SCOTT SPEICHER TENNIS CENTER



With the first stage of construction completed in the Summer of 1993, the Scott Speicher Tennis Center at the Donald Loucks Courts opened its gates to the public for the first time at a Children's Miracle Network charity tournament. Since then, many successful tournaments including the 1996 NCAA Women's Championships, have graced the courts at one of Florida State University's premier athletic facilities.

Costing \$1.2 million to build and then another \$800,000 for recent additions, Florida State's Speicher Tennis Center has become an example of the increasing dedication and commitment the University has to all of its 17 varsity athletic programs.

The Speicher Tennis Center houses 12 lighted hard courts, over 1,000 court level seats, coaching offices, men's and women's locker rooms, equipment and storage rooms, a team lounge and a public address system. The growing pride Florida State has for its tennis program and it's premier tennis center was honored just after it's opening in 1994, when the United States Tennis Association (USTA) awarded the structure with it's "Top Notch" facility award.

The Speicher Tennis Center was named in honor of Lieutenant Commander Michael Scott Speicher, a graduate of Florida State University and the first American casualty during Operation Desert Storm. By Presidential directive, the facility bears the name the "Scott Speicher Tennis Center."

H. Donald Loucks was the program's first tennis coach and is aptly known as the pioneer of Florida State tennis. He began his coaching career in 1936 at the University School of Florida State College for Women where he coached all sports. This was the

beginning of an association with Florida State which crossed six decades, 1936 - 1980, ending in his retirement as Professor Emeritus of Physical Education. In 1942, while serving as an officer in the Army, Loucks was stationed at West Point where he coached plebe basketball and tennis teams.

In 1947, Loucks became Florida State's first basketball coach and a year later was named the school's first tennis coach. His tennis team was the first athletic team to have a winning season. The varsity tennis courts were named for him in 1981. He served as Dean of Men from 1957 - 1967 and was known as a servant of leadership, service and devotion to many worthy causes.

The Speicher Tennis Center was designed by EMO/Architects, Inc., a Tallahassee-based architectural firm, in collaboration with Global Consult Group, Inc., an internationally recognized Tennis Facility Design Consultant. The complex was funded by private sources and supervised through the state university system of Florida.



Through its seven year existence, the Scott Speicher Tennis Center at the Donald Loucks Courts has served as the home courts for all Florida State men's and women's home dual matches, the annual Seminole Fall Classics, City of Tallahassee tennis championships, various USTA regional and zonal tournaments, the 1994 and 1995 Men's Intercollegiate tournament and the annual Children's Miracle Network Charity Invitational benefitting Shands Hospital in Gainesville.







ACC BIOGRAPHY



THE TRADITION

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor. However in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the ACC has defied the odds. Now in its 48th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not a mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 79 national championships, including 39 in men's competition and 40 in women's. In addition, 119 men and 29 women have earned the coveted title of NCAA champion.

1999-2000 IN REVIEW

The 1999-2000 academic year concluded with the league pocketing four more national team titles and six individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 36 national team titles in the last ten years.

The ACC 1999-2000 national champions were Maryland in field hockey and women's lacrosse, North Carolina in women's soccer and Florida State in football. Overall, ACC teams posted a 79-54-2 (.593) mark in NCAA Tournament play. In the last 11 seasons, conference schools have accumulated 625 team victories in NCAA Tournament competition.

The ACC placed a least one team in the Top 10 nationally in 19 of the 25 sports sponsored by the league. Other records of note during the 1999-2000 season include 85 teams competing at NCAA Championships, 5 bowl teams and 35 Top 10 showings. Fourteen ACC teams, in ten different sports, representing seven of the nine member institutions, earned a No. 1 ranking during the course of the past academic year.

The ACC Academic Honor Roll record was broken for the 15th-straight year in 1999-2000 as 1,659 student-athletes were recognized for their work in the classroom.

THE CHAMPIONSHIP

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2000-2001 academic year-12 for men and 13 for women. The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake

Forest University, October 6-8. Conference championships for women are currently conducted in cross county, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

THE HISTORY

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members-Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest-drawing up the conference bylaws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14,1953, the seven members met in Raleigh N.C., where a set of bylaw was adopted and the name officially became the Atlantic Coast Conference.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30,1971 when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The conference operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The Atlanta school withdrew from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964. The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State.








