

1981 National Champions 1982

In 1981, Florida State received its first women's national championship when the softball team won it all. Less than a month later, the FSU golf team added a championship banner to the fold. But in 1982, the softball squad was able to accomplish what few collegiate teams in any sport have ever done; FSU won its second consecutive national championship in only the second year that the championship had existed.

The 1981 series involved four close games. The final game with North Carolina came down to the third out in the seventh inning before the Seminoles escaped with a 4-1 win and their first championship trophy.

In 1982, FSU outclassed the tournament field. No team came within 15 runs of the Tribe before Florida was defeated in the championship game 9-4.

Over the two championship seasons, Florida State won 110 games, including a school record 56 in 1982, and lost just 17.



A year ago, head coach JoAnne Graf was asked how she planned to top 1981's national championship. "Go out and win it again," she replied. That's exactly what Graf's 1982 squad did. Now the goal of the 1983 squad becomes "Go For Three."

Although Graf is not sure who will be hosting that championship this year, her immediate concerns lie with her team where a small patching job will need to be undertaken to fill in some voids created by graduation.

"We lost three of our four starting outfielders and the right side of our infield, so our biggest weakness is going to be the lack of experience in certain areas," the fifth year coach says. "It's going to take a lot of time to figure out who will play where."

One position Graf won't have to worry about is shortstop where Broderick and Olympia Award winner Darby Cottle returns. Cottle's list of honors seems endless, but it should suffice to say that she is the heartbeat of the Florida State team. Cottle batted .459 a year ago and led the team in hits (96), runs (74), doubles (11) and home runs (10).

Sophomore Kelly Shaw returns at third base for her second season as a starter. The Washington native batted .413 and led the team in walks (17). Toney Donaldson, returning for her senior year at catcher, didn't commit an error in 1982. She also provided plenty of offensive punch, batting .444 with eight homers and led the team in RBI's (65).

The right side of the infield will be made up of new faces. Kelly Tillman, after two years as a backup to the graduated Jan Sikes, appears ready to take over as the starter at second base. Tillman, who appeared in just about half the games last year, is currently recovering from a foot injury.

First base lost Sandie Williams, who left school, but the Seminoles seem to be in good hands here too. LeAnn Harrell, a part-time starter last season, will get the starting nod. Harrell handled the ball 172 times, committing just two errors for a .989 fielding percentage.

Also returning in the infield are Carla Long and Wendy Davis. Long backed up third base last year but will probably be used more extensively in a backup role at other infield positions, too. Davis, a sophomore, will also be tried at different infield positions. The Pensacola native was the squad's most valuable pinch hitter in 1982 and will probably resume that role this spring.

Newcomers to the infield include freshman Greta Bahn and walkon Robin Thomas. Bahn should serve as Cottle's backup at shortstop while Thomas will see most of her playing time as a backup catcher or first baseman.

The pitching is in the capable hands of Susan Painter, a two-year starter who sports a 61-7 career record although plagued by a knee injury last year which caused her to miss over a dozen games. Painter, along with Cottle, is a returning All-American. Providing relief should Painter need it will be junior college transfer Cricket Olafson, who is listed as an outfielder. The multi-talented Olafson was All-American in summer play as a pitcher.


The outfield is the most inexperienced area for FSU. Two-year starter Cathy Gooding will provide the bulk of the leadership from her short field position. Olafson, who played last year at Florida Junior College, looks like a can't-miss prospect in right field. The remaining two positions will be open for four candidates to fight for. Two year player Sunnie O'Neal, a basketball player during the winter, is a favorite for one position while junior college transfers Dina Cooper and Teresa Collins and freshman Tammi Terrell are also candidates. Freshman Robin Pace is probably scheduled for backup duty.

"We have more power and better hitters than we've ever had," says Graf. "Depth-wise we're also stronger. The players seem to get better and better every year. We don't have a weak player. I really think any of our players could start for any school in the state. We're double stacked everywhere."

Florida State's schedule is almost a carbon-copy of its last two. A close look will reveal that the team's season will get underway earlier and it won't last as long either. "We're not going to play quite as many games as we have the last two years," says Graf. "We'll have anywhere from 48 to 55 games this year whereas in the past we've had over 65 games. We'll be in a few less tournaments."

Florida State will be entered in five invitationals—the Lady Gator, the Friendly City, South Florida's and N.C. State's Invitationals and its own, the Lady Seminole Invitational. In late April, a state championship will be held in Jacksonville, Fla. But from there, Graf doesn't know exactly where her team could go.

"There are a couple of organizations who have agreed to sponsor a national championship," she says. "Right now we're not sure who it will be. But we know that there will be something to shoot for."



Wherever Florida State ends up, most agree that it will probably include another run for the national title. "We lost a whole lot of kids off those last two national championship says teams, Graf. "They had a lot of experience and they were character ball players. I know that the returning kids think they can win the thing again. But the new players have got to learn that. Winners keep on winning.

Coaching Staff

JoAnne Graf Head Coach



Florida State softball has been a big winner since JoAnne Graf took over the program's leadership in 1979. In four years as head coach, she has led her teams to four consecutive state titles (1979 — 82), two region championships (1981–82) and back-to-back national championships (1981–82). Her

record during that period is a gaudy 173-42, a winning percentage of .805.

Nineteen of Graf's players have been named to the all-state team during her four year tenure and 15 have earned spots on the all-region team. For the last two years, Florida State has placed five players on the all-championship team at the national tournament and in 1983, five players made the first All-American team.

A 1975 graduate of Florida State, Graf returned to her alma mater as head coach in 1978. Prior to that, she was earning her master's degree in physical education at North Carolina-Greensboro while coaching three of the school's sports teams. She was head coach of the men's and women's swimming teams and assistant softball coach. In 1977, the softball team was the NCAIAW state champion.

