DR. HOWARD DANFORD

Director of Athletics

Dr. Howard Danford heads up the athletic program at Florida State University as director of athletics and director of physical education for men. Danford came to FSU in the fall of 1947 from Madison, Wis., where

he had served seven years as director of health, physical education, recreation, and safety for the Madison public school system.

Under his guidance, the FSU department of physical education has been expanded greatly both from a standpoint of curriculum and personnel.

Dr. Danford guides the overall athletic program, which includes intercollegiate competition in nine sports (football, basketball, gymnastics, swimming, track, volleyball, tennis, golf, and baseball), and the nationally famous FSU student circus, "Flying High."

Dr. Danford received his bachelor's degree from Ohio University and later was awarded his masters and doctorate degree at NYU in 1943.

Author of numerous magazine articles, Dr. Danford has held positions of prominence in national organizations. He is current president of the College Recreation Association and regional representative of Region VI of the United States Volleyball Association. He is past president of the Florida Recreation Association and is chairman of the public relations committee of the Florida Health, Physical Education, and Recreation Association.

SPORTS PUBLICITY DIRECTOR BENNETT LAND, 27, is a graduate of Florida State University with a major in journalism. While a student he served as sports editor of the semi-weekly school newspaper, The Florida Flambeau, and contributed to other student publications. His professional background includes service with the Arkansas Economic Council-State Chamber of Commerce in public relations work; a year-and-a-half as a sports writer for the Arkansas Democrat in Little Rock, and work with the Little Rock Junior College as part-time sports publicity director. He began work with FSU in July, 1952.

STUDENT ASSISTANT PAT HOGAN, 21, is a senior at Florida State University majoring in journalism. Hogan is a former all-state basketball player at Little Rock (Ark.) High. He formerly attended Little Rock Junior College. His professional background includes three years as a sports writer for the Arkansas Gazette, oldest daily newspaper west of the Mississippi.

STUDENT ASSISTANT TOMMY SANDS, 20, is a junior at Florida State University majoring in journalism. He is from Tallahassee, graduated from Leon High and played football there. Sands is a former sports editor of the school newspaper, The Florida Flambeau. His professional background includes service as a sports writer for the Tallahassee Democrat.

BASKETBALL

J. K. "BUD" KENNEDY

Head Basketball Coach

(Five Years-Won 61, Lost 62)

Head Coach J. K. "Bud" Kennedy begins his sixth season as director of Florida State University's budding basketball program.

The Seminoles' genial, hardworking head man of the hardwood opens the 1953-54 campaign facing the most formidible string of opponents in the short, seven-year history of basketball at Florida State.

Kennedy's five previous teams at FSU have won 61 of their 123 games—just a fraction below 50 per cent—with many of the South's most prominent round-ball powers.

Bud was born in a natural bas-

ketball setting, at Lawrence, Kan-sas, right in the heart of the cage country. He attended college at the University of Kansas, Baker University and Kansas State Teachers College, playing basketball at all three institutions. He also was an outstanding football player at Baker and Kansas State Teachers.

Kennedy got his first coaching experience before finishing college. After a successful first year at Baker, he was called to San Diego, California, where he was playing coach of the San Diego Athletic Club for two

Bud's next coaching job was at Warrensburg, Mo., High School, where he directed basketball, baseball and track with marked success for two years after he was graduated from Kansas State Teachers. Kennedy's Warrensburg basketball teams went to the Missouri state tournament each year, and advanced as far as the semi-finals the second season.

From Warrensburg Kennedy went to Kansas City, where he supervised physical education in the elementary schools, and at Westport High School. After six years with the Kansas City School System, Bud was appointed Assistant Director of Recreation for the city of Madison, Wis. He stayed at this job for three years; then went into the Navy for the next three.

While in the Navy, Kennedy got back to coaching basketball. He tutored teams at the Naval Training Station at Purdue and while overseas at Tubabo, Philippine Islands.

Kennedy came to Florida State as Athletic Business Manager in 1948, assisted in the basketball program that year, and took over as head cage coach the following year.

