Women's Cross Country Outlook

"We're not building for the future. The future is now." Those words are spoken by first-year cross country coach Roger Smith. "Don't get me wrong, we're not going to challenge for the national championship this year," says Smith. "But we've got talent

and we're going to start using it now.

Florida State finished 22nd in the nation last season, and Smith hopes to improve on that mark. "The biggest thing is to win our Regional," he says. "Then we can get to nationals, and we think we can finish among the top 15 teams in the country. We'd consider

that a great season.'

Two holdovers from last season will probably be running at the head of the pack this year. Kathy Moore, a senior from Miami, Fla., and Darien Andreu, a sophomore from Orange Park, Fla., hold the key to most of Smith's high hopes. "Kathy could be our top runner," says Smith. "She's a three-year letter winner and if she stayed with the summer program we mapped out and recovers from a chronic ankle injury, look for her to be out front.

"And," the first-year coach continues, "Darien is our team leader in a lot of respects. We're looking for very big things from her. She'll

be up there challenging for the number one position."

Smith's top "freshman" recruit checks into Florida State at 29. Margaret Coomber, a native of London, England, has been timed at 2:02 in the half mile which ranks her among the Top 30 women in the world. She's been a member of the Great Britain International team since 1972 and the Scottish International team since 1967. "Margaret's experience as a runner should be an asset to our program," says Smith.

The "younger" freshman class standouts include Jannette Wood,

a native of Oakville, Ontario, and walk-ons Sue Ebler and Stephanie Smith. Chris Edwards and Bonita Bradov may cause a few surprises

"We're hoping one or two of those young women can come to

the top and contribute to the squad," says Smith.

Three sophomores and two juniors also will be candidates for the first seven slots. Sophomores Mary Banks, Gale Grant and Lisa

Rhoden are all back as is junior Debbie Kemp.

"We have a good nucleus," says Smith. "I had a late start on recruiting since most distance runners had signed by the time I was hired at Florida State. Although there are a lot of question marks, I feel confident with the team we have."

A week of high altitude training in Boone, North Carolina is something new that Smith added to the FSU program. "We had two purposes in implementing the training," Smith says. "One was to test our summer program and see how well the team had kept pace with it. The second was to build team comraderie since we had a lot

of new faces in addition to mine."

Florida State's schedule is built around the concept of training for two meets at season's end, the AIAW Region III Championships and the AIAW Nationals. "We won't ignore the other meets and we won't train through them," Smith says, "but we will gear everything towards the regional and national tournaments. What we do in those meets will be the barometer to measure our success.'



### Head Coach ROGER SMITH

Winning seems to follow Roger Smith around the country. After establishing winning programs at El Monte (Calif.) High School, Clackamas (Ore.) Community College and the University of Wyoming, Smith has headed southeast to Florida State for yet another challenge.

"I have always maintained that there are three areas in the country -- Florida, Texas and California -- where a coach can build teams of national champion-ship caliber," Smith says. "The climate is conducive to year-round training and that gives us a jump on some of the other

schools. With the backing of our administration, we are committed to the goal of producing a national caliber program here at Florida State."

At El Monte High School, Smith took a program that had not won a dual meet in 63 attempts and won the Pacific League Champi-

onship in two years.

Smith's next move took him to Clackamas where he won the national championship in cross country and track and field in his first year of coaching (1977). Over a three-year period, his teams compiled a 51-1 record in cross country and a 119-4 record in track and field. Five of his cross country athletes and 19 track athletes achieved All-America status.

Before arriving on the FSU campus, Smith spent a year at the University of Wyoming. His cross country, indoor track and outdoor track squads all qualified for nationals, with indoor finishing 24th in

the nation and outdoor 38th.


Smith was assistant coach at the 1978 Summer Olympic Festival in Colorado Springs, Colorado. The same year, he was named both state and region Coach of the Year for cross country and track in

Smith is well-respected in his field. While at Clackamas, he was chairperson for women's cross country in the National Junior College Athletic Association. He also authored the NJCAA Region XVIII cross country and track and field operating manual.

Smith received his bachelor's degree from Idaho State in 1967

and his master's from Azusa Pacific College in 1971.

He is married and is the father of one child.



### Assistant Coach GARY WINCKLER

Assisting Roger Smith this season with both cross country and track and field will be first-year coach Gary Winckler, Winckler was assistant women's track and field coach at Oregon State prior to joining the Seminole staff.

