THIS IS TALLAHASSEE





Near, but far from the glaring strips of neon amusement, and the castles and crowds of Disney, lies another magical place in the Sunshine State — one of pow-wows, plantations, politics and great pride. Often described as "The Other Florida" with its deep-rooted history, rolling hills, canopy roads of moss-draped oaks, cool climate and Southernstyle hospitality; it is a Florida few have seen. It is Tallahassee — Florida with a Southern accent.


Best known as Florida's capital, Tallahassee is an intimate neo-metropolitan city where the power of state government, the academic and the artistic are complemented by subtle, old-fashioned charm. It is the perfect two- or three-day diversion for the more than 41 million annual visitors to Florida and 13 million residents.

Tallahassee touts a menagerie of sights including one of the world's deepest freshwater springs, site of America's first Christmas, a wildlife habitat, Capitol buildings, fascinating museums of history, sprawling plantations, highly acclaimed fishing and hunting adventures and nearby beaches. Spirited area festivals range from celebrations of Tallahassee's spectacular spring and swamp stomps to genuine rattlesnake roundups and seafood festivals.

With the Gulf of Mexico just 20 miles south and the Georgia border only 14 miles north, Tallahassee rests between the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and the juncture of Florida's panhandle and peninsula. Nearer in miles to Atlanta than to Miami, Tallahassee more closely resembles its Southern neighbors than Florida in topography, climate and lifestyle.

Accentuating Talla-hassee's Southern persona are lush rolling hills, likened to the seven hills of Rome, and five "official" canopy roads of patriarch oaks. The fertile, rich soil and four distinct, yet pleasant, seasons breed floral brilliance and natural vitality year-round.

Like the city itself, the story of how Tallahassee was chosen as the state capital is rich in history. In 1823, two ex-



The "old town" has undergone many changes, but one thing remains the same — it is still a government town fiercely proud and dedicated to preserving its heritage. The Capitol buildings, both old and new, epitomize Tallahassee's perseverance.

The 22nd floor of the New Capitol provides a panoramic scope of a sophisticated Southern city awash in a sea of flowering azaleas, snowy dogwoods, towering pines, fragrant magnolias, and hundreds of shimmering lakes, springs, swamps, rivers and sink holes. Special legislative viewing galleries are open during the legislative session.

Below, in the shade of giant live oaks, proudly stands the Old Capitol, originally constructed in 1845 and restored to its 1902 splendor complete with red-and-white candystriped awnings, a dome adorned with stained glass, an-

tique furnishings and political memorabilia.

Across from the Old Capitol are the 40-foot twin granite towers of the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial, and the blue stone Union Bank, Florida's oldest surviving financial institution. The nostalgic Old Town Trolley, a replica turn-of-the-century street car, carries passengers through restored Adams Street Commons to numerous other historical downtown shops for *free* — unheard of even 100 years ago.

Minutes from downtown lies the Governor's Mansion, which resembles the home of Florida's military hero Andrew Jackson; and the 52-acre natural animal habitat and 1880s farm of the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science, which provide the rare chance to walk and talk with

native Florida animals.

Tallahassee remains firmly linked with the past as evidenced by the unearthed 1539 winter encampment of Spanish Hernando de Soto, the site of the first Christmas celebration in America. Visitors travel back through time as they stand in the shadow of a giant 12,000-year-old American Mastodon at the Museum of Florida History or explore other historical spots including The Knott House that Rhymes, The Columns, San Luis Mission, Lake Jackson State Archaeological Site, Natural Bridge Battlefield, First Presbyterian Church, Brokaw-McDougall House, Goodwood Plantation and Adams Street Commons.

Nearby, alligators lazing in the sunshine and anhinga "snake birds" perched on twisted cypress branches are seen at Wakulla Springs, one of the world's deepest freshwater springs and site of many underwater scenes in the "Tarzan" movies with Johnny Weissmuller and Maureen O'Sullivan. Safaris aboard glass-bottomed and jungle cruise boats whisk visitors within arm's length of "The Other Florida."

Outdoor enthusiasts enjoy adventures including boating and fishing on area lakes, rivers, ponds and the Gulf—just 30 minutes away. Lakes Seminole, Jackson and Talquin are renowned in the bass fishing world for yielding the "big

ones," and dense forests offer an abundance of prize-winning game. Local wildlife areas such as the Florida National Scenic Trail, St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge and Apalachicola National Forest are among many spots for camping, picnicking, swimming, biking and exploring.


Appealing to the strokes of different folks, Tallahassee also features 99 holes of golf on six courses and a proliferation of tennis centers. Sideline athletes cheer the nationally-ranked Florida State Seminoles, Florida A&M Rattlers and the Tallahassee Tiger Sharks, of the East Coast Hockey League. And always a sure bet are the nearby greyhound races.

A sport of sorts, shopping at two regional malls and many specialty centers offer many "playing options" — from popular chains to curiosity and antique shops.

Cultural interests are sparked by widely-acclaimed museums and galleries and elaborate entertainment at the 14,000-seat Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center.


Tallahassee is a collaboration of power-play politics and classical character splashed with a twist of Southern beauty and charm. Tallahassee is Florida with a Southern accent.













THIS IS FLORIDA STATE

Florida State University, which will mark its golden anniversary as a coeducational graduate research institution in 1997, has joined the nation's elite in both academics and athletics.

Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida and building rapidly on the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, the University has emerged over the past 49 years as an institution of national and international esteem. Its stature is evidenced by a number of additions to its record of excellence in the 1990s:


In 1994, Florida State was classified a "Research University I" by the Carnegie Foundation, placing it among the nation's top research universities.

In 1994, the college referral service, "Who's Who Among American High School Students," placed FSU among its top 10 –

with such universities as Harvard, Duke, Stanford, North Carolina-Chapel Hill, Michigan-Ann Arbor and Yale – of most frequent choices of more than 100,000 of the nation's best and brightest high school students who asked that a specific college be notified of their recognition in "Who's Who."

Vice President of the United States Al Gore spoke at the dedication of the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory at Florida State in 1994. The National Science Foundation established the \$100 million magnet lab at FSU, which is partnered in research with the Los Alamos National Laboratory and the University of Florida, in 1990. A Nobel laureate in physics and a top Russian physicist were among the first scholars drawn to the facility. The world's largest magnet –





pus research complex, Innovation Park. In 1996, the NSF renewed and increased by 50 percent the NHMFL's funding for another five years.

 FSU created the first multipurpose student identification/banking card. The Card Application Technology Center is a national

leader in "smart card" systems.

 At the forefront of supercomputing since obtaining its first high speed computer in 1985, FSU took yet another step in ultrafast and parallel computing in 1990 when it acquired two supercomputers, the Thinking Machine Corp. Connection Ma-

chine and the Cray Y-MP.

In fall 1994, the first tenants moved into the east side of the \$100 million University Center, a classroom-and-office facility at Doak Campbell Stadium; the stadium's south end zone was also enclosed and the adjacent Moore Athletic Center expanded. When the west side is completed in 1996, University Center will provide 550,000 square feet of much needed academic space and a centralized location for student services.

One of the first academic areas to make its home in University Center, was the FSU School of Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts. Offering training for one of Florida's fastest growing industries, FSU conferred its first master's degree in film in 1991 and it's first bachelor's in film in 1993. The film school's students have already produced national and interna-

tional award-winning films.

The Center for Civic Education and Service was established in 1994 aimed at promoting community involvement and civic responsibility as integral elements of a liberal arts education at FSU. The center supports such service-learning programs as Project Amistades, which provides educational services to migrant farmworkers. Through ServScript, student's service may be recorded on their official academic transcript.

In 1990, Florida State ranked second in popularity nationwide among high school seniors, based on the number of students who request that their Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores be sent to an institution. FSU was the only institution listed among the top 10 choices of both black and white college-bound stu-

dents.

FSU's high-tech program in structural biology in 1991 received the University's largest single foundation grant, \$4 million.

Capping more than a decade of national prominence in intercollegiate athletics, Florida State's athletic teams, nicknamed "Seminoles," joined the Atlantic Coast Conference as its ninth member in 1990. The FSU football team won the 1993 National Championship and its quarterback, Charlie Ward, won the University's first Heisman Trophy.

To better understand the world's cultural diversity, FSU undergraduate students are required to complete at least two courses that focus on diverse traditions beyond Western civilization. The multicultural study requirement, in effect since 1991, complements a long-established liberal studies program at Florida State.

The Dr. Bobby E. Leach Center, a state-of-the-art student recreation facility, with a pool, saunas, basketball and racquet-sport courts, was completed in 1991

The Appleton Museum of Art in Ocala, its vast art collection and an eminent scholar chair were donated to FSU and Central Florida Community College in 1990.

FSU ranked 20th in the nation for 1990-91 in the number of black Ph.D. students it graduates. Over the five years, 1986 to 1990, FSU ranked eighth nationally by granting doctorates to 70 African-Americans.

FSU acquired the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota, home to the graduate theater program, the FSU/Asolo Conservatory

of Professional Actor Training.

As this list of highlights attests, Florida State is excelling in the 1990's with exceptional strength, energy and vision for the future. Under the leadership of the University's 12th president, Talbot "Sandy" D'Alemberte, who took office in January 1994, FSU

will continue to build on the foundation of its history of excellence in scholarship, research and service.

A senior member of the 10-member State University System, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act and began in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

Today, FSU's operating budget is \$452.5 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$99.9 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the University; FSU Foundation, which raises millions in private gifts to support academics, Seminole Boosters and FSU Alumni Association.

The main campus is spread over 450.6 acres in Tallahassee; FSU, which has one of the smallest campuses in the SUS, has been actively acquiring land in the 1990s after years of being landlocked at 847 acres. FSU owns 1,303 acres in Leon, Bay,

Franklin and Sarasota counties.

Within the state, the University maintains facilities at its 25acre campus in Panama City, its Marine Laboratory on the Gulf of Mexico, the Appleton Museum in Ocala and the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Augustus B. Turnbull III Florida State Conference Center on the edge of the campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

For years FSU has reached far beyond Florida through international programs in Switzerland, France, Panama, Costa Rica and the Caribbean. FSU's study centers in Florence, Italy and London, England are considered by many to be the nation's best in Eu-

rope.

