THE ATHLETIC DIRECTOR ...

HOWARD G. DANFORD

Heading Florida State University's vast and constantly improving athletic program is Howard G. Danford, a man who believes in equal emphasis on all athletics

Danford has served as Director of Athletics and Physical Education since 1947. During that period, he

has cultivated a program that includes nine intercollegiate sports.

They are football, basketball, baseball, gymnastics, swimming, golf, volleyball, tennis and track.

In addition, he has greatly aided the growth of Florida State's nationally famous student circus, "Flying High", and the equally famous gymnastics organization, "Gymkana".

A graduate of Ohio University, Dr. Danford received his Master's and Doctorate degrees from New York University in 1943.

He is a well-known author, his most recent work being the book, "Recreation in the American Community." He has also authored numerous magazine articles.

The FSU athletic director is presently a member of the Executive Committee of the United States Volleyball Association; chairman of the Curriculum Research Committee of the College of Physical Education Association; chairman of the Policies Committee of the Federation of National Professional Organization of Recreation, and chairman of the Florida AAU Volleyball committee.

One of America's volleyball pioneers, Dr. Danford made extensive six weeks tours of Germany and France in 1955, '56 and again this year, serving as an instructor for the Army's Volleyball clinics.

Prior to his arrival at Florida State, Danford served for seven years as director of health, physical education and safety in the Madison, Wisc., public school system.



BASEBALL

DANNY LITWHILER, Coach

When Danny Litwhiler came to Florida State University three years ago, it was his expressed desire to put the Seminoles on top of the intercollegiate baseball heap.

He's come a long way towards his goal.

His 1956 Seminoles virtually re-wrote the FSU record books as they posted a 24-5 season's record, won the Florida Intercollegiate Baseball championship, their own Florida State Invitational Baseball tourney and represented District III at the NCAA Playoffs at Gastonia, N. C.

Nine team and seven individual records fell under

FSU baseball progress during the season. The more outstanding new marks included the single season total of 24 games won and bantam Dick Howser's .422 batting average.

This year, with almost all of his team returning and a host of outstanding newcomers, Litwhiler said he expects to have another outstanding team.

"Our over-all team speed is excellent," he said. "Our hitting should be good and our pitching will be as good as it ever has been in the past."

LITWHILER

Litwhiler has the perfect background to be among the

best college baseball coaches in the nation. He built up a vast storehouse of strategy by keeping minute notes during his major leage playing days with the St. Louis Cards, Philadelphia Phillies, Cincinnati Reds, and the old Boston Braves.

The well-liked mentor went down in the books for several outstanding performances before retiring as an active player in 1950. He batted safely in 21 straight games in his first season with the 'big boys'. He belted a home run in every National League park for the Phillies in 1941.

In 1942 he became the first major league player to ever play a complete errorless season. He accepted 317 chances in 151 games that year and over a period of two seasons he set a record of playing 187 consecutive games without a miscue.

The glove Litwhiler used in that flawless skein was retired in baseball's Hall of Fame.

In 1942 and 1943, he tied a National League record for the most years—two— leading in fielding percentage by an outfielder appearing in 100 or more games.

After retiring as an active player, Danny coached Cincinnati in 1951 and has managed minor league clubs at Fargo, N. D., Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Jamestown, N. Y., and Duluth, Minn.

GOLF

DON VELLER, Coach

It took Don Veller just three years to build Florida State University into one of the nation's intercollegiate golfing powers. And with another team he ranks "comparable to last year's", he hopes to keep the Seminoles tough.

Veller's 1956 team skipped through a rugged elevenmeet schedule last year undefeated to win the Florida Intercollegiate title. That season pushed the Seminoles' unbeaten streak to 17.

In addition, the 1956 FSU Golfers finished fifth in the National Collegiate tournament at Columbus, Ohio.

"We feel our team this year will be about as strong as last year's," Veller commented. "But our opposition will be much tougher and that might make a differ-

The only goifer not returning from last year's team is Bob Dunn who averaged 73

Strokes for eleven matches.

But Veller points out that
Georgia, who FSU slipped
by 14½-12½ last year, has its entire team returning and arch-rival Florida "has several newcomers that will make them much stronger than last year."

Veller, an accomplished athlete himself, came to Florida State as head football coach in 1948 after having served as an assistant to the late "Bo" McMillin at Indiana in 1947.

He became head golf coach in January, 1953.

As a halfback at Indiana 1932 through '34, Veller was acclaimed one of the mid-west's finest 'backs. In his final collegiate game, he romped 82 yards for a game-winning touchdown.

He was awarded the Big Ten medal after his 1934 season, and was also honored as Indiana's top athlete when he received the Balfour Award and the Chicago Tribune Award.

Veller received his BS degree from Indiana in 1935 and received his Doctorate degree from Indiana in 1950. He is active in the Air Force Reserve and holds the rank of Lt. Colonel.

If Mike Long can develop a good shot and discus man, his 1957 track squad could possibly develop into one of Florida State's finest.

In his second season as track coach last year, Long guided the Seminole cindermen to an impressive 7-1 record. The single loss was a painful one, though—to

arch rival Florida, 90-41.
All three of the high point men from that 1956 team are returning this year and with a host of outstanding frosh, Long said he is looking for a good season.

Mike came to Florida State in 1953 as an assistant coach in football, basketball and track. Since taking over as head track coach, he now limits his abilities to assisting in basketball and guiding the show on the cinders.

Before graduating from Minnesota in 1937, he established himself as an outstanding track performer in his own right. He won the

regional Olympic tryout title in the pole vault in 1936.

Before coming to Florida State, Long was head basketball coach and assistant coach in football and track at Fort Myers (Fla.) High School. Previously he had coached for three years at Sarasota High.

In his first effort as FSU head track coach in 1955, Long's team ran up an impressive record of five wins against a single setback, and defeated Florida's cindermen, $51\ 5/6$ to $47\ \%$.

His team will duel Florida this year on April 13 in Tallahassee and again May 4 in the Florida AAUs.
