Reaching New Heights

A year ago, the Florida State women's golf team posted six top-10 tournament finishes and played in the NCAA East Regional Tournament. In 2002, Head Coach Debbie Dillman and the Seminoles are looking to play even better and reach even greater heights.

A breakdown of the Seminoles' 2001-02 roster shows the team has the talent (a returning All-ACC performer in Kristin Tamulis), the experience (four of Florida State's five starters are back) and the depth (seven talented returnees or newcomers) to once again be a major competitor in the ACC and on the national level.

"We have worked hard to put ourselves in a position where we can compete with the top teams in the nation," said Dillman, who is in her 18th season as Florida State's head

coach. "We enjoyed a fantastic spring season and are looking for that success to carry over into this season."

Dillman has reason to be excited after the Seminoles finished third at the ACC Championships and advanced to NCAA Regional play for the third time since 1998. In five tournaments last spring, a Seminole golfer finished in the top 25 of the individual standings 10 times. The string of top-10 finishes included Tamulis' third place finish at the ACC Championship.

Returning starters for Florida State includes senior Kelley Henderson, junior Kristin Tamulis and sophomores Alison Curdt and Carrie Sordel. In addition, senior Alison Zimmer is one of the most experienced golfers on the team and will look to earn time in the starting lineup.

"We have a lot of returning talent – experienced talent," said Dillman. "What we have to do now is continue to work with that talent and improve individually which will help us improve as a team."

Highlighting the list of returning letter-winners is junior Kristin Tamulis, who finished in a tie for third at the ACC Championships to earn All-ACC for the first time during her career in 2001. She is the Seminoles' most experienced golfer who has participated in 19 tournaments during the first two years of her career. She led Florida State with a career-low 74.86 per round stroke average as a sophomore.

"Kristin played well for us last season and her play was a major reason why we were so successful," said Dillman. "I think she is going to continue to step up her play and become a



team leader this season. I know that her best golf is ahead of her."

Kelley Henderson, one of two seniors on the Seminoles' roster, displayed her talent during last year – her first as a Seminole. She recorded three rounds below 75 and carded a career-low 73 at the Bryan National Collegiate during the spring season. Henderson participated in both the 2001 ACC Championship and NCAA East Regional. She earned her first career top-25 finish at the ACC Championship.

"Kelley emerged as one of our top golfers last season and we are looking for even better golf from her this season," said Dillman. "She strokes the ball well and knows the game of golf as well as any player on our team."

Florida State's sophomore tandem of Alison Curdt and Carrie Sordel were pleasant surprises for the Seminoles last year. Both players participated in all five tournaments during the spring season (including the ACC Championship and NCAA East Regional) and demonstrated their abilities to be successful on the collegiate level.

Curdt participated in all 10 events during her freshman season including the ACC Championship and NCAA East Regional and carded a career-low score of even-par 72 in the third round of the 2001 Bryan National Collegiate.

"I was pleased with Alison's performance throughout the year," Dillman said. "I thought she played well for her first year and I expect to see improvement this season. She needs to have a good year for us to be successful as a team in 2002.

Sordel stepped up and joined the Seminoles' starting lineup upon her arrival as a freshman. She, too, enjoyed a strong season and was another key performer in the team's run to the post season despite battling injuries throughout the season. Sordel will be counted on to continue her improvement and again be one of the Seminoles' top golfers during the 2001-02 season.

"Carrie surprised us with her overall play throughout the season last year," said Dillman. "We knew coming in that she was a strong golfer but she achieved at a higher level than we thought she would during her first collegiate season."

Alison Zimmer, a senior, is another player who has been a member of the Seminoles' starting five and certainly has the skill and desire to return to the lineup. She has competed in seven events during her career and was a starter for Florida State during the 2000 fall season. She will work hard and compete for playing time.

"I am pleased with the way Alison has competed," said Dillman. "We know she can help this team because she has throughout her career at Florida State. She has to get on the right track mentally to be able to make a difference for us."

Dillman has worked hard to bolster Florida State's depth and has many clubs in her bag when it comes to competing for playing time. Sophomore Katie Quinney and freshman Tyler Johnson look to be the most talented players with a quintet of strong players looking to make a push into the team's upper echelon.

Johnson, a freshman, is also looking to break into the Seminoles' starting five. She brings extensive junior and high school golf experience with her to Florida State after playing at a very high level of golf during her junior career.

Kristina Prestipino, a third newcomer, is another player who will add depth to the roster. She will compete for playing time in her first season. She comes to Florida State with a fabulous attitude and the ability to strike the ball consistently well off the tee.

Lindsay Iding, in her second season in the program, is another player who will battle for playing time as she adds depth to the roster. She gained valuable collegiate experience as a member of the Seminole team as a freshman and displayed future promise and strong abilities during her first year.

A trio of walk-ons will also add depth to the Seminoles' roster.

Sophomore Nichole McCormack and freshmen Amy and Gemma Harris are strong players who could earn the chance to compete for a position in the starting lineup.

As always, a very challenging schedule awaits the Seminoles. As a member of the ACC and located in the South region, Florida State competes against many of the nation's top teams. From the Lady Gator Invitational in February through the ACC and NCAA Championships in April and May, the Seminoles will battle the likes of Duke, Wake Forest, Vanderbilt and Florida.

The Seminoles' returning talent and exciting newcomers along with a solid schedule should put Florida State in good standing for regular season and postseason success in 2002.

Head Coach

Head Coach

Debbie Dillman, who has successfully developed the Florida State women's golf program into one of the top programs in the nation, is in her 18th season as the Seminoles' head coach.

Dillman has developed a perennial national power at Florida State. Her teams consistently rank among the best in the Atlantic Coast Conference and the nation. Her 2001 squad participated in the NCAA Eastern Regional, finished third at the ACC Championship and produced a school-record two All-ACC selections.

Florida State has played in the NCAA Tournament nine times and has won 14 tournament championships since Dillman became head coach. In addition, nine different golfers have captured a total of 14 individual championships.

Dillman herself was honored as the Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year in 1992, the Seminoles' first year in the conference. The Seminoles finished second in the league championship tournament that season and finished only two strokes behind North Carolina for the team championship.

