

The soccer field is located just south of the FSU football practice field off of Stadium Drive. Media members will be provided parking passes and will be seated in a designated area. Please notify the sports information office prior to home matches for credentials to be assigned. Any accredited photographer wishing to shoot the matches must check in with Finebloom prior to gameday so proper credentials can be assigned.




Head Coach Otterbein College - 1989 2nd season at FSU



Patrick Baker enters his second year as the head coach at Florida State University after leading the Seminoles to their second most wins in a season in the young history of the program. Baker, only the second coach in the history of Florida State women's soccer, led the Noles into the Southeast Regional Rankings for the first time since 1996. The Seminoles spent four weeks as the No. 10 team in the region and twice tied the record for the longest winning streak in team history (four games). Baker served as the women's head coach at the University of Pennsylvania for five years before coming to Florida State. During his tenure at Penn, Baker established a 42-37-5 record, won an ECAC Championship and was named the 1997 Mid-Atlantic Region Coach of the Year.



Baker served on the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) Division I Mid-Atlantic Rankings committee from 1995 to 1998 and the Intercollegiate Soccer Coaches Association of America (ISAA) South Region Rankings Committee from 1990 to 1993.





In his first year as head coach, Baker led the Noles into the Southeast Regional Rankings for the first time since 1996.




Prior to his head coaching stint at the University of Pennsylvania, Baker achieved much success at the Division III level where he coached North Carolina Wesleyan to three NCAA Division III tournament appearances and Top 10 finishes. He complied a record of 45-21-4 in his five years and was twice named the Dixie Conference Coach of the Year. In 1991, Baker was named the National Soccer Coaches of America Association's Division III South Region Coach of the Year. He was the NCAA Division III South Region Tounament Committee Chairman in 1993 as well as a member of the NCAA Division III South Region Tournament Committee.

Baker received his Bachelor of Arts from Otterbein College in 1989 where has was a starter all four years for the men's soccer team and was named team captain as a senior. He is married to the former Kelly Sack, and the couple is expecting their first child in February of 2001. Mrs. Baker is the marketing director for 3-W Studios.

ASSISTANT COACHES

Lauren Cyran

Assistant Coach Duke University - 1998 2nd season at FSU



Cyran served as assistant coach at the University of Pennsylvania for the 1998 season where she worked with all aspects of the program. She served as the recruiting coordinater and played an active part in the on-the-field training and practices. Prior to joining Penn, Cyran was the head coach for the Durham, North Carolina Under-12 girl's soccer team for two years and served as the assistant coach with the Lakewood Fury's Under-15 soccer team. She also was a coach at the Duke University soccer camp in 1996 and served three years as an instructor for the Lakewood Fury's soccer camp.

As a four-year starter at Duke, she garnered second-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors in 1994 and 1997 and served as the team captain her junior and senior years. Cyran was also named Rookie of the Year in 1994 and the team's MVP defender as a junior and senior.

As a member of the 1996 and 1997 western regional champion Denver Diamonds during the summer, Cyran was named team captain both years and was named to the 1997 all-star team. She also played one season with the Colorado Lakewood Fury, an Under-20 USWISL team, and served as the team captain. A native of Littleton, Colorado, Cyran graduated from Duke University in 1998 with a bachelor's degree in public policy studies. Cyran will complete her masters degree in higher education administration this December.

John Galas

Assistant Coach University of Liverpool - MBA 1999 University of Oregon - BA 1997 1st season at FSU

Assistant coach John Galas enters his first season with the Florida State women's soccer coaching staff. Galas has spent the past six years as either a head coach or assistant at all levels of soccer and has extensive experience coaching goalkeepers.


Since 1997, Galas served as the assistant coach for the University of Oregon women's soccer team where he mainly worked with the team's goalkeepers. Galas, during a one-year hiatus from Oregon, also worked with one of England's premier club teams, Liverpool Football Club. Galas was afforded access to all of Liverpool's training sessions and was given a rare opportunity for an American coach to observe how one of the world's most successful club teams trains. Galas also served as a goal-keeping coach for the club's Community Coaching Scheme.

A Woodland Hills, California native, Galas has worked with goalkeepers for most of his career. In 1999, he served as the director and head coach of the Eugene Goalkeeping Academy. During the summer of 1998, Galas worked as a goalkeeper coach at Soccer Plus Goalkeeper School in San Diego, California, where, this past summer, he served as the assistant director for the school. Soccer Plus was founded and directed by Tony DiCiccio, the head coach of the World Cup Champion USA women's soccer team.

Galas has also played an active role in youth soccer throughout his career. Prior to joining the University of Oregon staff, Galas served as an assistant coach/goalkeeper coach for both the boy's and girl's soccer programs at South Eugene High School in Oregon and assistant coach for the Willamette District U-23 state team. While coaching at South Eugene, the boys team won the state title in 1998 and the girl's team advanced to the state final one year and the state semi-final another year. Galas was also an assistant coach for the Olympic Development Program (ODP) in Portland, Oregon working with the U-17 boy's team. Prior to his work with the ODP, Galas was a head coach for the South Eugene Soccer Club U-14 boy's team and a head coach for the U-17 girl's team and U-18 boy's team at Lane County Association F.C. Galas coached the U-15 boy's team and most recently served as the head coach for the U-18 girl's team at McKenzie United S.A. He also served as a marketing assistant and operations assistant for the 1999 Women's World Cup in Portland.


A member of the United States Soccer Federation, National Soccer Coaches Association of America, the Football Association Coaches Association and the Oregon Youth Soccer Coaches Association, Galas currently holds a USSF National "C" coaching license and will pursue his USSF National "B" license in the winter of 2001.

Galas received his Bachelor of Arts in history from the University of Oregon in June of 1997. He then earned a Masters of Business Administration in Football Industries from the University of Liverpool in December of 1999. Galas married his wife, Anna Brockmeyer, on July 31, 1999.

Steven Nugent joins the Florida State coaching staff in his first year as a manager. Nugent has more than 10 years of coaching experience at all levels of soccer. He has worked with colleges, high schools, club teams, the Olympic Development Program (ODP) and soccer camps.

Since 1989, Nugent has worked with the Soccer Association of Boca Raton. As a staff coach and Assistant Director of Coaching with Team Boca, Nugent was responsible for the development of players and coaches, coordinating the summer program for elite players and placing players in college programs. He was also the head coach for six State Championship girl's teams and most recently coached the U-15 and U-18 girls teams to Florida State Championships.

