The FSU women's golf team claimed its first national title in 1981 when the Lady Seminoles captured the AIAW National Championship. The Seminoles won the tournament in quite dramatic fashion. After the front nine of the final round, FSU found itself two strokes behind the leader, the University of Georgia. But on the 17th hole, four FSU golfers birdied to give the Seminoles a three-stroke lead over the Bulldogs and the national championship as well.



One intangible has been lacking from previous Lady Seminole squads, experience. Last year's team featured two juniors, five sophomores, three freshman and no seniors. Turning the clocks ahead one year tells a different story. Although their is only one senior on this year's squad, several of the younger players saw significant action last year. This year's top five will feature one senior and four juniors that played together in all but two tournaments.

For the first time in over a decade, the Lady Seminoles return the top five players from the previous year. This year's team features the talent, experience and confidence to be among the top teams in the country.

"This team is very confident," stated Dillman. "We have the experience to return to the NCAA Championships and the confidence to do so. This is the first time in a long time that I have had a group stay together from one year to the next."

The goals continue to be the same for this year's team. The Lady Seminoles will set out to qualify for Regional play and a trip to the NCAA Championships. This road will prove to be a difficult one, as the district teams have improved immensely over the course of the last year. Couple that improvement with the loss of one qualifying spot from their district and the Lady Seminoles will have a difficult road.

"This year will be as difficult as ever in regards to qualifying for the Regional tournament," said Dillman. "Because the district struggled the last five to six years, we lost a spot in the East Regional tournament. Now all the teams are solid and we will have to play extremely well to qualify."

The top player for the Lady Seminoles as they finish out the fall season and move into the spring is Amy Bond. Bond, a junior from Ocala, FL, led the Lady

Seminoles in five tournaments last season. She also led the team with seven top 15 finishes and a stroke average of 76.9 in ten tournaments.

"Amy has the potential to be an All-American at Florida State," commented head coach Debbie Dillman. "She has all the physical tools and now she has added the mental toughness that it takes to be successful and

takes to be successful and win tournaments."

The next four spots in the line-up are interchangeable. One of the interchangeable components in Erika Iding. Iding, a junior from Lansing, MI, came to the Lady Seminole program last season after a one-year stint at the University of Arkansas. Finishing last season with a stroke average of 80.0, Iding's best finish was a tied for 15th performance at the Ryder-Florida State Championship.

"Erika spent a lot of time this summer on her game," said Dillman. "She wasn't happy with playing the four or five spot each week, so she really improved her game and we look for her to be a solid contributor to this

year's team."

One of the brightest spots of the summer was junior Amy Spooner. Spooner, a native of Margate, FL, was a semifinalist at the U.S. Public Links Championship and received medalist honors at the regional qualifier for the

U.S. Women's Amateur this summer. Spooner played in every tournament last year, finishing with a stroke average of 79.2 and three top 15 finishes.

"For Amy, it is a matter of confidence," commented Dillman. "I know that she has the tools, but now she knows that she can do it. She is looking ahead to the good days that are in front of her instead of thinking about the bad days."

The lone senior on this year's squad is leader Aguri Okura. Okura is a three-year contributor that led the Tribe in three tournaments, including her personal-best 2nd place finish at the Ryder-Florida State Championships last year. She also was selected as a

member of the Academic All-American team for the second consecutive season.

"Aguri is a quiet leader for this team," said Dillman. "She is a leader on and off the course and leads by example each time that she goes out."

The final member of the top 5 line-up in Sarah Capie of Carterville, IL. Playing in all 29 rounds last year, Capie had two top 15 finishes and led the Lady Seminoles at the Lady Seminole Invitational with a tied for 14th performance. Capie, an Academic All-American following last season, is a solid contributor for the Lady Seminoles.