Dillman has established the Seminole program as one of the nation's best by recruiting the nation's top talent to Tallahassee. Her strength as a recruiter is evidenced by the number of former players who have played or are playing professionally and the number of current players who are enjoying tremendous success as collegians.

Among the numerous current pros recruited to play at Florida State by Dillman are Karen Stupples and Tiffany Faucette. Stupples won two tournaments during her collegiate career as a Seminole and qualified for the LPGA Tour on her first attempt. She was a member of Great Britain's 1996 and 1998 Curtis Cup teams. Faucette was a three-year captain of the Seminole women's golf team who is currently a member of the Ladies European Tour. She won the 1997 McDonald's Open Championship and was the runner-up at the 1995 Canadian Women's Amateur Championship.

Despite her success, Dillman refuses to rest on her laurels.

The Davison, Mich., native grew up in an active golf family. Both of Dillman's parents were involved in country club management. Dillman captained her high school golf team for four years and twice was runner-up at the Michigan State High School Championships. For three consecutive years she also captured the Flint Junior Golf Championship, considered to be one of the top junior tournaments in the state of Michigan.

Dillman brought her talents to Tallahassee where she attended Florida State as an under-

graduate and played for the Seminoles from 1979-82. During that time she also worked at the Seminole Golf Course, enabling her to learn both the competitive and management sides of the sport.

Dillman's interests vary from the golf course, to the farm, to the beach. In her spare time she raises Tennessee Walking Horses on her farm just outside Tallahassee. She also has a daughter, Anne Lynn, who is eight years old.



Amy Bond



Assistant Coach

Amy Bond, a 1998 All-Atlantic Coast Conference selection as a player at Florida State, is in her first season as an assistant with the Seminoles' women's golf. Bond is an integral part of the program who assists with all of the coaching and administrative duties of the team.

Bond was the Seminoles' top player from 1997-1999 as she earned 10 top-10 finishes and was named the team's Most Valuable Player each year. She competed in the NCAA Championship tournament as a senior in 1999 (finishing in 30th place) and played in three NCAA regional tournaments during her career.

In addition, she finished in the top 20 in four consecutive ACC Championship tournaments and was the medalist at the 1998 Ryder/Florida State championship tournament. Bond earned 14 top-15 finishes during her collegiate career.

Bond joined the professional ranks and began playing on the SBC Futures Tour in 1999. In 2000, she made 13 cuts in the 17 events she entered and gained tour status that allowed her to play in each of the scheduled SBC events in 2001.

The Ocala, Fla., native earned Academic All-America honors during her senior season and was a four-time ACC Honor Roll selection. She earned her bachelor's degree in sports management in 1997 and her master's in sports administration in 1999. Bond was a member of the Student Athlete Advisory Council (1997-99) and represented Florida State University at the NCAA Leadership Conference in 1999.

Bond also enjoyed a successful junior career before coming to Florida State. She won the Marion County Championship in 1992 and the Yancy Junior Championship in 1991, 1992 and 1994. Bond was a four-year varsity team member at Vanguard High School where she earned all-area honors four times and won the district championship her senior season.

ON CURDT:

A talented golfer and strong competitor who became a member of Florida State's starting lineup upon her arrival as a freshman ... participated in all 10 events during her freshman season including the ACC Championship and NCAA East Regional ... career-low score of even-par 72 came in the third round of the Bryan National Collegiate during the spring of her freshman year ... arrived at Florida State as a very mature golfer who competed at the highest levels during her high school and junior golf career.

SPRING 2001:

Enjoyed a stellar season as the No. 3 player in the Seminoles' lineup ... a member of Florida State's lineup in the ACC Championship and NCAA East Regional ... finished in 20th place in her first career ACC Championship at Walt Disney's Palm Course ... her best round of the ACC Championship was a six-over par 78 in the third round ... was playing well at the NCAA East Regional before she was forced to withdraw (along with teammates Louise Wright and Kristin Tamulis and six other complete teams) after rain and darkness interrupted play in the third and final round ... she had carded two rounds of seven-over par 79 and helped Florida State into the top 12 of the team standings when the event was stopped ... scored a career-best even-par 72 in the third round of the Bryan National Collegiate in Greensboro, N.C. ... helped Florida State to an eighth place finish in the team standings in the nationally power-packed event ... career-low three-round tournament score of 231 in the Bryan National Collegiate ... played well at the Lady Gator Invitational with two scores of 77 and a three-round total of 236 ... averaged a career-low 78.86 strokes per round in 14 rounds.

FALL 2000:

Became a member of the Seminoles' starting five during the first semester of her freshman season ... shot her season-low single-round score of 76 twice - during the NCAA Fall Preview and the Lady Paladin Invitational ... her season-best three-round tournament score of 237 (+21) came in the final event of the fall

season, the Lady Paladin Invitational ... was the only event during the fall 2000 season that she shot at least two of the three rounds with scores in the 70s ... top individual finish was tied for 36th at the Tar Heel Invitational ... averaged 80.71 strokes per round in 14 rounds.



A member of the Seminoles' starting five during the spring 2001 season who will look to maintain her position among Florida State's starters ... participated in both the 2001 ACC Championship and NCAA East Regional ... first career top-25 finish came at the 2001 ACC Championship ... her career-best round of one-over par 73 came in the third round of the Bryan National Collegiate during the spring 2001 season ... a transfer from Georgia State University who earned a varsity letter during the 1998-99 season as a member of the Lady Panther squad.

SPRING 2001:

Earned her position in the Seminoles' starting five and played in both the ACC Championship and NCAA East Regional ... carded a career-low 73 in the third round of the Bryan National Collegiate ... carded a career-high three rounds of scores of 75 or below ... three-over par scores of 75 came in the second round of the Bryan National Collegiate and the second round of the ACC Championship ... her 75 in the second round of the ACC Championship helped the Seminoles move from fifth place (after day one) into fourth place (after day two) and into third place (final) and earn a bid to the NCAA East Regional ... a season-low tournament score of 235 came at the Bryan Tournament while her best career finish (tied for 23rd) came at the ACC Championship ... played well in the Lady Gator Invitational with two scores under 80 (77 and 78) and a three-round tournament score of 237 ... averaged a career-low 80.53 strokes in 14 rounds during five tournaments.

