Facelift Forces FSU to Realign Strategies

Quite often, when teams face a considerable loss from one year to the next, a new look goes into effect.


The 1990 Lady Seminole softball team has been through a remake since last May when it saw action in the NCAA Tournament. Gone are five seniors, four of which were starters.

The remake will not leave the Lady Seminoles unidentifiable because several players remain; they will now have more responsibilities to undertake.

Gone is the ability to carry the team, such as three-year South All-Region shortstop Tiffany Daniels was known to do. Gone is the leadership-by-example ability that dependable first baseman Lori Crouse displayed. And gone is the all-out physical strength that left-fielder Kari Keith used to throw out runners at first base from the outfield.

That's why a team effort is being stressed by head coach JoAnne Graf as she heads into her 12th season at Florida State.

Junior utility player Christy Larsen picked up 17 wins and played 26 games in the outfield to earn South All-Region status in 1989.



"We will not have the power we did last season," said Graf calculating that 11 of the team's 17 home runs left with Crouse, Daniels and Keith. "We're going to be one of those singles teams that relies on base running. We must execute better this season in certain situations. Each player must take responsibility. There will be no standout. The team will be a major aspect this year."

Looking down the roster and finding only one senior, Graf seems to contradict herself with an explanation of the experience level of her squad.

"We're a young team. But we're not young," said Graf. "We're a young team

when you look at the class breakdown and the ages of the players out on the field. But when you start looking at the experience that each of the players has, then you realize that they have played alot of softball."

The Lady Seminoles return five everyday starters

to the diamond in 1990, as well as both ends of their highly successful pitching combination which finished eighth in the nation with a 0.80 earned run average. Leading the way in the coming season will be the lone senior of the squad, pitcher Debbie DeJohn, who in three years has posted 65 wins.

In an attempt to secure their fifth NCAA postseason tournament appearance in as many years, here's how the Lady Seminoles check in position-by-position.


INFIELD: It's a half-empty or half-full situation for the Lady Seminole infield as two positions stay the same and two change personnel. At first base, Graf will test the waters with freshman Californian Toni Gutierrez and junior college transfer B.J. Hodges. While both will need time to mature as Gutierrez enters the collegiate ranks and Hodges is making a switch from slow- to fast-pitch, they will both learn and improve as the season progresses, according to Graf. Returning at second base for her third season is junior Kelly Flaczinski. Playing in 49 games, Flaczinski committed only four errors and showed she was quick on bunt coverage to first base with 147 putouts. At shortstop will be sophomore Penny Siqueiros. Moving back to her original position after spending a season in the outfield, this will be the biggest revamp of the season, Graf said. "Penny has a good head on her shoulders. When she begins to feel comfortable at the position, it will come natural to her." After a successful rookie season at third base, Shannan Mitchem will return to the position where she started 51 games in 1989. Mitchem can also be used in a backup shortstop situation while redshirt freshman Hunter LaFountain backs up Flaczinski at second and newcomer Susan Buttery, of Tampa, will provide infield depth at third base.

OUTFIELD: Three new faces will roam the Lady Seminole outfield in 1990 along with returnees Becky Harrison and Christy Larsen. Once again, the outfield rotation will be altered when Larsen is on the mound. A South All-Region selection as a utility player, Larsen played 24 games in centerfield while Harrison appeared in 16 games at a key point in the season when injuries took their toll on the Lady Seminoles. Of the three newcomers, Graf calls freshman Tina Getherall an impact player. "She could be the sparkplug of the team, one who makes things happen on the bases. And in the outfield, she does not drop anything." Jodie Bullock, an all-state and region transfer from Peoria Junior College, has been penciled in at left field and could be so consistent that no one will notice her, according to Graf. Freshman Leslie Barton could see action in the outfield as a spot starter when Larsen pitches. "Our outfielders have such speed that it will seem as if we have five fielders out there," said Graf.

BATTERY: No changes affect this part of Florida

State's game for the 1990 season. Both Debbie DeJohn, winner of 22 games last season and Christy Larsen, a 17-game winner, return to the mound for the Lady Seminoles. "The pitching looks very strong," Graf said. "Debbie is consistent and is in very good shape physi-

cally. Christy matures every year. She has always been a good thrower, but she has now learned pitching." FSU will be able to keep opposing hitters off balance with the combination of Larsen's power pitching, responsible for an average of 7.3 strikeouts per seven innings, and DeJohn's finesse. The lone senior on the team, DeJohn walked only 32 batters in 1989 in 213 innings. Should injuries or fatigue befall the FSU pitching combo, freshman Toni Gutierrez could be called to the mound.

