ear, but far from the glaring strips of neon amusement, and the castles and crowds of Disney, lies another magical place in the Sunshine State — one of pow-wows, plantations, politics and great pride. Often described as "The Other Florida" with its deep-rooted history, rolling hills, canopy roads of moss-draped oaks, cool climate and Southern-style hospitality; it is a Florida few have seen. It is Tallahassee — Florida with a Southern accent.

Best known as Florida's capital, Tallahassee is an intimate neometropolitan city where the power of state government, the academic and the artistic are complemented by subtle, old-fashioned charm. It is the perfect two- or three-day diversion for the more than 41 million annual visitors to Florida and 13 million residents.


Tallahassee touts a menagerie of sights including one of the world's deepest freshwater springs, site of America's first Christ-

mas, a wildlife habitat, Capitol buildings, fascinating museums of history, sprawling plantations, highly acclaimed fishing and hunting adventures and nearby beaches. Spirited area festivals range from celebrations of Tallahassee's spectacular spring and swamp stomps to genuine rattlesnake roundups and seafood festivals.

With the Gulf of Mexico just 20 miles south and the Georgia border only 14 miles north, Tallahassee rests between the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and the juncture of Florida's panhandle and peninsula. Nearer in miles to Atlanta than to Miami, Tallahassee more closely resembles its Southern neighbors than Florida in topography, climate and lifestyle.

Accentuating Tallahassee's Southern persona are lush rolling hills, likened to the seven hills of Rome, and five "official" canopy roads of patriarch oaks. The fertile, rich soil and four distinct, yet pleasant, seasons breed floral brilliance and natural vitality year-round.

Like the city itself, the story of how Tallahassee was chosen as the state capital is rich in history. In 1823, two explorers set out — one on horseback from St. Augustine and the other by boat from Pensacola — to find a permanent, central location for the Legislature to convene. The two met at a beautiful site that the Creek and Seminole Indians called "tallahassee" —



derived from the words "talwa" meaning town and "ahasee" meaning old. The rendezvous point remains Florida's capital.

The "old town" has undergone many changes, but one thing remains the same — it is still a government town fiercely proud and dedicated to preserving its heritage. The Capitol buildings, both old and new, epitomize Tallahassee's perseverance.

The 22nd floor of the New Capitol provides a panoramic scope of a sophisticated Southern city awash in a sea of flowering azaleas, snowy dogwoods, towering pines, fragrant magnolias, and hundreds of shimmering lakes, springs, swamps, rivers and sink holes. Special legislative viewing galleries are open during the legislative session.


Minutes from downtown lies the Governor's Mansion, which resembles the home of Florida's military hero Andrew Jackson; and the 52-acre natural animal habitat and 1880s farm of the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science, which provide the rare chance to walk and talk with native Florida animals.

Tallahassee remains firmly linked with the past as evidenced by the unearthed 1539 winter encampment of Spanish Hernando de Soto, the site of the first Christmas celebration in America. Visitors travel back through time as they stand in the shadow of a giant 12,000-year-old American Mastodon at the Museum of Florida History or explore other historical spots including The Knott House that Rhymes, The Columns, San Luis Mission, Lake Jackson State Archaeological Site, Natural Bridge Battlefield, First Presbyterian Church, Brokaw-McDougall House, Goodwood Plantation and Adams Street Commons.

Appealing to the strokes of different folks, Tallahassee also features 99 holes of golf on six courses and a proliferation of tennis centers. Sideline athletes cheer the nationally-ranked Florida State Seminoles, Florida A&M Rattlers and the Tallahassee Tiger Sharks, of the East Coast Hockey League. And always a sure bet are the nearby greyhound races.

Cultural interests are sparked by widely-acclaimed museums and galleries and elaborate entertainment at the 14,000-seat Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center.

Tallahassee is a collaboration of power-play politics and classical character splashed with a twist of Southern beauty and charm. Tallahassee is Florida with a Southern accent.

lorida State University, which will mark its golden anniversary as a coeducational graduate research institution in 1997, has joined the nation's elite in both academics and athletics.

Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida and building rapidly on the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, the University has emerged over the past 49 years as an institution of national and international esteem.

