



Scott Spiecher Tennis Center

To support the future of Florida State tennis, a new 1.2 million dollar tennis center will grace the FSU campus in the next year. Due to growing popularity and the rise of Seminole tennis, the existing courts no longer satisfy the recreational and Varsity athletic needs of the University.

The state-of-the-art center will house twelve varsity tennis courts as well as 1,332 court level seats. The Scott Speicher Tennis Center will be one of the premier tennis facilities in the country.

The center has been named in the honor of Lieutenant Commander Michael Scott Speicher, a graduate of Florida State University, and the first American casualty of the Operation Desert Storm. By Presidential Directive, the Facilty has been named the "Scott Speicher Tennis Center."

The facility was designed by Emo/Architects, Inc, a Tallahassee based Architectural firm, in collaboration with Global Consult Group, Inc. an internationally recognized Tennis Facility Design Consultant. The complex was funded by a private source and the State University System of Florida.




Consider the position of Head Coach David Barron- three of his top six players are gone from last season's team, construction of a new tennis stadium has displaced his home courts to Tom Brown Park and he faces one of the toughest schedules in recent years. But Barron is taking all these changes in stride. In fact he's optimistic about this season and he sees this year as the year for Florida State tennis to put all the pieces of the tennis puzzle together.

Ever since Barron took over the reigns of the program three years ago, he has been steadily adding the missing pieces that FSU lacked to become a national contender. Through recruiting, Barron has added the new faces that will take the Seminoles to the next level. This season six additions enter the mix, adding a variety of skills ranging from power to finesse to the lineup. Four of the newcomers are freshmen but their resumes hardly resemble those of first year players. Adam Baron, Patrik Filipsson, Scott Schuhriemen and Jason White all have award laden backgrounds, proving that they have the talent to make an impact on the team for years to come. Drew Kirkley and Art Martinez fill out the list of fresh additions although both have previous collegiate experience. played for Georgia Tech and Martinez was the number one player for Odessa Junior College.

Already proving to be a force in collegiate tennis are the four veterans on the team. The quartet of Ken McKenzie, Rick Jacob, Brian Stanton and Dean Ehrlich combined to win over 65% of their dual matches last year. The group has the skills and the knowledge it takes to win.

To help mold and shape the squad this year will be assistant coach Joey Rive. Rive has played on the ATP tour and as Barron says, "Joey thinks like a pro-he will only accept the best you can be and he demonstrates this on the court. His presence is a shot in the arm to the program."

Piecing Barron had added yet another intricate piece to the puzzle over the last two years that has been missing in the past - a national caliber schedule. This season the Seminoles will play more ranked teams than ever before. And some of the stongest competition is in FSU's own backyard. Florida, Miami, Mississippi, Mississippi State and ACC foes North Carolina and Duke all rank in the nation's top 15, making the South and the ACC two of the toughest places in win. Barron is quick to add that a strong schedule is imperative to build the team and get FSU rec-

One of the largest pieces of the puzzle will be the new Scott Speicher Tennis Center at Don Loucks Courts. Expected to be completed in the late Spring, the stadium will be one of the top tennis facilities in the country. The state-of-theart complex will house 12 lighted courtsart and 1,332 seats. It will be a fitting home to one of the nation's premier tennis teams.

David Barron

Head Coach University of Evansville

If the saying is true that recruiting is a prerequisite to winning, then third year

head coach David Barron must have Florida State moving in the right direction. The 31 year old University of Evansville graduate is a tenacious recruiter and has already coached two of his players into the ITA top 100, Stephen Noteboom in 1991 and Ken McKenzie in 1992. This year he has brought in six new players to supplement a team that was 14-9 last season, third place in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Barron, an Evansville native, played on a Junior College National Champion team at the University of Central Florida Community College before graduating in 1981. He then went on to the University of Evansville where he was team MVP in 1983 while earning his Bachelor's degree. Barron stayed at Evansville to complete a Master's in Business Adminstration in 1985.

Barron returned to Florida and worked at Nick Bollettieri's prestigious Tennis Academy. There he met Andy Brandi, who went on to become the head coach of the Florida Gator women's tennis team. Brandi brought Barron to Gainesville in 1985 where they proceeded to lead the Lady Gators to becoming one of the top teams in the country. Although this is only his third year as a head coach, Barron is experienced and confident that he can bring similar results to Tallahassee.

Barron is married to the former Michelle Sharp. He is USPTA (United States Professional Tennis Association) certified. Barron is currently working on his Doctorate in Athletic Adminstration here at Florida State.



Joey Rive
Assistant Coach

One of Florida State's alltime great players, Joey Rive is making his collegiate coaching debut this year

for the Seminole men's tennis team.

Rive played at FSU from 1981-1985 and as a senior was ranked in the top 25 and competed in the NCAA tournament. During his

career he won over 80% of his matches and garnered such honors as being named MVP of the FSU team and MVP of the Metro Conference.

Rive left FSU in 1985 to compete on the ATP tour where he ranked in the top 100 in the world from 1987-1991. At one point, he ranked as high as 55th among all professional tennis players. In 1987 he was named Sportsman of the Year by Tennis Magazine.

Rive is married to the former Kim Shaw, a FSU Masters student in Rehabilitation Counseling. Currently, Rive is continuing work on his bachelors degree in Sociology.






