ear, but far from the glaring strips of neon amusement, and the castles and crowds of Disney, lies another magical place in the Sunshine State — one of pow-wows, plantations, politics and great pride. Often described as "The Other Florida" with its deep-rooted history, rolling hills, canopy roads of moss-draped oaks, cool climate and Southern-style hospitality; it is a Florida few have seen. It is Tallahassee — Florida with a Southern accent.

Best known as Florida's capital, Tallahassee is an intimate neometropolitan city where the power of state government, the academic and the artistic are complimented by subtle, old-fashioned charm.

Tallahassee — derived from the words "talwa" meaning town and "ahasee" meaning old —has undergone many changes, but one thing remains the same — it is still a government town fiercely proud and dedicated to preserving its heritage.

The famous Gulf beaches and major metropolitan areas of the South are a short trip from Tallahassee. As Florida's capital city, Tallahassee offers the grace and charm of a small city, while Atlanta, Jacksonville, Tampa, Orlando and New Orleans are within easy driving distance. *

CLIMATE:

Tallahassee enjoys four distinct seasons with an average annual temperature of 67 degrees. Weather conditions are mild and moist due to close proximity to the Gulf. Summer temperatures are subtropical with an average of 83 degrees while winters average a pleasant 50 degrees.

The Capitol buildings, both old and new, epitomize Tallahassee's perseverance. With the 22-story New Capitol towering overhead since 1977, the Old Capitol, erected in 1845, has been restored to its 1902 appearance complete with red-and-white candystriped awnings and a gracious dome adorned with stained glass. The 22nd floor of the New Capitol reveals a spectacular view of the rolling hills of Leon County all the way to the shimmering Gulf of Mexico. Chambers of the House and Senate buzz with political zeal during the March through May legislative session.



The first Christmas mass celebrated in the United States was held in Tallahassee.




Standing nine feet tall, Herman, a skeletal prehistoric mastodon—originally weighing about five tons—was pulled from Wakulla Springs in the 1930s. The Museum of Florida History also features the Prehistoric Florida Exhibit, Spanish treasures, war relics and even a riverboat.



Downtown Tallahassee grew as a trade center with Florida's first railroad — a simple mule-drawn, rail trolley epitomizing the leisurely pace of Southern life — connecting Tallahassee and St. Marks. The 16-mile railroad has now been paved as the St. Mark's Bike Trail, and the Old Trolley remains a stylish way to get around.




Only 13 miles from the Capitol, amid alligators, anhingas and tranquillity is the 2,900-acre Wakulla Springs State Park. Visitors can drift lazily aboard a jungle cruise boat on Wakulla Springs while the alligators sun on the shore. Tallahassee's underwater passages have intrigued adventurers from around the world — even National Geographic magazine attempts to uncover the hidden mysteries of the springs in many issues.



The Winter Festival and Celebration of Lights, an outdoor celebration of holiday lights, music and the arts with activities including a night glow parade, Jingle Bell Run and Santa's Enchanted Forest has become a popular wintertime event in Tallahassee.



As one of the largest arenas in Florida, the Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center, situated on 22 downtown acres, provides the ideal setting for "star-studded" events. The Civic Center Arena was the site of the 1995 NCAA Basketball Southeast Regional while Jacksonville native Jimmy Buffet makes regular visits to Tallahassee.



Red wolves, Florida panthers, alligators and other fascinating wildlife in a 52-acre habitat highlight the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science.

senior member of the 10-member State University System, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1852 by legislative act and began in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857. Today, Florida State's operating budget is \$442 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$95 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the University: the FSU Foundation, which raises millions in private gifts to support academics, the Seminole Boosters and the FSU Alumni Association.

Florida State continues to progress and grow — from its pre-Civil War foundation as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, through the early 20th century as the academically respected Florida State College for Women, returning to coeducational status as a university in 1947, to its modern development as an acclaimed research institution, a topranked competitor in intercollegiate athletics and as a standard-setter in the basic sciences and the performing arts. *



The Dr. Bobby E. Leach Center, a state-of-the-art student recreation facility, with an indoor pool, saunas, basketball and racquet-sport courts, was completed in 1991. And in June, a 2300 square foot free weight area was completed.