Calling the pitches for FSU's mound corps will be the familiar face of junior Julie Rice. A starter since her freshman season, Rice has become much more sure of herself, according to Graf. "She's got good experience behind the plate," Graf said. One of only three players on the team to see action in all 53 games, Rice committed only one error in 353 chances last season. Providing backup behind the plate will be junior Lora Migliaccio, who will be in her third year at FSU.

OFFENSE: Execution, speed on the bases and manufactured runs will be the key to the Lady Semi-


nole offense in 1990 unless one of several players assumes the role of power hitter. Catcher Julie Rice is the leading candidate, with three home runs during 1989. Otherwise, baserunners such as Christy Larsen, Penny Siqueiros, Tina Getherall and Jodie Bullock will provide the spark

for the offense. Pitcher Debbie DeJohn, who hit .311 in 135 at bats last season, could once again be used in the designated player role when not pitching. Second baseman Kelly Flaczinski, last year's cleanup hitter, must produce in clutch situations.

SCHEDULE: Lady Seminole Field will be the host of 17 regular season home dates as well as the 24-team Lady Seminole Invitational. Once again, JoAnne Graf has assembled the top teams of the South region in single games or in tournament play. Florida State will host South Carolina, Southwestern Louisiana, Virginia, Nicholls State and Furman, all ranked in the South region as well as Michigan, Indiana, Connecticut, Missouri and Princeton, regionally ranked elsewhere. The Lady Seminoles will travel to participate in the Southern Invitational in Birmingham, AL, the Oklahoma State Invitational, the Chattanooga Invitational and the South Florida Invitational.

ADY SEMINOLE SOFTBALL COACHES

HEAD COACH, JOANNE GRAF 12th year, 485-119-4



Florida State Softball enters the decade of the 1990s with the same familiar face of JoAnne Graf which guided the Lady Seminoles to 459 victories through the decade of the 80s.

In her seventh year of fast-pitch competition, Graf has successfully placed Florida State among the upper echelon of national competition. For the second year in a row, the Lady Seminoles were ranked in the NCAA Coaches Poll from the beginning of the season until its conclusion.

It's no surprise good things keep coming Florida State's way in the fast-pitch game under Graf's tutelage. It's just a carry-over effect from the days of back-to-back slow-pitch national titles in 1981 and 1982.

In an effort to reach that level, Florida State has been selected for post-season play in each of the last four years. Following a playoff win over Adelphi in 1987, Florida State advanced into the Women's College World Series for the first time.

In six years of fast-pitch competition, Graf has directed the Lady Seminoles to 266 victories for a winning percentage of better than seventy-five percent. In her first five years at Florida State, she accumulated 219 wins playing the best slow-pitch competition in the nation. Her 485-119-4 overall career record checks in with an .798 winning percentage.

Graf, who was voted the South Region Coach-of-the-Year in 1986 after leading Florida State to its first NCAA post-season tournament, has seen 19 of her players elected to NCAA South All-Region teams. In 1987, FSU produced its first fast-pitch All-America in shortstop Tiffany Daniels.

A 1975 graduate of Florida State, Graf returned to her alma mater after two years at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro where she earned her master's degree in physical education. Graf also worked in the athletic department at UNC-Greensboro as head coach for the University's men's and

women's swim teams and assistant softball coach.

Graf, who serves as director of the Florida State softball camp each summer, is a former president of the Florida Collegiate Athletic Association. She is also a member of the NCAA Softball Committee and chairwoman of the NCAA softball advisory committee for the South region.

She is presently seeking her doctorate degree in administration.

Former All-American pitcher Connie Clark joins the Lady Seminole softball staff for the 1990 season. Clark brings to Florida State

several years of teaching on the national level as well as the international level. After earning a bachelor of science degree from Cal State Fullerton in Physical Education in 1987, she has worked as a private instructor at the Rod Carew Baseball School in California and conducted clinics in Tokyo, Japan; Auckland, New Zealand; and Shanghai, China.

While at Cal State Fullerton, Clark twice participated in the Women's College World Series and defeated Florida State 4-0 in the first round of the 1987 World Series. In 1986, she led the nation with a 0.18 earned run average pitching for the national championship Titan team. Her senior season she finished third in the nation with 33 wins, was named All-America and won the prestigious Broderick Award for Collegiate Softball Player of the Year.

