

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Florida State University

Florida State University, nearing its golden anniversary as a coeducational graduate research institution, is poised on the brink of joining the nation's academic elite.

Building rapidly from the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida, the University has emerged as an initiation of national and international esteem, evidenced by a number of exciting advances in many areas.

The main campus is spread over 347 acres in Tallahassee. Within the state, FSU maintains facilities at its campus' in Panama City, the marine laboratory on the Gulf of Mexico, the Appleton Museum of Art in Ocala and the film and theater professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Florida State Conference Center on the edge of the main campus.

These far reaching programs are but a few of the 271 graduate and undergraduate degrees offered through Florida State's eight independent colleges. With 1,533 members, the FSU faculty currently includes five members of both the National Academy of Sciences and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and has included five Nobel Laureates.

Florida State continues to progress and grow - from its foundation as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, through the early 20th century as the academically respected Florida State College for Women and its coeducational status as a university in 1947, to its modern development as an acclaimed research institution. In all areas of teaching research and service, Florida State University is advancing boldly into the 21st century.







Athletic Director Bob Goin has been at Florida State 11 years. He is widely credited with making the single most important move in the school's athletic history when FSU joined the Atlantic Coast Conference.



Associate Athletic Director Dr. Janice Stocker coordinates non-revenue sports at Florida State and serves as the senior women's administrator. She is in her seventh year with the FSU athletic department.

FSU Athletics ... On A Roll

A relative infant on the collegiate sports scene, Florida State has distinguished itself as one of the top all-around athletic programs in the country. And under the leadership of Athletic Director Bob Goin, it keeps getting better.

In just 46 years of competition in men's intercollegiate athletics, the Seminoles are on their way to becoming a household name — with the FSU football, basketball and baseball programs leading the way.

On the women's side, Florida State is even younger. FSU's first organized women's teams are celebrating a quarter-century of intercollegiate competition this decade. Yet, the Lady Seminole squads have claimed five national championships

Each year, Florida State teams strive to climb one notch higher on the ladder of national success. On July 1, 1991, Florida State joined one of the nation's most prestigious leagues when it entered the Atlantic Coast Conference. The move enabled Florida State's athletic program to reach new heights.

The 1992-93 school year marked Florida State's first season of ACC competition in each of its 16 sports. The triumphs nearly every FSU team enjoyed during the '92-93 season are unmatched in school history.

This year's Seminole squads will be challenged to surpass the successes of last season, both on and off the playing surface. Athletically, Florida State claimed conference championships in football and softball, and finished in the upper division of nearly every league race. The softball team became Florida State's first repeat champion by winning the ACC title for the second consecutive year.

On the national scene, Florida State also enjoyed unprecedented success. FSU vied for the title of National Collegiate Athletic Association champion in 12 sports. The warriors of the gridiron, after a convincing 27-14 drubbing of Nebraska in the Orange Bowl, secured the school's highest national finish again by placing second in the final college football poll.

The Tribe men's basket-ball team made its best showing in the NCAA Tournament since 1972 (when it reached the championship game) by advancing to the Elite Eight. That success followed a second-place finish in the Atlantic Coast Conference for the second consecutive year.

In tennis, the doubles team of Laura Randmaa and Audra Brannon made FSU history by advancing to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Championship Tournament, the highest finish ever by a Florida State duo or individual. Brannon also qualified on the singles side of the tournament.

For the fourth straight year, the Lady Seminole soft-ball team emerged as NCAA Regional champions to advance to the eight-team College World Series. FSU is becoming a regular at the championship in Oklahoma City.

Florida State qualified one of its largest contingents ever for the NCAA Track & Field Championships in 1993. Ten athletes qualified in 11 different events, with Seminoles reaching the finals in six of them.

Volleyball continued its run of success by appearing in the national championship tournament for the eighth time. The baseball, swimming and diving, and men's and women's golf teams all competed in NCAA Regional Tournaments.

Individually, Seminole coaches and athletes picked up individual honors. Both Cecile Reynaud (volleyball) and Dr. JoAnne Graf (softball) were named ACC Coach of the Year in their respective sports. Pitcher Jonathan Johnson (baseball), leftfielder Shamalene Wilson (softball) and wide receiver Tamarick Vanover (football) all earned Rookie of the Year honors from the league. Johnson and Vanover were also named freshmen All-Americans.

