

"YEAR OF THE SEMINOLES"

INDOOR

If everything goes as expected, the 1979 indoor track and field season could be the best in Seminole history. Sixteen returning lettermen, including three NCAA All-Americans and 16 recruits headline the 1979 squad.

Florida State expects the sprints, relays and middle distances to be the backbone of its indoor team. Highlighting this group will be two world class athletes, senior Mike Roberson and sophomore Walter McCoy who have earned a total of 10 All-American honors (five each) between them.

Roberson, who has achieved All-American honors as a sprinter, hurdler and relayist will again lead off a national championship caliber mile relay unit. McCoy, the defending NCAA champion at 600 yards and an All-American as a sprinter and relayist, will anchor the four man squad. Joining the pair on the mile relay is sophomore Ron Nelson, relay All-American in '78, and Palmer Simmons, last year's National Junior College indoor 440 champion. Senior John Citron, a national qualifier in both hurdles, and two time Metro Conference intermediate hurdle champion will also bid for a spot on the team.

Roberson, who has tied the unofficial hand time world record of 9.9 for 100 meters, will leave the hurdles this year and run the 60 indoor for the first time. McCoy, who has a 45.56 400 will defend his 1:09.6 NCAA victory in the 600.

Veterans Cliff Cook and Tom Herron will join newcomers Robb Gomez and Bobby Shackleford to form the nucleus of the middle distance crew that will cover the 880, 1000, mile, two-mile relay and distance medley relay. Cook, the two-time Metro Conference outdoor 1500 champion has a 4:05.3 metric mile equivalent. Herron, who still shares the Florida high school AAAA mile record, has lowered his time to 4:06.6 Gomez, the highly touted freshman is expected to see early action in the 1000 as well as the relays. Shackleford, another multitalented freshman, had one of the top doubles in Florida prep history at 4:14.4 and 1:54.3. The Miami native can also expect action in the relays.

Several other talented Seminoles also figure prominently in the '79 indoor season. Joining Roberson in the 60 will be Keith Davison, while distance running freshmen Herb Wills, John Hodge, Doug Overfelt and Larry Greene (all members of FSU's Metro Conference cross country champion squad) will cover the two and three mile events.

The field events will not be taking a back seat on the '79 indoor squad. Also featuring a blend of veterans and newcomers, the field event team will rely on veterans Ken Lanier, Brad Cooper and Ray Nuredini in the shot, Hilmar Skagfield in the pole vault and Rohn Stark in the high jump.

Lanier returns as the number two all-time shot putter for FSU with his 58-foot throw last year as a freshman. Senior discus record holder Cooper and junior Nuredini, the 1977 Metro shot put champion, are steadily improving. Skagfield, the top returning vaulter from '78, has cleared 15-7 in late fall competition, the same height as newcomer Al Stanley the '78 National Junior College runner-up. Stark, consistent at 6-10 in summer competition, will be joined by Florida prep AAAA champion Robert Haley (7-0) a '78 prep All-American. Brad Bosse, the national junior college runner-up in '77 and a 6-10 jumper, will give the Seminoles another three-man attack. Freshman Jeff Files has jumped 6'8''.

Heading the horizontal jumps is another freshman, Joe Moss, state AAAA long jump champion (24-6) who will also be competing in the triple jump.

OUTDOOR

In outdoor competition, much of the same holds true. Roberson, McCoy and company key the relays and sprints. Fast improving sophomore Nelson could challenge in the 100, 200 or 400 as could newcomers Simmons (400) and Davison (100 and 200). Citron takes responsibility for both hurdle events, while sophomore Leo Hodges, a surprise point getter in '78, will handle the 400 intermediate hurdles. Freshman hurdler Eddie Williams will work on the 110 hurdles, but should be a consistent factor in the 400 meter from the beginning.

Earl Caruthers, number three on the FSU all-time 800 list, returns for his final season of eligibility. Gomez, Herron, Shackleford and freshman Charlie Nye form the nucleus for an extremely capable middle distance corps. The distance events feature only one upperclassman, steeplechaser Tim McClain and four talented but inexperienced freshmen. Topping the list is two time prep All American Herb Wills. Already ahead of his prep performances, Wills could challenge for national qualifying standards as a freshman. The Tallahassee native will concentrate on 5,000 and 10,000 meters where he will be challenged by teammates Larry Greene and John Hodge. Doug Overfelt runs the steeplechase and is a talented prospect.