For the Lady Seminoles, Clark will work with the nationally ranked pitching staff and assume the first base coaching duties. She will also assist JoAnne Graf in the softball recruiting process.



JACKIE SAVIS GRADUATE ASSISTANT

Beginning her second season as a graduate assistant with the Lady Seminole softball team, Jackie Savis provides Florida State with 15 years

of fast-pitch softball experience.

A native of St. Louis, Mo., Savis played at the collegiate level at the University of Minnesota. Appearing in 147 games for the Gophers, Savis was part of two Big Ten Championship teams and Minnesota's first NCAA tournament bid.

At Minnesota, Savis enjoyed a fine academic career as well, graduating with honors in psychology. A three-time Big Ten All-Academic team selection, Savis won three Patty Berg awards for academic and athletic excellence. She also received the President's Student Leadership and Service Award and the Assembly Committee on Intercollegiate Athletics Award for the outstanding graduating senior.

Savis is currently working on a master's degree in sport psychology at FSU.





THIS IS FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY

Florida State University, home of the world's fastest supercomputer, is setting the pace as higher education in the state prepares to enter the 21st century. The FSU Supercomputer Computations Research Institute attracts international attention with scientists from many nations using the University's two powerful supercomputers in their research.

The Department of Physics' Tandem Van de Graaff Superconducting Accelerator Laboratory, ranked in the top four in the nation by the National Science Foundation, houses two powerful atom smashers which also provide unique research opportunities.


Located in Tallahassee, the capital of Florida, FSU is a public, coeducational university and a senior member of the State University System. More than 26,000 students are enrolled, representing all 50 states and 100 foreign countries. The University offers more than 250 graduate and undergraduate degrees in its 15 schools and colleges. Outstanding programs in the colleges of arts and sciences, business, communication, education, engineering, home economics, law and social sciences combine with the schools of criminology, library and information studies, music, nursing, social work, theater and visual arts to make Florida State a nationally acclaimed university.

The Florida State campus, located just blocks away from the state capitol, is beautiful in all seasons. Its 347 acres mirror the picturesque features of the surrounding North Florida region. The buildings are nestled among evergreen live oaks, pines and palms, as well as hardwoods that provide fall color, and dogwoods and azaleas that are covered with a profusion of springtime blossoms.

As an institution, FSU began as coeducational Seminary West of the Suwannee River, approved by the Florida Legislature in 1851 and assigned to Tallahassee in 1857. Name changes over the years included Florida State College in 1901; then in 1905, Florida Female College and, in 1909, Florida State College for Women. Gov. Millard Caldwell signed a bill in 1947 which again made the institution coeducational and changed the name to Florida State University.

The University's location affords excellent research and internship opportunities in government, law and the social sciences. The reputation of Florida State's research programs and the expertise of its more than 1,500 faculty members—including four members of the National Academy of Sciences and four members of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences—represent major strengths of the University. FSU prides itself on pursuing academic quality while maintaining a friendly, welcoming atmosphere.

Programs in music, dance and theater at Florida State have earned well-deserved national recognition. The visual and performing arts exhibited and produced on campus offer students and the community a wealth of enrichment opportunities.



Student activities at FSU create an important balance between the classroom experience and the personal life of the individual scholar. Honors programs, student government, intramural sports and more than 200 organizations are available for student involvement. Furthermore, the Flying High Circus, the world's only all-collegiate circus, makes its home here.

Florida State academic programs extend well beyond Tallahassee. The FSU Marine Laboratory is located on the Gulf of Mexico, 45 miles away. Students participate in professional training programs at the Asolo State Theater in Sarasota and the Burt Reynolds Institute for Theatre Training in Jupiter. The Panama City Campus of Florida State offers upper-level courses which lead to bachelor's and master's degrees. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Florida State Conference Center on the edge of the main campus, manages educational outreach activities from Pensacola to Miami.

The physical growth of the University during the 11-year administration of President Bernard Sliger represents new construction expenditures of more than \$100 million. It includes such additions as the University Union expansion project, the new Paul A.M. Dirac Science Library Building, the Jeffersonian-style Village Green project at the College of Law, the new wing of the Rovetta Business Building, and the new FAMU/FSU College of Engineering at Innovation Park.

It is not only the academic programs and facilities of Florida State, but also its people—students, faculty, alumni, administrators and staff—who make this University such a proud monument to learning.