Florida State is excelling in the 1990's with exceptional strength, energy and vision for the future. Under the leadership of the University's 12th president, Talbot "Sandy" D'Alemberte, who took office in January 1994, FSU will continue to build on the foundation of its history of excellence in scholarship, research and service.

A senior member of the 10-member State University System, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act and began in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

Today, FSU's operating budget is \$452.5 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$99.9 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the University; FSU Foundation, which raises millions in private gifts to support academics, Seminole Boosters and FSU Alumni Association.

The main campus is spread over 450.6 acres in Tallahassee; FSU, which has one of the smallest campuses in the SUS, has been actively acquiring land in the 1990s after years of being landlocked at 847 acres. FSU owns 1,303 acres in Leon, Bay, Franklin and Sarasota counties.

Florida State offers 283 graduate and undergraduate degree programs through its eight colleges — Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering (operated jointly with Florida A&M University, a historically black institution); Human Sciences; Law; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the Reubin Askew School of Public Administration and Policy) — and eight schools — Criminology and Criminal Justice; Library and Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

Library holdings at Florida State include 2.1 million book titles,



18,296 serials and 4.4 million microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked by computer to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library is located at the heart of the University's science research complex. FSU also maintains extensive music, library science and law libraries.

Graduate students, who number more than 5,856, pursue advanced degrees in fields as diverse as business administration and theoretical particle physics. A majority of research done at FSU is the direct result of student effort, culminating in numerous books, monographs and journal articles relating to the whole


spectrum of intellectual interests and the practical needs of society.

FSU, a residential campus, places a high priority on its 30, 268 students and their needs and interests (of the student population: 45 percent are male; 55 percent are female; 18.5 percent are minorities; and 2.4 percent are foreign students). The University Honors Program, Disabled Student Services, International Student Center, Student Government, Flying High Circus and intramural sports are among more than 200 organizations and activities in which students can participate.

Situated in the heart of the state's thriving capital city, Florida State's main campus blends Gothic and modern styles of architecture with the oaks, pines, dogwoods, palms and azaleas of North Florida.

Florida State continues to progress and grow from its pre-Civil War foundation as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, through the early 20th century as the academically respected Florida State College for Women, returning to coeducational status as a university in 1947, to its modern development as an acclaimed research institution, a top-ranked competitor in intercollegiate athletics and as a standard-setter in the basic sciences and the performing arts.

In all areas of its mission — excellence in teaching, research and public service — Florida State University is advancing boldly toward the 21st century.

hough there were some obstacles to overcome in 1995's inaugural season, 1996 will bring a whole new look to the Seminoles in their second stanza. Returning are ACC recordsmashing goalkeeper Melissa Juhl, leading goal and point scorers Alexandra Osorio and Lauren Lynch, plus top-defender and

Team MVP Janine Lavoie. Also returning are po-

tential ACC-superstar Janna Walkup, who sustained injury early last season, and

speedy midfielder Jessica Driscoll.

Joining the team this season are a number of freshmen with all-state and MVP honors, not to mention a tremendous amount of international playing experience.

The program's secondever recruiting class is led by a group of talented freshmen: midfielders **Kasey McCall**, **Erin Grimsley** and **Leslie Del Rio**, goalkeeper **Jamie Gurtov** and defender **Autumn Swofford**.

Along with junior transfer midfielder **Justina Torres** from St. Thomas Univer-

sity, the Seminoles will also have a group of strong athletes from the "Great White North" join the team. The Canadian contingent is led by one of the youngest carded players ever in the Canadian national program, freshman midfielder **Angela Bonaffino**, plus two highly talented senior transfers with World Cup experience, forwards **Kelley Poole** and **Nicole Sedgwick**. Poole was an NAIA All-American at the University of British Columbia and Sedgwick played for the Canadian World Cup team while attending Simon Fraser University in British Columbia.

"We have a young program again. Although we have a number of returning athletes, most of our scholarship athletes are sophomores," said Head Coach **Heather Kerby-Nelson**.

The Seminoles soccer schedule for 1996 is most favorable for the Tribe as they have an equal amount of games at home (9) as they do on the road (9), against last year's five home games. While the team was on the road the whole month of October in 1995, five of eight games will be played at the Seminole Intramural Soccer Complex during that month.

Added to this year's schedule are 10 new non-conference opponents: Appalachian State, East Carolina, Furman, Georgia State, Jacksonville, Jacksonville State, Mississippi, North Florida, South Alabama and Tennessee.

