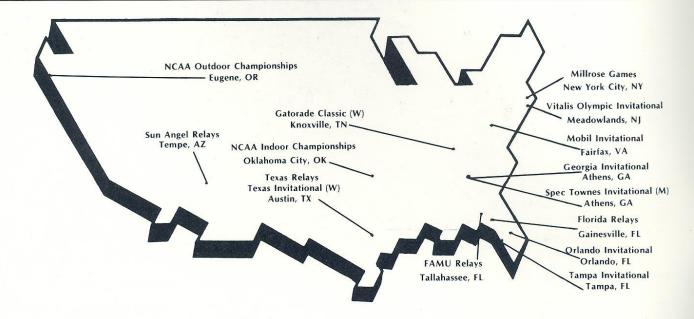

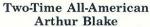

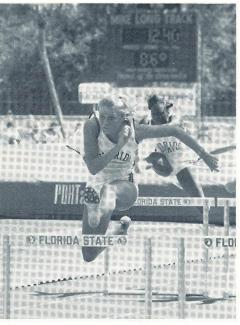

Terry Long Coordinator Men's and Women's Track (Florida State '63)

During the decade of the eighties, few women's collegiate track programs equalled the success of Florida State's. A portion of that success is due to head coach Terry Long. Over the last two seasons, Long has kept the Lady Seminole program at the pinnacle of collegiate track with a pair of top 10 outdoor finishes, a national championship 400 meter relay, and 22 All-Americans.

In 1988, Long will take on the added duties of coordinator of the entire track and field program at Florida State.

The 1963 FSU alumnus began his career in the high school ranks at Lakeland and Delray Beach High Schools. His notoriety in the coaching ranks came about during 13 years of coaching at Santa Fe and Seminole Community Colleges. Over those years, he developed hundreds of All-Americans and 56 national junior college champions. His teams won 14 state junior college track and cross country titles. He was named JuCo National Coach of the Year three times and three times he coached the Seminoles to runner-up spots at the national championships. He also guided the SFCC women's team to back to back national championships in 1982 and '83.

After a two-year stint as assistant coach at Florida, Long returned to his alma mater where his name was a familiar one in the Seminole program. Mike Long Track is named after his father, who coached three of his sons during his 23-year career at FSU. Today, Jim is an assistant at Florida State and Curtiss is head coach at Western Kentucky. In 1981, Terry joined his father in the state of Florida Track Hall of Fame. He presently serves as chairman of the Hall of Fame Committee.

Long received one of his greatest honors in 1984 as he was named head coach of the United States' entry in the first World Indoor Track Championships in Paris. He is presently cochairman of the National Olympic Development Sprint Committee.

The 47-year-old has also served as coach of the

Florida State Track

Athletic Attic Mazda and Bud Light Track clubs and has won six national TAC championships with his indoor and outdoor teams. Probably the most famous athlete he has coached on an individual basis is Chandra Cheeseborough, an Olympic gold medalist on two USA relays. He also supervises the training of Florida State Olympic hopeful Arthur Blake.

The Leon High School graduate, who also received his master's degree from FSU, is married to the former Dee Dee Malone.



Over the last 10 seasons, Florida State head coach Dick Roberts has led the men's program to new levels of success.

Since he took over the program's reins from the legendary Mike Long in 1978, Roberts has led the Tribe to a 119-31-2 record, 10 consecutive Metro titles and seven top 20 finishes. A total of 36 athletes have received 70 All-American awards and four have been national champions. Sprinter Walter McCoy (1977-81) was a member of 1980 and 1984 Olympic teams and was a gold medalist at the '84 games.

Recently, Roberts completed a two-year term as president of the NCAA Track and Field Coaches Association, the highest office in collegiate track and field. He also served as an assistant coach for the 1982 National Sports Festival, the 1984 Pan American Junior team and the 1987 World Indoor team.

Roberts has spoken at many track and field affairs as well as participating in others. Those include track and field clinics sponsored by the Florida High School Athletic Association, Hardee's, the Marine Corps, Medalist, the National High School Athletic Coaches Association and the NCAA Track and Field Coaches Association.

Al Schmidt, now in his seventh year at Florida State, has been a catalyst in bringing Florida State's program to the pinnacle of collegiate track and field.

Since his arrival in Tallahassee in August of 1982, the Lady Seminole track program has won two national championships-the 1985 NCAA indoor and 1984 outdoor-and has taken

the runner-up spot at the outdoor meets in 1983 and 1985. Acting as recruiting coordinator for track and field as well as coaching the distance runners. Schmidt helped build Florida State into a national power. This season, Schmidt will again direct both Florida State cross country teams and will coach the distance runners during track season.

Schmidt's teams have also enjoyed success in cross country. His 1984 squad finished fourth at the NCAA Region III meet and narrowly missed a bid to the national championship. Schmidt is also credited with helping to sign one of the finest women's recruiting classes in the nation last year.

Prior to joining the FSU women's program, Schmidt spent one year as assistant men's track and field coach at the University of Kansas. While there, he worked with the distance runners in both cross country and track and helped the Jayhawks capture Big Eight titles in indoor and outdoor track.

Schmidt was also a long-time coach in the Metro Conference. From 1976-81, he was head coach of the men's track and field program at St. Louis University. During his five seasons at St. Louis, his cross country team was Metro Conference champion (1977) and runner-up (1978) before the school dropped out of the conference.

A 1973 graduate of St. Louis, Schmidt also attended Missouri for two years where he ran on the Tiger cross country teams. Upon transferring back to his hometown, Schmidt served as an assistant track coach at the University of Missouri-St. Louis while finishing his degree.

Schmidt holds a Level I coaching certificate from the Athletics Congress (TAC) and was chosen in 1985 to conduct the Florida High School Athletic Association Coaching clinic for distance and middle distance runners. In 1979, he represented the United States on a Brazilian tour during which he helped conduct coaching clinics for the State Department.

Schmidt and his wife Jessie have one daughter.

Dennis Nobles, now in his third year on the Florida State staff, is rapidly developing into one of the most dynamic young coaches in track and field circles.

A pole vaulter on FSU's track team from 1979-81, Nobles graduated cum laude from Florida State's School of Physical Education. He went on to obtain his master's degree from FSU in exercise physiology in 1983.

