### DR. HOWARD DANFORD Director of Athletics

Dr. Howard Danford heads up the athletic program at Florida State University as director of athletics and director of physical ducation for men. Danford came to FSU in the fall of 1947 from Madison, Wis., where

he had served seven years as director of health, physical education, recreation, and safety for the Madison public school system.

Under his guidance, the FSU department of physical education has been expanded greatly both from a standpoint of curriculum and personnel

Dr. Danford guides the overall athletic program which includes intercollegiate competition in nine sports (football, basketball, gymnastics, swimming, track, volleyball, tennis, golf, and baseball), and the nationally famous FSU student circus, "Flying High."

Dr. Danford received his bachelor's degree from Ohio University and later was awarded his masters and doctorate degree at NYU in 1943.

Author of numerous magazine articles, Dr. Danford has held positions of prominence in national organizations. He is current president of the College Recreation Association and regional representative of Region VI of the United States Volleyball Association. He is past president of the Florida Recreation Association and is chairman of the public relations committee of the Florida Health, Physical Education, and Recreation Association.

SPORTS PUBLICITY DIRECTOR BENNETT LAND, 26, is a graduate of Florida State University with a major in journalism. While a student he served as sports editor of the semi-weekly school newspaper, The Florida Flambeau, and contributed to other student publications. His professional background includes service with the Arkansas Economic Council-State Chamber of Commerce in public relations work; a year-and-a-half as a sports writer for the Arkansas Democrat in Little Rock, and work with Little Rock Junior College as part-time sports publicity director. He began work with FSU in July, 1952.

STUDENT ASSISTANT PAT HOGAN, 20, is a junior at Florida State University majoring in journalism. He also serves as sports editor of the school newspaper, The Florida Flambeau. Hogan is a former all-state basketball player at Little Rock (Ark.) High. He formerly attended Little Rock Junior College. His professional background includes two-and-one-half years as a sports writer for the Arkansas Gazette, oldest daily newspaper west of the Mississippi.

STUDENT ASSISTANT TOMMY SANDS, 19, is a sophomore at Florida State University majoring in journalism. Sands is a former sports editor of the school newspaper, The Florida Flambeau. His professional background includes service as a sports writer for the Tallahassee Democrat.

# Basketball

J. K. "Bud" Kennedy Head Basketball Coach

(Four Years-Won 50, Lost 51-49.5%)

Instilled with the inborn characteristics of a paramount love for the game of basketball and a keen desire for teaching and working with young men, Head Coach J. K. "Bud" Kennedy begins his fifth season as director

of Florida State University's cage

destinies.

The Seminoles' genial, hard-working head man of the hardwood opens the 1952-53 campaign facing the most formidable schedule in the short, six-year history of basketball at FSU.

Kennedy's four previous teams at Florida State have won 50 of their 101 games — just a fraction below 50 percent—with many of the South's foremost round-ball powers.

Bud was born in a natural basketball setting, at Lawrence, Kansas. right in the heart of the cage coun-

try. He attended college at the University of Kansas. Baker University and Kansas State Teachers College. playing basketball at all three institutions. He also was an outstanding football player at Baker and Kansas State Teachers.

Kennedy got his first coaching experience before finishing college. After a successful first year at Baker, he was called to San Diego, California, where he was playing coach of the San Diego Athletic Club for two years.

Bud's next coaching job was at Warrensburg, Mo., High School, where he directed basketball, baseball and track with marked success for two years after he was graduated from Kansas State Teachers. Kennedy's Warrensburg basketball teams went to the Missouri state tournament each year, and advanced as far as the semifinals the second season.

From Warrensburg Kennedy went to Kansas City, where he supervised physical education in the elementary schools, and at Westport High School. After six years with the Kansas City School System, Bud was appointed Assistant Director of Recreation for the city of Madison, Wis. He stayed at this job for three years; then went into the Navy for the next three.

While in the Navy, Kennedy got back to coaching basketball. He tutored teams at the Naval Training Station at Purdue and while overseas at Tubabo, Philippine Islands.

