

TOM NUGENT

Athletic Director and Head Football Coach

The guiding hand behind Florida State University's eight inercollegiate sports is Thomas Norman Nugent, whose football team has just concluded one of its most successful seasons in State's short 11-year history.



Energetic could well describe the new Athletic Director, who believes in doing things first class. It's been that way with Tom Nugent since, at age 15, he wrote he would be a head college football coach some day. That day arrived when he assumed command of VMI's football fortunes. It was in 1949, and within three years after Nugent joined the obscure VMI Keydets, he had won a Southern Conference championship and pulled an upset over mighty Georgia Tech,

Searching for THE personality to put the Seminoles on the

football map, Florida State officials in 1953 looked no farther than Tom Nugent. In two years, the Seminoles for the first time attained "major college" status.

Thanks to Nugent's magnetic touch, football at Florida State has grown from a pickup sport in 1947 to a 1958 position that found the Seminoles playing such tradition-steeped opponents as Georgia Tech., Georgia, Tennessee, Florida, and Miami (Fla.).

Nugent is a tireless worker whose enthusiastic interest in the entire program of intercollegiate athletics at Florida State resulted in his appointment as Director of Athletics last May. As this past season can attest Nugent has made great strides with Florida State football.

He's also become nationally known for his bright innovations. It was Nugent who presented to football the typewriter huddle, the double quarterback and the "I" formation used so effectively by his own Seminoles. Florida State's annual June coaching clinic, which he fathered five years ago, is probably football's finest.

A native of Lawrence, Mass., the 45-year-old coach was graduated from Ithaca College in 1936. One of football's most colorful coaches, Tom is a member of the Public Relations and Press Committee and Film Selections Committee of the American Football Coaches Association.

Nugent and his lovely wife (nee Peg Foley) have five boys—Tommy, 15; T. D., 10; Timmy, 4; Jerry, 2, and John Michael, 3 months—and four girls—Kerry, 14; Peggy, 12; Patty, 8, and Mary Ann, 3.

BASKETBALL

J. K. Kennedy, Coach

Once again Florida State's basketball team has its work cut out as Coach Bud Kennedy has lined up another formidable schedule comprised of many of the best the South can offer.



Although FSU won only nine of 25 games last year, the prospect of a better-balanced team and added bench strength, a weakness for several seasons, makes it very possible that the Seminole fortunes will change this year.

The 1958-59 version of the Seminoles will be a tall and fast lineup dotted with seniors, juniors and sophomores.

Added to the varsity from the junior college ranks are Don Bates, a 5-10 guard with plenty

of backcourt savey along with a good outside shot and John Richter, at 6-5 will add plenty

of rebounding strength. Charlie Tinsley and Bill Archer, both at 6-5 will move up to the varsity this season after impressive showings as freshmen. Tinsley could very possibly

gain a starting position.

Back for his final year is All-Stater Hugh Durham, of Louisville. The 5-11 guard slipped slightly last year from his sensational sophomore season, but was still good enough to finish with a better than 15-point average per game.

Florida State opens their season on December 1 against NCAA champion Kentucky at Lexington. Other road foes include Wake Forest, Auburn. Memphis State and Murray, (Ky.).

At home the Seminoles will host such teams as Furman, Florida, Louisiana State, Memphis State, Loyola of New Orleans and Oklahoma City.

Kennedy, who has been the guiding hand behind FSU basketball the past 10 years, was born at Lawrence, Kansas-a natural basketball setting.

He attended the University of Kansas, Baker University and Kansas State Teachers College, playing basketball at all three schools and was an outstanding football performer at Baker and Kansas State.

His first coaching experience before leaving college at San Diego, Calif., where he was playing coach of the San Diego Athletic Club for two years.

Through his next few years, Kennedy coached at various high schools with marked success throughout the midwest. He also coached while serving as a Naval Officer.

Kennedy came to Florida State in 1948 as Athletic Business Manager, assisted in the basketball program that year, and took over as head coach the following season.

TOM GARCIA-Coach, Freshman Team

Tom Garcia takes over the coaching assignment of the freshman basketball team this year following four years of playing varsity basketball and baseball at FSU.

While playing under basketball coach Bud Kennedy, Garcia was known for his scrap and desire, and was considered one of the best defensive men on the squad.

In addition, Garcia will also assist Kennedy in

coaching the varsity team.

Garcia served four years in the Air Force and is currently working towards a Master's degree.

Hugh Durham, guard . . . senior from Louisville, Ky. . . . all around solid performer on both offense and defense . . . fancy dribbler and excellent ball handler . . . has a dead eye . . . holds individual game scoring mark with 43 points . . . he'll be playmaker for the team the third straight year . . . was team's second highest scorer last year with 15.3 average . . . had 19.6 average as sophomore.

Dan Boltz, center . . . 6-6 senior from Quincy, Ill. . . . big at 235 pounds, he's the team's top rebounder . . . looks for good year . . . should be starting center . . . scored 154 points last year.

Jim Liteky, guard . . . senior from Jacksonville . . . has terrific speed and is tireless on floor . . . standing 6-1, he's a tough rebounder . . . pulled down 120 last year . . . was third highest scorer on team with 268 points . . . top man during early part of season, he should repeat as starter this year.