Florida State University, nearing its golden anniversary as a co-educational graduate research institution, has joined the nation's elite in both academics and athletics. Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida and building rapidly on the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, the University has emerged over the past 48 years as an institution of national and international esteem.



With 1,568 members, the FSU faculty currently includes five members of the National Academy of Sciences and eight members of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and has included five Nobel laureates. It is backed by 2,987 administrative/professional and support staff.



FSU ranked 20th in the nation for 1990-91 in the number of black Ph.D. students it graduates. Over the five years from 1986 to 1990, FSU ranked eighth nationally by granting doctorates to 70 African-Americans.



FSU's high-tech program in structural biology in 1991 received the University's largest single foundation grant, \$4 million, to position it among the leaders in the field worldwide.



Vice President of the United States Al Gore spoke at the dedication of the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory at Florida State in October 1994. The National Science Foundation established the \$100 million magnet lab at Florida State, which is partnered in research with the Los Alamos National Laboratory and the University of Florida, in 1990. A Nobel laureate in physics and a top Russian physicist were among the first scholars drawn to the faculty by the magnet lab. The world's largest magnet — two stories high and capable of generating 45 tesla or 1 million times the Earth's magnetic field — is to be installed in 1995 at the NHMFL, located in the off-campus research complex, Innovation Park.




Florida State University alumnus, Dr.
Norman Thaggard ended the longest space
flight in U.S. history in July after a historic
mission on the Russian space station Mir.
Thaggard who received his undergraduate
degree in engineering at FSU in 1965 and
his masters a year later, is an avid
Seminole football fan and brought his
cosmonaut counterparts to their first
college football game in Tallahassee last
year. Thaggard's Florida State pennant
could be clearly seen in the space shuttle
aboard Mir during press conferences.
Thaggard has been on three space
missions including the historic six-day flight
on the Challenger in 1983 that included
Sally Ride.



Library holdings at Florida State include 2.06 million book titles, 18,498 serials and 4.25 million microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked via computerized information systems to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library is located at the heart of the University's science research complex. FSU also maintains extensive music, library science and law libraries, and the Mildred and Claude Pepper Library houses the personal and professional papers of one of Florida's best known political couples.



Florida State ranks first in popularity nationwide among high school seniors, based on the number of students who request their Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) and American College Test (ACT) scores be sent to an institution. FSU was the only institution listed among the top 10 choices of both black and white college-bound students. Florida State is also tops in the state for community college transfers as FSU admits over 3,000 transfer students every fall semester.



In fall 1994, the first tenants moved in to the east side of the \$82 million University Center, a classroom-and-office facility at Doak Campbell Stadium. The stadium's south end zone also was enclosed and the adjacent Moore Athletic Center expanded. When the west side is completed in 1996, the University Center will provide 550,000 square feet of much needed academic space and a centralized location for student services.



So how can Barron feel otherwise?

According to the 6th year FSU tennis coach it all comes down to "making the show." If the team does not qualify for the prestigious postseason NCAA tournament, to what level of success did it really achieve?

Fatigue from the season's grueling schedule, against some of the nation's strongest teams, may have set in as the Seminoles struggled toward the

"Although we fell short of our ultimate goal, a positive look at our team can see it was a season of first," Barron commented. "With our wins over Florida, Texas A&M, North Carolina and Virginia Commonwealth, we were put into the national spotlight for most of the spring. We went from a team attacking others to the team to be attacked. Other tennis teams were actually gearing up to play the Seminoles. That is the ultimate compliment to our program."

Barron's 1995 season of "firsts" was undoubtedly the highlight to his half a decade of work for this program. This past season Barron enjoyed his first victories against four nationally ranked opponents: arch nemesis from in-state, the Florida Gators 5-2, Texas A&M 5-2, VCU 6-1, and ACC-rival North Carolina 4-3.

According to Barron, the schedule was one of the toughest in the nation, but in order to grow as a player, a team and a program, the schedule must reflect the team's true caliber of talent. Which is why the 1996 schedule is even more

Although the team did not earn a postseason berth individual players stood out as among the nation's finest. Those playres were Brian Stanton, Ken McKenzie, Antonio Prieto and Jason White.

Stanton of Coral Springs, qualified for the NCAA tournament in both singles and doubles. McKenzie of Tallahassee qualified along with Stanton for doubles. These invitations were a perfect compliment to a long and illustrious career for the two senior Seminoles.


