

Media Information

Credentials

Required for all events where an admission is charged. Please contact the sports information office at least one week before event to be covered. Space for the working press, radio, television and scouts is allocated by the Sports Information Office.

Press Parking

Passes not required except for games at the Leon County Civic Center. For those events, make request at same time credentials are issued. Ample parking may be found in Doak Campbell stadium lots for baseball games and around Tully Gym area for basketball, track, and tennis events.

Photographers

Only accredited photographers will be issued working credentials. All still photographers must shoot from designated areas. Space for video cameras for certain events will be assigned by the Sports Information Office.

Statistical Services

Complete statistics will be provided for all basketball and baseball games. Additional services will be provided as requested for all other events.

Telecopiers

Two telecopiers are owned by the Sports Information Office. These will be made available on a first come - first served basis, free of charge.

Telephones

Telephone service for visiting radio stations should be secured directly through Centel Telephone Company of Florida, phone (904) 222-2236. For baseball, Seminole Flagship Station WTNT radio has installed a visitor's radio line that may be used free of charge on a reciprocal basis. Call (904) 386-6143 for more information.

Interviews

All interviews with Florida State coaches and athletes should be arranged through the Sports Information Office. For phone interviews, the SID office will fill out a call card, instructing the athlete who to call and at what time the call should be placed. All athlete calls to the media will be on a collect basis.

Sports At Florida State



They show it off every year at the prestigeous Lady Seminole Tournament in March.



When the Lady Seminoles play Volleyball, Tully Gym is electric. This sport has come so far in capturing the sports fans of this capital city that the seating capacity has been expanded. This is another sport in which Florida State has been represented in the NCAA playoffs. So popular is the game in Tallahassee and so powerful is the FSU program, that plans are in the works to host a regional playoff.

Baseball at Florida State has long been the pacesetter among the nation's colleges. The reasons why go back to the program's roots. Never has a Seminole baseball team had a losing record. Only two schools have appeared in more NCAA Regionals; and all of that against the toughest schedule in college baseball. Such a showcase of the sport it is, that Florida State plays it's games in a shining million dollar baseball park, unmatched in this part of the country. A Seminole baseball player spends 11 months a year playing the game, with fall, summer and spring programs affording him the opportunity to play an incredible 150 games a year.





What a proud tradition there is in track and field at Florida State. The Lady Seminoles recently added the latest of the national titles to the heritage by winning the 1984 NCAA Championships in Eugene, Ore. Incredibly, they had finished third and second in the two previous years. Members of the Lady Seminole track team have earned 51 All-American titles since 1982. That is about as close to domination of a sport as you'll find. The mens' track team continues to uphold its own proud tradition. Not, only the leader in its own state, this team has won The Metro Confrence title for eight consecutive years. And Florida State's prowess in this sport, too is aided by a newly renovated and upgraded track and field stadium. Utilizing the annual site of the prestigeous Domino's Pizza relays, no other track athletes in the area have the advantages that these Seminoles do in terms of training facilities and coaching.





1985 FSU Softball

OUTLOOK



If the old phrase "success breeds success" means anything, the Florida State University women's softball team is in for a heck-of-a season.

The Lady Seminoles, coming off a 41-5-2 inaugural fast-pitch season, are returning a solid nucleus of top players. Among that group are pitchers Tina Kyler, Shelley Berube and Monica Lawfield.

The success of the 1984 Seminoles had a lot to do with Kyler's 16-4-2 throwing mark. With those 16 wins came 16 shutouts; Kyler's 11.6

strikeouts per game led the college ranks in 1984.

Berube had her name plastered all over NCAA pitching records with an 8.0 per game strikeout mark and an ERA of 0.24 - good enough for sixth and fourth in the country, respectively. Her 18-1 record was tops on the team. Lawfield posted a 6-0 record last year and may be called on for duty in the outfield as well this season.

Overall, Florida State was fifth nationally in team ERA at 0.41 earned runs given up per contest.

Seminole head coach JoAnne Graf looks for a more experienced and potent offense to go with her talented pitching corps in 1985.

"Last year our offense was lacking," the seventh-year coach said. "With the institution of the fast-pitch game, our girls were just not accustomed to the type of offense we needed to play."

One player who is familiar with fast-pitch hitting is west coast transfer, Laurie Holler. A good hitter, she was sought to compensate for the loss of last year's power hitters, Teresa Collins and Sunnie O'Neal. Collins and O'Neal were listed as leaders in the NCAA for their ability to hit the long ball.

Another returning player who should help out in the hitting department is junior shortstop Greta Bahn. Bahn led Graf's 1984 squad in hitting with a .331 average and 25 runs batted in.

In addition to Holler and Bahn, Graf expects Kyler, Lawfield, Amy Snider and Leslie Miller to form the nucleus of the offense. Snider is battling for one of the outfield positions while Miller is the starting catcher again in 1985. Miller will have plenty of relief behind the plate with sophomores Laurie Tiedt and Heidi Nelson behind her. Dunwoody, Georgia native Tiedt saw action in 27 games last season and collected 17 hits. Nelson hit .333 in 10 games.