With only two home ACC games last season, FSU will play five in Tallahassee. These games are highlighted by perennial top-ranked North Carolina, with Top 10 Virginia, N.C. State and Clemson added in. The Seminoles hope to notch their first conference win during 1996, with their best chance coming against Wake Forest in the final regular season showdown, prior to the ACC Tournament.

Here is a look at the position breakdowns.

FORWARDS

The Seminoles will have a veteran frontline when they march the warpath into their second season. Most of the Tribe scoring threat is built around this striker position. With an excellent blend of size and speed the 'Noles look to have an abundance of talent at this position.

Now that **Janna Walkup** of Orlando is healthy, she is ready to show why she was named the 1994 Female Athlete of the Year by the *Orlando Sentinel*. According to Kerby-Nelson, "Walkup is one of the strongest athletes you'll find in the ACC."

Miami native **Alexandra Osorio**, who was one of two players to start in all of FSU's 19 matches will anchor the frontal attack. The South Florida-native led the team in points, while owning team leading stats in goals (6) and assists (3).

"She (Osorio) didn't have the season she is capable of," said Kerby-Nelson. "She was nursing an ankle injury all of September. Alex is a completely dedicated athlete."

Team leader for shots on goal **Lauren Lynch** of Kennesaw, Ga., will provide a lot of depth at forward if she does not get the starting nod. She tied for the team lead with six goals in 1995, while finishing second with 14 points.

"She (Lynch) might move to right wing in the midfield, because we've added Kelley (Poole). Lauren will definitely create a stir whichever position she plays."

The Seminoles have bolstered the forward position by adding some top players from the Canadian national program, **Kelley Poole** of British Columbia. A senior transfer from Simon Fraser University in B.C., Poole, along with Walkup, will bring great scoring threat from 35 yards and in.

If the 'Noles get into a must-score situation then look for Kerby-Nelson to insert another Canadian national team player and former University of British Columbia athlete and native **Nicole Sedgwick** to move in from her defensive post. Sedgwick has a lot of experience at striker, playing that position against some of the best national teams in the world.

MIDFIELDERS


The position where most of Kerby-Nelson's off-season recruiting took place. If any impact players emerge in '96, the midfield has the best chance of providing those athletes. Kerby-Nelson added five midfielders to the roster, all with very talented resumes.

Lauren Lynch, due to the abundance of talent at forward, will see a generous amount of action at the right wing. According to Kerby-Nelson, "Lauren can play either side of the field due to her excellent speed."

With the large amount of recruiting at this position, too much youth might be a question. But all have legitimate talent.

"United States national pool invitee **Kasey McCall** of Richardson, Tex., will be the attacking midfielder because of her aggressiveness," said Kerby-Nelson. "She can be brilliant. She has seen experience against current U.S. national team players."





According to Kerby-Nelson, "Angela Bonaffino (Ontario, Canada), one of the youngest carded players ever from the Canadian national program, is gifted with probably one of the nicest touches in the ACC. She is left-footed, which is unique. She'll give us a chance to open up the field and is a threat to score from about 35 yards out."

Lenexa, Kan. native **Erin Grimsley**, who has great size at 5-9 and quick speed, will probably see time at left wing. The three-time Kansas state champion earned all-everything (league, county and state) each year on the varsity squad.

Miami Springs' **Leslie Del Rio** will further the depth at midfield, according to Kerby-Nelson "she has excellent cross passing ability along with great speed."

Marietta, Ga. native Jessica Driscoll had a productive season at midfield last season chipping in three goals and two assists. Other players who saw time last season that will shore up the midfield in the substitution role are Boca Raton's Allison Hogan, Maitland's Kelly Huff and Chattanooga, Tenn.-native Katie Lunn. Last season's "Red Dog" award for team dedication went to Lunn.

Jennifer Yocca, a senior from Davie, and junior transfer from St. Thomas University **Justina Torres** of Miami are both utility players who will see time at midfield and up front.

"Against the U.S. team she had the job of shutting down Mia Hamm. I personally believe that Mia is the best player in the world right now and she didn't score," said Kerby-Nelson. "That is a definite pat on the back to Sedge."

