2006-07 Men's Tennis Outlook

he Florida State men's tennis team comes into the 2006-07 season with a bright future on the horizon. The Seminoles have become a regular at NCAA Tournament as they enter the season riding a streak of four consecutive appearances. Not only do the Seminoles plan on making their fifth trip this season but they will look to make a deep impact into the tournament. The Seminoles advanced into the second round last year and two years ago they made it into the elite eight for the first time in program history. Not only have the Seminoles made an impact in the post season but they have been dominant during the regular season as well, recording back-to-back 18 plus win seasons.

HEAD COACH DWAYNE HULTQUIST'S OUTLOOK

"We want to get back to the final site. I think if you're a football team you want to be in a BCS game or if you're a




basketball team you want to try and get to the second weekend or to the final four. We want to get back to the final site like we were two years ago. Last year we were very close and I feel like we are good enough to be in that group again. We also want to compete for a conference championship and

I think we're probably in that range where we're one of the teams that has the ability to win it. I don't think we're a favorite but if you look at Miami, Virginia, Duke, Georgia Tech, I think we're in that group that could win."

The Team

All of this success will only be built on during this upcoming season as Florida State returns eight letter winners from a year ago and has added four of the top recruits in the country. The eight letter winners include Ytai Abougzir, Andrew Bailey, Ryan Boyajian, Sam Chang, Chris Cloer, Jason Hood, Jonathas Sucupira and Maciek Sykut. The new faces on the team are Jean Yves Aubone, Bobby Deve, Bradley Mixson and

"I think Chris (Westerhof) is obviously a big loss. He won the most doubles matches in his career at Florida State



and certainly not having a guy that you know is going to be a dominant player that played No. 1 doubles is probably going to impact and hurt us. Chris won a lot of big matches in singles as well but I think this year's team is deep so I look at our new guys coming in to contribute. I look at Jean-Yves as a guy who is going to contribute to singles

and doubles right away and I think Brad Mixson will as well. I look at those guys as being big contributors this year and making up for the loss of Chris and then my hope is that all of our guys have improved from last year and they'll be a little bit stronger with a higher winning percentage and really emerge."

The Singles Lineup

The Seminoles will be a force to be reckoned with in singles this upcoming season as they have four players ranked in the ITA preseason top 120. Abougzir is at the front of the pack at No. 27 and is followed by Sucupira (No. 72), Chang (No. 106) and Aubone (No. 120).

HEAD COACH DWAYNE HULTOUIST'S OUTLOOK

"I think this year's team is very deep no matter from 1 through 6.



Whoever we have on the court, I feel like we are going to be very strong competing with whoever we play, but I see it as a team as our best spots may be lower in the line up, three,

four, five, six and I see all of our guys really being able to compete and be really close in ability. I think against some of the top teams we will be very competitive in our line up all the way through."

The Doubles Lineup

Despite the lost of Chris Westhof, FSU all-time leader in doubles victories, the Seminoles enter the season with two teams ranked in the ITA preseason top 60. Abougzir and Sykut make up the No. 14 team in the nation while Sucupira and Chang are ranked No. 59.

HEAD COACH DWAYNE HULTOVIST'S OUTLOOK

"I'm not sure how that's going to play out. I think we've still got some work to put that



work to put that together. I see Jonathas and Sam playing together. They played together for a couple years and have very good chemistry;


they like playing together and they've been nationally ranked. After that I'm not sure, we're a little bit uncertain about how we're going to do it. Ytai has really proved himself as a doubles player last year being ranked as part of a top team. I don't know if we'll play him with Maciek or maybe play him with Jean-Yves even though it would be a little unusual to play a senior with a freshman, but I look for one of those combinations to work. For our other doubles spot I could see both our freshmen Jean-Yves and Brad Mixson playing together and also Drew certainly fitting in to that mix and having very good results and hope for a national rank."


The Schedule

Florida State will open their season at home with a double header on January 20 against Florida A&M and Louisiana Lafayette. The Seminoles will then wrap up January with matches against Georgia State, Florida Atlantic and Furman all at home. February 2 will mark the first road trip of the season for FSU as they will take on Notre Dame then two days later battle Ohio State. Florida State will return home to take on rival Florida on February 10 then take a break to travel to Chicago for the 2007 USTA/ITA National Men's Indoor Championship. Upon returning, FSU will battle Atlantic Coast Conference opponents Miami at home and then Clemson and Georgia Tech on the road followed by a trip to California to take on Stanford and Pepperdine. On March



16 FSU will take on their last out of conference opponent in Rice at home and then from March 23 to April 15 the Seminoles will wrap up their regular season with an eight match conference schedule that will feature four home and four away matches. The ACC Tournament is scheduled for April 18-22 in Cary, N.C. The 2007 NCAA Tournament will be played in May with the final site being held in Athens, Ga.