Florida State offers 283 graduate and undergraduate degree programs through its eight colleges - Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering (operated jointly with Florida A&M University, a historically black institution); Human Sciences; Law; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the Reubin Askew School of Public Administration and Policy) and eight schools - Criminology and Criminal Justice; Library and Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

emy of Sciences members and eight American Academy of Arts and Sciences members, and has included five Nobel laureates. It is backed by 2,990 administrative/professional

and support staff.

Library holdings at Florida State include 2.1 million book titles, 18,296 serials and 4.4 million microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked by computer to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac

Science Center Library is located at the heart of the University's science research complex. FSU also maintains extensive music, library science and law libraries.

On the top floor of the Dirac Library is the headquarters of the Supercomputer Computations Research Institute, a multidisciplinary, multinational program established in 1984 that brings together some 50 scientists, engineers and technicians.

Also providing research opportunities is the tandem Van de Graff Superconducting Accelerator Laboratory, which houses two powerful atom smashers and has been ranked among the top four nuclear research centers in the nation by the National Science Foundation.


Graduate students, who number more than 5,856, pursue advanced degrees in fields as diverse as business administration and theoretical particle physics. A majority of research done at FSU is the direct result of student effort, culminating in numerous books, monographs and journal articles relating to the whole spectrum of intellectual interests and the practical needs of society.

FSU, a residential campus, places a high priority on its 30,268 students and their needs and interests (of the student population: 45 percent are male; 55 percent are female; 18.5 percent are minorities; and 2.4 percent are foreign students). The University Honors Program, Disabled Student Services, International Student Center, Student Government, Flying High Circus and intramural sports are among more than 200 organizations and activities in which students can participate.

Situated in the heart of the state's thriving capital city, Florida State's main campus blends Gothic and modern styles of architecture with the oaks, pines, dogwoods, palms and azaleas of

North Florida.

Florida State continues to progress and grow from its pre-Civil War foundation as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, through the early 20th century as the academically respected Florida State College for Women, returning to coeducational status as a university in 1947, to its modern development as an acclaimed research institution, a top-ranked competitor in intercollegiate athletics and as a standard-setter




1996-97 WOMEN'S PREVIEW

The Lady Seminoles are looking to finally make a name for themselves on a national level. The team expects to challenge for the ACC title after completing an offseason where the Seminoles recruited their strongest class ever. The team is facing a tougher schedule this year, with six meets against teams that finished in the top 25 at NCAA's last season. The coaches hope the schedule will better prepare the team for the ACC and NCAA Championship competition at the end of the year.

There are high hopes for the incoming class this year, which includes junior transfer Rachael Amman, NJCAA 50 free champion last year and freshman Anne Blachford from Ontario, Canada. While depth has been a problem in the past, Florida State is deeper in every event this year. According to head coach Don Gibb, "The points that are coming in outweigh what was lost." Assistant coach Neil Harper is very excited about this year's team. "It's a young and enthusiastic team with experience swimming at a national level. How the newcomers blend with the returning athletes will be a key for the team, but I see the potential for a fun and successful season."

The team will be led by the return of All-American Helen Jepson, who redshirted last season in an attempt to qualify for the Olympics for her native Great Britain. Also looking to perform strong are divers Sarah Henderson and Erin Gillooly. Diving coach Gary Cole notes, "This is one very talented group of young ladies and I'm sure the ACC will be keeping a close eye on our progress throughout the year. I believe we have a legitimate shot at winning both boards at the ACC meet and having someone at the NCAA Championships come February and March."



FREESTYLE

Florida State will be expecting its incoming freshmen to help improve on last year's performances. In the sprint events, sophomore Tenelle Ramer intends to improve on last year's ACC performance, where she placed 2nd in the 100, and 3rd in the 50 and 200. Rachael Amman, who is a junior transfer from Indian River CC and a NJCAA Champion in the 50 free last season, and freshman Anne Blachford will add depth in the sprint events. Coming off her ACC performance last year, senior Maider Gaztanaga will be leading the distance swimmers. Gibb is looking for sophomore Meagan Bradley to improve and join senior Shannon McHugh and freshman Katie Ruscoe at the ACC Championships.

BACKSTROKE

The Lady Seminoles will be led by sophomore Kristie McRoberts, the only returning letterwinner. The 'Noles will also be looking for strong performances out of Cindy Marion, a transfer from UNLV, who Gibb hopes will fill the loss of ACC Champion Jodi Krieg.

BREASTSTROKE

This is the team's deepest event top to bottom, with the top six swimmers all capable of scoring at ACC's. The top two returnees are sophomore Samantha White, runner up in the 100 and 200 at ACC's last season, and Allison Smith, 1995 ACC Champion in the 100. Freshman Anne Blachford is also expected to perform well and score high for the team.

BUTTERFLY

Another strong event for the Seminoles, with seven expected to score at ACC's. The team is led by All-American Helen Jepson, ACC Champion in the 100 and 200 in 1995. Jepson will be joined by a trio of sophomores; Amy Armond, Sherri Fowler, and Katie Wright, all who scored high at ACC's last season and expect to return. Junior Maria Toole, along with freshman Linda Finfrock and Laura Mateka, will provide depth and are also looking to place at ACC's.

INDIVIDUAL MEDLEY

Gibb is looking for this group to improve on last year's performances, which is needed for the team to advance in the ACC standings. Sherri Fowler, Amy Armond, Maider Gaztanga, and Samantha White all scored at ACC's in the IM events last season and hope to return. Adding depth this season will be newcomers Anne Blachford and Cindy Marion.