"I think that this group really has the opportunity to do some good things this year," stated Dillman. "They are confident in themselves and they know the golf courses that they are playing this year, which will give us an advantage."

will attempt to crack the line-up before the year is out. The best candidates for playing time are junior Kelly Hoffmeyer and freshman Louise Wright. Hoffmeyer, a fourth-year player from Michigan, played in two tournaments as an individual last year and played the ACC Championships, finishing in 20th place. Wright, a true freshman from Suffolk, England, comes to Florida State after a very successful amateur career in England. Wright was selected to the England Elite Squad and made the top 16 in England for the last two years. Stacy Burgin, Laura Kowalski, J.J. Swindle, Betsy Jaeger, along with freshmen Kelley Winship and Bette Lynn Carswell, will contend for time over the course of the year.

As with the mark of any good program, the Lady Seminoles will once again play a difficult tournament schedule. Starting with the Lady Seminole Inviational and concluding with the ACC Championships, the

Tribe will play the best teams in the Southeast and East regions. The ACC Championships continues to be one of the premier conference tournaments in the country. This year's tournament will return to Greensboro, NC after a one-year hiatus.

The Lady Seminoles will once again contend for postseason play with one of the deepest teams in history. Returning the top five golfers from a year ago and adding young talent, this Lady Seminole team has the ability and confidence to return to the NCAA Championships.

'97 COURSE: FCI RESULTS

The Lady Seminoles entered the fall season with the experience and talent necessary to be successful in tournament play. With all five golfers returning from a year ago, expectations of a successful fall season were eminent.

The Tribe started the fall season with the 22nd annual Lady Seminole Invitational at the Seminole Golf Course. Featuring 15 teams from across the Southeast, the Lady Seminole Invitational has become an important tournament in district rankings. The Lady Seminoles finished tied for third in this year's event with the University of Central Florida. Juniors Erika Iding and Sarah Capie led the Tribe, finishing tied for 12th with three-round totals of 228. The University of Kentucky captured the tournament title, beating Mississippi State University by nine strokes.

In the following week, the Tribe traveled to Auburn, AL for the Auburn Tiger Invitational. The Lady Seminoles posted a first-round team total of 297 to pace them to a sixth-place finish among 12 teams, four strokes behind host Auburn University. Potential All-American candidate Amy Bond fired a 73 in the opening round of the tournament, forging her way to a tie for 16th-place finish. The Lady Seminoles were once again led by Erika Iding. Iding, a native of Lansing, MI, carded a three-day total of 226 to finish tied for 14th with Christy Carter of Tulane University.

The Lady Seminoles had two weeks to prepare for the Beacon Woods Invitational at the Beacon Woods Country Club in Bayonet Point, FL. Iding paced the Tribe, finishing tied for 18th with a 234. Amy Bond and Aguri Okura both finished in the top 20, finishing tied for 20th.

The final tournament of the fall season was the very difficult Lady Paladin Invitational. A 21-team field faced the Lady Seminoles as they traveled to Greenville, SC for the annual event. The Tribe finished in 11th place out of 21 teams with a team total of 942. Amy Bond fired a final-round 77 to finish tied for 26th, while junior Amy Spooner finished tied for 33rd.

The Lady Seminoles hope to use the fall season as a stepping stone to the spring season. With four tournaments under their belts, this Seminole team prepares for a difficult spring schedule, culminating with the ACC Championships and a return trip to the NCAA East Regional.



In her 14th year at the helm of the Lady Seminole golf team, head coach Debbie Dillman will not rest on her laurels, although she has accumulated many over the years. The experienced and knowledgable coach has placed Florida State in a prominent position in collegiate golf.

The Davison, Michigan native grew up in an active golf family. Both of Dillman's parents were involved in country club management. Dillman captained her high school golf team for four years and twice was runner-up at the Michigan State Championship. For three consecutive years she also captured the Flint Junior Golf Championship, considered one of the top junior tournaments in the state.