Nobles began his coaching career at NAIA track powerhouse Wayland Baptist in Plainview, Texas. He helped that school to a national championship and a pair of runner-up finishes. Nobles also coached 14 All-Americans, two national champions, two U.S. Olympic qualifiers and a national record holder. He returned to his alma mater in 1986 when he accepted an assistant coaching post. Since coming back to FSU he has coached several All-Americans, one Olympian and one world record holder. A noted academian, Nobles is currently working towards his Ph.D. in athletic administration.

His duties at FSU include coaching athletes in the javelin, discus, long jump and triple jumps. In recent years, he has also been invited to participate in the elite women's javeling clinic in Long Beach, California.

Jim Long, former Florida State sprinter, enters his 12th season on the Florida State staff.

The son of former FSU head coach Mike Long, Jim returned to the Florida State program as an assistant coach in 1975, following a successful stint as head track coach at Leon High School. From 1974 until 1977, his coaching duties were in the sprint and hurdle events. In 1978, Long's coaching duties included working with the hurdlers, pole vaulters and decatheletes. His present duties include coaching Florida State athletes in both hurdle races and certain decathlon events.

During his years on the Florida State staff, he has coached 19 NCAA All-Americans, six of those individual, as well as 18 Metro Conference champions. One All-American decathlete. Rohn Stark, has gone on to lead the NFL in punting for the last three years.

Long has served as a clinician for the several years at the U.S. Olympic Development camp in Orlando along with brothers Terry, head women's coach at Florida State, and Curtiss, head coach at Western Kentucky.

Long holds a bachelor's degree in humanities, a master's degree in history and needs only a dissertation before completing a doctorate in physical education.

He and his wife Janis have two sons, Justin, 11, and Jarrett, 8.

Since joining the Florida State coaching staff last year, William Garrett has proven to be a valuable asset to the program. Garrett assists coordinator Al Schmidt in the recruitment of student-athletes to the Florida State program; last season, FSU signed five high school All-Americans. On the track, Garrett coaches Florida State's sprinters and hurdlers.

A former runner for FSU women's head coach Terry Long at Seminole Community College, Garrett arrived at Florida State last season with extensive high school coaching experience.

In 1986, he directed the Tallahassee Maclay girls team to a second place finish at the class A meet.

Olympic bronze medalist Kim McKenzie is Florida State's newest addition to the Florida State coaching staff.

She currently serves as a volunteer assistant, while training for the upcoming Olympic Games. McKenzie will coach Florida State's high hurdlers and sprinters. She will join the full-time Florida State staff next season after the Olympics. McKenzie was a member of the 1984 U.S. Olympic team and won the bronze medal in the 100 meter high hurdles.

The Detroit, Michigan native has an extensive background in national and international level competition. McKenzie finished first and second in the 100 meter hurdles in 1983 and '84, her final two years at Texas-El Paso. She also won a silver medal at the Pan Am Games.

McKenzie and her husband Leander, a former six-time All-American at Florida State, are the parents of a son, Leander III.

LADY SEMINOLE PREVIEW



A Changing of the Guard

If Florida State has its way, Lady Seminole track fans could be treated to a little deja vu by the end of the season. The Lady Seminoles, with six top 10 finishes in the last seven years, return to Eugene, Oregon for the NCAA Championships. It was four years ago in Eugene that FSU vaulted to national prominence in winning its first of two national titles.

With a little luck, FSU can again travel to Eugene and vie for another top 10 finish.

The Lady Seminoles will depend on a young, yet talented group to score at the NCAA Championships. In fact, you might even say that there's been a changing of the guard at Florida State.

"We have some young people who are very talented," Long says. "Somebody will have to step fourth and become a national-level athlete.

For the past two years, Florida State thirdyear head coach Terry Long has built his team around 13-time All-American Michelle Finn, who after four years with the program seemed



to stand as a reminder of the great Florida State teams of the past.

But Long is not worried, as two of the building blocks on that '84 national championship team remain. Janet Davis, a fifth place finisher at last year's 400 meter NCAA final returns for her senior season. The five-time All-American will be as versatile as she was last year. She could figure to score in the 100, 200, 400, 400 meter relay or 1600 meter relay in Eugene.

FSU's other top returnee, Andrea Thompson will also be a headliner in the sprint events.

A two-time All-American on FSU's relay teams, she could score as an individual in the 100 meters. Both Davis and Thompson will continue their key roles on FSU's defending national champion 400 meter relay that set the national record (43.19) for an all American, nonnational team. That team was undefeated and ran sub-NCAA qualifying times at every meet.

If Davis and Thompson don't give the Lady Seminoles enough talent in the sprints, FSU has a trio of performers who are ready to step in and carry on the sprinting tradition. Junior Angela Curry, with a personal best of 11.57, returned to school in the best shape of her career and could qualify in the 100 or 400. Also keep an eye on sophomore Lisa Horton who has continued to improve since the day she walked on the FSU campus. Last year she ran near-NCAA qualifying times in the 200, and displayed her vast potential in the 100. The freshman signee who looks to make an immediate impact on the team is Mobile's Frenchie Holmes. She has run personal bests of 11.63 and 24.20 in the 100 and 200. Long truly believes that she could become the program's next nationally-ranked sprinter.

In the 100 hurdles, the potent 1-2 punch of Mary Hawkins and Ann Girvan give FSU an excellent chance to send two hurdlers to the NCAA Championships. Hawkins drastically cut her time last year and is also shooting to represent her native Panama at the Summer Olympics. Girvan will try to rebound from an

off-year last year.

LADY SEMINOLE PREVIEW

There are plenty of national class athletes in the jumps. You do have to put an asterisk by these events, however. Although Long recruited a goldmine of talent in the high, long and triple jumps, the corps is made up almost entirely of freshmen. The good news is they all have the tools to qualify for the NCAA meet. The headliner in the high jump is Miami Palmetto's Holly Kelly, who has cleared 6-1¼ in the high jump. She has the potential to not only qualify for NCAAs, but score in her first year of collegiate competition as well.

In the horizontal jumps, Florida State could qualify either Kim Batten or Carolyn Hightower. The long jump is just one of several events that Hightower has shown the potential to qualify. Batten comes to FSU from East Rochester High where she topped 40 feet in the triple and 19 feet in the long jump. "Kim reminds me a lot of Esmeralda Garcia (the former world record holder in the triple jump)," Long says.