The field events strengthen during the outdoor season with the addition of the javelin, discus and decathlon. School record holder Eric Allain begins his junior year with more strength and consistency than any season past. Allain will be backed by sophomore Hank Langee, another surprise point getter in '78, who has demonstrated steady improvement. Bradley Cooper, the Seminole's top performer in the NCAA outdoor championships, will return for the discus. Ray Nuredini (former school record holder in the discus) and Ken Lanier are also expected to challenge the top throwers. Newcomer Mark Nugen, decathlete from Oregon, heads this new Seminole emphasis. Attempting the grueling event for the first time are punter-high jumper Rohn Stark and pole vaulter Dennis Nobles. Nobles is expected to be a top vaulter, while Stark should be right at the top in the high jump and Nugen adds excellent depth in the javelin.



DICK ROBERTS

Head Track Coach

Florida State graduate Dick Roberts begins his second year as head coach of the Seminole track team after serving as assistant to Mike Long for eight seasons

A native of St. Petersburg, Fla., Roberts was an outstanding distance runner for FSU and earned three varsity letters. He put his name in the school record book while running the indoor half-mile and as a member of the two-mile and distance medley teams. He also won the Florida Intercollegiate mile twice.

After graduating in 1964, Roberts remained on campus as a graduate assistant in cross country and track. He received his master's degree and moved to Dunedin High School as head coach where his track team won the state championship in 1968 and he was named Florida High School Coach of the Year. His athletes accumulated 10 individual state championships and set 13 state records during his three seasons at Dunedin.

Roberts returned to Florida State in 1970 as academic advisor for Seminole athletes, head cross country coach and assistant track coach.

In his first season at the Seminole helm, Roberts led the Tribe to an impressive 11-4 dual meet record including a second straight Metro Conference title. Overall, the Seminole thinclads finished 20th in the NCAA indoor and 21st outdoor. Also in his first season, Roberts coached seven All-Americans who earned the distinct honor 16 times.

Roberts has gained the reputation of an energetic and highly successful recruiter. He has been responsible for bringing the Seminoles' top track and field performers to FSU, and this year's list of newcomers is again an example of his recruiting prowess.

He is also an experienced speaker and clinician having spoken at many track affairs including the 1973 NCAA Track Coaches winter clinic.

Roberts was tutored by one of the most respected coaches in the collegiate track and field ranks and holds the highest regard for Mike Long, the man who directed Seminole track fortunes for the past 23 years.

"My goal is to continue to guide the track program as successfully as we have in the past on the regional level and hopefully expand our accomplishments at the national level." said Roberts.

"Hopefully we made progress towards that end in 1978 and we'll continue in the same direction in '79."



JOHN BROGLE

Assistant Track Coach Head Cross Country Coach

This season marks John Brogle's second on the Florida State track staff. Brogle, a former FSU student who obtained his physical education degree in 1966, served as captain of former coach Mike Long's track squad that year. He put his name in the Seminole record books that same year with a 1:52.2 clocking in the 880.

Brogle began his coaching career on the staff of Clearwater's Oak Grove Junior High School where he remained three years before moving cross county to St. Petersburg Catholic High School (formerly Bishop Barry).

Brogle's coaching career at Bishop Barry, his high school alma mater, is nothing short of phenomenal. His cross country teams won state championships in 1969, 1972, 1973 and 1975 and never finished lower than third in the state meet during his eight years at the Class AAA school.

His track and field performance has been just as impressive. Brogle coached squads finished either second or third in the state meet between 1971-74 and won the state crown in 1970.

In his first season as mentor of the FSU cross country team, the Seminoles captured their first ever Metro Conference cross country championship.

"Returning to Florida State was like coming home," says the easy going coach. "We're excited to be back in the atmosphere that Tallahassee and FSU provide."

Brogle was largely responsible for organizing FSU's first Summer Track and Field and Cross Country Camp. The highly successful endeavor attracted over 100 participants from Florida and the southeast during its first year.

Brogle obtained a masters in physical education from the University of South Florida and serves as assistant professor in physical education in addition to his coaching duties. He and his wife, Margie, have two children, Kimberly Anne, 12 and John Mark, Jr., 6.



JIM LONG

Assistant Coach

Former Florida State sprinter Jim Long returns to the Seminole track staff for his second season of coaching under head coach Dick Roberts.

Long, son of former Seminole mentor Mike Long, served as a graduate assistant in 1970 before moving cross town to accept the assistant coaching position at Tallahassee Leon. In his first season as assistant coach, the Long-led squad won both district and conference championships. The following season, Long was elevated to head coach and continued his winning ways capturing the conference championship twice and finishing second once.

The Seminole mentor was also instrumental in bringing women's high school athletics to the Leon County community. In 1974, Long served as a district representative on a committee to establish women's cross country in the Tallahassee area.