DIVING

Sarah Henderson and Erin Gillooly, selected as the squad's Most Valuable Divers in 1996 and 1995, respectively, return to lead the Lady Seminoles as does ACC scorer Karin Schmedeman. Added to the group this year is incoming freshman Marya Sabesky from Canada, which makes this a formidable group of divers that will add to an event that was inconsistent at times last season.

RELAYS

Expected to be stronger than ever. Both medley relays are looking to make NCAA's and be strong contenders for the ACC title. The ACC champion 200 medley relay team returns Samantha White at breast, and Tenelle Ramer at free. Cindy Marion will be filling in for the departed Jodi Krieg on the backstroke, while Helen Jepson will swim the butterfly. The freestyle relays will also be stronger, with Ramer, Wright, Jepson, Lindy Dorminy, and Rachael Amman. With the addition of Amman and the return of Jepson, Gibb looks for the free relays to finish in the top three at ACC's.

1996-97 MEN'S PREVIEW

This year, the men will settle for no less than improvement on both their 3rd place finish at ACC's and 18th at NCAA's last season. Coaches Don Gibb, Neil Harper, and Gary Cole completed an excellent recruiting year, and the

team is deeper in every event.

Returnees include sophomore All-American and ACC champions Brendon Dedekind, Stephen Parry, Matt McVittie, and two senior All-Americans, Eduardo Coelho and ACC 400 IM champion Chip Haberstroh. Providing a big boost this year will be the return of two former All-Americans, senior Rob Braknis and sophomore Dustin Bengston, both of whom had taken last season off to train for the Olympics.

Florida State will also be bringing in some strong recruits this season. Danny Chocron, South American champion in the distance freestyle events, will help out the freestylers, while diving coach Gary Cole pulled in three talented freshman, Brent Burkman, Glen Gonzales, and Ben Nuttall. "All the talent is there to be the dominant team in the ACC, but we are young and that in itself is a challenge. I believe someone will step up and win one or two boards at ACC's and go on to the NCAA Championships," said Cole.

The main goals this year is to compete for the ACC title, and to finish in the top ten at NCAA's. "We have a lot of talent and depth this year," said Dedekind, last year's ACC Rookie of the Year. "I'm very excited about the teams chances, because all the guys get along together and this should help us reach our goals."

FREESTYLE

This is easily the strongest event for the Seminoles. The sprinters hope to continue their success from last year, where sophomore Brendon Dedekind and senior Eduardo Coelho took the top two places in the 50 free at ACC's. With the return of Olympian and 1995 ACC 50 Free Champion Rob Braknis, FSÚ could take the top three in the 50 free in the conference meet, while All-American sophomore Matt McVittie also will contend for finals at ACC's. In the middle distance events, the team is not as strong as Gibb would like them to be. 500 free ACC finalist Stephen Parry and freshman Bill Schultz will be joined by the return of sophomore Dustin Bengston, 3rd in the 200 free at ACC's his freshman year. The distance events will be bolstered by the addition of freshman Danny Chocron, who has international success, but is unproven on a short course collegiate level. Senior Chip Haberstroh, ACC finalist in the 1650 free, will also be returning to add depth.

BACKSTROKE


Florida State returns All-American Rob Braknis, ACC and school record holder in both the 100 and 200. Braknis, a senior who redshirted last year while training for the Olympics, is a three time champion in the 100, and finished 16th at the Olympics this past summer. Senior David Semesco anticipates returning to the finals again in both backstroke events. Adding depth will be freshman Julian Daily and sophomore transfer Kile Zeller.

BREASTSTROKE

An area that has in the past been weaker and has left some room for improvement. The coaches are looking for the sophomores, James Henley and Tim Welsch, to step up and have a breakthrough year. Its a young group this year that will get help from the IMer's, such as senior Frank Bradley.

BUTTERFLY

Potential to be a very solid stroke force. The 100 and 200 events should be very strong. The Seminoles return



sophomore All-American Stephen Parry, 9th in the 200 at NCAA's, and NCAA qualifiers Eduardo Coelho and Dustin Bengston. Also swimming fly for the Seminoles will be sophomore Nei-Kuan Chia, 1996 ACC consolation finalist, and Julian Daily, who the coaches think could be a sleeper in this stroke.

INDIVIDUAL MEDLEY

Swimming the 200 IM this season will be 1995 ACC champion Frank Bradley, with help from sophomore transfer Chad Onken. In the 400 IM, All-American and ACC champion Chip Haberstroh returns to defend his title. Stephen Parry, who was 19th at NCAA's, looks to challenge Haberstroh for the title this year and to make All-American status. Also swimming for the Noles will be freshman Bill Schultz.

DIVING

The men's program returns senior Corey Geraghty, the team's most valuable diver last season, and he should finish his career in grand style. He will be pushed by three freshman, Ben Nuttal from Canada, Glen Gonzales from Pensacola and Brent Burkman from Virginia.

RELAYS

The goal this year is to have all five relays qualify for NCAA's and to contend for the top sixteen. The coaches expect to contend for the ACC title in every relay. The ACC record holding 200 free relay returns Coelho, McVittie, and Dedekind. Filling in for the graduated John Haynes will be 1995 ACC 50 free champion Rob Braknis. The return of Braknis and Bengston will improve both the medley relays, while Bengston will fill in on the 800 free relay as well.