Although Stanton dropped his opening round singles match, he and McKenzie advanced deep into the doubles draw.

The pair, who were among the top 10 in doubles for most of the season, were awarded as part of the nation's collegiate elite, ITA All-Americans.


Prieto of Curitiba, Brazil surprised the team by winning all but two matches in the fall and most of his dual matches in the spring. His achievement was a national ranking in the top half of the nation's best for the entire season.

He was one of the durable Seminoles who did not feel the end of the season crunch, as he won individually at the ACC's and NCAA Regionals, and advanced to the NCAA tournament where he lost in the first round.

White of Longwood emerged from the squad as one of the new budding Seminoles.



ESU TENNIS LEGENDS



Marco Abilhoa a native of Parana, Brazil was possibly the first Florida State Seminole to impact the nation. He was the No. 3 junior player coming out of Brazil when former FSU head coach Randy Jobson discovered him.

A five-year member of the Seminole tennis program from 1980 to 1984, Abilhoa ruled the Metro Conference. He was the singles and doubles champion in 1981 and 1982. His dominating presence earned him a record three Metro MVP awards in 1981, 1982, and 1984.

"If Marco can get himself so that he's pumped and psyched to play, and can keep his mind clear of distractions, there isn't anyone in the country that he can't beat," added Jobson.

Joey Rive of West Palm Beach played for the Seminoles from 1981 to 1985. One of the top players ever to compete at Florida State, Rive led the team in wins in 1983, 1984 and 1985. During his period at No. 1 singles, he was nationally ranked among the Top 25 in the nation.


His stellar performance for the Tribe resulted in three Metro Conference singles championships in 1983, 1984 and 1985 and two doubles championships in 1983 and 1985, including the conference's top crown, the MVP in 1985. His Metro success led to his invitation to the 1985 NCAA tournament and to the 1987 *Tennis Magazine* Sportsman of the Year award.

Following his FSU career, Rive played the ATP tour where he reached as high as No. 57 in the world in 1988. He returned back to Tallahassee, where he served as an assistant coach from 1993 to 1994. He is currently the head coach at the University of Alabama.

Paul Haarhuis, a native of Eindhoven, The Netherlands, attended Florida State from 1986 to 1988. During his time with the Seminoles, he captured many conference crowns and national honors.

Haarhuis was the Metro Conference MVP for the 1987 and 1988 seasons after winning the singles and doubles trophy both years. In 1987 he also earned one of the biggest college championships at the ITCA Nationals. He ranked in the Top 30 his senior year, earning an invitation to the NCAA tournament.

Haarhuis turned professional after his two years at FSU and in his second career Grand Slam at the U.S. Open in 1989, he upset four-time

champion, John McEnroe in the second round en route to the round of 16. His ATP rankings jumped from No. 115 to No. 80 following that tournament. In 1994, Haarhuis and Jacco Eltingh were the No. 1 ranked doubles pair in the world.


In 1991, Notebloom achieved big-time success as he won the Metro Conference singles and doubles trophy and the conference MVP award. His 1991 success culminated in a repeat invitation to the NCAA Championships. Very few Seminoles have ever accomplished this feat.

Brian Stanton of Coral Springs and Ken McKenzie of Tallahassee recently finished up their playing careers with the Tribe. As a doubles team the duo ended their final campaign earning collegiate tennis' top honor, the ITA All-American. The doubles pair received the 1995 award after a superb run in the NCAA Championships. What may be the most impressive feat for them was being ranked among the nation's top 10 doubles tandems throughout the season.


During his stay at FSU, Stanton won back to back Junior Davis Cup singles titles in 1993 and 1994, won the 1993 Junior Davis Cup in doubles and was named to the All-ACC team his sophomore and junior seasons.

Stanton will be back with the Seminoles as a graduate assistant coach in 1996.








DAVID BARRON Head Coach University of Evansville

David Barron has elevated Florida State to a higher level in collegiate men's tennis. Whether in coaching, recruiting, or involved in charitable activities, Barron has brought the FSU program national acclaim.

Barron in his sixth year will be busy once again, as the Seminoles venture into one of the nation's toughest schedules in 1996. Despite the difficult schedule, the Seminoles are expected to contend once again for the ACC title. The Florida State men's tennis team has steadily improved with the addition of top players to the program, and much of the team's success can be attributed to the recruiting and coaching abilities of Barron.