FALL 2000:

Participated in the final two tournaments of the fall and averaged 83.67 strokes in six rounds ... shot a season-low 78 in the second round of the Lady Paladin Invitational ... earned her best tournament gross score (241) and best tournament score vs. par (+25) at the Lady Paladin ... an 84 came in the first round of the Tar Heel Invitational during her first competitive round as a Seminole ... averaged 83.67 strokes in six rounds.

SPRING 2000:

A member of the varsity team at Georgia State but did not see any tournament action.

A member of the varsity team at Georgia State ... played in the College of Charleston Tournament and the University of Mississippi Tournament ... averaged 80.00 strokes per rounds in five rounds during two tournaments.

2001 Florida State Women's Golf Team Enjoys Strong Season – Seminoles Participate in NCAA East Regional and Gain Two All-ACC Selections

REVIEWING THE 2001 SEASON

The Florida State women's golf team participated in the NCAA East Regional, finished third at the ACC Championship and earned four top-10 finishes (in five events) during the 2001 spring season. The Seminoles' participation in the NCAA East Regional marked the eighth time since 1990 that head coach Debbie Dillman has guided the team into post-season play. In addition, the Seminoles' third place finish in the ACC Championship marked the third best finish in the conference championship since Florida State joined the league in 1992.

FLORIDA STATE IN THE NATIONAL RANKINGS

Florida State is ranked No. 42 in the final GolfWeek.com rankings of the 2001 season. The rankings were released following its third place finish at the Atlantic Coast Conference Championship tournament and its participation in the NCAA East Regional. Florida State had four wins against top-25 ranked teams and 41 wins against teams ranked in the top 100. The Seminoles are the third highest rated ACC team in the rankings. Individually, senior Louise Wright (Ipswich, England) finished the season with an individual ranking of 96th after being as high as 75th during the regular season. Sophomore Kristin Tamulis (Naples, Fla.) was ranked 154th in the final individual rankings.

SEMINOLES AT THE NCAA EAST REGIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

Florida State finished in a tie for 15th place at the 2001 NCAA East Regional that was held at Finley Golf Course in Chapel Hill, N.C. The tail end of the final round was cancelled due to a rain delay and darkness with seven teams, including Florida State, still on the course. At that time, officials determined the tournament to be complete and the seven teams still on the course would finish in a tie for 15th place. The individuals who did not finish were all grouped in a tie for 79th place.

Two Seminoles, Carrie Sordel (Windermere, Fla.) and Kelley Henderson (Marietta, Ga.), were able to complete the event before darkness on the event. With seven teams and 29 individuals having to end play prematurely, Sordel finished in a tie for 73rd place while Henderson finished in 77th place.

WRIGHT AND TAMULIS NAMED TO ALL-ACC WOMEN'S GOLF TEAM

Senior Louise Wright and sophomore Kristin Tamulis, members of Florida State's NCAA East Regional participating golf team, were named to the Atlantic Coast Conference women's golf team as selected by a vote of the league's six head coaches. It marked the first time since the Seminoles joined the ACC for the 1992 season that multiple members of the Florida State women's golf team had earned all-conference honors. It also marked the first

time since 1998, when Amy Bond was named to the all-conference team, that a Seminole has been named to the all-conference team. Wright and Tamulis are the sixth and seventh players in school history to be so honored.

TAMULIS FINISHES IN A TIE FOR THIRD AT ACC CHAMPIONSHIP

Sophomore Kristin Tamulis earned the top finish of her career as she finished in a tie for third place at the ACC Championship. Tamulis was outstanding throughout the tournament as she shot 74-74-75 for a seven-over par 223 total. Her 223 total was the second lowest of her career (her top tournament score of 222 came during the 1999 Lady Seminole Classic). In addition, she has now shot eight scores of 75 or below this spring, which is more than she shot during the first 28 events of her career (five).

HOWIE-IN-THE-HILLS, Fla. – The Florida State University women's golf team finished 11th at the rain-shortened NCAA Fall Preview Women's Golf Tournament hosted by Stetson University at Mission Inn's El Campeon Course. The event was shortened from three rounds to two because of rainy weather conditions. The event was halted at 12:30 Saturday afternoon as heavy rains pounded the area. The round continued nearly three hours later, but tournament officials decided to cancel the final round due to the impending threat of Hurricane Gordon. 


Seminoles Finish 14th At Tar Heel Invitational (Oct. 6-8, 2000)

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (Oct. 8) – Senior Louise Wright finished in 25th place in the individual standings with a 19-over par score of 235 and the Florida State University women's golf team finished in 14th place at the Franklin Street Trust/Tar Heel Invitational at Finley Golf Course. Wright finished with her second best three-round tournament total of the fall season in leading the Seminoles. She shot a personal tournament-low 73 in the second round on Saturday. Wright averages a team-low 77.63 strokes per round in 11 rounds this season. Ryder/State Championships (March 30-April 1, 2001)

MIAMI LAKES, Fla. – Florida State senior Louise Wright tied her career high with a second-place finish in the individual standings to propel the Seminole women's golf team to a sixth place finish in the team standings at the Ryder/Florida Women's Collegiate Golf Championships which concluded at Don Shula's Golf Resort on Sunday. The University of Florida won the team championship while Michelle Simpson of Florida International won the individual title. Wright shot a career-best three-round score of 215 and tied her career-best finish of second place. She finished only one stroke behind Simpson as the two players matched each other over the final two days of the tournament. Wright and Simpson shot 69 in Saturday's second round and 73 in Sunday's third and final round. Simpson gained the edge on Friday as she fired an even-par 72 as compared to Wright's one-over par 73. Wright's previous career-low score was 218 at the Lady Seminole Classic in 1999. She tied her career-best finish of second that also came at the Bryan National Collegiate

Championships in 2000. Seminole sophomore Kristin Tamulis finished in a tie for 13th place with an 11-over par score of 227. 
ACC Championships (April 20-22, 2001)

LAKE BUENA VISTA, Fla. – Florida State sophomore Kristin Tamulis shot a near-career low 223 to finish in a tie for 3rd place in the individual standings and the Seminole women's golf team finished third in the team standings at the 13th Annual Atlantic Coast Conference Women's Golf Championship at Disney's Palm Course. It marked the second time the Seminoles had finished third or higher in the last three years. Florida State earned the third place finish with a three-round total of 936. The Seminoles' shot a tournament-best 308 in the final round to surpass North Carolina and moved up from fourth place. The Seminoles outdistanced North Carolina, 945, Maryland, 952 and NC State, 1,024. Duke has now won a record of nine ACC women's golf championships.