Dillman brought her talents down south to Tallahassee where she attended FSU as an undergraduate and played golf for the Lady Seminoles from 1979-82. During that time she also worked at Seminole Golf Course, enabling her to learn both the competitive and management sides of the sport.

Over the past 13 years, the Lady Seminoles have emerged as one of the perennial golf powers in the nation. With Dillman at the helm, the Seminoles have walked away from a tournament with the overall team championship 13 times. Under her coaching, eight Seminole golfers have captured 13 individual champion honors.

While members of the team have garnered many honors, Dillman herself has been honored as well. In the Seminoles' inaugural season in the Atlantic Coast Conference, Dillman's fellow coaches selected her as ACC Coach of the Year.

Dillman interests vary from the golf course to the farm. In her spare time she raises Tennessee Walking horses on her farm just outside of Tallahassee. She also has a daughter, Anne Lynn, who is four years old.

Both the men's and women's golf team benefit from the experience and service of assistant coach Sue Urry. Urry, in her fourth year at Florida State, performs a variety of duties to assist coach Debbie Dillman and men's coach Dr. Ernie Lanford in the day-to-day operations of the Seminole golf program.

Urry grew up in Peoria, Illinois, where her father first introduced her to the game of golf. Under the influence of Jerry Barber, a player on the senior tour, Urry became more serious with golf in addition to playing volleyball.

Urry's athletic talents attracted attention from college coaches. She

Each fall, the FSU women's golf program hosts the Lady Seminole Invitational. This tournament has become one of the most widely known tournaments on the collegiate circuit. The 22nd annual Invitational took place on September 12-14, 1997 at the Seminole Golf Course. In her spare time away from the course, Urry enjoys boating, playing volleyball, and other outdoor sports. She and her husband, Keith, share their home with two yellow labs.

The Lady Seminoles entered the 1996-97 season hoping to achieve the goal that has eluded them in recent years, a trip to the NCAA Championships. Loaded with young, experienced talent and the addition of transfer Erika Iding, the Lady Seminoles were poised to achieve the goals set forth for them by head coach Debbie Dillman.

The Tribe entered the fall season with a strong nucleus of golfers that made contributions in the 1995-96 season. One junior and four sophomores returned to tournament action after an added year of experience under their belt. The Lady Seminoles were forced to replace Mabel Pascual del Pobil and Kate Burton that led the team in eight tournaments and posted ten top 20 finishes over the course of the year.

The Lady Seminoles reasserted themselves among the elite teams in the country after posting three top 5 finishes in the fall season. Sophomore Amy Bond led the Tribe through the fall season, posting three top 10 finishes. After opening the season with a third place finish at the Lady Seminole Invitational, Bond finished the Auburn Tiger Invitational tied for 10th. Bond finished the nine tournament schedule with seven top 15 finishes and a stroke average of 76.9. In addition to her team-leading stroke average, the team score counted all but two rounds that Bond participated in.

The lone junior on the squad was Aguri Okura, a native of Osaka, Japan. In her second year after transferring from UNC-Greensboro, Okura posted five top 20 finishes and

lost on the first hole of sudden death at the Ryder Florida-State Championship to finish second. Okura's stroke average of 78.3 was second best on the team. She also led the Tribe with a sixth place finish at the Auburn Tiger Invitational.

A newcomer graced the Florida State line-up at the beginning of the season. Sophomore Erika Iding transferred from the University of Arkansas after one year. Iding played in all but two tournaments, posting a

stroke average of 80.3 and a top 15 finish at the Ryder-Florida State Championship. Iding missed the ACC Championships before returning for the NCAA East Regional.

Amy Spooner, a sophomore from Margate, FL, made solid contributions after playing in

all nine events as a true freshman. Spooner's best finish came in the ACC Championships, were she led the team with a tied for 8th performance. She recorded three top 15 finishes, including a 12th-place finish at the Florida-State Championship. Spooner missed most of the off-season conditioning in between the fall and spring due to injury suffered in a car accident.