Deerfield Beach native **Kelly Duffek** and **Hogan** will see time at the stalker position. Duffek had a goal last season against West Florida in FSU's inaugural home match.

Wesley Chapel's **Molly Nye**, and defense recruit from Chapel Hill, N.C. **Autumn Swofford** will add much needed depth to the team. Yet each will have the opportunity to fight for the final starting position. Alpharetta, Ga. native **Jacki Stradtman**, who appeared in 16 matches last season might have to medical redshirt the 1996 season with a knee injury.

GOALKEEPERS

Not much change can be made to this position. Last season Marietta, Ga.-native **Melissa Juhl** single handedly thwarted numerous scoring attempts. She helped put FSU's name into distinction with two ACC records, in otherwise, a season that could have easily been forgotten. She holds the record for goalie saves (155) and was the lead figure in securing the team-goalie saves (197). Juhl didn't even play the final four games of the season due to a season ending injury against the University of Georgia in the Georgia Invitational.

"Melissa was big-time," said Kerby-Nelson. "There isn't much else to say, besides that her knickname ought to be the wall."

Last year the Seminoles had Jenni Roberts providing the depth in goal, this year it's Plantation-native **Jamie Gurtov**. She was part of the Olympic Development team for the past four years, earning all-county honors and team MVP honors.

DEFENDERS

Last season's MVP, Janine Lavoie, will once again anchor the backfield as the sweeper. Lavoie of Saskatchewan, Can., was the only other player (Osorio) on the team to start all 19 matches. She led all defenders with seven points along with her three goals and one assist.

"Janine is the picture perfect athlete," said Kerby-Nelson. "Everything she works at is because she wants to be the best athlete she can possibly be."

Sedgwick will probably play on the left side. She played there during the World Cup, so she has excellent experience at this position.

Two matches later the Seminoles handed Jacksonville their worse loss of the season, beating the Dolphins 11-0. The Seminoles largest margin of victory was also a chance for every

FSU also fared well at the LSU Tournament in Baton Rouge, La., where they finished 1-0-1. Defeating Memphis 3-1 in the first match, the 'Noles went on to the tie host school, Louisiana State, I-I in the championship. The finals match was also the longest of the season, called due to heavy rain in



STARTING THE GAME: The game is started by a kickoff which requires a player to kick the ball into the opponent's half of the field. A goal may not be scored directly from a kickoff. Kickoffs are used to restart the game following a goal or any halftime or overtime interval.

BALL IN AND OUT OF PLAY: The ball is designated out of play when the entire ball has crossed outside the entire boundary line. The ball is put back into play by one of the following:

A. <u>Corner kick</u> - Put into play by attacking team when ball is last touched by defending team.

B. <u>Goal kick</u> - Put into play be defending team when ball is last touched by attacking team.

C. Throw-in - Put into play by team that didn't last touch ball.

METHOD OF SCORING: A goal is scored when the whole of the ball has passed over the goal line, between the goal posts and under the crossbar, provided it has not been intentionally thrown or carried by hand by a player on the attacking team.

OFFSIDE POSITION: A player is in an offside position if that player is nearer to the opponent's goal line than the ball, unless the player is in her own half of the field or play, or there are at least two opponents as near to their own goal line as the opposing player.


WHEN OFFSIDE: A player shall be declared offside and penalized for being in an offside position only if at the moment the ball touches or is played by a teammate, the player is, in the opinion of the referee, interfering with play, or seeking to gain an advantage by being in that position.

VIOLATIONS AND MISCONDUCTS: A player shall be penalized if she intentionally handles the ball, holds or pushes an opponent, violent or dangerous charging, fouling a goalkeeper or any dangerous play. A player shall be penalized if that player intentionally spits, kicks, strikes, attempts to kick or strike, uses blood or bleeding injuries improperly against an opponent, or jumps at an opponent.


NUMBER OF PLAYERS: The game is played by two teams of II players each, one of whom is the goalkeeper.

SUBSTITUTIONS: Either team can substitute up to 11 players at a time. Either team may substitute on a goal kick, corner kick, after a goal has been scored, between periods, when a player has been cautioned, when a player has been ordered off the field for an equipment change and in the event of an injury.