THE COACHES





DON GIBB HEAD COACH (FLORIDA '85)

Entering his fourth year as head coach for the Seminoles, Coach Don Gibb continues to build on his success with both the men's and women's teams.

Gibb, the 1995 ACC Men's Coach of the Year, continues to steadily improve

both his men's and women's national and conference team performances. Seven performers garnered All American honors under Gibb's direction in 1996. The men's team finished 18th in the nation in 1996 (up seven spots from the previous year), which was the highest finish for the men's team in Florida State history. Under Gibb's guidance last year, the men's team captured four ACC Championship titles, sent six swimmers to compete in the NCAA Championships and sent one diver to the NCAA Zone Qualifying Meet. Gibb's coaching also produced FSU's first ACC Rookie of the Year, when Brendon Dedekind captured the award in 1996. At last year's ACC Championships, the team made it three consecutive top three finishes. The men's team also set six new school records and set a new ACC conference record in the 200 free relay. Two FSU swimmers went on to compete in the 1996 Olympics held in Atlanta this past summer.

The Lady Seminoles continued to improve on their na-Championships last year. The women's conference success included placing 4th at the ACC Championships while capturing two ACC Championship titles. They also had two NCAA qualifiers and two divers qualified for the NCAA Zone Qualifying Meet. Additionally, the Lady Seminoles achieved a new school record in the 100 breast.

Prior to becoming head coach for the Seminoles, Gibb spent one year as an assistant on the Seminoles' staff and was the top assistant for the University of Florida's men's program for five seasons.

Gibb, who graduated from the University of Florida in 1985 with a degree in psychology, swam for the Gators for

two seasons (1981-1983). In 1982, he was the SEC champion in the 100 yard free, and was a finalist in the United States World Championship Trials in the 100 meter free. He swam on the NCAA Champion 400 yard free relay in 1983, which clinched the national title for Florida, and also finished seventh in the 100 free.

Gibb and his wife Gena of 11 years, herself a 1994 graduate of the Florida State School of Nursing, have two daugh-

ters, Sarah (6) and Emily (5 mos.).



GARY COLE DIVING COACH (BOWLING GREEN '75)

Florida State diving has been very successful under the guidance of Gary Cole who, in the past 14 years, has produced some of the best divers in the nation.

A member of the Professional Diving

Coaches Association and NCAA Diving Rules Committee, Cole has coached four collegiate All-Americans as well as two World Age Champions. In 1988, Cole was named the Olympic coach for the host country of South Korea.

In the 1994 season, Cole was named ACC Women's Diving Coach of the Year. This was his fifth coach of the year honor since arriving to Florida State. He also has the distinction of winning the ACC team title without having a cham-

A 1975 graduate of Bowling Green, Cole was a standout diver in college and high school. He was tutored by eight time Olympic coach Ron O'Brien. In his free time, Cole is an avid golfer and his biggest fans are his wife Vicki and daughters Angela (4) and Savannah (14 mo.).



NEIL HARPER ASSISTANT COACH (LOUISIANA STATE '88)

Neil Harper enters his third year as assistant coach at Florida State after two highly successful years working with FSU's IM and stroke group. An excellent recruiter, his efforts have netted immediate

success for Florida State, with four freshmen earning All-American honors at the 1996 NCAA's.

Harper is in his ninth year of college coaching. He began his coaching career as recruiter and on-deck coach at his alma mater, Louisiana State. During his six years at LSU, both the men's and women's teams made the NCAA Top 15.

At FSU, Harper continues to handle recuiting duties for both the men's and women's teams, as well as coordinating

the strength and conditioning programs and overseeing the

individual medley and stroke groups.

As a performer, Harper competed in two Olympics and was on the British 400 meter Medley Relays that finished 6th and 4th in Los Angeles and Seoul, respectively. He was a seven event NCAA All-American, a four time SEC Champion and captained the 1988 LSU men's team to its only conference championship title.

Harper and his wife Paige, herself an NCAA All-American and SEC Breaststroke Champion, have been married for six years and have two daughters, Katherine who will be 2 in November and Kelly who was born this past August.



CASHEL MACK ASSISTANT COACH (DRURY COLLEGE '92)

Cashel Mack enters her first year as assistant coach with Florida State's swim program. Although Mack will have responsibilities with both the women's and men's squads, her primary duties will be

in assisting with the women's team. Mack will handle many administrative duties for the swimming program including assisting with recruiting, planning the travel iteneraries, overseeing the academic support, and supervising strength training and conditioning.

Mack comes to FSU after serving as the head age group coach for Clearwater Aquatics in Clearwater, Fla, since August of 1993. Mack was nominated the 1996 Florida Age Group Coach of the Year. Prior to her head coaching position in Clearwater, Mack served as graduate assistant coach at her alma mater Drury College in 1993. She helped the 1993 Drury team to a NAIA Championship that year.

While a student-athlete at Drury, Mack swam the sprint freestyle and butterfly events. She was named Most Valuable Swimmer in 1989 and 1990 and was captain of Drury's

first NAIA Championship women's team in 1992.