Bud's best team at Florida State was the 1950-51 squad, which won 18 games and lost only nine. That same team won the District 25 NAIB tournament, bringing Florida State its first basketball championship, and went to the quarter-finals of the National NAIB tournament at Kansas City before being eliminated by Millikan, the tournament runner-up.

Coach Kennedy is married—his wife's name is Laura -and they have two sons, Hugh and Bob, and one granddaughter, Sharon.

ASSISTANT COACH MIKE LONG

Mike Long joins the FSU football and basketball coaching staffs this fall after 10 seasons in Florida's high school ranks.

Long assisted with football until November 1, coaching the FSU football B squad to three wins in four

starts before switching to basketball.

A graduate of the University of Minnesota (1937), Long was a standout track and field performer there. He won the Regional Olympic pole vault tryout title in 1936.

For the last seven years, Long was head basketball and assistant football coach at Ft. Myers (Fla.) High. Previously, he had coached three years at Sarasota (Fla.) High.

Mike is married—his wife's name is Louise. They have four sons—Steve, 14; Terry, 12; Curtis, 10; and

Jim, 5.

ASSISTANT COACH LEE BENJAMIN

Lee Benjamin joins his former coach in taking over the freshman portion of the basketball teaching duties at FSU this season.

Lee was one of the Seminoles' greatest all-time cage performers, playing under Head Coach Bud Kennedy

in 1948-49.

An excellent dribbler and exceptionally fast when he cavorted in a Seminole uniform, Lee's all-star play in 1948 earned him a spot on the All-Dixie Conference dream team and a berth on Florida's All-Collegiate group.

A native of Miami, Lee coached basketball and baseball the past two seasons at Boston (Ga.) High School. His Boston basketball teams won 34 of 42 games and his baseball nine had a 15-5 mark over two campaigns.

Lee is married—his wife's name is Felice. They have two daughters—Terry Lynn, 2, and Debra Anne, 6 months.

SEMI-NALITIES

Rick Benson . . . Maitland, Fla. (Winter Park High) . . . Junior center . . . 6-7, 215 pounds . . . A two-year letterman, Rick may be the most improved Seminole this season, after finishing the 1952-53 campaign as the team's fifth best scorer, with 130 points in 21 games. Benson has terrific spring, great potential rebound strength, and can lay the ball in going over the rim with his right hand. A dangerous scoring threat on a hot night, Rick is rapidly picking up the feints and passwork of a top-notch pivotman, and is working to improve his dribbling skill. He could be a serious threat with the soft hook shots he has developed.

Tom Burst . . . Batesville, Ind. . . . Junior guard . . . 6-0, 175 pounds . . . After earning his first letter last year, Burst is back to try to better his mark of being the team's eighth leading scorer in '52-53. A rugged defensive player, Tom got his "primary" basketball education in the same local—Batesville, Ind.—as did teammate Ham Wernke. Burst has an accurate one-hand push shot but needs more experience in tight situations.

Duane Gordon . . . Madison, Wis. (West High) . . . Senior forward . . . 6-4, 195 pounds . . . One of only two seniors on the squad, Gordon is shooting for his third FSU letter after transferring from the University of Wisconsin as a sophomore. Willowy Duane averaged 7.5 points per game last season, bucketing 164 points for the squad's fourth best effort. A better-than-average rebounder, Gordon is an ambidextrous shooter who scores on the run and with sets. His tip-in ability adds strength to the Seminole inside game.

Jimmy Oler . . . Economy, Ind. . . . Sophomore guard . . . 5-11, 180 pounds . . . One of FSU's most pleasant freshmen finds in 1952, Oler served notice of bigger things ahead by nialing down a starting position in his first year of college basketball. A deadly free-throw shooter (90 of 118 last season), Jimmy averaged almost 10 points in each of 20 games to wind up as the squad's No. 3 scorer a year ago. An excellent floor general who is the team's top feeder and passer, Oler is extremely fast and deceptive. He makes most of his baskets on driving layups, but can ring the bell from the outside, too.

