#### DR. HOWARD G. DANFORD

#### DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Dr. Howard G. Danford heads Florida State University's vast athletic and physical education program. He has served as director of athletics and physical education for men since 1947.

Prior to his arrival at Florida State, Danford served for seven years as director of health, physical education,

and safety in the Madison, Wisconsin, public school system. Since coming to Florida State

University, Danford has seen football rise from a pick-up sport in 1947 to major college status, as well as guiding all other phases of the FSU athletic program, which includes nine varsity sports, a complete physical education and recreation curriculum, and the nationally famous Florida State University Circus, "Flying High," and the equally famous "Gymkana."

The next hig step in the over

The next big step in the overall physical education program will be taken with the completion of FSU'S new gymnasium

on the East Campus. When this structure is completed it will contain all facilities for the men's physical education program.

A graduate of Ohio University, Dr. Danford received his master's and doctorate degrees from New York University in 1943.

Dr. Danford is an author of note, his most recent work being the book "Recreation in the American Community," published in 1953. He has also authored numerous magazine articles and has held prominent positions in several national organizations. He is currently a member of the Executive Committee of the United States Volleyball Association; chairman of the Curriculum Research Committee of the College Physical Education Association; chairman of the Policies Committee of the Federation of National Professional Organization for Recreation; and chairman of the Florida AAU Volleyball Committee.

One of America's volleyball pioneers, Dr. Danford made an extensive six weeks tour of Germany and France last winter, serving as an instructor for the U. S. Army's 1955 volleyball clinics. Danford made the trip at the request of the Commander in Chief of United States Army, Europe, and is planning a return trip this year (January-February) for another tour of duty with volleyball clinics.

Under Dr. Danford's guidance and direction, Florida State's excellent program of intercollegiate athletics has grown in size and stature, and is now becoming recognized as one of the finest in the nation.

Danford's enthusiastic interest in the whole program of intercollegiate athletics at Florida State has resulted in phenomenal achievements made by all Seminole athletic squads in the eight short years Florida State has been engaging in intercollegiate sport.

#### BASEBALL

# DANNY LITWHILER, Coach RONALD MELTON, Assistant Coach

Starting his second season at the helm of the Florida State's strong baseball team, Danny Litwhiler has proven himself one of the finest baseball mentors in collegiate ranks.

Litwhiler has the perfect background to be among the best college coaches in the nation. He built up a vast storehouse of baseball strategy by keeping minute notes during his major league playing days with the St. Louis Cardinals, Philadelphia Phils, Cincinnati Reds and the old Boston Brayes.

In his first season at FSU in 1955, Danny rounded up the best baseball schedule in Seminole history, and his young horsehiders proved capable

young horsehiders proved capable of the task before them. Under Litwhiler's excellant tutelage, the 1955 Indians compiled a fine 17-6 record.

This year, Litwhiler expects another good club. And if the most and best can be gotten out of any college team, Danny is the man who can do it.

Litwhiler went down in the baseball record books for several oustanding performances before retiring as an active player in 1950. He batted safely in 21 straight games in his first season in the majors. He belted a home run in every National League park for the Phillies in 1941.

Among his most noteworthy feats was accepting 317 chances in 151 games (1942) without an error, becoming the first major league outfielder to play a complete errorless season. His record of 187 consecutive games without an error still stands.

The glove Litwhiler used in that flawless skein was recently retired in baseball's "Hall of Fame."

In 1942 and 1943, Litwhiler tied a National League record for the most years—two—leading in fielding percentage by an outfielder appearing in 100 or more games.

With a lifetime major league batting average of .281, Danny played in the 1943 and 1944 World Series with the Cardinals, and singled in his only trip to the plate in the 1942 All-Star game.

Litwhiler, 39, was born in Ringtown, Pennsylvania, and is a graduate of Bloomsburg, Pa., State Teachers College. A Pennsylvania Dutchman, Litwhiler began his professional baseball career in 1936 with Charleroi of the Penn State League. It took him only 4 years to advance to the majors.

After retiring as an active player, Danny coached Cincinnati in 1951 and has managed minor league clubs at Fargo, N.D., Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Jamestown, N.Y., and Duluth, Minn., in the past four years.

The Litwhiler family is a string of D's—Danny, wife Dorothy, sons Danny (14) and Dickie (10), and daughters Deanna (8) and Dottie (4).

#### DR. DON VELLER, Coach

Dr. Don Veller starts his fourth season as head man of the FSU links squad. In three seasons Veller's teams have posted a record of 23 wins against but 7 defeats. Veller's 1955 golf team was the best in Florida State's brie! history, winning 10 out of 11 matches.

Veller took over the golf coaching duties after relinquishing his position as head football coach in January, 1953. During a five year tenure as FSU's grid coach, he compiled an impressive record of 31 wins, 12 losses and

He came to Florida State as head football coach in 1948 after having served as an assistant to the late "Bo" Mc-Millin at Indiana in 1947.

Veller played three years of football at Indiana (1932-33-34), and was acclaimed one of the

and was acclaimed one of the midwest's finest backs in 1934. In his final collegiate game, he ran 82 yards for a touchdown that enabled Indiana to defeat Purdue.

He was awarded the Big Ten medal after that season, and was also honored as Indiana's top athlete when he received the Bal-four award and the Chicago Tri-

bune award. Veller received his BS degree

in physical education at Indiana in 1935. From 1935 through 1941 he compiled a fine high school football coaching record at Elkhart, Indiana where his teams won 54 games, lost 11 and played three

Veller was awarded the doctor of physical education degree from Indiana in 1950. In addition to coaching golf at FSU, Veller holds the rank of full professor of physical education. He is active in the Air Force Reserve, and holds the rank of Lt. Col.

Mike Long starts his second season as head man of FSU'S track fortunes, and results produced in 1955 leave little doubt that this University of Minnesota graduate is doing a great job.

Mike came to Florida State in 1953 as a "triple threat" man, being at assistant coach in football, basketball, and

and defeated the University of Florida's talented team in the Florida AAU by a 51 5/6 to 47 3/4 count. Long will inherit several seasoned veterans from last

year's top crew, plus some fine rising sophomores and in-coming freshmen. Some of the leading returnees include Tenney Brown in the high jump; Joe Davis in the hurdles, broad jump and sprints; Jerry Jacobs in the shot; Jack Terwilliger in the sprints and relay; Charlie Watson in the middle distances; and Ron Weaver in the javelin.
