## DR. HOWARD G. DANFORD

## Director of Athletics

Dr. Howard G. Danford heads Florida State University's vast and rapidly-rising athletic and physical education program. He has served as director of athletics and physical education since 1947.

Prior to his arrival at Florida State, Danford served for seven years as director of health, physical education, and safety in the Madison, Wisc., public school system.

Since coming to Florida State, Danford has seen football rise from a pick-up sport in 1947 to major college status, as well as guiding all other phases of the FSU athletic program, which includes nine varsity sports, a complete physical education and recreation curriculum, and the nationally famous Florida State University Circus, "Flying High," and the equally famous "Gymkana."

Another big step in the overall physical education program was taken only this year when the new men's gymnasium was completed. This million dollar structure houses the entire men's physical education plant.

A graduate of Ohio University, Dr. Danford received his master's and doctorate degrees from New York University in 1943.

Dr. Danford is a well-known author, his most recent work being the book "Recreation in the American Community", published in 1953. He has also authored numerous magazine articles and has held prominent positions in several national organizations.

The ambitious FSU athletic director is presently a member of the Executive Committee of the United States Volleyball Association; chairman of the Curriculum Research Committee of the College Physical Education Association; chairman of the Policies Committee of the Federation of National Professional Organization for Recreation; and chairman of the Florida AAU Volleyball Committee.

One of America's volleyball pioneers, Dr. Danford made an extensive six weeks tour of Germany and France in 1955 and 1956; serving as an instructor for the U. S. Army's Volleyball clinics. Danford made the trip at the request of the Commander in Chief of United States Army, Europe.

Under Dr. Danford's guidance and direction, Florida State's excellent program of intercollegiate athletics has grown in size and stature, and is now becoming recognized as one of the finest in the nation.

Danford's enthusiastic interest in the whole program of intercollegiate athletics at Florida State has resulted in phenomenal achievements made by all Seminole athletic squads in the nine short years Florida State has been engaging in inter-collegiate sport.

## BASKETBALL

J. K. (Bud) Kennedy, Coach

This is the year Florida State University becomes known as a 'big-time' basketball power. And it's made the rapid climb in just nine years with Bud Kennedy directing Seminole fortunes.



The Basketball Seminoles will be playing a big-time schedule this year. Such names as West Virginia, Bradley, Texas A&M, Duquesne and N. C. State decorate the FSU slate. This is the season, too, the Seminoles tangle with Florida's Gators at Gainesville.

Also making it a season with that "something extra", the Seminoles will be dedicating their new 4,000capacity gymnasium December 13

against Texas A&M.

Kennedy's 1955-56 Tribe cage outfit recorded a fine 16-9 mark while winning its second successive Florida Intercollegiate Basketball

J. K. (Bud) Kennedy Conference title.

But, even though this is the big year for FSU basketball, the aura of a question mark hung ominously over the campus as the cagers began preparation for the campaign. Material-

wise, they'll be an almost complete new outfit.

Gone are stars Jimmy Oler, who re-wrote all the FSU scoring records last season, and Dick Artmier, a fiery forward who had a way of making the FSU offense go. Gone, too, is Gary Wold, a 6'7" center-forward, who meant a lot to the

Seminoles on the backboards.

It could be a long season—but Kennedy's always been full

of surprises in the past.

Bud was born in a natural basketball setting, at Lawrence, Kans., right in the heart of the cage country. He attended college at the University of Kansas, Baker University and Kansas State Teachers College. He played basketball at all three schools and was an outstanding football player at Baker and Kansas State Teachers.

The jovial mentor got his first coaching experience before finishing college. After a successful first year at Baker, he was called to San Diego, Calif., where he was playing coach of the San Diego Athletic Club for two years.

Through his next few years, he coached various high school teams with marked success throughout the midwest.

He also coached while serving as a Naval Officer.

Kennedy came to Florida State as Athletic Business Manager in 1948, assisted in the basketball program that year, and took over as head coach the following season.

ASSISTANT COACH MIKE LONG

Mike Long, a personable fellow who is also head track coach, begins his fourth year as assistant FSU basketball coach. Mike joined the Seminole staff three years ago after ten seasons in the Florida high school circles.

A graduate of the University of Minnesota in 1937, Long was a standout track and field performer there. He won the

regional olympic pole vault tryout title in 1936.

He was for seven years head basketball coach and assistant football coach at Ft. Myers, (Fla.) High School. Previously, he coached at Sarasota (Fla.) High School. FRESHMAN COACH JIMMY OLER

Jim Oler, FSU's new freshman coach, should provide this year's freshmen Seminoles with plenty of inspiration along basketball lines.

He's been labeled by many as the greatest cager to ever wear FSU's Garnet and Gold. And with plenty of reason.

He holds the school's scoring records in just about every department. They include a career total of 1,820 points; a single season total of 743 points and he averaged 29.7 points per game in his final season, 1956.

Jim is married and 22 years old.

## GYMNASTICS HARTLEY PRICE, Coach

Beyond a doubt, one of the most competent coaches in the histroy of Gymnastics in the United States, Dr. Hartley Price begins his eighth year as coach of the nationallyknown Florida State University gymnastics team.

Competing with the best gymnastics talent in the land, Dr. Price led FSU gymnasts to five national titles in as many years. His teams swept the NCAA and NAAU in 1951, repeated as the NCAA team champion in 1952 after being edged out of a second successive AAU title. In 1954 FSU won the AAU title and again in 1955.

In addition, Dr. Price is credited with developing FSU's Olympic stars Bill Roetzheim, Don Holder, Jack Miles and Rafael Lecuona.

National championships are not exactly new to the Seminole coach. As gymnastics coach at the University of Illinois in the 1930's, his

teams won four NCAA titles and twice walked off with the NAAU championships.