Florida State will begin its third campaign in the Scott Speicher Tennis Center, the nationally renowned tennis facility. Barron was one of the central figures behind its construction. Through his vision and lobbying, Barron did much of the leg work to make the center a reality on the Florida State University campus.


A native of Evansville, Indiana, Barron played on a junior college national championship team at Central Florida Community College in Ocala, before graduating in 1981 with his Associates degree. He then moved on to the University of Evansville where he was the team MVP in 1983, while earning his Bachelor's degree later that same year. Barron then traveled to Nova University

where he earned a Master's degree in 1985 for Business Administration.

After Nova, Barron worked at Nick prestigious Bollettieri's Tennis Academy. While at the Academy, Barron met Andy Brandi, who went on to become the head coach for the University of Florida women's tennis Brandi brought Barron to team. Gainesville in 1985 where they proceeded to lead the Lady Gators into one of the top teams in the country. Although entering just his sixth year as head coach at FSU, Barron is already proving he can produce the same results for the Seminoles.

Recently, other organizations have benefitted from Barron's involvement. He has been heavily involved in a campaign to raise money for the Children's Miracle Network. Through his organizing of a tennis pro-am tournament this fall at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center, money will be raised for the pediatric programs at Shands Hospital at the University of Florida.

Barron, who is married to the former Michelle Sharp. They are the proud parents of a son John David. He is currently working on his Doctorate in Athletic Administration here at Florida State and he is USPTA (United States Professional Tennis Association) certified.



ASSISTANTICOACHES

John Vinson, who returns for his fourth

year as assistant coach of the Seminoles, will once again hold several on and off court responsibilities for Barron and Florida State. Among Vinson's tasks is to monitor the strength and conditioning of the players. He also works with the team at practices and matches. His role is especially crucial in the fall, as he organizes the annual Seminole Fall Classic, which has become one of the most successful tournaments in the nation.

Besides his valuable assistance to Coach Barron, Vinson is no stranger to Seminole tennis. He was an assistant coach at FSU under Richard McKee from 1986 to 1988. During that period he worked with current ATP No. 1 doubles player Paul Haarhuis.


In addition to Florida State, Vinson has held two other head coaching positions. He was at Louisiana Tech from 1988 to 1990 coaching the Lady Bulldogs while earning his Master's degree in general counseling. For the second semester of the 1990 season Vinson became the head coach for the entire Utah State Utes tennis program until the end of the 1991 season.

Upon returning to Florida in 1991, Vinson was named the Florida Section Director of Player Development for the USTA from 1991 to 1993. His duties for the USTA included coaching the top Florida zonal teams, organizing tournaments for Florida USTA players and coaching at many different training sites around the state. His impact for the USTA helped FSU in this year's recruiting class, as freshmen Ty Braswell and Steve Weinstein both met Vinson during his stay with the amateur association.

Vinson lettered four years in tennis at Wake Forest University and held the number one singles position during his senior season under the legendary Demon Deacon tennis coach Jim Leighton and then Ian Crookenden. He was named the teams MVP his junior year after finishing second at the ACC tournament at No. 3 singles.

He earned a Bachelor of Science degree in psychology from FSU and received his

Master's degree in general counseling from Louisiana Tech University. Vinson is married to the former Kim Schwenbeck. Vinson serves as a tennis pro at various Tallahassee area tennis clubs, and is USPTA certified.

ompleted in the summer of 1993, the Scott Speicher Tennis Center at Donald Loucks Courts is one of the premier tennis facilities in the country. Costing over \$1.2 million to build, "Speicher" has become the newest focal point in Florida State's commitment to providing topnotch facilities for its athletes.

The tennis center houses 12 lighted tennis courts and over 1,000 court level seats. It is adjacent to the tennis offices, locker rooms and weight room in Tully Gym.

The facility was named in the honor of Lieutenant Commander Michael Scott Speicher, a graduate of Florida State University and the first American casualty during Operation Desert Storm. By Presidential directive, the facility bears the name the "Scott Speicher Tennis Center."

The facility was designed by EMO/Architects, Inc., a Tallahassee-based architectural firm, in collaboration with Global Consult Group, Inc., an internationally recognized Tennis Facility Design Consultant. The complex was funded by private sources and supervised through the state university system of Florida.