Donnie Bates, guard . . . junior from Jasper, Indiana . . . played his first two years of college ball at Vanderbilt . . . a clever ball handler . . . has a good driving layup . . . has good chance to break into starting lineup as playmaker alongside Durham.

John Richter, center-forward. 6-5, 215-pound junior from Gloversville, N. Y. . . . Has potential to become one of team's best . . . played at Paul Smith's Junior College in New York last year . . . was third highest scorer in junior college ranks with 28.6 average . . . received all-conference honors at center.

Jim Savage, forward. Junior from Ft. Lauderdale letterman back from last year . . . played in every game . . . seventh in individual scoring with 65 points . . . relies mostly on one-hand jump shot.

Joe Williams, 5-10 guard . . . from Tallahassee . . . senior, used sparingly in previous years . . . good ball-handler and passer . . . should see more action this season.

Charlie Tinsley, 6-5 forward from Miami . . . one of the top sophomore prospects . . . leading frosh scorer from last year's team . . . tough on the boards . . . dark horse for a starting berth.

Bill Archer, 6-5 sophomore from Melbourne . . . one of four frosh to make varsity team . . . lots of drive and hustle . . . gives team added reserve strength.

Fred Woodward, guard, senior from Ft. Lauderdale . . . played in only two games last year . . . good outside shot man. Stands an even 6' . . . has good speed.

Miles will assume the duties of directing the Seminole gymnastic fortunes in the absence of Dr. Hartley Price, who in his nine years at the reigns of the team led FSU to numerous titles and championships. Price is in India on a Fullbright Scholarship.

Jack made his debut in Tallahassee in 1951 an auspicious one, winning the NAAU Flying Rings championship and earning a berth on the All-American AAU Team. He repeated this latter honor in 1955 and also added the NAAU Still Rings

title to his list of gymnastic achievements.

One of the most outstanding gymnasts in Florida State history, Jack has been a member of two Olympic teams. In '55 he was named to the Pan-American Olympic Team and in '56 to the U. S. Olympic squad.

Miles will find himself in a double role this year. Not only will he direct the gymnastic team in all its activities but he will help produce Gymkana, annual show featuring gymnastic skits and stunts.

Jack graduated from FSU in 1954 with a BS in marketing. Presently, he is in the Graduate School specializing in Physical Education.

Besides physical education, Miles has had experience in various other fields. He has worked as a statistician, insurance investigator, retail salesman and buyer, audio visual technician, draftsman, and illustrator. This year, however, all of Jack's efforts will be channeled toward the gymnastics team and classes.

The present holder of 18 individual gymnastic titles in this region, Miles' objective is to keep Florida State among the top gymnastic teams in the nation.

Jack is married to the former Bess A. Rogers of Greenwood, Florida and they have two sons, David, 7, and Michael, 2.

SWIMMING

N. B. (BIM) STULTS, Coach

Florida State's swimming team opens its 10th year under the leadership of Coach Bim Stults with an impressive total of 72 victories, 17 losses, and two ties in dual meet competition during Stults' nine-year reign.

This record marks the FSU tankers as one of the outstanding college teams in the South. Last year the Seminoles won 10 of 12 meets, including a 45-41 win over arch rival Florida. FSU also tied the Gators earlier in the year. They suffered their only defeat to Southern Methodist.

Stults has guided the Seminoles through three unbeaten seasons—1951, 1954 and 1955—and only nine dual losses since 1950. At one point, his teams carried a 25-meet winning streak that spread over a three-year period.

Among Stults' outstanding achievements at Florida State has been the development of All-Americans Roger Slater and Ernie Stock. Stock was an allaround ace, specializing in the breaststroke. Slater won his laurels as a diver.

The Stults' era at FSU has also produced some noteworthy team championships. The Seminoles have won the Florida AAU the last three years and the Georgia AAU the past two seasons. In 1951, the Tribe tied for the Southeastern AAU championship and was second in the Southern Regional AAU. FSU tied for seventh in the National AAU meet that same year.

Stults graduated from Washington & Lee in 1930 with an AB degree. After graduating, he went directly to Ross High School in Freemont, Ohio, as head swimming coach, where he won the Ohio state championship five times and was runner-up twice. His Ross tankmen finished third in national competition four times.

In 1939 he served as assistant swimming coach at Ohio State University. After serving in the Navy from 1942 through 1946 as a Lt. Comdr., he returned to Ohio State until he came to Florida State in 1948.

WALLY DOBLER, Asst. Swimming Coach A former two-time All-American at Michigan State, Wally Dobler, assumes the role of Bim Stults' assistant this year.

Dobler, who won All-Service honors and numerous trophies while swimming for the 82nd Airborne before going to MSU, was All-America as national champ in the 100 and 200 butterfly events both in '57 and '58.

Wally also won his specialities these years in the Big Ten Championships while leading the Spartans to victories. Michigan State was second in the nation in '57 and third in '58, when Dobler was the Spartans' co-captain.

The 21-year-old assistant coach is doing graduate work in vocational education in addition to his coaching duties.