Nugent also spent the past four years working as a staff coach with the Florida Youth Soccer Association's ODP. He was an assistant coach for the 1982 girl's team in 1998 and the 1983 girl's team in 1997. He also served as the FYSA Coaching Course Coordinator (D License) in Boca Raton, Florida from 1994-1996.

As a volunteer assistant coach with 1995 NAIA National Champion Lynn University from 1995-1997, Nugent was responsible for coaching goalkeepers, recruiting players, and handling administrative responsibilities. During that time, he worked with the Saint Andrews School from 1991-1996 as a physical education teacher, soccer coach, and Assistant Director of the summer soccer camps. Nugent has attained his "B" license from the United States Soccer Federation and is a member of the National Soccer Coaches Association of America. He will pursue his "A" license in the Winter of 2001.

Nugent will enter graduate school this fall and will pursue a master's degree in Sport Administration. His wife, Janna, is set to begin her first semester at the Florida State University School of Law. The two were married February 13, 1999.





2000 OUTLOOK

Florida State enters the 2000 season with many reasons to believe they will eclipse last year's strong campaign, in which they recorded the second-most wins in team history. The Seminoles welcome back seven returning starters and a large group of players that received valuable playing time as freshmen. Season-ending injuries to Danielle Foard and Heather Dyche in 1999 opened the door for many younger players to gain experience. Head coach Patrick Baker is optimistic about the 2000 season. "We have a good nucleus of returning players and one of the top recruiting classes in the country," according to Baker. Florida State signed the 13th best recruiting class in the country, the No. 1 class in Florida and the 3rd best class in the Southeast Region according to Soccer Buzz.

FSU proved in 1999 that they are not far from being a force on the national stage. Judging from last season's results, Florida State is just lacking the experience needed to compete with the upper echelon of collegiate soccer teams. "In 1999, we went 9-0-1 in every game we scored first but we were 0-10 when an opponent scored on us first," said Baker.

Eight of the 10 losses in 1999 were to teams ranked in the Top 20 in national polls and, of those eight loses, six were by only one goal and the other two were to the eventual national champions, North Carolina. According to coach Baker, the Noles were able to secure wins against teams they were expected to beat and they played well against the teams ranked ahead of them. In 2000, Florida State needs to win the games they should win and hopefully get some victories in the "big" games.

Baker is counting on his senior class to help raise the standards of the program and provide early leadership. Sarah Crawford, Foard, Rachael Watkin, April Murphy, Sarah Deacon and Ashley Halter have between 19 and 60 career starts each.









The Seminoles should also benefit this season from playing a tough schedule in the spring and a more balanced schedule in the fall of 2000. Florida State opened up the spring with a 0-0 tie versus the University of Miami, who beat the Noles 3-0 last year, and a tough loss to Fortuna, a strong Danish club team. The Seminoles next welcomed teams to their own tournament and recorded their second shutout of the spring with a 6-0 win over the Georgia ODP team. They then dropped the second game of the tournament to the Klein Challenge of Texas 4-2.

The Noles traveled to Gainesville next to face the University of Florida, the University of South Florida and the University of Central Florida. Florida State continued to show improvement against a Gator team that finished the 1999 season as a consensus Top 10 pick. The Seminoles fell to Florida 3-0 but improved from their previous meeting with UF in the fall. Florida State went on to rack up their third and fourth shutouts of the spring by defeating UCF 2-0 and USF 3-0. Both wins provided a reason for optimism entering the 2000 season since FSU lost to Central Florida 2-1 in the 1999 preseason and edged South Florida 1-0 during the fall of 1999.

Florida State went on to record their fifth and sixth shutouts of the spring by defeating the University of Mississippi 1-0 and the University of Alabama-Birmingham 3-0. Heading into a tough west coast trip against Santa Clara and Cal-Berkeley, the Seminoles were 5-3-1 and had recorded six shutouts. FSU fell to Santa Clara, fresh off an appearance in the 1999 Final Four, and dropped their last game of the spring at Cal-Berkeley 3-1.

Commenting on the Seminoles spring schedule, coach Baker said, "We played in some very competitive environments and continually made positive strides. Our trip to California was an awesome experience for a relatively young team and our overall team defense was especially pleasing to me."

Florida State should also benefit from greater scheduling balance this year with home and away games mostly taking place on alternating weekends. Baker, commenting on last year's schedule said, "Last year we were all over the place and sometimes that was reflected in our play."

Florida State faces eight teams ranked in the NSCAA's pre-season Top 25, five of which are ranked in the Top 12. One positive for the Seminoles is that six of those eight teams play in Tallahassee. This year's schedule features a visit from the defending national champion, and pre-season #1, North Carolina Tarheels. Other Top 25 teams that will travel to the FSU Soccer Facility are pre-season #6 Clemson, #10 Florida, #11 Texas A&M, #12 Wake Forest and #16 Virginia. The Noles will visit #22 Duke and #23 Maryland.

Looking towards the fall, coach Baker said, "The 2000 season will be interesting because we are going to be blending a veteran group with an exciting recruiting class. Our pre-season will be the most competitive it has ever been and, except for goalkeeper, there will be a battle at every position."

There is a lot of experience at the forward position this season. Maren Vik Edvardsen, April Murphy and Cindy Schofield have appeared in 119 matches with 58 of those appearances coming in 1999. Vik Edvardsen and Murphy are poised to re-write the Florida State record book this season. These two already appear on the all-time leaders list seven times in five different categories.

Vik Edvardsen, a junior form Norway, is the most prolific goal scorer in Florida State history after just two seasons. She ranks first in goals scored (17), second in points (39) and second in game-winning goals (5). In 1999, Vik Edvardsen also set numerous single season records. She tied the record for the second most goals scored in one season (9), recorded the third most points accumulated in a season (21) and scored the second most game winning goals (4). Maren also broke the Florida State record for most points in one game (8) against Furman.

Murphy, a senior from Tulsa, Okla., set single season records in 1999 for assists (7) and game-winning assists (3). She currently ranks fourth in Seminole history in shots (82), fifth in goals (13), fourth in assists (9), fourth in game-winning assists (3) and third in points (35). Murphy also tied the Florida State record for most first half assists (2) versus South Alabama. Schofield enters the 2000 campaign looking to improve on a solid rookie season. The sophomore from Lakeland, Fla. led all freshmen in goals (3) and points (7) while appearing in 18 matches. Schofield had a breakout game versus Stetson in 1999, recording an assist and the game-winning goal in a match that was broadcast regionally on the Sunshine Network.