SPRINTS—Success in the sprinting events has become synonymous with Lady Seminole track and field. Just look at the success through the years. FSU has had 12 national champions in the last six years in the sprints and holds the fastest 400 and 1600 meter relay times ever run. Despite the departure of Finn, FSU has more overall talent than in the last several years. The headliner in this group is Davis, a five time All-American, who could qualify in the 100, 200 or 400 meter dashes. She will again be a prime cog on the 400 and 1600 meter relay.

The second returning member on that recordsetting 400 meter relay, Andrea Thompson, will also try to qualify in the 100 meter dash in addition to running on the 400 and 1600 meter relays. She has run a personal best of 11.76 in the 100.

After living in the shadows of fellow Orlandoans Levy and Finn, junior Curry is expected to fulfill the expectations that followed her from her high school All-American days at Oak Ridge High. She will run the 100 and be a key member on the 400 and 1600 meter relays.

If these three veterans aren't enough, Florida State also boasts a corps of talented freshmen and sophomores waiting to make names for themselves. Perhaps the biggest surprise could be sophomore Lisa Horton who has improved her times in the 100 (12.03) and 200 (23.82) during pre-season workouts. "Lisa has worked very hard during the last year and is very much improved over her freshman year," Long says.

Although only a freshman, don't be surprised to see Frenchie Holmes of Mobile to make a quick impact on the team. With personal bests of 11.63 and 24.20 in the 100 and 200, Holmes was a top-flight high school performer and could be FSU's next great sprinter.

THE HURDLES-The 100 meter high hurdles is an event that could send not one, but two athletes to the NCAA Championships. One of the top stories on the team last year centered around the rapid development of junior Mary Hawkins. Hawkins, who earned a scholarship after walking on at FSU, cut nearly a full second off her time from the previous year to qualify for the NCAA Championships. After barely missing making the final at the NCAA meet, Hawkins went on to run her best time of the year (13.48) at the TAC Championships. "You rarely find people who improve from the 15's to the low 13's," Long says. "Although she's not a big strong girl, Mary has made herself into a nationally-ranked hurdler.'

Making the event doubly difficult to opponents is the return to form of senior cocaptain Ann Girvan. Ann spent last season primarily working on her conditioning, and she has been close to NCAA qualifying standards in the past.

MIDDLE DISTANCE-"We've been a little weak in the middle distance events over the last couple of years," Long says. Last year, the Lady Seminoles didn't have a single entrant in the event, but that will change with the emergence of freshman Carrie Boyd. The former Texas state champion comes off a redshirt year that has given her added strength and endurance to compete on the collegiate level. Boyd, along with junior Colleen O'Reilly and freshman Michele Farrall, decided to remain in Tallahassee last summer to train under distance coach Al Schmidt. All three improved tremendously and their results were seen at the Metro Conference Cross Country Championships where they led FSU to a second place finish.

Also on that team was freshman Lisa Samocki. Considered by many to be the finest high school miler in the state last year, she displayed the raw talent and competitive traits that impressed the FSU coaching staff during the past cross country season.

DISTANCE—Like the middle distance events, this is an area of concern going into the season. With the graduation of Barbara Matthews, no returning letterwinners are on the roster.

THE JUMPS—It's been four years since Florida State has had an athlete in the high jump. Long and his staff made up for lost time by signing Holly Kelly, one of the most heralded

freshmen to ever sign with the Lady Seminoles. As a senior at Miami Palmetto High, she was the top-ranked high jumper in the country, clearing 5-10 at five meets on her way to the state record in the event. If she can remain healthy and make a smooth transition to collegiate track, she could become an NCAA qualifier and perhaps a scorer at the NCAA indoor and outdoor meet.

In the long and triple jumps, Hightower and Batten show signs of superstar potential. Last year, Hightower soared 18-10 at the first meet of the season before receiving a medical redshirt. The former Orlando Oak Ridge star will be looking for her first trip to the NCAA Championship in the jumps. The biggest acquisition in the event is Batten, whose value is doubled because of her prowess in both the long and triple jumps. Already many are comparing her to former Florida State great Esmeraldo Garcia. A proven performer in high school, Batten's 19-8 jump was ranked 10th in the country among prep jumpers. But her most impressive performance came in the triple, where she jumped 40-6 to rank third.

Add to this group talented sophomore Sonya Blades and FSU has the makings for success for years to come. Blades was the second-leading long jumper on last year's team, leaping 18-8½.

It's almost scary to think that freshman Michelle Spear of Orlando Oak Ridge could have been added to this group. The three-time All-American came to FSU with a personal record of 20-5, but a back ailment has sidelined her indefinitely.

THE THROWS—Notoriously weak over the years, Florida State has proven it can be a national power with virtually no help in these events. The prospectus for the javelin had taken an upswing over the last two years with the addition of two-time NCAA qualifier and school record holder Kari Keith. Keith who doubled as a softball player on FSU's nationally ranked softball team, has elected to forego track to concentrate on softball. Her decision leaves a void in the javelin, shotput and discus events.

THE SCHEDULE—Keeping with Long's philosophy of emphasizing the outdoor season over the indoor one, Florida State will attempt to qualify as many athletes for the NCAA Championships during the indoor season without jeopardizing injury or overtraining. FSU will compete at the Milrose Games in New York, the Eastman Kodak Invitational in Johnson City, Tennessee and the Florida Fast Times in Gainesville.

Although FSU will compete against some of the nation's finest athletes at these meets, the Lady Seminoles face the problem of running on Oklahoma State's unique 176 meter bankboarded track at the NCAA Championships, a track different from any other they will run on during the indoor campaign.

During the outdoor season, Florida State will again host three meets, including the FSU Relays, Eastern Airlines Invitational and the Seminole Twilight. On the road, FSU travels to a number of the finest meets across the country, including the Sun Angel Relays, the Florida Relays, the Texas Relays and the Penn Relays.

Florida State will cap its season at the NCAA Championships in June in Eugene, Oregon.

"The talent is there to be a top 10 team," Long says. "The competition in women's track has become so good that it's difficult to predict the meet in the pre-season. It's just hard to know if you're going to put it all together on that one day."

THE LADY SEMINOLE NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

Nobody Has Done It Better

It's hard to imagine any women's track program in the nation that has attained the success Florida State has in just the first 10 years of the program's existence. The numbers are truly astonishing. As two-time national champions, Florida State athletes have won over 110 All-American awards and have finished in the top 10 a total of 11 times.

