VAUGHN MANCHA

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Whenever Alabama disciples gather to talk football, the conversation invariably gets around to Vaughn Hall Mancha, a living symbol of the Crimson Tide's great teams of the mid-forties.

Mancha is practically as legendary in Alabama football circles as Pooley Hubert, Don Hutson, and Harry Gilmer. For Florida State University's personable new

director of athletics was a 240pound All-Southeastern Conference center at Alabama for four seasons (1944-47) and everyone's All-America center.

Mancha was a solid choice to return to Florida State as athletic director in November, ending a three-year absence from the FSU campus. He gained wide popularity with Florida State officials and fans while serving as line coach at FSU from 1952 through 1956. During that time, Mancha was credited with the recruitment of a number of players that led FSU to success.

Born in Sugarvalley, Ga., on Oct. 7, 1921, Mancha moved to Birmingham at an early age. After a successful high school career in Birmingham, Vaughn entered Alabama in 1944. He was issued jersey No. 41, a number that Alabama's football opponents tried to dodge for the next four years.

During Mancha's four seasons, Alabama rolled to 30 victories against only 9 defeats and 2 ties, and played in three major bowl games. Mancha was a starter and played most of the way when the Crimson Tide met Duke in the 1945 Sugar Bowl, Southern Cal in the 1946 Rose Bowl, and Texas in the 1948 Sugar Bowl.

He was such a standout in the '45 Sugar Bowl—on one sparkling play he threw Duke's great George Clark for an 18-yard loss—that he was named to the All-Time Sugar Bowl Team (1945-52 period). In 1955, Mancha was named as a member of Alabama's All-Time Crimson Tide.

Mancha earned a BS Degree in Education at Alabama in 1947 and played one season of professional football with the old Boston Yankees in 1948. In 1949, he returned to Alabama to earn a Masters Degree in Education.

Turning to the coaching field, Mancha put in a highly-successful three-year tenure as coach, head of the Department of Physical Education, and athletic director at Livingston (Ala.) State. His Livingston teams in three seasons compiled a 21-7 record that included a 1949 victory over Florida State (13-6) and spoiled an otherwise perfect season for the Seminoles.

Mancha first came to Florida State in 1952 as assistant football coach under Dr. Don Veller and as an instructor of Physical Education. From 1953-56 he was an assistant football coach and an assistant professor of Physical Education at FSU.

In 1957, Mancha went to Columbia University as an assistant football coach and associate member of the Department of Physical Education, positions he held for the past three years. While at Columbia, he completed all work for the Doctorate with the exception of the dissertation.

Married to the former Sybil Little of Birmingham, he is the father of three children: Clare, 10; Nan, 8, and Vaughn, Jr., 9 months.

BASKETBALL

J. K. (BUD) KENNEDY, Head Coach

Moving into his 12th year as head basketball coach at Florida State, Coach J. K. (Bud) Kennedy takes a squad comprised almost entirely of new faces against the toughest cage schedule in FSU history.

With only one starter returning from a squad which posted an 8-15 record, Kennedy must rely heavily on a

promising bunch of sophomores who turned in impressive performances as freshmen last year.

The only starter back is guard-forward Jim Savage. A 6-3 senior from Fort Lauderdale, Savage averaged 7.3 points a game last year.

Other returning veterans are center John Richter of Gloversville, N. Y., guard Fred Woodward of Fort Lauderdale, and center Bob Casteel of Fort Lauderdale.

Heading the list of sophomores who are expected to aid the varsity considerably is forward Dave Fedor. A fine shoot-

er and a good rebounder, the 6-6 Fedor played his high school basketball in Germany.

FSU will participate in the Gator Bowl tournament at Jacksonville against LSU, Georgia and Jacksonville University, Dec. 29-30.

Kennedy, who has been the guiding hand behind FSU basketball the past 11 years, was born at Lawrence, Kansas—a natural basketball setting.

He attended the University of Kansas, Baker University and Kansas State Teachers College, playing basketball at all three schools, and was an outstanding football performer at Baker and Kansas State.

His first coaching experience before leaving college was at San Diego, Calif., where he was playing coach of the San Diego Athletic Club for two years.

Through his next few years, Kennedy coached various high schools with marked success throughout the midwest. He also coached while serving as a Naval Officer.

Kennedy came to Florida State in 1948 as Athletic Business Manager, assisted in the basketball program that year, and took over as head coach the following season.

