JANICE DYKEHOUSE

HEAD BASKETBALL COACH

When a reporter saw the Florida State women's basketball team scrimmaging in Tully Gym last year, he asked a bystander, "which one is the new coach?"

Now, after a year on the job, head coach Janice Dykehouse is still confused with her players. It's just that the 6-0 mentor looks as much like an athlete as her players do.

That's understandable. Dykehouse WAS an athlete not too long ago.

The Grand Rapids, Michigan native enjoyed four successful years of playing collegiate basketball, in addition to several years of AAU and international ball.

Fresh out of high school, Dykehouse attended Grand Rapids Junior College where she played two seasons. Both years, she helped lead the squad to the national tournament where it finished as high as fourth.

Her collegiate career continued at Grand Valley State College where she saw her teams compile records of 22-6 and 16-6. Her senior team finished third in the region, beating teams such as Ohio State, Michigan State, Michigan and Ilinois State. She carried a game average of 12 points and 11 rebounds. In 1976, Dykehouse graduated with a bachelor's degree in physical education.

Dykehouse's playing career continued as she played center-forward for the AAU Allentown Crestettes in 1976. With Dykehouse averaging 16 points, the Crestettes

finished fifth in the nation.

She finished her playing career as a player-coach for Union Sportive Vierzon, a French National Team. The senior team on which she participated had a 22-4 record and won the division title. Dykehouse averaged 22 points, She also coached the junior team to an undefeated season.

Prior to accepting the job at Florida State, Dykehouse was an assistant coach for the University of Denver where she worked on a master's degree in sports science.

Dykehouse also has previous coaching experience at the American School in Paris, Lehigh University (Pa.) and Spring Lake (Mich.) High School.

She currently serves on the selection committee for both the Wade Coach of the

Year and Player of the Year awards, representing Region III.

Dykehouse, only the second full-time women's basketball coach at Florida State, runs her own summer camp at FSU. Last summer, some 170 youngsters enrolled, making it Florida's largest summer basketball camp.

Dykehouse's philosophy at FSU is simple. "I want my players to be highly competitive on the floor, yet well-rounded off the court," she says. "I want them to be

poised and to be ladies."

She wants them to be students, too. "If someone on my team gets a failing grade on a test, they don't play the next game. The first role is as a student. Then they are basketball players. If they can't do both, they shouldn't play.

"When my players graduate from FSU, I want them to be productive members

of society," she concludes.

DENNIS MCNELIS

ASSISTANT COACH

The newest addition to the women's basketball staff is Dennis McNelis. McNelis came to Florida State by way of Clemson University where he was head volleyball and assistant basketball coach for two seasons. While at Clemson, the volleyball team had a two-year record of 61-23 and won the state championship. The Lady Tiger basketball squad was consistently in the nation's top twenty.

McNelis, 31, also has coaching experience at the high school level. He coached at Walsingham Academy in Williamsburg, Va. for three years, leading his girl's basketball team to the Catholic League state title in 1976 and earning Coach of the

Year honors.

At Poquoson High School in Virginia, McNelis squads were the state champions and state runners-up with 25-0 and 26-1 records. During his tenure, Poquoson set the Virginia record for most consecutive wins with 76. He was named Kellogg's Coach of the Year in Virginia in 1976.

All told, McNelis' five-year high school coaching career record shows a neat

99-18 log.

McNelis is a 1971 graduate of Belmont Abbey College where he received his bachelor's degree in sociology. He obtained a Master's of Education in Personnel Services from Clemson in May, 1980.

McNelis' responsibilities at Florida State include coaching the guards, coor-

dinating FSU's recruiting efforts and arranging travel.





GRADUATE ASSISTANT COACH

Margaret Cooney is a second-year member of the Seminole coaching staff. She is completing her doctorate degree in Exercise Physiology at Florida State while assisting head coach Janice Dykehouse.

Cooney, a native of Westfield, N.J., received her bachelor's degree from Ithaca College in 1978. She continued her schooling at the University of Denver, receiving her master's degree for sports sciences in 1979.