Kennedy came to Florida State as Athletic Business Manager in 1948, assisted in the basketball program that year, and took over as head cage coach the following year.

Bud's best team at Florida State was the 1950-51 squad, which won 18 games and lost only nine. That same team won the District 25 NAIB tournament, bringing Florida State its first basketball chamiponship, and went to the quarter-finals of the national NAIB tournament at Kansas City before being eliminated by Millikan, the tournament runner-up.

Coach Kennedy is married—his wife's name is Laura -and they have two sons, Hugh and Bob, and one granddaughter, Sharon.

### Student Assistant Bob Whitmer

One of Florida State's "own sons" and regarded as one of the better players ever to don a Garnet & Gold basketball jersey, Bob Whitmer steps into his first coaching job this season.

The 24-year-old native of South Bend, Ind., who captained last year's Seminole cagers, will direct the freshman team and assist Kennedy with the varsity.

"We are delighted to have Bob with us," Kennedy stated earlier this year. "We know he will do a fine job for us."

Whitmer, a stylish, versatile forward who also was a starting offensive end on the 1951 Indian football team, was FSU's second best point-maker last basketball campaign.

Bob bucketed 276 points in 23 games for a 12-point average. He also was highly valuable as a play-maker and rebounder.

Whitmer also played on Kennedy's outstanding 1951 five which won the District 25 NAIB crown and advanced to the quarterfinals of the National meet in Kansas City.

# Gymnastics

### DR. HARTLEY PRICE, Coach

Recognized as one of the most competent coaches in the history of gymnastics in the United States, Dr. Hartley Price begins his third year as director of the nationally-famous Florida State University gymnastics team.

Competing with the best gymnastics talent in the land, Dr. Price has led FSU gymnasts to three national team titles in two seasons, the NCAA and AAU crowns in 1951 and repeated as NCAA team champion last Spring after being edged out of a second straight AAU title.

In addition Dr. Price is credited with developing FSU's Olympic stars Bill Roetzheim and Don Holder, who represented the United States at Helsinki, Finland last summer.

However, national championships are not exactly new to the Seminole coach. As gymnastics coach at the University of Illinois, his teams won

four NCAA titles and twice copped the national AAU bunting.

Born in Brisbane, Australia, Dr. Price was a standout athlete in "The Land Down Under" before coming to the United States. In Australia he won a number of gymnastics titles.

After coming to America in the early '20's, Dr. Price entered Springfield College in Massachusetts where he was a member of the gymnastics team. He was graduated from Springfield with a BS degree in physical education in 1928.

He later studied at the University of Illinois where he received his BS in education in 1929 and his MS in education in 1931.

It was in the mid-thirties that Price commenced producing championship gymnastics teams at Illinois. During World War II, Dr. Price served as head of gymnastics and tumbling at the Navy's Pre-Flight school in Iowa and later at St. Mary's Pre-Flight school. He served as coordinator of gymnastics for the Naval aviation program and authored the Navy's "Tumbling and Gymnastics Guide." He has written numerous magazine articles.

Upon being discharged from the service, Dr. Price entered New York University where he completed work on his doctor's degree in 1945.

In 1949 Price was awarded the research award from the American Academy of Physical Education and in 1950 was listed in the monthly supplement of "Who's Who in America."

A firm believer in permitting his gymnasts to work out their own problems, Coach Price is a stickler for insisting on hard work and strives to build within his competitors a keen desire to excel.

### HISTORY OF FSU GYMNASTICS

Florida State University fielded its first collegiate gymnastics team in 1950 and rolled to an impressive record of four wins and no losses. Since that time Coach Hartley Price has directed his talented charges to three national team championships—two NCAA crowns, in 1951 and 1952, and to the national AAU title in 1951.

This season with 11 lettermen back in the fold, chances for finishing high in national competition appear good.

Heading the list of returning veterans is Olympic participant Don Holder who along with Bill Roetzheim, now a graduate student at FSU, were the only freshmen college gymnasts ever to make the Olympic team from the United States. Roetzheim had participated in the 1948 Olympics when a freshman at the University of Illinois. He also was on the '52 Olympic team.