In his role for the Seminoles, Long's responsibilities include the hurdle, pole vault and decathlon events. Long also serves as the home meet administration correspondent with visiting teams.

The former Leon coach is no stranger to many of the Seminole athletes he now tutors having coached Seminole standouts Jesse Forbes, John Hodge and Metro Conference individual cross country champion Herb Wills.

Academically, the highly educated Long has already earned a B.A. in Humanities, a Master's in history and only needs a dissertation before completing his doctorate in physical education.

SEMINOLES WIN FIRST CROSS COUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIP

METRO CROSS COUNTRY

Florida State's Herb Wills, going out at a quick pace in hope of helping his team, set a course and school record November 4 to lead the freshmandominated Seminoles to their first Metro Conference championship. The victory is coupled with FSU's two consecutive track and field titles.

FSU put three men in the first 10 at the 8,000 meter Seminole Golf Course loop, to defeat defending conference champion and pre-meet favorite St. Louis and first year Metro team Virginia Tech. The Seminoles had 43 points, St. Louis 55 and Virginia Tech 58.

Cincinnati (90), Memphis State (92), Louisville (157) and Tulane (218) completed the team scoring.

Wills, a native of Tallahassee, said after his victory that he ran better because he thought FSU had a chance to win.

Wills winning time was 24:05.2 over the slightly less than five-mile cross country course. He opened up a 5-10 yard lead in his first mile, increased it slightly at three miles and then easily held off a challenge by defending champion Bernie Weber of Cincinnati. Weber finished 11 seconds behind Wills.

The Seminoles used their strongest effort of the season to win the team title. Junior and team captain Tom Herron ran his best race of the season, finishing fourth in 24:55. Freshman John Hodge may have nailed down the victory for FSU when he sprinted past two St. Louis runners to finish seventh in 25:01.

Other FSU finishers were freshman Doug Overfelt (12th in 25:08) and Larry Greene (19th in 25:32), sophomore Steve Andrews (31st in 26:34) and freshman Bobby Shackleford (34th in 26:47).

Following the meet, cross country coach John Brogle stressed that team unity and pride were the keys in winning for the young Seminoles.

"I felt we were ready for our best effort of the year," said Brogle. "This meet was something that we looked forward to from the outset of the season. What we lacked in experience we made up in determination and pride."

MIKE LONG TRACK

In addition to the structural renovations at one of the finest on-campus outdoor facilities in the nation, the Florida State track has also added a name.

After 23 years at the Seminole helm, head coach Mike Long's name will be placed on the scoreboard to commemorate his devoted service to Florida State and the Tallahassee community.

Located conveniently on the FSU athletic complex, the eight lane, quarter mile oval has a highly regarded Chevron 440 running surface. The same surfacing material is used for the jump runways in the infield portion of the track. The Chevron 440 surface is reputed to be one of the finest all-purpose surfaces for a multi-use university track. It not only gives a uniform, fast, all-weather track for meets, but also is soft enough to be an ideal daily workout surface.

A new scoreboard commemorating the Mike Long Track will feature a running display clock which connects with an Accutrack system to be viewed by both runners and spectators. The new clock can stop for split times and then catch up. It will be used to record the winning time and then continue. A time and temperature clock will also be featured on the scoreboard which will display in five second intervals, four seconds of time and one second of temperature. The time readout displays seconds as well as the hour and minutes.

Illuminated for 24 hours, the clock can be utilized not only for Seminole athletes, but for joggers in training.

Also added to the '79 addition of the Mike Long Track is a new innovative design, combination high jump takeoff and javelin approach area. Located at the south end, the area will feature an octagonal design which will provide eight separate takeoff areas.

Extending from the northernmost and southernmost sides is an additional extension to increase the length of runup for the javelin to 110 feet.

Shot put will move to the southeast corner and the discus throwing circle will be moved to the southwest end of the track. This will place all field event performers in front of the spectators.

Chutes at both ends of the straightaway provide the opportunity to take advantage of prevailing winds in the 110 HH and 100 meter dash. Additionally, the long jump, triple jump, and pole vault are constructed to also take advantage of any favoring wind.

The facility, completely enclosed and surrounded by tall pines and short palms, is used by the entire campus. The track has seating for approximately 5,000 persons and a press box is located over the west stands. The facility is lighted for night events.

FSU PRESIDENT



Dr. Bernard F. Sliger, Florida State University's president since 1977, is one of the most ardent fans in Seminole sports history.

The 53-year-old Sliger believes that competition is an integral part of university life. "A major public institution is benefited by a well-rounded athletic program," he said. "In addition to being an important source of outside giving, it is a means of identification. Athletics is a rallying point for present and former students as well as supporters of Florida State."