Ham Wernke . . . Batesville, Ind. . . . Junior guard . . . 6-0, 168 pounds . . . Florida's leading intercollegiate point-producer last season, Wernke compiled a somewhat phenomenal sophomore record. The small (for college basketball) all-round star tossed in 468 points for a 21.3 average in 22 games last winter. Possessing quick reflexes and a "natural" eye for the basket, Ham also has the unusual knack of being able to spot opposing teams' defensive weaknesses. A serious, hard-working student of the game, Ham could have another great season in 1953-54, one which could make his candidacy for All-America laurels a reality.

Jerry Westhafer . . . Greensburg, Ind. . . . Junior forward . . . 6-4, 180 pounds . . . A lanky but agile front-line performer, Westhafer teamed with Wernke to average 35 points per game last year, one of the most prolific one-two punches in the Southeast. Jerry is a talented outside shooter who has an eagle eye to guide his one-hand set shots from the keyhole and corners. Accounting for 306 Seminole points last season, Westhafer is also one of the club's top rebounders. He gets most of his recoveries when the Seminoles need the ball the worst way. Westhafer, like Benson, Gordon and Wernke, is after his third letter.

Gary Wold . . . Madison, Wis. (East High) . . . Sophomore center . . . 6-6, 210 pounds . . . Still growing although he is six-and-a-half feet tall, Wold was highly impressive as a freshman last year. Playing in 15 games, Gary compiled the team's best percentage on field goal attempts (47%), hitting 28 of 60 shots and averaging an even half-dozen points per game. He's improving with time, but needs plenty of experience in the definsive department. Not too quick but difficult to guard, Wold's best shot is left or right-handed hooks from the side.

GYMNASTICS

DR. HARTLEY PRICE, Coach

Recognized as one of the most competent coaches in the history of gymnastics in the United States, Dr. Hartley Price begins his fifth year as coach of the nationally-famous Florida State

University gymnastics team.

Competing with the best gymnastics talent in the land, Dr. Price has led FSU gymnasts to four national team titles in three seasons, the NCAA and NAAU crowns in 1951 and repeating as NCAA team champion in 1952, after being edged out of a second straight AAU title. Last year FSU won the NAAU Championship.

In addition, Dr. Price is credited with developing FSU's Olympic stars Bill Roetzheim and Don Holder, who represented the United States at Helsinki, Finland in 1952.

However, national champion-

ships are not exactly new to the Seminole coach. As gymnastics coach at the University of Illinois, his teams won four NCAA titles and twice copped the national AAU bunting.

Born in Brisbane, Australia, Dr. Price was a standout athlete in "The Land Down Under" before coming to the United States. In Australia he won a number of gymnastics titles.

After coming to America in the early '20's, Dr. Price entered Springfield College in Massachusetts where he was a member of the gymnastics team. He was graduated from Springfield with a BS in physical education in 1928.

He later studied at the University of Illinois where he received his BS in education in 1929 and his MS in education in 1931.

It was in the mid-thirties that Price commenced producing championship gymnastics teams at Illinois. During World War II, Dr. Price served as head of gymnastics and tumbling at the Navy's Pre-Flight school in Iowa and later at St. Mary's Pre-Flight school. He served as coordinator of gymnastics for the Naval aviation program and authored the Navy's "Tumbling and Gymnastics Guide." He has written numerous magazine articles.

After discharge from the service, Dr. Price entered New York University where he completed work on his doctor's degree in 1945.

In 1949 Price was awarded the research award from the American Academy of Physical Education and in 1950 was listed in the monthly supplement of "Who's Who in America."

A firm believer in permitting his gymnasts to work out their own problems, Coach Price is a stickler for insisting on hard work and strives to build within his competitors a keen desire to excel.

The 1953-54 Outlook

The national AAU championship Florida State University gymnastics team, coached by Dr. Price, will enter the 1953-54 season hoping to retain its 1953 AAU title and hoping to regain the NCAA title it held in 1951 and 1952. The '53 FSU team placed fifth in the NCAA, came back strong several weeks later to win the national AAU crown.