Here's a look at many of the program's highlights over the last few years.

June 6, 1981 and May 29, 1982-As a sign of things to come, the Lady Seminoles burst onto the national scene with a pair of third place outdoor finishes in 1981 and '82. Those finishes were just the start of what would begin a string of six top 10 finishes in seven years.



record-setting relays, the Lady Seminoles finished second at the NCAA Championships in Houston. On the first day of the finals Angela Wright, Brenda Cliette, Marita Payne and Randy Givens ran the fastest collegiate 1600 meter relay in history, as the Lady Seminoles ran 3:28.46. Florida State's foursome followed that feat with another record-breaking performance the next day in the 400 meter relay. In the final race of the meet, the same team ran 42.94 to win its second relay championship of the meet. Both records still stand today.

June 4, 1983-Powered by a pair of

10 Florida State Track

June 2, 1984-The Lady Seminoles saved their best outdoor performance for 1984, when they scored 145 points to win the national title in Eugene, Oregon. Florida State scored in a total of 11 events to outdistance second place Tennessee by 21 points. The performance was simply awesome. Florida State's dominance in the sprints continued as it successfully defended both its 400 and 1600 (Michelle Finn, Payne, Cliette and Givens) relays. In the 100, Florida State occupied lanes 4-5-6. Olympian Givens used a strong finish to win the event going away; Cliette finished second, followed by Finn in fourth. The results in the 200 were equally as impressive with the Lady Seminoles scoring

48 points via a 1-2-3-6-9 finish by Givens, Cliette, Payne, Finn and Davis. The win by Givens, an 18-time All-American, completed a remarkable two days for the Amityville, NY, native, as she captured four national titles.

Teammate Payne came back in the 400 to smash the NCAA record and vault her to the Summer Olympics in Los Angeles. The 21-time All-American's time of 51.05 has yet to be broken.

March 5, 1985-With the graduation of Payne and Givens, many thought that Florida State would fade to an anonymous level. With a few athletes left over from possibly the greatest sprint team ever assembled on the collegiate level, including sophomore Finn, Florida State stormed back to win the 1985 Indoor NCAA Championship. The rise of Finn, who was a surprise winner in the 55 meters, was clearly one reason for FSU success as was triple jumper Esmeralda Garcia, who had returned to Florida State following a three year absence.

May 31, 1985-If that showing didn't silence the critics, the Lady Seminoles proved that they intended to stay on top of the track world with a runner-up finish at the national championships. Leading the way was Finn, winning her second national title with a win in the 100 and a runner-up finish in the 200. Garcia won the triple jump and took third in the long jump and fifth in the 100.

March 15 and June 7, 1986-In what began with a rebuilding season in 1986 under first-year head coach Terry Long turned into sixth and 14th place showings at the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor

Championships.

June 6, 1987-You could call them the untouchables. Through the course of the season, Janet Levy, Andrea Thompson, Janet Davis and Finn could not be beaten at their specialty-the 400 meter relay. Eight times they faced the nation's toughest competition and eight times they walked away with victories. Finn finished her sparkling college career by anchoring a national champion relay team that ran the fastest time (43.19) a non-national team which consisted entirely of American athletes has ever run. The victory gave the Lady Seminoles a 10th place finish, but more importantly, the achievement reminded the track establishment that through the years, nobody has done it better.

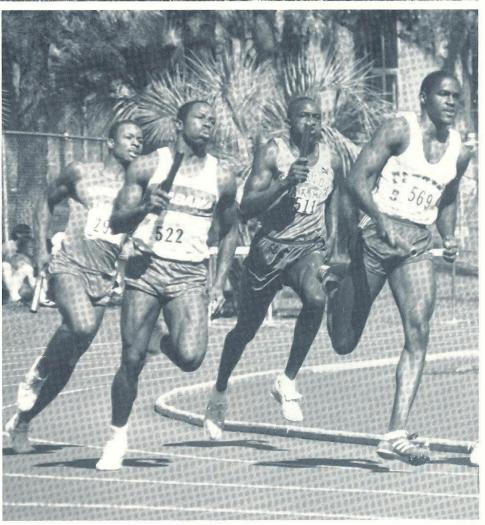

A World Class Environment ...

Florida State is truly a world class environment. And over the years, FSU athletes have produced some world class performances. Both Florida State's men's and women's programs are perennial national powers, as the men's team has won 11 consecutive Metro Conference Championships while the women have finished in the nation's top 10 in seven of the last eight years and have won two national championships. This year, junior hurdler Arthur Blake is ranked third in the nation and fourth in the world in the 110 meter high hurdles.

Much of the program's success goes to the Seminole coaching staff who has helped to develop hundreds of All-Americans and even an Olympic Gold Medalist.

If that isn't enough, Florida State athletes train at the most modern facilities in the nation. The 5,000-seat Mike Long Track is host to five major meets during the outdoor season and features the same surface that will be used at the 1988 Summer Olympics.

The Florida State experience prepares an athlete for the future. "Running track at Florida State definitely helped me make it to the Olympics," said Walter McCoy, a 1984 gold medalist. "I can travel anywhere and people recognize the quality of Florida State's academic and track programs. I still train at FSU because the facilities and coaching is so good."

SEMINOLE PREVIEW

On the Right Track

Once again, Dick Roberts proves the prognosticators wrong. Roberts, now in his 10th season at the helm of the Seminole track program, continues to amaze onlookers with Florida State's success in the face of adversity.

Case in point—the 1987 Metro Conference Championships. Going into last year's meet, almost everyone predicted that FSU would finally lose its 11 year stronghold on the conference championship. After all, favorite South Carolina hosted Florida State and the six other member schools in its own back yard. With FSU superstar Arthur Blake sidelined with mononucleosis, it looked as if it was only a matter of time before the Seminoles lost their first title in 11 years.

But Roberts' team rallied during the two-day event to continue the longest conference winning streak in collegiate track and field. With almost every member of that team back, it is that monumental win that helps to generate much of the enthusiasm going into this year's campaign.



FSU will also get an added bonus with the return of junior world class hurdler Arthur Blake. Blake enters the season needing an impressive showing during the latter part of the spring to propel him to a spot on the U.S. Olympic team. The idea is not so farfetched considering that he is ranked third in the nation and fourth in the world with a personal best of 13.29 in the 110 meter high hurdles. After finishing second at last year's NCAA Championships, Blake is the top returning performer in the nation. A healthy Blake translates to instant points for FSU at nationals.

