georgia Tech, the University of Louisville, Memphis State University, St. Louis University and Tulane University.

Expansion was on the horizon. League membership increased to seven as Florida State University was admitted on July 28, 1976. After Georgia Tech left the conference following the 1977-78 season, Virginia Tech quickly filled the void. When St. Louis left the Metro, the University of South Carolina joined in 1983 to increase the membership to eight schools. However, Tulane forfeited its membership when its basketball program was discontinued following the 1984-85 season.

At the present, 13 league championships are decided. Men's sports include baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, swimming, tennis and track. Women participate in basketball, cross country, golf, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

The Metro Conference has come a long way in 12 short years. Effective leadership and aggressive promotion have become the trademarks of its administration while the accomplishments of its athletic teams are now recognized in all sports.

THIS-IS FSU

Florida State University, home of the world's fastest supercomputer, is setting the pace as higher education in the state prepares to enter the 21st century. The FSU Supercomputer Computations Research Institute attracts international attention with scientists from many nations using the University's two powerful supercomputers in their research.

Located in Tallahassee, the capital of Florida, FSU is a public, coeducational university and a senior member of the State University System. More than 29,000 students are enrolled, representing all 50 states and 100 foreign countries. The University offers more than 250 graduate and undergraduate degrees in its 15 schools and colleges. Outstanding programs in the colleges of arts and sciences, business, communication, education, engineering, home economics, law and social sciences combine with the schools of criminology, library and information studies, music, nursing, social work, theater and visual arts to make Florida State a nationally acclaimed university.

The Florida State campus, located just blocks awary from the state capitol, is beautiful in all seasons. Its 347 acres mirror the picturesque features of the surrounding North Florida region. The buildings are nestled among evergreen live oaks, pines and palms, as well as hardwoods that provide fall color, and dogwoods and azaleas that are covedred with a profusion of springtime blossoms.

Programs in music, dance and theater at Florida State have earned well-deserved national recognition. The visual and performing arts exhibited and produced on campus offer students and the community a wealth of enrichment opportunities.

Student activities at FSU create an important balance between the classroom experience and the personal life of the individual scholar. Honors programs, student government, intramural sports and more than 200 organizations are available for student involvement. Furthermore, the Flying High Circus, the world's only all-collegiate circus makes its home here.

Florida State academic progrms extend well beyond Tallahassee. The FSU Marine Laboratory is located on the Gulf of Mexico, 45 miles away. Students participate in professional training programs at the Asolo State Theater in Sarasota and the Burt Reynolds Institute for Theatre Training in Jupiter. The Panama City Campus of Florida State offers upper-level courses which lead to bachelors and masters degrees. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Florida State Conference Center on the edge of the main campus, manages educational outreach activities from Pensacola to Miami.

It is not only the academic programs and facilities of Florida State, but also the people – students, faculty, alumni, administrators and staff – who make this University such a proud monument to learning.

The Seminoles wish to congratulate PAUL HAARHUIS on his victory over John McEnroe, 6-4, 4-6, 6-3, 7-5 in the 1989 U.S. Open. McEnroe was the number four seed in the tournament while Haarhuis, ranked #115 in the world, was a qualifier.

Congratulations to Paul Haarhuis and Joey Rive for continuing the fine tradition of Florida State tennis.