Defensively, Graf expects her squad to be solid. Four returning players man the middle of the diamond with Miller at catcher, Bahn at shortstop, Wendy Rogers (formerly Davis) at second and Kelly Shaw in centerfield. Both Rogers and Shaw are three-year letterwomen.

Holler comes in to play third while Palm Beach Junior College transfer Barbara Gillespie takes over at first. Gillespie played slow-pitch ball the past two years at PBJC, but Graf doesn't expect her to have too many problems with the faster game.

Two outfield spots are "up for grabs" according to Graf. Judi Davison, a promising newcomer, was expected to start immediately in left field. However, she suffered a shoulder injury and is not expected back for the opening of the season. Snider and Lawfield are leading candidates for the slots, but Gillespie, Tiedt and freshman pitcher Julie Larsen may also be used.

"We lost a lot of players off last year's squad, so I have to consider this a rebuilding year for us," Graf said. "This is only our second year of fast-pitch and we're still adjusting to that too."

Even in the "rebuilding" year, Graf set lofty goals for her 1985 squad. Those goals include a respectable won-loss record, a top three finish in every tournament they play, including the tough Texas A&M Invitational, and if the season goes well, a bid to the NCAA Championships.

"For all those things to happen, we have to be very lucky," Graf said. "We cannot afford any injuries this year because we just don't have the depth any more. We also upgraded our schedule considerably. At least eight of the teams we see went to the NCAA's in 1983 or 84."

Florida State will play in five tournaments, its own Lady Seminole Invitational, the Nicholls State Tournament in early March and the Texas A&M and South Carolina invitationals later in the season. The last tournament will be the state championships in Tampa in April. In addition to the tournaments, Graf has scheduled 16 teams to come in to Tallahassee for doubleheaders.

Again, if "success breeds success..." opponents had better watch out for the 1985 Lady Seminoles.

Head Coach JoAnne Graf

In the past, Florida State softball coach JoAnne Graf has been regarded as one of the top coaches in the country. Last year, in an inaugural fast-pitch season, Graf was not sure how she would fare. Well, again she gained the respect of her peers, leading her squad to a 41-5-2 mark.

Before entering the fast-pitch arena, Graf had led her teams to several state, region and national tourneys. In her first four seasons at Florida State, Graf's teams won four consecutive state crowns (1979-82), two region championships ('81-'82) and two back-to-back national titles ('81-'82).

Prior to the 1984 season, Graf's five-year mark stood at 219-53 for a .805 winning percentage. Today, Graf is sporting a 260-58-2 record, a mark of .816.

In 1981, Graf was named FAIAW Softball Coach of the Year, but she is not the only member of the women's softball program to pull in the accolades. Twenty-seven of Graf's players have been named to all-state teams and 10 earned spots on all-region teams. In 1982, five players made first-team All-American and in the past national championship tournaments, 16 FSU players were named to the all-championship squads. Overall, 68 players have been named to post-season teams.

A 1975 graduate of Florida State, Graf assumed head coaching duties at her alma mater in 1978. Before that, Graf attended North Carolina-Greensboro, where she earned her master's degree in physical education. While at North Carolina-Greensboro, Graf was head coach for the men's and women's swim teams as well as assistant softball coach.

Graf was a member of both the tennis and softball teams while an undergraduate at Florida State. She was co-captain of the 1974 and 1975 softball squads that finished second in the state tourneys.

Graf, who serves as director for the Florida State softball camp, is a former president of the Florida Collegiate Athletic Association. She is also a member of the NCAA Softball Committee.

She is presently seeking her doctorate degree in administration and needs only her dissertation to complete the requirements.

Her coaching philosophy is simple. "My job is to help the athlete develop to her greatest potential as an athlete and as a person," she says. "I care about the quality of my coaching and the quality of my program. When I recruit an athlete, I'm going to do the best possible job I can do for her and I think she will give me 100 percent in return."

Assistant Coach Winnie Dodgion

Since joining JoAnne Graf's team in January of 1982 as assistant coach, Winnie Dodgion has been a valuable member of the Seminole staff. Dodgion assists Graf with the fall conditioning of the athletes and works extensively with the outfielders. She is also involved with recruiting and handles several administrative duties. Dodgion joined the Tribe program with experience as both a player and a coach. Prior to coming to FSU, Dodgion taught physical education and coached the softball team at Liberty Junior High School in Orlando. She also served as assistant coach of the softball team at the University of Central Florida in 1979 and again for three months in 1981. She was head softball coach at Boone High School from 1974-75.