Florida State will probably have to turn to the field events for the remainder of its points at the NCAA meet. In the pole vault, the 1-2 combination of junior Larry Carr and senior Tom Riether could figure into FSU's point total. Both have cleared 17-6 during their careers and are quickly closing in on the 18-foot barrier.

Just behind this group, Florida State boasts a host of athletes who are expected to qualify for the NCAA meet. Reminding many of Herschel Walker, Florida State's Sammie Smith is one two-sport athlete who continues to draw favorable comparisons to the former Georgia Heisman Trophy winner. In 1987, Smith ran a 10.31 in the 100 meters to win the Metro title. This season, he is expected to improve on that impressive mark.

In the long jump, watch for Billy Close to improve on his PR of 25-8 in the long jump. The injury-prone Close made his first visit to the indoor NCAA Championships last year.

Another FSU athlete seeking a return trip to the NCAA Championships is high jumper Darrell Wills, indoor school record (7-3½) holder.

SPRINTS—Coming off the best rushing season in Florida State history, where he racked up 1,230 yards on the ground, Smith will use that momentum to spring him into the track season. "I don't think there's any question that he can improve," Roberts says. "With his breakthrough last year and his enthusiasm, Sammie comes into this season in an even better position than he did last year." At press time, Smith is FSU's only entrant in the 100 and 200, although there is some talk that several of Smith's teammates on the football team might join him in the starting blocks.

In the 400, FSU will rely soly on freshman Tyrone Bligen. He will attempt to help alleviate the loss of Carter Williams, who elected to graduate early. A 46+ sprinter in high school, Bligen could see action on FSU's 400 and 1600 relays in addition to his work in the quarter.

HURDLES—This will be without question Florida State's strong suit entering the season. Blake, who is seeking to become Florida State's second individual to make a U.S. Olympic team, will headline the event. Last season, the Haines City native cut his personal best to 13.29 to finish second to Greg Foster at the National Sports Festival.

The quality in the highs does not end with Blake, however, Jason Welsh and Rodney Lawson are a pair who are not far off NCAA qualifying standards and figure to score at the Metro Championshps.

In the intermediate hurdles, sophomore Bruce James returns after finishing in the Metro last year. He owns a personal record of 53.31 in the 400 hurdles.

MIDDLE DISTANCE-Florida State has so many new athletes in the middle distance events that spectators to Mike Long Track will have to pay special attention to their programs. The Seminole coaching staff, trying to break Virginia Tech's domination in these events in recent years, signed Alex Caulder and Philip Harrell, a pair of outstanding high school athletes. Harrell is a former Alabama state champion in the 800 and 1500, while Caulder was one of the top three school boy milers in England.

After spending last year straightening out his academics, Richard Corbett also returns to shore up the middle distance events. The versatile Corbett, with a personal best of 3:53 in the 1500, could see action from the 1500 and 3000.

DISTANCE-The distance events is one area that has steadily improved in recent years. That trend should continue with the return of several talented runners. Two-time All-Metro selection David Keen returns in the 3000 and 5000 meters. The Marianna junior finished last year at the Conference meet, racing to a 31:12.15 time. Also figuring to score is junior John Charlton. Charlton was one of the top runners on the cross country team over the past two years. After spending most of last year on the sideline because of injury, former state champ Billy Penick will also team with Keen and Charlton to give the Seminoles a powerful trio. Last year's distance ace, Jacob Hoesly, will take a redshirt year to give him an added year of eligibility.

THE JUMPS-From top to bottom the horizontal jumps are loaded with topflight talent. Teaming with newcomer Erik Robinson in the long and triple jumps, Close could have his finest year ever. Often hampered by injuries, Close took advantage of an injury-free indoor season in 1987 to qualify with a school record jump. He could very likely do the same this year during both the indoor and outdoor seasons. He will be pushed by junior college transfer Robinson who is equally adept in the triple or long jumps. Robinson comes to FSU from Miami Dade South with PRs of 24+ and 51+ in the long and triple jumps, respectively.

Sophomore Brian Mallory, a fifth place finisher at the '87 Metro Conference meet in the long jump, provides quality depth in both events. Darrell Wills, FSU's top returner in the high jump, could very well be the best athlete on the track team. A former community college basketball player, Wills has shown superstar potential in the high jump, soaring 7-3½ two years ago as a sophomore. He will need to overcome nagging injuring that bothered him last year to challenge the nation's best.

THE VAULT-Never before have the Seminoles had a combination as potent as Carr and Riether in the pole vault. Probably the biggest surprise of the '87 season was the development of Carr, who

bettered his PR by almost 1½ feet. The Jacksonville sophomore continues to be one of the most diligent workers on the team, which means 18 feet is within reach.

Riether cleared 17-6 last summer and looks to sky even higher this spring.

THE THROWS-With heavy graduation losses in the discus and shotput, Florida State will spend the season rebuilding these events with a corps of young talent. In the shot, FSU lost twotime Metro champion Mike Bell. He will be replaced by freshman Eric Chambers, the 4A state champ out of Altamonte Springs. Before his career is over, many think he could rewrite the FSU record

Handling the discus chores will be redshirt freshman Mike Hill. One of the pleasant surprises during the '87 season, Hill figures heavily in the Seminoles' hopes to score in the discus at the Metro meet.

After working in the shadow of All-American Horatio Garcia for the last two years, George Karakatsanis will prove to be a talented replacement in the hammer. Although he has limited meet experience, Karakatsanis could step in and make his presence felt at the Metro meet.

The strength of the throw lies with senior Tom Fetters in the javelin. The returning Metro champion was just four feet from the NCAA qualifying mark during pre-season workouts. As one of the hardest workers on the team, Fetters could get the added distance to improve on the PR of 208-2 to surpass the NCAA standard.

THE SCHEDULE—As has been the case in recent history, Florida State will not accentuate its indoor schedule. The Seminoles will meet national caliber competition at the Millrose Games in New York, the Vitalis Olympic Invitational in Meadowlands, NJ, and the Mobil Invitational in Fairfax, VA. The NCAA Indoor Championships will again be held in Oklahoma City.