An economist and scholar in special fields of economic theory and finance, Dr. Sliger earned his B.A., M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in economics at Michigan State University, and has done postdoctoral studies in mathematical economics at the University of Minnesota. He has taught at Michigan State. Southern University and Louisiana State University. He served as executive director of Louisiana Coordinating Council for High Education before joining FSU as executive vice president in 1972.

Dr. Sliger, and his wife Greta, have four children.

JOHN BRIDGERS

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR



John Bridgers came on the Florida State scene as its athletic director in the spring of 1973 and since that time the Seminole program has constantly been on the move upward.

His list of accomplishments is an imposing one for an athletic director who has been faced by the same general financial woes that beset the economy in general and intercollegiate athletics in particular nationwide. These problems were compounded at Florida State since the Tribe football program — the main source of revenue generation

for the department — had suffered through its leanest years since the University resumed athletics in 1947.

A native of Birmingham, Ala., Bridgers came to Florida State from South Carolina. Previously he had spent 10 years as athletic director and head football coach at Baylor University, a period during which the Bears participated in three bowl games.

Following graduation from Auburn, Bridgers served two years with the Army in Korea, being discharged as a captain after enlisting as a private.

Bridgers is married to the former Frances Young of Florence, Alabama.

THIS IS FLORIDA STATE

Florida State University — the home of more than 20,000 Seminoles — has a campus that starts at the top of one of Tallahassee's famed seven hills, and rolls gently downward and westward across 340-odd acres of pines, palms and pecan trees.


Founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, its heritage is evidenced in the wide range of architectural struggles to preserve history and keep up with modern times and air conditioning. Yet it still ranks as one of the South's last, few bastions of campus greenery — the kind that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods with moss-hung oaks that are, in some cases, as old as the University itself, if not older.

From the Gothic towers of Westcott at the eastern entrance to the campus, to the modern glass and steel structures of its Science Complex to the west, Florida State University has moved forward in time and growth more rapidly than many of its newer counterparts in the State University System. Its enrollment has quadrupled since it became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as the Florida State College for Women.

Today, its 14 schools and colleges are spread through \$150 million worth of building, its annual budget exceeds \$100 million and it attracts more than \$18 million a year in research contracts and grants. Students can pick and choose from more than 100 career options offered in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, dance, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater and visual arts programs.

The University is a member of the Academic Common Market and has overseas study centers in Florence, London and the Panama Canal Zone. Summer programs of study are offered in law at Oxford, in hotel and restaurant ad-





ministration in Switzerland, and in comparative studies of economic and social systems in Yugoslavia.

The location of FSU in the Capital City of Florida offers unusual opportunities for study and research in the social and policy sciences, and an optimum environment for internships and on-the-job learning experiences for students in many fields of study.

The University operates major laboratory facilities for nuclear, marine and computer research. In addition, it has a wide-ranging spectrum of institutes and research centers, each of which deals with specialized aspects of the following fields of study: government, geophysical fluid dynamics, molecular biophysics, educational research, American theater, gerontology, social research, community mental health, employee relations, economic development, analysis of resources and environment, Southern culture and religion, statistical consultation, educational technology and instructional systems, population studies, multi-campus systems, educational tax policy, urban and regional planning, criminological and correctional research, and the study of women in educational management systems. A Regional Rehabilitation Center serves citizens in the tri-state area with diagnostic and remedial treatment of speech and hearing problems.

A city within a city, Florida State has 1,200 faculty members, more than 6,000 additional employees and a construction program that will exceed \$50 million between now and 1981. The construction of a new civic center and a center for continuing education — both near the State Capitol — are destined for completion by the fall of 1980.

MIKE LONG JOINS FSU HALL OF FAME




MIKE LONG

ESOL HALL OF FAME

In his 23 years as FSU track coach, Mike Long amassed an enviable record of 131 wins and 32 losses. Five times in his 23 years Long's teams were undefeated and on six other occasions Florida State lost only one meet. From 1955 to 1977 Mike Long made the Seminoles one of the strongest track and field powers in the South. Fourteen Florida State thinclads won All American designation. Furthermore, four of Coach Long's sons competed for the garnet and gold. In his final year, Long led the Tribe to an overwhelming Metro Conference championship. From 1953 to 1955 Mike Long also coached football, handling ends for head coach Tom Nugent.

An excellent on-the-field coach, Mike Long instilled a fierce sense of competition in his athletes. He is largely responsible for making the Florida State program and facility among the best in the nation.

Long joins previous inductee Ken Misner and Mike Kelly, who will join the pair at the 1979 induction.