CONFERENCE HISTORY BEFORE THE ACC

DIXIE CONFERENCE AFFILIATION (1949-1951)


The 1949, 1950 and 1951 teams, coached by Florida State tennis pioneer, H. Don Lucks (1949-50) and Ralph Matherly (1951), won the Dixie Conference team championship for three consecutive years. The Dixie Conference was made up of seven small schools within the Southeast including Florida State, Stetson, Millsaps, Mercer, Howard, Lambuth and Oglethorpe.






Expansion was soon on the horizon, as the league membership increased to it's size to seven schools when the Florida State University was admitted on July 28, 1976

After Georgia Tech left the conference following the 1978 season, Virginia Tech quickly filled the void. Then St. Louis left the Metro. But waiting in the wings was the University of South Carolina who joined in 1983 to increase the membership to eight schools. However, Tulane forfeited its membership when its basketball program was discontinued following the 1984-85 season.

SUPPORT SERVICES

Academic, personal and professional support are essential to college success. At the Florida State University, we have developed an outstanding support program which enables student-athletes to reach their full potential. Our philosophy is "to offer an academic support program integrated with the total university that will assist all student-athletes with the transition into college and provide continued support in all phases of academic and professional development culminating with graduation, job placement or graduate school."

To accomplish this goal we have developed an academic environment which facilitates the academic success of student-athletes. Student success is encouraged through competent academic counseling, career exploration, planning and placement and academic assistance through tutorial programs.

Our program operates on a "proactive" rather than "reactive" approach. At Florida State, our academic staff does not wait for academic crises to occur. We gather important background information and build an academic profile on all student-athletes to assess their needs in advance. We also stay informed on the daily progress of each student-athlete.

The academic support services are located in the state-of-the-art University Center and are on the sixth floor of the \$126 million facility. It includes private study carrels, a tutorial study area and a computer lab outfitted with 16 new IBM computers and laser printers. In addition, athletic sky boxes are utilized for group in individual tutorial instruction.

FSU offers 16 Schools and Colleges with 99 undergraduate degrees and 75 post-baccalaureate degrees.



ATHLETIC ACADEMIC SUPPORT STAFF



MARK MELENEY Director, Athletic Academic Support Programs

Mark Meleney became Florida State's Director of Athletic Support Programs in 1997 and brings 13 years of advising experience to the position. Over the past six years, meleney has played an integral role in development of a comprehensive program of student athlete support, which in 1996 won the "Program of Excellence" award from Athletic Management Magazine.

A native of Iowa, Meleney began his college education at Buena Vista College, where he earned varsity letters in football and baseball. Upon transferring to Florida State, he earned Bachelor's degree's in Management and Finance in 1986 and received a Masters in Athletic Administration from FSU in 1997. He is currently pursuing his Ph.D. in Athletic Administration.

Meleney oversees an academic staff comprised of five academic counselors, and administrative assistant, several graduate assistants, individualized learning specialists and a cadre of about 70 tutors and mentors.

Meleney and his wife Sarah are the parents of a six year old daughter, Montana Shea.

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING



STRENGTH/CONDITIONING

The Strong Shall Survive is the motto of the strength and conditioning staff at Florida State. It is also this philosophy that has made Seminole athletes in all sports among the strongest, fastest and fittest anywhere. At Florida State, the strong not only survive, they win too!

Strength training, conditioning, medical care and treatment are vital aspects of an athlete's performance on the court. At Florida State, a specially designed program is developed for the men's tennis team, emphasizing the objectives along with the proper medical attention and injury prevention.

Strength and conditioning coach Marcus Martin, who is in his second season, individually customizes programs for each of the athletes, beginning

with preconditioning, before the season even gets

under way.

Martin, who earned his bachelor's degree in nutrition and fitness from Florida State University has received first hand experience as a graduate assistant for the Florida State football team.

This season, Martin, a certified National Strength and Conditioning Association member, and certified Advanced Personal Trainer with the International Fitness Professionals Association, is customizing a sound and comprehensive workout for the men's tennis team. The workout is instrumental in improving muscular endurance, strength, power, speed and cardiovascular conditioning on the court. FSU

takes pride in customizing the program to help student athletes reach their maximum potential.



