


# FACILITIES



## *Bobby E. Leach Center Pool*

The Leach Pool is a 16-lane by 25-yard indoor swimming facility with two 1-meter and two 3-meter diving boards. A complete spa area is located just off the pool deck and is equipped with two whirlpools, two steam rooms, and a sauna. A wet classroom is located just off the pool for instruction. The Leach Pool is open Monday through Friday from 6:15 a.m. until 11:00 p.m. and weekends from 10:00 a.m. until 9:00 p.m. Please call the Leach Center at 644-0556 for up-to-date hours as various University events and practice sessions may limit the availability of the pool. The Leach Center Pool was the host to the 1993 ACC Championships.

## *Future Home of Florida State University Swimming & Diving in the Works*

All good things must come to an end. For the Florida State University athletics department the end came in the form of the closing of the Bim Stults Aquatics Center in the fall of 2003, but the horizon looks promising with plans for a new facility taking shape.

Formerly the outdoor home of the Seminole swimming and diving program, the Stults facility was closed because an aging filtration system in the pool was beyond repair. The Tribe currently trains on

campus in the Bobby E. Leach Center with long course training and platform diving in various pools throughout the area.

But the days of using a potpourri of training facilities will soon be a distant memory for Florida State. In conjunction with Seminole Boosters, the athletics department is currently in the process of raising additional money to begin construction for the new aquatics center which might be built in two phases.

“Currently a definite site has not been identified for the new

facility,” FSU athletic director Dave Hart said. “The current site of the Stults pool will probably serve as the site of a new classroom building so other potential sites are being considered and feasibility studies are ongoing.”

The design for the new aquatics center is a part of the athletics department’s master facility plan. Preliminary sketches feature a 50-meter long course setup and a 25-yard competition configuration in the main area and separate diving well. The unnamed facility will also have locker rooms for both the men’s and women’s teams, as well as offices for the coaching staff along with seating for spectators.

“After meeting with President Wetherell and Mr. Hart, I’m excited about the commitment that Florida State has to the swimming and diving program and its future,” FSU head coach Neil Harper said. “Many of the elite teams in the country have made huge strides after moving into new facilities and this could be the final piece of the puzzle that elevates us to that level. We’ve improved tremendously over the last few years, but the new facility will put us on an even playing field with the top programs when it comes to recruiting and competing.”

# 2004-05 REVIEW

## **Men's & Women's Teams Score Points at NCAA Meet**

For the second time in three years, both the men's and women's teams scored at the NCAA Championships. With a total of 10 points, the women took 31st, while the men took 35th with their two points. Prior to the 2003 meet, the last time Florida State scored points during both championships was the 1997 campaign.


## **Courtney McClow Goes From Walk-On to All-American**

A four-year journey was completed in nearly storybook fashion for senior Courtney McClow. After joining the team as a walk-on, the diving captain capped her Florida State career with Honorable Mention All-America accolades at the NCAA Championships. McClow picked up her first honor with a 10th-place finish on the one-meter board, followed by a 13th-place mark on the platform. Doing herself one better, at the recent US Open Diving Championships, McClow won the qualifying round and then placed eighth overall during the platform.

## **800 Free Relay Snaps Six-Year Dry Spell**

Not since the days of Stephen Parry and Brendon Dedekind have the men's team produced an All-American in the pool. That changed this year when the quartet of Thomas Bishop, Billy Jamerson, Steve Roof and Kyle Young took 16th in the 800 freestyle relay at the NCAA Championships. The award marked the sixth time that Florida State has earned the honor in the 800 free relay, the most of any of the five relays.

### **Men Take Second, Women Place Fourth at ACC Championships**

Despite having two more teams in the league, the men's squad tallied its highest point total under Neil Harper at this year's ACC Championships. Florida State posted 580 points at the league summit to take second for the third year in a row. The tally is the Seminoles' highest since 1999 when it amassed 697.5 points. For the fourth year in a row, the women finished fourth or better as they chalked up 433 points to finish fourth just behind North Carolina.