Mack graduated in 1992 from Drury College with a degree in elementary education



ANDY ROBINS
ASSISTANT COACH (WILLIAM & MARY '83)

Andy Robins begins his first full year as an assistant coach with the Seminoles, having joined the program last winter.

In addidtion to his on deck coaching duties, Robins will assist with recruiting

and organize team workout information and data.

Robins has been actively coaching in the swimming field since 1980. He has held various assistant and head coaching positions, especially in the local Tallahassee area. Beginning in 1985, Robins began coaching for the Area Tallahassee Aquatic Club and eventually became head coach for A.T.A.C. in 1993. Robins led A.T.A.C. to a top 10 finish at the spring 1996 Junior Nationals.

Other local swimming coaching positions Robins has held include coaching Leon High School in Tallahassee from 1986-1991. His hard work at Leon earned him recognition as the *Tallahassee Democrat's* High School Coach of the Year in 1987.

Robins also served as head coach of Florida's All-Star Team in 1990 and 1991, after previously holding the assistant coaching position for the team in 1989.


Robins currently serves on the Florida Swimming Board of Directors and House of Delegates, which he has been a member of since 1987.

SUPPORT SERVICES



ACADEMICS

Florida State University is committed to the academic success of its student-athletes. Under the direction of interim academic director Mark Meleney, the FSU athletic department's Academic Support Program is in place to meet the personal, academic and professional needs of each student-athlete.

Meleney and his staff aid student-athletes with admission, class scheduling, registration, and the normal progression towards a degree. Unveiled in the fall of 1994 was a new state-of-the-art academic center as part of the University Center expansion. The center provides study hall and tutoring rooms, as well as a resource area with study carols, computers and basic reference materials.

Class attendance is closely monitored during the playing and practice seasons. Throughout the school year, nightly study halls and tutoring sessions help the student-athletes stay on course. Student-athletes have unlimited access to mentors who provide one-on-one tutoring. The academic support staff works closely with the faculty members at Florida State as well as with the athletic department's own office of Student Services.

For everyone in the Florida State athletic department — from coaches and academic support personnel to student

services staff and administration — giving each student-athlete every opportunity to earn a degree is the primary goal. And every year, that goal is becoming reality for more and more Florida State student-athletes.

STRENGTH TRAINING & CONDITIONING

Strength training and conditioning is an important part of an athlete's performance in the pool and on the boards. At Florida State, a supervised program is developed for swimming and diving, emphasizing the objectives of not build-ing bodies, but strengthening and conditioning them. Women's strength coach **Jay Zemliak** and men's strength coach **Russ Barbarino**, customize programs for each of the athletes beginning with pre-conditioning before the season gets underway.

Zemliak and Barbarino work with the swimmers and divers in sport specific training which includes conditioning the major muscle groups used in swimming and diving. FSU takes pride in customizing the programs to help student-athletes reach their maximum potential.

PREVENTION CARE & TREATMENT

Being an athlete at Florida State University means receiving the best care and treatment possible. All of the student-athletes undergo pre-season screening so a certified trainer can detect any potential injuries an athlete may incur. If a problem is detected, the athlete is placed on a prevention care program which may include any kind of treatment from icing to exercising. The program is closely monitored by swimming trainers Shelley Sturdivent for the women and Damon Wooley for the men.

Rehabilitation is another important component of the Seminole training room. Though preventing injuries is the main objective, they are unavoidable for the athletes who participate in sports. More serious injuries and illnesses are referred to the Seminole team physicians at the Tallahassee Orthopedic Center who, for many years, have worked in conjunction with the FSU training room in successfully rehabilitating numerous athletes after an injury.

Nutrition counseling and drug testing are both responsibilities of the athletic training team which is dedicated to providing the best care possible for all FSU student-athletes.



The Lady Seminoles completed another successful season, finishing 34th at the NCAA Championships, an improvement from their 38th place finish the year before. The 'Noles placed six swimmers on the All-ACC squad on their way to a 4th place ACC finish, just 23 points behind second place Virginia (534).

Florida State started the season with a close loss to the University of Miami, 129-114. That was followed by losses to top-10 ranked Florida and Auburn. Stepping up for FSU in the early meets were sophomore Allison Smith and a group of freshmen, led by Samantha White, Sherri Fowler, and Tenelle Ramer. Florida State concluded the season falling to Alabama and LSU but with a win over ACC rival N.C. State to finish at 4-5. 1-0 for the year going into the ACC Championship.

5, 1-0 for the year going into the ACC Championship.
FSU finished 4th at ACC's with 511 points, just 16 points behind third place Clemson (527). North Carolina won the championship title with 862 points. FSU highlights included sophomore Jodi Krieg defending her 100 back title and the 200 medley relay taking first place. Other strong points included Folwer taking 2nd in the 200 fly and Ramer finishing 2nd in the 100 free and 3rd in both the 50 and 200 free. White placed 2nd in the 100 and 200 breast, Smith finished 3rd in the 100 breast, and sophomore Sarah Henderson finished 2nd on the one meter board.

Krieg and White represented FSU at the NCAA Championships in Ann Arbor, Mich. Krieg finished 33rd in the 100 back, while White placed 13th in the 100 breast, earning second team All-American status. White's swim put FSU into a tie for 34th, its highest finish under Coach Gibb.