This year the Scott Speicher Tennis Center serves as the home courts for all Florida State men's and women's home matches, the Children's Miracle Network Charity Invitational and the 1996 NCAA Division I Women's Tennis Championships in May.

SUPPORTSERVICES

STRENGTH, CONDITIONING, MEDICAL CARE AND TREATMENT

Strength training and conditioning is an important part of an athlete's performance on the court. At Florida State, a specially designed program is developed for tennis, emphasizing the objectives of strengthening and conditioning the athletes. Strength coach Ron Miller individually customizes programs for each of the athletes, beginning with pre-conditioning, before the season gets underway.

Miller, who holds professional memberships in the National Strength and Conditioning Association and Aerobics and Fitness Association, works with the players in sport specific training which includes strengthening the major muscle groups used in tennis.

This season, Miller is customizing a sound workout for the men's tennis team. The workout is instrumental in improving muscular endurance, strength and cardiovascular conditioning on the court. The coaches believe so strongly in the program that they even participate themselves. FSU takes pride in customizing the programs to help student athletes reach their maximum potential.

Miller has proven to be an asset to the University's athletic program, where he was a four-year lettermen with the Seminole basketball team. On that team, Miller was selected the Top-Conditioned athlete all four years. During the 1991-92 season he was team captain and awarded the 1992 ACC Senior Scholarship Athlete of the Year.


ACADEMICS

To support Seminole student-athletes in their effort to strive to meet their fullest potential both on and off the court, the athletic department has undertaken several projects to upgrade its academic support services and facilities. The physical plant expansion of the Coyle E. Moore Athletic Center as part of the University Center project means FSU student athletes have expanded access to a state of the art learning environment. This includes individual study areas, the latest in computer technology and a study hall which also houses a research area.

Florida State student athletes also benefit from one of the premier academic support systems. A full-time staff helps all incoming student athletes adjust to their new campus environment and works with them throughout their academic careers at FSU.

Athletes at Florida State University receive the best care and treatment possible. All of the student athletes undergo a preseason examination in order to prevent and detect any potential injuries that an athlete may incur. If a problem is detected, the athlete is placed on a prevention care program which may include any kind of treatment from icing to exercising.

Rehabilitation is another important component of the Seminole training room. Though preventing injuries is the main objective, they are sometimes a part of participating in athletics. More serious injuries and illnesses are referred to the Seminole team physicians at the Tallahassee

Academic Staff

Under the direction of Dr. Roger Grooters, the Academic Support Program is in place to meet the needs of FSU's student athletes. Grooters and his staff aid student athletes with admission, class scheduling, registration and the normal progression towards a degree.

Regular class attendance is required in order to play tennis at FSU and attendance is closely monitored during the playing and practice seasons. Throughout the school year, nightly study halls and tutoring sessions help the student athlete "stay on course so they can stay on court." In addition, student athletes have unlimited access to mentors who provide one-on-one tutoring. The academic support staff works closely with the faculty members at Florida State and with the athletic department's own office of student services.

ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE

nstilling a standard of excellence in its athletes the Atlantic Coast Conference, now in its 43rd year of competition, has long been a leader in athletics and academics. The tradition of ACC men's tennis is historically strong and 1995 was no exception. The ACC had at one time or another six schools in the top 50, with Duke breaking into the top 10. Duke, North Carolina, Wake Forest, Clemson, Virginia, Georgia Tech, and Florida State all positioned themselves among the elite top 50 during the course of the season.

Riding a season-high No. 16 national ranking, the Seminoles were seeded No. 2 in the 1995 ACC Championships. With their only regular season loss coming at the hands of the Duke Blue Devils the Seminoles (7-1) defeated Virginia in the first round. Avenging their April 8th loss to the Seminoles the momentum-carrying Clemson Tigers defeated Coach Barron's squad in the semifinals to end a strong and successful Florida State season.

Men's tennis began in the Atlantic Coast Conference in 1954. From 1954 to 1978, North Carolina dominated the conference championships. During that time, there were only three years that the Tar Heels were absent from the team championships. In the 1980's, it was Clemson that mounted a streak, winning the crown nine times in 10 years. North Carolina and Duke have split the dominance in the early 1990's, but Florida State is set in their ways to make a strong run for the title in '96.