Cooney has previous coaching and teaching experience at Westfield High School in New Jersey where she taught and coached gymnastics.

At the University of Denver, she developed and administered a physical fitness program and taught in the School of Physical Education. She was also involved with the Denver Nuggets in a pre-season testing and analysis program.

Cooney has designed Florida State's weight training program and monitors the

day to day conditioning and training of the basketball squad.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL PROSPECTUS: **BUILDING BLOCKS**

In some ways, Janice Dykehouse and her basketball program at Florida State are just like a construction company. Groundwork, or the foundation, must be the starting point.

That's precisely where Dykehouse started last season when she was appointed head basketball coach at Florida State. Now her program is "going up", but it is still

a long process.

"I look upon this year as a rebuilding season again," says Dykehouse. "I've just had my first recruiting year at FSU and we're building towards that solid program."

Dykehouse knows that building on solid ground may take a little longer, but it is sure to stand longer too, "We're still two years away from being a national contender," she says.

"We are pretty much established in the state of Florida. But the region is tough, and tough to break into. We've got to start winning against Division I schools.'

Last season's 13-22 record is indicative of a large schedule of that type of school. "Before I came here, our schedule was toned way down," says the second-year coach. "Florida State was winning but much of the competition was against smaller, lower enrollment schools. We weren't playing with the 'big girls'. Last year we played a very competitive schedule and I think it showed up in our record."

Dykehouse has some of the building blocks ready for the new season. She has four starters back to complement three other returning letterwinners and seven

newcomers.

But Florida State's big gun of the past, Cherry Rivers, has departed the Tallahassee campus for the Professional Women's Basketball League and gone is her 15.9 career scoring average and the 1636 points she amassed overfour seasons as a Seminole.

"We'll miss Cherry, no doubt," says Dykehouse. "But I think we have a lot of talent back and some great new talent. Our depth and experience will be a plus this

The major responsibility for carrying the team will fall upon the shoulders of six players. Laine Lasseter, last year's scoring leader, heads the list with her 17.6 points and 7.5 rebounds per game. The 6-0 junior was the top scorer in 13 of the squad's 35 games.

Lynn Dee McDonald, a 5-8 sophomore forward from Calhoun, Ga., was third in

scoring with a 13.1 average.

Four others also contributed to a balanced scoring effort. Glenda Stokes, a 6-0 sophomore, averaged 9.1 points per game and led the team in rebounding with 8.4 per contest. Teresa Tinsley, a 5-6 junior guard, finished fifth in the scoring column with 7.5 points a game. Part-time starter Linda Gray averaged 7.4 points and senior Rose Harper was right behind at 7.1. Harper also led the squad in assists with 125.

The newcomers to Florida State's program may be the biggest part of Dykehouse's blueprint. "We didn't get some of the height we needed," she says, "but we did get the first nationally recognized athletes to sign to play basketball at

Florida State.'

Foremost, she is referring to 6-0 forward Sue Galkantas, a freshman from Chicago's Oak Forest High School. Galkantas was a 1980 Prep All-America selection and was also named to the Chicago Tribune's "Top 20" honor roll. The allarea and all-state cager averaged 28 points and 10 rebounds her senior year.

Jill Baker of Lakeworth, Fla., a first team all-stater, was the second player to ink

with Florida State. According to Dykehouse, Baker was not highly recruited but may be the sleeper of the bunch. She'll be used to shore up depth within the guard position.

LeeVavn Oliver, a 5-10 power forward out of Orlando's Evans High School and

transfer Lisa Foglio will make strong bids for starting positions.

Oliver averaged 18 points and 13 rebounds and was named Converse All-

Foglio, a sophomore, played last season at Mercer, averaging 7.6 points. A year ago, the 5-8 guard was a blue chipper coming out of Ocean City (N.J.) High School where she averaged 28 points a game.

The last of the 1980 signees is Ruthann Burgun, a 5-10 guard who will be playing out her final year of eligibility. Burgun transferred to Florida State after playing stints

at Old Dominion and South Carolina.