The Florida State Relays on March 18-19 will highlight a four-meet home schedule for the Seminoles. FSU will also host the Eastern Airlines Invitational, Metro Conference Championshps and Seminole Twilight Invitational. One noticeable change in the 1988 schedule is the interruption of the 32-year series with Florida, as the Gators elected not to renew the rivalry. On the national front, Florida State will compete at the Sun Angle Relays in Tempe, AZ, the Texas Relays in Austin, TX and the Gatorade Classic in Knoxville, TN. The outdoor meet schedule will help Florida State prepare for the NCAA Championships in Eugene,

In Eugene, FSU will be shooting for its 10th top 20 finish in as many years.

"Last year we were 21st in the nation," Roberts says. "I see us as possibly better than that this year. There's again a possiblity of a top 20 finish."



ARTHUR BLAKE

Junior Haines City, Florida

110 HH (13.29) — one of the premier hurdlers in the world, Arthur is a prime candidate for a spot on the U.S. Olympic team . . . Greg Foster, the number one ranked hurdler in the world told Track and Field News, "I'd pick Arthur Blake as the next great hurdler. He's young, he's quick, and he can

handle big competitions" . . . although nationally known since his high school days at Haines City High, last year he made his breakthrough to join the world's elite . . . at Haines City, he set the national high school mark of 13.84 in the Standard Collegiate 42-inch hurdles . . . entered last season with a personal best of 13.54 in the 110 high's and by the time the summer was over, he cut that to 13.29 . . . in fact, during his tour of Europe and the United States in the summer, Arthur ran sub 13.5 clockings a total of nine times . . . his emergence was remarkable considering that he battled mononucleosis in May ... after he received the FSU team doctors' approval to continue his training, he ran an uncharacteristic 14.29 at the final meet of the outdoor season . . . not knowing what to expect, Blake decided to give the NCAA Championships a try . . . to the surprise of onlookers, he finished second to LSU's Eric Reid ... ran a 13.59 to finish only 8/100's behind Reid ... continued to surprise during his summer meet schedule and finished second at the World University Games in Budapest, hurdling to a personal best of 13.36 perhaps his most notable accomplishment was at the U.S. Olympic Festival in Durham, NC ... used a rocket-like start to take an early lead on Foster . . . Foster caught Blake on the fourth hurdle and went on to set the Olympic Festival record of 13.19, while Blake finished second at 13.29 ... also ran both 13.31 and 13.32 in a two-day period at the London and Cologne Grand Prix's 1987: started the '87 season off in recordbreaking fashion . . . cruised to one of the fastest 60 meter hurdle times ever recorded (7.05) in only his first indoor meet of the season at the LSU Relays . . . tied Willie Gault's O'Connell Center record of 7.19 in the 55 meter highs . . . concluded the indoor season by running the second fastest prelim. 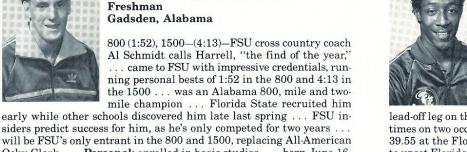

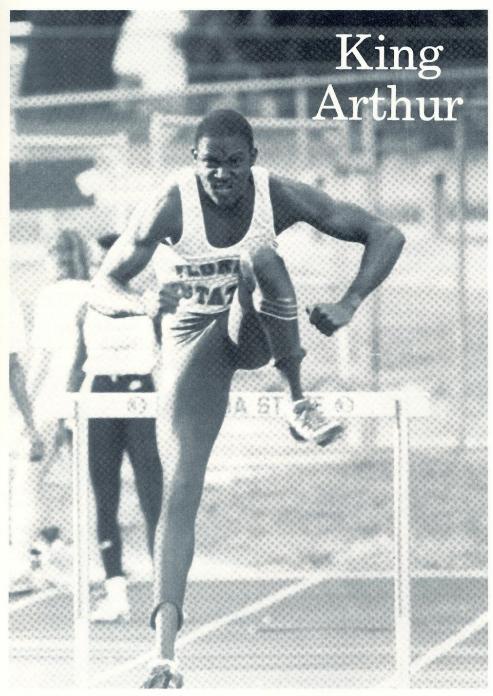

There's an old axiom that still holds true today—if you want a direct answer to a question, go straight to the top. That's why, when you want to know who is the next great athlete to emerge in world track and field circles, ask the numberone ranked hurdler in the world, Greg Foster.

"I'd pick Arthur Blake as the next great hurdler in the world," Foster told **Track** and **Field News** this winter.

Foster ought to know. In this past summer's National Sports Festival in Durham, NC, Blake gave Foster an unexpected test in the 110 meter high hurdles. Rocketing out of the starting blocks, Blake led the world champion going into the fourth hurdle and went on to finish second to Foster. Foster's time of 13.19 was the fastest run during 1987 and

Blake's second place clocking of 13.29 was his personal best. With that performance, Blake finally gained a huge dose of self-confidence that he needed to move among the world's elite.

"This summer I got my confidence back," says Blake, who at age 21 has had to learn how to compete against older and more experienced hurdlers like Foster. "Every time I go out on the track, I feel like I can win."

Throughout the course of the summer, Blake enjoyed the taste of winning on a number of occasions. Slashing his personal best by an unheard of 3/10's of a second in only a period of three months, Blake took a lesson in world geography while running on the European circuit. He dueled every member of the hurdling fraternity; one-by-one he walked away a

winner. Probably no win was more satisfying than the victory over 1984 Olympic gold medalist Roger Kingdom at the London Grand Prix. After racing to a 13.30 time, a curious thing happened. The shy and reserved Blake was ready to leave the track, just as he had after scores of other victories in the United States, when Kingdom approached him. "Arthur," he said, "go ahead and take a victory lap. You ran a good race." Blake hesitated for a moment, before jogging a lap on the 400 meter oval track, much to the delight of the huge following of track fans. Perhaps Kingdom recognized Blake's win as an omen of things to come. "He knows I'll be ready for next year," Blake says, referring to the approaching Summer Olympics in South Korea. "I make so many more mistakes than Kingdom does. If I get my act together, I think he thinks that he might be in trouble."