### **Brick, Lerew, & Men's 400 Free Relay Bring Home Gold Medals**

The Seminoles were well represented on the medal stand at the ACC Championships with two individuals and one relay bringing home titles. Picking up Florida State's first title was sophomore Lauren Brick as she continued the school's dominance in the 100 breaststroke by winning the event. Joining Brick atop the medal stand was her classmate Brittany Lerew as she captured the gold medal in the three-meter diving. In the final event of the men's meet, FSU came through with its first title as the quartet of Michael Averett, Ed Denton, Alex Kennon and Joel Roycik won the 400 free relay in convincing fashion.

### **Fifteen Seminoles Earn All-ACC Honors**

For the third year in a row, FSU had at least 15 men and women earn All-ACC accolades at the league meet. Over that three-year span, FSU and Virginia are the only two teams in the league to have at least 15 honorees each season. The men totaled eight recipients this year, the second highest tally under Neil Harper, while the women had seven. Courtney McClow and Emily Breen made history as they became the first women to earn All-ACC honors all four years of their careers.

### Seven Records Fall During 2004-05 Season

During the 2005 ACC Championships, the Seminoles broke seven records, including a pair that had stood for a decade. On the first day of competition, the women broke the 800 free relay with a time of 7:19.59. Day two saw Brittany Lerew break her sister Chelsie's mark on the three-meter board with an 11-dive total of 556.60. On Saturday, a trio of marks went by the wayside as Courtney McClow set the platform record (438.70), Romy Altmann tied the 200 backstroke standard (1:59.50) and freshman Lindsay Kenney reset a 10-year old mark by becoming the first Seminole to go under two minutes in the 200 butterfly (1:59.92).

While only two men's record fell, one was broken twice in the span of an hour and a half. First Steve Roof posted a 15:16.48 in the 1,650 free to smash Chip Haberstroh's 1994 record during at the ACC Championships. Then during the timed final in the evening session, Thomas Bishop did Roof one better with his 15:08.47 to take third. In the opening 1,000 yards of the race, Bishop broke his own mark with a split of 9:07.98.

### Jamerson & McClow Earn ACC Performer of the Week Honors

After a strong showing at the Georgia Fall Invitational, FSU swept ACC Performer of the Week honors as Billy

Jamerson and Courtney McClow won the men's and women's awards on December 6. Jamerson became the first Seminole to win the award twice in one year when he took the January 31 honor after winning both breaststroke events against defending national champion Auburn.

### Both Squads Reach Double-Digit Wins in Regular Season

Along with strong showings at the conference meet, Florida State has been putting together great regular season performances as well. For the third time in the last four years, both teams reached ten wins with the women totaling 13-4 on the year while the men were 10-3. All seven losses came to top 15 programs with six coming to top 10 teams. Since Neil Harper took over six years ago, the women's 71 dual meet triumphs and the men's 53 are the most in the league.

### Fabulous Freshmen

Giving the Seminoles a big boost this year was the work of some talented freshmen. All told, 12 different freshmen on both teams combined for 53 victories last season. Billy Jamerson led the way on the men's side with 11 while Lindsay Kenney topped the women at five. Jamerson, Kenney, Jarryd Botha, Ed Denton, and Alex Tilbrook all collected All-ACC honors as freshmen, the highest total for rookies in school history.

# THIS IS THE ACC



### **The Tradition**

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 53rd year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 94 national championships, including 49 in women's competition and 45 in men's. In addition, 120 men and 60 women have earned the coveted title of NCAA champion.

### **2004-05 in Review**

The 2004-05 academic year concluded with the league collecting three more national titles and seven individual crowns. In all, ACC schools have won 51 national championships over the last 15 years.

The league's 2004-05 national champions were Wake Forest in field hockey, the Virginia women's lacrosse team, North Carolina in men's basketball and Duke in women's golf. In addition, 181 student-athletes from the ACC earned first, second or third-team All-America honors

### **The Championships**

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2005-06 academic year — 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University.

Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

### **A History**

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members — Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina,

North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest — drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern

Conference in January of 1964. The league expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

Last season the conference started a new chapter when it welcomed the University of Miami and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University on July 1, 2004. Boston College University became the league's 12th member for the 2005-06 school year.