Rick Jacob

Coach Barron on Stanton: "His position this




It's the motto of Florida State strength and conditioning coach Dave Van Halanger and his staff in the FSU weight room. It's also the philosophy that has made Seminole athletes in all sports among the strongest, fastest, fittest and most flexible anywhere.

Thanks to a recent expansion, Florida State athletes now have a state-of-the-art facility in which to accomplish their goals. The weight room grew to 7,200 square feet but is still conveniently located in the Moore Athletic Center. The carpeted and mirrored room includes exercise systems by Cybex Eagle as well as free weight equipment. A variety of exercise bicycles, rowing machines and Stairmasters incorporate both strength and conditioning and cardiovascular endurance.

Strength & Conditioning FSU strength coach Dave Van Halanger has specially designed a weight program for the men's tennis team. The squad which works out three days a week, do strength work on their legs, backs, stomachs, wrists, and forearms. This strength workout along with explosive exercises keep the program closely related to the game of tennis. Van Halanger's well thought out plan helps players on all aspects of their games. He says, "With strength there is added confidence. Also it will help cut down the threat of injuries and give the players a mental edge."

Expectations for the Spring season were high after most of the team posted winning records in tourna-

ments in the Fall. In fact, three players, Ken McKenzie, Brian Stanton and Ford Lankford had titles to their names following the month of October. Ken was crowned the singles champion of the Seminole Fall Classic while Brian and Ford teamed up to win the doubles portion of the same tournament.

The Seminoles started the Spring quickly, notching two quick wins over Rollins and North Florida. FSU's record was evened after the team lost two narrow, disappointing matches to FIU and South Florida. In both matches the Seminoles had been ahead in the match but failed to capitalize on the momentum.

Florida State responded to a loss to the nationally ranked Florida Gators by winning their next two matches. One of the victories was over N.C. State who became FSU's first victory in the ACC.

The season seemed to be marked by a pattern- the team would win two matches, lose the next three and then win again. In early March, Florida State broke the sequence in dramatic fashion. The Seminoles went on a

nine match winning streak that lasted into April.

Included in the streak was a monumental win over the 18th ranked Clemson Tigers on March 26. The match was tied 3-3 following singles and Clemson appeared to be pulling away when they won at No. 1 doubles. However, FSU mounted a comeback taking the next two matches including an exciting three set match won by Ken McKenzie and Eric Ullsten at No. 2 doubles.

Florida State began play in the ACC Championships on April 17 in Charlotte, N.C. The third seeded Seminoles defeated no. 6 Wake Forest 5-3 in the first round to advance to a second round showdown with Duke. The match was deadlocked after singles but Duke captured the victory, winning two of the doubles matches.

Duke Head Coach Jay Lapidus had nothing but praise for Florida State following the season. He said, "Dave (Barron) did a really good job with the team. The Seminoles were overachievers-they were fiesty and mentally tough. I think they are an up and coming team in the ACC and next year they will be competing for the title."

The Seminoles finished the season with a 14-9 overall record and a 6-3 mark and a third place finish in the ACC.

The University . . .

From its beginning as "The Seminary West of the Suwannee" in 1857, Florida State University has grown to stretch across 347 acres of rolling oak and pine-covered hills to comprise a campus which has educated millions of students over the last century.

Florida State University has boasted a heritage of service and scholarship since the beginning when the legislature passed an act authorizing two state colleges — one east (now University of Florida) and one west of the meandering Suwannee River.

Starting with a 130-member coed enrollment in 1857, the Seminary survived the Civil War, reconstruction, radical social changes, and a variety of name changes to emerge in 1909 as the Florida State College for Women.

It was helped back into coed status in 1947 by a legislature anxious to open up the state's educational resources to thousands of degree-seeking ex-GI's from World War II. It also was granted a new name "Florida State University." The University's expanse and complexity today contrast vividly with its beginning. Sixteen schools and colleges within the University serve more than 29,000 students who are enrolled in the 276 graduate and undergraduate degree programs and live and work among 1,300 faculty and 2,600 staff members. About 5,000 degrees are awarded every year.

In the past several years, the University has joined an elite group of universities in the United States which produce more than 200 doctoral graduates annually. Emphasis on graduate research and study at the University continues to grow, and today more than 4,000 graduate students pursue a variety of degrees.

Student life at Florida State University also offers young people ample opportunity to acquire leadership skills and to apply their classroom learning in student government, residence hall government, Greek social organizations, honors programs, departmental organizations and more than 200 other registered student organizations active on campus. The FSU Artist Series, the Distinguished Lecture Series and outstanding music, theater and dance production provide enjoyable evenings for the entire community.



FSU's Tennis Academics

A full-time staff assists incoming student-athletes adjust to their new campus environment, as well as making sure they are advised throughout their entire academic careers.

Part and parcel of the academic package is a nightly schedule for athletes in the Moore Athletic Center. The academic staff has tutorial services for those athletes who request them. Working closely with FSU faculty, the academic staff has the responsibility of ensuring that all student-athletes are making satisfactory progress toward their educational goals.

The study hall has every advantage conducive to meeting the athlete's study needs - private study carols, computers, reference materials and a quiet atmosphere.

Athletic Director, Bob Goin says, "We want to provide the best opportunity for the student-athlete to achieve both academic and athletic success. Doing that, we'll be setting a precedent of excellence."

The men's tennis team continues to make its mark on the FSU campus with its growing tradition of academic excellence. They have now set new standards in the classroom by which all student-athletes aspire to achieve.