The forward position should be bolstered by the arrival of two newcomers this season. Janet Burke, Fayetteville, Ga., was an NSCAA All-American in 1999 as a member of the Georgia State Champions, Starrs Mill High School. She was also voted MVP of the state high school playoffs that season. Vero Beach's Summer Corum enters Florida State after a prolific career at Vero Beach High. Corum led her district in scoring for three straight years and scored 140 goals during her high school career. Corum was also a member of Team Boca when they won the 1999 Florida club team championship.

MIDFIELD:

The Seminoles enter the 2000 season with a young group of midfielders who have a lot of experience. Despite losing three seniors in the midfield, Florida State shouldn't miss a step. Rachael Watkin, Marte Vik Edvardsen, Katie Talley, Meredith Jones and Sarah Deacon appeared in 94 games last season and this group has 176 career appearances for the Seminoles. Vik Edvardsen, Watkin and Deacon made 59 starts in 1999 and should provide valuable maturity in the middle of the field.

Vik Edvardsen, a junior and Watkin, a senior, were two of only four players to start every game in 1999. Vik Edvardsen has already amassed 32 career starts in her two seasons at Florida State and she set a single season record for the fourth most shots (35) during the 1999 campaign. She ended the season third on the team in points (11), third in goals (4) and tied for fourth in assists (3). Watkin, co-captain of the 2000 squad, is expected to make the move from sweeper to central midfield in hopes of providing the cohesive ingredient the team needs. She is FSU's most experienced player with 60 starts in her three years and should end her career with the most starts by a Seminole in team history. Deacon, a senior, started 19 matches last season and ranked fifth on the team in shots (21). She also contributed two goals and five total points. All three players will be counted upon to provide leadership based on their experience as returning starters. After missing the entire 1999 season with a knee injury, Jennifer Garcia is also expected to compete for playing time this season as a central midfielder. She came to Florida State as a threetime All-State selection and won the MVP award of the Senior All-Star Classic.

Talley, Kennesaw, Ga., appeared in 18 games and started four matches as a freshman despite sitting out the start of the season with injuries. The sophomore recorded a goal and an assist, including a game-winning assist, against South Florida. Talley should see more playing time this season as she will challenge for a starting spot at a wide midfield position. Jones, a sophomore from West Chester, Penn., will work as a defensive midfielder this season after appearing in 18 games, and starting six, in 1999. Jones finished the season with one goal on four shots.

Freshman Emma Breland will provide depth and could be called upon to add offense from the central midfield position. She holds the Tennessee high school record with 59 goals in just 19 games and was a finalist for All-American honors. Breland was named All-Region Player of the Year and could make an impact for the Seminoles this season.

UTLOOK

Two other freshman could make an immediate impact for the Noles in 2000. Maclay High School's Sara Dunlap decided to stay close to home and signed with Florida State University this past spring. Dunlap was the All Big-Bend Player of the Year in 1998 and 1999 and the leading scorer for Maclay during their state championship season. Amber Tollefson was a Golden Boot winner at Boca Raton's Spanish River High during her freshman season. Tollefson led her team in scoring that year on the way to the state title. She won the state title with Spanish River again during the 1998 season. Tollefson is a four-time member of the All-State squad and a four-year starter at Spanish River.

DEFENSE:

After suffering two major injuries within the first eight games of the season, Florida State had to fight an uphill battle in 1999 to develop consistency on defense. The Seminole defense should benefit due to the return of two veterans from injury and the extra playing time younger players got due to the those injuries. Coach Baker feels the defense will be an area of concentration from the first day of the pre-season for Florida State in 2000. "I want our team to shut people out and we have started to develop that mentality," said Baker. After spending his first season at Florida State employing a zonal three back, Baker has experimented with a zonal four back set but has yet to settle on a scheme for the fall.

The defense will get a big lift with the return of Danielle "Dee" Foard who appeared in 44 matches before suffering a season-ending injury in 1999. Foard, a senior from Falls Church, Va., started eight games in 1999 before the injury versus Wake Forest. If she can successfully return to form, Foard will provide a big boost to the Seminoles defense. Coach Baker assesses Foard's play by stating that she is hard on the tackle and chases down attackers very







well and adds that she is a needed addition to the Seminole defense. Another senior who will challenge for a starting spot with Foard is Ashley Halter. Halter, who has appeared in 54 games during her three seasons, led all Seminole defenders in goals scored (3) and points (8) in 1999. After starting for the majority of the season at right outside back in 1999, Halter continues to become a stronger one-on-one defender and her understanding of Baker's system has steadily increased. Baker, commenting on Halter, said "She is very good in the air and scored three goals for us last year when she went forward."

Two juniors will also be counted on to contribute a great deal and compete for starting jobs in the back. Heather Dyche, like Foard, is coming off a season-ending injury she suffered in the first match of 1999 versus Florida. If Dyche is fully recovered, coach Baker could use her as the starting center back entering the 2000 season. "She is very good technically and tactically - consistency will be the key," according to Baker. Dyche is a four-time All-State player out of New Mexico who appeared in 11 games for the Noles in 1998 and scored a game-winning goal versus Mercer that season. Christy Peacock saw limited action in 1999, appearing in seven games, but according to coach Baker she will see more playing time during the 2000 season. "Peacock has developed the most of any FSU player in the last year. She received some playing time in the fall, but earned a starting spot as an outside left back this spring and did very well," according to Baker. Sophomore Ashlee Fontes appeared in 12 matches as a freshman and started as the team's central midfielder last spring. Her fitness and impact in the defense during the pre-season will determine if she earns a starting spot this fall.

The Seminoles added four freshmen defenders from a recruiting class ranked No. 13 in the country. This group will be called on immediately to provide depth in the Seminole's defense. Tiffini DeGaetani enters FSU as a four-time All-State selection in New York and captain of the reigning New York state championship team. Tori George, from Fairfax, Va., is a two-time All-District selection and a four-year starter on the varsity squad. Kristin Boyce, from Austin, Texas, is a four-year All-District selection and was also a four-year starter on her varsity squad. Marisha Crowe was the captain of the 1999 Tennessee state champions and a four-year All-State honoree. This freshman from Memphis also started for four years on her varsity squad at Germantown High School.

