

"YEAR OF THE SEMINOLES — 1980"

OUTDOOR

There will be some new faces for the Seminoles this season when the Tribe places their 11th place NCAA finish on the line in outdoor season.

Lost from last year's roster are NCAA qualifiers Brad Cooper, John Citron and Earl Caruthers. Also lost from the team are top pole vaulter Hilmar Skagfield, hammer thrower Vinnie Bilotto, Seminole javelin record holder Eric Allain, high jumper Robert Haley and hurdler Eddie Williams.

Cooper, probably the biggest loss for the Tribe, is the defending NCAA discus champion hurling the platter 212-6, a new NCAA record. The loss of Citron will mean the Tribe must find a new 400 meter intermediate hurdler, while the graduation of Caruthers will open up a spot on the NCAA third

place finishing 1600m-relay unit.

While the Tribe has lost a great deal, they have also gained through recruiting. Joining the squad this year are 400 meter runner Reggie Ross, an All-South prep performer and local Tallahassee product Dusty Harmon, one of the state's top pole vaulters. Also added to the Seminole roster are Vance LaSage, holder of the second fastest 440 time behind teammate Ross, and Lincoln High School graduate Lenx Jackson, a top hurdler. Making the transition from football to track, Seminole defensive back Bobby Butler joins the squad in the sprints and long jump, and Mel Boodie, the national junior college indoor 600 champion and state 400 champion should provide the Seminoles with depth in the 400-800 meter range. In the distance events, the Tribe also recruited well, grabbing Marcus Trigg, one of the top five cross country runners for the Tribe this fall, and Paul Hodge, younger brother of Seminole distance runner John Hodge, another standout athlete from Lincoln High School.

While the new recruits are almost guaranteed to make a contribution, a

pair of 'old' Seminoles may make the biggest difference of all.

Returning to the ranks of the healthy are five-time All-American Mike Roberson and a top Seminole sprinter from two years ago Kevin Johnson.

Roberson, the only person ever to earn All-American in the sprints, hurdles and both relays, returns to the Tribe after missing all but two meets last year due to injury. During his return this summer, Roberson captured the World University Games 100 meter dash and tied for second on the world list clocking an amazing 10.07. The sleek footed senior, who has outdoor eligibility only, also led off the American 4 x 100 relay teams in the Pan American Games, World Cup Championships, National Sports Festival and World University Games.

Johnson, a standout before he contracted Guillion Barre Disease, will return to the squad after a year of difficult recuperation. A former All-American for the Tribe in the 400-meter relay, Johnson is expected to run in

the 100, 200, relays and compete in the long jump.

Also gaining eligibility for the Seminoles this season are Leon Hutchins,

a Division II All-American triple jumper, and 5,000 meter distance runner Brett Hoffman who holds the fastest prep two mile time ever by a Floridian at 8:53.0.

With the return of Roberson and Johnson, the Seminoles will be able to return last year's quarter-milers to their natural positions. Look for the Seminoles to be much improved in the shorter distances.

Leading the list of the Seminoles' talented corps of 400 meter runners is Walt McCoy, the holder of the world's fifth fastest time in 1979. McCoy also owned the world's fastest collegiate time last year with a clocking of 45.16. Also a runner to watch is All-American Ron Nelson who had the fastest lead off leg in the NCAA 1600-meter relay last season and has a best of 46.16.

A top 400 meter runner last year, senior Palmer Simmons moves from that event to the 800 this year. Joining Simmons will be Boodie and sophomores John Anderson, Tony Bradley, Charlie Nye and freshman Carlton Jones. Junior Lynn Brown, top 800 runner in 1978 returns after a

vear at junior college.

Another big switch finds NCAA 800 qualifier Robb Gomez moving to the 1500 meter event. Senior Tom Herron, the top 1500 meter runner on the squad last year also returns for his final season. Sophomore Bobby Shackleford, plagued by injuries last year, should also see action in the

When you speak of the distance events, you speak about the FSU youth. Sophomore Herb Wills, a winner in every Metro race he ran last year returns with a host of accolades he earned this summer. Included in Wills' prestigious list are the 1979 National Junior Cross Country Championshlip, the National Junior 10,000 meter championship, a spot on the US team that competed in Ireland, and the honor of being the top 10,000 meter runner that competed against the Russians in Boston and California. Also an Olympic Marathon qualifier, Wills will be joined by distance runner/steeplechaser Doug Overfelt. Add to those two Larry Greene, a third place finisher in the Conference 5,000 meter outdoor and a second place finisher in the Conference 10,000 meter outdoor, John Hodge, Trigg, Hoffman and Mark McGee, and the Tribe is well stocked in the distance events.