JOHN POWLESS, Assistant Coach

In his first year as assistant basketball coach is John Powless, who also serves as FSU's head tennis coach.

A 1957 graduate of Murray (Ky.) State College, Powless was a varsity regular for four years and finished one season as the nation's No. 2 free-throw shooter.

In addition to his basketball honors, Powless was selected to the NCAA's 1957 tennis All-America team.

HUGH DURHAM, Freshman Coach

Hugh Durham, one of the finest basketball players in FSU history, takes over as head freshman coach this season.

An All-Florida choice for three years, Durham averaged a shade under 19 points a game during his three-year stay and holds the single-game record of 43 points.

A native of Louisville, Ky., Hugh is married to the former Malinda Dixon.

- 23—RUFUS ASHWORTH. Sophomore forward, 19, 6-3, 175, Coral Gables. An All-City forward while performing for Coral Gables High School, good shooting ability has helped Rufe nail down a starting position as a sophomore. Employing a one-hand push from long range, he was one of top scorers on 1958-59 freshman squad.
- 15—BOB CASTEEL. Senior center, 23, 6-5, 200, Fort Lauderdale. Back after a tour in the service, Cass was a 1957 letterman for the Seminoles. A three-sport (basketball, football, track) performer at Fort Lauderdale High, Casteel should give FSU valuable aid on boards in final season.
- 11—JACK DAVIS. Sophomore guard, 20, 5-11, 150, Hagerstown, Ind. A standout freshman year and fine pre-season performance this red-haired scrapper a good bet for a starting role. A top-flight ball-handler and feeder, Davis earned 9 letters in 4 sports at Hagerstown.
- 25—TIM EDNEY. Sophomore guard, 20, 6-0, 175, Montgomery, Ala. An Alabama prep all-stater in basketball and track, Edney is a fiery competitor who will be hard to keep out of starting five. A versatile athlete, Tim earned 8 letters in 4 sports at Montgomery's Sidney Lanier High.
- 43—DAVID FEDOR. Sophomore center, 19, 6-6, 185, Zephyrhills. A gifted pivot man who shoots a soft left-hand push shot, Dave is rated by Coach Bud Kennedy as fine possibility for All-America honors before he graduates. He earned 7 letters and was twice named to the All-Europe high school squad while playing at Frankfort, Germany.
- 13—JOHN RICHTER. Senior center, 21, 6-5, 215, Gloversville, N. Y. Rick came to FSU last year from Paul Smith's (N. Y.) Junior College and finished fast after a slow start. Appearing in 14 games, John earned letter and contributed a 5.2 scoring average. Will see plenty of action.
- 45—JIM SAVAGE. Senior forward-guard, 24, 6-3, 190, Fort Lauderdale. A two-year letterman, hustling Sav is lone returning starter from last season. Has nifty one-hand push shot, good speed, rebounding talent. Averaged 7.3 points in 23 games last season and is rough in clutch.
- 35—JERRY SMITH. Junior forward, 20, 6-4, 190, Chattahoochee. An All-Big Bend high school whiz at Greensboro High, Smith will be playing his first season with the Seminoles after a fine career at Chipola Junior College. Needs experience against tough opposition and he'll get it this season.
- 33—RAY SWAIN. Sophomore forward, 19, 6-4, 190, Jacksonville. A former all-state performer from Jacksonville's Landon High School, Ray has excellent potential and figures to become a starter in his first varsity year. A good shot from the corners, "Swish" could be crackerjack with experience.
- 41—FRED WOODWARD. Senior guard, 21, 6-0, 165, Fort Lauderdale. One of three Fort Lauderdale senior lettermen on squad, Fred will be called on for a lot of duty this season. A Tennessean by birth, Woodward has been a hard-luck player but could have finest year with confidence.

GYMNASTICS HARTLEY PRICE, Coach

Numbering among the most outstanding gymnastics coaches in the country, Dr. Hartley Price begins his 10th year as coach of Florida State's nationally-known team.

Dr. Price has led FSU to five national titles. His teams swept the NCAA and NAAU in 1951 and repeated as the NCAA team champion in 1952 after being

edged out of a second successive AAU title. In 1954, FSU won the AAU title and then repeated again in 1955.

In addition, Price is credited with developing FSU's Olympic stars, Bill Roetzheim, Don Holder, Jack Miles, and Rafael Lecuona.

He was elected to the Helms Athletic Foundation Gymnastics Hall of Fame at the Pan-American games in Chicago this year.