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. – The tail end of the final round of the NCAA Eastern Regional Women's Golf Championship was cancelled due to a rain delay and darkness with seven teams, including Florida State, still on the course. The event was delayed nearly two hours between 3 and 5 p.m. because of thunder, lightning and rain. Play was resumed at 5:08, but was halted again at 7:10 due to thunder and lightning. At that time, officials determined the tournament to be complete

and the seven teams still on the course would finish in a tie for 15th place. The individuals who did not finish were all grouped in a tie for 79th place. Each of the seven teams forced to withdraw finished in a tie for 15th place in the final standings. With seven teams and 29 individuals having to end play prematurely, Sordel finished in a tie for 73rd place while Henderson finished in 77th place.

The Seminole women's golf program has a long and rich tradition of success. Since the spring of 1990, Florida State has won eight team championships – an average of nearly one title a year. Equally as impressive are the 50 top-five individual finishes the squad has compiled in just over 100 tournaments since the beginning of the decade.

Individual golfers have made their mark in the Seminole record book as well. Led by Karen Stupples (1993-95), who won two individual tournament championships, a total of six Seminole golfers earned medalist honors at different tournaments. Stupples earned All-America second-team honors in 1995.

Overall, 12 Florida State golfers have posted top-five finishes since 1990. Amy Bond, who completed her standout career in 1999, most recently captured the individual championship of the Ryder-Florida State Championship, defeating Riko Higshio of Florida by one stroke. Bond was an All-ACC selection as a senior.

Florida State made seven consecutive NCAA appearances from 1991-97 and again in 1999 and 2001. The team qualified for the NCAA Tournament four times and made eight regional appearances during the decade of the 1990s.

Overall, 12 Florida State golfers have posted top-five finishes since 1990. Amy Bond, who completed her standout career in 1999, most recently captured the individual championship of the Ryder-Florida State Championship, defeating Riko Higshio of Florida by one stroke. 

This is Tallahassee



Florida State University is located in Tallahassee – the capital city of the state of Florida.

Near, but far from the glaring strips of neon amusement and the castles and crowds of Disney, lies another magical place in the Sunshine State – one of pow-wows, plantations, politics and great pride. Often described as “The Other Florida” with its deep-rooted history, rolling hills, canopy roads of moss-draped oaks, cool climate and Southern-style hospitality, it is a Florida few have seen. It is Tallahassee – Florida with a Southern accent.

Best known as Florida’s capital, Tallahassee is an intimate neo-metropolitan city where the power of state government, the academic and the artistic are complemented by subtle, old-fashioned charm. It is the perfect two or three-day diversion for the more than 41 million annual visitors to Florida and 13 million residents.

Tallahassee touts a menagerie of sights including one of the world’s deepest freshwater springs, site of America’s first Christmas, a wildlife habitat, Capitol buildings, fascinating museums of history, sprawling plantations, highly acclaimed fishing and hunting adventures and

nearby beaches. Spirited area festivals range from celebrations of Tallahassee’s spectacular spring and swamp stomps to genuine rattlesnake roundups and seafood festivals.

With the Gulf of Mexico just 20 miles south and the Georgia border only 14 miles north, Tallahassee rests between the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and the juncture of Florida’s panhandle and peninsula. Nearer in miles to Atlanta than to Miami, Tallahassee more closely resembles its Southern neighbors than Florida in topography, climate and lifestyle.

Accentuating Tallahassee’s Southern persona are lush rolling hills, likened to the seven hills of Rome, and five “official” canopy roads of patriarch oaks. The fertile, rich soil and four distinct, yet pleasant, seasons breed floral brilliance and natural vitality year-round.

Like the city itself, the story of how Tallahassee was chosen as the state capital is rich in history. In 1823, two explorers set out – one on horseback from St. Augustine and the other by boat from Pensacola – to find a permanent, central location for the legislature to convene. The two met at a beautiful site that the Creek and Seminole Indians called “tallahassee” – derived from the words “talwa” meaning “town” and “ahasee” meaning “old.” The rendezvous point remains Florida’s capital.



The "old town" has undergone many changes, but one thing remains the same – it is still a government town fiercely proud and dedicated to preserving its heritage. The Capitol buildings, both old and new, epitomize Tallahassee's perseverance.

The 22nd floor of the New Capitol provides a panoramic scope of a sophisticated Southern city awash in a sea of flowering azaleas, snowy dogwoods, towering pines, fragrant magnolias, and hundreds of shimmering lakes, springs, swamps, rivers and sink holes. Special legislative viewing galleries are open during the legislative session.

Below, in the shade of giant live oaks, proudly stands the Old Capitol, originally constructed in 1845 and restored to its 1902 splendor complete with red-and-white candy-striped awnings, a dome adorned with stained glass, antique furnishings and political memorabilia.

Across from the Old Capitol are the 40-foot twin granite towers of the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial, and the blue stone Union Bank, Florida's oldest surviving financial institution. The nostalgic Old Town Trolley, a replica turn-of-the-century street car, carries passengers through restored Adams Street

Commons to numerous other historical downtown shops for free – unheard of even 100 years ago.

Minutes from downtown lies the Governor's Mansion – which resembles the home of Florida's military hero Andrew Jackson – and the 52-acre natural animal habitat and 1880s farm of the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science, which

provide the rare chance to walk and talk with native Florida animals.

Tallahassee remains firmly linked with the past as evidenced by the unearthed 1539 winter encampment of Spanish Hernando de Soto, the site of the first Christmas celebration in America. Visitors travel back through time as they stand in the shadow of a giant 12,000-year-old American Mastodon at the Museum of Florida History or explore other historical spots including The Knott House that Rhymes, The Columns, San Luis Mission, Lake Jackson State Archaeological Site, Natural Bridge Battlefield, First Presbyterian Church,

Brokaw-McDougall House, Goodwood Plantation and Adams Street Commons. Nearby, alligators lazing in the sunshine and anhinga "snake birds" perched on twisted cypress branches are seen at Wakulla Springs, one of the world's deepest freshwater springs and site of many underwater scenes in the "Tarzan" movies with Johnny Weissmuller and Maureen O'Sullivan. Safaris aboard glass-bottomed and jungle cruise boats whisk visitors within arm's length of "The Other Florida."