In the 110 meter hurdles, look for freshman Lenx Jackson to take the lead, while in the 400 intermediate hurdlers junior Leo Hodges, a major con-

tributor behind the graduated Citron, should pace the way.

In the high jump, seniors Larry Sayers and Brad Bosse should be the major contributors. Also, decathlete Rohn Stark could make a sizeable contribution if needed.

In the long jump, the loss of sophomore Joe Moss should be offset by the return of Johnson and recruitment of freshman Phil Hunt. The triple jump

will feature sophomores Hutchins, Sam Gates and J. T. Stockton.

With the loss of NCAA Champion Cooper, the Tribe will be hurt in the discus unless FSU record holder Ken Lanier can perform as well in the discus as he has in the shot. Joining Lanier is senior Ray Nuredini, former school record holder in the discus, who has consistently been improving.

In the javelin, the Tribe is a little weaker with the loss of Allain, but should fare well with the return of junior Hank Langee, the second best javelin thrower on the squad last year. Joining Langee are Phil Hunt, Joe

Pascal, and Niles Steward.

In the decathlon, Florida State record holder Rohn Stark (also the punter on the FSU football team) returns as a possible Olympic trials hopeful. Joining Stark are Dennis Nobles (winner of last year's Domino Classic) and junior college transfer Mark Nugen.

The loss of senior Skagfield should be made up by the return of Al Stanley, Nobles, Tim Ward and Donnie Bailey. Toss in freshman Dusty Har-

mon and the vaults look secure.

"This team could be our best team nationally ever," said FSU head coach Dick Roberts. "This team has maybe a half-dozen competitors that can compete anywhere on the national level. This year we should have an excellent chance to improve our 11th place finish in the NCAA's last season. But, like always our goal is to improve."



DICK ROBERTS

Head Track Coach

Florida State graduate Dick Roberts begins his third year as head coach of the Seminole track team after serving as assistant to Mike Long for eight seasons.

A native of St. Petersburg, Fla. Roberts was an outstanding distance runner for FSU and earned three varsity letters. He put his name in the school record book while running the indoor half-mile and as a member of the two-mile and distance medley teams. He also won the Florida Intercollegiate mile twice.

After graduating in 1964, Roberts remained on campus as a graduate assistant in cross country and track. He received his master's degree and moved to Dunedin High School as head coach where his track team won the state championship in 1968 and he was named Florida High School Coach of the Year. His athletes accumulated 10 individual state championships and set 13 state records during his three seasons at Dunedin.

Roberts returned to Florida State in 1970 as academic advisor for Seminole athletes while serving as head cross country coach and assistant track coach.

In his first season at the Seminole helm, Roberts led the Tribe to an impressive 11-4 dual meet record including a second straight Metro Conference title. Last season the Tribe's dual meet record improved 11-2 losing only to SEC foes LSU (8th nationally) and Tennessee (11th nationally) and the squad captured its third straight outdoor Metro title. They also won the Conference's inaugural indoor championship. The team also finished in 11th place at the NCAA Championship (only one point away from 10th place) last year, its highest finish ever. In two seasons, Roberts coached nine All-Americans who earned the distinct honor 21 times.

Roberts has earned the reputation of an energetic and highly successful recruiter. He has been responsible for bringing the Seminoles top track and field performers to FSU, and this year's list of newcomers is again an example of his recruiting prowess.

An experienced speaker and clinician, Roberts has spoken at many track affairs including the 1973 NCAA Track Coaches winter clinic.

Roberts was tutored by one of the most respected collegiate coaches in the track and field ranks and holds the highest regard for Mike Long, the man who directed Seminole track fortunes for 23 years.

"With our 11th place performance last season, I would say we are on the path to continuing our excellence both in regional and national competition," said Roberts. Hopefully this year we can crack the Top 10, but the goal this year as it is every year is to improve individually and as a team."

Coach Roberts is married to the former Allene Hughes of St. Petersburg.



JOHN BROGLE

Assistant Track Coach Head Cross Country Coach

This season marks John Brogle's third on the Florida State track staff. Brogle, a former FSU student who obtained his physical education degree in 1966, served as captain of former Mike Long's track squad that year. He put his name in the Seminole record book that same season with a 1:52.2 clocking in the 880.