COACHING STAF



nder Dwayne Hutlquist's leadership, Florida State men's tennis has emerged as one of the top programs in the nation. When Hultquist took over the Florida State program in 1999, the Seminoles were struggling to compete in the state of Florida, let alone in the Atlantic Cost Conference or at the national level. A lot has changed in eight years as FSU is a player on the national scene and a staple in the NCAA Tournament with four straight appearances.

Now entering in to his eighth season at Florida State, Dwayne Hultquist continues to bring the FSU Tennis program to remarkable heights. Last season he recorded his 100th career win as the Seminoles advanced to the second round of the NCAA Men's Tennis Championship by defeating Auburn, 4-2. With his 100th career win he joined an illustrious group at Florida State which only features three other coaches. In 57 years of Florida State men's tennis Hultquist's 100 wins puts him fourth all-time at FSÛ and just one victory behind Randy Jobson to become tied as the school's third all-time winningest coach by victories.

Undoubtedly, year six in the Hultquist era was the best season in school history. For starters, the Tribe not only made their third straight appearance to the national summit, but FSU reached the 2005 NCAA Elite Eight for the first time ever. Florida State also finished with its highest-ever national ranking at No. 13 and FSU stamped its first 20-plus win season since 1995. Hultquist led his squad to an impressive 21-8 mark and a second-place finish in the ACC.

Under Hultquist's tutelage in 2005, Mat Cloer, became the school's first singles All-American and won the program's first national honor with the ITA Arthur Ashe Award.

After a few months off, Hultquist hit the ground running in the fall of 2005 and led his troop to an impressive fall campaign. For the Seminoles efforts, Florida State not only earned the school's first invitation to the 2006 USTA/ITA National Men's Team Indoor Championship, but it also garnered a respectable preseason ranking of No. 11 by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association. In Hulquist's fifth season, FSU reach heights it hadn't scene since the mid 1990's. The Tribe's second trip to the national summit

was their first back-to-back appearances since the 1997-98 campaigns and they ended the 2004 year ranked for the 11th season in a row with a 10-13 record.

Individual honors were also bountiful in 2004 with Mat Cloer claiming his second ACC Player of the Year honor, only the third time in league history that the award has gone to the same player in back-to-back years. Then-freshman Jonathas Sucupira was named to the All-ACC team, a first by an FSU rookie since 1992

Florida State had a break-out year during Hultquist's fourth season as the 2003 squad returned to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1998 and ended the year with a 15-10 mark. The Seminoles produced their best finish in the ACC standings, taking second, while winning the ACC Indoor Doubles Champion for the second year in a row.

Individual accolades rolled in as Hultquist's former aide, Ty Braswell, was named ITA Assistant Coach of the Year. On the court, Cloer became the first Seminole to earn ACC Player of the Year honors With a passion for the sport of tennis, Hultquist always wanted to accomplish one thing. That one thing was the desire to become a successful Division I collegiate coach. In the summer of 1999, Hultquist's hiring as the Seminole head men's tennis coach culminated a decade-long journey to fulfill his dream.

In his first year, Hultquist brought the Seminoles a winning record of 14-10. In his second year, the men's team entered the 2001-02 season ranked No. 59 by the ITA.

Hultquist arrived at Florida State after serving eight years as an assistant coach at the University of Texas. While working under legendary coach Dave Snyder, Hultquist became known for his excellent recruiting abilities. He was also responsible for scheduling, fundraising, individualized coaching and many of the day-to-day operations of the program. While at Texas, Hultquist coached nine All-Americans, helped lead the Longhorns to six conference titles and made it to the NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 in each of his eight years.

Hultquist began his tennis career at Penn State where he was a four-year letterman and team captain in 1986. During that same year, he was an NCAA Tourna-

ment qualifier in doubles, and earned allconference honors in both singles and doubles. After graduating from Penn State, Hultquist turned pro, playing in the United States, Israel and Asia. During his career, Hultquist was selected to play on national teams that traveled to Korea and China for

Hultquist's coaching career began when he started working with USTA in 1988. During his tenure at the USTA, he traveled with the Boy's National Team to South America as well as the Orange Bowl and

Easter Bowl tournaments.

In 1991, Hultquist began his collegiate coaching career when he accepted a graduate assistant position at the University of Kentucky, where he was responsible for recruiting and co-directing the National Collegiate Indoor Team Championships. Hultquist is married to the former Angela

ntering into his fourth season on staff at Florida State, assistant coach Nick Crowell continues to have a profound impact on the Seminoles. Since Crowell's arrival in 2004, Florida State has reached the NCAA Championships every season, won 60 percent of their dual matches and shattered several team records. Crowell's success is no surprise as he came to FSU from the University of Texas where he was an All-American under current Seminole Head Coach Dwayne Hultquist, who was an assistant there at the time.

The 2006 season found the Seminoles concluding the year with a respectable 18-12 record with arguably the hardest strength of schedule in the nation. Florida State's 18 wins tied as the second-most number of program victories in the last 16 seasons. FSU advanced to the second round of the NCAA Champion-ship and made the school's first four-peat appearance in the Big Dance since its run of five consecutive trips from 1994-98.