While an undergraduate at Florida State, Graf was a member of both the tennis and softball teams. She served as co-captain for the 1974 and 1975 softball squads that finished second in the state softball tournament.

Graf, who directs Florida State's softball camp each summer, has served as a chairperson for slow pitch softball on the state, regional and national levels.

She is presently pursuing her doctorate degree in administration at Florida State and needs just a dissertation to earn it.

Her coaching philosophy is simple. "My job is to help the athlete develop to her greatest potential as an athlete and as a person," she says. "I care about the quality of my coaching and the quality of my program. When I recruit an athlete, I'm going to do the best possible job I can for her and I think she will give me 100 percent in return."

Winnie Dodgion Assistant Coach



Returning for her second season as assistant softball coach is Winnie Dodgion, who joined the Seminole staff in January of 1982 with experience as both a player and coach.

Prior to joining the Tribe program, Dodgion taught physical education and coached the softball

team at Liberty Junior High School in Orlando. She also has coached at the University level; in 1979 and again for three months in 1981 she was assistant coach at the University of Central Florida. She was head softball coach at Boone High School from 1974–75.

Dodgion, a 1979 graduate of Central Florida, was a varsity softball player at the school from 1975 until 1978. Following graduation, she played for the "Dots" slow pitch softball team in Miami, where the squad won the national Open championship in 1979. As a player/coach for the national champion Orlando Stars in 1981, she was MVP of the national tournament. She also received the Golden Glove award in the regional tournament and was named Metro Tournament MVP that same year.

Dodgion's responsibilities at FSU include the fall conditioning program and working with the outfielders and pitchers. She is also involved in recruiting and handles administrative duties.



Florida State Athletic Leaders



C.W. "Hootie" Ingram Athletic Director

C.W. "Hootie" Ingram is in his second year as Florida State's athletic director. He came to the post in 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeastern Conference.

Since coming to Florida State, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities that will include a new athletic administration building and improvements to the football sta-

dium, baseball complex and swimming pool area.

Ingram had been associated with the SEC office for eight years. He was first an assistant commissioner before being named associate commissioner (1978).

A native of Tuscaloosa, Al., the home of the University of Alabama, Ingram played football for the Crimson Tide from 1951 through 1954. He was all-SEC as a sophomore when he led the nation in pass interceptions.

After an Army stint, Ingram turned to coaching. He started as an assistant at Bradenton (FI.) Manatee High School and was later head coach at Tuscaloosa High School for three years.

He later moved into college coaching and had stops at Wake Forest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas as an assistant. His only college football head coaching assignment began in 1970 when he succeeded the veteran Frank Howard as head coach at Clemson. Three years later he joined the SEC as assistant commissioner.



Barbara Palmer Associate Athletic Director

Barbara Palmer has been with the Florida State athletic program since 1977. As associate athletic director, Palmer is in charge of the women's athletic program.

Since her arrival on campus, the FSU women's program has grown to the point where it is now considered among the top five programs in the country.

All eight women's sports have turned

in winning records over the past three years. There have been three national championships won, including back-to-back titles by the softball team in 1981 and 1982. And finally, last season Florida State sent every team to a national tournament, a feat accomplished by only one other school in the nation.

Simply put, Barbara Palmer has been the energy behind that climb toward national excellence. She was directly responsible for the funding FSU women's athletics receives from the state legislature each year. It was Palmer's lobbying that pushed Title IX legislation through the state government in 1980.

So great has been Palmer's impact on the growth of women's athletics in the state of Florida that she was chosen to the inaugural Women's Florida Hall of Fame by Governor Bob Graham last summer. She was one of just six women elected from a field of 226 candidates.

Palmer joined Florida State after serving four years as executive director of a private leisure and recreation services organization. A long-time resident of Tallahassee, Palmer graduated from FSU in 1970 and earned a master's degree in leisure services in 1974.

This is Florida State



Florida State University, nestled in the center of Florida's capital city, is home to more than 22,000 students from all over the nation and from 115 foreign countries. FSU was founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee. Today, the main campus, with more than 340 green acres, is one of the prettiest in the South. Camellias, azaleas and dogwoods blossom under towering moss-draped oaks from the stately Gothic-styled structures on the eastern end of campus to the contemporary science complex on the west. FSU has grown and changed with the times. Enrollment has quadrupled since the school became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as FSCW — Florida State College for Women.

Today, students at Florida State can choose from more than 100 career options made available by 14 schools and colleges including arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theatre and visual arts. Also, the FAMU/FSU Institute for Engineering began this fall.

The University's location in the capital city of Florida affords excellent study and research opportunities in the areas of government, social sciences and policy sciences. Additionally, the presence of state government provides widespread opportunities for internships and on-the-job study.

In terms of scientific research, FSU excells as a basic research-oriented university. The nuclear physics laboratory is ranked by the National Science Foundation as one of the top four in the nation. FSU also maintains a large marine laboratory on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico.

Florida State counts among its faculty six members of the National Academy of Sciences, including Paul Dirac, a Nobel Prize winner in physics. Kurt Waldheim, former secretary general of the United Nations, recently joined the university faculty as a distinguished visiting lecturer in international relations and law.

The University is home to the only collegiate circus in the country. The Flying High Circus carries a reputation of quality, professional aerial and stage entertainment for children of all ages.

But it's not just good programs that make the university great. As President Bernard Sliger proclaims, it's the people who make Florida State the successful monument to learning that it is. And he takes special pride in the people — students, faculty, administrators and staff — who are Florida State University.