The Tully Gymnasium weight room took on a whole new look following a complete renovation in 1996 and additional improvements have been made to the facility every year since. The weight room went from 1,500 square feet to 3,500 square feet in size in 1996, fresh with a new stereo system, drop



ceiling, lighting and mondo rubber flooring. Over \$140,000 worth of new exercise equipment was added to the Lady Seminole weight room, including 16 cardio-vascular pieces such as Life Fitness, Stairmaster and Textrix. The facility was expanded to 4,500 square feet this past summer with a new squat rack and platform.

MEDICAL CARE AND TREATMENT


An athlete can expect to receive the best care and treatment possible from the athletic training staff at Florida State University. Prior to competition, all FSU student-athletes undergo screening in order to detect any potential injuries. If a problem is detected, the athlete may be placed on a prevention care system which may include any kind of treatment from icing to exercising.

Athletes at Florida State University receive the best care and treatment possible. All of the student athletes undergo a preseason examination in order to prevent and detect any potential injuries that an athlete may incur. If a problem is detected, the athlete is placed on a prevention care program which may include any kind of treatment from icing to exercising.

Sam Lunt, who is in his 17th season as a member of the Florida State University athletic staff, oversees the athletic training duties for the men's

tennis team. Lunt originally came to Florida State in 1983 as a graduate assistant after receiving his bachelor's degree in athletic training from the University of Miami, While at Miami, he worked as a student trainer in the Hurricane athletic department and served as an assistant trainer with the Miami Dolphins of the NFL during the summer of 1982.

As a graduate assistant at Florida State, Lunt worked with the Seminole football team while earning his master's degree in sports psychology. During the 1985 spring football season, he worked for the Jacksonville Bulls of the USFL. He returned to the collegiate ranks that summer when he was named an assistant trainer at the University of Louisville.



The Fort Myers, Fla., native returned to Florida State in 1986. His duties included assisting head trainer Randy Oravetz with the Seminole football team as well as working with all of the men's varsity teams. Lunt then became the head trainer for the men's basketball team while overseeing all men's sports.

During his career at Florida State, Lunt has been involved with athletes at both the national and international level. He worked closely with FSU's team of physicians in planning and coordinating the medical coverage for the 1991 AAU Junior Olympics which were held in Tallahassee.

Lunt is a certified member of the National Athletic Trainers Association. He worked as a volunteer trainer at the United States Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colo., during the 1987 U.S. Olympic Festival. He was also a member of the training staff at the 1989 World University games in Duisurg, Germany.

Lunt, 39, is married to the former Agnes Bundick. The couple have three children: Ryan, a three-year-old son, and newborn twins, Sean and Erin

Though the prevention of injuries is the main objective, some injuries are unavoidable. Rehabilitation is another component of the Florida State training room. The FSU athletic training staff will work with the athlete and provide an intense rehabilitation schedule that will allow the athlete to successfully rehabilitate after an injury. Some injuries and illnesses may be referred to the Seminole team physicians at the Tallahassee Orthopedic Center, who, for many years, have worked in conjunction with the FSU athletic training staff in successfully rehabilitating athletes after an injury.

PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

Fostering the development of personal growth is a fundamental component of the NOLES program. These support programs ensure that the student-athlete will be provided opportunities to focus on personal growth issues such as values clarification, goal setting, fiscal planning, decision making and personal responsibility. Programming focuses on helping student-athletes develop a healthy

lifestyle while they are at Florida State and habits that will benefit them for life.

CAREER DEVELOPMENT

Preparing for life after college sports is a major focus of the NOLES Career Develop-ment program. The program is designed to work cooperatively with the University's Career Services to acquaint students with the job search

process, provide networking opportunities



and ultimately assist with job placement. This program places a priority on the development of the total person, with the goal of developing individuals who will have rewarding careers and productive lifestyles after they leave Florida State.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

Serving the community is the focus of our Seminole Spirit program. Student-athletes are challenged to give service to our community and individuals who are in need. With a clearly defined program of service, student-athletes are given the opportunity to develop the foundation for a lifelong commitment to volunteerism. The Seminole Spirit Student-Athlete Speakers' Bureau enables student-athletes to improve their speaking skills, develop effective communication and impact the lives of others through their service as role models in our community.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

The Florida State University Department of Athletics is committed to developing programs of excellence that foster leadership development. The foundation of the leadership development program are the Seminole Leadership Institutes that are held four times a year. These Institutes offer student-athletes the opportunity to learn skills that will benefit them as students, as athletes, and as they pursue their goals after leaving Florida State. The Institutes are based on building communication skills. Students have the opportunity to use the values and work ethic taught by athletic participation as the framework for their leadership development. The Institutes attract outstanding guest speakers who challenge Seminole

student-athletes to achieve their greatest potential and use their leadership skills to positively influence others.

The Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) serves as the advisory board to the NOLES program and the athletics administration. prestigious board, The comprised each representatives of athletic team at FSU, also recommends programming and serves as a liaison between student-athletes and the athletics administration. The Advisory Council plans and implements various events for student-athletes and serves as the department's

NCAA INFORMATION

The following information is provided by the Florida State Office of Compliance for prospective student athletes. It is intended as a guideline to introduce some of the rules governing NCAA athletic involvement.


WHO IS PERMITTED TO RECRUIT FOR FSU?

Only Florida State University coaches who have successfully completed the NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination on an annual basis may be involved in the recruitment process. Representatives of our athletics interests may not make any recruiting contacts. This includes letters, telephone calls or face-to-face contact on or off campus with a prospect or the prospect's parents.

KEY TERMS YOU SHOULD KNOW


You become a prospective student-athlete if you have started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, you become a prospective student-athlete if the college provides you (or your relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide to prospective students generally.

A contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's legal guardian and an institutional staff member or athletic representative during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of greeting. NOTE: At the Division I level, athletic representatives (boosters) may not contact you for the purpose of recruiting. A college coach may contact you in person off the college campus beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year in high school.



An evaluation is any off-campus activity designed to access your academic qualifications or athletic ability, including any visit to your high school (during which no contact occurs) or the observation of any practice or competition in which you participate.

During your senior year, you can have one expense-paid official visit to a particular campus. You may receive no more than five visits. During your official visit, which may not exceed 48 hours, you may receive round-trip transportation between your home and the campus, and you (and your parents) may receive meals, lodging and complimentary admission to campus athletics events.



PHONE CALLS AND LETTERS

Phone calls from faculty members and coaches (but not boosters) are permitted beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year. A college coach or faculty member is limited to one telephone call per week except when it is:



 On the day of a coach's off-campus contact with you

 During the time beginning with the initial National Letter of Intent signing date in your sport through the two days after signing date

Letters from coaches and faculty members (but not boosters) are not permitted until September 1 at the beginning of your junior year in high school. A Division I university may provide you

with the following printed materials:

- General correspondence, including letters, U.S. Postal Service postcards and institutional note cards
- Game programs which may not include posters and one Student Athlete Handbook can be provided only during official or unofficial visits to the university's campus
- NCAA educational information
- Pre-enrollment information subsequent to signing a National Letter of Intent with the university
- One athletic publication which may include only one color of printing inside the covers
- Official academic, admissions and student services publications published or videotapes produced by the institution and available to all students
- · Schedule cards
- Questionnaires which may be provided prior to your junior year
- Summer camp brochures which may be provided prior to your junior year.

ALUMNI AND BOOSTERS DO'S AND DON'TS

You may forward information about prospective student-athletes to the appropriate coaches.

You may have contact with a prospect regarding permissible preenrollment activities such as summer employment, provided the prospect has already signed a National Letter of Intent and the Compliance Office is aware that you are making these contacts in regard to employment.

You may have a telephone conversation with a prospect only if the prospect initiates the call. Such a call may not be prearranged by an institutional staff member and you are not permitted to have a recruiting conversation, but may exhibit normal civility. You must refer any questions about our athletics programs to an athletics department staff member/coach.

You may view a prospect's contest at your own initiative provided you do not contact the prospect or his/her parents. In addition, you may not contact a prospect's coach, principal, or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.

You may continue established family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with sons and daughters of these families are permitted as long as they are not made for recruiting purposes or encouraged by Florida State University coaches. You may not become involved in making arrangements to receive money or financial aid of any kind for a prospect or the prospect's family and friends.


You may not make contact with a prospective student-athlete and his/her parents when the prospect is on campus for an official or unofficial recruiting visit.

You may not transport, pay or arrange for payment of transportation costs for a prospect, and his/her relatives or friends to visit campus (or elsewhere).

You may not pay or arrange for payment of summer camp registration fees for a prospect.

You may not provide anything to a prospect, the prospect's family or friends without prior approval from the athletics' Compliance Office.