With all the success Blake experienced during the summer, it could have easily turned into the summer of his discontent. In his first year in a Seminole uniform, he had a record-breaking year, running NCAA qualifying performances in nearly every race. But late in the season, Blake contracted mononucleosis which forced him to miss several key meets, including the Metro Conference Championships during the crucial stretch leading up to the NCAA Championships. While mono might not be the most serious or dreaded of diseases, it is particularly debilitating to a world class athlete when it robs him of his conditioning and strength. "Once I got mono, people told me it would take a while to come back," Blake says. "I wasn't allowed to start training until one week before the NCAA meet. I wasn't as strong as I could have been."

Undaunted, Blake decided to give the NCAA Championships a try after receiving the medical clearance only one week before the meet. Most didn't even figure Blake to make the final-after all, the week before he ran 14.29-which is hardly Blake standards. But in Baton Rouge, Blake surprised, cutting his time to 13.59 in the final to finish second in the nation. That surprising finish, together with his development over the summer, makes Blake the heavy favorite in college meets this season. For most young runners who are unaccustomed to the new-found attention, reaching the top and maintaining peak performance is more difficult than getting to that point. But Blake, a hurdling prodigy in high school, is used to the pressure of the track world.

Blake now looks toward the '88 Olympics as his next goal. Ranked fourth in the world and third in the nation, Blake may have the credentials to make the Olympic team, but you'd only know he was a world class athlete by looking at him. His sleek and aerodynamic 5-11 frame could not be mistaken for anything other than a fine-tuned athlete. That is the only thing that would tip one off. Blake is as modest a person as you'll find. Despite his fame, he genuinely cares about others. "Arthur gets more satisfaction when a teammate does well, than when he does well," Long says.

Blake seems to leave his impressions on people he surrounds, which is why track experts feel he has a legitimate shot at making the U.S. Olympic Team this summer. "When experts speak of those who will wear the U.S. uniform, Arthur will have to be mentioned in the conversation," FSU men's head coach Dick Roberts says.

"He's young, he's still learning and he can handle the big competitions," said an impressed Foster who usually does not talk about his opponents openly.

Arthur Blake may still be learning, but if past experience indicates future performances. Blake has risen to the front of the

As a senior at Haines City High, he drew national attention from the likes of Sports Illustrated and Track and Field News for his exploits on the track. He won the 3A 100 and 200 dashes and 120 yard high hurdles to single handedly scored enough points for Haines City to walk away with the 3A team title. He also set the national high school record (13.18) in the 110 meter high hurdles that was previously held by Renaldo Nehemiah. He was the toast of the prep track world, as he was selected as the State's top athlete and finished second in the balloting for National High School Athlete of the Year by Track and Field News. Nearly every college and university in the country descended upon the small town of Haines City, which is in the shadows of Walt Disney World. After a heated recruiting battle, he decided on Florida, where he developed a close relationship with then-Florida assistant Terry Long. Raised by his grand mother Viola, Blake looked up to Long and trusted his career with him. It was that relationship that moved Blake to transfer to Florida State when Long accepted the head women's post at his alma mater. "Terry Long was the main reason I came to Florida State," Blake now says. "I had different coaches all the way through high school and I didn't want another change. He's worked a lot of things for me in Europe and has helped me become mentally stronger."

Long feels the same way for his star pupil. "There is a personal relationship that has emerged," Long says. "I feel a personal duty to help him achieve his

goals."

TRACK TRADITION

Florida State's NCAA Champions



DANNY SMITH 60 yd. HH (7.1) 1974 and 1975

In 1975, Danny Smith became the first person to win the NCAA indoor championships in the 60 yd. high hurdles two years in a row. Including trials and finals over three years, Smith won 11 of 12 races, placing second to Olympic champion Rod Milburn in 1973.



WALTER McCOY 600 yd. run (1:09.6) 1978

McCoy's upset victory as a freshman was only a tenth of a second off the NCAA meet record of 1:09.5 set by Olympian and world record holder Rick Wolhuter.



BRADLEY COOPER Discus (212-6) 1979

Cooper's victory established a new NCAA meet record and climaxed an undefeated senior year. His record throw was the second longest in collegiate history.



MIKE ROBERSON 200 Meters (19.96) 1980

Roberson saved his greatest collegiate race for his last one. After three races in the 4 x 400 relay (which placed third) and three races in the 100 meters where he finished second, he became the first human in history to break 20 seconds for 200 meters at sea level, finally winning an NCAA championship in the race he loved most.

(RON NELSON), REGGIE ROSS MELFORD BOODIE, PALMER SIMMONS WALTER McCOY

Mile Relay (3:16.7) 1980

Lead-off runner Nelson suffered a severe hamstring strain during the qualifying race but even so the Seminoles were the fastest qualifier. Boodie flew in the next morning and Ross replaced Nelson at the lead off. McCoy's come-from-behind anchor leg was the fastest of the meet and brought FSU the victory.

Florida State Hall of Fame



KEN MISNER Elected 1977

The team captain of the 1970 and 1971 Seminoles, Misner specialized in distance events for FSU. He earned All-America status in two sports (track and cross country). Misner first made All-American in 1969 in cross country and repeated that honor in 1970. The following year, he was All-American in both the three and six mile runs. Misner at one time held school records in the indoor two mile run, as well as the outdoor 2, 3 and 6 mile events.



MIKE LONG Elected 1978

One of the most prolific coaches in the history of the sport, Mike Long headed the Florida State track and field program for 23 seasons. During that time, Long recorded a won-lost record of 145-51 and had only one losing season. He coached five undefeated teams at FSU and had five others that lost only once. During that period, he coached 14 athletes who garnered a total of 26 All-American titles.



MIKE KELLY Elected 1979

An outstanding hurdler for Florida State in the late sixties, Kelly earned All-American honors in both the 120-yard high hurdles and the 440-yard IM hurdles. His combined time of 63.9 in those two events set a world mark that stood for seven years.



MIKE CONLEY Elected 1980

As a member of Florida State's track team, Conley was one of the South's most dominating runners from 1956-58. During his junior and senior seasons, he went undefeated in the one mile run. So dominating was Conley that his time of 4:05.7 in the mile run at the Meet of Champions in Houston (1958) would set a Florida State school record that would stand for 16 years.



DANNY SMITH Elected 1981

A three-time All-American in the hurdles, Smith at one time was co-holder of the world record in the indoor 50-yard hurdles. From 1975-76, Smith became the first athlete in NCAA history to claim back-to-back NCAA Championships in the indoor hurdles. A former world and NCAA record holder, Smith finished his career at FSU with seven university records to his credit.