GOALKEEPERS:


Senior Sarah Crawford enters the 2000 campaign as one of the most important players on this year's squad. The co-captain, from Lilburn, Ga., started in half the games for Florida State in 1999 and is already third on FSU's all-time list for minutes played (900), saves (65) and shutouts (2). Crawford is the lone goalkeeper on this year's squad who has seen any playing time for Florida State and will be key in organizing a defense that should be vastly improved from 1999. Crawford started ten matches in 1999 behind a defense that was hit hard by injuries yet she managed to record a respectable 4-5-1 record in the nation's best soccer conference. Her 77% save percentage and 1.90 goals against average led the team last season. Crawford brings a lot of experience with her as she enters her senior season. On top of the experience she gained last season, Crawford gained valuable playing time at Georgia State before transferring to FSU. Crawford was a member of the 1998 TAAC Champions and named to the All-TAAC tournament team that season. In two seasons at Georgia State, she started 38 games, recorded 194 saves and 14.5 shutouts. According to coach Baker, Crawford is a very talented goal-keeper who enjoyed a great deal of success this past spring and she will be counted on to provide leadership at the start of the 2000 season.

With the beaches close by and the opportunity to travel throughout the country, being a member of the women's soccer team is indeed an exciting experience. This young program has traveled all over the East Coast and will head west to Oregon this season to take on Oregon State and the University of Oregon.

Florida State soccer boasts a new state-of-the-art complex. With lockerrooms, training and equipment room, coaches offices and a spacious work room, the Seminole Soccer Complex is a home away from home, allowing the team to dress, train and compete in one location. Since fielding its first women's team in 1968, Florida State University has continued to build a rich tradition in women's intercollegiate athletics.

FSU began with volleyball and track and field in the early days and by 1975, supported seven intercollegiate women's teams. In 1995, Florida State introduced its ninth women's varsity sport as the women's soccer team took the field for the first time.

Today's student athlete has the opportunity not only to excel in the athletic arena but in all facets of life.

Florida State soccer competes in the Atlantic Coast Conference, which includes some of the toughest teams in the nation. The ACC boasts the reigning, and 16-time National Champion, North Carolina Tar Heels as well as four other teams, Maryland, Wake Forest, Duke and Clemson, that participated in the 1999 NCAA tournament. Six of the conferences eight teams were ranked in the final Top 25 NSCAA poll. The conference has also placed many players on the NCAA All-Tournament Team as well as having players named NSCAA All-Americans and tournament MVP's. Along with their success on the field, the Seminoles have seen their experience as student-athletes expand in the classroom. Fifteen women's soccer players garnered All-ACC academic honors last season, including four players who appeared on the honor roll for more than one year.

The Florida State soccer team continually gives back to their community and they were awarded the Athletic Director's Cup for Community Service at the 2000 Golden Nole Banquet. The Seminoles also take the time for the youth soccer community, often offering clinics before and after matches. Playing for an up and coming program in the premier soccer conference in the country, graduating from a prestigious university and serving the community are all a part of Florida State women's soccer.











Soccer Complex





In 1995, Florida State introduced women's soccer as it's 17th varsity sport. As a new state-of-the-art complex was in the planning stages, the team played its first three seasons on a renovated intramural field while Tully Gym housed the Seminole lockerroom. By the spring of 1998, Florida State's dream of a new complex began to become reality as ground was broken for the new facility and construction began. Although the facility was not completed, the Seminoles began playing on their new field in the fall of 1998. The 1999 season marked the first full season in the new Seminole Soccer Complex, which is regarded as one of the nation's best with a its new top playing surface.

"We have the field of dreams in a beautiful stadium setting," head coach Patrick Baker said. "There are days when it looks too good to be true. Having the offices and lockerrooms at the facility makes our complex all inclusive. You don't have to leave for anything. Our players have everything at one site. It really is our home away from home."

The Seminole Soccer Complex will host six preseason Top 25 teams in 2000, including the defending national champion **North Carolina** Tar Heels.







The complex includes ticket and concession buildings and a spacious press box, including press seating and radio/television booths. The two-level team building houses the coaches offices which overlook their respective stadiums, a reception area, a combined workroom, large team and coaches lockerrooms, visiting team lockerrooms, and training and equipment rooms.

The Seminole Soccer Complex, which also houses the FSU Softball Complex, is located between Dick Howser Baseball Stadium and Mike Long Track on Chieftan Way. The facility can be accessed from both Chieftan Way and Stadium Drive.

Near, but far from the glaring strips of neon amusement, and the castles and crowds of Disney, lies another magical place in the Sunshine State — one of plantations, politics and great pride. Often described as "The Other Florida" with its deep-rooted history, rolling hills, canopy roads of moss-draped oaks, cool climate and Southern-style hospitality; it is a Florida few have seen. It is Tallahassee — Florida with a Southern


Best known as Florida's capital, Tallahassee is an intimate neo-metropolitan city where the power of state government, the academic and the artistic are complemented by subtle, old-fashioned charm. It is the perfect two- or three-day diversion for the more than 41 million annual visitors to Florida and 13 million residents.

Tallahassee touts a menagerie of sights including one of the world's deepest freshwater springs, site of America's first Christmas, a wildlife habitat, Capitol buildings, fascinating museums of history, sprawling plantations, highly acclaimed fishing and hunting adventures and nearby beaches. Spirited area festivals range from celebrations of Tallahassee's spectacular spring and swamp stomps to genuine rattlesnake roundups and seafood festivals.

With the Gulf of Mexico just 20 miles south and the Georgia border only 14 miles north, Tallahassee rests between the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and the juncture of Florida's panhandle and peninsula. Nearer in miles to Atlanta than to Miami, Tallahassee more closely resembles its Southern neighbors than Florida in topography, climate and lifestyle.


Accentuating Tallahassee's Southern persona are lush rolling hills, likened to the seven hills of Rome, and five "official" canopy roads of patriarch oaks. The fertile, rich soil and four distinct, yet pleasant, seasons breed floral brilliance and natural vitality year-round.


Like the city itself, the story of how Tallahassee was chosen as the state capital is rich in history. In 1823, two explorers set out — one on horseback from St. Augustine and the other by boat from Pensacola — to find a permanent, central location for the Legislature to convene. The two met at a beautiful site that the Creek and Seminole Indians called "tallahassee" — derived from the words "talwa" meaning town and "ahasee" meaning old. The rendezvous point remains Florida's capital.