The Seminoles completed one of their most successful seasons in 1995-96, as they finished 3rd at the ACC Championship meet and 18th at the NCAA Championships. There were several question marks coming into the start of last season, because the Seminoles were going to be without the services of Robert Braknis and Dustin Bengston, who took the year off for Olympic training. However, with leadership from the upperclassmen and the addition of a trio of talented freshman, the 'Noles finished with a 5-4 dual meet season record.

In the season's first meet, a 135-108 win over the University of Miami, the Seminoles saw their future as both freshmen Brendon Dedekind and Stephen Parry won events. FSU then went 4-3 going into the season finale at Louisiana State. During the meet, FSU's 400 medley relay was disqualified, and that proved to be the difference as LSU won 127-116. Unfortunately, the relay was a harbinger of the upcoming

ACC and NCAA championships.

Florida State finished third at ACC's with 528 points, behind second place N.C. State (661.5) and champion North Carolina (801.5). The highlights of the meet included Dedekind winning both the 50 and 100 freestyles, Chip Haberstroh defending his 400 IM title, and the 200 free relay of Dedekind, Eduardo Coelho, John Haynes, and Matt McVittie winning in a conference record time. However, a disqualification in both the 400 IM and the 200 medley relay kept the Noles' from finishing as high as they would have liked. The NCAA Championship meet was a different story. FSU finished 18th, the program's highest finish ever, and had six individuals capture second team All-American status. Leading the way was Dedekind who placed 9th in the 50 free. Haberstroh and Parry finished 10th in the 400 IM and 200 fly, respectively. Dedekind joined Coelho, Haynes, and McVittie on the 9th place 200 and 400 free relays. Head coach Gibb was pleased with the team's finish.

"Our guys were able to improve on the performance from last year, and we went from 25th to 18th place," said Gibb. "By placing as a second place ACC team at the NCAA's, we proved we have excellent quality, while still needing some depth."

OLYMPIC GLORY

Most Florida State swimmers relax their training during the summer offseason. Some will take summer classes or work summer jobs, such as coaching youth swim teams. They will keep in shape training with local age group swim teams either in Tallahassee or in their hometowns. But two FSU swimmers took another path when they competed against the best in the world this summer at the 1996 Summer Olympic Games in Atlanta, Ga.

If you had asked Brendon Dedekind a year ago if he thought he would be swimming in the Olympics, he would have looked at you as if you were crazy. When he started school at Florida State last fall, the Olympics were the last thing on his mind. But midway through the season, Brendon's improvement was so great that graduate assistant coach Nada Cenanovic mentioned to him that he had a realistic chance to qualify for the Olympic Games. Then came the Atlantic Coast Conference Championships, where Dedekind won both the 50 and 100 freestyles, setting school records in both. This performance convinced Brendon, a native of Natal, South Africa, that he may just be able to swim with the best. So when the South African trials came around, Dedekind wasn't surprised when he won the 50 meter free and finished 2nd in the 100 free, qualifying for the Olympic team in both events.

Dedekind said that competing in the Centennial Olympics was an amazing experience for him and he made the most of it. After finishing 26th in the 100 free with a time that equaled the South African national record, he went into the preliminaries of the 50 free with a goal of finishing in the top eight, thus qualifying for the final heat that night. He not only reached his goal, but finished fourth overall.

"I was happy to accomplish one of my goals, to finish in the top eight," said Dedekind. "After my morning swim I went back to relax in my room and get ready for the final and my ultimate goal, which was to medal." Dedekind finished fifth in the final, in what was the fast-

Dedekind finished fifth in the final, in what was the fastest heat in history in the 50 meter free. He was happy with his performance, but not yet satisfied and plans on working



to reach his ultimate goal in the 2000 Games in Sydney. The reception from home after the Olympics was one of

amazement according to Dedekind.

"They were all impressed and awestruck at what I had accomplished," Dedekind said. "The whole experience was even more unbelievable to them, because I had gone from

nothing to an Olympic finalist."

It was indeed a learning experience for Dedekind, competing against swimmers he had only seen in pictures and had idolized before. Being surrounded on the pool deck and swimming against such stars as Alexandar Popov and Gary Hall Jr., had humanized the whole process for Dedekind. He expects the experience will help him in the upcoming season, especially at the NCAA championship meet.

Competing in the Olympics was always a life-time dream for Robert Braknis, a native of Chateauguay, Canada. Having swam on an international level since 1991 at the Pan Pacific Championships, Braknis always knew there was a possibility of qualifying for the Canadian Olympic Team. During his four years competing for the national team, Braknis gained more experience and the dream of the Olympics

became more of a reality.

Swimming in front of a crowd as large as 16,000 strong was quite an experience for Braknis. He was excited and not as nervous as he expected at an event he had waited his whole life to compete in. Having swam in international meets before, Braknis knew he must not worry about the pressures of the excitement around him, he just had to concentrate on his swims.

Swimming in his first event, the 100 meter backstroke, Braknis had hopes of swimming well. But even he didn't expect to finish so high, placing 10th in the morning preliminaries. Swimming as the top seed in the consolation head that night, Braknis finished last in the heat and 16th overall.