And this season, Price can call upon 14 experienced lettermen. However, three—twin brothers Carmine and Joe Regna and Dick Gutting, will be eligible only for AAU competition.

Heading the rest of the returning aggregation are Co-captains Don Holder, U. S. Olympic team member in 1952, and Pat Signorelli, Jack Miles, Ben Wallace, Larry Weston, Dick Ireland, Al Ruda, Bill Koslow, Jim

Fadigan, Jim Tanaka, and Joe Taylor.

There are four newcomers to the 1954 squad—Rafaeal Lecouna from Cuba, Tom McDonald, Lauren Young and Eugene Brockenbrough. However, Lecouna looms most likely to make himself heard from. He captained the Cuban Olympic team in both 1948 and 1952 and has won numerous South American titles. A transfer, he will be ineligible for collegiate competition.

These gymnasts form the backbone of the university's outstanding "Gymkana" production, a show described by its originator, Dr. Price, as "gymnastics plus

showmanship."

The "Gymkana" troupe is available for performances throughout the South and in 1952-53 performed before more than 100,000 spectators. Civic clubs, chambers of commerce, sponsoring groups interested in bringing the FSU Gymkana Troupe into their towns are requested to write Dr. Price.

The "Gymkana" home showing was staged in Tallahassee from Nov. 30 to Dec. 5. The show was all new this year and featured university gymnasts, beautiful FSU coeds, and the increasingly popular "Tallahassee Tumbling Tots," a group of young gymnastic enthusiasts being groomed for future competition in the gymnastics field.

The FSU gymnasts and the "Gymkana" production

have been filmed several times.

SWIMMING

N. B. "BIM" STULTS, Coach

Since swimming first made its appearance on the Florida State University campus five short years ago, Coach N. B. "Bim" Stults' teams have compiled an

enviable record of 29 wins, 11 losses and a tie. In the past four years Stults' tankmen have only lost four dual meets.

Coach Stults came to Florida State in January of 1948. The following year, despite a green squad, Stults guided the Seminole tankmen to a 6-3 record in their first full season of activity.

In 1950 the Tribe hit its stride, winning seven dual meets while losing only two. In 1951 "Bim" directed his charges to their finest season ever. That year they were undefeated in seven dual encounters,

tied for the Southeastern A.A.U. crown and won the Florida A.A.U. title.

In addition, FSU was rated the best college swimming team in the Deep South.

Then in 1952, swimming their toughest schedule in history, the Seminoles copped five dual meets, lost two and tied one. They were runners-up in the Florida A.A.U. meet.

And last season the Indians' 7-1 record was again best in the South. A 45-39 loss to Georgia was the only blur on an otherwise clean slate and that was avenged later in the season. In addition, the Seminoles tied for seventh place in the National A.A.U. meet, were second in the Southern Regional A.A.U. and runners-up in the Florida A.A.U.

Coach Stults graduated from Washington & Lee in 1930 with an AB degree Bachelor of Arts. After graduation he went directly to Ross High School in Fremont, Ohio, as head swimming coach, where he won the Ohio State championship five times and was runner-up twice. His Ross tankmen also finished third in the national tank meet four times.

In 1939 he served as assistant swimming coach at Ohio State University. After serving in the Navy from 1942 through 1946 with the rank of Lt. Commander, "Bim" returned to Ohio State and remained there until coming to Florida State.

Coach Stults is married, his wife's name is Jeanne, and they have no children.

One of Stults' outstanding accomplishments was the development of Roger Slater, ace diver of the 1950-51 teams, who was named to the All-America Collegiate Swimming team those years.

Now, starting his sixth term as head swimming mentor, Stults will have seven lettermen—Steve Bailey, George Cooper, Larry Beaty, Charles Crowe, Richard Rhoton, Ernie Stock and Bob Stuke—on which to build his 1953 team.

Despite the fact that graduation and the service have cut deeply into his roster, prospects for 1954 appear bright. A promising crop of freshmen plus several holdovers from last year's squad will again make Florida State's tankmen a team to watch.