The "old town" has undergone many changes, but one thing remains the same — it is still a government town fiercely proud and dedicated to preserving its heritage. The Capitol buildings, both old and new, epitomize Tallahassee's perseverance. The 22nd floor of the New Capitol provides a panoramic scope of a sophisticated Southern city awash in a sea of flowering azaleas, snowy dogwoods, towering pines, fragrant magnolias, and hundreds of shimmering lakes, springs, swamps, rivers and sink holes. Special legislative viewing galleries are open during the legislative session.

Below, in the shade of giant live oaks, proudly stands the Old Capitol, originally constructed in 1845 and restored to its 1902 splendor com-

plete with red-and-white candy-striped awnings, a dome adorned with stained glass, antique furnishings and political memorabilia.

Across from the Old Capitol are the 40-foot twin granite towers of the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial, and the blue stone Union Bank, Florida's oldest surviving financial institution. The nostalgic Old Town Trolley, a replica turn-of-the-century street car, carries passengers through restored Adams Street Commons to numerous other historical downtown shops for free — unheard of even 100 years ago.

Minutes from downtown lies the Governor's Mansion, which resembles the home of Florida's military hero Andrew Jackson; and the 52-acre natural animal habitat and 1880s farm of the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science, which provide the rare chance to walk and talk with native Florida animals

Tallahassee remains firmly linked with the past as evidenced by the unearthed 1539 winter encampment of Spanish Hernando de Soto, the site of the first Christmas celebration in America. Visitors travel back through time as they stand in the shadow of a giant 12,000-year-old American Mastodon at the Museum of Florida History or explore other historical spots including The Knott House that Rhymes, The Columns, San Luis Mission, Lake Jackson State Archaeological Site, Natural Bridge Battlefield, First Presbyterian Church, Brokaw-McDougall House, Goodwood Plantation and Adams Street Commons.

Nearby, alligators lazing in the sunshine and anhinga "snake birds" perched on twisted cypress branches are seen at Wakulla Springs, one of the world's deepest fresh water springs and site of many underwater scenes in the "Tarzan" movies with Johnny Weissmuller and Maureen O'Sullivan. Safaris aboard glass-bottomed and jungle cruise boats whisk visitors within arm's length of "The Other Florida."

Outdoor enthusiasts enjoy adventures including boating and fishing on area lakes, rivers, ponds and the Gulf—just 30 minutes away. Lakes Seminole, Jackson and Talquin are renowned in the bass fishing world for yielding the "big ones," and dense forests offer an abundance of prize-winning game. Local wildlife areas such


as the Florida National Scenic Trail, St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge and Apalachicola National Forest are among many spots for camping, picnicking, swimming, biking and exploring.


Appealing to the strokes of different folks, Tallahassee also features 99 holes of golf on six courses and a proliferation of tennis centers. Sideline athletes cheer the nationally-ranked Florida State Seminoles, Florida A&M Rattlers and the Tallahassee Tiger Sharks, of the East Coast Hockey League, Tallahasse Thunder of Arena 2 football league. And always a sure bet are the nearby greyhound races.

A sport of sorts, shopping at two regional malls and many specialty centers offer many "playing options" — from popular chains to curiosity and antique shops.

Cultural interests are sparked by widely-acclaimed museums and galleries and elaborate entertainment at the 14,000-seat Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center.

Tallahassee is a collaboration of power-play politics and classical character splashed with a twist of Southern beauty and charm. Tallahassee is Florida with a Southern accent.

Judging is based on the overall level of community involvement in solving critical local problems, including public-private partnerships.

"This is clearly one of the most exciting things to ever happen to Tallahassee," said a jubilant Mayor Scott Maddox. "For those of us who call Tallahassee home, the All-America City award verifies what we've known for so long — that we have one of the greatest cities in all of America!"



This Is Florida St

Florida State University, recently celebrating its golden anniversary as a coeducational graduate research institution in 1997, has joined the nation's elite in both academics and athletics.

Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida and building rapidly on the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, the University has emerged over the past 50 years as an institution of national and international esteem. Its stature is evidenced by a number of additions to its record of excellence in the 1990s:




- In 1994, Florida State was classified a "Research University I" by the Carnegie Foundation, placing it among the nation's top research universities.
- In 1994, the college referral service, "Who's Who Among American High School Students," placed FSU among its top 10 with such universities as Harvard, Duke, Stanford, North Carolina-Chapel Hill, Michigan-Ann Arbor and Yale of most frequent choices of more than 100,000 of the nation's best and brightest high school students who asked that a specific college be notified of their recognition in "Who's Who."
- Vice President of the United States Al Gore spoke at the dedication of the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory at Florida State in 1994. The National Science Foundation established the \$100 million magnet lab in 1990 at FSU, which is partnered in research with the Los Alamos National Laboratory and the University of Florida. A Nobel laureate in physics and a top Russian physicist were among the first scholars drawn to the faculty. The world's largest


magnet — two stories high and capable of generating 45 tesla or 1 million times the Earth's magnetic field — was installed in 1995 at the NHMFL, located in the off-campus research complex, Innovation Park. In 1996, the NSF renewed and increased by 50 percent the NHMFL's funding for another five years.


- FSU created the first multipurpose student identification/banking card. The Card Application Technology Center is a national leader in "smart card" systems.
- At the forefront of supercomputing since obtaining its first high-speed computer in 1985, FSU took yet another step in ultrafast and parallel computing in 1990 when it acquired **two supercomputers**, the Thinking Machine Corp. Connection Machine and the Cray Y-MP.
- In fall 1994, the first tenants moved into the east side of the \$100 million University Center, a classroom-and-office facility at Doak Campbell Stadium; the stadium's south end zone also was enclosed and the adjacent Moore Athletic Center expanded. With the completion of the west side in 1996, University Center now provides 550,000 square feet of much needed academic space and a centralized location for student services.
- In 1990, Florida State ranked second in popularity nationwide among high school seniors, based on the number of students who request that their Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores be sent to an institution. FSU was the only institution listed among the top 10 choices of both black and white college-bound students.
- FSU's high-tech program in **structural biology** in 1991 received the University's largest single foundation grant, \$4 million.
- Capping more than a decade of national prominence in intercollegiate athletics, Florida State's athletic teams, nicknamed "Seminoles," joined the Atlantic Coast Conference as its ninth member in 1990. The FSU football team won the 1993 National Championships and its quarterback, Charlie Ward, won the University's first Heisman Trophy. The 1999 team also won the National Championship going undefeated and wire-to-wire number one in the polls.
- The Dr. Bobby E. Leach Center, a state-of-the-art student recreation facility, with a pool, saunas, basketball and racquet-sport courts, was completed in 1991.
- FSU ranked 20th in the nation for 1990-91 in the number of Black Ph.D. students it graduates. Over the five years, 1986 to 1990, FSU ranked eighth nationally by awarding doctorates to 70 African Americans.