Born in Brisbane, Australia, Dr. Price was a standout athlete in the land down under before coming to the United States. There, he won a number of gymnastics titles.

After coming to the U.S. in the early '20s, he entered Springfield College in Massachusetts where he was a member of the gym team. He graduated from Springfield with a BS in physical education in 1928.

He later studied at the University of Illinois where he received his BS in education in 1929 and his MS in education in 1931. He received his PhD at N.Y.U. in 1945.

During 1945, Price served as head of gymnastics and tumbling at the Navy's pre-flight school in Iowa and later at St. Mary's (Calif.) in the same capacity. In addition, he served as coordinator for the Navy's aviation gymnastics program and authored the Navy's official tumbling and gymnastics guide.

In 1949, Price was the recipient of a research award from the American Academy of Physical Education and in 1950 was listed in the monthly supplement of Who's Who in America.

Besides heading the competitive side of the gymnastics program at FSU, Dr. Price also directs the nationally-famous student Gymkana production which has become a soughtafter show throughout the southeast.

Price has as his objective to keep FSU among the top ten gymnastics teams in the nation. But since 1951, his Seminole outfits have never been out of the top five.

Jack Miles, Philadelphia, Pa. A graduate student, he's been one of the Seminoles' best for a long time. He's about 5'6", 135 pounds, married. At the time of this writing was vieing for a spot on the U. S. Olympic team for the World Olympics at Melbourne, Australa . . . was a member of the U. S. Pan American team in 1956 . . . specialty is flying rings. Excells on long horse . . . won NAAU rings title in 1951 . . . tied for national all-around last year. He'll be a tough one to lose.

Don Holder, Jersey City, N. J. One of the greatest gymnasts in U. S. History . . . member of the U. S. Olympic team in 1952, Pan American team in 1956. Was a freshman at the time he made the World Olympic team . . . second man to ever merit that honor. Was the National AAU Clubs Champion in 1953 . . . Southern All-Around champion. One of the Seminoles' greatest point-makers ever. He's married.

Jamile Ashmore, Dallas, Texas. Little as Texans go, but that don't make no never mind . . . at 5'4", 120 pounds, he's one of the greatest gymnastics' products ever to come out of the Lone Star state. Won a national title in 1956 . . . was the NCAA Calisthenics Champ. Even greater things are expected of him this year . . . tumbling is his specialty, loves to teach it to others. 

### SWIMMING

#### N. B. (BIM) STULTS, Coach

Swimming has only been a part of the Florida State University collegiate athletic program since 1949, but in that short period of time it has developed into one of the University's most consistent winners under the capable tutalege of Bim Stults.



Stults.

In eight seasons, Stults' teams have compiled an enviable record of 53 wins, 13 defeats and a single tie in dual competition which ranks them among the South's best.

The mermen mentor has directed the Seminoles through three unbeaten seasons during that span—1951, 1954, and 1955—and only five dual losses since 1950. At one point his teams carried a 25 meet winning streak over a three-year period.

Among Stults' outstanding achievements at Florida State has been the development of

All-Americans Roger Slater and Ernie Stock. Stock was an all-around ace, specializing in the breast stroke. Slater won his laurels as a diver.

The Stults era at FSU has also produced some noteworthy team championships. The Seminoles captured the Florida AAU crown in 1951 and last year and have been runners-up twice—1952 and 1953. In 1951, the Tribe tied for the Southeastern AAU championship and was second in the Southern Regional AAU. FSU tied for seventh in the National AAU meet that same year.

Stults graduated from Washington & Lee in 1930 with an AB degree. After graduating, he went directly to Ross High School in Fremont, Ohio, as head swimming coach, where he won the Ohio state championship five times and was runner-up twice. His Ross tankmen also finished third in national competition four times.

In 1939 he served as assistant swimming coach at Ohio State University. After serving in the Navy from 1942 through 1946 as a Lt. Cmdr., he returned to Ohio State until he came to Florida State in 1948.

#### AL KING, Assistant Coach

Coach Bim Stults reached way back up into his home state to pull down the man who serves as his assistant coach this year. And to make it even more paradoxical, Alford S. King is a former student of the mermen mentor.

King was on Bim's state champion high school swimming team at Fremont High School in Fremont, Ohio. Upon graduation, he followed Stults to Ohio State University where he won three letters in the water sport.

A breaststroke artist, King swam on Central Collegiate and Mid-American Conference champion teams while in college. He found time in the summers to play semi-pro baseball.

Al came to FSU this year after three years in the Navy. He is doing graduate work in addition to his coaching efforts.

A graduate of Springfield College, Odeneal received both his B.S. and Masters' Degree from that institution. During

his undergraduate days, he lettered in track and football as well as being a member of the Volleyball Club. The Volleyball aggregation copped the New England Intercollege crown.

Odeneal was also a member of the Golf Club and was winner of the annual Senior-Alumni golf trophy. Besides his athletic activities, he was president of the junior class, member of Alpha Phi Omega, National Scouting Fraternity, and Sigma Delta Psi, honorary athletic fraternity.

Since coming to FSU, Odeneal's teams have won the Florida AAU

Volleyball title six times, and were runner-up another time. In 1951 his squad won the Mid-South Open Volleyball Tournament, a feat which had never been accomplished by any college team in the sport's history.

Nationally, FSU had placed fifth, fourth twice, and third once in four years previous to 1955 when the Seminoles grabbed the NCAA title. Last year they placed third behind UCLA and Stanford.

Coach Odeneal teaches golf in the service program as well as being an ardent golfer. He is author of many Volleyball articles appearing in various national publications and holds positions in the United States Volleyball Association.