BRADLEY COOPER
Elected 1984

Florida State's greatest field event performer came to Tallahassee from the Bahamas. In 1978, his junior year, Cooper won All-American honors when he finished fourth in the NCAA discus competition with a throw of 189 feet. His senior year, Cooper became FSU's first NCAA record-holder in track and field when he won the NCAA Championship discus event with a throw of 212-6. That mark stood for four years. Cooper, the co-captain of the 1979 track and field team, also holds the second-best shot put mark in FSU history at 60-2.



MIKE ROBERSON Elected 1985

A World Class sprinter all four years (1976-1980) at Florida State, Mike Roberson set records at all levels of competition. He set FSU indoor and outdoor marks in the 60, 100 and 200, and Metro Conference records in the 100 and 200. Roberson won a gold medal in the 100 in the World University Games and was a member of the gold medal winning 400 meter relay team in the Pan American Games.

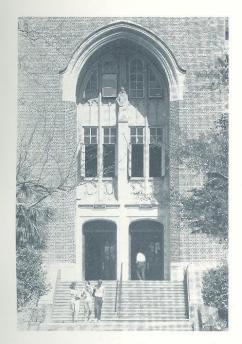
In 1980 FSU's greatest team, led by Roberson, finished third in the nation. He won the NCAA 200 meter championship in 19.6, becoming the first human in history to break 20 seconds at sea level. He also picked up second place in the 100 and was a member of FSU's third place 400 meter relay.



WALTER McCOY Elected 1986

Upon his arrival at Florida State from Daytona Beach in 1978, Walter McCoy immediately started setting records for the Seminoles. As a freshman, he was the NCAA's 600 yard indoor champion, finishing the race in 1:09.6—just one tenth of a second off the NCAA meet record held by Olympian Rick Wolhuter. McCoy captained Florida State during his final season and set the school and Metro Conference 400 meter dash records, both of which still stand today. The 12 time All-American was a member of the U.S. Olympic team and won a gold medal as a member of the 400 meter relay.

THIS IS FLORIDA STATE



Florida State is the University which boasts of such diverse assets as the world's most powerful supercomputer and the greatest all-collegiate show on Earth, the Flying High Circus.

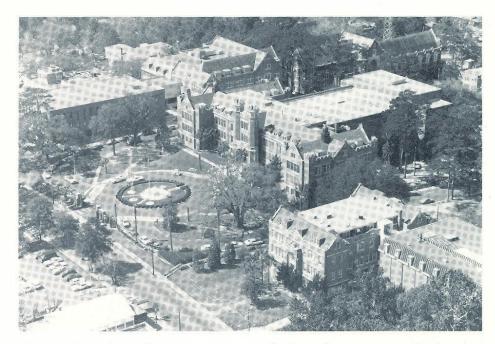
Located in Tallahassee, the capital of Florida, FSU is a public, coeducational university and a senior member of the State University System.

About 23,500 students representing all 50 states and more than 100 foreign countries work toward more than 250 different graduate and undergraduate degrees in the 15 schools and colleges of Florida State. The colleges of arts and sciences, business, communication, education, engineering, home economics, law and social sciences combine with the schools of criminology, library and information studies, music, nursing, social work, theatre and visual arts to make FSU a nationally acclaimed university.

The Florida State campus, located just a few blocks from the state Capitol, is one of the most beautiful in the southeast. Traditional Gothic-style structures combine with the latest in modern architecture, all brought together by an array of oaks, pines, palms, dogwoods and azaleas. The natural beauty of the 347-acre main campus mirrors the picturesque features of the surrounding North Florida region.

Florida State was founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee River. Name changes over the years included Florida State College and, in 1909, Florida State College for Women. Governor Millard Caldwell signed a bill in 1947 which again made the institution coeducational and named in Florida State University.

Today, Florida State faculty and administrators generate more than \$35 million annually in external funding to supplement state sponsorship of research.



In addition, almost \$13 million in private gifts was raised through the FSU Foundation during the past fiscal year. These contributions from alumni, friends, corporations, the university community and charitable foundations are for the sole benefit of Florida State's academic programs.

The FSU Supercomputer Computations Research Institute has attracted international attention to the University, home of the world's fastest supercomputer. The ETA10 has the capacity to perform 10 billion calculations per second.

The Tandem Van De Graaf-Superconducting Accelerator Laboratory in the Department of Physics houses two powerful atom smashers and has been ranked in the top four in the nation by the National Science Foundation.

The University's location affords excellent research and internship opportunities in government, law and the social sciences. The reputation of Florida State's research programs, the expertise of its more than 1,500 faculty members—including four members of the National Academy of Sciences—and the quality of the graduate students involved in research represent major strengths of the University.

Programs in music, dance and theater at Florida State have earned well-deserved national recognition. The visual and performing arts exhibited and produced on campus offer students and the community a wealth of enrichment opportunities.

Student activities at FSU create an important balance between the classroom experience and the personal life of the individual scholar. Honors programs, student government, intramural sports and more than 200 organizations are available for student involvement.

Students from every academic major have a chance to become stars on the highwire or flying trapeze by participating in the Flying High Circus, the only one of its kind in the nation.

Florida State academic programs extend well beyond Tallahassee. The FSU Marine Laboratory is located on the Gulf of Mexico, 45 miles away. Students participate in professional training programs at the Asolo State Theater in Sarasota and the Burt Reynolds Institute for Theatre Training in Jupiter. The Panama City Campus of Florida State offers upperlevel courses which lead to bachelor's and master's degrees. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Florida State Conference Center on the edge of campus, manages educational outreach activities from Pensacola to Miami. In addition, Florida State maintains programs of study in England, Costa Rica, Switzerland, Yugoslavia, the Panama Canal Zone and even the People's Republic of China.

The physical growth of the University during the Sliger administration is best evidenced by such additions as the new wing of the Rovetta Business Building, the University Union expansion project, the new Paul A.M. Dirac Science Library Building, the Panama City Campus, the Jeffersonian Village Green project at the College of Law and the new building for the FAMU/FSU College of Engineering, now under construction.

Florida State is setting the pace as higher education in Florida prepares to enter the 21st century. And President Sliger takes pride not only in the academic programs and facilities of the University, but also in the people—students, faculty, alumni, administrators and staff—who make Florida State a successful monument to learning.