Crowell was a big factor in the success of Ytai Abougzir, who became the first Seminole in 12 seasons to qualify for both the NCAA Singles and Doubles



Assistant Coach of the Year and became a finalist for the national award.

Thanks to incoming freshmen Jean-Yves Aubone, Bobby Deye and Bradley Mixson, Florida State boasted the No. 1 recruiting class in the nation at the start of the Fall 2006 Campaign.


In 2005, Hultquist and Crowell led the Tribe to a Cinderella-run that included a trip to the NCAA Elite Eight for the first time in school history. Florida State also finished with its highest-ever national ranking at No. 13 and stamped in the record book its first 20-plus win season since 1985.

After a few months off, the pair of Seminole coaches hit the ground running in the fall of 2005 and led their troop to an impressive fall campaign. Since graduating from Texas in 2000 with a bachelor's degree in sports management, Crowell has been playing professionally on the Challenger and FUTURES tours. Three seasons he reached the semifinals in doubles play at the Seascape Challenger (Aptos, Calif.) and the Challenger of Dallas. Unfortunately an injury cut his career short and was a teaching pro at Holly Tree Country Club in Tyler, Texas.

"The thing that separated Nick from the others was, not only was he a great player, being a two-time All-American, but there was the connection we had back at Texas and the success we had there," Hultquist said. "My last three years we won the Big 12 every year and Nick was a huge part of that. He understands what it means to be at a top five program."

means to be at a top five program."

Early in his career at Texas, Crowell established himself as one of the top doubles players in the country. During his freshman season, he teamed up with Paul Martin to advanced to the quarterfinals of the doubles draw at the NCAA Tournament, earning him his first All-America honor. That season he also earned the Big 12 Conference and ITA Region VI Freshman of the Year awards. Sophomore year, he earned all-conference honors in his last three seasons in singles and doubles.

Finishing his career just as he started it, Crowell captured his second All-America honor during his senior season as he and playing partner Michael Blue advanced to the round of 16 at the NCAA Tournament. Earlier in the season, the two paired up to win the doubles title at the ITA National Indoor Tournament.

With nearly 100 doubles victories during his tenure with the Longhorns, Crowell ranks third in school history with 98 triumphs. His 29 doubles wins with Martin during 1997 still ranks in the top five. Sparked by a 35-win season in 1997, he ranks 15th on the all-time singles list.

A native of Amarillo, Texas, the 28year-old Crowell resides in Tallahassee.

2005-06 Season In Review



Hultquist Hits 100 Wins

To cap off his seven season at FSU, head coach Dwayne Hultquist earned his 100th career victory as Florida State defeated Auburn 4-2 in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. He now sits just one victory behind Randy Jobson to become tied as the school's third all-time winningest coach by victories. In 57 years of Florida State men's tennis only three other coaches have had 101 or more wins including David Barron (141-85, 9 seasons), Richard McKee (129-65, 7 seasons) and Randy Jobson (101-62, 7 seasons).

Crowell Named ITA Mideast Region Assistant Coach of the Year

Third year assistant coach Nick Crowell was named the Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) Mideast Region Men's Tennis Assistant Coach of the Year. Since Crowell teamed up with head coach Dwayne Hultquist three seasons ago the pair has helped FSU emerge as one of the top programs in the nation. Since Crowell's arrival in 2004, the Seminoles have advanced to the NCAA Championships every season, won sixty percent of their matches, and shattered several team records along the way, including the programs first-ever trip to the NCAA Elite Eight in 2005. Most recently, Crowell was a big factor in the recent success of junior Ytai Abougzir, who became the first Seminole in 12 seasons to qualify for both the NCAA Singles and Doubles Championship.

Seminoles Advance Into Semifinals of ACC Tournament

The Seminoles cruised through the opening round of the ACC Tournament defeating Boston College 4-0. In the second round FSU faced off against No.

11 North Carolina and came up with a huge upset win taking down the Tar Heels 4-2. The Seminoles' run ended in the semi-finals when they faced off against No. 3 Duke, who they had defeated earlier in the season 4-3. After being forced inside due to rain Florida State was defeated 4-2.

Fourth Consecutive NCAA Tournament Appearance

The Seminoles are becoming a regular at the NCAA Tournament as they made their fourth consecutive appearance in 2006. It is the longest run of consecutive tournament appearances for Florida State since they had five in a row from 1994 to 1999. FSU advanced through the first round defeating Auburn 4-2 then were defeated in the second round by Ole Miss 2-4.

Abougzir Competes in Both Singles and Doubles at the NCAA Championships

Ytai Abougzir, who played No. I singles for the Seminoles during the season, was the first Florida State men's tennis player in 12 years to be selected to participate in both the singles and doubles competition of the 2006 NCAA Division I Men's Tennis Championships. FSU All-American Brian Stanton was the last FSU player to qualify for both singles and doubles during the 1994 season. After taking an early lead in the first set of his opening singles match, Abougzir eventually stumbled to Arkansas' No. 17-ranked Adrians Zguns