Walkons Debbie Putzi, Susie Thrapp, Kris Podulka and Lynn Marnie will also


vie for playing time.


"With our recruiting year and returning people, we are now able to go with a good two-deep at every position," says Dykehouse. "With the extra talent, we'll be able to substitute freely. No one is assured a position. It will be a constant challenge to our players."

Although Florida State added height to its roster, it must still be considered a "short" team by national standards. "We're going to use a running attack with pressure defense as our primary weapon," says Dykehouse. "We're going to be a

quick team and we will run.'

The foundation has been laid, the "new materials" have arrived. As the main contractor, Dykehouse can sit back and smile when she says "everything is going right on schedule."

Women's Athletic Director Barbara Palmer



Determination. Dedication. Enthusiasm. Each of these words has been used to describe Florida State women's athletic director Barbara Palmer at one time or another. Never has one individual had such a dynamic impact on a program in such a short period of time.

Since Palmer was hired in August of 1977, Florida State has developed one of the top programs in the nation.

"It is and always has been our goal to build a national-caliber program here at Florida State," says Palmer. "We are committed to that goal and we will not accept anything short of it. But at the same time, we are concerned with the academic achievement of our athletes. We're building winners in all aspects of personal and pro-

fessional growth."

Palmer's duties as athletic director include the hiring of coaches, preparation of budgets, monitoring of scheduling and travel and fund-raising.

The Lady Seminoles Booster Club is yet another area where Palmer has directed much of her energy. "The development of the Booster Club has meant a great deal to our program," she says. "There are a lot of people out there interested in the Lady Seminoles and they let us know that. They're behind us 100 percent."

Palmer is directly responsible for the funding Florida State will receive each year from the state for women's athletics, making Florida the first state in the nation to come into full compliance with Title IX. It was Palmer's lobbying that pushed the bill through the 1980 Legislature to make it law.

Additionally, she was instrumental in the hiring of full-time coaches for each of FSU's eight women's sports. More recently, full-time assistant coaches have been added to the growing staff.

Palmer joined the Florida State staff after serving four years as executive director of a private leisure education and recreation services organization. Prior to that, she served as administrator of Camp Indian Springs, program director for Wakulla County and recreation supervisor of Merritt Island.

A long time Tallahassee, Fla. resident, Palmer received her bachelor's degree in recreation at FSU in 1970 and earned her master's degree in leisure services and studies in 1974.

Palmer is presently the president of the southeast region, region III, of the AIAW.



1980-81 FLORIDA

THIS IS FLORIDA STATE



Florida State University—the home of more than 20,000 Seminoles—has a campus that starts at the top of one of Tallahassee's famed seven hills, and rolls gently downward and westward across 340-odd acres of pines, palms and pecan trees.

Founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, its heritage is evidenced in the wide range of architectural struggles to preserve history and keep up with modern times and air conditioning. Yet it still ranks as one of the South's last, few bastions of campus greenery—the kind that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods with moss-hung oaks that are, in some cases, as old as the University itself, if not older.

From the Gothic towers of Westcott at the eastern entrance to the campus, to the modern glass and steel structures of its Science Complex to the west, Florida State University has moved forward in time and growth more rapidly than many of its newer counterparts in the State University System. Its enrollment has quadrupled since it became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as the Florida State College for Women.

Today, its 14 schools and colleges are spread through \$150 million worth of buildings, its annual budget exceeds \$100 million and it attracts more than \$18 million a year in research contracts and grants. Students can pick and choose from more than 100 career options offered in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, dance, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theatre and visual arts programs.

The location of FSU in the Capital City of Florida offers unusual opportunities for study and research in the social and policy sciences, and an optimum environment for internships and on-the-job learning experiences for students in many fields of study.

A city within a city, Florida State has 1,200 faculty members, more than 6,000 additional employees and a construction program that will exceed \$50 million between now and 1981. The construction of a new civic center and a center for continuing education—both near the State Capitol—are destined for completion by the fall of 1980.