As this list of highlights attests, Florida State is excelling in the 1990's with exceptional strength, energy and vision for the future. Under the leadership of the University's 12th president, **Talbot "Sandy" D'Alemberte,** who took office in January 1994, FSU will continue to build on the foundation of its history of excellence in scholarship, research and service.

A senior member of the 10-member State University System, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act and began in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

Today, FSU's operating budget is \$474.3 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$102 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the University: FSU Foundation, which raises millions in private gifts to support academics, Seminole Boosters

and FSU Alumni Association.

acres in Tallahassee; FSU, which has one of the smallest campuses in the SUS, has been actively acquiring land in the 1990s after years of being landlocked at 347 acres. FSU owns 1,281 acres in Leon, Bay, Franklin and Sarasota counties. Within the state, the University maintains facilities at its 25-acre campus in Panama City, its Marine Laboratory on the Gulf of Mexico, the Appleton Museum in Ocala and the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Augustus B. Turnbull III Florida State Conference Center on the edge of the campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

Florida State offers 286 graduate and undergraduate degree programs through its eight colleges — Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering (operated jointly with Florida A&M University, a historically Black institution); Human Sciences; Law; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the Reubin Askew School of Public Administration and Policy) — and eight schools


— Criminology and Criminal Justice; Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.


With 1,655 members, the FSU faculty has included nine National Academy of Sciences elected members, nine American Academy of Arts and Sciences fellows and five Nobel laureates. It is backed by 2,887 administrative/professional and support staff.

Library holdings at Florida State include 2.1 million book titles, 16,384 serials and 4.5 million micro-forms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked by computer to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library is located at the heart of the University's science research complex. FSU also maintains extensive music, library science and law libraries.

Graduate students, who number more than 5,929, pursue advanced degrees in fields as diverse as business administration and theoretical particle physics. A majority of research done at FSU is the direct result of student effort, culminating in numerous books, monographs and journal articles relating to the whole spectrum of intellectual interests and the practical needs of society.

FSU, a residential campus, places a high priority on its **35,019** students and their needs and interests (of the student population: 45 percent are male; 55 percent are female; 20.1 percent are minorities; and 2.5 percent are foreign students). The University Honors Program, Disabled Student Services, International Student Center, Student Government, Flying High Circus and intramural sports are among more than 200 organizations and activities in which students may participate. In all areas of its mission — excellence in teaching, research and public service — Florida State University is advancing boldly toward the 21st century.







1999 Review

Under first-year head coach Patrick Baker, the Seminole soccer program began to lay the foundation for what will be a nationally recognized program in the near future. During the 1999 season, the Seminoles made great strides towards that goal. They not only defeated a ranked team on the road, but the Seminoles showed improved play in the conference.

FSU opened their season in Gainesville versus the defending National Champion, and fourth-ranked, Florida Gators. Despite a 5-1 loss, the game provided the Seminoles with a piece of history as April Murphy scored the only goal Florida State has ever recorded against the Gators.

The Noles opened their home schedule by falling to the Miami Hurricanes 3-0. Despite controlling play for most of the game, FSU couldn't seem to cash in on their opportunities. "It was really frustrating that we would dominate play and not execute on certain situations," said head coach Patrick Baker. The Seminoles notched their first victory of the 1999 season with a 4-1 win over the Mercer Bears.

Florida State went on to record three more wins without allowing a goal. The Seminoles shutout South Florida 1-0, Stetson 4-0 and Florida International 3-0. The win over South Florida was FSU's first victory of the season against a ranked opponent. USF entered the game ranked No. 10 in the Southeast Region rankings. The victory over Stetson gave the Noles a winning record (3-2) and an impressive showing in a game that was broadcast regionally on the Sunshine Network. "Whether it was the television game or being an in-state rival, we knew they would come out hungry," said Baker. FSU recorded its fourth straight win by scoring three unanswered goals against FIU in the second half.



The Seminoles traveled to Chapel Hill for their Atlantic Coast Conference season opener against No. 2 North Carolina. The loss to the eventual National Champion Tarheels broke FSU's four game win streak. The Seminoles next faced Wake Forest, the Southeast Region's 6th rated team. Despite a 2-1 loss, the Noles played well on the road and continued to show improvement against ACC competition. Florida State also impressed the pollsters with their play as they entered the NSCAA Southeast Region rankings for the first time since October 28, 1996.



The Southeast Region's 10th ranked team concluded its four game road trip at Clemson by dropping their third straight ACC match. The Seminoles finally returned home to face the Georgia Bulldogs who were ranked No. 5 in the Southeast. FSU recorded their biggest win of the season by shuttingout the Bulldogs 2-0. Coach Baker talked about the victory after the game, "This is a really big win for us. Georgia had better possessions and lots of opportunities but we did a good job of absorbing the pressure and making the plays happen." The Noles recorded their fourth straight home win by defeating South Alabama 5-1. Five different players scored for the Seminoles versus South Alabama. The wins over UGA and South Alabama landed FSU in the NSCAA regional rankings at No. 10 for the third time in the 1999 season.

The Seminoles continued their strong play and recorded their third and fourth straight victories with wins over Jacksonville (4-1) and Wright State (3-0). The win over Wright State improved the Noles to 8-5 and eclipsed 1998's mark of seven wins. "I'm excited for the team, getting win number eight. We've topped last year's seven wins and still have six games left" Baker said. With a road trip to the No. 9 Virginia Cavaliers and No. 21 Texas A&M Aggies coming up, coach Baker knew how tough things could become, "We plan on working extremely hard this week knowing we have two tough games this weekend."