HEAD COACH HEATHER KERBY-NELSONUniversity of Saskatchewan '91

Vancouver, B.C., native Heather Kerby-Nelson made history last season at Florida State University, as she led the first-ever Seminole soccer team into NCAA Division I

competition, and specifically, the top-rated Atlantic Coast Conference.

But with her eye on the future, Kerby-Nelson continues to progress the program in a direction that will compliment the high level of success Florida State is accustomed to.

Kerby-Nelson boasts an extraordinary Division I playing career. As a four year starter and captain for the University of Saskatchewan Huskies, she earned Canada-West honors. She was also named captain of the 1987 and 1991 Western Canada Games team. Her highest playing achievement was being selected to the first Canadian National Team Program in 1987.

Coaching soccer at all levels has been a priority for Kerby-Nelson. She began coaching mini-soccer at the age of 17 and a few years later, accepted the Under-14 Girls Saskatchewan Games Team. Under her guidance, the team took the gold medal at the Games. Her next coaching positions included a Staff Coach position at Sask Soccer and the assistant coaching position at the University of Saskatchewan.

In 1992, Kerby-Nelson moved to Canada's west coast for the opportunity to continue her playing career and advance her coaching career. While attending the National Institute, Coaching Kerby-Nelson guided the Victoria Gorge S.C. to the B.C. Championships, as a player-coach. In addition to attending the N.C.I., she became a Staff Coach for B.C. Soccer and the National Training Center.

In 1993 and 1994, Kerby-Nelson played for the Vancouver Marlins, the 1993 Canadian National Champions.



In the summer of 1993, she returned to Saskatchewan to coach the Sask First Team at the 1993 Canada Games. As one of only two female head coaches at the Games and only the third female to graduate from the National Coaching Institute, Kerby-Nelson is recognized as one of the top female coaches in Canada.

Exposure to national level players came with Kerby-Nelson's acceptance to the National Coaching Institute, which will no doubt continue to help in her quest to bring high caliber Division I student-athletes to Florida State.

At the National Training Center, she trained a number of Canadian National Team members including Mitch Ring, the Canadian Team captain who claims the most international appearances for Canada, and Sylvana Burtini, the Golden Boot Award winner for most goals in 1994 CONCACAF play.






ASSISTANT COACH PAUL NELSON

Having Paul Nelson serve as an assistant coach for the Seminole soccer program is truly one of the biggest assets that the program has to offer.

Nelson will draw upon his extensive playing and coaching career from every level, juniors to professional, to provide the much

valued guidance to the fledgling soccer program at the Florida State University.

His professional knowledge and keen understanding of what it takes to compete at the highest level will serve the purpose of continuing the challenge of helping build a nationally-recognized collegiate soccer program in Tallahassee.



Recognized as one of the best players to be produced by the Canadian Soccer Association, his professional experience began at a young age. Nelson signed with the Vancouver Whitecaps of the NASL at the age of 18 and had the opportunity to play with and against some of the best players in the world, including, Pele, Gerd Mueller, and Teofillo "NeNe" Cubillas.

One of the most memorable highlights of Nelson's professional career was eliminating the NASL's Northern Division powerhouse, the New York Cosmos, in the semifinals of the Soccer Bowl, and a week later, defeating the Southern Division's equal, the Tampa Bay Rowdies, in Giant Stadium, to earn the 1979 championship.

During the NASL's off season, Nelson played for the Dublin-based Shamrock Rovers in the Irish Premier League. The Rovers won both an Irish Cup and League Cup title during Nelson's tenure there. These victories qualified the Rovers to compete in Europe's Winners Cup and other European Cup competitions.

As a Staff Coach for British Columbia Soccer, the Canadian province's national organization, Nelson boasted one of the best amateur coaching records. His coaching successes have included two gold medal finishes, guiding B.C. men's teams to the 1991 Western Canadian and the 1993 Canada Games champi-

onships. No other provincial men's coach can claim such a feat. In 1991, Nelson served as coach of the American Soccer League's Vancouver 86ers reserve team and was the assistant coach for the 86ers starters level in 1992.

Prior to accepting the assistant coaching position at FSU, Nelson spent two years coaching at the National Training Center and served as assistant coach for the Canadian Olympic squad in 1994.