Brogle began his coaching career on the staff of Clearwater's Oak Grove Junior High School where he remained three years before moving cross county to St. Petersburg Catholic High School (formely Bishop Barry).

Brogle's coaching career at St. Pete Catholic, his high school alma mater, was nothing short of phenomenal. His cross country teams won state championships in 1969, 1972, 1973, and 1975 and never finished lower than third in the state meet during his eight years at the Class AAA school.

His track and field performance has been just as impressive. Brogle coached squads finished either second or third in the state meet between 1971-74 and won the state crown in 1970.

In his second season as mentor of the FSU cross country team, the Seminoles became the first team in Conference history to win the Metro cross country championships two years in a row.

"I'm very pleased and proud in the way our program has gone in the last two years," said the well-liked and easy going coach. I hope to continue the success in cross country and track that Florida State has enjoyed in the past."

Brogle was largely responsible in 1978 for organizing FSU's first Summer Cross Country camp. The highly successful endeavor attracted over 100 participants from Florida and the southeast during its first year and continued in its winning ways last summer.

Brogle obtained a master's degree in physical education from the University of South Florida and serves as assistant professor in the physical education department at FSU in addition to his coaching responsibilities. He and his wife, Margie, have two children, Kimberly Anne, 13, and John Mark, Jr., 7.



JIM LONG

Assistant Coach

Former Florida State sprinter Jim Long returns to the Seminole track staff for his third season of coaching under head coach Dick Roberts.

Long, son of former Seminole mentor Mike Long, served as a graduate assistant in 1970 before moving cross town to accept the assistant coaching position at Tallahassee Leon High School. In his first season as assistant coach, the Long-led squad won both district and conference championships. The following season Long was elevated to head coach and continued his winning ways capturing the conference championship twice and finishing second once.

The Seminole coach was also instrumental in bringing women's high school athletics to the Leon County community. In 1974, Long served as a district representative on a committee to establish women's cross country in the state of Florida.


In his role with the Seminoles, Long's responsibilities include the hurdles, pole vault and decathlon events. Long's influence is easily recognized with the Seminoles gaining regional prominence in all three areas. The personable coach also serves as the home meet administration correspondent with visiting teams.

The former Leon coach is no stranger to many of the former and current athletes he now tutors having coached Seminole standouts Jesse Forbes, John Hodge and nationally known Metro Conference cross country champion Herb Wills.

Academically, the highly educated Long has already earned a B.A. in humanities, a master's in history and only needs a dissertation before completing his doctorate in physical education.



SEMINOLES BECOME FIRST TEAM TO WIN TWO CONSECUTIVE CONFERENCE CROSS COUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIPS

METRO CROSS COUNTRY

This year's cross country team showed its depth at the Metro Conference cross country championships at Memphis, Tenn. this past season by winning their second straight team title.

Florida State put four men in the Top 10 over the five mile golf course terrain to finish with a record low 39 points. A young Virginia Tech team finished second with 51 points, followed closely by Memphis State (54), Cincinnati (98), St. Louis (140), Louisville (152) and Tulane (196).

Sophomore Herb Wills, the defending Metro cross country champion, who had been slowed for several weeks prior to the race with a leg injury, finished ninth (25.20) despite falling down with less than two miles to go. Wills was in second place at the time of the mishap. Florida State's first finisher was versatile sophomore Doug Overfelt who covered the five mile distance in a credible 25:05. Following Overfelt were freshman Marcus Trigg (sixth at 25:14) who ran his best race of the year as did sophomore John Hodge (eighth, 25:18). Team captain and senior Tom Herron finished out his cross country running career by nailing down the championship with a 12th place finish at 25:42. Sophomore Larry Greene (13th, 25:46) gave the team the insurance it needed by beating every other team's fourth and fifth place runners. Sophomore Scott Taylor (22nd, 26:15) rounded out the Seminole entry.

The Seminoles were without the services of sophomore distance sensation Brett Hoffman who missed most of the season with a blood disorder.

Though the team returns six of the seven runners, plus Hoffman, from this year's championship squad, head coach John Brogle cautioned the team after the meet of the importance of improvement.


"Metro cross country has steadily improved over the past few years," Brogle said. "With the addition of a young and talented Virginia Tech team, these championships will even get tougher in the future."