The hard work the Noles put in paid off despite dropping games to No. 8 Virginia (1-0) and No. 22 Texas A&M (2-1), Florida State proved it could go on the road and challenge nationally ranked teams for 90 minutes. The strong showing the previous weekend couldn't compensate for the disappointment in their next ACC match against NC State. The Noles jumped out to a 2-0 lead only to give up two second half goals and miss out on the opportunity to get their first ACC win of the season. "We've been stressing to our freshman that we're not only fighting the 11 players on the other side but we are also fighting history," said coach Baker. "We've only won three games in the ACC since this program began and our players need to understand what we are fighting here."

The Noles dropped their next match to No. 21 Duke but still had an impressive 5-2-1 record at home. The Seminoles headed to Auburn next to face the Tigers in their final road game of the regular season. The 4-0 win at Auburn was the fifth shutout of the season for FSU and concluded the Noles away schedule with a mark of 4-5-0. The Seminoles lost their season finale to Maryland (1-0) but ended the regular season with the second most victories in the history of the program (9-9-1). "I am very proud of our seniors. They have done a good job this season leading this team. I'm pleased with the overall performance of our team this season," Baker commented after the loss to Maryland.

The Seminoles opened up the ACC tournament against the third-ranked, and No. 1 seed, North Carolina Tarheels. For the ninth time in a row, UNC defeated the Noles in the second closest match in the history of the series. The 4-0 loss was an improvement over the first match less the two months before the tournament.

In 1999, Florida State recorded the second most victories in the history of the program, they posted a streak of six home games without a loss, they doubled the number of shoutouts they recorded in 1998 and they tied the longest winning streak in team history, twice. The Seminoles also broke into the Southeast Regional Rankings for the first time since 1996 spending four weeks as the No. 10 team in the region. Florida State made positive strides in 1999 and will carry some confidence into the 2000 season. A strong group of veterans combined with the nations 13th best recruiting class have the Noles poised to make their move in the best soccer conference in America.

This Is The ACC

The Tradition

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 48th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 79 national championships, including 39 in men's competition and 40 in women's. In addition, 119 men and 29 women have earned the coveted title of NCAA champion.

1999-2000 in Review

The 1999-2000 academic year concluded with the league pocketing four more national team titles and five individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 36 national team titles the last 10 years.

The Championship

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2000-01 academic year - 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954 at NC State. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University. Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

The History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C.,

The ACC has won 32 national team titles in the last nine years.

The ACC's 1999-2000 national champions were Maryland in field hockey and women's lacrosse, North Carolina in women's soccer and Florida State in football. Overall, ACC teams posted a 62-46 (.574) mark in NCAA Tournament play.

The ACC placed at least one team in the Top 10 nationally in 19 of the 25 sports sponsored by the league. Other records of note during the 1999-2000 season include 90 teams competing at NCAA Championships, five bowl teams and 34 Top 10 showings.

Fourteen ACC teams, in ten different sports, representing seven of the nine member institutions, earned a No. 1 ranking during the course of the past academic year.

The ACC Academic Honor Roll record was broken for the 13th-straight year in 1999-2000 as 1,631 studentathletes were recognized for their work in the classroom. with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest — drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971 when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation. The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The Atlanta school withdrew from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State.





FSU Support Services

Academic Support

Academic, personal and professional support are essential to college success. At Florida State University, we have developed an outstanding support program which enables student-athletes to reach their full potential.

FSU's academic support philosophy is "to offer an academic support program integrated with the total university that will assess all student-athletes with the transition into college and provide continued support in all phases of academic and professional development culminating with graduation, job placement or graduate school."

To accomplish this goal, FSU has developed an academic environment which facilitates the academic success of student-athletes. Student success is encouraged through competent academic counseling, career exploration, planning and placement and academic assistance through tutorial programs and mentors.

The program operates on a "proactive" rather "reactive" approach. At Florida State, the academic staff does not wait for an academic crisis to occur. They gather important background information and build an academic profile on all student-athletes to assess their needs in advance. Coaches also stay informed on the daily progress of each student athlete.

The academic support services are located in the state-ofthe-art University Center and are on the sixth floor of the \$126 million facility. It includes private study carrels, a tutorial study area and a computer lab outfitted with 16 new IBM computers and laser printers. In addition, athletic sky boxes are utilized for group and individual tutorial instruction.

FSU offers 16 Schools and Colleges with 99 undergraduate degrees and 75 post-baccalaureate degrees.

Mark Meleney became Florida State's Director of Athletic Academic Support Programs in 1997 and brings 13 years of advising experience to the position. Over the past six years, Meleney has played an integral role in the development of a comprehensive program of student athlete support, which in 1996 won the "Program of Excellence" award from Athletic Management Magazine.

A native of Iowa, Meleney began his college education at Buena Vista College, where he earned varsity letters in football and baseball. Upon transferring to Florida State, he earned Bachelor's degrees in Management and Finance in 1986 and received a Master's in Athletic Administration from FSU in 1997. He is currently pursuing his Ph.D. in Athletic Administration.

Meleney oversees an academic staff comprised of five academic counselors, an administrative assistant, several graduate assistants, individualized learning specialists and a cadre of about 70 tutors and mentors.

Meleney and his wife Sarah are the parents of a six-year-old daughter, Montana Shea.

Walter Goffigan is in his first year with the FSU Athletic Academic Support Staff where he currently serves as the Academic Counselor for soccer and football.

Goffigan is responsible for coordinating support services for student-athletes, monitoring their academic

progress and counseling them on academic issues such as course and major selection, study habits and eligibility requirements.

During his tenure at the University of Wyoming, Goffigan spent more than five years working as an academic advisor. He spent three years at the Center for Academic Advising working with the College of Arts and Sciences and then worked for two and a half years with the athletic department as an Academic Counselor for men's and women's soccer, men's and women's track, men's and women's swimming, wrestling and football. Goffigan graduated from the University of Wyoming with a Bachelor's degree in Liberal Arts and a minor in education. He is currently pursuing his Master's degree in Athletic Administration.

In addition to his counseling duties, Goffigan was a four-time letterwinner and captain of the University of Wyoming football team during his senior season in 1983. He was a high school All-American who set the career rushing record at the University of Wyoming. Goffigan was named a sophomore All-American in 1981 by *The Sporting News* and was All-Conference in the WAC three of his four years. Goffigan played four years in the National Football League with the Dallas Cowboys and Denver Broncos.