ASSISTANT COACH KERRY DZICZKANIEC

George Washington - 1993

Entering her first season with the Florida State women's soccer staff, Kerry Dziczkaniec will primarily serve as coach for the Seminoles goalkeepers, as well as recruiting coordinator. Along with her on and off-field soccer duties, she will be charged with monitoring the student-athletes academic progress with the Universities' Academic Support Staff.

For the past two seasons Dziczkaniec has served as an assistant coach on the Virginia women's soccer staff under

former Cavalier coach Lauren Gregg.

While she was at UVa, the Cavaliers posted two Top 10 finishes, as their goalies were among the best in the Atlantic Coast Conference. In 1995 she had one sophomore and two freshman to work with in the goal, still posting identical successful numbers as with a group of seasoned veterans.

In addition to the instructing and conditioning of the Cavalier goalkeepers, Dziczkaniec's responsibilities at Virginia in-

cluded monitoring the academic progress of the student-athletes, the recruitment of prospective players, as well as assisting with administrative affairs, including management of summer camp.

A 1993 graduate of George Washington University, she earned a degree in exercise and sports science. While attending GW, Dziczkaniec was a goalkeeper on the Colonial's women's soccerteam. She earned team MVP honors in 1991, while being named team captain for two seasons (1991-92).

Following her graduation, she spent one season as an assistant coach with the first-ever team fielded at Georgetown University, where she was responsible for the instructing and conditioning of the Hoya's goalkeepers.

With solid experience as a Division I collegiate player, as well as coaching experience within ACC, Dziczkaniec brings unique perspective to a young Seminole soccer program.







ACC Soccer Review

he first Atlantic Coast Conference match for the Seminoles, against Maryland in Tallahassee, was a true testament of just how good this conference is in women's soccer. The Terrapins scored three unassisted goals in about 20 minutes of play and wound up scoring four goals off of 14 shots in the first half. On the upside of the field, the Seminoles shut down the Terp-attack for nearly the entire second half, chipping in a goal of their own by up-and-coming star Janna Walkup of Orlando on an unassisted shot at the 58:00 mark.

The second effort for Florida State in the ACC was a better outing, as the Seminoles probably played their best 90 minutes of soccer against then-10th-ranked Duke. The Blue Devils put in two unassisted shots nearly 40 minutes apart for an eventual 2-0 win. FSU's Alexandra Osorio of Miami had three solid attempts to score in the second half, but a team like Duke can make the possible look impossible. The Seminoles ACC record-smashing goalkeeper, Melissa Juhl of Marietta, Ga., had a banner afternoon recording 21 saves in the match. The goalie would go on and thrash the ACC record for goalie saves in a season with 155, while the team would go on and break the team saves in a season record with 197.

For the five remaining ACC regular season matches the Seminoles would be on the road, due to scheduling conflicts at the temporary field site where all home matches


currently take place. The seccer for the 'Noles.

where FSU head coach Heather Kerby-Nelson called the Tigers "the best team she had seen this season." The fifthranked Cavaliers gave FSU a 6-0 defeat of their own on an unlucky night where the 'Noles had zero shots on goal and just one cornerkick. Ironically, the loss to UVa came on Friday the 13th.

The Seminoles were able to do what very few teams could, go ahead of the top-ranked North Carolina Tar Heels. At the 52:35 Janine Lavoie of Saskatoon, Saskatchewan put the Tribe ahead with an unassisted score in a penalty box scramble. With 4:03 left in regulation, UNC's All-American Debbie Keller tied up the score and also hit the winner in overtime to end FSU's and the nation's biggest upset bid.

In the final two regular season ACC matches against N.C. State and Wake Forest, the 'Noles scored one goal being outshot a total 50-11. The Demon Deacons, also a first-year program notched their first ACC win in program history, as the Wolfpack solidified second place in the final conference standings.

FSU found out firsthand why UNC is the nation's topranked team as the Tribe fell 9-0 in the opening round of the ACC tournament. The Seminoles were outshot 24-3 as UNC's Aubrey Falk scored the second hat-trick in tournament history. The Tar Heels also had a tourney record, 16 cornerkicks.

1995 ACC WRAP-UP

CLEMSON: The Tigers own a 24-1 record against non-league teams in their first two years of competition ...Clemson has not lost a regular season game against non-ACC opponents ...the second year program has been ranked in the national polls for 23 consecutive weeks.