Dodgion, a 1979 graduate of Central Florida, was a varsity softball player from 1975 to 1978. Following graduation, she played for the "Dot's" slow pitch softball team in Miami, where the squad won the national open championship in 1979. As a player/coach for the national champion Orlando Stars in 1981, she was MVP of the national tournament. That same year, she received the Golden Glove award in the regional tournament and was named Metro Tournament MVP.

Dodgion's playing career did not stop when she came to Tallahassee. In 1983, she was named second team ASA All-American at the Class "A" national tournament in Sacramento, California and in 1984 she earned first team All-American honors at the national championships in Midland, Texas.



Assistant Coach Jo Evans

A 1983 graduate of the University of Utah, Jo Evans is in her second season as a member of the Seminole softball program.

Prior to coming to Florida State, Evans was assistant coach of the women's softball team at the University of Utah, where she played competitively from 1978 to 1982. During her senior year, Evans was captain of the squad and won the Occie Evans Award. The award is annually given to the outstanding senior woman athlete in team sports at the University and is based on athletic ability, academic record and character. In 1980, Evans was an All-Western Athletic Conference player for the Utes.

Evans has played competitive fast-pitch softball for 14 years. She has participated in nine national tournaments and in 1980 was awarded All-American status at the Class "A" fast-pitch national tournament.

At Florida State, Evans' primary duties are coaching the pitchers and catchers. Florida State pitchers were ranked 1st and 6th nationally in strikeouts averaged per game as well as 4th in earned run average. The entire 1984 pitching staff was ranked 5th nationally in earned run average by the NCAA.

Evans is also involved in recruiting as well as other administrative duties.

Florida State's facilities are in a word. AWESOME. On this page you see part of a new \$4.5 million athletic complex...the Coyle E. Moore Athletic Center. It is the hub of FSU's Men's sports operation, housing all of the men's athletic administrators, coaches and support personnel. Amid the plush furnishings, the building boasts 11/2 basketball gymnasiums, two fully equipped weight rooms. locker rooms for each sport, two equipment rooms, a training room, a complete cafeteria and kitchen, a projection room seating more than 100, an academic work area for athletes, numerous meeting rooms board rooms and plush, spacious office suites. The entire ticket and business operations are also afforded space here.








Florida State University






Among many interesting facets, Florida State boasts the only Collegiate circus in the world.








Tallahassee

C.W. "Hootie" Ingram Athletic Director

Cecil Ingram, known to most of his friends and associates as simply "Hootie", has headed the Florida State athletic department since 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeast Conference.

Since his arrival in Tallahassee, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities, including the Moore Athletic Center...Home of Florida State athletics.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Alabama, Ingram played for the Crimson Tide from 1951 through 1954 and led the nation in interceptions as a sophomore. He also lettered in baseball as an infielder. Following a stint in the army, Ingram turned to coaching. After several years of high school coaching, Ingram moved into collegiate athletics; making assistant coaching stops at Wake Forrest, Virgina Tech, Georgia and Arkansas.





A member of the Florida State athletic staff since 1981, Bob Goin begins his fourth full year as Associate Athletic Director.

All men's non-revenue coaches report to Goin and he also assists Director Ingram in the day-to-day operations of the athletic department. A large portion of football, basketball and baseball game day operations fall under his leadership.

A 1959 graduate of Bethany College, Goin recieved his master's degree from West Virgina in 1961. From 1960-76, Goin served Bethany in several administrative and coaching capacities, before moving on to West Virgina as an assistant athletic director. He was named athletic director at California (Pa.) State College in 1980, where he formed that institutions first scholarship fund for athletics and the college's first booster club.

Charles W. EhrhardtFaculty Athletic
Committee Chairman



A Florida State University professor of law, Charles W. Ehrhardt is in his first year as Chairman of the Athletic Committee.

He is currently in his second stint on the committee, serving from 1969-71 and then being reappointed to the board in 1983. As chairman, Ehrhardt suceeds Dr. James Jones, who served in that capacity since 1980. Ehrhardt becomes Florida State's representative to the NCAA.

A native of Elkander, Iowa, Ehrhardt received his bachelor's degree from Iowa in 1962, before earning a law degree at Iowa State two years later. He came to Florida State in 1967.

A widely respected expert in the field of Evidence, Ehrhardt is frequently called on to lecture on the subject by lawyers and judges nationwide.

Barbara Palmer Associate Athletic Director



Barbara Palmer has been with Florida State athletic program since 1977. As Associate Athletic Director. Palmer is in charge of the women's athletic program and also holds the title of women's athletic director.

Since her arrival, the Florida State Lady Seminoles program has been recognized as one of the strongest in the country...with four national championship teams in the last four years (track, 1984; softball, 1981-82; and golf 1981). In 1982, all eight varsity sports went to national tournaments...one of only two schools to make the claim nationwide.

A 1970 graduate of Florida State, Palmer has been recognized as the driving force behind FSU's climb toward national excellence. Palmer headed a lobbying effort that pushed Title IX legislation through state government and she is directly responsible for state funding women's athletic recieves each year.