Dr. Price was a Fulbright Professor at Lakshmibai College of Physical Education at Gwalior, India, this past year.

FSU isn't the only school at which Price has won national

championships. As gymnastics coach at the University of Illinois in the 1930's, his teams won four NCAA championships and twice walked off with NAAU titles.

Born in Brisbane, Australia, Dr. Price was a standout athlete in the "land down under" before coming to the United States. There, he won a number of gymnastics titles.

After coming to the U.S. in the early '20's, he enttered Springfield College in Massachusetts where he was a member of the gym team. He graduated from Springfield with a BS in physical education in 1928.

He later studied at the University of Illinois where he received his BS in education in 1929 and his MS in education in 1931. He received his Ph.D. at NYU in 1945

During 1945, Price served as head of gymnastics and tumbling at the Navy's pre-flight school in Iowa and later at St. Mary's (Calif.) in the same capacity. In addition, he served as coordinator for the Navy's aviation gymnastics program and authored the Navy's official tumbling and gymnastics guide.

In 1949, Price was the recipient of a research award from the American Academy of Physical Education and in 1950 was listed in the monthly supplement of Who's Who in America.

Besides heading the competitive side of the gymnastics program at FSU, Dr. Price also directs the nationally-famous student Gymkana production which has become a sought-after show throughout the southeast.

Price has as his objective keeping FSU among the top ten gymnastics teams in the nation.

JIM FADIGAN, Assistant Gymnastics Coach

Jim Fadigan, assistant gymnastics coach and assistant director of gymkana activities, holds numerous trampoline, tumbling and free exercise titles which he earned at Florida State.

Fadigan performed at the Brussell's World's Fair. Jim was graduated from Florida State and while attending FSU was named to Who's Who in Colleges and Universities. He also was a member of Gold Key, a campus honorary society.

A native of Margate City, N. J., Jim is a graduate

student in Psychology. 12

SWIMMING

N. B. (BIM) STULTS, Coach

Florida State's swimming team opens its 11th year under the leadership of Coach Bim Stults with an impressive total of 80 victories, 18 losses, and two ties in dual meet competition during Stults' ten-year reign.

This record marks the FSU tankers as one of the outstanding college teams in the South. Last year the Seminoles won eight of nine meets, including two wins

over arch rival and SEC champion Florida. They suffered their only defeat to Southern Methodist, Southwest Conference champion.

Stults has guided the Seminoles through three unbeaten seasons—1951, 1954, and 1955—and only 10 dual losses since 1950. At one point his teams carried a 25-meet streak that spread over a three-year period.

Among Stults' outstanding achievements at Florida State has been the development of five All-Americans including three members of this year's team who are back this season. The All-Americans are: Buck Hiles,

440 freestyle—1959; Curt Genders, diver—1959; Bob Weber, diver—1959; Ernie Stock, breaststroke—1954; Roger Slater, diver—1951.

The Stults era at FSU has also produced some noteworthy team championships. The Seminoles won the inaugural Florida Intercollegiate title last year and captured the Florida AAU crown in 1958, 1957, and 1956. They also won the Georgia AAU crown in 1958 and 1957. In 1951 the Tribe tied for the Southeastern AAU championship and was second in the Southern Regional AAU. FSU tied for seventh in the National AAU meet that same year.

Stults graduated from Washington & Lee in 1930 with a BA degree. After graduating, he went directly to Ross High School in Freemont, Ohio, as head swimming coach where he won the Ohio state championship five times and was runner-up twice. His Ross tankmen finished third in national competition four times.

In 1939 he served as assistant swimming coach at Ohio State University. After serving in the Navy from 1942 through 1946 as a Lt. Comdr., he returned to Ohio State until he came to Florida State in 1948.

DEE EDINGTON, Assistant Swimming Coach

Dee Edington, a former All-America swimmer from Michigan State, takes over as assistant swimming coach under Bim Stults this year.

The 21-year-old native of Huntington, Ind., who was national YMCA breaststroke champion in 1959, helped lead Michigan State to the Big Ten championship in 1957 and to second and third-place national finishes in '58 and '59.

Edington was voted the outstanding freshman swimmer in 1956 while setting the Big Ten freshman record in the 200-yard breaststroke. He earned All-America recognition in the long distance freestyle (14 miles) event in 1955.

Holder of numerous trophies and medals, Edington is doing graduate studies in physical education.