Goffigan has been married to his wife Julie for 16 years and they have three sons and a daughter.

Strength and Conditioning


Strength/Conditioning

A native of Hernando, Fla., Dawson attended Florida State earning her undergraduate degree in Physical Education in April of 1992 and her Master's in Athletic Administration in April of 1996.

Weight Room

The Tully Gymnasium weight room took on a whole new look following a complete renovation in 1996 and additional improvements have been made to the facility every year since. The weight room went from 1,500 square feet to 3,500 square feet in size in 1996, fresh with a new stereo system, drop ceil-

ing, lighting and mondo rubber flooring. Over \$140,000 worth of new exercise equipment was added to the Lady Seminole weight room, including 16 cardiovascular pieces such as Life Fitness, Stairmaster and Textrix. The facility was expanded to 4,500 square feet this past summer with a new squat rack and platform.

Medical Care and Treatment

An athlete can expect to receive the best care and treatment possible from the athletic training staff at Florida State University. Prior to competition, all FSU student-athletes undergo screening in order to detect any potential injuries. If a problem is detected, the athlete may be placed on a prevention care system which may include any kind of treatment from icing to exercising. Trainer Angela Sehgal will handle the athletic training duties for the seminole soccer program.

Angela Sehgal came to Florida State in 1988 as a graduate assistant athletic trainer after graduating from Anderson (Indiana) University with honors and a double major in athletic training and physical education. Sehgal returned to FSU in 1991 after a short stint as a head athletic trainer at a high school in Virginia and has pursued her doctoral degree. She is a member of the National Athletic Trainers Association and is also a certified Red Crodd CPR/First Aid instructor. She not only works closely with team physicians, but also provides evaluation and

advanced first aid, injury prevention, rehabilitation, counseling and guidance, education and administration. Nutrition counseling and drug testing are also responsibilities of the athletic training team which is dedicated to providing the best care possible for all FSU studentathletes.

Though the prevention of injuries is the main objective, some injuries are unavoidable. Rehabilitation is another facet of the Florida State training room. The FSU athletic

training staff will work with the athlete and provide an intense rehabilitation schedule that will allow the athlete to successfully recover after an injury. Some injuries and illnesses may be referred to the Seminole team physicians at the Tallahassee Orthopedic Center, who, for many years, have worked in conjunction with the FSU athletic training staff in successfully rehabilitating athletes

after an injury.

Drug testing is also the responsibility of the athletic training team. This program is dedicated to providing the best care possible for all FSU student-athletes.


athletes to improve their speaking skills, develop effective communication and impact the lives of others through their service as role models in our community.


to achieve their greatest potential and use their leadership skills to positively influence others.

NCAA Complian

Compliance for prospective student athletes. It is intended as a guideline to introduce some of the rules governing NCAA athletic involvement.

Only Florida State University coaches who have successfully completed the NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination on an annual basis may be involved in the recruitment process. Representatives of our athletics interests may not make any recruiting contacts. This includes letters, telephone calls or face-to-face contact on or off campus with a prospect or the prospect's

Key Terms You Should Know

You become a prospective student-athlete if you have started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, you become a prospective student-athlete if the college provides you (or your relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide to prospective students generally.

A contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's legal guardian and an institutional staff member or athletic representative during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of greeting. NOTE: At the Division I level, athletic represen-

tatives (boosters) may not contact you for the purpose of recruiting. A college coach may contact you in person off the college campus beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year in high school.

An evaluation is any off-campus activity designed to access your academic qualifications or athletic ability, including any visit to your high school (during which no contact occurs) or the observation of any practice or competition in which you participate.

During your senior year, you can have one expense-paid official visit to a particular campus. You may receive no more than five visits. During your official visit, which may not exceed 48 hours, you may receive round-trip transportation between your home and the campus, and you (and your parents) may receive meals, lodging and complimentary admission to campus athletics events.

Phone Calls and Letters

Phone calls from faculty members and coaches (but not boosters) are permitted beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year. A college coach or faculty member is limited to one telephone call per week except when it is:

- During the five days immediately before your official visit to the university
- On the day of a coach's off-campus contact
- During the time beginning with the initial National Letter of Intent signing date in your sport through the two days after signing date

The following information is provided Letters from coaches and faculty members (but not boosters) are not perby the Florida State Office of mitted until September 1 at the beginning of your junior year in high school. A Division I university may provide you with the following printed materials:

- General correspondence, including letters, U.S. Postal Service post cards and institutional note cards
- Who is Permitted to Recruit for FSU? Game programs which may not include posters and one Student Athlete Handbook can be provided only during official or unofficial visits to the university's campus
 - NCAA educational information
 - Pre-enrollment information subsequent to signing a National Letter of Intent with the university
 - One athletic publication which may include only one color of printing inside the covers
 - Official academic, admissions and student services publications published or videotapes produced by the institution and available to all students
 - Schedule cards
 - Questionnaires which may be provided prior to your iunior vear
 - Summer camp brochures which may be provided prior to your junior

Alumni and Boosters Do's and Don'ts

You may forward information about prospective student-athletes to the appropriate coaches.

You may have contact with a prospect regarding permissible preenrollment activities such as summer employment, provided the prospect has already signed a National Letter of Intent and the Compliance Office is aware that you are making these contacts in regard to employment.

You may have a telephone conversation with a prospect only if the prospect initiates the call. Such a call may not be prearranged by an institutional staff member and you are not permitted to have a recruiting conversation, but may exhibit normal civility. You must refer any questions about our athletics programs to an athletics department staff member/coach.

You may view a prospect's contest at your own initiative provided you do not contact the prospect or his/her parents. In addition, you may not contact a prospect's coach, principal, or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.

You may continue established family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with sons and daughters of these families are permitted as long as they are not made for recruiting purposes or encouraged by Florida State University coaches.

You may not become involved in making arrangements to receive money or financial aid of any kind for a prospect or the prospect's family and friends.


You may not make contact with a prospective student-athlete and his/her parents when the prospect is on campus for an official or unofficial recruiting visit.

You may not transport, pay or arrange for payment of transportation costs for a prospect, and his/her relatives or friends to visit campus (or elsewhere).

You may not pay or arrange for payment of summer camp registration fees for a prospect.

You may not provide anything to a prospect, the prospect's family or friends without prior approval from the athletics' Compliance Office.