DUKE: The Blue Devils made their fourth straight trip to the NCAA Tournament and recorded their fourth consecutive national ranking in the Top 10 ...All-America Kelly Walbert became Duke's first ACC Player of the Year, closing out her stellar career with 117 points on 47 goals and 23 assists.

FLORIDA STATE: Goalkeeper Melissa Juhl began her Seminole career breaking the conference record for saves in a season with 155 ... Florida State also set a new mark for team saves in a season with 197.

MARYLAND: ACC Coach of the Year April Heinrichs led the Terps to their first ACC Tournament finals appearance ... Maryland also recorded its best record and highest ACC finish in program history with an 18-6 overall record and a 4-3 ACC mark tying for third place in the regular season race.

NORTH CAROLINA: The Tar Heels captured their seventh straight ACC title and eighth overall ...UNC tied its own NCAA record for most wins in a season with 25 ...for the fifth straight year, the Tar Heels did not lose a non-ACC match during the regular season (81-0-1) ... ACADEMIC SUPPORT PROGRAM

Academic, personal and professional support are essential to college success. At Florida State University, we have developed an outstanding support program which enables student-athletes to reach their full potential.

Our philosophy is "to offer an academic support program integrated with the total university that will assist all student-athletes with the transition into college and provide continued support in all phases of academic and professional development culminating with graduation, job placement or graduate school."

To accomplish this goal we have developed an academic environment which facilitates the academic success of student-athletes. Student success is encouraged through competent academic counseling, career exploration, planning and placement and academic assistance through tutorial

Our program operates on a "proactive" rather than "reactive" approach. At Florida State, our academic staff does not wait for academic crises to occur. We gather important background information and build an academic profile on all student-athletes to assess their needs in advance. We also stay informed on the daily progress of each studentathlete.

Our academic support staff includes a director, five counselors, and three graduate interns forming a group of professionals serving the needs of all our student-athletes.

In 1994, the academic programs moved to the state-ofthe-art University Center and are located on the 6th floor of the \$126,000,000 facility. It includes private study carrels, a tutorial study area and a computer lab outfitted with 16 new IBM computers and laser printers. In addition, athletic sky boxes are utilized for group and individualized tutorial instruction sessions.

STRENGTH, CONDITIONING, MEDICAL CARE AND TREATMENT

Strength training and conditioning is an important part of an athlete's performance on the field. At Florida State, a specially designed program is developed for soccer, emphasizing the objectives of strengthening and conditioning the athletes. Strength coach Ron Miller and staff individually customize programs for each of the athletes, beginning with preconditioning, before the season even gets underway.

Miller, who holds professional memberships in the National Strength and Conditioning Association and Aerobics and Fitness Association, works with the players in sport specific training which includes strengthening the major muscle groups used in soccer.

This season, Miller is customizing a sound workout for the soccer team. The workout is instrumental in improving muscular endurance, strength and cardiovascular conditioning on the field. The coaches believe so strongly in the program that they even participate themselves. FSU takes pride in customizing the programs to help student athletes reach their maximum potential.



Miller has proven to be an asset to the University's athletic program, where he was a four-year lettermen with the Seminole basketball team. On that team, Miller was selected the Top-Conditioned athlete all four years. During the 1991-92 season he was team captain and awarded the 1992 ACC Senior Scholarship Athlete of the Year.

Athletes at Florida State University receive the best care and treatment possible. All of the student athletes undergo a preseason examination in order to prevent and detect any potential injuries that an athlete may incur. If a problem is detected, the athlete is placed on a prevention care program which may include any kind of treatment from icing to exercising. Graduate Assistant Janet Brown, A.T.C., will handle the athletic training duties for the soccer team.


Though preventing injuries is the main objective, they are sometimes a part of participating in athletics. Rehabilitation is another important component of the Seminole training room. The FSU trainers will work with the athlete and provide an intense rehabilitation schedule that will allow the athlete to successfully rehabilitate after an injury. More serious in-






juries and illnesses are referred to the Seminole team physicians at the Tallahassee Orthopedic Center, who for many years have worked in conjunction with the FSU training room in successfully rehabilitating numerous athletes after an injury.

Nutrition counseling and drug testing are also responsibilities of the athletic training team which is dedicated to providing the best care possible for all FSU student-athletes.