The final member of the Lady

Seminole squad that saw significant action was sophomore Sarah Capie. Capie, an Academic All-American, participated in all nine tournaments, finishing with a stroke average of 80.5 in 29 rounds of play. Capie ended the season with two top 15 finishes, including placing tied for 13th at the ACC Championships.

The Lady Seminoles started the fall season hosting the 21st annual Lady Seminole Invitational. The Tribe finished in third place behind the



The Lady Seminoles' best finish of the year was a second place finish at the Ryder-State Championships.

University of Alabama and the University of North Carolina. Amy Bond led the Seminoles with a third place finish, followed by Sarah Capie's 14th place finish.

After a solid fourth-place finish at the rain-shortened Auburn Tiger Invitational, the Tribe traveled to Bayonet Point, FL for the Beacon Woods Invitational. Amy Bond's 8th-place finish paced the Seminoles to a fifth-place finish as a team with a total

of 949. It marked the first tournament for J.J. Swindle, a native of Camilla, GA, who finished tied for 50th. Swindle replaced Iding in the line-up.

The fall schedule was completed with the Lady Paladin Invitational on the campus of Furman University. The Tribe struggled to finish 14th out of the 21-team field. Amy Spooner led the Seminoles, finishing tied for 28th with a three-round total of 233. The University of Tennessee captured the team title, beating Wake Forest University in a playoff.

The Lady Seminoles entered the spring season poised to build on the successful fall campaign. They prepared for postseason play with a tough tournament schedule in the spring. Starting with the Lady Gator Invitational and finishing with the ACC Championships, the schedule featured several tournaments against district teams.

The Lady Seminoles traveled to arch-rival Florida for the Lady Gator Invitational in early March. The Lady Seminoles finished in 8th place, nine strokes behind the University of Georgia. After a seventh-place finish at the LSU-Fairwood Invitational, the Tribe traveled to a most difficult tournament of the spring, the Lady Gamecock Classic. Featuring 14 teams from the Southeast, the Seminoles placed in 8th place out of 15 teams.


In an annual event held at the Don Shula's Golf Club, the Ryder-Florida State Championship features 12 teams from the state of Florida. The Lady Seminoles used a final-round 299 to finish one stroke behind the University of Florida. Aguri Okura

paced the Tribe, losing in the first hole of sudden death to finish in second place behind Riko Higashio of Florida. Okura's second-place finish was the highest in her two years at Florida State, with previous best coming in the Auburn Tiger Invitational.

Poised to improve on the fourth place finish from a year ago, the Lady Seminoles traveled to Atlanta for the ACC Championships. Held as part of the ACC Spring Weekend, the Championships were at the Eagles Landing Country Club. The Lady Seminoles struggled to a fourth-place finish, nine strokes behind North Carolina.

With a strong fall and a productive spring, the Tribe once again qualified for the NCAA East Regional in Bloomington, IL. The field of 19 teams battled inclement weather conditions, while the Lady Seminoles finished tied for 18th. Amy Bond led the Lady Seminoles, finishing tied for 36th with a three-round total of 241. FSU's season came to an end as the 18th place finish was not good enough to qualify for the NCAA Championships.

The 1996-97 season was high-lighted by several bright spots. From a third-place finish in the first tournament of the year to a second-place finish in the Ryder-Florida State Championship, the Lady Seminoles remained at or near the top of every tournament. Several excellent individual performances also paced a Seminole squad that is looking forward to the future. With four juniors and one senior returning, Florida State will be a dominant force in NCAA golf in 1997.



Superior strength and conditioning are two reasons why the Lady Seminole golf team is among the top programs in the nation every year. The golf team's committment to excellence does not start on the practice green, it starts in the weight room every Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 6:45 a.m.

Assistant Strength Coach Sterling Brown works with the women's golf team and has created a special program so that each golfer can reach maximum potential on the course.