Inside linebacker Marvin Jones capped an illustrious FSU football career by becoming only the second player in college football history to win both the Rotary/Lombardi and Butkus Awards in the same year. Jones also made Florida State football history when the New York Jets selected him with the fourth pick in the first round of the National Football League draft to make him the highest Seminole draft choice ever .

Florida State produced 10 All-Americans in 1993. Jones and Vanover were both named football All-Americans, while Randmaa and Brannon (tennis); Marla Looper, Lisa Davidson and Susan Buttery (softball); and Trinette Johnson, Kevin Crist and Marcus Dixon (track & field) all garnered All-America honors.

Seminole athletes had a banner year in the classroom, too. Forty-six student athletes that competed for FSU in 1992-93 received undergraduate degrees. Four current football players have already graduated and are pursuing master's degrees.

Academically, 97 student athletes were named to the ACC's Academic Honor Roll for 1992-93. These athletes maintained a grade point average of 3.0 and above for both the fall and spring

semesters. The Lady Seminole golfers took top team honors among all 16 FSU teams on the year with a 3.14 g.p.a. in the fall and a 3.32 mark last spring.

The FSU football team equalled its on-field success in the classroom as 29 players posted a grade point average above 3.0 for the spring semester. The team g.p.a. reached one of its highest points ever with a cumulative 2.44 mark last spring.

Football player Carl Simpson and golfer Kelly Pittman were named the University's ACC Scholar-Athletes of the Year. Simpson, a second round draft pick of the Chicago Bears, began work on a second degree while completing his eligibility last fall. The Baxley, Ga. native finished his career second on FSU's career sack list.

Pittman, who finished sixth at the 1993 conference tournament, graduated magna cum laude from Florida State last spring. She was the recipient of an ACC post-graduate scholarship for outstanding academic achievement and is currently pursuing a master's degree in marketing communication at FSU.

To support Seminole student athletes as they reach their fullest potential both on and off the field, the athletic department has undertaken several projects to upgrade both their academic support services and facilities. The physical plant expansion of the Moore Athletic Center as part of the University Center project, means FSU student athletes will have access to a state-of-the-art learning environment, which will include individual study areas, the latest in computer technology, and a study hall and research area.


Other facility improvements include the ongoing expansion of Doak Campbell Stadium, which already sports a completely new look for this season with the completion of the south end zone. In addition, Mike Long Track, Tully Gym and Lady Seminole Field have all undergone upgrades. The Scott Speicher Tennis Center, completed this summer, is one of the finest collegiate tennis complexes in the country.

The Bobby E. Leach
Center, home of the Seminole
swimming and diving teams,
will be the site of the 1994
Atlantic Coast Conference
championships. FSU baseball's Dick Howser Stadium
has been the site of 11 NCAA
Regional baseball tournaments in the last 12 years,
and has a national reputation
as one of the nation's best
facilities.

Much of the ongoing expansion and improvements to facilities at Florida State were made possible by the financial backing the athletic department receives from the Seminole Boosters Inc., the second largest booster organization in the country.

Fans across the country are jumping on the Florida State bandwagon as evidenced by the sale of FSU apparel. The Seminoles' logo and merchandise are among the five most popular sellers in the nation, which is another boon to the University through licensing benefits.

With Florida State's vision toward the future, ever-improving facilities and the support of the University administration, athletic department staff and fans across the country, the successes enjoyed by Florida State student athletes in 1992-93, both on and off the playing surface, are sure to continue for years to come.



Marynell Meadors Middle Tennessee State, 1965

It doesn't take long to realize why Marynell Meadors is at the top of her profession. Listed as America's 8th most winningest coach in Division I, Meadors enters her 24th year of coaching women's basketball with all the excitement of her first season.

The Tennessee native has spent seven seasons at FSU, making two appearances in the NCAA Championship Tournament, including a 2nd round trip, registering over 100 wins, and a Metro Conference Championship. Just last season the Lady Seminoles produced their first All-ACC player in Tia Paschal who was also selected a 2nd team All-American by the WBCA. Meadors can also add to her accolades Metro Conference Coach of the Year in 1989-90 and Co-Coach of the Year in 1990-91.

Before arriving at Florida State, Coach Meadors spent a successful 16 years at Tennessee Tech where she built the program from scratch. During her tenure there, Meadors amassed 363 wins, becoming the first women's coach to win 300 games at one institution. She also had 16, 20-plus win seasons, advanced her team into post-season play 12 times, won four Ohio Valley Championships and was twice named conference coach of the year. Just last year, her many accomplishments were honored as she was inducted into both the Ohio Valley Conference Hall of Fame and the Tennessee Tech Hall of Fame.