Outdoor enthusiasts enjoy adventures including boating and fishing on area lakes, rivers, ponds and the Gulf – just 30 minutes away. Lakes Seminole, Jackson and Talquin are renowned in the bass fishing world for yielding the "big ones," and dense forests offer an abundance of

prize-winning game. Local wildlife areas such as the Florida National Scenic Trail, St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge and Apalachicola National Forest are among many spots for camping, picnicking, swimming, biking and exploring.

Appealing to the strokes of different folks, Tallahassee also features 99 holes of golf on six courses and a proliferation of tennis centers. Sideline athletes cheer the nationally ranked Florida State Seminoles and Florida A&M Rattlers. And always a sure bet are the nearby greyhound races.

A sport of sorts, shopping at two regional malls and many specialty centers offer many "playing options" – from popular chains to curiosity and antique shops.

Cultural interests are sparked by widely acclaimed museums and galleries and elaborate entertainment at the 14,000-seat Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center.

Tallahassee is a collaboration of power-play politics and classical character splashed with a twist of Southern beauty and charm. Tallahassee is Florida with a Southern accent.

On June 26, judges from the National Civic League named Tallahassee as one of 10 cities to win the prestigious All-America City (AAC) award from the 1999 All-America City conference in Philadelphia. The All-America City award is the most prestigious and coveted award a community can win. The annual award recognizes exemplary grassroots and problem-solving efforts of communities that cooperatively tackle challenges and achieve measurable results. Judging is based on the overall level of community involvement in solving critical local problems, including public-private partnerships.

"This is clearly one of the most exciting things to ever happen to Tallahassee," said a jubilant Mayor Scott Maddox. "For those of us who call Tallahassee home, the All-America City award verifies what we've known for so long – that we have one of the greatest cities in all of America!"





This is Florida State

Florida State University, a coeducational graduate research institution, stands among the nation's elite in both academics and athletics. Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida and building rapidly on the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, the university has emerged over the past 52 years as an institution of national and international esteem. Its stature is evidenced by a number of additions to its record of excellence in the 1990s:

- In 1994, Florida State was classified a "Research University I" by the Carnegie Foundation, placing it among the nation's top research universities.

- In 1999, FSU was ranked as the most wired university in Florida, and 44th in the nation, in the "100 Most Wired Colleges" ranking by Yahoo! Internet Life magazine.

- FSU established the Bryan Hall Living-Learning Community in fall 1994, a unique academic residential program for freshmen designed to create a close-knit learning environment that benefits from the assets of a large research university. Building on the success of the Bryan Hall program, the Broward Hall Social Sciences Residential Program in Public and International Affairs was launched in fall 1999.

- Former Vice President of the United States Al Gore spoke at the dedication of the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory at FSU in 1994. The National Science Foundation established the \$100 million magnet lab in 1990 at FSU, which runs the facility in partnership with the Los Alamos National Laboratory and the University of Florida. A Nobel laureate in physics and a top Russian physicist were among the first scholars drawn to the faculty. The world's largest magnet – two stories high and capable of generating 45 tesla or 1 million times the Earth's magnetic field – was installed in 1995 at the NHMFL, located in Innovation Park, an off-campus research complex.



The University Center is one of the most popular buildings on the FSU campus.

- FSU created the first multipurpose student identification/banking card. The Card Application Technology Center is a national leader in "smart card" systems.

- In fall 1994, the first tenants moved into the east side of the \$85 million University Center, a classroom and office facility at Doak Campbell Stadium. With the completion of the west side in 1996, University Center now provides 550,000 square feet of much needed academic space and a centralized location for student services.

- In 1998, the FSU School of Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts' graduate film program was ranked in the top 10 in the nation and third among public university film programs. Offering training for one of Florida's fastest growing industries, FSU con-

ferred its first master's degrees in film in 1991 and its first bachelor's in film in 1993. The Film School's students have produced numerous national and international award-winning films.

- The Center for Civic Education and Service was established in 1994, aimed at promoting community involvement and civic responsibility as integral elements of the liberal arts education at FSU. The center supports such service-learning programs as Into the Streets, a one-day community service project for freshmen, and Gadsden ESL (English as a Second Language), which provides educational services to migrant farmworkers. Through ServScript, students' service may be recorded on their official academic transcript.

- Florida State ranked eighth in popularity nationwide among all prospective students, fifth among prospective African-American students and fourth among prospective Hispanic/Latino students, based on the number of students who request that their Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores be sent to an institution. FSU was the only institution listed among the top 10 choices of all three prospective student categories.

- FSU ranked seventh in the nation among public universities for 1993-97 in the number of African-American Ph.D. students it graduated.

- To better understand the world's cultural diversity, FSU undergraduate students are required to complete at least two courses that focus on diverse traditions beyond Western civilization. The multicultural study requirement, in effect since 1991, complements a long-established liberal studies program at FSU.

- In 1999, FSU created the Institute on War World II and the Human Experience to "save the memories of those who saved the world" by collecting letters, diaries, memoirs and photos from participants in the war effort, in order to preserve the materials for classroom teaching, scholarly research and public viewing.

- Capping more than a decade of national prominence in intercollegiate athletics, Florida State's athletic teams, nicknamed "Seminoles," joined the Atlantic Coast Conference as its ninth member in 1990. The FSU football team won the 1993 National Championship and its quarterback, Charlie Ward, won the university's first Heisman Trophy.

- The Dr. Bobby E. Leach Center, a state-of-the-art student recreation facility, with



weight-training facilities, a pool, saunas, basketball and racket-sport courts, was completed in 1991.

- The Appleton Museum of Art in Ocala, its vast art collection and an eminent scholar chair were donated to FSU and Central Florida Community College in 1990.

- FSU acquired the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota, home to the graduate theater program, the FSU/Asolo Conservatory of Professional Actor Training.