"With physical fitness the women can help themselves two different ways," Miller said. "The first is injury prevention and the second is they will be able to play better, longer."

The Lady Seminoles start their workout with 30 minutes of cardiovascular training. This can range from running to riding a stationary bike. Cardiovascular training will help the overall endurance of a player so she is

not tired after walking for 36 holes.

Next the women go through the "Seminole Circuit" which is a total body strength program devised specifically for golfers.

"The main areas we work are the wrist, forearms, and abdominals," Miller said. "Once again we are working toward muscular endurance."

The Seminoles work out in the Tully Gymnasium weight room which is a carpeted and mirrored area that includes state of the art exercise systems by Cybex Eagle, as well as free weight equipment. A variety of exercise bicycles, rowing machines and stairmasters incorporate both strength, conditioning and cardiovascular endurance. The weight room is open every weekday, year-round, at the most convenient hours to give all student-athletes time to work a strength and conditioning routine into their busy schedules.

Words of encouragement and guidance come from Miller and his staff, who take a personal interest in every Seminole athlete. Miller works with the individual to tailor a weight program that specifically meets her needs and goals. His office is located in Tully Gym, where he can remain close to the action at all times.

Miller is working towards training the athletes to condition themselves year-round and not just during the season.

"I want working out to become a lifestyle for these women," he said.

At Florida State we believe "the strong shall survive." FSU takes pride in its strength and conditioning programs to help student-athletes reach their maximum potential.



Academic, personal, and professional support are essential to college success. At Florida State University, we have developed an outstanding support program which enables student-athletes to reach their full potential.

Our philosophy is "to offer an academic support program integrated with the total university that will assist all student-athletes with the transition into college and provide continued support in all phases of academic and professional development culminating with graduation, job placement, or graduate school."

To accomplish this goal we have developed an academic environment which facilitates the academic success of studentathletes. Student success is encouraged through competent academic counseling, career exploration, planning and place-


ment and academic assistance through tutorial programs.

Our program operates on a "proactive" rather than "reactive" approach. At Florida State, our academic staff does not wait for academic crises to occur. We gather important background information and build an academic profile on all student-athletes to assess their needs in advance. We also stay informed on the daily progress of each student-athlete.

The academic support staff includes a director, five counselors, and three graduate interns forming a group of professionals serving the needs of all studentathletes. The director, Mark Melaney, is starting his first year as the head of the program. Melaney served as the interim director after the departure of Dr. Roger Grooters, who took over a similar posi-

tion at Michigan State University.

In 1994, the academic programs moved to the state-of-the-art University Center and are located on the sixth floor of the \$126 million facility. It includes private study carrels, a tutorial study area and a computer lab outfitted with 16 new IBM computers and laser printers. In addition, athletic sky boxes are utilized for group and individual tutorial instruction.





The Atlantic Coast Conference boasts a rich tradition of success in women's golf. Although only four conference schools have women's golf teams, those four teams have made their mark on the national level.

Since Florida State joined the ACC in 1991, the women's golf team has been a major contributor to FSU's success in the ACC. The Lady 'Noles have finished second in the conference twice, in 1992 and 1995. Coach Debbie Dillman was named ACC Coach of the Year in 1992, and former Seminoles Erica Firnhaber, Marie Josee Rouleau, and Karen Stupples have been All-ACC selections, with Stupples attaining that honor in both 1994 and 1995.

In the 1997 ACC Championships, held at the Eagles Landing Country Club in Atlanta, the Lady Seminoles finished the tournament in fourth place. Sophomore Amy Spooner led the Seminoles, finishing tied for eighth place after a final-round 78. Duke University claimed the team championships, beating Wake Forest by ten strokes. The University of North Carolina finished in third, 21 strokes behind the Demon Deacons.