Most impressive is
Meadors success on the international level. Three of
Meadors' former athletes
have gone on to compete in

the International League in Europe and Meadors herself has spent the last two summers in Taiwan. In 1992, she was the assistant coach for the Jones Cup Senior women's team which won a gold medal, and in 1993 she served as head coach for the bronze medalling junior national team which competed in the same Jones Cup Tournament. In 1989, Meadors stayed state-side as head coach of the Olympic Festival's North team which also won a gold medal.

Meadors has served on several selection committees during her coaching career. Since 1976, she has been a member of the selection committee for Women's Basketball Top 25. She has also held posts on the Kodak All-American selection com-

mittee, the Stayfree Coach and Player of the Year Awards, the Converse Coach of the Year Award, the Olympic Sports Festival selection committee, the U.S. Olympic Trials and the NCAA Mideast Basketball Committee.

Meadors has been instrumental in strumming up community support for Lady Seminole Basketball. She instituted the weekly Marynell Meadors Basketball Show where she reviews past games and previews upcoming opponents as well as started booster programs and the Little 'Nole Club.

In the off season, when Meadors is not on the recruiting tour she enjoys golfing in the Florida sunshine.



Assistant Coach Second Year Luther College, 1985


Assistant Coach Mark Schmidt begins his second season as a member of the Lady Seminole coaching staff. He serves as the coordinator for recruiting, supervisor of fall conditioning, and assists in game coaching as well.

An eight year coaching veteran, Schmidt began his stint as an assistant after relinquishing his post as the head coach at the University of Hartford. During his two years at Hartford, Schmidt implemented a tough denial defense, one that will complement the press and run style that Meadors brought to Florida State.

Schmidt was head coach of the women's basketball program at the University of Tulsa from 1985-87. He then proceeded to the United States Military Academy at West Point, spending three seasons as an assistant coach to former professional player Lynn Chiavaro.

Schmidt helped Chiavaro form one of the stingiest defenses in the nation at Army. The Lady Knights finished among the top three nationally in Division II scoring defense during each of Schmidt's three seasons at the New York state school.

A 1985 graduate of Luther College in Decorah, Iowa, Schmidt received his degree in physical education and is in the process of finishing his master's degree in athletic administration from the University of Tulsa. He and his wife, Mary Jo, were married in May of 1992.




Sue Panek Assistant Coach First Year Maryland, 1991

Lily, Pennsylvania native Sue Panek joins the Lady Seminoles staff as an assistant coach this season. After a successful four year career as a University of Maryland forward which included a Final Four and Final Eight finish, Panek served as a student assistant under Terp's head coach Chris Weller.

Panek's primary responsibilities will include handling all team travel as well as scouting opponents and oncourt coaching.

Panek graduated from Maryland with a degree in kinesiology in 1991.

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At first glance, the road for the 1993-94 season looks to be an uphill battle. Lost is a pair whose four-year legacy will go down in the history books ... literally. Danielle Ryan and Tia Paschal etched their names on 13 career and single season statistical categories. Even more impressive is that the two combined for an average of 35 points a game last season – half of the entire team's scoring average.


"The number of points that we're losing is too incredible to think about," says head coach Marynell Meadors, who's entering her 7th season at FSU. "Tia and Dee have meant so much to our program over the years. You simply can't replace players like that. You just have to hope that others step up the pace and you get in some young talent."

What Coach Meadors does have to look forward to is a talented group of athletes who will step out of the shadows. Senior, Christy Derlak is the top returner averaging over 13 points a game. The forward from Dayton, Tennessee has had a quiet but important role over the last three seasons. After being utilized as the sixth player her first year, Derlak has moved into a starting position where she has improved with each season. Last year she scored 20 or more points five times and became a defensive factor as well, averaging over five rebounds a game.

Joining Derlak at forward is Louisiana native **Liberty Taylor**. Though averaging just over six minutes of playing time through the first 18 games, Taylor took over starting duties the last month of the season. Battling inexperience and a lack a confidence, Taylor quickly put any







questions to rest and stepped up to average over six points and contributed 34 rebounds over the last ten games.

Back at shooting guard this season is Allison Peercy. After spending a month last summer with the ACC All-Star Tour, Peercy is one of the most talented players on the roster. As a sophomore, the Tennessee native made her way into the school's single season assists and steals record book and currently ranks 5th on the all-time field goal percentage chart. In the conference, Peercy ranked 4th in both steals and assists last year as well.