As this list of highlights attests, Florida State has excelled in the 1990s with exceptional strength, energy and vision for the future. Under the leadership of the university's 12th president, Talbot "Sandy" D'Alemberte, who took office in January 1994, FSU will continue to build on the foundation of its history of excellence in scholarship, research and service.

A senior member of the 10-member State University System, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act and began in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

Today, FSU's operating budget is \$525 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$112 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the university: the FSU Foundation, which raised \$301 million in private gifts during the university's first capital campaign, Seminole Boosters and the FSU Alumni Association.

The main campus is spread over 455.5 acres in Tallahassee; FSU, which has one of the smallest campuses in the SUS, actively acquired land in the 1990s after years of being landlocked at 347 acres. FSU owns 1,308 acres in Leon, Bay, Franklin and Sarasota counties.

Within the state, the university maintains facilities at its 25-acre campus in Panama City, its Marine Laboratory in the Gulf of Mexico, the Appleton Museum in Ocala and the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Augustus B. Turnbull III Florida Conference Center on the edge of the campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

For years, FSU has reached far beyond Florida through international programs in Switzerland, France, Panama, Costa Rica, Spain, Russia and the Caribbean. FSU's student centers in Florence, Italy and London,

England, are considered by many to be the nation's best in Europe.

Florida State offers 289 graduate and undergraduate degree programs through its eight colleges – Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education, Engineering (operated jointly with Florida A&M University, an historically black institution); Human Sciences, Law and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the Reubin Askew School of Public Administration and Policy) – and eight schools – Criminology and Criminal Justice; Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

With 1,731 members, the FSU faculty has included nine National Academy of Sciences elected members, nine American Academy of Arts and Sciences fellows and five Nobel laureates. It is backed by 3,002 administrative/professional and support staff.


Library holdings at Florida State include 2.2 million book titles, 16,384 serials and 4.7 million microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked by computer to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac

Science Center Library is located at the heart of the university's science research complex. FSU also maintains extensive music, library science and law libraries. Also providing research opportunities is the tandem Van de Graaff Superconducting Accelerator Laboratory, which houses two powerful atom smashers.

Graduate students, who number more than 5,685, pursue advanced degrees in fields as diverse as business administration and theoretical particle physics. A majority of research done at FSU is the direct result of student effort, culminating in numerous books, monographs and journal articles relating to the whole spectrum of intellectual interests and the practical needs of society.

FSU, a residential campus, places a high priority on its 34,500 students and their needs and interests (of the student population 45 percent are male, 55 percent are female, 21.7 percent are minorities, 2.6 percent are foreign students). The University Honors Program, Disabled Student Services, International Student and Scholar Center, Student Government Association, Flying High Circus and intramural sports are among more

than 200 organizations and activities in which students may participate. Situated in the heart of the state's thriving capital city, Florida State's main campus blends Jacobean Revival and modern styles of architecture with the oaks, pines, dogwoods, palms and azaleas of North Florida. Florida State continues to progress and grow – from its pre-Civil War foundation as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, through the early 20th century as the academically respected Florida State College for Women, (returning to coeducational status as a university in 1947) to its modern development as an acclaimed research institution, a top-ranked competitor in intercollegiate athletics and as a standard-setter in the basic sciences and the performing arts. Florida State University enters the 21st century with excellence in all areas of its mission – teaching, research and public service.

Golf Courses

The Seminoles play and practice on the best and most challenging courses in the state of Florida.

Quality practice facilities and championship style golf are crucial to your improvement in the game of golf. The athletic administration and the support of the boosters at Florida State have helped build a first-class practice complex to promote the development of the current and future Seminole golfers. The improvements and enhancements of the golf course and its facilities will provide Florida State with one of the finest training complexes in the country.

THE DAVE MIDDLETON LEARNING CENTER

During the fall of 2001, Florida State completed a \$5.7 million dollar project that dramatically enhances the facilities for the Seminoles' men's and women's golf teams. A new clubhouse featuring coach's offices, team lockers, an instructional auditorium, a traditions area and an exercise room will be completed. An exclusive practice academy and a video-teaching center will be part of the Florida State golf home.





DON A. VELLER SEMINOLE GOLF COURSE

A university-owned facility that has undergone extensive improvements since 1998. Projects involving the addition of supplemental irrigation and the construction of several new greens and tees have resulted in a well-conditioned golf course with a challenging design.

GOLDEN EAGLE COUNTRY CLUB

Heralded as one of Tom Fazio's personal favorites, Golden Eagle is a special place for the women's golf team and is considered to be the best golf course in Tallahassee – a true championship-style layout and a staple for team play.

SOUTHWOOD

A Fred Couples design developed by the Arvida Group. The staff and membership at have given the Seminole women's golf team unlimited access to their excellent facilities which gives our players an opportunity to practice and play at any time. The quality of the Southwood course makes for an environment that is conducive to overall personal and team improvement.

KILLEARN COUNTRY CLUB

Killearn's 27-hole championship golf course challenges players of all skill levels with its rolling hills and tree-lined fairways. As the former site of the PGA Tallahassee Open and the LPGA Centel Classic this par 72 course offers a 7,006-yard layout. Matching the caliber of the golf course, the Club offers a well-constructed practice range and a short game facility.

CAPITAL CITY COUNTRY CLUB

Capital City Country Club is the oldest venue on the Seminoles' playing rotation. It features a shorter layout of 6,550 yards with narrow fairways and fast, undulating greens which help FSU prepare for the demanding playing conditions at the NCAA Championships. The membership is an integral part of the history of the Seminole golf program, and supports the team in every way possible.

Academic Support



Athletic Academic Support Mission Statement

The primary focus of the Athletic Academic Support Program is to provide an environment that facilitates the academic success of each student-athlete. Student success is encouraged through competent academic counseling, study skills development, individualized assessment and support, and a wide array of tutorial services.

An Overview of an Award-Winning Academic Support Program

Academic, personal and professional support is essential to college success. At The Florida State University, we have developed an outstanding support program that enables student-athletes to reach their full potential.

Director, Mark Meleney states, "Our philosophy is to offer an academic support program integrated with the total University that will assist all student-athletes with the transition into college and provide continued support in all phases of academic and professional development, culminating with graduation, job placement or graduate school."