Also returning are NCAA trampoline champion, Dick Gutting, Jack Sharp, NCAA flying rings champion; Jack Miles, former AAU rings titlist; Carmine and Joe Regna, Pat Signorelli, Ben Wallace, Larry Weston, Dick Ireland, and Al Ruda.

Since only eight of the nation's 3,000 gymnasts are selected to represent the United States in the Olympic games, Florida State accomplished a heretofore unheard-of feat when it placed Holder and Roetzheim on the 1952 team.

Prior to the 1952 Olympics, Holder had placed fourth in the all-around at the NCAA championships at Boulder, Colorado, and had finished ninth in the AAU all-around. It was not until the Olympic tryouts that he hit his stride.

For Roetzheim, the 1952 Olympics marked the fifth time that he has represented this country in an international competitive gymnastics event as well as being his second Olympic outing.

Roetzheim was a member of the all-star team that met Czechoslovakia in New York in 1947 and in 1950 led a three man U. S. team to win over Japan's best in Tokyo. In 1951 he was the United States' lone representative in the Pan-American games in Buenos Aires where he won the high bar, all-around titles.

While competing in collegiate circles, Roetzheim copped four national all-around titles, three national high bar championships and a single national side horse crown. He will be eligible for AAU meets representing Florida State Gymkana.

Roetzheim has been picturized in a number of national publications including Parade Magazine and Friends Magazine. His latest honor was his being selected as the "Athlete of the Month" in the December, 1952 American Boy Magazine.

Florida State University gymnasts form the backbone of the school's outstanding "Gymkana Troupe" and are available for performances throughout the state. Civic clubs, schools, Chamber of Commerce, and other groups interested in bringing the Gymkana Troupe to their towns are requested to write Dr. Hartley Price, Gymnastics Coach, Florida State University, Tallahassee.

Florida State University's "Gymkana Production" will be filmed by Grantland Rice's Movietone and will be released in 1953. The film will also feature Florida State gymnasts including Olympic performers Bill Roetzheim and Don Holder.

# Swimming

### N. B. "BIM" STULTS, Coach

Coach N. B. "Bim" Stults' swimming teams at Florida State have complied an enviable record of 22 wins against 10 losses and a single tie since the sport first made its appearance on the campus four short years ago.

Coach Stults came to Florida State in January of 1948. The following year, despite a green squad, the Seminole tankmen under Stults' guidance, met their first full schedule and won three dual encounters while losing six.

In 1950 the Florida State swimmers hit their stride, winning seven dual meets while losing only two. And in 1951 "Bim" directed his charges to their finest season ever—when they went undefeated in seven dual meets and tied for the Southeastern AAU crown in addition to winning the Florida A.A.U. title.

That year the Seminoles were rated the best college team in the Deep South.

Finally, last season, swimming their toughest schedule in history, the Seminoles copped five dual meets, lost two and tied one. Included among the victims were such toughies as the University of Miami, Georgia Tech, Clemson and Texas A. & M.

Coach Stults graduated from Washington & Lee in 1930 with an AB degree Bachelor of Arts. After graduation he went directly to Ross High School in Fremont, Ohio as head swimming coach where he won the Ohio State championship five times and was runner-up twice. His Ross tankmen also finished third in the national tank meet four times.

In 1939 he served as assistant swimming coach at Ohio State University. After serving in the Navy from 1942 through 1946 with the rank of Lt. Commander, "Bim" returned to Ohio State and remained there until coming to Florida State.

Coach Stults is married, his wife's name is Jeanne, and they have no children.

Now, starting his fifth term as head swimming mentor, Stults will have eight lettermen—John Baruch, Larry Beaty, Dan Blackshear, Jack Burnett, Bob Carter, Bob Richardson, Don Van Hise and Dick Wells—on which to build his 1953 team.

This group of veterans plus a promising crop of freshmen could make the Seminoles hard to catch once they get started this year.