"I had a great swim in the morning, and when I saw the time I thought making the final was even possible," Braknis said. "When all the heats were finished and I came in 10th, I was happy, but a little disappointed not to make the final after coming so close. That probably contributed to my swim at night, as my heart just wasn't in it after coming so close to the finals."

Braknis also swam on the 400 meter medley relay which finished 12th in the preliminaries, missing the finals by just .81 seconds.

Upon returning home, everyone was very supportive. Parties were thrown in his honor, and everybody made sure to congratulate him.

Braknis has set high goals for this season, including defending his 100 and 200 backstroke titles at the ACC Championships, and for Florida State to win the overall title.

"We've been so close the last two years, and this year we really believe we have a chance to take first," Braknis said.

As for NCAA's, he plans on challenging for the top three in both the 100 and 200 backs.

"I plan on challenging for first at NCAA's," Braknis said. "It's still early in the season and I don't know what other swimmers will be out there, but I'll still give it a shot."

Dedekind and Braknis weren't the only Seminoles with Olympic dreams. Sophomore Stephen Parry and senior Helen Jepson both had hopes to represent their native Great Britain at the Centennial Games. But while Parry finished 2nd in the 200 meter butterfly and Jepson won the same event on the women's side, they did not reach qualifying times set by Great Britain to allow them to compete in Atlanta. Another Seminole attempting to swim for his country, senior Chip Haberstroh, swam at the United States Olympic Trials, finishing 11th in the 400 IM.

"A TRADITION OF EXCELLENC

THE TRADITION

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in

any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 43rd year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that

is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, Atlantic Coast Conference schools have captured 56 NCAA and AlAW championships, including 27 in men's competition and 29 in women's. In addition, 96 men and 24 women have earned the coveted title of NCAA champion.

The conference had an immediate impact on the national college football scene in the fall of 1953 when the University of Maryland captured the first of what would even-

tually be four national football titles for the ACC.

The ACC is one of only two conferences to capture three or more national football titles since 1980. Clemson laid claim to the league's second national title in 1981, Georgia Tech followed suite in 1990 while Florida State pocketed national title No. four in 1994.

The nine schools that take to the field this fall under the ACC banner have produced 310 first or second team gridiron All-Americas and 48 first-team academic All-Americas. ACC teams have had 1,336 players selected in the annual professional football draft, including 82 first round selections.

If success if measured best in terms of wins and losses, then the ACC over the years has proved itself to be among the elite in Division I-A football. After posting a 3-1 bowl mark in 1995, the ACC moved past the Pacific 10 as the conference with the best all-time bowl winning percentage. The league's teams are a combined 76-63-5 (.614) in post-season play.

Two ACC teams, Florida State and Georgia Tech, are tied as the nation's winningest bowl teams. The Seminoles are 15-8-2 in bowl play while the Yellow Jackets are 17-8.

Clemson is eighth at 12-8 (.600).

The ACC also stands at the forefront of intercollegiate athletics in terms of academic accomplishments of its' student-athletes. Ten times over the past 16 years, an ACC member school has claimed the CFA Academic Achievement Award which is awarded to a CFA member institution with the highest graduation rate among members of its football team.

This past year, Duke tied with Boston College of Vanderbilt for the coveted award. In addition Florida State, Maryland, N.C. State, Virginia and Wake Forest were accorded honorable mention for having graduation rates of

70 percent or better.

1995-96 SEASON IN REVIEW

The 1995-96 academic year concluded with the league pocketing two more national team titles and seven individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 23 national team

crowns in the last six years.

The ACC's 1995-96 national champions were North Carolina in field hockey and Maryland in women's lacrosse. The league also had four teams participate in national title games — Duke in men's soccer, Virginia in men's lacrosse, North Carolina in women's lacrosse and Maryland in field hockey. Overall, the ACC posted a 67-48-1 (.575) mark in NCAA Tournament play.

In addition, seven ACC schools — North Carolina (6), Virginia (21), Florida State (23), Clemson (27), N.C. State (32) and Duke (39) — were ranked in the Top 40 of the Sears Directors' Cup, an all-sports award honoring the Division I school with the best performance by women's and men's athletic teams during the 1995-96 academic year.

The ACC placed at least one team in the Top 10 nationally in 13 of 23 sports sponsored by the league. Other records of note during the 1995-96 season include 83 teams competing at NCAA Championships, four bowl teams and 20 Top 10 showings.

Six ACC teams, in six different sports, representing three of the nine member institutions, earned a No. 1 ranking

during the course of the past academic year.

The ACC Academic Honor Roll record was broken for the 10th-straight year as 1,185 student-athletes were recognized for their work in the classroom.

THE CHAMPIONSHIPS

With the additional of women's lacrosse, the ACC will conduct championship competition in 24 sports during the 1996-97 academic year — 12 for men and 12 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in

cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Conference championship for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf,

lacrosse and softball.

THE HISTORY

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded May 8, 1953, at Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N. C. with seven charter members — Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest drawing up the conference by-laws.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971 when the University of South Caro-

lina tendered its resignation.

The conference operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrew from the Southeastern Conference in lanuary of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991,

with the addition of Florida State.

VIRGINIA — Charter member of the SIAA in 1894, charter member of the SC in 1921, resigned from SC in December, 1936, joined the

ACC in December, 1953.

WAKE FOREST — Joined the SC in February, 1936, charter member of the ACC in 1953.