MIKE LONG TRACK

Located conveniently on the FSU athletic complex, the eight lane, quarter mile oval has a highly regared Chevron 440 running surface. The same surfacing material is used for the jump runways in the infield portion of the track. The Chevron 440 surface is reputed to be one of the finest all-purpose surfaces for a multi-use university track. It not only gives a uniform, fast, all-weather track for meets, but also is soft enough to be an ideal daily workout surface.

A new sign board commemorating the Mike Long Track was made operational last year and includes a running display clock which connects with an Accutrack system to be viewed by both runner and spectator. The new clock can stop for split times and then catch up. It can be used to record the winning time and then continue. A time and temperature clock is also featured on the sign board which displays in five second intervals, of time and temperature. The time readout displays seconds as well as the hour and minutes.

Illuminated for 24 hours, the clock can be utilized not only by the Seminole athlete, but by the joggers in training.

Added last season to the Mike Long Track was a new innovative design, combination highjump takeoff and javelin approach area. Located at the south end, the area features an octagonal design which provides eight separate takeoff areas. The area is completely covered with the new "rubaturf" surfacing.

Extending from the northernmost and southernmost sides is an additional extension to increase the length of the runup for the javelin to 110 feet.

The shot put is located to the southeast corner and the discus throwing circle is at the southwest end of the track.

Chutes at both ends of the straightaway provide the opportunity to take advantage of prevailing winds in the 110 HH and 100 meter dash. Additionally, the long jump, triple jump, and pole vault are constructed to take advantage of any favoring wind.

The facility, completely enclosed and surrounded by tall pines and short palms, is used by the entire campus. The track has seating for approximately 5,000 people and a press box is located over the west stands. The facility is lit for night events.

Ingram, one of the top Seminole vaulters ever, works regularly with the Florida State vaulters. Pursuing post graduate studies, Ingram still competes as often as possible while lending valuable assistance to the coaching staff. A walk-on in the 1971 season, the first year mentor worked his way to the team's number one vaulter in '74.

Wills, father of Florida State sophomore distance runner Herb Wills, continues his lifetime running enthusiasm by assisting in the distance events. A former high school level coach, Wills lettered in track, cross country and wrestling while attending Eastern Illinois University. The highly scholared mentor has earned a B.S. and M.S. in mathematics and a doctorate in education.

DR. BERNARD F. SLIGER FSU President

Dr. Bernard F. Sliger, Florida State University's president since 1977, is one of the most ardent fans in Seminole sports history.

Known as "Bernie" to nearly all the student athletes, Dr. Sliger makes no secret of his sentiments about athletics at Florida State. He says he wants a "spot in the Top 20" for every Seminole team, including those who compete in the arenas of academe. And there's no one on campus prouder than he is of the records set in honor of that tradition last year by more than one team in each category.

Dr. Sliger, who came to Florida State as its executive vice president in 1972, was formerly executive director of the Louisiana Coordinating Council for Higher Education. His background as an educator includes 19 years as a faculty member and administrator and sports fan at LSU.

An economist and scholar in the special fields of economic theory and public finance, he frequently serves as a consultant to private and public commissions. He also authored several publications dealing with public finance.

Dr. Sliger and his wife, Greta, have four children.

PHILLIP R. FORDYCE

Interim Athletic Director

As interim athletic director for Florida State, Phillip R. Fordyce is responsible for the administration of all intercollegiate athletics at FSU.

Fordyce accepted the temporary post after the resignation of former AD John Bridgers.

Currently, Fordyce is the chief executive officer for Dr. Bernard Sliger. Before assuming this position, he served as provost for the Division of Professional Schools and Colleges for three years.

In his role as special assistant and assistant chief executive officer, Fordyce is respon-

sible for the general administration and policy formulation for such areas as Strozier Library, all international programs and the Seminole Booster Club. He also represents the University on the SUS Collective Bargaining Advisory Committee and represents the President's Office on numerous standing committees of the University.

Fordyce, born in Lyons, Ind., holds a M.S. and B.S. degree from Butler University where he majored in botany and zoology and specialized in graduate studies at Indiana and Purdue University.

Fordyce is married to the former Marilyn Lamb of Amboy, Ind. They have five children: Deborah, Natalie, Marilyn, Kerry and Timothy.


THIS IS FLORIDA STATE

Florida State University — the home of more than 20,000 Seminoles — has a campus that starts at the top of one of Tallahassee's famed seven hills, and rolls gently downward and westward across 340-odd acres of pines, palms and pecan trees.

Founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, its heritage is evidenced in the wide range of architectural struggles to preserve history and keep up with modern times and air conditioning. Yet it still ranks as one of the South's last, few bastions of campus greenery — the kind that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods with mosshung oaks that are, in some cases, as old as the University itself, if not older.

From the Gothic towers of Westcott at the eastern entrance to the campus, to the modern glass and steel structures of its Science Complex to the west, Florida State University has moved forward in time and growth more rapidly than many of its newer counterparts in the State University System. Its enrollment has quadrupled since it became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as the Florida State College for Women.

Today, its 14 schools and colleges are spread through \$150 million worth of buildings, its annual budget exceeds \$100 million and it attracts more than \$18 million a year in research contracts and grants. Students can pick and choose from more than 100 career options offered in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, dance, education, home



economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater and visual arts programs.

The University is a member of the Academic Common Market and has overseas study centers in Florence, London and the Panama Canal Zone. Summer programs of study are offered in law at Oxford, in hotel and restaurant administration in Switzerland, and in comparative studies of economic and social systems in Yugoslavia.

The location of FSU in the Capital City of Florida offers unusual opportunities for study and research in the social and policy sciences, and an optimum environment for internships and on-the-job learning experiences for students in many fields of study.

The University operates major laboratory facilities for nuclear, marine and computer research. In addition, it has a wide-ranging spectrum of institutes and research centers, each of which deals with specialized aspects of the following fields of study: government, geophysical fluid dynamics, molecular biophysics, educational research, American theater, gerontology, social research, community mental health, employee relations, economic development, analysis of resources and environment, Southern culture and religion, statistical consultation, educational technology and instructional systems, population studies, multi-campus systems, educational tax policy, urban and regional planning, criminological and correctional research, and the study of women in educational management systems. A Regional Rehabilitation Center serves citizens in the tri-state area with diagnostic and remedial treatment of speech and hearing problems.

A city within a city, Florida State has 1,200 faculty members, more than 6,000 additional employees and a construction program that will exceed \$50 million between now and 1981. The construction of a new civic center and a center for continuing education — both near the State Capitol — are destined for completion by the fall of 1980.



SEMINOLES FINISH 11TH AT NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

Following a 21st place finish one year ago, the Florida State thinclads jumped ten notches and posted an 11th place finish in the NCAA championships held June 1-3 in Champaign, III. The 11th place finish was the best ever for Florida State.

The Tribe brought eight athletes to compete in six separate events and finished with 20 points tieing the Seminoles with fellow track powers Arizona, Tennessee and Texas A&M. Florida State finished a mere one point behind Washington State for a Top 10 position.

Making the trip up north for Florida State was Robb Gomez in the 800 meter dash, John Citron in the 400 meter intermediate hurdles, Ken Lanier in the shot put, Walter McCoy, Ron Nelson and Palmer Simmons in the 400, Brad Cooper in the discus and the 1600 meter relay team consisting of Nelson, Simmons, Earl Caruthers and McCoy.

In the first days of competition, Gomez, Citron, Lanier, Nelson and Simmons were eliminated from competition leaving McCoy in the 400, the 1600 meter relay team and Cooper in the discus. In those first days in the field events Cooper tossed the discus an amazing 212-6 to establish a new NCAA record. One day later Cooper would hurl the implement 209-9 out-distancing his nearest competitor by almost three feet and capturing the NCAA title

In the running events, McCoy survived the semi-finals and raced to a fourth place finish in a time of 45.83, his fastest time of the year to that point. Two months later McCoy would shock the track world with a clocking of 45.18 at the National Sports Festival and 45.16 at the World University Games, the fastest collegiate time of 1979. McCoy's finish set the stage for the following day when the 1600 meter relay team would unite 400 meter qualifiers Nelson, Simmons and McCoy and along with senior Caruthers.

The Seminoles took the early lead as Nelson, for the second time in as many days, recorded the fastest lead-off leg in the relay with a time of 46.9. The Seminoles dropped back slightly in the second leg and even a 45.9 performance by Simmons and a 44.8 run by McCoy couldn't lift the Seminoles' past favorite LSU and Texas-Austin. The Tribe finished a very satisfying third at 3:05.62 the fastest relay time ever for an FSU team.

"I'm more than very pleased with our job at NCAA's," said an obviously drained coach Dick Roberts. "An 11th place performance is great, but we can improve next year."

The coming months should certainly tell.