Over the past three seasons at Oregon State, Winckler helped to build the women's track and field program from 10 athletes to the current program involving 45 young women. During that period, the track team climbed from the bottom of the 37-school region to a second place finish in 1980. Winckler's duties as assis-

tant included setting up the squad's training programs, coordinating travel arrangements and organizing annual track and field clinics.

Winckler has other coaching experience at Lynnwood (Wash.) High School and Seattle Pacific University. At the latter, he competed in the high jump in the 1974 NCAA finals and still holds Seattle Pacific's record in the event (6-10). Pacific's program was consistently ranked in the nation's top five during Winckler's career.

Also an accomplished writer, Winckler has had several articles published, including Perspective on the Back-Layout High Jump which appeared in the 1980 May/June issue of Scholastic Coach

Magazine.

Winckler received his master's degree in mathematics from Oregon State in 1980.

Winckler will coach the sprinters, hurdlers and jumpers in track.


# **SEMINOLE**

### Women's Athletic Director — BARBARA PALMER



Determination. Dedication. Enthusiasm. Each of these words has been used to describe Florida State women's athletic director Barbara Palmer at one time or another. Never has one individual had such a dynamic impact on a program in such a short period of time.

Since Palmer was hired in August of 1977, Florida State has developed one of

the top programs in the nation.

"It is and always has been our goal to build a national-caliber program here at Florida State," says Palmer. "We are committed to that goal and we will not accept anything short of it. But at the same time, we are concerned with the academic achievement of our athletes.

We're building winners in all aspects of personal and professional

Palmer's duties as athletic director include the hiring of coaches, preparation of budgets, monitoring of scheduling and travel and

fund-raising.

The Lady Seminoles Booster Club is yet another area where Palmer has directed much of her energy. "The development of the Booster Club has meant a great deal to our program," she says. "There are a lot of people out there interested in the Lady Seminoles and they let us know that. They're behind us 100 percent."

Palmer is directly responsible for the funding Florida State will receive each year from the state for women's athletics, making Florida the first state in the nation to come into full compliance with Title IX. It was Palmer's lobbying that pushed the bill through the 1980 Legislature to make it law.

Additionally, she was instrumental in the hiring of full-time coaches for each of FSU's eight women's sports. More recently, full-time assistant coaches have been added to the growing staff.

Palmer joined the Florida State staff after serving four years as executive director of a private leisure education and recreation services organization. Prior to that, she served as administrator of Camp Indian Springs, program director for Wakulla County and recreation supervisor of Merritt Island.

A long time Tallahassee, Fla. resident, Palmer received her bachelor's degree in recreation at FSU in 1970 and earned her

master's degree in leisure services and studies in 1974.

Palmer is presently the president of the southeast region, region III, of the AIAW.

### THIS IS FLORIDA STATE

Florida State University — the home of more than 20,000 Seminoles — has a campus that starts at the top of one of Tallahassee's famed seven hills, and rolls gently downward and westward across 340-odd acres of pines, palms and pecan trees.

Founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, its heritage is evidenced in the wide range of architectural struggles to preserve history and keep up with modern times and air conditioning. Yet it still ranks as one of the South's last, few bastions of campus greenery — the kind that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods with moss-hung oaks that are, in some cases, as old as the University itself, if not older.

From the Gothic towers of Wescott at the eastern entrance to the campus, to the modern glass and steel structures of its Science Complex to the west, Florida State University has moved forward in time and growth more rapidly than many of its newer counterparts in the State University System. Its enrollment has quadrupled since it became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as the Florida State College for Women.

Today, its 14 schools and colleges are spread through \$150 million worth of buildings, its annual budget exceeds \$100 million and it attracts more than \$18 million a year in research contracts and grants. Students can pick and choose from more than 100 career options offered in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, dance, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater and visual arts programs.

The location of FSU in the Capital City of Florida offers unusual opportunities for study and research in the social and policy sciences, and an optimum environment for internships and on-the-job learning experiences for students in many fields of study.

A city within a city, Florida State has 1,200 faculty members, more than 6,000 additional employees and a construction program that will exceed \$50 million between now and 1981. The construction of a new civic center and a center for continuing education — both near the State Capitol — are destined for completion by the fall of 1980.