Our program operates on a "proactive" rather than "reactive" approach. Our academic staff does not wait for crises to occur. We gather important background information on each entering student-athlete, build an academic profile and develop individualized support programs which are tailored to the unique needs of each student-athlete. We also stay informed on the daily progress of the student-athletes through consistent communication with our faculty.

The academic support unit is housed in the \$126 million dollar, state-of-the-art University Center Complex. It includes private study carrels, a tutorial study area, and a computer lab outfitted with 20 IBM compatible computers and laser jet printers. In addition, the athletic skyboxes are used for group and individualized tutorial instruction. The academic support staff is comprised of a director, an administrative assistant, five academic counselors, several graduate assistants, individualized learning specialists, and a cadre of approximately 50 tutors and mentors.

Mark Meleney was named the program's director in 1997 and brings 13 years of advising experience to the position. Over the past seven years, Meleney has played an integral

role in the development of a comprehensive program of student-athlete support, which in 1996 won the "Program of Excellence" award from *Athletic Management Magazine*.

Academic Support Tutorial Program

The Athletic Department at Florida State University has made a commitment to providing our student-athletes with one of the finest and most comprehensive tutorial programs in the nation. The tutorial program is just one of several key support services that is available to all student-athletes as they progress towards their ultimate goal of obtaining a college degree. We hire approximately 70 tutors a year, from a variety of academic departments, who are committed to providing a proactive, individualized approach in assisting student-athletes with course comprehension and study skills. The tutors are usually seniors or graduate-level students who have outstanding academic backgrounds. Tutorial assistance is available for all academic course work and may be obtained by filling out a tutorial request form at the beginning of the semester, or as needed.

Mentor Program

Academic Mentors are academic role models who have demonstrated the ability to

teach and give guidance in areas of academic developmental skills. Each semester, mentors begin the process by sitting down with their assigned student-athletes and assist them in identifying all of their academic responsibilities for that semester.

A calendar is developed which becomes a visual blueprint of each course's academic requirements. This tool introduces the student-athlete to the concept of time management. Students learn to plan projects days and weeks in advance. Such planning aids them in developing strong study and organizational habits.

Mentors are also responsible for providing assistance in the development of skills such as note taking, test preparation, and communication with faculty. In essence, mentors become an extension of the academic counselor as they keep the academic performance of their student-athletes under close observation and report to the academic counselors each week.

The N.O.L.E.S. Program

New Opportunities for Leadership, Education and Service

Developed by the Florida State University Department of Athletics, the NOLES program represents a commitment to the total growth and development of the student-athlete. This program establishes an administrative commitment to academic and athletic excellence. Those efforts will be supported with programs and services in personal development, career development and community service.

Personal Development

Fostering the development of personal growth is a fundamental component of the NOLES program. These support programs ensure that the student-athlete will be provided opportunities to focus on personal growth issues such as values clarification, goal setting, fiscal planning, decision making and personal responsibility. Programming focuses on helping student-athletes develop a healthy lifestyle while they are at Florida State and habits that will benefit them for life.

Career Development


Preparing for life after college sports is a major focus of the NOLES Career Development program. The program is designed to work cooperatively with the University's Career Services to acquaint students with the job search process, provide networking opportunities and ultimately assist with job placement. This program places a priority on the development of the total person, with the goal of developing individuals who will have rewarding careers and productive lifestyles after they leave Florida State.

Community Service

The Florida State University women's golf team, regularly donates its time to the Dick Howser Center for Childhood Services as part of an expansive community service program sponsored by the FSU Department of Athletics. The members of the team spread cheer nearly every week to the children and individuals with disabilities who participate in the program. The organization is named for the late Dick Howser,



former Seminole baseball head coach and manager of the New York Yankees and Kansas City Royals. The center is a charitable organization that receives monetary support from the citizens of Tallahassee and its surrounding communities. "Spending time with the children at the



Howser Center is very rewarding for the members of our team," said sophomore Carrie Sordel. "We are fortunate to be able to get to know the children and in some cases make a difference in their lives. We are as

happy to spend time with them, as they seem to be with us each time we go to the center.

Visiting the center and playing with the children has become part of our weekly schedule. We plan our academic and practice schedules around the time we can spend at the center." The center began as a small parent group in 1974 and, 30 years later, serves most communities in the Big Bend area through preschool centers in Crawfordville, Monticello, Quincy and Tallahassee. The centers offer a variety of services for young children, including childcare, educational services and early intervention. Children with special needs can receive physical, occupational, speech and audiological therapy services. Among those enrolled are infants, toddlers and preschool students. In addition, children who

have delayed development or have been diagnosed with medical or genetic conditions may be eligible to attend sessions at one of the center's clinics. "It's very rewarding for us, as adults, to help brighten the lives of the children at the Howser Center," said junior Kristin Tamulis. "We look forward to going to the center each week and having fun with the children. It is great to see their faces light up when we walk in the door. Just seeing the expressions on their faces makes the time we spend with them worth while to us."

Leadership Development

The Florida State University Department of Athletics is committed to developing programs of excellence that foster leadership development. The foundation of the leadership development program will be the two councils that represent the student-athletes at the University.

The Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) serves as the advisory board to the NOLES program and the athletics administration. The prestigious board, comprised of two representatives of each athletic team at FSU, also recommends programming and serves as a liaison between student-athletes and the athletics administration. The Advisory Council plans and implements various events for student-athletes and serves as the department's most visible ambassadors. The SAAC planned and hosted the annual Golden Nole banquet for the first time last year and recently planned such events as orientation for incoming student-athletes and the back to school picnic.

The following information is provided by the Florida State Office of Compliance for prospective student-athletes. It is intended as a guideline to introduce some of the rules governing NCAA athletic involvement.

Who is permitted to recruit for FSU?

Only Florida State University coaches who have successfully completed the NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination on an annual basis may be involved in the recruitment process. Representatives of our athletics interests may not make any recruiting contacts. This includes letters, telephone calls or face-to-face contact on or off campus with a prospect or the prospect's parents.

Key terms you should know

You become a prospective student-athlete if you have started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, you become a prospective

student-athlete if the college provides you (or your relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide to prospective students generally.

A contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's legal guardian and an institutional staff member or athletic representative during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of greeting. NOTE: At the Division I level, athletic representatives (boosters) may not contact you for the purpose of recruiting. A college

coach may contact you in person off the college campus beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year in high school.

An evaluation is any off-campus activity designed to access your academic qualifications or athletic ability, including any visit to your high school (during which no contact occurs) or the observation of any practice or competition in which you participate.

During your senior year, you can have one expense-paid official visit to a particular campus. You may receive no more than five visits. During your official visit, which may not exceed 48 hours, you may receive round-trip transportation between your home and the campus, and you (and your parents) may receive meals, lodging and complimentary admission to campus athletics events.

Phone calls and letters

Phone calls from faculty members and coaches (but not boosters) are permitted beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year. A college coach or faculty member is limited to one telephone call per week except when it is:

- During the five days immediately before your official visit to the university
- On the day of a coach's off-campus contact with you
- During the time beginning with the initial National Letter of Intent signing date in your sport through the two days after signing date.

Letters from coaches and faculty members (but not boosters) are not permitted until September 1 at the beginning of your junior year in high school. A Division I university may provide you with the following printed materials:

- General correspondence, including letters, U.S. Postal Service postcards and institutional note cards
- Game programs which may not include posters and one Student-Athlete Handbook can be provided only during official or unofficial visits to the university's campus
- NCAA educational information
- Pre-enrollment information subsequent to signing a National Letter of Intent with the university
- One athletic publication which may include only one color of printing inside the covers
- Official academic, admissions and student services publications published or videotapes produced by the institution and available to all students
- Schedule cards

- Questionnaires which may be provided prior to your junior year
- Summer camp brochures which may be provided prior to your junior year.

Alumni and boosters' do's and don'ts

You may forward information about prospective student-athletes to the appropriate coaches.

You may have contact with a prospect regarding permissible pre-enrollment activities such as summer employment, provided the prospect has already signed a National Letter of Intent and the Compliance Office is aware that you are making these contacts in regard to employment.

You may have a telephone conversation with a prospect only if the prospect initiates the call. Such a call may not be prearranged by an institutional staff member and you are not permitted to have a recruiting conversation, but may exhibit normal civility. You must refer any questions about our athletics programs to an athletics department staff member/coach.

You may view a prospect's contest at your own initiative provided you do not contact the prospect or his/her parents. In addition, you may not contact a prospect's coach, principal or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.

You may continue established family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with sons and daughters of these families are permitted as long as they are not made for recruiting purposes or encouraged by Florida State University coaches.

You may not become involved in making arrangements to receive money or financial aid of any kind for a prospect or the prospect's family and friends.

You may not make contact with a prospective student-athlete and his/her parents when the prospect is on campus for an official or unofficial recruiting visit.


You may not transport, pay or arrange for payment of transportation costs for a prospect and his/her relatives or friends to visit campus (or elsewhere).

You may not pay or arrange for payment of summer camp registration fees for a prospect.

You may not provide anything to a prospect, the prospect's family or friends without prior approval from the athletics' Compliance Office.



Strength & Conditioning

The strength and conditioning program at Florida State University is designed to improve athletic performance through an individualized regimen of stretching, lifting, speed, power, agility and conditioning drills. The goal of the program is to maximize the performance of the Seminole golfers while reducing the risk of injury.

Physical development is critical in order to excel at the collegiate level. The strength and conditioning staff individually customizes programs for each of the Seminole student-athletes beginning with a pre-conditioning program before the season gets underway.

The focus of the strength and conditioning staff revolves around building stronger and more well-conditioned athletes. The staff is goal-orientated towards providing the Florida State student-athletes with the best instruction, tools and resources in the nation.

Preparing the Seminole student-athletes to be successful on the golf course encompasses exercises that match the characteristics of the game.

Strength and conditioning for golf must be carefully planned and geared to a golf build. Preparing the Seminole student-athletes to be successful on the golf course encompasses exercises that match the characteristics of the game. The best way to build strength for golf is to understand the principals that govern the sport itself, then apply the exercises, sets and repetitions to being successful on the golf course.



Assistant strength and conditioning coach Bryan McCall works directly with Florida State's men's and women's golf teams.

McCall, who is in his first year at Florida State, individually customizes programs for each of the Seminole golfers. His program begins before the season and continues

throughout the student-athletes' competitive season. The strength and conditioning staff and Florida State takes a great pride in customizing and carrying out programs to help the student-athletes realize their full athletic potential.

McCall, who graduated from the University of Texas at Arlington is a member of the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches Association, and a member of the Allied Health Society. He earned his bachelor's degree in exercise science in 1999 after beginning his academic career at Stephen F. Austin University.

McCall began his strength and conditioning career on the collegiate level at Southern Methodist University where he worked with the men's and women's basketball, volleyball and swimming and diving programs. In addition, he assisted (as he does at Florida State) with all strength and conditioning activities for the Mustangs' football team. Among his prized pupils are former SMU swimmer Martina Maravcova, who earned a silver medal at the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games.



A Closer Look: The ACC



The Atlantic Coast Conference boasts a rich tradition of success in women's golf. Each of the five teams in the ACC is considered to be among the best in the nation and together for the top women's golf conference in the nation.

Florida State joined the ACC and began competing for the conference championship in 1992. The Seminoles have been one of the most successful women's golf teams in the league since their arrival. Florida State has finished second in the conference three times (1992, 1995 and 1999) and finished third last season. Head coach Debbie Dillman was named the ACC coach of the year in 1992.

Florida State earned an ACC women's golf first in 2001 as Kristin Tamulis and Louise Wright both earned all-conference honors marking the first time two Seminoles had earned ACC honors during the same season.


Florida State finished third in the ACC championship in 2001 which was held at Disney's Palm Course in Lake Buena Vista, Fla. Duke freshman Virada Nirapathpongorn won the individual title with an even-par 216 score and the Blue Devils won the team championship with an 899 team score at the 13th Annual Atlantic Coast Conference Women's Golf championship at Disney's Palm Course. It marked the third consecutive year a Duke player had won the individual championship and the conference-record sixth consecutive team victory for the Blue Devils.