The ACC was well represented at the 1997 NCAA Championships by Wake Forest . The Demon Deacons finished the tournament in 11th place. Laura Philo was the highest individual finisher for the ACC, finishing in 20th with a three-round score of 297.

This year's ACC Championships will place at the Grandover Golf Course in Greensboro, NC.

Lady Seminole Golf has been highly successful in the first seven years of this decade. Since the spring of 1990, Florida State has come away from a tournament as the team champion eight times. Equally as impressive are the 46 top five finishes the squad has compiled over 81 tournaments during those years.

Individual golfers have made their marks in the record book as well. Five Lady Seminoles have captured tournament championships, with Karen Stupples (1993-95) adding two tourney titles to her list of accomplishments. Stupples was named a second-team All-American in the spring of 1995. In all, 12 FSU golfers have posted 43 individual top 5 finishes since 1990.

The women have made appearances in NCAA post-season play each spring since 1991. Three times they've gone to the championships, while in other years they were selected to participate in regional play.





Florida State University, in its golden anniversary as a coeducational graduate research institution, has joined the nation's elite in both academics and athletics. Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida and building rapidly on the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, the University has emerged over the past 48 years as an institution of national and international esteem.

A senior member of the 10-member State University System, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1852 and began in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.





Florida State continues to progress and grow—from its pre-Civil War foundation as the Seminary West of the Suwanee, through the early 20th century as the academically respected Florida State College for Women, returning to coeducational status as a university in 1947, to its modern development as an acclaimed research institution, a top-ranked competitor in intercollegiate athletics and as a standard-setter in the basic sciences and the performing arts.

Today, Florida State's operating budget is \$442 million. Faculty and

administrators generate more than \$95 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the University: the FSU Foundation, which raises millions in private gifts to support academics, the Seminole Boosters and the FSU Alumni Association.

Florida State offers 275 graduate and undergraduate degree programs thorugh its eight colleges—Arts & Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering (operating jointly with Florida A&M University); Human Sciences; Law; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the school of Public Administration and

include 2.06 million book titles, 18,498 serials, and 4.25 million microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked via computerized information systems to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library is located at the heart of the university's science research complex. FSU also maintains extensive music, library science, and law libraries, and the Mildred and Claude Pepper Library houses the personal and professional papers of one of Florida's best known political couples.

Florida State ranks first in popularity nationwide among high school seniors, based on the number of







Policy) —and eight schools—Criminology & Criminal Justice; Library & Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television & Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts & Dance.

With 1,568 members, the FSU faculty currently includes five members of the National Academy of Sciences and eight members of the National Academy of Arts and Sciences, and has included five Nobel Laureates. It is backed by 2,987 administrative, professional, and support staff.

The ASTAR-410 differs from other ASTAR Golf Learning Systems in that it does not use a digital video processor, i.e., computer technology. It relies instead on traditional videotape for capturing and replaying video. The subject is captured directly from the camera to a VCR, which is then used to rewind and replay the tape.

Rather than being a pre-packaged product that is readily identifiable on the price list, the ASTAR-410 is actually a collection of components specifically assembled to meet the customer's requirements. The customer is free to choose among cabinet, camera, VCR, and other options to assemble a system that meets the need at hand.

The ASTAR system provides the Florida State several other features. This system has the ability to edit student tapes, allowing the student-athlete to review his/her swing and make immediate adjustments. The system also allows the coach to mount it on a golf cart for moveable operations throughout the golf course. Several operations are available for a variety of situations.

ASTAR software is based on several principles which have resulted from working with teaching professionals in several sports and educators in general. The most fundamental concepts originate in learning theory: Knowledge of Results (KOR) and Immediate Visual Feedback (IVF). Both have been proven to be of major importance in any type of learning environment, and espically in learning complex motor skills.

The ASTAR camera system concentrating on translating five theories to practice. Visual feedback, drawing tools, swing library, story board and comparative modeling are the five theories that makes ASTAR one of the most successful camera systems in the golf world.