Allison Arnoldi and Michelle Frank will share time at guard for the Tribe. Arnoldi was enjoying one of her finest seasons before being slowed by an ankle injury. Meadors expects Arnoldi to pick where she left off prior to the injury.

Frank, who walked on to the team last year and later earned a scholarship, is the final returner for the Lady Seminoles. Though she received limited game play, Frank adds a fighting spirit to the squad.

"Michelle is an enthusiastic player, especially on defense," explains Meadors. "She's a very determined individual and a hard worker."

Coach Meadors will also look forward to seeing the talented redshirt freshman, Angela Atkinson. Atkinson suffered two cartilage tears and knee scope surgeries last year but is expected to fully recover.

New on the roster is transfer **Antonette Preston** who recently completed a successful two-year stint at Central Florida Community College. Meadors is confident that, even at 5-4, Preston will be a

top contender in the ACC because of her quickness and strong outside shooting ability. **Sharron Washington**, who played a season at Coppin State College in Maryland, will also be added to the roster.

Back again with the Lady Seminoles is **Katina Cobbins** who was absent last season after lettering in 1991-92. As a freshman, the Louisiana native averaged just over five minutes a game. Newcomer Kaila Walker of Atlanta will be the only true freshman on the squad. Walker a 6-1 forward will be an asset to the Tribe's efforts according to Meadors.

"Kaila has a tremendous amount of ability. Once she learns the post moves, she will be a super player," adds Meadors.

The Lady Seminoles look forward to another exciting year. In addition to the Atlantic Coast Conference schedule and games against traditional rivals Florida and Florida A&M, FSU faces strong non-conference competition and also hosts the 3rd annual Dial Soap Classic.

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Question— what fictional characters best symbolized the 1992-93 Women's Basketball Team? Perhaps the Wonder Twins? After all, Danielle Ryan and Tia Paschal did score almost half the team's season point total and led the Lady Seminoles to wins over top ranked teams Miami, North Carolina and Maryland. Or maybe Charlie Brown and the Peanuts gang would be a better description of the squad. Just when Florida State started rolling, Lucy pulled the ball away. One thing is for sure, the 1992-93 season did have Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde similarities to it.

Meet Dr. Jekyll-Florida State started the year on a three game win streak, beating Florida Atlantic, South Florida and Louisiana State by at least 20 points. After dropping a 8 point contest to their first ACC opponent, N.C. State, FSU rebounded with a big win over Miami. The Lady Seminoles abruptly halted the Hurricanes 31 game regular season winning streak as Danielle Ryan put the game away, nailing the last free throw as the Miami fans yelled wide right.

FSU built on the win, coasting past Marynell Meador's former place of employment, Tennessee Tech, 88-72. Tia Paschal scored over twenty points for the third consecutive game to pace the Lady Seminoles.

The month of December culminated with a loss to California. After 7 games, FSU stood at 5-2 and was shooting 48% from the floor. Two awards had been added to the trophy case as Florida State had claimed the Dial Classic Championship trophy in the first week of the season and also won the runner-up plaque at the Oakland Tribune Classic in California.

In January, FSU faced a rough 10 game slate that saw the Lady Seminoles take on

seven ranked opponents. In two of the games, Florida State played perhaps their best basketball of the season as they upended 15th ranked North Carolina and third ranked Maryland in back to back games. The wins were bolstered in part by two huge individual performances. Tia Paschal broke the school record for most points scored in a game with her 38 point performance in Chapel Hill January 10th. Danielle Ryan answered two days later with a 33 point game in the upset of the Terrapins.

Meet Mr. Hyde-despite winning two of the biggest games in recent FSU history, the Lady Seminoles could not capitalize on the momentum. Florida State won only two games (against Georgia Tech and Florida A&M) over the course of the next 10 contests. A string of injuries and other problems could be partially blamed for the skid as Chantelle Dishman, Ursula Woods and Mary Berryhill did not return to the court after the first part of February.

FSU went 3-2 prior to the ACC tournament with wins over Wake Forest, Oral Roberts and Duke. The Lady Seminoles entered the Championships seeded seventh and faced Maryland in the first round. Florida State could not duplicate its early season win as the Terrapins upended FSU 91-68. The Tribe finished the season with a 13-14 overall record. The team broke three school records over the course of the season-number of threepointers in a season, threepoint field goal attempts and three-point field goal percentage.
